

Operator Trainee Program Adopted by Joint Meeting Board

t its June 2006 monthly meeting, the Joint Meeting Board of Directors approved a plan to establish a wastewater operator trainee program. This program is designed to hire and train up to five individuals to provide a good source of qualified wastewater treatment operators for future operational needs.

Trainees must attend and satisfactorily complete a one-year Introduction to Water and Wastewater Course and successfully complete all required in-house training, which includes training in the Dewatering, Primary, Secondary and Sludge Handling facilities. At that point, the

trainees would be eligible to bid for wastewater openings as they occur.

Trainees must also agree to remain employed with Joint Meeting for at least two years after the successful completion of the required training.

The first three operator trainees were hired in September 2006. They are Dan O'Brien, Roscoe Scott and Ryan Gerhard. Dan is single and resides in New Milford, New Jersey. Roscoe is married, and he and his wife Barbara have two children, Deirdre and

Roscoe, Jr. They make their home in Irvington. Ryan lives in Iselin with his wife Erin and daughter Brianna.

The trainee program was adopted by the Board due to the current difficulty in recruiting trained and qualified wastewater operators and because it is expected that some of our experienced operators will be retiring in the near future. By extending the training period beyond the current six-month period and by requiring trainees to attend ten-month wastewater operator classroom training program on their own time, Joint Meeting is hopeful it will able to staff future vacancies with better trained personnel.

Trainees will be eligible to bid on existing wastewater operator vacancies next June after they successfully complete their in-house training and operator course. And they will be fully reimbursed for the cost of tuition and books upon successful completion of the course. They also must make a commitment to remain employed with Joint Meeting for two years after the completion of the course. They would be eligible for group health insurance benefits as well as the pension program.

ork will begin by the end of 2006 to upgrade three main sewage pumps, #2, #4 and #5. located on the pump room floor of the Pump and Office Building. The work will include the installation of motors, shafts and new impellers. New variable frequency drives (VFDs) will also be installed to match the pumps' speed to the incoming flow rate.

A new computer control system will be installed for all five main sewage pumps. The entire job is expected to take twelve to fifteen months. The contractor is Remsco Northeast Construction who has worked on numerous past construction projects at the Joint Meeting. The engineering firm is CME Associates.

A major project to rehabilitate the Joint Meeting bulkhead along the Arthur Kill waterway, which separates New Jersey from Staten Island, has been underway since late May 2006. Upon completion, this important project will protect and maintain the integrity of Joint Meeting's twin treated effluent pipelines that discharge into the Arthur Kill. The original bulkhead was constructed during the 1930s.

The work that is underway is expected to be completed by early December 2006 and should extend the life of the existing bulkhead for at least

the next 50 years. The contractor, Trevcon Construction Company, has worked on numerous projects along the New Jersey-New York waterfronts for many years and is a highly respected firm. The engineering firm is Schoor DePalma.

A new two-story laboratory and office building will be constructed on site immediately to the east of the P. & O. Building. Construction will begin by early November. The firm of Jeral Construction Service was awarded the contract to construct the building. The engineering company is Schoor DePalma.

Construction of the new facilities is expected to take approximately 18 months. The entire first floor will consist of a modern laboratory to replace the outdated and space-limited existing main laboratory that was constructed during the 1970s. The artist's drawing of the new laboratory and office building is on page one.

Changes in State of New Jersey Group Insurance Laws

everal new changes under the State of New Jersey Group Health Insurance laws will be taking place in 2007. One gives employees the option to continue health insurance coverage to certain qualified dependents up to age 30. Another changes the co-pays for medical and prescription drug plans. A third proposed change would eliminate duplicate coverage if approved.

Normally, a dependent child who reaches age 23 will automatically be deleted from group coverage on December 31st of the year he/she turns 23. The dependent child then has the option to continue coverage for 36 months under COBRA, but he/she must pay the premiums. If the COBRA period ends, under the new law, Chapter 375, the dependent may continue coverage up to age 30 under specific restrictions.

To qualify for this new Chapter 375 coverage, the overage child must:

- Be under age 30
- Be unmarried
- Have no dependents
- Be a NJ resident or full-time student at an institution of higher learning
- Not be covered under another health plan

An eligible child may enroll now for coverage that will begin on January 1, 2007. During 2007, an eligible child may enroll at any time, with coverage taking effect on the first of a month. For 2008 and forward, Chapter 375 enrollments must take place during the annual October open enrollment period. If an enrollee opts to take the Chapter 375 coverage, he/she is responsible for the full cost of the monthly premiums. A second change effective January 1, 2007 will affect employees enrolled in NJ Plus and an HMO. The co-payment for primary care doctor visits and visits to specialists will increase from \$5 to \$10. Co-payments for 30-day supplies of prescription drugs will increase from \$5 to \$10 for brand name drugs and from \$1 to \$3 for generic drugs. Mail orders for 90-day supplies go from \$1 to \$5 for generic and from \$5 to \$15 for brand name drugs.

Under proposed rule changes, which have not yet been adopted, an employee under the State Health Plan would only be able to have coverage as a member or a dependent, but not as both. So if a husband and wife both have SHBP coverage as employees, each would then have to elect single coverage or one may elect member/spouse coverage. Qualified dependent children could only be carried by one parent. If adopted, affected employees would be notified and changes would occur in early 2007.
