house owner Virgil Wander is "cruising along at medium altitude" when his car flies off the road into icy Lake Superior. Virgil survives but his language and memory are altered and he emerges into a world no longer familiar to him.

Awakening in this new life, Virgil begins to piece together his personal history and the lore of his broken town, with the help of a cast of affable and curious locals--from Rune, a twinkling, pipe-smoking, kite-flying stranger investigating the mystery of his disappeared son; to Nadine, the reserved, enchanting wife of the vanished man; to Tom, a journalist and Virgil's oldest friend; and various members of the Pea family who must confront tragedies of their own. Into this community returns a shimmering prodigal son who may hold the key to reviving their town. (goodreads.com)

Come learn all about the Libby app! OverDrive has created a new user-friendly app that lets you browse, check out, and read or listen to ebooks and digital audiobooks from our digital collection, SD Titles to Go. As of right now, you can still use their older app called OverDrive, but at some point in the future, they will stop supporting it and focus on their newer Libby app. Also, this app is not currently available on Kindle Fire tablets, so users of this tablet will still have to use the OverDrive app for now.

## **Spring Adult Reading Program**

The spring adult reading program is underway and welcomes all adults to play. This year the program is a combination of Bingo and Scrabble. On the reading log at the front desk, you will find a set of bingo layouts with letters in the spaces. To win a small prize you will need to read a book from the library's adult or young adult collection with that letter in the **title**. Two bingos are allowed per layout. Each bingo gets you closer to one of three grand prizes. One grand prize will be given to the person who makes the longest word out of the letters they've read between picking up the sheet and April 12. The second grand prize will be given to someone who completed at least one bingo, through a random drawing. There is a limit of one sheet per person.

Duel in the Sun: Alberto Salazar, Dick Beardsley, and America's Greatest Marathon by John Brant

The 1982 Boston Marathon was great theater: two American runners, Alberto Salazar, a celebrated champion, and Dick Beardsley, a gutsy underdog, go-

ing at each other for just under 2 hours and 9 minutes. Neither man broke. The race merely came to a thrilling, shattering end, exacting such an enormous toll that neither man ever ran as well again. Beardsley, the most innocent of men, descended into felony drug addiction, and Salazar, the toughest of men, fell prey to depression. Exquisitely written and rich with human drama, John Brant's *Duel in the Sun* brilliantly captures the mythic character of the most thrilling American marathon ever run—and the powerful forces of fate that drove these two athletes in the years afterward. Who are the Sawkill Girls?

Marion: The newbie. Awkward and plain, steady and dependable. Weighed down by tragedy and hungry for love she's sure she'll never find.

Zoey: The pariah. Luckless and lonely, hurting but hiding it. Aching with grief and dreaming of vanished girls. Maybe she's broken—or maybe everyone else is.

Val: The queen bee. Gorgeous and privileged, ruthless and regal. Words like silk and eyes like knives; a heart made of secrets and a mouth full of lies.

Their stories come together on the island of Sawkill Rock, where gleaming horses graze in rolling pastures and cold waves crash against black cliffs. Where kids whisper the legend of an insidious monster at parties and around campfires. Where girls have been disappearing for decades, stolen away by a ravenous evil no one has dared to fight...until now.
