



Ashia's Book Recommendation: *The Magnificent Esme Wells*, by Adrienne Sharp This book expertly explores the locales of Hollywood and Las Vegas during the 1930s and 40s. As Esme Wells comes of age with a father

who is a small time gangster and gambler, and a mother who is determined to be a movie star, she channels her own ambitions into becoming a star in Las Vegas stage shows. Along with her parents, young Esme suffers tragic conseauences from their ruthless pursuit of success and her own success comes at a high cost. My heart broke for Esme and the sorrow and hardships she endured, but she was a survivor and I loved her indomitable and irrepressible spirit. This well researched book with marvelous period and location detail, superb character development, and a moving plot make this a recommended read .

All craft nights require registration to ensure enough materials are available. Call the library at 692-9407 or stop in to sign up.










Library Book Club - Meets the second Tuesday of the month and is open to anyone interested in attending.


Tues., **June 12 at 6:30 pm** *Commonwealth* by Ann Patchett



Patchett tells the enthralling story of how an unexpected romantic encounter irrevocably changes two families' lives. One Sunday afternoon in Southern California Bert Cousins shows up at Franny Keating's christening party Commonwealth uninvited. Before evening falls he has kissed Franny's mother Beverly, thus setting in motion the dissolution of their marriages and the joining of two families. Spanning five decades Commonwealth explores how this chance encounter reverberates through the lives of the four parents and six children involved.

The book for our July meeting is *Marcel's Letters* by Carolyn Porter.




Booked for Murder - Mystery Book Club discusses an author's body of work rather than a specific title. They meet at noon on the first Monday of the month.

On **Wednesday, June 6 at 7 pm** Bob and Shiela Everhart will present their "How Western Music Won the West" program. This entertaining musical program is about the very earliest cowboy and western songs along with the unusual stories associated with them. Not only the songs themselves, but the writers and singers of them are sometimes very funny, sometimes very sad. The Everharts spent many hours researching the origin of western music. It's fascinating, historical, entertaining, and educational, just right for an audience ready to have a good time as well as be entertained. A memory adventure to be sure, it covers times from the earliest cowboy singers right up to the days of Gene Autry and Roy Rogers. Bob and Sheila debuted this show at Apple Valley, California, in 2017, the ranch home of Roy Rogers and Dale Evans. Don't miss an opportunity to hear them bring a whole new aspect to cowboy and western music.

MP3 Players and MP3 CD Players



You may have noticed that BPL offers some audiobooks on MP3 discs. MP3 audiobooks come on fewer discs, making them easier to listen to, and they're often cheaper for the library to purchase than traditional CD audiobooks. To play an MP3 disc audiobook, you must have a device capable of playing it. Most newer model cars work, as do most computers.

Don't have the proper device? No problem! We recently added both MP3 CD players and MP3 players to our collection. Plug headphones into either to listen to your audiobook, or pair them with an FM transmitter to broadcast the audio on your car radio. The MP3 CD players are great for listening while sitting, while the MP3 players allow you to download the book onto the player to use on the go! These, along with the FM transmitters, are available near the MP3 audiobook cards, and come with instructions for use. If you're unsure which is best for you, feel free to ask!

THE GREAT AMERICAN READ

We are pleased to announce that the Brookings Public Library is one of 50 libraries nationwide to be selected from a pool of 220 applicants to receive a grant from the American Library Association (ALA) and PBS to host programs around "The Great American Read," an eight-part television series and multi-platform initiative that celebrates the joy of reading and the books we love.

This month we will kick off our programming on **Thursday**, **June 14 at 7 pm** with a showing of clips from the May 22 premier event which announced the list of 100 diverse books, encouraging audiences to read the books, vote from the list of 100, and share their personal connections to the titles. Copies of the list of books will be available at that time and voting rules and procedures will be explained. A complete list of programs planned will be available. Events include themed book discussions, a summer reading challenge with prizes, panel discussions and screening of episodes in the fall.

This event will kick off a summer of reading and voting. In fall 2018, seven new episodes will air, featuring appearances by celebrities, athletes, experts, authors and everyday Americans advocating for their favorite book, culminating with a finale that reveals America's best-loved novel as selected by the American public.

Programming for *The Great American Read* is offered as part of a grant from the American Library Association and PBS.

Jennifer Phar Davis





Jennifer is a professional speaker who has shared her trail adventures across the United States and Europe. She is founder and owner of Blue Ridge Hiking Company, a guid-


ing service that strives "to make the wilderness accessible and enjoyable" for hikers of all ages, genders, and ability levels. Jennifer lives in Asheville,
