FINANCE 3

(WATSON SCHOOL REPAIRS)

ORDERED: That the City appropriates the amount of Ten Million Two Hundred and Two Thousand Six Hundred Forty-four Dollars (\$10,202,644) for the purpose of paying costs for the replacement windows, doors, roof replacement and a boiler at the Samuel Watson Elementary School including the payment of all cost incidental or related thereto, and for which the City may be eligible for a grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"), said amount to be expended under the direction of the City of Fall River. To meet this appropriation, the City Treasurer, with the approval of the Mayor, is authorized to borrow said amount under and pursuant to M.G.L. Chapter 44, or pursuant to any other enabling authority. The City acknowledges that the MSBA's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and any costs the City incurs in excess of any grant approved by and received from MSBA shall be the sole responsibility of the City, and that the amount borrowing authorized pursuant to this vote shall be reduced by any grant amount set forth in the Project Funding Agreement that may be executed between the City and the MSBA, and,

LOAN ORDER

(TANSEY SCHOOL REPAIRS)

ORDERED: That the City appropriates the amount of Two Million Nine Hundred and Seventy Thousand Four Hundred Ninety-six Dollars (\$2,970,496) for the purpose of paying costs for the replacement of windows, doors, and a boiler at the James Tansey Elementary School including the payment of all cost incidental or related thereto, and for which the City may be eligible for a grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"), said amount to be expended under the direction of City of Fall River. These are two distinct projects that will work in conjunction. The Public Safety Communication Network is the infrastructure (Backbone is required) that the Video Surveillance Network project will on top of.

Microwave Technology is a line-of-sight wireless communication technology that uses high frequency beams of radio waves to provide high speed wireless connections that can send and receive voice, video, and data information.

Microwave links are are widely used for point-to-point communications because their small wavelength allows conveniently-sized antennas to direct them in narrow beams, which can be pointed directly at the receiving antenna. This allows nearby microwave equipment to use the same frequencies without interfering with each other, as lower frequency radio waves do. Another advantage is that the high frequency of microwaves gives the microwave band a very large information-carrying capacity; the microwave band has a bandwidth 30 times that of all the rest of the radio spectrum below it.

Microwave radio transmission is commonly used in point-to-point communication systems on the surface of the Earth, in satellite communications, and in deep space radio communications. Other parts of the microwave radio band are used for radars, radio navigation systems, sensor systems, and radio astronomy.

The higher part of the radio electromagnetic spectrum with frequencies are above 30 GHz and below 100 GHz, are called "millimeter waves" because their wavelengths are conveniently measured in millimeters, and their wavelengths range from 10 mm down to 3.0 mm. Radio waves in this band are usually strongly attenuated by the Earthly atmosphere and particles contained in it, especially during wet weather. Also, in wide band of frequencies around 60 GHz, the radio waves are strongly attenuated by molecular oxygen in the atmosphere. The electronic technologies needed in the millimeter wave band are also much more complex and harder to manufacture than those of the microwave band, hence cost of Millimeter Wave Radios are generally higher.

This public safety infrastructure upgrade will end the reliance on the publicly switched network for public safety radio traffic. The public telephone physical network is aged and becoming unreliable. During severe weather the publicly switched network that supports Fall River's public safety radio system frequently fails at various sites. When a receive site is down, it causes communication difficulties for public safety personnel patrolling or responding to public assistance calls.

The advent of a City of Fall River Public Safety microwave network will improve the Motorola life safety radio system by improving audio quality and site up time. The main transmitter location at Cardinal Mederios will be linked by dual trunked microwave paths. This will maintain communications to the system in the event of a link failure. There will also be a dual redundant link from Mederios to Barressi Heights. This site is is important to police channel 2 operations.

The proposed microwave network will consist of 18GHz licensed microwave radio links. These links will be capable of 100Mb of data bandwidth Full duplex. A vlan will be configured for the radio traffic. The radio traffic will have the highest priority on the network.



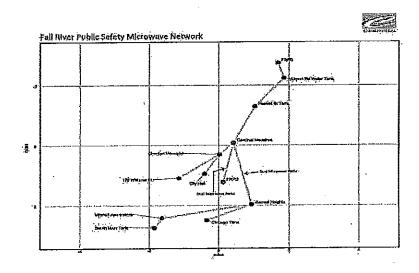
The microwave network will utilize the following locations. The south Main St. water tank, Mitchell Apartments, Chicago St. water tank, Barresi heights,170 Williams St. City Hall, Police HQ, Charlton Memorial, Cardinal Medeiros, Haskell St. water tank. Airport Road water tank, Fire HQ. The locations indicated allow for clear unobstructed line of sight for the proper operation of the network.

At the Police & Fire communications sites a multiplexer will be installed along with the microwave network equipment. The multiplexer will connect to the Motorola radio equipment and the existing telephone circuits will be removed. At police HQ a core multiplexer will be installed and connected to the Police & Fire radio systems comparator.

The equipment in the 18GHz microwave network is covered by manufacturers warranty. The RAD multiplexers are covered for 5 years. The HP switches have a life time warranty. The Dragon Wave microwave radios are covered for one year.

Optional extended coverage up to 5 years is available for an additional cost per microwave link. This proposal does not include Dragon Wave extended warranty coverage. A more economical solution is to have a spare link. This proposal includes a spare link. The spare MW link will cover every radio in the 18GHz microwave network.

Labor & materials are covered for 90 days after acceptance of the microwave network.

Cyber Communications is pleased to present this proposal for the design, installation and integration of a Point to Multi-point 4.9GHz to 5.8GHz microwave network that will enable the transport of the existing 7 cameras as well as the additional 26 Security Solutions Fish Eye 360 degree view cameras.

The control station radios will be located at the proposed 18GHz microwave sites that are currently used for the Public Safety radio system. The P to MP video network will be configured for 100Mb of data bandwidth. The video transport will be configured for asymmetrical transport, 90Mb downstream and 10Mb upstream.

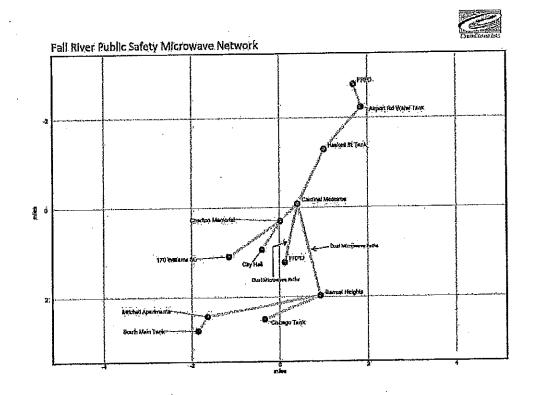
The proposed cameras will be configured for 15fps video rate. At each camera location, a subscriber unit radio, weather proof IP67 rated 12"x12" enclosure, all mounting brackets, hardware will be galvanized. In each enclosure there will be a 20Amp 120-volt 4 outlet power source. The enclosures will be a lockable design.

This proposal assumes that Fall River will provide bucket trucks and Electricians to provide the 120 volts at the camera locations. Supply and install the AC power in a 12"x12"x12" weather proof enclosure.



The video system is IP based. Using 360 degree view cameras requires considerable storage capacity. The proposed DVR system will have 30 days of storage capacity. Each of the 2 servers can handel up to 360 cameras each.

The video equipment carries the following warranty. The cameras are 3 years. The servers have a 2 year warranty. The VMS software has a 2 year warranty. The video management software also includes a 3 year upgrade plan.

WHEREAS, the Central Market Rate Housing Incentive Zone and Plan for Fall River was ordained by the City Council on July 9, 2013 and approved by the Mayor on July 11, 2013; and

WHEREAS, the former Lincoln School, 439 Pine Street, is an amendment established as illustrated on the attached Map, which is hereby made a part of this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor is hereby authorized to submit the former Lincoln School as an Amendment to the Central Market Rate Housing Incentive Zone Plan and Map to the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor is authorized to act in connection with the submittal of the Amendment and to provide such additional information as may be required by the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development; and

3) Reason the request to name or re-name is being made:

Dr. David S. Weed is a psychologist by profession who retired as an employee of the MA Department of Mental Health after 33 years of practice at Corrigan Mental Health Center in Fall River. He was unique in his early service as he was considered a practicing Community Psychologist with the whole city as his "patient". He worked his entire professional career, and beyond, to make Fall River healthier in an extraordinary number of ways. He was one of the original members of Greater Fall River Partners for a Healthier Community, launched some 24 years ago, for which he most recently served as its Executive Director. He retired from Partners in June of this year after a long, distinguished career dedicated to improving the overall health of our community, and was recognized by local and state dignitaries at a retirement reception held in his honor at the end of June. Among Dr. Weed's most significant accomplishments are the following:

- Was responsible for bringing hundreds of thousands of dollars to the City of Fall River by authoring or co-authoring countless grants including major awards from Tufts University, the MA Department of Public Health and Harvard Pilgrim Health Care
- Brought national recognition to Fall River in 2013 by writing the application that
 resulted in the city receiving one of only 6 Culture of Health Prizes awarded by
 the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the largest philanthropic organization in
 the world dedicated to health initiatives. Fall River was chosen as an inaugural
 recipient from more than 160 applicants nationwide.
- Co-authored the application which resulted in Fall River being named one of only 10 All America City recipients in the summer of 2015

Although the trail currently only borders a portion of the pond, the long-term plan is for it to continue around the entire circumference of the pond resulting in a strikingly scenic three and a half-mile walking loop. The restoration was a collaborative undertaking of the City of Fall River, the Trustees of the Reservation, the Fall River School Department and Fall River Mass in Motion coordinator, Jullanne Kelly. As a temporary "place holder", the trail was unofficially named the Amity Nature Trail by Ms. Kelly in 2015 based on its location at the west end of Amity Street. - The company may maintain or replace the equipment with other equipment that is the same size or smaller in size, weight and height.
- Upon abandonment of the equipment, the company shall notify the City within ninety (90) days.
 Following receipt of such notice, the City may direct the company to remove all or a portion of the facility within thirty (30) days if such removal is in the best interest of the public health, safety and welfare. Failure to do so shall result in a \$50.00 fine per day until removed.
- The company shall pay a one-time fee of \$1,000.00 to the City for each piece of equipment installed.

 Approval is hereby granted to New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC ("AT&T") to lay and maintain underground at each of the locations identified in the attached order, conduit conveying ground wire terminating at a new ground rod within the sidewalk. All sidewalk panels impacted by the work shall be removed and replaced in their entirety.
