Holy August Batman! Where did the summer go?! It seems like just yesterday we were kicking off the summer reading program and now we are opening the Library Store.





Cutting for Stone by Abraham Verghese

Marion and Shiva Stone are twin brothers born of a secret union between a beautiful Indian nun and a brash British surgeon. Orphaned by their mother's death and their father's disappearance, bound together by a preternatural connection and a shared fascination with medicine, the twins come of age as Ethiopia hovers on the brink of revolution.

Moving from Addis Ababa to New York City and back again, *Cutting for Stone* is an unforgettable story of love and betrayal, medicine and ordinary miracles--and two brothers whose fates are forever intertwined.

This fall we will begin with the book *The Lovely Bones* by Alice Sebold. We will be meeting with others reading the book as part of The Great American Read on **Wednesday**, **September 19 at 7 pm**.

Informing the News: The Need for Knowledge-Based Journalism by Thomas E. Patterson.

As the journalist Walter Lippmann noted nearly a century ago, democracy falters "if there is no steady supply of trustworthy and relevant news." Today's journalists are not providing it. Patterson proposes "knowledge-based journalism" as a corrective. Unless journalists are more deeply informed about the subjects they cover, they will continue to misinterpret them and to be vul-

nerable to manipulation by their sources. Patterson calls for nothing less than a major overhaul of journalism practice and education. This book speaks not only to journalists, but to all who are concerned about the integrity of the information on which America's democracy depends.


This discussion of the One Book South Dakota is made possible with a grant from the South Dakota Humanities Council.


