MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

THE CITY OF FALL RIVER

and

THE FALL RIVER ENVIRONMENTAL POLICE, MCOP LOCAL 491

This **MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT** is entered into by and between the City of Fall River (hereinafter "the City") and the Fall River Environmental Police, MCOP Local 491, ("Union"):

WHEREAS, the City and the Union are parties to a collective bargaining agreement originally in effect for the period of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2021, and

WHEREAS, the City and the Union have come to terms for a successor agreement,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of mutual covenants and promises, the Parties hereby agree extend and maintain all current terms and conditions of employment which are established by their 2019-2021 Memorandum of Agreement, the 2016-2019 Collective Bargaining Agreement, the parties' practices, current polices and work rules, or in any other way, except as modified by this Memorandum of Agreement:

1. Duration:

a. Modify the CBA to reflect a one-year agreement from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

2. Wages:

a. Modify section 1 of Article V of the CBA to reflect the following across the board increases to base pay:

Retroactively increase base pay by 1% effective July 1, 2021.

3. COVID-19 Bonus:

a. In recognition and appreciation of the work performed by unit members during the pandemic, the City will remit a one-time payment to each member of the bargaining unit in the amount of three thousand (\$3, 000.00) dollars payable in the payroll following funding of this MOA by City Council. This shall be paid to any member who is an active employee as of the date of funding by the City Council and the following former unit members Wedson Tiburtino, Jeffrey Gosselin, and Jeffrey Kilby, who will receive the full payment described herein along with all other eligible members of the bargaining unit.

4. Work Week, Work Hours & Overtime

- a. Amend section 1 of Article VI such that the regular work week shall consist of forty (40) hours and the regular workday shall consist of eight (8) hours, and increase unit members base pay accordingly to reflect one additional hour worked each work day at their regular rate of pay.
- b. Amend section 2 of Article VI to reflect the 40-hour work week and 8-hour workday.

5. Holidays

a. Effective July 1, 2020, modify section 1 of Article VII to add:
 i. Juneteenth (celebrated each year on June 19th) to the list of paid holidays.

6. Reservation of Rights

- a. The City expressly reserves its right to assert that future negotiations with the Union will be for a new collective bargaining agreement and that any term contained in the 2016-2019 collective bargaining agreement is null and void and inapplicable to negotiations for a new collective bargaining agreement unless such term or condition is explicitly agreed to by the City and Union.
- b. The Union expressly reserves the right to assert that all terms and conditions contained in the 2016-2019 collective bargaining agreement remain in full force and effect unless the Union and the City agree otherwise.

Housekeeping

1. Wages

a. Correct section 5(a) of Article V to clarify that "the City agrees to the sick leave buy back of sixty (60) unused sick days..."

2. Vacation

- a. Delete subsection D(b) of Article VIII, as it is superseded by section E.
- b. Correct the last sentence of section E to state "with a maximum not to exceed an additional eight (8) days."


Rationale for ARPA Funding:

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Massachusetts (BCBSMA) has created a "National Fitness Campaign" in an effort to "build healthy communities by bringing people outside to move every day." As part of this campaign, BCBSMA, is offering a \$50,000 grant to 15 communities to build a Fitness Court® Worlds Best Outdoor Gym. The City was notified in August 2022 that it was the recipient of the grant. The Fitness Court® is a functional training system with thousands of exercises and allows users to focus on seven full body workouts.

The City of Fall River, population 89,618 (US Census 2020 American Community Survey 5-year estimates), is a Gateway City which once enjoyed economic success but now faces a variety of social and economic challenges. The city is one of the most financially stressed communities with high poverty and unemployment rates, further exacerbated by the COVID-19 emergency health crisis. Fall River is also an Environmental Justice (EJ) community, with a population at risk for health inequities based on demographic criteria, such as low income, minority, and English language isolation. The population also meets four vulnerable health EJ criteria, including heart attack. The poor local economy severely limits opportunities for our residents who are looking for increasingly accessible and affordable recreation options. Furthermore, the pandemic has placed an emphasis on the need for outdoor spaces that support public health and safe mobility in the community. The proposed project is also consistent with CDC guidelines on pandemic safety, e.g., social distancing; it is easy to maintain 6' physical distancing on the

Fitness Court®. According to the National Recreation and Park Association, promoting healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization helps to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 by improving health and overall wellbeing.

Data provided by the Massachusetts Office on Disability shows a total of 18,037 residents of all ages as having a disability of some sort. This number makes up approximately 20.6% of our population. Statistics for people ages 18 to 64 are broken down as follows: 2.6% have a hearing difficulty; 2.4% have a vision difficulty; 10.1% have a cognitive difficulty; 8.9% have an ambulatory difficulty; 3.3% have a self-care difficulty; and 7.4% have an independent living difficulty. Many of these residents, depending on their disability, cannot access fitness facilities and programs. By increasing access and promoting increased accessibility, we believe there will be increased visits to the Fitness Court® and increased participation in fitness programs by people with disabilities. The proposed project will positively affect the access of individuals with disabilities to world-class, free outdoor fitness opportunities, which will ultimately lead to a healthier community.

Rationale for ARPA Funding:

COVID-19 had a significant and detrimental impact on public transportation. Across the nation ridership on public transportation declined, when people who normally frequented such transportation, feared overcrowding and infection, and many just simply no longer commuted to work. Additionally, there was a shortage of bus drivers which caused routes to be eliminated. In urban cities many people simply opted to walk. According to the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) ridership on public transportation dropped by 79%. There was a significant increase in utilitarian and recreational walking. Recreational walking surpassed pre-pandemic levels as people opted to escape the confines of their homes to get fresh air and exercise. As a result, there is more pedestrian traffic, as well as more, single vehicle traffic, as people opt out of public transportation.

In an effort to ensure the pedestrians accessing the heavily travelled intersections, schools, elderly housing and parks in the City and to increase visibility and awareness of drivers on the roadway, the solar powered flashing stop signs and LED flashing pedestrian crossing signs will

be extremely beneficial to the pedestrians and drivers in the City of Fall River. Additionally, the solar powered flashing stop and pedestrian crossing signs are cost efficient and environmentally friendly.

In the elderly housing locations, there is considerable pedestrian traffic due to a large number of the elderly not able to drive, and a considerable need for visibility of signs. Priority placement for the flashing pedestrian crossing signs in the elderly housing include (1) Hood Street for Cardinal Medeiros Towers, (2) Bate Street for Bates Tower, (3) Pleasant Street for Francis J. Barresi Heights and George H. Cottell Heights.

High pedestrian traffic areas include schools. The priority placement for the flashing pedestrian crossing signs are those schools with the most kids walking to/from school include: (1) Jackson Letourneau on Anthony and Stafford Road (school has walking patrol in which principal walks kids to school due to safety concerns), (2) Mary Fonseca at Quarry Street and Small Way (walkers include kids from nearby housing complex and as far as Robeson Street and all the way to Pine Street, (3) Green School at Cambridge Street, and (4) Henry Lord on Amity Street (also includes nearby housing complex).

Placement of the flashing stop signs will begin with priority at the following locations: (1) Morgan Street and Second Street (playground located at intersection), (2) Globe Street and Stafford Road (playground located at intersection), (3) Wade Street at John Street/Wade Street and Fifth Street (park located in this area). The following are other heavily travelled intersections:

- Lyon Street and Middle Street
- Airport Road for the Northbound drivers
- Bay Street and Middle Street
- Bradford Avenue at Broadway
- Division Street at Broadway
- William Street at Broadway

Interval Training

Interval training has been scientifically proven to burn more calories than traditional steady state cardiovascular exercise. Additionally, this form of activity raises basal metabolic rate long after the interval training workout is complete.

Full Body Circuit Training

Full body circuit training, when conducted for alternating muscle groups (upper body, lower body, etc.) supports rest and recovery periods for each muscle group, while sustaining heart rate levels to maximize conditioning and caloric expenditure.

Functional Bodyweight Movements

Functional fitness movements strengthen performance in every day activities and movement patterns, and support longevity in adults.

Caloric Expenditure Analysis

Caloric expenditure on the Fitness Court is analyzed for the average adult. Program format is NFC's standard 7 movements in 7 minutes routine. This routine is conducted with work periods of 45 seconds at each station, followed by 15 seconds of rest. 




Loveland, CO Case Study: Individual Use

Loveland, Colorado NFC Pilot Program

National Fitness Campaign partnered with the city of Loveland and UCHealth to launch the first 21st Century Fitness Court and Campaign program in the state of Colorado. With support from the city of Loveland, UCHealth, and NFC staff, this location has been selected as a nationwide pilot and study site.

For the 2019 Pilot Program, there are various data points under consideration. The primary data point used for individual use for 2019 is Fitness Court App Data, showcasing total active users on the platform. It is important to note that this study is speculative in nature, extrapolating nationwide estimates for caloric expenditure as it relates to body composition. Historically, an estimated 5-10% of total Fitness Court users at a given location use the App. Thus, estimates can be created on total users, digital and non-digital. NFC recommends further investment in 2020 in on-site studies to confirm total daily user counts and usage duration.

This location represents, in NFC's calculation, an example of a tier 2 environment for the program. Program impact tiers are listed below. Factors that influence a site's qualification for a given tier include population density, connection to active pedestrian infrastructure, and traffic visibility. These tiers represent various levels of program impact based on random, individual use.



Traffic visibility: >28,000 daily impressions

Tier 2 Ex. Mishowaka, IN

Population density: 2,000 - 10,000 / SQ M Pedestrian trail usage: >200 daily users Traffic visibility: >5,000 - 28,000 daily impressions.

Calculating Estimated Impact - Individual Users

The benefits of the NFC program are far reaching, and include impacts on both physical and mental health. As NFC explores program impact, the immediate research focus has centered around body composition. Thus, caloric expenditure is the most appropriate initial study metric. Individual use impact calculations focus on both Fitness Court usage and duration of program participation. The UCHealth Fitness Court in Loveland Colorado was studied to determine average daily users, and average duration spent at the Fitness Court. Key findings are listed below.



NFC provides training for up to 15 ambassadors with each Fitness Court launch. The purpose of this program is to educate America around functional training practices and establish a core of leaders to continue to deliver programming in all partner communities.

In Loveland, NFC trained and certified a group of local Ambassadors, primarily made up of city staff. Following the training, these Ambassadors are now approved to teach Fitness Court Classes and Clinics, and support ongoing community programming on the UCHealth Fitness Court.

It shall be charged with the superintendence of the construction of all bridges, structures and public works, under the general control and direction of the City Engineer or of the division or department having charge of such construction, and shall prepare all plans and specifications for such structures and works. The division shall also make all surveys and plans relative to the laying out, widening, altering or grading of streets, and shall also make all surveys, estimates and descriptions required by the Mayor or the City Council.

B. The City Engineer shall provide professional civil engineering advice and assistance to other municipal departments.

Section 2-622 Office of the City Engineer: training of engineering personnel. All engineering personnel employed within the Office of the City Engineer, including the street inspectors, shall be briefed in the use of compaction testing and soils analysis at the state highway department prior to assuming the full responsibilities which are assigned to their positions.

Section 2-623 Office of the City Engineer: street inspectors.

Those personnel whose primary responsibilities are to inspect City streets and/or sidewalk construction, reconstruction, resurfacing, repair and permit excavation shall operate from within the Office of the City Engineer. They shall avail themselves of the expertise of the engineering personnel.

Section 2-624 Office of the City Engineer: superintendence of development work undertaken by City departments.

The provisions of Section 2-641 shall apply to all development work undertaken by any department of the City for which plans of any nature, with or without specifications, are required.

Annual inspections and examinations of all the bridges and public works belonging to the City shall be made by the Office of the City Engineer. A report of their condition as to safety or need of removal or repairs, as the City Engineer in consultation with the Director of City Operations shall deem necessary, shall be made to the Mayor and the City Council on or before February 1 of each year.

Section 2-626 Office of the City Engineer: custody of plans relating to streets, sewers and other public works.

The Office of the City Engineer shall have custody of all plans relating to streets, sewers and other public works, and shall keep such plans properly classified and indexed.

Section 2-627 Office of the City Engineer: preparation of estimates and specifications for work on highways; inspection of work.

The Office of the City Engineer shall prepare estimates and specifications for all work done by contract upon the highways and shall carefully inspect all work done by or for the Streets and Highways Section of the Division of Community Maintenance".

The Office of the City Engineer shall see that there is affixed a number on all buildings as prescribed in Chapter 10, Buildings and Building Regulations, § 10-92, of the City Code.

- 2. Discussion with Community Preservation Committee representatives re: accomplishments and 10th Anniversary of Community Preservation Act John Brandt, Chair of the Community Preservation Committee, provided an overview of the accomplishments during the ten years that the Community Preservation Act has been in effect. There were three videos presented regarding improvements and renovations that were made to the Veterans' Memorial Bicentennial Park, the entrance gates to the Oak Grove Cemetery and the Administration Building for the Fall River School Department. Councilor Bradford L. Kilby stated that he is very impressed with the number of projects that the Committee Preservation Act has funded. John Brandt stated that if the City had a Historical Planner, it would save thousands of dollars of city funds as all of the city projects need Historical approval, which usually costs approximately \$20,000.00 for such approval. Councilor Laura-Jean Washington stated that these projects are preserving the history of Fall River. She then asked if there are any projects pending regarding the Underground Railroad. Alexander Silva stated that funding assisted in the purchase of the Dr. Isaac Fiske house on Pine Street which was part of the Underground Railroad. He then added that volunteers have been working on restoring the house to eventually open the building to the public.
- 3. Discussion re: proposal for Bristol County ARPA funding of \$1,365,000.00 for the Bioreserve Discovery Center

The Administrator of Community Utilities stated that Kara Humm, the ARPA Coordinator, did an excellent job with the proposal for Bristol County ARPA funding for the Bioreserve Discovery Center on the shore of North Watuppa Pond. He then stated that there was a question about using CPA funds for the purchase of land and mentioned that the application requesting \$515,658.00 will be submitted prior to September 1, 2022. He also stated that an application was submitted to the Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs (EOEEA) through the land grant program for additional funding to purchase the land and highlighted that over 50% of the land mass of Fall River is forest and water. Councilor Bradford L. Kilby stated that this is a wonderful project for the residents of Fall River. Councilor Shawn E. Cadime stated that he is in support of the project but wanted to clarify the use of Community Preservation funds.

4. Resolution – City Council obligate \$11,000,000.00 of Bristol County ARPA funding for water and sewer infrastructure mandates

Councilor Michelle M. Dionne asked Paul Ferland, the Administrator of Community Utilities, how much the current mandates will cost. The Administrator of Community Utilities stated that currently the City is under a federal court order that is overseen by the Conservation Law Foundation which has a number of mandates to be completed prior to 2025. He then explained that there are other potential mandates and changes within the lead and copper rule that will require work prior to 2024, with an estimated cost of approximately \$100 million dollars. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne asked what will happen if these projects are not completed within the proper time table.

The Administrator of Community Utilities stated that there are fines attached if these mandates are not fulfilled on time. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne asked the Administrator of Community Utilities: if the City Council approved the \$11 million dollars for water and sewer infrastructure, would these funds be expended prior to December 31, 2026? Mr. Ferland stated that those funds would be expended prior to the end of 2026, in accordance with the Bristol County ARPA funding regulations. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne then asked what the savings would be to the residents if the \$20 million dollars that were bonded over 20 years would not be needed. Mr. Ferland stated it would save residents approximately \$.50 to \$.65 per one hundred cubic feet of water (CCF), with an average household using 53 CCF per year. Councilor Laura-Jean

Washington asked for the definition of a CCF. Mr. Ferland stated that 1 CCF is equal to one hundred cubic feet of water, which equals 748 gallons. Councilor Linda M. Pereira asked if \$9 or \$11 million dollars will fix the flooding issues at Stafford Square. The Administrator of Community Utilities stated that is not a sufficient amount of funds to correct the problems in that area. The Director of Financial Services stated that if the City were to use all of the ARPA funds available, the City of Fall River, which is a Gateway City, would not be able to apply for loan forgiveness and other additional grants, which could be more beneficial to the residents.

Council President Pam Laliberte-Lebeau turned the podium to Vice President Michelle M. Dionne for purposes of addressing the attendees.

Council President Pam Laliberte-Lebeau asked the Administrator of Community Utilities how much it would cost to correct the flooding problems at Stafford Square. The Administrator of Community Utilities stated that it would cost between \$42 to \$45 million dollars. Council President Pam Laliberte-Lebeau then asked if the \$9 or \$11 million dollars of ARPA funds would reduce this amount. Mr. Ferland stated that the ARPA funding would not have an impact on the necessary funds needed for Stafford Square as that project is not currently slated to begin. He then elaborated that there are other funding sources that are being considered for that project, but nothing at this time. The City Administrator stated that although the water and sewer projects are all needed, the Administration has already dedicated \$13 million dollars to the water and sewer divisions and feels that there are numerous other projects that may benefit the residents more. Council President Pam Laliberte-Lebeau stated that the residents who were waist deep in water pushing their vehicles out of Stafford Square after the last severe rain storm would probably disagree. She then stated that she supports the funding of an ice skating rink at Kennedy Park, as this is a great attraction for residents.

Council President Pam Laliberte-Lebeau returned to the podium at 8:21 p.m.

Councilor Joseph D. Camara stated that the local federal delegation should be contacted to request additional assistance with Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) funding. He then asked when the water main replacement program will end and Mr. Ferland stated that it should be complete by 2035. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne expressed concern that residents were advised that rate increases would cost a household \$11.00 per year and her utility bill increased \$30.00 per quarter instead. She also asked how much of the \$13 million dollars that were earmarked for the water and sewer divisions are used for road and sidewalk repair and Mr. Ferland explained that the repair of all roads and sidewalks are included with the replacing of water and sewer infrastructure. Councilor Shawn E. Cadime stated that the City has this opportunity to use a large amount of funding from the federal government for projects that are usually placed lower on the list of priorities due to their high cost. As a result, all parties should find a compromise and work together to get these projects funded since they will need to be funded in the near future and the total burden will be placed on the taxpayers instead. Councilor Leo O. Pelletier stated that many City departments are unable to fill vacant positions due to the low salaries. He then stated that the only solution to filling vacancies is to increase salaries, which unfortunately must increase the water and sewer rates. On a motion made by Councilor Bradford L. Kilby and seconded by Councilor Shawn E. Cadime, it was unanimously voted to refer the matter to the full council for action.

On a motion made by Councilor Andrew J. Raposo and seconded by Councilor Shawn E. Cadime, it was unanimously voted to adjourn at 8:47 p.m.
