President Shawn E. Cadime called the meeting to order at 10:10 p.m. with a moment of silence followed by a salute to the flag and announced that the meeting may be recorded with audio or video and transmitted through any medium.

- a. Jefferson Street Area Land Acquisition and Improvements \$1,000,000 On a motion made by Councilor Steven A. Camara and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte, it was unanimously voted to authorize the loan order to be published and referred to the Committee on Finance.

On a motion made by Councilor Steven A. Camara and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte, it was unanimously voted to authorize the loan order to be published and referred to the Committee on Finance.

3. Corporation Counsel re: Open Meeting Law Complaint 2016-117 Councilor Linda M. Pereira is concerned that if an appeal is filed and the City loses, could the City then be fined? Council President Shawn E. Cadime stated that he believes the City should move

Camara and seconded by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell to waive the rules to invite Corporation Counsel to discuss item #3. Corporation Counsel stated that his position is that elected officials who are not part of the subcommittee can participate in meetings, as long as they don't deliberate. He also stated that there is no decided case from a court that has been published that states that the City is wrong. The Attorney General's opinions are consistent and are enforceable if no one challenges them. Councilor Steven A. Camara asked Corporation Counsel if the Massachusetts Municipal Association had been contacted regarding this matter. Corporation Counsel stated that he intends to contact MMA and a few other associations to see if they may want to file Amicus Curiae Briefs in this matter. Councilor Steven A. Camara also questioned if this situation would also affect the School Committee. Corporation Counsel stated he was unsure, but would reach out to them to discuss the matter.

On a motion made by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell and seconded by Councilor Richard Cabeceiras, it was unanimously voted to have Corporation Counsel move forward with an appeal.

A motion was made by Councilor Steven A. Camara and seconded by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell to waive the rules to invite the City Administrator to discuss item #8. The City Administrator stated that he is an individual who receives a stipend. He would have to be classified a special municipal employee and the designation could be changed if it was the wish of the Council. She explained that the appointment letters stated that this is a stipend and not a salary. Councilor Steven A. Camara questioned if all employees who get paid stipends be eligible for medical insurance. The City Administrator stated she will need to contact the Human Resources Director to discuss this and ensure that it be done correctly. Councilor Cliff Ponte stated that he has been working with the City Administrator, Human Resources Director and the City Clerk to redo the entire salary chart. He stated that there can be a section that discusses stipends vs. salaries within the ordinance. On a motion made by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell and seconded by Councilor Pam Laliberte-

Lebeau, it was unanimously voted to pass the proposed ordinance through first reading with the Council President opposed.

Mr. David Hebert from Hanover Properties, LLC stated that he fully intends to restore this building, with a mixed use, commercial on the first two floors and high end residential apartments or condos on the

top floor.

On a motion made by Councilor Richard Cabeceiras and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte, it was voted 8 yeas to adopt the order, with Councilor Joseph D. Camara abstaining. Approved, September 15, 2016, Mayor Jasiel F. Correia II

Order - Bid for former Silvia School - Hanover Properties, LLC - \$5,000 Councilor Linda M. Pereira stated that she would prefer to see LAL Construction get the building as 12. they offered \$20,000 and Hanover Properties, LLC only offered \$5,000. Councilor Richard Cabeceiras stated that he is supporting the Hanover Properties, LLC bid of \$5,000 because the plans for the building proposed will generate more taxes than just a residential use. Councilor Cliff Ponte stated that just in the first year, the taxes could be in the vicinity of \$40,000. On a motion made by Councilor Steven A. Camara and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte, it was voted 7 yeas, 1 nay to adopt the order, with Councilor Linda M. Pereira voting in the negative and Councilor Joseph D. Camara abstaining.

On a motion made by Councilor Cliff Ponte and seconded by Councilor Steven A. Camara, it was voted 7 yeas, 2 nays to waive the rules to allow the City Administrator to answer questions in this regard, with Councilors Stephen R. Long and Linda M Pereira voting in the negative. The City Administrator stated the bidder had to provide a cost estimate from a contractor regarding the necessary emergency repair work which included a roof system and they had to be able to provide a letter of credit showing that they had the financial capacity to complete the emergency repair work and they represented to the committee that they had that capability. This was not required with the bid but would be required for the purchase and sales agreement. Councilor Pam Laliberte-Lebeau stated that if they could not present this for the P & S, then the agreement would be void. The City

Administrator stated that she was correct. Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell made a motion to move the question, but received no second. On a motion made by Councilor Pam Laliberte-Lebeau and seconded by Councilor Richard Cabeceiras, it was unanimously voted to waive the rules to allow Leonardo Diogo, President of St. John's Holy Ghost Club to answer questions in this matter. Councilor Pam Laliberte-Lebeau asked for bank statements from St. John's Holy Ghost Club. Mr. Diogo stated that bank statements were provided in the envelope that contained the check that was submitted to the Purchasing Department and he offered to get another copy.

On a motion made by Councilor Linda M. Pereira and seconded by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell, it was unanimously voted to move the question. A motion made by Councilor Steven A. Camara and seconded by Councilor Linda M. Pereira to adopt the order failed to carry 3 yeas, 5 nays with Councilors Richard Cabeceiras, Pam Laliberte-Lebeau, Stephen R. Long, Cliff Ponte and President Shawn E. Cadime voting in the negative and Councilor Joseph D. Camara abstaining. A further motion made by Councilor Richard Cabeceiras and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte to grant the bid leave to withdraw failed to carry 4 yeas, 5 nays, with Councilors Joseph D. Camara, Steven A. Camara, Pam Laliberte-Lebeau, Raymond A. Mitchell and Linda M. Pereira voting in the negative. A further motion was made by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte to refer the matter to the Committee on Real Estate. After further discussion and on yet a further motion made by Councilor Stephen R. Long and seconded by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell it was unanimously voted to move the question. On the motion made by Councilor Raymond A. Mitchell and seconded by Councilor Cliff Ponte, it was voted 9 yeas to refer the matter to the Committee on Real Estate.

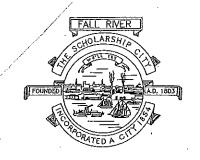

Councilors:

For further clarification, the list of surplus property before you does not include two other pieces of equipment that were previously utilized by the SanItation Division. The DCM Streets and Highways Division has determined that a 2013 Rear Loader valued at approximately \$115,000 and a Roll-off valued at approximately \$65,000 will provide continuing use to this Division.

With the Council's approval, the City intends to request sealed bids for disposition of this surplus property. The solicitation can include a minimum bid amount. Our trash collection vendor, EZ Disposal, had offered a purchase price of \$1.1 million. Given the removal of the above items from the surplus list, the EZ Disposal bid offer would need to be reduced by \$180,000. A Minimum bid of \$920,000 could be considered.

Your approval is respectfully requested for the attached loan orders for \$2,000,000. There are two separate loan orders for \$1,000,000 each as one will be supported by the Water Enterprise Fund and the other shall be supported by the City General Fund. This project is intended to result in the acquisition of over 13 acres for a future Water Treatment Facility and the protection of Sucker Brook.

The plan involves the donation of 10 acres of land by the Atlantis Charter School. In return the City shall construct a driveway and stream crossing to allow access to their site. This driveway also has the potential future use of improving access to the adjacent industrial park and public access to the waterfront. The Water Division also plans to purchase the adjacent land on Lot D-20-16 which includes 3.37 acres.

The value of this plan is to protect waterfront property on the South Watuppa Pond for construction of a future water treatment facility. As water demand expands in the future the potential use of this additional resource will be a major advantage for the City. On the interim, we plan to develop a public access plan for passive recreation.

Also attached are the estimated project costs, amortization schedule, draft agreement with the Charter School and location of the land parcels. Please note that the agreement is still a draft and subject to further revision.

AGREEMENT

Draft-8/22/16

Agreement made thisday of August, 2016 by and between the City of Fall River, a municipal corporation of the commonwealth of Massachusetts, and the Atlantis Charter School, 37 Park Street, Fall River, MA 02721.
WHEREAS, the Atlantis Charter School, intends to build a new school on Lot D-20-1 bordered by Jefferson Street to the north, Dickinson Street to the south, wetlands to the west and the South Watuppa Pond to the east; and
WHEREAS, the City of Fall River and area residents have expressed concerns regarding the detrimental impact of traffic to the Dickinson Street area by the Atlantis Charter School; and
WHEREAS, the Atlantis Charter School is willing to address the traffic and safety issues to the extent and upon the terms hereinafter enumerated;
NOW THEREFORE, the City of Fall River and the Atlantis Charter School agree as follows:
Atlantis Charter School shall:
 Require that all vehicles (buses, vehicles for employees, students and parents) shall enter the site via an access road from Jefferson Street.

- 2. Construct a secondary emergency egress road to Dickinson Street that will be gated and closed except for emergency vehicle access by the Police/Fire Departments and/or release of vehicles during a temporary emergency event that renders the Jefferson Street driveway inaccessible. Said emergency must be related to Police/Fire emergency events and not for convenience.
- 3. In the event that the Jefferson Street access is not completed and ready to use when the School is ready to open in September of 2017; then the Dickinson Street access may be used on a temporary basis for student access only.

- Construct a walking path for students that walk to utilize the Dickinson Street egress area. The Atlantis Charter School shall require walking student to use this pathway.
- 5. Construct the flood control Improvements on Dickinson Street previously identified in the draft integrated Master Plan to include elevation of the road at the low point by 2,5 feet and replace the existing culvert with two 5 'x 2' box culverts.
- 6. The Engineer for Atlantis shall design the flood control improvements subject to approval by the City Engineer and the Administrator of Community Utilities. Atlantis shall not be held liable for flooding events or impacts related to these improvements as approved by the City after construction is complete.
- 7. Donate 10 acres of land including portions of the north and west side of the property to the City of Fall River Water Division. The exact land donation must be finalized in a sub division plan approved by and deeded to the City of Fall River.
- 8. Disclose any land contamination issues on the existing site and mitigation efforts that are needed.
- 9. Avoid and minimize the use of Dickinson Street by any vehicles related to construction of the school to the greatest extent possible.
- 10. If any wetland restoration is needed on the donated land then said restoration shall be completed by the Atlantis Charter School on their remaining portion of the land.
- 11. Atlantis shall support and not interfere with the City of Fall River land purchase efforts of Lot D-20-16 delineated below.
- 12. Atlantis shall cooperate with the City staff and Engineering Firms in providing access to the site and all related documentation requested.

The City of Fall River Shall:

1. Prepare the sub division plan for the land donation delineated above.

- 2. Said land donation shall be assigned to the Water Division for potential future use as a Water Treatment Facility for the South Watuppa Pond and protection of Sucker Brook.
- 3. Purchase the adjacent land known as Lot D-20-16 subject to the Owner's approval. Said land purchase shall be assigned to the Water Division for potential use as a Water Treatment Facility for the South Watuppa Pond. This purchase shall not involve or interfere with Atlantis School Project.
- 4. Improve the land donation denoted above in Atlantis Charter School Item 7 to include a driveway to accommodate vehicular traffic for the Atlantis Charter School including the stream crossing and access from the existing Jefferson Street extension to the new property boundary to be created by the land division.
 - a. Atlantis shall be responsible for the continuation of that driveway on their remaining property to the school.
 - b. The City shall provide an access and transportation easement to the Atlantis Charter School for use of the driveway and stream crossing on City of Fall River land.
 - c. Atlantis shall plow snow as needed for school access for the entire driveway to the existing Jefferson Street Extension.
- 5. Submit a \$2,000,000 loan order subject to City Council approval to allow:
 - a. Construction of the stream crossing.
 - b. Construction of the driveway access.
 - c. All Related construction costs.
 - d. All related engineering, construction management, permitting costs.
 - e. Purchase of Lot D-20-16.
 - f. Any costs related to the City's commitments in this agreement.
- 6. Preserve the new City owned land denoted herein for open space conservation uses until such that time a Water Treatment Facility is constructed.
- 7. Submit for approval the revised site plan submittal by the Atlantis Charter School that will conform to the requirements of this agreement.
- 8. Approve the building permit for the Atlantis Charter School once the above noted revised site plan is approved and conformance to all requirements are in place.

I have not yet received your decision in the above matter but Mr. Ferry kindly e-mailed me a copy. While your decision was not unexpected I had hoped that your office might change it's position based on our submission and discussion.

However, since you have not I wanted to outline below the options which I understand would be acceptable to your office:

I; Announce every sub-committee meeting as a regular city council meeting. The agenda to be followed would have to be that published with the announcement of the meeting. Any City Councilor could attend and participate.

2: Continue to announce sub-committee meetings and meet as we have. The caveat to this procedure being that any councilor not a member of the sub-committee may attend but must sit in the seats designated for the general public and not in their assigned seats at the council table. Additionally those councilors in attendance could only participate, if at all, as members of the public if recognized by the chair and only if other members of the public were recognized as well.

3: File an appeal pursuant to MGL 30A sec 23(d). Filing such appeal would stay the order of September 1, 2016.

If I am in any way incorrect please advise. There are other, similar, complaints still pending with your office. While I expect the same decision in those complaints I would hope that any remedy or order would be prospective only since the earliest notice of a definitive finding was dated September I, 2016 and not yet received by this office.

RE: Open Meeting Law Complaint

Dear Attorney Macy:

This office received a complaint from CJ Ferry, dated March 30, alleging that the Fall River City Council (the "Council") violated the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, §§ 18-25. The complaint was originally filed with the Council on February 16, and the Council responded by letter dated March 10. In his complaint, Mr. Ferry alleges that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law when a quorum of the Council was present at a meeting of the Council's Subcommittee on Ordinances and Legislation (the "Subcommittee") and deliberated, even though the meeting was not noticed as a joint meeting.

We appreciate the patience of the parties while we reviewed this matter. Following our review, we find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law as alleged. In reaching a determination, we reviewed the original complaint, the Council's response, and the request for further review filed with our office. We also reviewed a video recording of a Subcommittee meeting held on February 16.3

FACTS

We find the facts as follows. The Council is a nine-member public body, thus five members constitute a quorum. At all times relevant to this complaint, five Councilors—Cliff Ponte, Joseph Camara, Pam Laliberte Lebeau, Stephen Long, and Linda Pereira—were the sole members of the Subcommittee. On February 10, the Subcommittee posted notice of a meeting to be held on February 16. The notice did not state that the meeting would be a joint meeting between the Subcommittee and the Council.

The Subcommittee held the February 16 meeting as planned in the Council chambers with four Subcommittee members present. The Subcommittee members sat at a rectangular table in the middle of the room in front of the dals where the Councilors regularly sit, During this meeting, four other Councilors arrived, sitting in their regular seats at the Council's dals, bringing the total present to eight Councilors. During the meeting, Councilors Richard Cabecelras, Shawn Cadime, Raymond Mitchell, and Steven Camara were recognized to speak. These Councilors, not members of the Subcommittee, addressed the Subcommittee from the Council dals and asked questions. Ultimately, the Subcommittee voted to refer one issue to the Council for full discussion; the Councilors present did not comment on this vote.

DISCUSSION

The Open Meeting Law requires that, except in limited circumstances, "all meetings of a public body shall be open to the public." G.L. c. 30A, § 20(a). Except in an emergency, "a public body shall post notice of ever meeting at least 48 hours prior to such meeting, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays." G.L. c. 30A, § 20(b). A subcommittee of a public body is itself a public body subject to the Open Meeting Law. G.L. c. 30A, § 18. The Open Meeting Law defines a "meeting" as "a deliberation by a public body with respect to any matter within the body's jurisdiction," however this definition does not include the "attendance by a quorum of a public body at a meeting of another public body that has complied with the notice requirements of the open meeting law, so long as the visiting members communicate only by open participation in the meeting on those matters under discussion by the host body and do not deliberate." Id. "Deliberation" is defined, in relevant part, as "an oral or written communication through any medium, including electronic mail, between or among a quorum of a public body on any public business within its jurisdiction." Id.

The complaint alleges that the presence of five Councilors—a quorum of the Council—on the Subcommittee is a per se violation of the Open Meeting Law. The complaint alleges that every Subcommittee meeting is therefore a meeting at which a quorum of the Council is present. This argument is unavailing. We have previously concluded that a quorum of a public body may sit on its subcommittee without having to post a separate meeting notice, provided that the discussion is limited to matters within the jurisdiction of the subcommittee. See OML 2013-155, En. 2.4 Because we discern from the recording of the February 16 meeting no discussion of topics beyond the Subcommittee's jurisdiction, we find no violation with respect to this allegation.

The complaint also alleges that the Councilors who were not members of the Subcommittee violated the law when they deliberated during the Subcommittee's February 16 meeting. Members of a parent public body may attend the neeting of a subcommittee provided there is no deliberation. See OML 2013-38. In considering whether members of the parent public body have deliberated during a subcommittee meeting, we look for indicia such as whether the parent public body members were seated with the general public and whether they participated by open participation to conclude that no improper deliberation occurred. Id. Here, Councilors Cabeceiras, Cadime, Mitchell, and Camara sat in their seats at the Council dais. When they were recognized to speak, it was done with the honorific "Councilor." Based on this,

a reasonable member of the public watching the recording of the meeting would have believed they were watching a joint meeting of the Council and the Subcommittee. We therefore find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law by deliberating during the February 16 meeting without posting notice.

While not raised in the complaint, we note that the Council did not respond to respond to the complaint within the time frame required by law. Unless an extension of time has been granted, a public body must, within 14 business days of receipt of an Open Meeting Law complaint, send a copy of the complaint to the Attorney General's Office and notify the Attorney General's Office of any remedial action taken. G.L. c. 30A, § 23(b); 940 CMR 19.05(5), (6). Here, the complaint was filed with the Council on February 16. The Board did not request an extension, and responded by letter dated March 10. We take this opportunity to remind the Board of its obligations under the Open Meeting Law.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons stated above, we find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law. We order the Council's immediate and future compliance with the Open Meeting Law, and we caution that similar future violations may be considered evidence of intent to violate the law.

We now consider the complaint addressed by this determination to be resolved. This determination does not address any other complaints that may be pending with our office or the Council. Please feel free to contact the Division at (617) 963-2540 if you have any questions.

Dear Councilors:

I am counsel to Matthew Ford (hereinafter "Ford") and Ephesian Arms. Inc. regarding post-eviction proceedings after a commercial eviction at their business, Ephesian Arms (hereinafter "Bphesian") at 112 Tripp Street in Fall River. This letter is being sent to you as the appointing authority for Moniz & Latimer, Constables (hereinafter "M&L") to make you aware of several irregularities and improprieties that have occurred regarding my clients' eviction that we believe calls into serious question Moniz & Latimer's continued appointment as constables by the City of New Bedford and their continued possession of firearms licenses.

My client's business, Ephesian Arms, is engaged in the sale and manufacture of firearms, and possesses all necessary federal and state licenses to be engaged in that line of business. On approximately January 25, 2016, M&L appeared at my client's place of business at 112 Tripp Street in Fall River with an Execution for Possession and Money Damages on behalf of Ephesian's landlord, 379 Kilburn Street, LLC issued by Fall River District Court.

My client immediately asked M&L if there was a representative from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, & Firearms (hereinafter "ATF") or the chief law enforcement officer from the Fall River present to take an inventory of the firearms present on the premises. My client was told that there was not. My client then informed M&L that this was legally required. M&L refused to call in the ATF or chief law enforcement officer and also refused to allow my client to conduct an inventory of firearms himself. My client was told to leave the premises ASAP or they would have him arrested.

Before my client was forced to leave the premises, he witnessed M&L remove all the recordings from and disable the security system and begin dismantling the computer system. He witnessed movers taking out items unsupervised by the constables. He witnessed the constables seize cash of the register. He was never given a receipt for the cash seized out of the register, nor did the constables conduct an inventory of the premises, allow my client to conduct any sort of inventory, and did not notify the ATF of chief law enforcement officer of what was being done, despite the presence of firearms. My client contacted the ATF himself to inform them of what had happened.

On approximately February 12, 2016, Ford learned that firearms that had previously been stored and located on the premises pursuant to his Federal Firearms License (hereinafter "FFL") had been taken off the premises and were being held at 8 Archers Way in Acushnet, MA, an address not associated with the FFL and not a secured facility appropriate for the storage of firearms. My client contacted Wayne Betencourt (hereinafter "Betencourt") at the ATF and provided him with this information. My client learned that the ATF had not approved the removal of the firearms from the premises, nor did they approve the storage of firearms at 8 Archers Way in Acushnet.

Shortly thereafter, my client and his employee Alfred Cometta were able to arrange to meet M&L at the 8 Archers Way address to recover possession of firearms that were placed with his business on consignment when they were seized by M&L and were not owned by Ephesian. My client was able to view that the firearms were not properly secured, there were gun parts randomly thrown into boxes, including receivers (which are the actual working parts of the firearm). My client again insisted that the proper inventory had to be done.

In approximately mid-February an inventory of the firearms was finally be done with M&L, my client and his employee Alfred Cometta, Betencourt, and Mark Bouchard (hereinafter "Bouchard"), the Fall River Police Department, Chief Law Enforcement officer. The inventory was not able to be fully completed, as M&L did not bring any receivers to be inventoried, claiming that the receivers were being stored at W&W Movers in New Bedford. It merits mentioning, that W&W is also not an approved storage facility for firearms. Betencourt was not able to complete the inventory that day and only 2 days later did he meet with M&L to complete the inventory of the firearms.

There were a total of six missing receivers and firearms, which my client subsequently filed a missing firearms report for with the ATF. M&L informed Betencourt that they had sold some receivers without registering them to the buyers, including an NFA dealer sample machine gun. These receivers have subsequently been returned to either Betencourt or to the Fall River Police Department, where at least one receiver is still currently being held. We have the names and contact information of two of the purchasers of these receivers and would be happy to provide you with that information to help in your investigation. Officer Bouchard would also be happy to provide a statement regarding his knowledge of this and the entire situation.

Several sales of firearms, equipment, and accessories seized from Ephesian by M&L took place. These sales were not properly advertised as required by law. Several of them were advertised by social media postings as opposed to being published in a public record as required by law. Furthermore, such sales are to be done by auction. It appears many of these were conducted as private sales.

My client knows that one such sale took place on the Fishing Pier in New Bedford, where firearms, parts, and accessories were sold, including the sale of high capacity magazines with no proper law enforcement identification to back the sale up. Based on a partial inventory was client has attempted to conduct based on his records and memory, he is missing well over 150 of these magazines, which include magazines for the AR-15, AK-47, AK-74, Glock, Smith & Wesson among others.

After the sales, M&L purchased a total of eight firearms themselves, with an approximate value of \$10,000-\$11,000. It is a violation of law for a constable to personally benefit from the sale of seized property and these highly collectible firearms should be returned to my client immediately.

My client believes that a further 8 to 10 firearms were illegally sold by M&L. Five firearms are still missing. On approximately May 9, 2016, my client discovered an illegally sold receiver on social media while looking for information regarding M&L's sale of items seized from Ephesian. This information was forwarded to Betencourt and my client is hopeful that he can recover possession of this illegally sold receiver as well.

As of current, M&L has never provided my client an inventory of what was seized from the premises on January 25, 2016, nor provided my client with documentation regarding property that was sold pursuant to the execution or any information related thereto, nor have they remitted any funds to my client above and beyond those necessary to satisfy the landlord's money judgment, plus their reasonable fees and services accrued in doing so, despite both the legal obligation to do so, and an agreement entered as an order of Fall River District Court requiring them to do so. All M&L has provided to my client is a wildly inflated hand written invoice claiming they were owed almost \$16,000.00 in costs and fees as of April 11, 2016, with no breakdown or backup of any kind.

M&L has not returned my client's books and records seized from the premises, nor have they returned the videotapes seized from my client's security system. They did not notify the ATF of Fall River Police Department as was required, they improperly stored firearms at unapproved and unsecured locations, they have sold firearms and related accessories without complying with applicable law. They have conducted sales of seized property without properly advertising such sales, and they have not conducted auctions of seized property as required. They have engaged in prohibited self-dealing by purchasing property that they had themselves seized for below market value.

Based on M&L's actions and omissions in the handling of this matter as laid out above, both my client and Officer Bouchard from the Fall River Police Department believe that M&L's firearms licenses should be revoked and that their appointment as constables should be revoked and not reappointed. We strongly urge you to investigate this matter as it is of the upmost importance.

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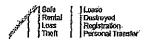

Dear Members of the City Council,

I am requesting a vote by the Fall River City Council endorsing the resolution in opposition to lifting the cap on the number of charter schools allowed under state law. This fall, voters will decide whether or not to approve the lift by voting on Question 2. The Fall River School Committee, and over 70 other communities (see below), have taken official votes to support the resolution. This resolution would not impact the charter school currently operating in Fall River. It would merely ensure no new charters open.

As a public school educator in Fall River, I am concerned about attempts to increase the number of charter schools in Massachusetts. This year alone, Fall River is losing \$9,672,561 to charter schools. Not coincidentally, the FRPS experienced millions of dollars in cuts last June, the impact of which will be detrimental to the majority of our students.

If the charter cap is lifted, we could lose much more. When funds are diverted from district schools to pay for publicly funded, privately run charter schools, we jeopardize opportunities and choices for the majority of students. This is contrary to the principle that public education is meant to provide all students with opportunities to explore and grow.

As a taxpayer, I am also concerned with the lack of accountability of charter schools. Cities and towns have no say over whether a charter school can be located in their communities. That decision is made by appointed state officials. Once a charter school is opened, local elected officials have no authority over the school's operation. That means that if a charter school acts in ways that are not in the best interests of students from the community such as suspending students in large numbers, failing to meet students' special education needs or pushing students back to their district schools in the middle of the school year. Local residents and their elected officials have no recourse to fix those practices.

Rather than lifting the caps on charter schools, leaders in Massachusetts should be committing the resources necessary to provide *all* children with the education they deserve.

WHEREAS, Fall River is losing \$9,672,561 to Commonwealth charter schools and public school districts across the state are losing more than \$408 million this year alone — a loss of funds that is undermining the ability of districts to provide all students with the educational services to which they are entitled; and

WHEREAS, Commonwealth charter schools are often approved over the objections of a majority of community residents and their elected officials and are not accountable to local elected officials once they are approved; and

WHEREAS, Commonwealth charter schools often fail to serve the same proportion of special needs students, low-income students and English language learners as the districts from which they receive students and often use high suspension rates to drive out students they don't want to serve; and

WHEREAS, the Commonwealth charter school system is creating separate and unequal opportunities for success; and

WHEREAS, lifting the cap on charter schools would greatly worsen the problems listed above and lead to a costly and divisive two-track school system;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Fall River City Council opposes lifting the cap on Commonwealth charter schools.

RE: Open Meeting Law Complaint

Dear Attorney Macy:

This office received a complaint from CJ Ferry, dated March 30, alleging that the Fall River City Council (the "Council") violated the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, §§ 18-25. The complaint was originally filed with the Council on February 16, and the Council responded by letter dated March 10. In his complaint, Mr. Ferry alleges that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law when a quorum of the Council was present at a meeting of the Council's Subcommittee on Ordinances and Legislation (the "Subcommittee") and deliberated, even though the meeting was not noticed as a joint meeting.

We appreciate the patience of the parties while we reviewed this matter. Following our review, we find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law as alleged. In reaching a determination, we reviewed the original complaint, the Council's response, and the request for further review filed with our office. We also reviewed a video recording of a Subcommittee meeting held on February 16.3

FACTS

We find the facts as follows. The Council is a nine-member public body, thus five members constitute a quorum. At all times relevant to this complaint, five Councilors—Cliff Ponte, Joseph Camara, Pam Laliberte-Lebeau, Stephen Long, and Linda Pereira—were the sole members of the Subcommittee. On February 10, the Subcommittee posted notice of a meeting to be held on February 16. The notice did not state that the meeting would be a joint meeting between the Subcommittee and the Council.

The Subcommittee held the February 16 meeting as planned in the Council chambers with four Subcommittee members present. The Subcommittee members sat at a rectangular table in the middle of the room in front of the dais where the Councilors regularly sit. During this meeting, four other Councilors arrived, sitting in their regular seats at the Council's dais, bringing the total present to eight Councilors. During the meeting, Councilors Richard Cabeceiras, Shawn Cadime, Raymond Mitchell, and Steven Camara were recognized to speak. These Councilors, not members of the Subcommittee, addressed the Subcommittee from the Council dais and asked questions. Ultimately, the Subcommittee voted to refer one issue to the Council for full discussion; the Councilors present did not comment on this vote.

DISCUSSION

The Open Meeting Law requires that, except in limited circumstances, "all meetings of a public body shall be open to the public." G.L. c. 30A, § 20(a). Except in an emergency, "a public body shall post notice of ever meeting at least 48 hours prior to such meeting, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays." G.L. c. 30A, § 20(b). A subcommittee of a public body is itself a public body subject to the Open Meeting Law. G.L. c. 30A, § 18. The Open Meeting Law defines a "meeting" as "a deliberation by a public body with respect to any matter within the body's jurisdiction," however this definition does not include the "attendance by a quorum of a public body at a meeting of another public body that has complied with the notice requirements of the open meeting law, so long as the visiting members communicate only by open participation in the meeting on those matters under discussion by the host body and do not deliberate." Id. "Deliberation" is defined, in relevant part, as "an oral or written communication through any medium, including electronic mail, between or among a quorum of a public body on any public business within its jurisdiction." Id.

The complaint alleges that the presence of five Councilors—a quorum of the Council—on the Subcommittee is a per se violation of the Open Meeting Law. The complaint alleges that every Subcommittee meeting is therefore a meeting at which a quorum of the Council is present. This argument is unavailing. We have previously concluded that a quorum of a public body may sit on its subcommittee without having to post a separate meeting notice, provided that the discussion is limited to matters within the jurisdiction of the subcommittee. See OML 2013-155, Fn. 2.4 Because we discern from the recording of the February 16 meeting no discussion of topics beyond the Subcommittee's jurisdiction, we find no violation with respect to this allegation.

The complaint also alleges that the Councilors who were not members of the Subcommittee violated the law when they deliberated during the Subcommittee's February 16 meeting. Members of a parent public body may attend the meeting of a subcommittee provided there is no deliberation. See OML 2013-38. In considering whether members of the parent public body have deliberated during a subcommittee meeting, we look for indicia such as whether the parent public body members were seated with the general public and whether they participated by open participation to conclude that no improper deliberation occurred. Id. Here, Councilors Cabeceiras, Cadime, Mitchell, and Camara sat in their seats at the Council dais. When they were recognized to speak, it was done with the honorific "Councilor." Based on this,

a reasonable member of the public watching the recording of the meeting would have believed they were watching a joint meeting of the Council and the Subcommittee. We therefore find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law by deliberating during the February 16 meeting without posting notice.

While not raised in the complaint, we note that the Council did not respond to respond to the complaint within the time frame required by law. Unless an extension of time has been granted, a public body must, within 14 business days of receipt of an Open Meeting Law complaint, send a copy of the complaint to the Attorney General's Office and notify the Attorney General's Office of any remedial action taken. G.L. c. 30A, § 23(b); 940 CMR 19.05(5), (6). Here, the complaint was filed with the Council on February 16. The Board did not request an extension, and responded by letter dated March 10. We take this opportunity to remind the Board of its obligations under the Open Meeting Law.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons stated above, we find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law. We order the Council's immediate and future compliance with the Open Meeting Law, and we caution that similar future violations may be considered evidence of intent to violate the law.

We now consider the complaint addressed by this determination to be resolved. This determination does not address any other complaints that may be pending with our office or the Council. Please feel free to contact the Division at (617) 963-2540 if you have any questions.

Dear Attorney Macy:

This office received three complaints from Patrick Higgins, dated April 6, alleging that the Fall River City Council (the "Council") violated the Open Meeting Law, G.L. c. 30A, §§ 18-25.1 The complaints were originally filed with the Council on March 8, and you responded, on behalf of the Council, in a letter on July 13. In each complaint, Mr. Higgins alleges that, at the beginning of specific Council meetings, the Council President failed to require those individuals who intended to record the meeting to notify him. Additionally, Mr. Higgins alleges that the Council, as a practice, does not create and/or approve written meeting minutes.

Following our review, we find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law by failing to approve its meeting minutes in a timely manner and by failing to respond to Open Meeting Law complaints within 14 business days. However, we find no violation with respect to the ·Council's procedure for announcing the recording of its meetings. In reaching this determination, we reviewed the original complaint, the Council's response, and the request for further review filed with our office. We also reviewed portions of the video recordings of the Council meetings held on February 9, February 23, and March 8, which are posted on the Fall River Cable Access Television website.2

FACTS

We find the facts as follows. At the beginning of the Council meetings held on February 9, February 23, and March 8, President Shawn Cadime announced that any person "may make a recording" and that "people are advised that such recordings... are being made." It does not

appear from the video that President Cadime asked the audience whether anyone intended to record the meeting.

Before the filing of these complaints, the Council drafted minutes of its meetings, but did not approve them. The Council has since changed this practice by approving minutes at the next meeting. The Council has not, however, approved the draft minutes of any meetings held before the filing of these complaints in March.

On March 8, the complainant filed the three Open Meeting Law complaints with the Council. The Council did not respond to the complaints within 14 business days of its receipt, and the complainant subsequently sought further review of the matter by filing a copy of the original complaints with our office on April 6. At no time did the Council request an extension of time to respond to the complaints. In June, the Office informed us that it had experienced some personnel turnover and would respond to the complaints in due course. The Council responded to the complaints in a letter dated July 16.

DISCUSSION

I. The Council Properly Announced that its Meetings Were Being Recorded.

The Open Meeting Law requires that all meetings of a public body be conducted in an open session, with some exceptions. G.L. c. 30A, §§ 20(a), 21(a). The Open Meeting Law states that "[a]fter notifying the chair of the public body, any person may make a video or audio recording of an open session of a meeting of a public body, or may transmit the meeting through any medium, subject to reasonable requirements of the chair as to the number, placement and operation of equipment used so as not to interfere with the conduct of the meeting." Id. at § . 20(f). The law requires the chair to inform attendees of any recording. Id. The requirement that the chair inform attendees that a meeting is being recorded includes the requirement that the chair inform the attendees when those recordings are being made by the public body itself for public broadcasting or administrative purposes. See OML 2013-136; OML 2012-24.3

The complaint alleges that President Cadime failed to require those who intended to record the meeting to notify him at the beginning of the meeting. This is not a requirement of the Open Meeting Law. Rather, the law requires the chair to announce that the meeting is being recorded only upon becoming aware that a person intends to record the meeting. See OML 2015-151; see also OML 2014-8 (the chair must inform members of the public of any recording of which the chair is aware). Here, the City cable channel regularly records the Council meetings. Accordingly, President Cadime properly complied with the law by notifying the public at the beginning of the meeting that the meeting was being recorded. Where this announcement is already being made, the law does not require the chair to inquire about additional recordings. The purpose of the law—to notify the public that the meeting is being recorded—was served with this one announcement. Only in the instance where a chair does not know whether anyone is recording the meeting, and therefore does not know whether to make the announcement, should the chair should make reasonable inquiries of the audience to

determine whether anyone intends to record the meeting. See OML 2014-39; OML 2013-139. Accordingly, we find that the Council did not violate the law in this regard.

II. The Council Failed to Approve its Meeting Minutes.

The Open Meeting Law requires that a public body "create and maintain accurate minutes of all meetings, including executive sessions, setting forth the date, time and place, the members present or absent, a summary of the discussions on each subject, a list of documents and other exhibits used at the meeting, the decisions made and the actions taken at each meeting, including the record of all votes." G.L. c. 30A, § 22(a). The law does not provide a definition of "timely manner," but a public body should approve minutes at the next meeting where possible. See id.; OML 2012-91. For bodies that meet regularly, we have concluded that a delay of two to three months in approving minutes does not comply with the law. See OML 2016-62.

The Council has failed to create and approve meeting minutes in a timely manner, in violation of the Open Meeting Law. See G.L. c. 30A, § 22(a). The Council had a longstanding practice of drafting minutes, but not approving them. Since the filing of these complaints in March, the Council corrected this practice and began approving minutes at the next meeting. The Council has not, however, approved the draft minutes from any of its meetings held before March. Accordingly, we order the Council to approve the backleg of draft minutes of any of its meetings held since July 1, 2010.4

III. The Council Failed to Properly Respond to These Complaints.

We find that the Council failed to properly respond to these complaints. The Open Meeting Law requires that within 14 business days after receiving a complaint the public body shall review the complaint's allegations; take remedial action, if appropriate; and send to the Attorney General a copy of the complaint and a description of any remedial action taken. G.L. c. 30A, § 23(b); 940 CMR 29.05(5). At no point did the Council request an extension of time to respond to the complaints. By taking nearly four months to respond, the Board clearly failed to comply with the Law.

CONCLUSION

For the reasons stated above, we find that the Council violated the Open Meeting Law by failing to approve its meeting minutes in a timely manner and by failing to respond to Open Meeting Law complaints within 14 business days. We order immediate and future compliance with the Open Meeting Law's requirements, and we caution that similar future violations may be considered evidence of intent to violate the law. Additionally, we order the Council, within 60 days of receipt of this determination, to approve the backlog of draft minutes of its meetings held since July 1, 2010.

^a Our office assumed authority for the interpretation and enforcement of the Open Meeting Law, as it applies to local public bodies, on July 1, 2010. See G.L. c. 30A, § 23(a); see also G.L. c. 30A, §§ 18-25, generally. Prior to July 1, 2010, the law governing meetings of local public bodies was G.L. c. 39, § 23B (now repealed), and the District Attorneys were responsible for its enforcement. One of the practical effects of this change is that our office has authority to enforce the Open Meeting Law only with respect to violations that occurred on or after July 1, 2010. See OML 2015-97.

The family of Edmond J. Desmarais, DOB: 2/15/31- DOD: 6/3/1999, respectfully request that the unnamed bridge, located at the junction of Jefferson, Quarry and Quequechan Streets, be named the Sgt. Edmond J. Desmarais Bridge.

Edmond J. Desmarais was a life-long resident of Fall River, who for most of his adult life resided at 55 Quarry Street. He was initially employed as a mill worker at Newport/Capri Finishing, off of Stevens and Jefferson Streets. And after those mills closed, he was employed by the City of Fall River, first at the Bank Street Armory where he oversaw the rehabilitation of the gym/basketball floor, and then for the Department of Public Works, off of Rodman Street, where he worked until he retired.

Because Mr. Desmaris resided on Quarry Street he traveled over the Jefferson, Quarry, Quequechan Street bridge on a daily basis, first to his job in the mills and then in his employment for the City's Department of Public Works. Mr. Desmarais also served as a Fall River Police Constable, appointed by then Mayor, Carlton M. Vivelreos.

Mr. Edmond I. Desmarais inititally joined the Army, July 1953, and then due to a health condition was transferred from active duty to the Army Reserve, from which he was honorably discharged as a Private on March 21, 1962. In his later years he joined the Massachusetts Army National Guard; on April 25, 1977, and honorably discharged on April 24, 1980, having attained the rank of Sergeant.

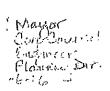
During the Bilzzard of 1978, Edmond J. Desmarais, who was then a member of the Massachusetts Army National Guard was assigned to the Bank Street Armory with a city restoration project, and during the Blizzard, assisted the city and our citizens with disaster relief services by keeping the Armory open night and day, initially as a refuge from the blizzard, and then for the Federal Emergency Management Agency to provide disaster relief services for Fall River. For his efforts, going above and beyond what was required of him, Mr. Desmarais was awarded a Federal Disaster Assistance (FEMA) Citation, by then Director of the Federal Emergency Management Administration, Joel Finkle. Shortly after the blizzard of 1978, Mr. Desmarais began his employment with the Department of Public Works, where he worked until his retirement.

Mr. Edmond J. Desmarais worked for many years as a DPW Sanitation Worker on the rubbish trucks, and in later years, he became the DPW Garage "Night Watchman", becoming a well known figure, responding to motor vehicle accidents and special projects. He was always known for his easy, friendly and outgoing manner and his willingness to help others whenever possible. He is also fondly known for his constant companion and DPW mascot; Lady, a stray dog which he adopted and put to work keeping the DPW garage free of rodents.

In tribute to Sgt. Edmond J. Desmarals; his military service to our country, state and city, and in recognition of his outstanding service to our city during the Blizzard of 78, and as a public employee, we, the family of Edmond J. Desmarals, respectfully petition that the Fall River City Council name the bridge located at the juncture of Jefferson, Quarry and Quequechan Streets in his honor.

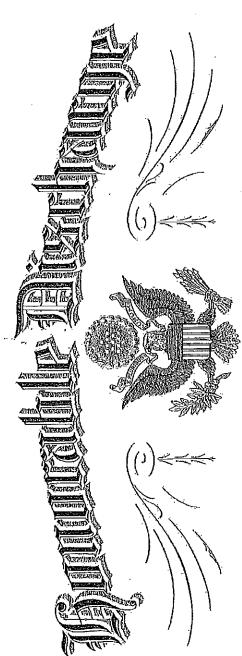
