MINUTES

Mr. Jacobus asked that the Pristina report submitted for the January 11, 2022 meeting be replaced as the incorrect report was forwarded for that meeting. Mr. Nolte moved to approve the January 11, 2022 minutes with that correction. Rev. Davis seconded the motion. Motion carried.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Financial report for July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022 was distributed indicating expenses through January 2022 to be \$18.40 for publication of the December 14 Sister Cities Commission summary minutes in the Business Record. Ms. Miller moved to approve the financial report. Rev. Davis seconded the motion. Motion carried.

COMMISSION CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Mr. Nowadzky shared the following written report:

Here we are in February. Sometimes midwinter can be sluggish and/or even the near equivalent to the movie "Groundhog Day." That is not the case for our Commission and its activities.

Again, we are pleased to announce the revitalization of Friends of Sister Cities. The Friends group is a nonprofit organization with the purpose of supporting the mission and activities of the Greater Des Moines Sister Cities Commission. It recognizes that the mission of the Commission takes more resources than the Commission's municipal budget. In this regard, the Friends will be working with our Kofu City Committee to help fundraise at an upcoming scholarship event planned by our Kofu

Committee. Please read the Kofu report for details, along with their plans for an upcoming virtual mayoral meeting.

We are also reminded that February brings the anniversary of Kosovo's annual Independence Day. Look to the Pristina City Committee report for discussion as to related activities. Also, a peek at our Facebook page will remind you that our friends in our Chinese sister city of Shijiazhuang will be celebrating their lunar new year, and a recipe to help them bring in the year of the tiger.

In this regard, please carefully read the Commission Vice Chairperson's Report. What should all of us and our committees be doing to routinely strengthen the relationship between your sister city and our community? While some may be treading water waiting for a return of safe international travel, the Vice Chairperson's report and the Chairperson's last month's report are instructive of how the Commission can and is powering forward. Again, I thank all of you for your dedicated efforts in citizen diplomacy.

COMMISSION VICE CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Ms. Whisenand shared the following written report:

February is *Heart Month*--and there is a vein of cooperation at the heart of what we are witnessing at the Des Moines Sister Cities Commission. Sister Cities subcommittees are taking root and adding to their membership ranks, highlighting new ideas and solidifying their execution plans. Pristina and Kofu Committees have not missed a beat when it comes to meeting every month (and, in the case with palpating accuracy, Pristina committee meets every two weeks.) But there is still more to do. Remember, it's the Chinese New Year. It's the Independence Day anniversary month for Kosovo.

Chairman Nowadzky and I are pulling together the coming year's budget, based on those who turned in their strategic plan and financial "wish list." *We needed your starting point to get to the end point.* For those whose cities are lagging in interest to engage with us here in Des Moines, our plan from the homeland is simple (and less expensive). Figure out a way to engage them on social media! Folks, talk to our committee members with Pristina, Kofu, and Shijiazhuang! They are posting on our Facebook, setting up Zoom calls, connecting through *What's App* and other social platforms. All with little or minimal effort. We have scheduled appointments with their cities' mayors and our Mayor and elected officials all in the effort to stay in touch. We are still seeking your list of "major holiday happenings" in each city--even if they are not responding. We respond with our courtesy acknowledgements. We build that bridge ... eventually. And finally, we have the Friends of the Sister Cities Commission back up and moving along. We have identified a few interested citizens to serve on the Board of Directors and hope that our current Commission members will hold on through the transition and beyond. So, there you have it. In the heart of Des Moines, we move forward around the world.

Ms. Whisenand added that she is working on bringing the Commission's history document up to date and into a book/e-book format. A big thank you goes to Cumming Mayor Becker and Commissioner (Cumming City Clerk) Ritchie who were of enormous assistance with getting the data collected from a number of previous year's meeting minutes added.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Stavropol Committee

Mr. Spaine shared the following written report:

If you have been watching the news lately, there has been a lot of talk about Russia invading Ukraine, an independent country. Maybe, you have been troubled by the news and also questioned what it means for the City of Des Moines to continue to engage in a Sister City relationship with Stavropol,

Russia. As, it appears that Russia is being a big bully in trying to overthrow an established, sovereign nation in Ukraine. In this report I thought it was time to open a conversation and address some of your feelings and questions regarding this issue. So, I encourage you to ask questions or comment of how you feel about this situation. One thing that we have to keep in mind is that we exist as a Sister City with Stavropol purely on a humanitarian level with our friends in Stavropol. This is a people-to-people relationship and bares no political influence. The Russian citizens in Stavropol have a genuine affection for us here in our beloved city of Des Moines.

This is also quite evident in my numerous trips to Stavropol, as they have welcomed our delegation into their homes, and have enjoyed their gracious hospitality. Also, it is worth mentioning about my continued interaction with the Stavropol administration and to say that I am really encouraged when I listen to them speak passionately about how much they appreciate this friendship. One thing that I am quite convinced of, and I know this to be true because I lived in both Russia and Ukraine, is that the ordinary citizens of Russia want nothing but to live in peace with their neighbors, raise their families, put food on the table, and pave the way for the future generation of Russians. I see our role at this critical time to be very vital and to realize that we want the same desired outcome as our Russian partners. My hope is that this relationship continues and flourishes as we make progress at all levels.

I blame the pandemic for the pace at which progress has slowed down in this relationship. It will be nice when at some time in the near future, we can travel to Stavropol, and vice versa welcome our Russian friends to Des Moines. I am still vigorously recruiting Des Moines Public School (DMPS) students to become friends with Russian students in Stavropol. I believe this kind of relationship has the potential to shed light on our commonalities and help bridge gaps between our two countries. I continue to maintain contact with Stavropol through emails, zoom, and phone calls, and they have been reciprocating.

Let us all continue to endeavor that in the final analysis peace will prevail, realizing that war is never ever the answer.

Shijiazhuang Committee

Ms. Zhao Mandelbaum reported that with China going into Chinese New Year and also the Shijiazhuang Foreign Affairs Offices being deployed to help out with the Winter Olympics, so everyone is every busy, so no activity is going on this month. Hopefully when both of these finish up, we will be back talking about more exchanges and other activities.

Saint-Etienne Committee

Dr. Zeff shared the following written report:

In January, two (2) French Chefs from the Saint-Etienne region traveled to Des Moines and Ankeny to work with the students in the Iowa Culinary Institute (ICI) program at Des Moines Area Community College (DMACC). Both chefs work in restaurants in France that are rated with two (2) Michelin stars, a very prestigious award. They celebrated the 37th anniversary of the Sister City connection between Des Moines and Saint-Etienne.

I attended one (1) of the three (3) dinners (January 27, 28 and 29) and was recognized as a Sister City Commissioner and one (1) of the early participants in the Des Moines and Saint-Etienne partnership. The Sister City program was also acknowledged as an important part of the development of ICI as a premier training program for Iowa, and other culinary arts students around the country. DMACC's President reaffirmed ICI's importance to its overall curriculum for area students.

Several Alliance Française members were present on January 28 and were acknowledged for helping with translating for the French chefs recently and last year during COVID restrictions when the chefs' offerings had to be all presented online. The Des Moines Alliance Française is very supportive of the Sister City connection with Saint-Etienne and also works with the Commission on The Bastille Day celebration every July 14th.

As Chair of the Saint-Etienne Sister City Committee on the Commission, I also met with Ginny Renda to discuss the issue of finding new Sister City connections and renewing existing ones.

Dr. Zeff added that there have been no student trips to Saint-Etienne for two (2) years, but they are looking to make up for that by taking two (2) trips this summer, one in May and the other one in August.

Pristina Committee

Mr. Jacobus shared the following written report:

1. **Governor Reynolds Trip To Kosovo CANCELLED.** Governor Reynolds had a trip scheduled to Kosovo for February 16-18, 2022, as part of an economic focused trip where she would be visiting four other countries with Debbie Durham, Director of Iowa Department of Economic Development, and others. Governor Reynolds' plan in Kosovo was to renew the State Partnership documents, and meet with President, Prime Minister, Parliament, and others. She was planning to celebrate Independence Day in Kosovo. That trip was indefinitely postponed on January 19, 2022, due to COVID-19 related concerns. The trip has not yet been re-scheduled.
2. **Summer Trip to Kosovo.** There WILL be a delegation visiting Kosovo on June 1-July 8, 2022. Anyone who either plans to attend or wants to be added to the "information distribution list", should reach out to Kim Heidemann, Administrative Assistant to the Kosovo Chief of Mission, at kim.heidemann@rks-gov.net or (515) 215-0118. Kim will make sure to keep you informed of the

schedule and help coordinate hotels, etc. The skeletal schedule that was distributed by the Kosovo Consulate in early January 2022 is as follows:

 - g. The Kosovo Ministry of Local Government Administration will host a one-day conference for ALL sister city partners, including those from other states and even countries.

Todd Jacobus met with Artan Duraku this morning to talk about the event. We will plan on serving light refreshments. 7. **Connecting With People.** Karla McCollum emphasized that we are working to find more connections to strengthen our partnerships. These COILL programs will do exactly that. We will sustain programs through PEOPLE – not through government. We need to work to develop and solidify relationships.
8. **Rochester Institute of Technology in Pristina.** Karla McCollum reported that she recently spoke with the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) in Pristina, Kosovo, and learned that the U.S. Embassy in Kosovo is supporting the “Kosovo Bridge Project” (<https://www.rit.edu/kosovo/bridgeproject>) to teach English. ISS will assist with a “pen pal project” for students ages 14-18. The project is intended to help Kosovar students learn vocational English with the goal being to bring these students to the U.S. to study. The Government of Kosovo said that they would support this initiative financially to bring students to Kosovo. The RIT Website says, “Pen Pal Program with Iowa”. Sister Cities is perfect place to start. The platform is called “Edmoto” [[Edmoto Details](#)], which could be monitored by schools,

RIT, etc. The concept is that we create a topic (What are finals like? Do you have a job after school? etc.), and then allow students in Kosovo to respond so they can practice English. Iowa/Sister Cities are Module 1, and there are 10 modules.

Kofu Committee

Mr. Nolte shared the following written report:

The Kofu Committee met on January 31 by Zoom. Much work has been done on the event for May. Ricki King was contacted by a woman who was a Des Moines Public Schools (DMPS) teacher on the very first Kofu exchange. She offered to speak and bring photos. We have composed a letter for sponsorship requests, and we are now approaching our partners. Joe and Joanne shared that their pastor, Rev. Janelle Osbeck, donated two (2) boxes of Japanese art and decorations that she acquired while growing up in Japan. These pieces are great vintage pieces that Rev. Osbeck is excited can be sold to support travel to Japan. The Committee also discussed how the scholarships will ultimately be distributed. We will work with the school district to distribute the funds we raise, and we hope that Vidal will be able to assist in securing that agreement.

We also discussed the call with the two (2) Mayors. Joe worked with the City to send the attached New Year's Greetings from Mayor Cownie to Mayor Higuchi (*attached at end of minutes*). In the letter, Mayor Cownie invited Mayor Higuchi to a Zoom meeting. Mayor Higuchi has accepted. We are still working on setting a date. At our committee meeting, we created a draft agenda which (thank you Roger and Joyce) Mayor Cownie has approved and which we will now send to Mayor Higuchi. We will keep the Commission informed as the date solidifies, as we hope you will all try to join the call.

Joe met with the Executive Director and Board President of the Japanese American Society of Iowa (JASI). They will be joining the Kofu Committee and helping with the fundraising event. They have a lot of great ideas for entertainment, promotion, and food. They have also invited the Commission to help volunteer a shift or two as we are able for CelebrAsian. More information about that opportunity will come as we learn more.

If I am not at the meeting (I will be in London and I hope that I am sleeping when the meeting occurs, although with jet lag you never know), thank you all for your good work and support! Please let me know if you have any questions.
