Blast from the Past: August 1985

This August will mark the 40th anniversary of one of Brookfield's biggest sporting achievements in its history – when the Brookfield National Little League All-Stars won the 1985 Little League Softball World Series championship in Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Managed by legendary Brookfield softball coach Dan Hull – who in addition to being a police officer later operated a popular bar on Brookfield Avenue called Handsome Hull's – the Brookfield National 12U squad was not only the first Illinois softball team but the first

Central Region team to win the Little League World Series title. It wouldn't be until 2011 until another Illinois team won the championship.

"I can't even tell you what a riot it was and what a thrill it was," Dan Hull told the Riverside-Brookfield Landmark on the 30th anniversary of the achievement. Brookfield's run to the championship included two extra-inning games, including the title game against a team from California, which ended in the 8th inning with Hull's daughter, Becky, driving in the winning run.

Village Launches Brookfield Shops at Progress Park

6 mini-shops open Fri., Sat. and Sun. through December

The Village officially launched its new small business incubator program, the Brookfield Shops at Progress Park, with a festive grand opening ceremony on Friday, June 6, in the Eight Corners Business District.

Located at 9202 Broadway Ave., the Brookfield Shops initiative features six 12-by-15-foot seasonal storefronts, each operated by a locally owned small business. The incubator is designed to provide entrepreneurs and artisans with an affordable, supportive platform to grow their businesses, connect with the community and prepare for long-term retail success.

The Brookfield Shops are open to the public through December on Fridays (11 a.m. – 6 p.m.), Saturdays (10 a.m. – 6 p.m.), and Sundays (11 a.m. – 5 p.m.).

“This project is a key part of our commitment to fostering local entrepreneurship and revitalizing our commercial corridors,” said Libby Popovic, community development director for the Village of Brookfield. “The Brookfield Shops give small business owners a real-world opportunity to test and grow their businesses, while activating a visible and walkable part of our community.”

The Brookfield Shops at Progress Park draws inspiration from successful retail incubator models in neighboring communities. It combines affordable space with hands-on mentorship, workshops and community engagement to help entrepreneurs build sustainable operations. Local sponsors and partners provide additional support, helping vendors build skills in business planning, marketing and customer engagement.

The Village aims to make the Brookfield Shops a seasonal destination that energizes the local economy and offers residents a new way to shop local while supporting emerging talent.

The inaugural vendor cohort was selected earlier this year through a competitive application process judged by a panel of local business and community leaders. Participating businesses include:

- Four Star Coffee Company, offering handcrafted coffee, candles and artisan goods.
- Frost With Us, featuring cake-decorating kits and workshops.
- New Book Joy, selling books and curated gift items for all ages.



- Organic Jewelry, creating sustainable jewelry from recycled and natural materials.
- Rites of Wellness, providing plant-based bath and body products, supplements and home goods.



- The Shop Salon & Style House, offering fashion-forward clothing and accessories.

Use SeeClickFix to Report Building Code Violations

Residents now have a simpler way to submit Code Enforcement requests. Use SeeClickFix to easily report issues.

SeeClickFix is an online work order request app that we've encouraged residents to use to submit Public Works-related requests. Now, in addition to those requests, you can request that our Property Maintenance Code Enforcement team look into property maintenance-related issues as well.

It works the same way: Enter the address, provide a description of the issue, attach photos if you have them and hit submit. No more worrying about who to contact; everything is streamlined into one platform.

You can submit requests via the SeeClickFix app, available for both Apple and Android devices, through their website at SeeClickFix.com or by scanning the QR Code.

Music on Grand is scheduled to return the weekend of Aug. 29-31 when, once again, the south half of the 3700 block of Grand Boulevard will be closed off to allow expanded outdoor dining all weekend.

Downtown Construction Means New July 4 Parade Route



Brookfield's Fourth of July Parade is a highlight of the summer, with residents and visitors lining the length of Grand Boulevard to take in the patriotic spectacle. But if you're planning on watching the parade this year, you may need to scout out a new location, because there's a new route for 2025.

Streetscape construction in the 3700 block of Grand Boulevard means the parade will kick off at 10 a.m. and head south on Grand Boulevard from Garfield Avenue. When the parade reaches Eight Corners, however, it will then head east on Washington Avenue to Arden Avenue, where it will turn south and end at Brookfield Avenue.

While that's a change, it also means the parade will end right next to Kiwanis Park, where the Party in the Park starts right after the parade ends. So, if you are planning to watch the parade along Arden Avenue, be sure to bring your picnic gear, because we'll have an entire afternoon of fun waiting for you.

There will be food and drink available for purchase at the park, and there will be live music at the Kiwanis Park Bandshell. Standing Room Only pumps out high-energy hits from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m., with country band Wild Daisy performing from 3 to 5 p.m.



Vehicle Sticker Renewal Period continues through June 30



In May, anyone who owns a vehicle registered to a Brookfield address received a vehicle sticker renewal notice in the mail. All vehicles registered to a Brookfield address, whether housed in the Village or not, are required have a valid 2025-26 vehicle sticker displayed by June 30.

Fees are:

Passenger Car	\$50
Senior Citizen Car or Truck (one per household)	\$8
Motorcycle/Motorbike	\$25
Truck/Bus Under 8,000 lbs.	\$80
Truck/Bus Over \$8,000 lbs.	\$125

Late fees will be applied for purchases made after July 1, 2025. Senior Citizens must be 65 at the time of purchase. Proof of age is required.

If you are a new resident, you have 30 days from your move-in date to acquire a sticker. If you purchase a new car, you have 10 days to acquire a sticker. Vehicle sticker revenues are used by the Village to maintain local streets, including patching, striping, signage and snow removal.

Dos and Don'ts

Don't Rake Leaves/Grass into Streets

During heavy rainfall, storm drain inlets can become clogged with debris, leading to street flooding. To prevent this from happening in your neighborhood, it's important to keep the inlets free of any leaves, grass clippings, or other debris that may have accumulated. This can be easily done by regularly clearing the area around the inlets.

Village ordinances prohibit raking leaves, grass clippings, or any other debris into the street. Doing so can obstruct the flow of water and create hazardous driving conditions, especially during rainfall.

By following these guidelines, we can all do our part in keeping our community safe and clean.

Call J.U.L.I.E. before digging

Nationwide, an underground utility line is damaged every few minutes, usually from someone digging and not knowing where the lines were buried on their property. Striking a single underground utility line can cause an interruption to critical services such as electricity, natural gas, water, cable TV, internet, and more. It also can result in costly repairs and fees for the individual who caused the damage. Someone can also be seriously injured.

JULIE -- Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators -- is dedicated to preventing underground utility line damage and keeping Illinoisans safe. Anyone planning a digging project can submit a request to JULIE to have underground utility lines on their property or job site located and marked for free. In fact, state law requires the person doing the digging to contact JULIE at least two business days before putting a shovel in the ground.

Keep FOG Out of Our Sewers

FOG -- an acronym for fats, oils, and grease -- is a term commonly used in wastewater collection systems. As the name suggests, it's a mixture of fatty acids and glycerol derived from vegetables or plants.

However, when FOG is not disposed of properly, it can cause significant problems for sewer systems. FOG can solidify and accumulate in sewer pipes, leading to blockages that can cause sewer overflows, damage pipes and produce foul odors.

In addition to this, FOG can also accumulate in other parts of a wastewater system, which can increase maintenance expenses, and it can interfere with the effective transportation of wastewater to treatment facilities.

These issues can pose significant dangers to public health, damage local ecosystems, create unpleasant odors, and degrade water quality, making it essential to manage FOG properly to keep our sewer systems functional and safe.

Keep Track of Brookfield's Construction Projects 24/7

It's mid-June and the Village is well into the 2025 construction season, with multiple projects well under way and a few more to begin in the coming months.

If you want to keep up to date on the status of any project, you can do so at any time by **visiting our 2025 Capital Improvements Project GIS map collection by scanning the QR code** or visiting www.brookfieldil.gov, clicking the Capital Improvement Projects button at the top of the homepage and then following the links.



Here's a brief rundown on where we're at with the major infrastructure projects:

3700 Grand Blvd./Brookfield Ave. Streetscape

This project to improve the streetscape in the 3700 block of Grand Boulevard and a full resurfacing of that roadway and the length of Brookfield Avenue/Woodside Avenue/Golf Road began in April on the east side of Grand Boulevard.

All of the sidewalk area on the east side has been poured, and underdrain piping, structural soil and electric conduit for new light poles have been installed. Construction of a decorative seat wall at the corner of Grand and Prairie has also begun.

Work on the west side of the street begins when the east sidewalk area is substantially complete.

Preliminary work has also begun on Brookfield Avenue, east of Arden Avenue.

2025 Street Improvements

The street improvement project began in April and is under way on all of the project streets, including Monroe Avenue (Kemman to Grand); Cleveland Avenue (Monroe to Washington); Harrison Avenue (Monroe to Washington); and Blanchan Avenue (Ogden to Rochester).

Concrete curbs and gutters as well as deteriorated drainage structures have been replaced. Pavement milling and resurfacing and parkway restoration will take place once all of the concrete and underground work is complete on all streets for this year's project.

Green Parking Lot Improvement Project (3840 Maple Ave.)

This project to repave the Water Tower parking lot with permeable brick pavers began in April and is substantially complete.

2025 Water Main Improvements

This year's project kicked off in May on Jackson Avenue (Kemman to Grand), with that new main completely installed by the end of May. Work will progress to Lexington Avenue (Kemman to Cleveland) as well as Cleveland Avenue (Jackson to Lexington), Blanchan Avenue (Lincoln to Southview) and Raymond Avenue (Jackson to 31st).

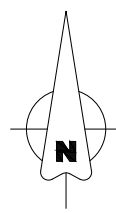
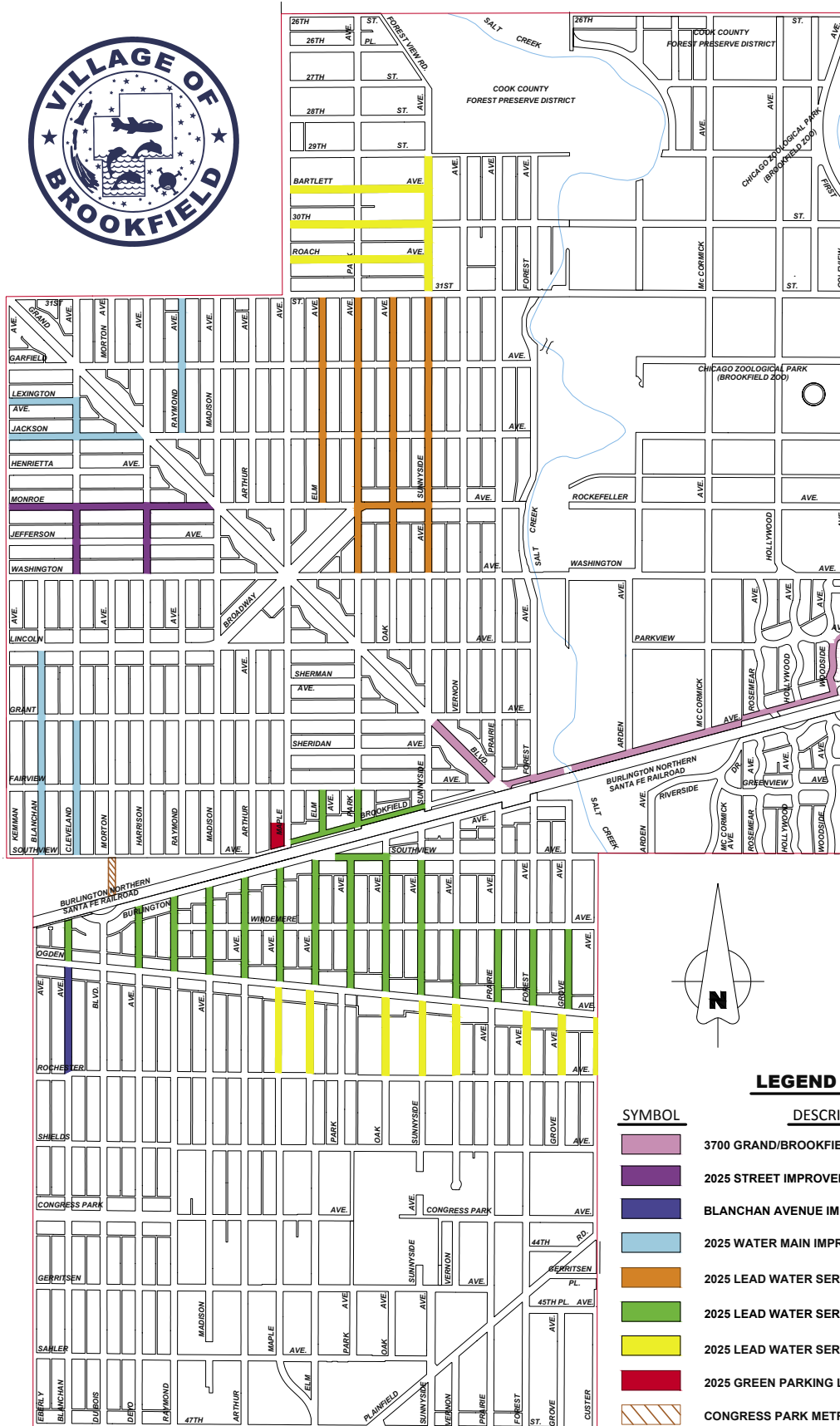
Once the water mains are installed, crews will begin replacing the residential lead water service lines on those blocks prior to sidewalk, driveway, roadway, and landscaping restoration.

2025 Lead Water Service Line Replacement

After replacing 675 lead water service lines throughout Brookfield in 2024, the Village plans to replace another 634 lead service line in 2025. Work started in mid-May on Grand Boulevard south of the Veterans Memorial Circle.

Work locations are spread throughout the Village, and work is expected to continue into November.

Our Bike Patrol Officers are now more visible and better equipped than ever before. They're sporting high-visibility uniform shirts, modern helmets designed for multi-impact protection, and specialized bike patrol pants and shorts for comfort and functionality.

Our officers will be riding specially equipped Raleigh Mojave-8.0 mountain bikes, ready to tackle any terrain our village presents.

This unit includes six highly trained members of our department: Sgt. Ray Paton, Sgt. Dan McCarthy, Officer Anthony Reyes, Officer Kevin Berry, Officer Curtis Duffek, and Officer David Harrison. Each officer underwent a 32-hour Police Cyclist course and earned national certification through the International Police Mountain Bike Association.

We're excited for you to see them out and about!

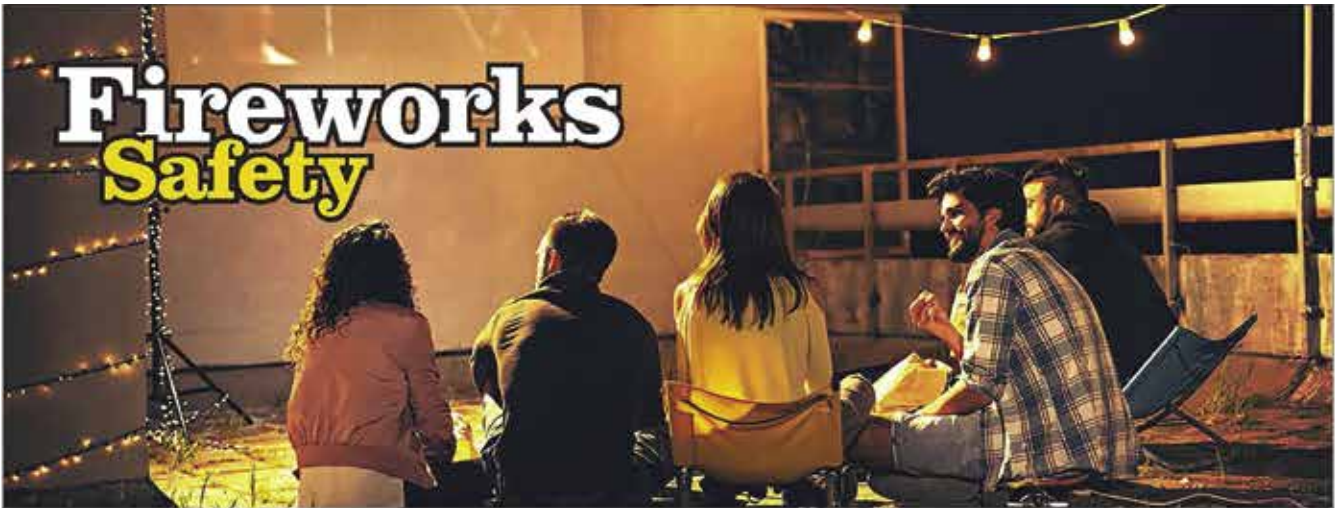

Fireworks Safety



FIREWORKS are often used to mark special events and holidays. The only safe way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. It is important to know that **fireworks are not safe in the hands of consumers**. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

A few ideas to get into the patriotic spirit, without fireworks:

1. Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
2. Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
3. Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bugspray!
4. Red, white and blue silly string...fun for all ages.
5. Make a patriotic craft with the family.
6. Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake.



FACTS

- ! More than 31,000 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- ! Burns account for 38% of the 7,400 injuries treated in emergency rooms in the month around July 4.
- ! Half of the fireworks injuries at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- ! Children younger than 15 years old accounted for 28% of the estimated fireworks injuries.
- ! Sparklers account for 29% of fireworks injuries for children under the age of 5 treated in emergency rooms in the month around July 4.

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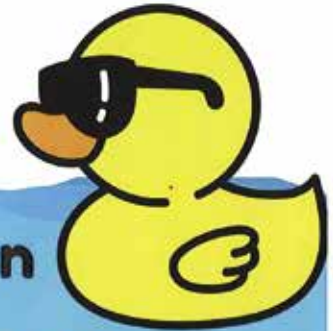
