President Cliff Ponte called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with a moment of silence followed by a salute to the flag and announced that the meeting may be recorded with audio or video and transmitted through any medium.

3. Mayor and order appropriating \$250,000.00 from the General Fund FY20 Surplus Revenue (Free Cash) to the Capital Project Fund for police vehicles

Councilor Michelle M. Dionne asked if the vehicles are currently on order. The Director of Financial Services stated that these vehicles are already on order and were submitted to be funded by the CARES Act, unfortunately the Federal Government does not allow these funds to be used for the purchase of vehicles. She then stated that the regulations do allow for the leasing of vehicles, but the City did not want to lease police vehicles. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne then stated that these discussions should have occurred prior to the purchase of the police vehicles. Councilor Christopher M. Peckham asked how many vehicles will be purchased with the \$250,000.00. The Director of Financial Services stated that five vehicles will be purchased. Councilor Bradford L. Kilby stated that five police vehicles are very significant to the Police Department. Councilor Trott

Lee stated that he fully supports public safety. On a motion made by Councilor Bradford L. Kilby and seconded by Councilor Christopher M. Peckham, it was voted 9 yeas to adopt the order.

At a meeting of the City Council held on Tuesday, November 17, 2020, it was voted 8 yeas, to send a letter to your honorable board in opposition of item #6 on your agenda for the meeting scheduled for Thursday, November 19, 2020. The petition is for JH Holdings Group, LLC, Mariano S. Bishop Boulevard and August Street, Assessors Lots C-16-1, 23, 82, 86-88, for a variance request to allow construction of a 63-unit apartment complex consisting of seven (7) 9-unit buildings waiving requirements in the [R-8] District; as well as a request for a Special Permit to allow parking to be provided at the rate of 1.5 spaces per unit.

Members of the City Council have been contacted by numerous residents of this neighborhood regarding this petition. This neighborhood suffers from various flooding problems, which are still ongoing, as well as the increased traffic, parking issues and odors due to the Northeast Alternatives Marijuana Dispensary located at 999 William S. Canning Boulevard. The construction of such a large complex would only intensify the flooding issues and negatively impact the neighborhood.

Please consider denying this request to respect the integrity of this single family neighborhood and read this letter into the minutes of the meeting. Should this request be denied and the petitioner files a new request in the near future, please notify the City Council so they are aware of the changes being requested in the neighborhood. Dear Councilors -

By letter dated August 28, 2020, Walter A. Furman Co., LLC, and New 180 Liberty Street, LLC, requested the City of Fall River to release all its rights, title and interest in a portion of the unaccepted paper street known as Center Street extending from South Beacon Street westerly a distance of 445.48 feet. On September 8, 2020, the City Council referred this matter to the Planning Board and asked the Board to review and submit its recommendation to the City Council. The Planning Department conducted a detailed review and, after consulting with the Engineering Department and the Department of Community Utilities, submitted a Staff Memo to the Planning Board dated November 5, 2020, a copy of which is attached for reference.

In brief, the Staff Memo recommends against the City releasing all of its rights in and to this section of Center Street because the result would be to preclude the possibility of access over this area to city-owned land to the west. On the other hand, the Staff Memo recognizes the petitioners' interest in using this land for parking and therefore suggests that it might be acceptable for the city to release some, but not all, of its rights.

After review of the Staff Memo, and after allowing the petitioner an opportunity to be heard at the November 9, 2020; Planning Board meeting, it was unanimously voted to make the following recommendations to the City Council:

(1) The City Council should <u>not</u> release all of the City's rights in and to this portion of Center Street; and,

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(2) The City Council should refer this matter to the Corporation Counsel with instruction to work with the petitioner and with the Department of Community Utilities to draft a revocable license or other agreement that would accommodate the petitioners' needs while at the same time protecting the City's potential future access needs and other interests.

Re: Request for Release of Rights in and to a Portion of Center Street

Dear Planning Board Members:

By letter dated August 28, 2020, Walter A. Furman Co., LLC (hereinafter, "Furman") requested the City Council to relinquish the City's rights, title and interest in and to a portion of the unaccepted, paper street known as Center Street from South Beacon Street westerly a distance of 445.48. On September 8, 2020, the City Council referred this matter to the Planning Board for its opinion, specifically seeking the Board's advice whether to adopt the following proposed order:

ORDERED, that the City of Fall River does hereby relinquish any and all rights, title and interest which it may have in the unaccepted portion of the street or way known as Center Street extending from South Beacon Street westerly for a distance of 445.48.

After review and after consulting with the City's Engineering Department and with the City's Department of Public Utilities, my opinion is that the Planning Board should recommend <u>against</u> adoption of the proposed Order, for the following reasons:

The portion of Center Street in question is shown on the attached copy of an "Approval Not Required Plan" dated June 12, 2020, recorded with the Bristol County Fall River District Registry of Deeds in Plan Book 165, Page 26. When that plan was recorded, "New 180 Liberty Street, LLC", owned the land on the northeasterly side of Center Street. The plan includes a notation "Non-Buildable Parcel Y to be Conveyed to New 180 Liberty St LLC..." Parcel "Y" is the long, narrow strip of land along the southwesterly side of Center Street. That conveyance was subsequently made, by deed of South Beacon, LLC to New 180 Liberty Street, LLC dated July 29, 2020, recorded in Book 10184, Page 61 (copy attached). As a result, New180 Liberty Street, LLC now holds title to both sides of the portion of Center Street running westerly from South Beacon a distance of 445.48 feet. New 180 Liberty Street LLC is believed to be the owner of the real estate occupied by Furman and is controlled by it.

Of most importance to the City's interests, you will note that the recorded plan shows two parcels owned by the City of Fall River near the terminus of Center Street - one on the southerly side of Center Street and the other on the northerly side of Center Street. Therefore, Center Street is a potential means of access from South Beacon Street to these city-owned parcels. These parcels are a portion of the so-called "Cook Pond Outlet", a stream/ecological system that drains from Cook Pond all the way to the Taunton River.

In my opinion, it would not be prudent for the City to release all interests it may have in Center Street because by doing so it would thereby release its rights to access these City-owned parcels via Center Street should it desire to do so in the future. The Community Utilities Department notes that: (1) In the event of drainage issues arising in this portion of the "Cook Pond Outlet" stream, it is important to for the City to retain the right of access for heavy equipment which it might have to bring into this area to address such issues; (2) The City has already given up its rights to a portion of Center Street (running off of Bay Street) and releasing all rights to yet another section which might be developed could result in additional drainage issues; and, (3) This area may have potential for parkland and nature walks, for which access should be retained.

The reason for Furman's request that the city release its rights is presumed to be so that Furman could then use this area for parking of other use associated with its operations.


While, for the reasons stated, I recommend against the City releasing all of its rights, it might be reasonable to release some rights on a revocable basis to accommodate Furman and to make sure that any use of this land would be in a manner that would not preclude future City access and would not result in new drainage issues. The Community Utilities Department has suggested that, as one possible alternative, the City would retain any rights it might have but then issue a revocable license to Furman to use this portion of Center Street for purposes consistent with the present and potential future access and other needs of the city and the general public.

In conclusion, my advice to the Planning Board is to make the following recommendations to the City Council:

- (1) The City Council should not adopt the proposed Order releasing all of its rights in this portion of Center Street;
- (2) The City Council should refer this matter to the Corporation Counsel with instruction to work with Walter A. Furman Co., LLC, New 180 Liberty Street, LLC, and the Community Utilities Department to draft a revocable license or other agreement that would accommodate the petitioner's needs while at the same time protecting the City's potential future access needs and other interests.



RE: Abolishment of both Board of Police and Board of Fire Commissioners

Dear Mr. Mayor:

It is my understanding you desire to abolish the Board of Police and the Board of Fire Commissioners. To achieve this end, I have attached two (2) simple orders petitioning the General Court to abolish the same.

By way of brief history, the Board of Fire Commissioners was created in 1938 by an Act of the General Court. The most recent Act of 2012, Chapter 281 maintained the Board of Fire Commissioners with modifications. The Board of Police was established in 1946, undergoing various changes over the years, and currently an existing Board through the Acts of 1986 Chapter 1.

To abolish such boards, you need to submit a Special Act for City Council consideration. Once the Special Act is adopted by the Council and approved by you, it will need to be filed by either a State Representative or Senator at the Massachusetts Legislature for enactment.

Once the bill passes the House and Senate and is approved by the Governor, it will need to be submitted back to the City Council for purposes of amending the current city ordinances.

Once the bill is enacted and the City is notified, the Law Department will need to draft the proposed ordinance(s) for the Council's consideration.

RE: FISCAL YEAR TAX FACTOR

Dear Council President and Members of the Fall River City Council:

As you know, General Laws Chapter 40, Section 56 allows a municipality to adopt a tax factor creating a split tax rate. The City of Fall River typically adopted such a tax factor creating a split tax rate in previous fiscal years. Such a tax factor must be adopted by the City Council with the approval of the Mayor. Before any such tax factor is adopted, there must first be a public hearing. As you are also aware, Chapter 40, Section 56 mandates that the factor cannot exceed 1.75. As the factor increases from 1.00 to 1.75, the residential rate decreases, and therefore the commercial, industrial, and personal property, (C.I.P.) tax rate increases.

It is my understanding that the public hearing concerning the classification of property within the City of Fall River has been scheduled for Tuesday, November 17th at 5:55 p.m. within the City Council Chambers. The hearing will be held in order to establish the tax factor pursuant to Chapter 40, Section 56. In past years, the Board of Assessors has been able to provide a packet of relevant information including an analysis of the various tax rates that would result from tax factors ranging between 1.00 and 1.75.

As you are aware, the Covid-19 Pandemic, and the State of Emergency declared by Governor Baker on March 10, 2020, have significantly impacted the ability of the Commonwealth, and municipalities across the Commonwealth, to deliver essential municipal services in the manner they had been provided in the past. In spite of this, the Commonwealth, and municipalities like Fall River, have continued to provide essential municipal services, albeit in a slightly different fashion. The Assessors Office is currently finishing the MassDOR Approval process necessary to produce the analysis of the various tax rates that would result from tax factors ranging between 1.00 and 1.75. It is our intention to be able to forward that analysis to the City Council by close of business on Monday, November 16, 2020.

Dear Governor Baker:

This letter serves as a response to your initiation of COVID-19 Order #54. I am representing my position as an individual City Councilor from Fall River, MA. This letter does not represent the City Council body as a whole.

As you are well aware, Fall River is a city with many fiscal challenges well before the imposition of this current pandemic. However, over the past several years we have had a number of economic opportunities come our way such as the arrival of Amazon, marijuana facilities and the South Coast Marketplace. We have seen many small businesses such as salons, barber shops, local restaurants and bars gain some footing over the years as Fall River is fighting to keep its economy progressing. With South Coast Rail in the process of being built, we are seeing increased interest from investors obtaining property, which would assist greatly in the further development of our economy and broadening our tax base.

I recognize the deadliness and severity this pandemic presents. We do not want to see more cases, increased death tolls, and overpopulated hospital beds. I personally have seen friends and colleagues lose loved ones to COVID-19. I fully understand this is not a hoax and not a political ploy. Without a doubt, the largest impact outside of the death toll has been the economic devastation, and this is something we must find a balance in for us to bounce back from this situation. The policies that have come from your office have put our city in severe financial jeopardy governmentally and in the private sector, which directly impacted our safety overall. For example, the limits placed upon the marijuana facilities hurt those who were employed, but also significantly impacted our city's revenue. We were facing cuts to public safety based on the revenue challenges presented by your policy that did not need to be implemented. While I respect the needs to protect our people from spreading the virus, I must ask: what is the purpose of imposing policy that puts us in more danger by threatening our public safety? This current imposition of currew is another example of a policy that will further damage our economy and put more people in danger in the long run. Again, I emphasize that there needs to be balance in protecting ourselves from spreading, but also allowing workers and business owners opportunities to continue making a living. And we especially have a duty to assist those who have been taking the precautions while running their businesses.

While my experience as a City Councilor is new, I am not new to Fall River. I was born and raised here, it is my heart and soul, and I know it very well. I have participated in and had a front-row seat to multiple recalls and protests. It is a historical fact that the people of Fall River will not sit idly by and submit to policy that hurts them.

I recommend an immediate retraction of the curfew and instead making an increased comprehensive effort to assist citizens and businesses in practicing and preserving safety measures such as mask wearing, hygiene, distancing, contact-tracing procedures, and ensuring they have the supplies in place to carry out these safety guidelines. We must certainly refrain from imposing policy that affects revenue, as that places a heavier burden on taxpayers, jeopardizing our public safety and education system.

Finally, I recognize that I am just one voice on a City Council of a small city, but if you strive for common-sense practices to reach a balance of preserving our economy and protecting lives, you will have an ally in me in those efforts.

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

The chair called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and announced that the meeting may be recorded with audio or video and transmitted through any medium.

In accordance with a resolution adopted, as amended May 8, 2012, persons are allowed to address the Council for a period of three minutes prior to the beginning or at the conclusion of business in the Committee on Finance.

The City Clerk read communications received from city residents, copies of which are attached hereto and made a part of these minutes.

Resolution to discuss and review solid waste and recycling Councilor Michelle M. Dionne asked the Director of Community Maintenance how the City has advanced with regards to solid waste and recycling. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that currently he is gathering information to review the various options. He then stated that he is not prepared to make a presentation tonight, but is working on all the various possibilities and also reviewing various policies of other cities and towns. He also stated that he is reviewing all associated costs for the collection of solid waste and recycling. The Director of Community Maintenance then stated that the collection of solid waste and recycling from businesses is also being reviewed, along with residences with 6 units that may be considered commercial properties. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne then stated that various other communities are being reviewed that are in similar situations, such as not having a pay-as-you-throw program or a household fee. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that there are 351 communities in . the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and of those there are only 44 communities that do not have a pay-as-you-throw program, a household unit fee for the removal of trash and recycling or a combination of both. He then stated that most of the 44 communities are affluent communities that can afford to dispose of their trash without fees or they have infrastructure in place to handle



the disposal, such as a landfill. He also stated that the City does not have a landfill or transfer station to assist with the costs associated with the collection of solid waste and recycling, so the City needs to research all possibilities.

Councilor Michelle M. Dionne then asked the Director of Community Maintenance for an update on the plan to remove the blue recycling carts from Fall River Housing Authority properties. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that he has been in contact with Timothy Barrow, the Executive Director for the Fall River Housing Authority, regarding the removal of the blue recycling carts from Housing Authority properties. He then stated that Mr. Barrow is in the process of obtaining proposals from solid waste companies for the collection of recycling from the various properties. Mr. Perry then stated that once that process is complete, the Fall River Housing Authority will determine how recycling will be collected from the various properties and notify the City to either remove the recycling carts or determine payments to be made to the City of Fall River. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne then stated that she will await the decision from the Fall River Housing Authority, as she understands that the process will take time and as long as the process is moving forward, she is agreeable to allowing sufficient time to ensure the process is done correctly. Councilor Trott Lee stated that there should also be discussions regarding the storage of solid waste and recycling carts. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that there was a time when the carts were stored outside at the Lewiston Street Facility and there were many problems with this method. He also stated that in the future the construction of a storage facility will need to be discussed for the storage of carts and other necessary equipment that is weather sensitive. Councilor Trott Lee then stated that there will need to be an information. dissemination process regarding businesses that may no longer have their recycling picked up by the City and this may cause an increase of carts to be stored as they are returned to the City. He then asked the Director of Community Maintenance if businesses would be able to retain having the City collect their solid waste and recycling if the business paid a fee for the service. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that these are discussions that need to be had, whether these services will still be provided by the City and if so how much will be charged. Councilor Trott Lee then stated that fees will need to be researched and discussed because the City does not want to overcharge businesses but it also does not want to be severely undercharging. Councilor Leo O. Pelletier asked the Director of Community Maintenance what the cost would be to erect a storage building approximately 30 or 50 feet by 100 feet. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that it would cost approximately \$130,000.00 to \$150,000.00 to construct a storage facility of this size. Councilor Leo O. Pelletier then asked how much the City is paying in the rental of storage space per year. The Director of Financial Services stated that the City is spending \$62,400.00 per year on the rental of storage space as follows:

- Rodman Street \$19,200.00
- Seabury Street \$30,000.00
- Montaup Street \$13,200.00

Gouncilor Leo O, Pelletier then stated that he believes that the City should construct a storage facility, since it would be paid for in 2 or 3 years with the amounts the City is currently paying in rental fees. He then asked the Director of Community Maintenance if the parcel of property on Bay Street that was transferred to the City could be used to construct a storage facility. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that the Bay Street location cannot be used to construct a storage facility because a brook crosses the parcel. Councilor Linda M. Pereira asked the Director of Community Maintenance if any of the 44 communities that do not have any fees for solid waste collection are gateway communities. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that he would need to check those statistics of all the communities, but he does know that New Bedford does not have any fees for solid waste collection but has a transfer station and an active landfill. Councilor Linda M. Pereira then asked the Director of Community



Maintenance how many years New Bedford will be able to utilize their landfill. The Director of Community Maintenance stated New Bedford has approximately 15 years remaining in the life of their landfill. Councilor Linda M. Pereira then stated that she would like to see more educational outreach to the residents regarding regulations for recycling. She also stated that the Department of Community Maintenance facility on Lewiston Street is in need of cleaning and renovations. Councilor Michelle M. Dionne asked the Director of Community Maintenance if he had obtained any information on machinery that would grind mattresses and sofas to reduce the amount of space required for disposal. The Director of Community Maintenance stated that he had not yet researched this equipment. He also stated that he would share the information on this machinery once obtained.
