

Spring Work Days, Help Needed!

Beachgrass Harvesting will resume in Fall of 2021 - assuming the global pandemic has let up & restrictions are lifted.

In the meantime, lots of work is needed at the nursery to remove succession of shrubs and small trees competing with our beachgrass crop.

Native Grass Seed Mixes...

Native Seed Mixes from MWF

Start with seeds to create a natural wildlife haven in your backyard! These native seed mixes from **Michigan Wildflower Farm** are specialized seed mixes for naturalizing landscapes with Michigan native plants.

** Wildlife Habitat Mix \$8/oz or \$100/lb 20% forbs, 80% grasses

Milkweed, asters, Coneflower, Bergamot, Evening Primrose, Black-eyed Susan, Rosinwood, Stiff Goldenrod & Grasses from Native Grass Mix (see below).

Big Bluestem, Switch Grass, Little Bluestem, Indian Grass

Grass Seeding Covers: 1 oz./200 sq.ft. or 10 lbs./acre

Nature Scapes add more diversity, shelter and color to your backyard, field or forest edge. They also help wildlife, conserve water and save money.

Once purchased, there are a few steps to take to ensure germination. Once established (3-5 years), wildflowers provide a relatively low maintenance area with high aesthetic and environmental quality.

NEW NATIVE GARDEN & FALL NATIVE PLANT SALE



This Fall over 600 native plants were donated and planted in front of the District office. The new Sun and Shade gardens will offer interested landowners an up close look at native plants that help preserve soil and water, and benefit wildlife. Aside from our American Beachgrass, Spring Tree Sale and Fall Native Plant Sale, other district programs include educational workshops for youth and adults including invasive species management, and helping local farmers become environmentally sustainable through our MAEAP program (details below).

The Michigan Agriculture Environmental Assurance Program,

or MAEAP, helps and recognizes farmers who reduce erosion and runoff from private land onto public waters. Strated in 1998, MAEAP is a voluntary program that recognizes farmers who are top stewards of their land, helps farmers adopt cost-effective practices that reduce erosion and runoff into ponds, streams and rivers, and helps farmers comply with state and feder-



al laws. MAEAP recognition is achievable with 5,842 farms receiving MAEAP verification to date. The four verifications include: Farmstead, Cropping Systems, Livestock Systems and the most recent, Forest, Wetlands and Habitat Systems. Highbush Cranberry

ALL: 5/\$15, 10/\$25, 25/\$50

Shrub, medium growth rate,

will reach a height of 8-12' with an equal round spread. Prefers good, well-drained soil, full sun to partial shade. Edible fruit, excellent for preserves.



Dogwood, Gray

This tough, low-maintenance shrub offers subtle year-round beauty. White panicles of flowers brighten the landscape in June. White berries and pinkish fruit attract birds the late summer into winter.



Elderberry, American

Fast growing shrub with whitish flowers in late spring early summer. Bears a purple-black fruit in August. Makes excellent wine and jam, and often used in many naturopathic remedies.



Hazelnut, American

A large fast growing shrub with showy spring flowers. Best used when naturalizing an area.



Nannyberry

Vase shaped habit holds large numbers of heavy fruit in the fall. Glossy dark green leaves turn shades of red in fall. Plants should be pruned immediately after flowering in order to get flowers the next year. Plant in moist, well drained soil. Flowers bloom April & May.



Ninebark

Upright dense spreading shrub. Bears white or pinkish flowers in spring and red colored seeds in fall. Blooms May to early June.



Serviceberry

Slow growing, moderately long lived, reaches a height of 12-24'. Wide range site tolerances. Will not do well on wet soils. Bears sweet and juicy black fruit and is characterized by bronzy colored leaves that turn orange-red in fall.



Winterberry A moderate sized shrub, growing to heights of 5 to 15 feet tall. The smooth bark is gray to blackish, with knobby lenticels. The branches grow in a zigzag pattern with an upright spreading crown. The twigs are gray to gray-brown color with small buds.

Tree Planter

It has a 3-point hitch and is pulled by a tractor. A 40 hp tractor will pull the planter through very soft soil. If your planting site doesn't meet this condition, a larger tractor (80-100 hp) will be needed. A large tub holds the trees in front of a comfortable yellow seat. The large disc in front slices



the ground, followed by a plow shoe which opens the soil for tree placement. By hand, you place the tree in position and a cement packer wheel follows close behind to close and firm the soil. A handy clicker signals when the spacing is appropriate for the next tree. Transporting the tree planter is easy. Hauled on a $4' \times 8'$ trailer, it can

be easily lifted on and off with your tractor. COST: \$50.00 per day

Colorado Blue Spruce

Rich blue-green needles. Grows on most soil types but does not like real wet soil. Moderately shade tolerant, drought resistant

once established. Height 60-80'.

Norway Spruce

Deep green needles, araceful droopina branches with large cones. Fastest growing spruce. Grows well on most sites



Red Pine

Plant in well-drained sandy soil, full sun. Medium to fast arowina. Height 50-80'. Sheds lower branches as it matures.



White Pine

Does best on rich, porous moist soils and well-drained sandy soil. Shade tolerant & fast growing. Height 80-100'.



LARCH

A deciduous conifer that likes its "feet wet" with delicate needles that turn a bright golden color in the fall prior to

falling off. Height 40-80' Shade tolerant, fast growing, best suited for wet sites.

Shade tolerant, very slow growing and long lived. Leaves are flattened scales. Does best planted in low swampy areas, however will also grow in upland areas. Great for hedges & windbreaks.
