





TRAINING

The City of Clever Police Department is responsible for ongoing education of civilian employees as well as sworn peace officers as required by the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

The CLEE training requirements for the January 1, 2023, to December 31, 2023, reporting period are outlined below.

- + Peace officers licensed prior to January 1, 2023, must obtain 24 hours of Continuing Law Enforcement Education (CLEE) by December 31, 2023, with at least 8 of the 24 hours coming from an 'approved provider' of training. Of these 24 hours, officers must obtain a minimum of:
 - + 2 hours Legal Studies
 - + 2 hours Technical Studies
 - + 2 hours Interpersonal Perspectives
 - + 2 hours Skill Development-Firearms
 - + 16 hours Electives (any of the above-listed core curricula areas)
 - + 1 hour Racial Profiling
 - + 1 hour Implicit Bias
 - + 1 hour De-escalation
 - + Racial Profiling, Implicit Bias, and De-escalation training are part of the required 24 hours, not in addition to it.
- + Peace officers instructing basic and CLEE training courses can receive 1 hour of CLEE credit for each hour of basic training or CLEE training they instruct. However, there is no longer a maximum number of CLEE credit hours that can be earned for instructing basic or CLEE courses.
