1. PUBLIC HEARING – Ordinance 2024-447 – Amending City of Halsey Municipal Code Chapter 10.10 – Livestock and Poultry

Council Action: NONE July 9, 2024

Issue Statement: Council is holding a public hearing prior to adoption of Ordinance 2024-447 – Amending City of Halsey Municipal Code Chapter 10.10 – Livestock and Poultry

Summary:

During the March 2024 City Council meeting, members of council considered a proposal to review Halsey livestock municipal code for consideration of amending provisions to allow 4-H project animals on smaller lot sizes than were currently represented in City Code. The Council heard public comment, which was primarily in favor of reviewing the livestock code for these potential amendments. As such, the council voted to go to a work session to review an update the livestock municipal code.

A work session was held on May 28^{th} , at which time the recommended updates for Chapter $10.10 - 10^{th}$ Livestock. Municipal Code updates were drafted. The council reviewed them at the regular council meeting on June 10^{1h} , 2024 and recommended amendments to the proposed ordinance.

The Halsey Municipal Code currently limits livestock to lot sizes 30,000 square feet and larger, does not include restrictions on uncastrated male livestock, or provide any limitations to slaughter and butcher of animals within the city limits. The proposed updates to Chapter 10.10 – Livestock - allow for the issue of a special livestock permit for goat kids and lambs on minimum lot sizes of 9,000 square feet, for youth educational purposes only. The updates also include size and age limitations for goats and lambs qualifying for the special livestock permit, limitations on quantity of livestock, size of enclosure, and requirements for food storage and manure disposal. The updates to the ordinance also restrict the housing of educational lambs and goats to February through October, in alignment with 4-H and FFA timelines for raising and showing animals. Lastly, the updates to the ordinance place restrictions on uncastrated male livestock within city limits and prohibits the slaughter of specific livestock in the city.

LIVESTOCK ORDINANCE REVISION WORKSESSION

- It was brought to the attention of the council that an amendment to the current ordinance could be made for 4-H lambs. Councilor Romer brought forth his suggestions for an amendment to the ordinance for a subsection regarding 4-H/FFA livestock.
- There was a suggestion that the livestock be allowed on the property for a period time frame of February 1st to October 1st.
- Council discussed possible permitting requirements, allowances, and restrictions.
 - o The possibility of the permit being open to all citizens, not just those in 4-H/FFA if it was for educational purposes.
 - o Permission from neighbors for the permit.
 - Restrictions- No unaltered males are allowed.
- Suggested application fee for permit of \$25
- Suggested sanitation plan that includes having waste receptacles as an requirement.
- Setbacks of current livestock ordinance were discussed.
- A recommendation was made on lot size of .28 as the minimum lot size. A 5x8 space required per lamb was discussed. Plans for the pin would need to be shown on the permit was considered.

- A 3 lambs max limit was discussed.
- No butchering livestock in plain view was discussed.
- Enforcement of the code was considered. Possible penalty fees- maximum \$500.
- Adding a definition to the code of what is considered a lamb(age/size). Possible weight limit was discussed.

DELEGATIONS

Linn County Sheriff's Office- Sergeant Frambes

For the month of May there were ten traffic citations, and seventeen warnings. A total of forty-three complaints/incidents were investigated and seventy-three and three quarter hours were spent in Halsey.

Sergeant Frambes warned about recent fraudulent calls that are coming through as if from the Sheriff's Department. There was an incident in May in which they had to force entry into a home and assist a Halsey resident with a medical emergency.

- -Council President Isom expressed thanks for the patrol efforts at the four-way stop intersection of American Drive and Highway 99 E. Administrator Parra asked if LCSO has historic data on traffic stops at the intersection. Sergeant Frambes said they are able to pull traffic stop information for up to eight years for that area.
- -Mayor Lachenbruch asked if there has been an increase in speeding post road construction. Sergeant Frambes stated that LCSO can place a traffic speed mobile unit to narrow down times when speeding is occurring.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Tj Gillson stated support for increased patrol for traffic violations at the four-way stop. She also inquired on the location and condition of a set of original prints that were donated to the Library when it was established. Administrator Parra will follow up to get more information. The prints are believed to be located in storage in City Hall and not in danger of damage.

REPORTS TO COUNCIL

City Administrator-Briana Parra

- City Water Outage Public Works intends to conduct system maintenance to replace the master water meter at the water treatment plant on Thursday, June 13th. The work is anticipated to take approximately five hours, during which time water service will be off city-wide. Notifications have been sent to residents via the Brownsville Times, the Halsey Happenings Newsletter, on Utility Bills, on Facebook, and a zip code wide mailing. Target communications were provided in advance to the Fire District and School District. Portable toilets and handwash stations will be available at City Hall, the Library, and Halsey Memorial Park during the service interruption.
 - -A question was asked if flyers were posted at 7 Star Convenience Store. Staff will take flyers over on Wednesday.
- Georgia Pacific Donation- The Georgia Pacific Mill is donating \$500 to the Halsey City Library. GP has consistently and generously donated to help support the library since it's opening in 2015.
- City-Wide Garage Sale- The annual City-Wide Garage Sale took place on Saturday, June 1st. There were several sales and increased foot traffic in Halsey. The City was unable to secure any food truck vendors for the event, for reasons including availability due to conflicts with other events in the area, power access restrictions, and previous experiences in Halsey that resulted in low revenue. The City could consider options in the future to increase the chances of securing food vendors, including changing the date of the sale or investing in creating a sales event at the park to attract vendors.
- Summer Reading Program- Administrator Parra reminded families to get their children registered for the summer reading program.

- OSU Extension Service Food Preservation Workshops- Jenny Gilbert with the OSU Extension Service will be holding a series of food preservation workshops in the Community Center this summer. There is a nominal fee for each class to cover the cost of materials. Fees may be waived if food donated for a particular class is received.
- <u>City Ordinance Efforts</u>- There has been an increase in inoperable vehicles, boats, and RVs parked for extended periods of time in the city right-of-way. Staff has been conducting targeted efforts to address compliance related to these items and ensure safe and clear avenues of traffic on city streets.
- City Clean-Up Day- Staff conducted targeted outreach to residents with restricted items put out for clean-up day to help people understand and benefit fully from this event. Administrator Parra also participated in a ride along with Sweet Home sanitation on the morning of the event to better understand the reasoning behind certain item restrictions, and gauge who staff will need to reach out to following the event.
- Renewal for Advocacy-Halsey is a member of the Small Municipal Communities Advisory Council (SMAC). This program aids in getting priorities for small communities to legislature. Administrator Parra recently received the contract renewal. The cost to be a member is \$1,800 a year. A consensus is not needed at this time. Briana will send additional information to Council and invite Sean with SMAC to a Council Meeting soon to discuss the program.
 - Councilor Gillson asked a question about the City-wide Garage Sale and how the event date is determined. He stated that he would like to see a larger event during the sale that involves food vendors. Administrator Parra suggested that Halsey could consider coordinating the event with Brownsville City-Wide Garage Sale and other sales in the region to try to increase traffic to support food vendors.

Public Works- Andy Ridinger

- Water Leaks- Two water leaks were repaired in the month of May, one on West 1st Street and another on East 2nd Street.
- A sewer lateral on the 100 block of West A Street was inspected with a contractor and a buried sewer clean out was located.
- Spraying and mowing was conducted in town and out at the lagoon.
- Entry was made into the sewer lift stations dry vault to inspect the pumps.
- A new water distribution master meter will be installed at the water treatment plant on June 13th, resulting in a city-wide water service outage from approximately 9 am to 2 pm. City Hall and Public Works have been diligent in reaching out to business owners and residents to notify of the planned outage.

<u>Library Report-Abi Vinson</u>

- Monthly Stats-There were a total of 123 visitors to the Library in the month of May for an average of 5.35 patrons per day. One hundred twenty books were checked out and one new library card was issued. Five new books were added to the catalog, including purchases and donations. Additional donated books are in the process of being catalogued.
- Summer BBQ- The Library Summer Barbecue is on Saturday, June 22nd from 11:30 pm to 1:30 pm. There will be free food and drinks and attendees will have the opportunity to see recent changes and additions to the Library, including the Lending Library and Seed Library, as well as sign up for the Summer Reading Program.
- <u>Door Update</u>- An installation date is TBA. Left Coast Door is awaiting parts for the project.
- <u>Technology Grant Update</u>- New technology will be purchased in June with the grant monies awarded by the Oregon Humanities Connectivity Grant.
- Summer Reading Program Preparation- The majority of the prizes and supplies for this year's Summer Reading Program have been purchased using the Ready 2 Read Grant funds and proceeds from the 5K Fundraiser.
- Central Cascades Wilderness Permit Pass- This is a program in which the Halsey Library be provided a pass that could be checked out by library card holders to access local recreation.
 - Councilor Gillson asked if there is an update to the Lending Library Program with OSU. Librarian Vinson attended a meeting about the program and OSU Staff did some safety education on the equipment and spoke more about the waiver. There will be a form and waiver that will be required to check out equipment, as well as proof of address. Cleaning or replacement fees will be assessed if applicable. Mayor Lachenbruch asked if OSU has provided replacement cost information for the items in the Lending Library. They have not, but most items are estimated at around \$100 in value. Abi will request further information from OSU. Councilor Gillson asked if there is a final list of items that will be available to check out. Items include a pressure canner, steam canner, food sealer, fermentation crock, and dehydrator.
 - Mayor Lachenbruch voiced appreciation for Librarian Vinson's efforts with the awarded technology grant. Councilor Gillson asked for a timeline on when the technology will arrive. The timeline is unknown currently.

Mayor's Report- Jerry Lachenbruch

- Mayor attended a meeting with Sean from SMAC. The meeting was informational, and Sean would like to come speak to Council.
- Bond Advisory Committee Meeting- Mayor attended the meeting. The discussion was about how potential school bonds will affect property tax rates.

- City-Wide Garage Sale- Mayor was out and about in the community during the City-Wide Garage Sale and was able to speak with many residents and get an idea of what is happening around town.
- Spring Clean-Up- There were not many items left after the event had concluded, which is a good indicator that residents received the communications from the City about what items were eligible to be picked up at the event.

Central Linn School District Report- Council President Isom

There was no report.

NEW BUSINESS

"Library of Things" Agreement & Waiver

The Halsey Library received several food preservation equipment items donated by the OSU Extension Service for the new lending library program. These items will be the launch of a "Library of Things" program. Council was asked to review waiver options and provide feedback to City Staff for the development of a waiver of liability for citizens renting items from the Halsey Library. There was discussion.

-Councilor Romer suggested that the agreement and waiver be reviewed by the City Attorney.

Ordinance 2024-447- Livestock (First Reading)

Council was asked to review and provide feedback on the draft ordinance. A work session to discuss changes to the Halsey Municipal Code Chapter 10.10-Livestock and Poultry was held on May 28th.

Administrator Parra explained the deviations in the proposed ordinance from what was discussed in the work session, including:

- Restrictions on slaughter in City limits.
- The council had expressed that they would like the permit applicant to be responsible for checking with neighbors. Briana has suggested that the City conduct communications with neighboring properties rather than the applicant.
- Removal of redundant language regarding allowing the ordinance on commercial properties. Briana will research further, including guidelines for when the animals are bordering a commercial property.
 - -Councilor Gillson asked if Council has had any additional thoughts on opening up this ordinance from just 4H use to the entire community. Mayor stated that he feels that the ordinance should be kept strictly educational. Administrator Parra stated that the City attorney has reviewed the draft ordinance and stated that he does not foresee potential issues with litigation if Council decides to limit the ordinance for educational use only. The attorney did not provide a legal opinion on the number of animals on the lot size indicated but did express concern about the lot size and number of animals allowed within the proposed ordinance. Councilor Gillson stated

that there will potentially be much less conflict with neighboring properties if the ordinance is only limited to 4H. Councilor Romer stated that limiting the ordinance to 4H only would be beneficial for the health of the animals and cleanliness due to strict 4H requirements in those areas.

- -Administrator Parra asked how Council feels about the proposed ordinance language stating that the City will communicate with neighboring properties when a permit is applied for, rather than an applicant. This change was suggested since some neighboring residents may not feel comfortable voicing concern directly to their neighbor. Councilor Romer requested adding something to the ordinance that encourages applicants to communicate with their neighbors. That language would not be able to be a part of the ordinance but could be included as part of the permit application process.
- -Councilor Romer addressed the formerly mentioned concern regarding density of animals per lot. He said that you cannot have less than two animals, as they are herd animals and would make much more noise and attempt to escape. Mayor Lachenbruch suggested a limit of two. Councilor Romer stated that there would not be a concern if area requirements and setbacks are met, but that a limit of two would be acceptable. Council agreed on setting the limit to two animals.
- -Administrator Parra asked Council if they are ok with the proposed setbacks in the draft ordinance. Roofed structures must comply with setbacks, but pens do not and could be placed on the property line, so long as they fall within the setbacks from neighboring buildings. There was consensus.
- -Councilor Romer declared a potential conflict of interest but stated that his children will not be participating in the program in the coming year.

Council reached a consensus to recommend the ordinance as written with amendments.

Special Livestock Permit (First Reading)

The Council was asked to review and provide feedback on the draft Special Livestock Permit. Some changes will be necessary due to the amended changes to the ordinance in the previous agenda item. Administrator Parra has removed the requirement for minors to sign the document. Their name will be listed on the agreement, but the parent/guardian will be responsible for understanding the ordinance and for any violations.

Council reached a consensus to approve the permit as amended.

1. Highway 99 Project

As many of you have noticed, the project has moved to the western lanes of Highway 99, resulting in closure of O street where is accesses the highway. While we new this closure would happen eventually, unfortunately the date of closure took us by a bit of surprise. Public works notified me of the closure to the street right away, and I went to investigate the signage situation. I connected with our ODOT contact, Andrea, who was very responsive to our concerns about communication and signage. ODOT worked to update and improve signage immediately, which we hope will lessen the chance of semi-trucks driving through our small residential streets. I was briefed on the anticipated timeline of the O street closure for this portion of the project, which is expected to take 4 weeks. Larissa was able to get the information into our July newsletter, and we posted it to social media and the City website. I went to visit all of the industrial buildings down O street and Powerline to apologize for the lack of notice for the street closure and update them on the timeline. We have also requested that the contractors limit the storage of equipment in the right of way near the park to allow patrons to continue to use our facilities.

2. Parks Project

We have received our right of way permit for the tree removal from ODOT! While these steps took a bit longer than anticipated, having the permit in place allows us to move forward with scheduling work. We will need to collaborate with ODOT to ensure that our work does not disrupt their Highway 99 work, and vice versa. We also received the wetland delineation report for the portion of the park that will house the new playground equipment. The report found no requirements for wetland mitigation, and that our project will not have any significant impact on wetlands. This was a pivotal step in the process allowing us to move forward. I am working on Bids for the path project, the playground equipment, and court resurfacing, which need to comply with an intermediate procurement process due to anticipated cost exceeding \$25,000.

3. Elections – Council seats coming to end of term

IT is an election year! We have 3 council seats and the Mayor positions coming to the end of their term in December 2024. Election packets are available at City Hall. There are two major deadlines to keep in mind if you wish to file candidacy

a. File by petition -

This requires candidates to collect signatures from City of Halsey residents. Signature pages must be approved by the Halsey Election Officer (Briana) prior to collection of signatures. The deadline to submit all the necessary forms to file by petition is **August 14**th **at 5pm**

b. File by Declaration -

This requires a candidate filing fee and submission of the file by declaration forms to City of Halsey. The Deadline to file is **August 27**th **at 4pm**

We repaired a 2" water line leak @ E. 2nd and A st. We had to replace a section of pipe to complete the repair. We successfully installed a new distribution meter at the water treatment plant. But an unusual issue happened while turning on the distribution pump. The VFD (variable frequency drive) that is attached to the pump failed or should I say burnt up.

Luckily, we had one on the shelf and were able run to Eugene and pick up a new keypad display controller and got it programmed and running the next day.

We located a buried 6" sewer clean-out that was on our maps on the 600 block of W. 2nd that had a 5-gallon bucket covering it. The reason we started the investigation was we needed to find it and a resident wanted to put up a fence and we had video footage of a root ball in the sewer main from civil west engineering. The clean out was found, the root ball was extracted and the clean out was repaired and brought to grade with a new access cap.

We noticed excessive water coming into a manhole on W. A street. Our investigation found the contractor that installed the new sewer lateral at 150 A street had drilled completed through the pipe creating ground water to enter the system. Corrective actions are in place from Briana.

Summary: A work session to discuss changes to Halsey Municipal Code (HMC) chapter 10.10 – Livestock and Poultry. During the work session council proposed a Special Livestock Permit to accompany proposed changes to the HMC.

- **Possible Options:** Council can discuss and reach a consensus, providing instructions to City Administrator on next steps.
 - 1. Approve as recommended
 - 2.Approve with amendments
 - 3. Provide further direction to staff
 - 4. Deny request

Halsey Special Livestock Permit

[No permit required for lot sizes 30,000 square feet (~0.69 acre) or larger]

<u>Purpose</u>: To provide opportunity for youth participating in educational programs such as 4H or F FA to raise lambs or goat kids within Halsey City Limits, subject to verification and a signed agreement with the City regarding conditions and care of keeping animals, and in compliance wi th all other Halsey Municipal and Development codes.

Area & Pen Requirements

- 1. Minimum tax lot size requirement 9000 square Feet (approximately .2 acres)
- 2. Animal pen cannot be located in the front yard.
- 3. Designated pen with the minimum equivalent of a 5'x 8' ft (40 square feet) area for each animal, and provide adequate shelter from sun and rain.
- 4. Designated pen must comply with all setbacks described in Municipal Code 10.10.080 and Development Code 2.2.120
- 5. Animals must be on leash, halter, tied up, staked out or within a fenced yard at all times when not in a designated pen.

Animal Restrictions

- 1. Lamb and/or goat kids are <u>only</u> permitted on site from **February 1st October 1st** of a calendar year.
- 2. Lamb and goat kids allowed under this permit must be under 12 months of age and under 175 pounds
- 3. No more than 2 sheep or goats per tax lot.

Health and Sanitation

- 1. Animal feed must be stored in a rodent-proof container.
- 2. A covered, self-contained, waterproof receptacle must be used for holding accumulations of solid waste to prevent flies and odor. This receptacle should be emptied sufficiently to prevent it from becoming a nuisance.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING HALSEY MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 10.10 TO ADD PROVISIONS ON LAMBS AND GOAT KIDS

Whereas, the City does not currently allow lambs and goat kids on small parcels within the City;

Whereas, the City would like to allow lambs and goat kids within the City under certain conditions that account for the possible nuisance impacts of livestock on neighbors,

Now, therefore, the City of Halsey ordains as follows:

Section 1. Hasley Municipal Code Chapter 10.10 is amended, in total, to read as follows:

10.10.010. Purpose. The purpose of this chapter is to set forth regulations as they apply to the keeping or raising of livestock or poultry within the City of Halsey.

10.10.020. Definitions. As used in this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning ascribed:

"Butcher" means to cut up and the preparation of domestic meat for consumption.

"City" means the City of Halsey, Oregon.

"Goat kid" mean any male or female goat under the age of 12 months, and under 175 pounds.

"Harvest" means the act of slaughter or butchering of an animal for the purpose of making consumable meat.

"Lamb" means any male or female sheep under the age of 12 months, and under 175 pounds.

"Livestock" means any domesticated animals commonly kept for use on a farm or raised for sale and profit. The term includes, but is not limited to: cows, calves, bulls, horses, mares, colts, mules, goats, kids, sheep, lambs, and swine.

"Person" means a natural person, firm, partnership, association, or corporation.

"Poultry" means any domesticated birds that commonly serve as a source of food. The term includes, but is not limited to chickens, domesticated pigeons, turkeys, ducks, and geese.

"Slaughter" means putting animals to death and does not include butchering, meat cutting or preparation of domestic for consumption.

"Youth Educational Program" means participation in an organized education program for livestock husbandry. The term includes, but is not limited to 4-H, FFA, or similar programs.

10.10.030. Animals Running Loose.

- (1) No person owning, in possession of, or having control of any livestock or poultry shall permit the livestock or poultry to run loose in a public place, or on property of others without their permission
- (2) No person owning, in possession of, or having control of any livestock or poultry shall permit the livestock or poultry to be tethered or pastured in any manner upon a public place, or on property of others without their permission.

10.10.040. Exceptions for riding, herding and leading livestock.

Ordinance No. 2024-447

- (1) No person shall ride, herd or lead livestock over the right-of-way of any major street except for the purpose of reaching an area where the livestock are permitted.
- (2) The council may grant exceptions to the provisions of this section for community activities such as parades, special promotions, etc., upon application to the council in a manner prescribed by the City Administrator.
- (3) Nothing in this ordinance shall prohibit the transportation of an animal by any reasonable means to a veterinarian for medical treatment or examination or for commercial purposes.

10.10.050. Health and Sanitation.

- (1) The keeping or raising of poultry or livestock must not be conducted so as to create an unsanitary condition resulting in a nuisance as may be determined by the City Council or County Health Department. No person keeping or raising such livestock shall create or maintain a nuisance by allowing or permitting unusual or excessive:
 - a. Noise.
 - b. Accumulation of manure.
 - c. Presence of flies.
 - d. Presence of rodents.
 - e. Production of odors.
 - f. Accumulation of surface water without adequate sanitary drainage in or about any barn, stable, roofed structure for the shelter of livestock, corral, fenced area, or pasture.
- (2) All persons keeping or raising poultry or livestock shall be required to have the following:
 - a. A rodent-proof container for storage of animal feed.
 - b. When keeping lambs and goat kids on lots under 30,000 square feet as described HMC 10.10.070, a fly proof and watertight receptacle for collection of manure, which will be emptied sufficiently often and in such a manner as to prevent it becoming a nuisance.
- (3) Harvesting of animals on residential property shall meet the following criteria:
 - a. Only poultry and rabbits may be slaughtered on site.
 - b. The slaughter of all other livestock is prohibited on residential property.
 - c. Any allowable harvesting of animals shall not occur in view from any public area or any adjacent property.

10.10.060. Secondary Use.

The keeping and raising of livestock shall be secondary to the principal residential use of the property.

10.10.070. Area Requirements.

(4) Livestock shall only be kept or raised on lots of 30,000 square feet (approximately three-fourths of one acre) or more, and shall be kept within an adequately fenced area in a back or side yard. Unaltered male livestock are not permitted. The total number of all such livestock is subject to the following land area limitations:

- (a) Not to exceed one horse or three sheep, or one swine, or similar livestock for each 20,000 square feet of area devoted to livestock.
- (b) Not more than four horses or twelve sheep or two swine or similar livestock shall be kept at one location.
- (5) Lambs and goat kids shall per permitted on lots under 30,000 square feet or more if the following criteria are met:
 - Lambs and goat kids are being kept solely for the purpose of a youth educational program such as 4-H or FFA livestock projects.
 - b. The lot size shall not be less than 9,000 square feet.
 - c. Lambs and goat kids on lots under 30,000 square feet are only permitted from February 1 through October 1.
 - d. Each lamb and goat kid requires the equivalent of a 5' x 8' feet area (40 square feet of space) within a dedicated holding pen.
 - e. Lambs and goat kids must be leashed, haltered, or in a fenced yard at all times when not in a dedicated enclosure.
 - f. No more than 2 total lambs and goat kids are allowed.
 - g. Prior to bringing a lamb or goat kid onto the property an annual permit shall be applied for at the City, a fee for which shall be established by Council Resolution.
 - h. A permit shall be issued by the City:
 - i. After a notice has been sent to adjoining property owners and renters, other than the City, informing them of the request to place lambs or goat kids on adjoining property and informing them they have 10 days to let the City know in writing if they have an objection or concern; and
 - ii. No objection is made to the City.
- (6) Livestock on residential property located in the commercial zone shall require administrative review

10.10.080. Animal Shelters.

- (1) All barns, stables, or roofed structures for the shelter of livestock shall be located no closer than 60 feet to any existing dwelling or swimming pool on property adjacent to the property where said livestock is kept, nor closer than 25 feet from a residence on the subject property.
- (2) Any corral, fenced area, or restraint for livestock, except swine, shall not be located closer than 25 feet to an existing dwelling on property adjacent to the property where said livestock are kept, nor within 30 feet of the center line of a public street.
- (3) Any fenced area or roofed structure restraint for swine shall not be located closer than 100 feet to an existing dwelling or swimming pool on property adjacent to the property where said swine are kept, nor within 100 feet of the center line of a public street.

10.10.090. Poultry.

The keeping of poultry is permitted in the residential zoning district subject to these limitations and restrictions:

- (1) The maximum number of chickens allowed on a residential lot shall be limited to one chicken hen per 1,000 square feet of lot size, up to a maximum of 15 chickens. Roosters are not permitted. Chicks under the age of four months shall not count towards the maximum numbers allowed. Other poultry are limited to: 12 pigeons and two of any other kind of poultry.
- (2) Poultry must be kept confined to a single lot. No poultry shall be allowed to be within 25 feet of a dwelling on an adjoining lot.

10.10.100. Penalty.

- (1) A violation of this chapter is punishable upon conviction by a fine not to exceed \$500. Each day of occurrence of such violation shall constitute a separate violation of this chapter.
- (2) Removal of livestock from property can be required under the following conditions:
 - a. A livestock owner is found to be abusive or negligent of the animal under their care;
 - b. When there is a public risk to health or safety as determined by the City Administrator or Oregon Health Authority;
 - c. Upon the determination of a third violation of this chapter; or
 - d. If two notices of a single violation have been sent and there has been no response to the City, and the violation has not been addressed within 14 days.

Livestock will not be permitted for 1 year following the removal of livestock from property that otherwise meet area requirements as described in HMC 10.10.070 and 10.10.080.

10.10.110. Severability. The sections and subsections of this ordinance are severable. The invalidity of any section or subsection shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections or subsections.

Section 2 - Effective Date. This ordinance will go into full force and effect on the 30th day after City Council enactment as provided in the Halsey Charter.
