

Background for Resolution in Opposition to City of Fall River Proposed Electronic Billboards

On October 22, 1965, President <u>Lyndon B. Johnson</u> signs the Highway Beautification Act, which attempts to limit billboards and other forms of outdoor advertising, as well as junkyards and other unsightly roadside messes, along America's interstate highways.

The act also encouraged "scenic enhancement" by funding local efforts to clean up and landscape the green spaces on either side of the roadways. "This bill will enrich our spirits and restore a small measure of our national greatness," Johnson said at the bill's signing ceremony. "Beauty belongs to all the people. And so long as I am President, what has been divinely given to nature will not be taken recklessly away by man."

The Highway Beautification Act was actually the pet project of the first lady, <u>Lady Bird Johnson</u>, Beauty, she believed, had real social utility: Cleaning up city parks, getting rid of ugly advertisements, planting flowers and screening junkyards from view, she thought, would make the nation a better place not only to look at but to live.

"The subject of Beautification is like a tangled skein of wool," she wrote in her diary. "All the threads are interwoven—recreation and pollution and mental health and the crime rate and rapid transit and highway beautification and the war on poverty and parks ... everything leads to something else."

Many urban activists, along with a number of other people who were beginning to think seriously about the consequences of the nation's poor environmental stewardship, supported Mrs. Johnson's efforts.

Business groups, polluters and advertisers, on the other hand, were not so thrilled. Lobbyists for the Outdoor Advertising Association of America and their Republican allies managed to water down the highway-beautification bill significantly: Companies who had to take down their billboards were compensated handsomely by the government, for example and the law's enforcement provisions were weak.

Still, Johnson's bill was important: It declared that nature, even just the strips of nature along the country's roadsides, was fragile and worth preserving, an idea that still holds great power today.

Please find enclosed the information regarding my injury which occurred on 9/24/2016 while on vacation and visiting Fall River, MA for the day. We were walking on the sidewalk on our way to take a picture of the Little Theatre where an Aunt had performed. I was walking in front of my siblings when my sister began to fall forward, which caused her to fall into me, knocking me down and breaking her fall. When falling, my body twisted and my right knee/leg hit the concrete. When I tried to move and stand up, I couldn't move my right leg and it was bent at the knee.

My sister Peggy had tripped on a raised obstacle — it appears to have been a metal pole that was not cut flush with the sidewalk as it was raised. A picture is enclosed. A woman with a pink baseball cap even took a picture of it (unfortunately I did not get her name as I was being attended to by a local resident).

Local residents called 911 and ambulance arrived and transported me to Charleton Hospital down the street. After x-rays, was informed it was a complicated injury which required specialized surgery. Was given Massachusetts General Hospital and ambulance then transported me to Boston.

Was admitted to MGH on 9/24/16 and surgery was performed morning of 9/25/16. Discharged on 9/28/16 and waited in hotel to fly home on 9/30/2016.

Chair called to order the start of the Meeting at 5:30pm. Mr. Lucciola was not yet present.

1 A. Application for Endorsement of Plan Believed Not to Require Approval – File No. 18-1409:

Owner/Applicant-

Cottages at Bayview LLC

Location -

4300 North Main St.

Assessor Lots:

X-4-14

Mr. Roth explained that the property recently received relief from the Zoning Board of Appeals for a variance to adjust the lot lines for the purpose of the existing cottages to acquire the pool and an additional one story building. No frontages were changing and he recommended to the Board that the proposal satisfied the requirements for "approval not required" endorsement.

Upon motion made by Ms. Fagundo and seconded by Mr. Moniz, it was unanimously VOTED 4-0: to direct the Chair to endorse the plan, "Approval Not Required Under the Subdivision Control Law". Mr. Moniz, Ms. Fagundo, Mr. Paquette and Mrs. Sevigny voted in favor of the motion.

2 A. Renaming of nature trail at Cook Pond to 'Dr. David S. Weed Nature Trail'

Mr. Roth explained the research process being limited to information submitted by the applicant relating to the Nature Trail at Cook Pond, as well as requests directed to the Site Plan Review Committee, School Department, Parks Department, DCM and Mass In Motion coordinator for their comments or concerns with the request. Of which, none were received.

Marsha Piccard of 49 Long View Drive, Dartmouth MA, on behalf of Partners for a Healthier Community, presented a verbal history of Dr. David S. Weed in honor of his dedication to improving the community and accomplishments in that regard.

Julianne Kelly of Fairhaven, MA briefly described the existing trail at Cook Pond in relation to the area.

No one was present in opposition to this petition.

Upon motion made by Mr. Moniz, and seconded by Ms. Sevigny, the Board unanimously VOTED 4-0 to recommend the renaming of the nature trail at Cook Pond to 'Dr. David S. Weed Nature Trail' to City Council for final determination.

2 B. Renaming portion of Wall St. (from London St. to Locust St.) to 'Ralph M. Small Way'

Mr. Roth explained the research process being limited to information submitted by the applicant whereas the Ralph M. Small Elementary School was renamed the Mary L. Fonseca Elementary School, as well as requests directed to the Site Plan Review Committee, DCM and Traffic Department, for their comments or concerns with the request. Of which, none were received or opposed.

Former City Councilor Raymond Mitchell of 1535 Meridian St. presented a verbal history of Mr. Ralph M. Small in honor of his dedication to improving the community and accomplishments in that regard. Mr. Mitchell briefly described the history of the demolished elementary school which had been named in honor of Ralph M. Small, but upon rebuilding the school, it was subsequently

renamed to Mary Fonseca Elementary School. With the school being located on a street with no other addresses, it seemed applicable to honor Mr. Small in this way.

No one was present in opposition to this petition.

Upon motion made by Mrs. Sevigny and seconded by Ms. Fagundo, the Board VOTED 4-0 to recommend renaming the portion of Wall St. from London St. to Locust St., to 'Ralph M. Small Way' to City Council for final determination.

Mario Lucciola entered the meeting at 5:49pm

3 A. Street Acceptance-Bell St.

Mr. Roth summarized the estimated costs and overview for the needed improvements in the event the City accepts the street, which were prepared by Paul J. Ferland, Deputy Administrator Community Utilities Department and JR Frey, City Engineer. Mr. Roth explained that if this petition receives the applicable approvals, funds are appropriated through Capital Improvement Projects and Chapter 90 funding, so this request would be added "in line" to other projects already awaiting funding.

No one was present in opposition to this petition.

Upon motion made by Ms. Fagundo and seconded by Mr. Moniz, the Board unanimously VOTED 5-0 to recommend acceptance to City Council for Bell St. extending from Corbett St. to dead end.

3 B. Street Acceptance- Estes Lane

Mr. Roth summarized the estimated costs and overview for the needed improvements in the event the City accepts the street, which were prepared by Paul J. Ferland, Deputy Administrator Community Utilities Department and JR Frey, City Engineer. Community Utilities recommended inspections but estimated minimal costs to this acceptance. Engineering recommended turnaround for emergency vehicles and estimated cost to accept. Mr. Roth further explained that if this petition receives the applicable approvals, funds are appropriated through Capital Improvement Projects and Chapter 90 funding, so this request would be added "in line" to other projects already awaiting funding.

Paul Gagne of Stafford Rd. addressed the Board with details of the existing conditions of the paper street being paved but in rough condition, and the man holes being about 2" above grade. He was present in favor of approving this petition.

Board discussed approval procedures and history of the area. Mr. Roth summarized it being land locked from changes to the surrounding area.

No one was present in opposition to this petition.

Upon motion made by Mr. Lucciola and seconded by Mrs. Sevigny, the Board unanimously VOTED 5-0 to recommend acceptance to City Council for Estes Lane extending from Lark St. to (old) Lower Stafford Rd.

3 C. Street Acceptance-Lynwood St.

Mr. Roth summarized the comments received from Community Utilities detailing cost estimate being minimal and recommendation that the top coat be installed so as to help water flow more delicately due to water excess in that area. Mr. Roth further summarized comments received from City Engineer having determined that the road deterioration had been accelerated by poor drainage, recommending a hammerhead turnaround for emergency vehicle access and cost estimate to fully reconstruct.

Albert Coelho of 89 Lynwood St. addressed the Board in favor of the acceptance, offering details regarding drainage, plowing increasing difficult in the winter because the street breaks the plows. Mr. Coelho voiced his controversy regarding appropriate road width.

Camille Serrecchia of Lynwood St. was present to submit a letter to the Board in favor of the petition herself. Ms. Serrecchia explained that the road was impassable at times due to the business located at the end of the street.

Mr. Roth explained that the area was already surveyed so it may be expedited in the approval process.

Board discussed road history. Mr. Roth suggested that the plans were a hybrid of a Form-A that had an Improvement Plan as part of the approval.

Celia Coelho of Lynwood St. was present in favor of the petition, providing details of the road history being that the paper street was originally made for Forever Paws but was never a road prior to that.

Board discussed possible recourse against developer in the future.

No one was present in opposition to this petition.

Upon motion made by Mr. Moniz and seconded by Ms. Fagundo, the Board unanimously VOTED 5-0 to recommend to City Council acceptance of Lynwood St. extending from Mariano Bishop Boulevard to the dead end.

4. Street Discontinuance- Kennedy St.

Mr. Roth explained the request to discontinue the proposed street due to it being a nuisance property. The street was not currently paved but an easement was proposed and received recommendation for Community Utilities Department. Mr. Roth recommended discontinuance subject to two conditions: 1. An easement be required within the former Right-of-Way for Utility

access and maintenance. Said easement should be reviewed and approved by the Community Utilities Department. 2. Form-A plan be required which combines the Right-of-Way into the respective abutting properties, as agreed to by all of the abutting property owners.

No one was present in opposition to this petition.

Upon motion made by Ms. Fagundo and seconded by Mr. Moniz, the Board unanimously VOTED 5-0 to refer this matter to City Council for further approvals, with Conditions being: 1. An easement be required within the former Right-of-Way for Utility access and maintenance. Said easement should be reviewed and approved by the Community Utilities Department. 2. Form-A plan be required which combines the Right-of-Way into the respective abutting properties, as agreed to by all of the abutting property owners.



On behalf of Algonquin Gas Transmission, LLC¹ ("Algonquin"), (the proponent), VHB, Inc. respectfully submits the revised Project design for a proposed Cathodic Protection Ground Bed Project in Fall River, Massachusetts. An ENF for this Project was filed on July 31, 2018 under the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act (MEPA). The proponent is proposing installation of a cathodic protection ground bed to provide corrosion protection to an existing natural gas transmission pipeline. The proposed Project design has been revised from that described in the ENF to avoid potential conflict with an existing waste water treatment plant outfall pipe that extends into Mount Hope Bay near the proposed ground bed. The ground bed alignment off the end of Pembroke Street in Mount Hope Bay has been angled to the north to keep the anodes at least 400 feet from the outfall pipe.

The length of the proposed ground bed will increase within Mount Hope Bay and will change the temporary impacts to regulated wetland resource areas reported in the ENF. The following summarizes the changes in the impact areas.

As noted in the ENF, all project related impacts will be temporary. The proposed ground bed will be installed below the ground or seabed. Once installed, the header cable and anodes will be buried and the ground or seabed elevation restored. In uplands, the work area will be loamed and seeded. Within Mount Hope Bay, the work area will be backfilled and allowed to restore naturally.

As a result of the revision of the Project design, the MEPA comment period has been extended until October 9, 2018 to allow review and comment. The Certificate is due to be issued on October 19, 2018.
