Baluster/Balustrade Also known as a "spindle"; a vertical member in a railing. A balustrade is a run

of balusters.

**Casement Window** A side-hinged swinging window.

Most commonly available as lap siding, a product composed of wood product **Cementitious Siding** 

fibers mixed with cement.

Colonial Revival Style See discussion of this style in Section 3 Overview of Styles.

Contributing/

A Contributing Structure is one that has been determined to be important to the **Noncontributing Structure** integrity of the Historic District. Contributing Structures should be maintained

and preserved to the greatest degree possible.

Cornice A continuous projection (usually composed of boards and/or moldings) that

crowns a wall or other structure. See illustration at end of Glossary

**Dentils** Small, closely spaced square or rectangular blocks located on a cornice. See

illustration at end of Glossary.

**Double Hung Window** A window composed of two sash units which slide up and down. Typically

> classified by the number of individual panes in the upper unit compared to the number of panes in the lower unit. Thus, a "three-over-one" double hung window has three panes of glass in the upper sash and one pane of glass in the

lower sash. See illustration at end of Glossary.

The horizontal piece covering the end of rafters. See illustration at end of Fascia

Fretwork Decorative trim with a repeating pattern, typically found under eaves, in porches

and within railings.

Frieze The decorative horizontal band in a wall, typically immediately below the

cornice. See illustration at end of Glossary.

**Gambrel Roof** A "barn" shaped roof. See illustration at end of Glossary.

Gingerbread Fanciful, delicate trimwork.

Italianate Style See discussion of this style in Section 3 Overview of Styles.

Light (or "Lite") A pane of glass, as in a window or door.

**Meeting Rail** The horizontal center divider of a window. See illustration at end of Glossary.

Modillion A small ornamental bracket, usually scroll-shaped at an eave. See illustration at

end of Glossary.

Muntin A window pane divider.

Newel Post A post that terminates a railing.

Palladian Window A window with a central arched unit flanked on each side by square-topped

units. See illustration at end of Glossary.

Pediment A low-pitched decorative element above a door, window or other opening. See

illustration at end of Glossary.

Pilaster A vertical element protruding from a wall surface that mimics the shape of a

column. See illustration at end of Glossary.

**Rake** Top edge of a gable end. See illustration at end of Glossary.

**Soffit** The horizontal underside element of a roof overhang. See illustration at end of

Glossary.

**Transom** A window above a door or doorway.

**Tuscan Column** A simple type of round column. See illustration at end of Glossary.

**Vergeboard** Decorative **fascia** at the rake end of the roof overhang.
