This ordinance will adjust appropriations to the local coronavirus relief fund and the law enforcement fund. There was an increase of \$52,768.37 to Police Division Personal Services to allocate usage of coronavirus relief funds and an increase of \$11,000 to Other to cover the replacement of two in-car camera systems.

RESOLUTION 2020-63 AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF MONTGOMERY COUNTY, OHIO AND THE MONTGOMERY COUNTY ENGINEERS OFFICE, OHIO RELATING TO THE DAYTON-CINCINNATI PIKE RETAINING WALL FEASABILITY STUDY AND REPAIR/REPLACEMENT OF THE RETAINING WALL

This IGA allows the City of Franklin to jointly work with the Montgomery County Engineer's Office to complete a feasibility Study to repair/replace the retaining wall holding up Dayton-Cincinnati Pike (N. Dixie Highway). The retaining wall is approximately 791 feet long with 53% of the wall being located in the City of Franklin. The feasibility study would cost approximately \$100,000 for the City. The County Engineers office estimates the wall will cost approximately \$1.6 Million. The feasibility study would be completed in 2021, design in 2022 and the construction would occur in 2023. Mr. Conway reported that the Miami Conservancy District notified him that portions of the wall were falling onto the bike path which creates a safety hazard. He offered to answer any questions. The Mayor asked if Mr. Inman had anything to add. Mr. Inman said that this is a necessity as it is a safety hazard and is glad that we can share

the cost of the repair with Montgomery County. He asked Mr. Conway if there were any grant opportunities to help with the City's share. Mr. Conway replied that he has talked with the County Engineer about an OPWC grant and will apply if the timeline works out.

The Mayor asked if there were any comments or questions from Council. Mr. Ruppert added that with the emphasis that the state has put on the bike paths he sees this as an urgent necessity. The Mayor agreed.

B. RESOLUTION 2020-64 AWARDING THE BID AND AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF THE CONTRACT WITH FORD DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION FOR THE 2020 3RD STREET LIFT STATION REPLACEMENT PROJECT

On December 2, 2020, the City opened bids for this project. The Engineer's estimated cost for this Project was \$640,000. The project includes the replacement of the 1937 3rd Street Lift Station, extending the sanitary sewer along South River and installing a force main from the lift station to the sanitary sewer. There were three bidders. Staff recommends that we accept the bid in the amount of \$648,000.00 from Ford Development Corp. as the lowest and best bid. The City budgeted the cost of this Project in the Issue Two Fund. This is an OPWC project and the City will be reimbursed for 47% of the project up \$300,000.00.

The Mayor asked if we have used Ford Development Corp. previously. Mr. Conway answered that we had and that they just completed a storm sewer project. Mr. Wilcher asked about the timeline of the project. Mr. Conway answered that Ford is looking to start as quick as possible. It will take 5-6 weeks to order the lift station and their bid allocated five months for completion. The Mayor asked if there were any further comments or questions. C. DISCUSSION OF PROPERTY ON DEARDOFF ROAD

a. Exhibit A

The Mayor explained that Ms. Fouts has brought this issue to the Economic Development Committee and wanted further discussion with all of Council. Ms. Fouts thinks that with the passage of the school levy, it would be beneficial to market the City owned property on Deardoff Road for construction of new homes. Mr. Lewis said that if Council would like to sell the land, he recommends putting it out to bid, with a minimum bid restriction. The property is zoned R-1B residential. Mr. Aldridge asked if there was an ability to set requirements for the type of homes that would be built to ensure that property values of existing homes did not decrease. Mr. Lewis replied that Council can place restrictions, but not covenants. He gave examples of requiring the homes built be a minimum square footage or that the homes be all brick. Ms. Dinkler added that there are several options depending on Council's desire for the property, including keeping the minimum bid amount private if the property is put out to bid. Mr. Aldridge asked if we could market this property to specific developers to see if there was in interest. Ms. Dinkler answered that the bidding process could be waived. Mr. Aldridge added that the City has been strategic in the properties that have been purchased to increase aesthetics and wants to ensure this strategy is maintained. The Mayor agreed with Mr. Aldridge and said that there are limited places for expansion within the City. The Mayor commented that the property is currently being farmed and asked if it would be a breach of contract if the property were to be put for sale. Mr. Lewis said that it would not. The Mayor asked about connecting properties. Mr. Lewis said that Frost Wood Farms was approached in the past and they were not willing to sell at that time. Their property is currently zoned as industrial use. The Mayor asked about a fair market price in setting a minimum bid. Mr. Lewis believes the previous appraisal came in around \$10,000 per acre. There was continued discussion about protecting the value of the existing homes in the area and pursuing builders to see if there is an interest in the property. It was determined that if a proposal were brought to the City, Council could then choose to waive the bid process. Mr. Lewis suggested an easement be added for entry onto Commerce Center Drive. The Economic Development Committee will meet next year to discuss proceeding with sales strategies.







Section 2. Chapter 905.03, Permit fee, of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Franklin, Ohio is hereby amended to read as follows:

905.03 PERMIT FEE.

The <u>Public Works Director or his designated representative</u> Chief Building Official is hereby authorized and directed to charge and collect a permit fee as set forth in Appendix A of Chapter 17, Rate and Fee Schedule, for the purpose of constructing, repairing or replacing curbings, curbs and gutters and driveway approaches.

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Franklin finds it necessary, upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee, the City Manager and the Finance Director, to make certain amendments to the appropriations made by Ordinance 2020-15, passed on December 7, 2020, which provides appropriations for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2020, in order to meet current expenses and to authorize certain other expenditures; and

Section 3. Existing Ordinance 2020-15 is hereby repealed.

Section 4. The Finance Director is hereby authorized to make payments from any of the appropriations herein made, upon receiving proper claims, certificates and or vouchers approved by the officials, department heads, or their respective designees, authorized by law to approve the same, or upon an ordinance or resolution of Council to make expenditures; provided, however, that no payments for salaries or wages shall be made except to persons employed in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Franklin and/or laws of the State of Ohio.

<u>Section 5</u>. The Finance Director is hereby authorized to adjust appropriations within any Fund or Department, so long as the adjustments made do not exceed the total appropriations authorized within any Fund. In addition, the Finance Director is hereby authorized to establish additional accounts within any Fund as may from time to time be required to ensure proper accounting or by the State of Ohio.

<u>Section 6</u>. It is found that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council that resulted in this formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements, including Chapter 121 of the Ohio Revised Code, and the Rules of Council.

<u>Section 7</u>. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and, in accordance with Sections 4.05 and 4.14 of the City's Charter, shall not be automatically repealed.

Scope/Description: This ordinance will provide temporary appropriations for the year ending

December 31, 2021.

This Ordinance appropriates funds for the first three months of the 2021 fiscal year. It is a temporary budget, and we will present the final budget

to City Council before March 31, 2021.

This budget uses the projected revenues from the Tax Budget as passed by City Council in Resolution 2020-31 on June 15, 2020. The majority of

expenditures mirror the 2020 permanent budget.

Salary increases were included in this temporary budget. Once the City's five-year plan and final numbers are has been finalized, line items will

need to be modified for the permanent budget in March.

Budgetary Impact: Provides appropriations to meet expenses, as budgeted, for the beginning

of the 2021 fiscal year.

Exhibits: Temporary Budget.

Emergency Legislation: Yes – Necessary to provide for the financial operations of the City through

the end of the fiscal year.

Vote Required for Passage: Per Section 4.14 of the City Charter, the passage of this Ordinance requires

the affirmative vote of at least FOUR (4) members of Council.

RECOMMENDATION: Presented to Finance Committee who recommends approval.

CITY OF FRANKLIN, OHIO ORDINANCE 2020-20

PROVIDING TEMPORARY APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY OF FRANKLIN, OHIO, THROUGH MARCH 31, 2021, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code Section 5705.38 grants this Council the authority to postpone passage of the required annual appropriation ordinance until an amended official certificate of estimated resources, based on actual balances, is received from Warren County;

WHEREAS, said ORC 5705.38 also provides that a temporary appropriation ordinance may be passed in order to meet the ordinary expenses of the City until no later than the first day of April of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, this Council finds it necessary and desirable to postpone the 2021 Annual Appropriation Ordinance of the City until the receipt of the amended official certificate of estimated resources;

WHEREAS, this Council further finds it necessary, upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee, the City Manager and the Finance Director, to make certain temporary appropriations for the first quarter of the 2021 fiscal year in order to meet current expenses and to authorize certain other expenditures, pending receipt of the amended official certificate of estimated resources; and

WHEREAS, Section 4.14 of the City's Charter authorizes emergency appropriations, when such appropriations are made pursuant to an emergency ordinance,

THE CITY OF FRANKLIN HEREBY ORDAINS, at least four (4) members of Council elected thereto concurring, that:

<u>Section 1</u>. This Ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety and welfare of the City of Franklin, Ohio. The reason for such necessity arises from the need to provide temporary appropriations for current expenses and other expenditures for the first quarter of the 2021 fiscal year, ending March 31, 2021, to ensure the continued, usual, daily operation of the City Government.

Section 2. Pending receipt of the Amended Official Certificate of Estimated Resources, and in order to provide for current expenses and other expenditures of the City of Franklin, Ohio, for the first quarter of the 2021 fiscal year, ending March 31, 2021, the sums contained within Exhibit A are hereby appropriated. These appropriations shall be chargeable to the appropriations in the 2021 Annual Appropriation Ordinance when passed.

<u>Section 3</u>. Upon receipt of the Amended Official Certificate of Estimated Resources, the City Manager shall present to this Council the 2021 Annual Appropriation Ordinance for consideration and passage.

Section 4. The Finance Director is hereby authorized to make payments from any of the appropriations herein made, upon receiving proper claims, certificates and or vouchers approved by the officials, department heads, or their respective designees, authorized by law to approve the same, or upon an ordinance or resolution of Council to make expenditures; provided, however, that no payments for salaries or wages shall be made except to persons employed in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Franklin and/or laws of the State of Ohio.

Section 5. The Finance Director is hereby authorized to adjust appropriations within any Fund or Department, so long as the adjustments made do not exceed the total appropriations authorized within any Fund. In addition, the Finance Director is hereby authorized to establish additional accounts within any Fund as may from time to time be required to ensure proper accounting or by the State of Ohio.

Section 6. It is found that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council that resulted in this formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements, including Chapter 121 of the Ohio Revised Code, and the Rules of Council.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect as of January 1, 2021, and in accordance with Sections 4.05 and 4.14 of the City's Charter, shall not be automatically repealed.

ESTABLISHING THE ORGANIZATIONAL LISTINGS AND PAY RATES FOR THE CITY OF FRANKLIN OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES FOR THE YEAR 2020

WHEREAS, section 3.03 of the City of Franklin Charter grants this Council the power to fix the number of employees in the various offices, departments, divisions, bureaus, boards and commissions of the City and to fix the rate of their compensation;

WHEREAS, this Council, by Resolution 2020-66, passed on December 21, 2020, has established a list of position titles and the number of authorized positions to be filled under each title for the year 2021; and

WHEREAS, this Council finds it necessary to establish the salaries and pay rates for said positions,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Franklin, Ohio, a majority of members present concurring, that:

<u>Section 1</u>. The compensation hereafter provided in Exhibit A shall apply to the listed positions for and during the year 2021.

Section 2. Effective with the first pay period of 2021, each non-union employee shall pay fifteen percent (15%) of the premium for health and dental insurance. Life insurance in an amount equal to one-year's base salary and double indemnity for accidental death will also be provided to each employee at the City's sole expense.

<u>Section 3</u>. The City Manager is authorized to issue regulations for the administration of the organizational listings and pay rates set forth in this Resolution.

<u>Section 4</u>. The salary or hourly wage of each employee shall be reviewed annually by his or her department head for the purpose of determining whether the employee is entitled to a step increase. All of the employee's personnel records, performance and length of service shall be considered in making recommendations, with major emphasis placed on the evaluation of services rendered. On the recommendation of the department head, the City Manager may advance an employee at the time of such review until the maximum step has been reached.

<u>Section 5</u>. The City Manager may hire a new employee at an advanced step in the event such new employee has a considerable amount of experience, training and/or education and the City would be best served by authorizing such an advanced step.

<u>Section 6</u>. The City will pay to the employee pension fund all full-time employees' pension costs, in accordance with and in the amounts set forth in Section 143.14 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Franklin or as set forth in the collective bargaining agreement applicable to the employee.

Section 7. The full-time, non-union employees of the Police Division shall receive a uniform allowance of \$900 per year. This amount will be paid in two (2) equal payments of \$450.00 each. The payments will be made on or before the 10th day of February and on or before the 10th day of August, and shall be issued by separate checks.

<u>Section 8</u>. The full-time, non-union employees of the Fire & EMS Division shall receive a uniform allowance of \$400 per year. This amount will be paid on or before the 10th day of February and will be issued by separate check.

<u>Section 9</u>. The full-time, non-union employees of the Public Works Department shall receive annual incentive bonuses as follows:

EPA Lab Certification	\$800.00
Water & Sewer Distribution License	\$200.00
Water I Certificate	\$400.00
Water II Certificate	\$600.00
Water III Certificate	\$800.00

<u>Section 10</u>. The following monthly car allowances will be paid to the listed employees who drive their private vehicles on City-related business:

City Manager (provided with City vehicle)

Fire & EMS Chief \$400

Police Chief (provided with City vehicle)

City Engineer/Zoning Official \$200

<u>Section 11</u>. The City Manager is hereby authorized to issue, by Administrative Directive, a Smart Phone Policy, establishing regulations and eligibility for a monthly cell phone allowance to employees, not to exceed thirty-five dollars (\$35.00) per month, and a monthly data plan allowance to employees, not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per month.

<u>Section 12</u>. An employee who serves in the position of "Acting Director" of one of the City's four Departments (Finance, Law, Safety or Public Works) for a period of thirty (30) days or more shall be paid at Step 1 of the Director's then current salary for the time period in which the employee serves as the Acting Director of the Department.

Section 13. Volunteer Firefighter-Standby personnel working a scheduled shift as determined by the Fire Chief, shall receive double time payment for actual hours worked at a minimum, for the following holidays: Independence Day; Thanksgiving Day; Christmas Eve; Christmas Day and a 24 hour period beginning on New Year's Eve at 6 p.m. and ending on New Year's Day at 6 p.m.

Section 14. It is found that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this council, and that all deliberations of this Council that resulted in this formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code, and the Rules of Council.

DECLARING CITY MANAGER, THE CITY'S CONTRACTING OFFICER, TO BE EMPOWERED TO ACQUIRE TITLE TO OR INTERESTS IN REAL PROPERTY, FORMERLY KNOWN AS 24 E. THIRD STREET, FRANKLIN, OHIO, PERMANENT PARCEL ID#: 04-31-127-0170

WHEREAS, Charter of the City of Franklin, Ohio, Effective January 1, 1984, and last amended on January 1, 2018, Section 3.03 POWERS OF COUNCIL, provides:

The power to acquire title to or interests in real property shall be vested in the (i) Council, whether such property is acquired by: the exercise of the power of eminent domain, purchase, gift, lease, devise, bequest, in trust, or otherwise. The power to sell or otherwise convey, lease, or grant interests in real property shall be vested in the Council. Such sale, conveyance, lease or grant, shall be in the manner provided by the ordinance authorizing the sale, conveyance, lease, or grant provided that real estate shall not be sold or leased except to the highest and best bidder after competitive bids have been received pursuant to a notice of the proposed sale or lease published once a week for four (4) consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City. Written notice of intent to sell or lease real property shall be posted on the real estate to be sold or leased in a conspicuous location on such property and shall remain posted for four (4) consecutive weeks. The requirement that real estate be sold or leased only after competitive bidding may be waived upon the vote of at least five (5) members of the Council provided, however, that the Council shall give notice of its intent to dispense with competitive bidding by publication of such intent in the manner prescribed herein and by the reading of such intent at two consecutive regular Council meetings. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, property may be sold or leased to the United States, the State of Ohio, or any governmental unit or agency thereof, without competitive bidding, by ordinance, upon the vote of at least five (5) members of Council. (Ord 17-17, 11-17-17; passed by electorate 11-17-17, eff. 1-1-18);

WHEREAS, the City Manager, under the Charter of the City of Franklin, Ohio, Effective January 1, 1984, and last amended on January 1, 2018, Section 3.03 POWERS OF COUNCIL, appoints the City Contracting Officer;

WHEREAS, the City desires to acquire permanent parcel number 04-31-127-0170, formerly known as 24 E. Third Street, Franklin, OH 45005;

WHEREAS, the Seller has offered to sell the property to the City of Franklin for the current land value as shown on the Warren County Auditor's site;

WHEREAS, the City benefits, as to its citizens, when the City purchases certain property situated in city limits that it deems desirable to accomplish the objectives established by council and carried out by staff;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Franklin, Ohio, a majority of the members of Council present concurring, that:

<u>Section 1</u>. It is hereby declared necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare of the City of Franklin, Ohio, to reduce blight, nuisance, and like conditions within the City;

<u>Section 2</u>. It is hereby declared necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare of the City of Franklin, Ohio, to acquire certain property, regardless of whether such property in blighted or nuisance like condition, to accomplish the objectives established by Council and carried out by Staff to best serve its citizens;

Section 3. The City Manager is hereby empowered and directed, by Council under Charter Section 3.03(i), to carry out the City's objectives by acquiring title to or interests in the real property identified by permanent parcel number 04-31-127-0170 and formerly known as 24 E. 



CITY OF FRANKLIN, OHIO RESOLUTION 2020-65

APPOINTING JONATHAN WESTENDORF AS CITY MANAGER AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT WITH JONATHAN WESTENDORF FOR SERVICES AS THE CITY MANAGER

WHEREAS, Section 5.01 of the Charter of the City of Franklin, Ohio, grants Council the authority to appoint, by majority vote, a City Manager for a term of five years beginning January 1, 2020 and to fix his annual compensation including benefits, the first year being \$115,000;

WHEREAS, this Council desires to appoint Jonathan Westendorf as City Manager and enter into an employment agreement with Mr. Westendorf for his services as City Manager; and

WHEREAS, Section 6.02 of the Charter allows the City Manager to serve as the head of one or more Departments, with the approval of Council,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Franklin, Ohio, that:

- <u>Section 1</u>. Jonathan Westendorf is hereby appointed the City Manager of the City of Franklin, effective January 1, 2021 for a term of five years, ending December 31, 2025.
- <u>Section 2</u>. The compensation for the first year is \$115,000 plus benefits and the City agrees to review the City Manager's compensation annually upon the contract anniversary date.
- <u>Section 3</u>. The contract may be mutually terminated by either party for any reason with thirty days written notice. Where early termination occurs, the City Manager shall receive a severance payment equal to the amount of six month's salary and benefits and the payment of unused leave benefits.
- <u>Section 4</u>. The City Manager shall receive twenty-five days of paid vacation leave and sick leave shall accrue at the same rate as full time employees. The City Manager shall receive all other leave benefits, retirement benefits, insurance benefits and fringe benefits afforded full time employees.
- <u>Section 5</u>. The City may fix any such other terms and conditions related to performance as it deems necessary.
- <u>Section 6</u>. The Mayor, on behalf of the City Council, is hereby authorized to execute a contract with Jonathan Westendorf for his services as the City Manager, upon such terms and conditions as approved by this Council, and in a form as approved by the Director of Law.
- <u>Section 7</u>. In accordance with the Franklin City Charter, this Council hereby approves Mr. Westendorf, as City Manager, to also serve as the head of the Safety Department.
- <u>Section 8</u>. It is found that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council that resulted in this formal action were in meetings open to the public in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code, and the Rules of Council.
