**158.05 SECTION 101.1 AMENDED -- TITLE.** Section 101.1, Title, of the IFC, is hereby deleted and there is enacted in lieu thereof the following section:

- (166.10.4) All water mains, including hydrants and hydrant leads, within the development are proposed to be public
  water mains. This does not include water services. Water services from the main to the residence will be
  private. Easements are to be shown on the final plat for the water mains. Easement documents will be
  prepared and submitted to the City and will stipulate the following:
  - a. The City will be responsible for the maintenance and repair of the water mains and hydrants.
  - b. The developer will be responsible for all replacement work beyond the water main including subgrade compaction and pavement replacement.

All other utilities within the development will be private including all sanitary and storm sewers. There needs to be a discussion on whether the City wants the water mains within the development to be public or private.

There are good arguments for this both ways. The private argument is there is precedence for this arrangement such as the mobile home park just to the west and the City does not have the expense of future maintenance costs. The public argument is that for better water quality it would be best to have the system looped (mobile home park has just one connection, Kading proposing three connections) and the City then has control over repairs to make sure the water supply is kept safe.

Planning & Zoning Commission would prefer that the main is looped and inspected by the City but wants Council to decide on if the water is public or private.

The developer is proposing to install a 10-foot wide trail on the east side of Deerwood Drive in lieu of a 5-foot
wide sidewalk on the west side of Deerwood Drive. There are existing trees along the west property line next to
the mobile home park that will make the installation of a sidewalk difficult in this area if the trees are to be
protected.

Comp plan shows a trail. P&Z is ok with eliminating the 5ft sidewalk requirement on the west side of Deerwood Drive and making the east side a 10ft foot wide trail.

3. If a trail is installed on the east side of Deerwood Drive then there needs to be a discussion on how the trail is connected to the Heart of lowa Trail spur located just to the west of the southwest corner of the site.

It is proposed that the trail on the east side of Deerwood extend to 1<sup>st</sup> street, however, the commission would like council to decide on what they foresee for that area in the future and how to connect to the existing trail. The commission indicated that a mid-block crossing is not as safe a crossing at an intersection.

4. The north end of Deerwood Drive connects differently than what is shown on the preliminary plat for Meadow Lane to the north. Possible changes to the Meadow Lane Preliminary Plat need to be discussed and determined.

It was decided that a new preliminary plat is needed when Meadow Lane Phase 4 is developed. Kading and Steve Quick will solve between themselves and provide a written agreement to the City before council on February 13th.

5. The storm sewer outlet at the northeast corner of the mobile home park and the storm sewer outlet from the north detention basin for the development will impact the preliminary plat for Meadow Lane. Possible changes to the Meadow Lane Preliminary Plat need to be discussed and determined.

It was decided that a new preliminary plat is needed when Meadow Lane Phase 4 is developed. Kading and Steve Quick will solve between themselves and provide a written agreement to the City before council on February 13th.

Subdivision Ordinance 165.05.44 requires parking spaces to be not less than 200 square feet. The proposed
parking stalls are 9 feet by 18 feet or 162 square feet. A decision needs to be made on a variance for the smaller
parking spaces.

No variance is needed as the proposed meets code. Some discussion is needed on the length of the parking spaces.

7. A traffic study needs to be provided and evaluated.

Planning & Zoning Commission agrees.

8. A lighting plan needs to be provided and evaluated.

Planning & Zoning Commission agrees.

9. Construction plans for Deerwood Drive need to be provided.

Planning & Zoning Commission agrees.

10. Subdivision Ordinance 165.24.4.C. requires a minimum 26-foot wide pavement for the interior private streets.

Twenty-two foot (22-foot) wide streets are being proposed meeting Subdivision Ordinance 165.33.4 for private access drives. A determination needs to be made on the width of the interior pavement.

The proposed street width of 22 feet does not meet Huxley code of 26 feet. If the code did not specify 26 feet, the Planning & Zoning commission would not have a problem with the street width. Kading is indicating these are not streets or roadways. Huxley code states:

All interior private roadways shall be paved according to City standards for residential street pavement construction with a minimum pavement width of 26 feet, measured back to back of curb.

"Private roadway" means a paved access, private right-of-way which is for private usage and ingress and egress to a public street.

Discussion and a decision is needed.

11. Subdivision Ordinance 166.21.7 states that lots shall not have access onto an arterial street unless unavoidable. E. First Street is an arterial street. The site plan shows an access onto E. First Street in the southeast corner of the site. This access would be across from the existing east daycare driveway. A decision needs to be made on a variance for this access point.

It is recommended that the far east access from 1st Street is eliminated as it is in violation of Ordinance 166.21.7

The public argument is that for better water quality it would be best to have the system looped (mobile home park has just one connection, Kading proposing three connections) and the City then has control over repairs to make sure the water supply is kept safe.

- 2. The developer is proposing to install a 10-foot wide trail on the east side of Deerwood Drive in lieu of a 5-foot wide sidewalk on the west side of Deerwood Drive. There are existing trees along the west property line next to the mobile home park that will make the installation of a sidewalk difficult in this area if the trees are to be protected. The City's comprehensive plan shows a trail to be extended along Deerwood Drive.
- 3. The north end of Deerwood Drive connects differently than what is shown on the preliminary plat for Meadow Lane to the north. The storm sewer outlet at the northeast corner of the mobile home park and the storm sewer outlet from the north detention basin for the development will impact the preliminary plat for Meadow Lane. Planning and Zoning recommended the Meadow Lane preliminary plat be changed to reflect the proposed changes for the Villas @ 315 before the next development is constructed in the Meadow Lane subdivision. We have requested that Steve Quick, the owner of the Meadow Lane subdivision, provide a written statement that he is agreeable to the proposed improvements associated with the Villas @ 315 as it affects the Meadow Lane subdivision.
- 4. City Ordinance 166.20.16 states the pavement width of Deerwood Drive shall be 34 feet wide with parking allowed on one side. SUDAS Design Standard Table SC-1.01 states the pavement width of Deerwood Drive shall be 34 feet wide parking allowed on one side (matching the ordinance) or shall be 31 feet wide with no parking allowed. The developer is proposing the pavement width of Deerwood Drive to be 31 feet wide with no parking allowed.
- 5. The plan as presented to Planning and Zoning was for 22 feet wide private streets with a 4-foot sidewalk on one side. City Ordinance 165.24.4.C requires a minimum pavement width of 26 feet. The site plan has been revised for 26 feet wide private streets with no sidewalks except for a sidewalk on the north side of the middle east/west street extending from Deerwood Drive to the middle north/south street.

In addition to the above City Council considerations we have the following additional comments:

- 1. We have reviewed the traffic study and find it acceptable.
- 2. We have reviewed the stormwater study and find it acceptable.
- 3. A lighting plan needs to be provided and evaluated as a part of the Deerwood Drive construction plans.

- 4. A pavement design determination needs to be performed for Deerwood Drive as a part of the Deerwood Drive construction plans.
- 5. Construction plans for Deerwood Drive need to be provided.
- 6. The following comments need to be addressed by Kading Properties and Lee Chamberlin Consultant Engineers:
  - a. In the southeast detention basin showing a 6-foot wide flume from the detention basin to the sidewalk on the north side of East First. Purpose of the flume?
  - b. Believe current ADA will require an opposite ramp be installed on the south side of East First opposite the trail ramp on the north side. Please review.
  - c. A culvert is shown running east and west under the throat to the temporary turn around. It appears the ground can be graded such that the drainage can be directed northward around the turn around and the culvert deleted.
  - d. Planning and Zoning's comment was to connect the outlet storm sewer from the mobile home park in the northwest corner and pipe it to the north detention basin. Please approach the mobile home park concerning permission to get on their property to make the connection and delete the open drainage channel.
  - e. The detention basin outlet pipes need to be RCP. The south two outlet pipes extend into the East First R.O.W. The north detention basin outlet pipe will extend into the R.O.W. of a future street.
  - f. The City's comprehensive plan shows the land to the east of the development scheduled to be single family residential. Please provide vegetative screening plant materials along the east property line boundary.
  - g. The temporary turnaround at the north end of Deerwood Drive needs to be hard surfaced with asphalt or concrete in accordance with City Ordinance 166.20.10.

# INTERGOVERNMENTAL 28E AGREEMENT FOR COMBINED LAW ENFORCEMENT OPERATIONS

THIS AGREEMENT, made by and among the County of Story, Iowa, the City of Ames, Iowa, the City of Nevada, Iowa, the City of Story City, Iowa, the City of Huxley, Iowa, Story County Conservation, and Iowa State University of Science and Technology, with their respective law enforcement agencies, the Story County Sheriff's Office, the Ames Police Department (hereinafter "Ames PD"), the Nevada Public Safety Department (hereinafter "Nevada PD"), the Story City Police Department (hereinafter "Story City PD"), the Huxley Police Department (hereinafter "Huxley PD"), Story County Conservation Public Safety (hereinafter "Story County PS"), and the Iowa State University of Science and Technology Department of Public Safety (hereinafter "ISU DPS"), (hereinafter collectively "the Parties"), is entered into to permit combined law enforcement activities within their boundaries pursuant to Chapter 28E of the Iowa Code, providing as follows:

### I. PURPOSE

WHEREAS, this Agreement does not contemplate and shall not be construed to limit or expand the powers of the participating entities, except as expressly stated in this Agreement;

WHEREAS, the undersigned entities provide law enforcement services to their respective constituents; and

WHEREAS, the Parties recognize that in certain situations, the use of law enforcement officers and other law enforcement employees to perform law enforcement duties outside of the territorial limits of the political subdivision or institution where such officers are legally employed may be desirable and necessary to preserve and protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, the Parties recognize that there are certain types of criminal activities or trends that are a local, regional, state, and/or national problem involving violations of laws that cross political jurisdictional lines and that law enforcement officers from the jurisdictions listed in this Agreement may be called to render assistance to officers and/or become independently involved in law enforcement activities outside of their respective political subdivision or institution. The parties further recognize that there are certain prearranged law enforcement tasks that may be planned which will involve participation of law enforcement officers from all Parties and that these tasks may take place outside of their respective subdivision or institution; and

WHEREAS, the Parties recognize that there are certain criminal activities or investigative tasks that the officers identified in this Agreement may become independently involved in outside of their jurisdiction without participation of any officers of the jurisdiction where those activities are taking place.

IT IS, THEREFORE, the purpose of this Agreement to permit the Parties, through their respective law enforcement agencies, to share personnel for the purpose of combined routine patrol, investigations, and any other law enforcement related activities as the Parties deem appropriate.

### II. NATURE OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made pursuant to Chapter 28E, Code of Iowa. This Agreement is to permit joint law enforcement activities by the Parties. No separate legal entity is established by this Agreement. Each Party shall independently finance and budget for its activities under this Agreement. No real or personal property will be purchased, held or disposed of in the performance of this Agreement.

## III. MUTUAL AID

Mutual aid means a voluntary exchange of services, personnel, and/or equipment among the Parties.

Mutual aid may be provided between and among the Parties during a natural disaster, public disorder, State emergency, other emergency, or routine police work when it would best serve the interests of the Parties and public within the respective jurisdictions.

All law enforcement personnel employed by each party shall have authority to render mutual aid at the request of personnel from another party's law enforcement agency unless such authority is revoked or restricted by a commanding officer of either agency. Such revocation or restriction may be made at any time, but not without first notifying the requesting party. A request for aid may be made through commanding officers, through law enforcement dispatchers or directly from one officer to another. In any case where mutual aid is rendered, every officer involved shall report the extent of aid rendered to their respective commanding officers.

### IV. AUTHORITY OF PARTICIPATING OFFICERS

The officers designated pursuant to this Agreement shall have full powers as peace officers when participating in the law enforcement activities identified in this Agreement anywhere in the jurisdictions of the participating agencies. However, they shall have no greater authority than they have when in their employing jurisdiction or institution.

The Police Chief of the City of Ames, the Sheriff of Story County, the Police Chief of Nevada, the Police Chief of Story City, the Police Chief of Huxley, the Director of Public Safety for Story County Conservation, and the Assistant Vice President/Chief of Police for the Director of the Department of Public Safety at Iowa State University, or any officer commanding in their absence, shall retain full command of and authority over officers employed by their respective agencies at all times, even while in the process of rendering mutual aid, unless specific orders to the contrary are issued by the officer's commander. A delegation of command authority to another agency shall not relieve the delegating Party from its obligations to hold harmless and indemnify the other Parties to this Agreement as set forth below.

## V. COMPENSATION

It shall be the responsibility of each party to this agreement to provide compensation to its own personnel and to provide appropriate insurance for its personnel who may suffer injury, disability, or death in the performance of official duties while assisting the other party under the

terms of this Agreement. No participating law enforcement agency shall be required to compensate officers of another agency.

Each party to this Agreement shall be responsible for the issuance of, repairs, and maintenance on its own vehicles and other equipment.

### VI. LIABILITY

Employees or volunteers of any party acting pursuant to this Agreement shall be considered as acting under the lawful orders and instructions pertaining to their employment or volunteer status with such party. Under no circumstances are employees or volunteers of one party to be considered employees or volunteers of the other party.

Each party waives all claims against the other for compensation for any property loss or damage and/or personal injury or death to its personnel as consequence of the performance of this Agreement unless such loss, damage, injury, or death arises from the negligent or willful misconduct of a party. Each party shall bear the liability and/or costs of damage to its equipment and facilities, and the compensation of its employees or volunteers, including injury and death of its personnel, occurring as a consequence of the performance of this Agreement, whether the damages, costs, injury, or death occurs at an emergency in the party's own jurisdiction or in the jurisdiction of the other party unless such damages, injury, liability, or death arises from the negligent or willful misconduct of a party. Nothing in this Agreement is intended nor does it waive any right to seek federal or other assistance provided for disaster relief.

A party shall hold harmless and indemnify the other parties from any liability to third parties arising out of its negligent or willful misconduct, or arising from the execution of a specific command or order pursuant to this Agreement. Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent or limit any party to this Agreement from recovering or attempting to recover costs of services rendered to a third party where such recovery of costs is provided for by law.

The Parties to this Agreement do not waive any defenses, immunities, or other limitations applicable to a respective party and nothing herein shall be so construed. Each party to this Agreement reserves the right to fully defend all claims arising from loss of or damage to private property and/or death of or injury to private persons who are not parties to this Agreement including, but not limited to asserting defenses of immunities available under applicable law.

This article shall survive the termination of this Agreement where necessary to protect each party to this Agreement.

# VII. RULES AND REGULATIONS

The commanding officers of the participating law enforcement agencies are authorized to establish the operational rules and regulations for the law enforcement officers' conduct pursuant to this Agreement, covering such matters as administrative duties and command responsibility for the personnel and equipment involved.

Unless otherwise agreed by the respective parties to a specific case, the party requesting mutual aid shall be responsible for original case preparation and filing criminal charges, if any. In cases where this agreement in invoked to address potential or perceived conflict of interest, the party leading the investigation will be responsible for case preparation and filing of criminal charges. The secondary party shall provide supplementary reports as needed. Both parties shall maintain their respective copies of criminal reports generated by a mutual aid request.

A sworn officer making an arrest shall be responsible for maintaining custody and writing reports generating from the arrest. If the arrest is based on officer observation or investigation, that officer must file the appropriate criminal charge(s) (citation of complaint) with the appropriate courts.

Officers responding outside of their jurisdiction will notify the agency whose jurisdiction they are entering as soon as possible of the criminal activity.

### VIII. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence when approved by the governing body of each law enforcement agency and signed by the representative of each governing body and continue until terminated as provided herein. The term of this Agreement shall end on February 28, 2028, unless previously terminated as provided herein.

This Agreement may be terminated at any time by the mutual agreement of all parties or by the political entity authorizing this agreement by furnishing written notice to the other agencies of the termination. All Parties to this Agreement must provide 90 days notice prior to terminating participation in this Agreement. This Agreement would remain in effect as to the non-terminating agencies, and an amendment to the Agreement made and filed.

### IX. AMENDMENTS

This Agreement represents the entire agreement of the parties. This Agreement is not intended to supersede any prior agreements between participating agencies or prevent any of the Parties from adopting other agreements relating to cooperative law enforcement activities. Any amendments must be in writing, approved by the governing bodies of all Parties, and executed by the authorized representatives of all Parties. All executions, terminations, and amendments of this Agreement will be filed in the office of the Iowa Secretary of State, in accordance with Chapter 28E.8 of the Code of Iowa.

## X. VALIDITY

In the event any part or paragraph of this Agreement is declared void as being contrary to Iowa law, the remaining portions of the Agreement that are valid shall continue in full force and effect.

## XI. APPLICABLE LAW

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Iowa (excluding conflict of laws rules), and applicable federal law.

### XII. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same instrument.

# XIII. AUTHORITY

Each party to this Agreement represents and warrants to the other that it has the right, power and authority to enter into and perform its obligations under this Agreement; and that it has taken all requisite actions necessary to approve the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement.

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this	day of	, 2018, by and
between Story County, Iowa, and the City of Hux	ley, Iowa, and is duly	authorized by Chapter
28E of the Code of Iowa.		

The City of Huxley has no office wherein the police department may receive or dispatch telephone and radio messages on a 24 hour per day basis. Huxley agrees to the following terms with the Story County Sheriff's Office:

- 1. This contractual agreement shall commence on the first day of July, 2018 and shall continue for one (1) year ending on June 30, 2019. The per capita charge shall automatically increase by 4 percent or an amount equal to the U.S. Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for a 12 month period, to be reviewed each November and increased the lesser amount. The new rate will begin on the first day of each July.
- 2. Story County shall be reimbursed by Huxley for its dispatching services at a rate of \$5.87 per capita based on the 2010 census figure of 3,317 for Huxley and 827 for the City of Cambridge, combined population of 4,144, for an annual fee of \$24,325.28. This fee shall be paid in equal quarterly installments to the Story County Sheriff's Office on July 1, October 1, January 1 and April 1.
- 3. The Sheriff of Story County and his deputies or duly designated representatives agree to receive in the Sheriff's Office or county jail, such telephone calls, teletype messages and radio messages as are directed to the Police Department and the Fire Department of the Cities of Huxley and Cambridge and transmit the same to the officers of the respective departments.

The Sheriff of Story County and his deputies or duly designated representatives agree to receive or dispatch telephone, radio and teletype messages on a 24 hour per day basis in the Sheriff's Office or county jail as are directed to the Huxley and Cambridge Wastewater Treatment Plant and transmit same to said department.

- The Sheriff's Office telephone number shall be included on the Automatic Dialing Alarm System for the Water Department and Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- 4. The Sheriff's Designee will provide the Huxley Police Department with copies of teletype messages of general and specific interest to all law enforcement officers and agencies in Story County.
- 5. The Sheriff's Designee will provide a printed daily report to the Huxley Police Chief or the Chief's Designee of all phone calls received in the Dispatch Center and other such calls for service and activities that are entered into the Computer Aided Dispatch System for the Huxley Police Department.
- 6. The Sheriff agrees to provide and allow the Huxley Police Chief's Designee computer terminal access to the records contained in the Computer Aided Dispatch System that pertain to the activities of the Huxley Police Department and its officers.
- 7. The Story County Sheriff shall keep in the Story County Jail, under his control and supervision, any and all prisoners who have been committed to its care by the Chief of Police of the City of Huxley or his duly authorized agents or police officers, for violation of the city ordinances of Huxley and Cambridge, Iowa, at no additional charge.
- 8. The Sheriff and his deputies or duly designated representatives shall take fingerprints and forward same of all persons arrested and brought into custody at the Story County Jail by members of the Huxley Police Department to the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation and the Federal Bureau of Investigation as required by State and Federal law.
- 9. The Sheriff agrees to allow the Huxley Police Chief or the Chief's Designee access to the criminal history and jail record files of all prisoners brought into custody at the Story County Jail by members of the Huxley Police Department.
- 10. The City of Huxley agrees to pay all medical and doctor expenses for injuries to or sickness of their prisoners held on City of Huxley and City of Cambridge ordinance violations and all other extraordinary expenses related to those prisoners which may occur and which are not due to the negligence of Story County or its employees.
- 11. Story County will furnish and maintain the necessary radio equipment to provide the services named above (The City of Huxley will pay for their telephone service on the designated police department line installed in the Sheriff's telephone system.)
- 12. In accordance with Section 28E.7 of the Code of Iowa, this agreement shall not relieve any of the parties hereto of any obligation or responsibility imposed upon it or them by law, except that to the extent of actual and timely performance

- thereof by either of the contracting parties hereto, said performance may be offered in satisfaction of the obligation or responsibility.
- 13. No separate legal or administrative entity or organization shall be created by this agreement; no separate budget shall be established and no tangible property shall be acquired which would require disposition upon the termination of this agreement.
- 14. The duly elected Sheriff of Story County, Iowa, and the duly appointed City Administrator of Huxley, Iowa, shall be joint co-administrators of this agreement as provided by Section 28E.6(1) of the Code of Iowa.
- 15. As joint co-administrators the duly elected Sheriff of Story County, Iowa and the City Administrator, shall develop the necessary procedures to effectively administer this agreement including but not limited to addressing new situations not covered by this agreement and conflict resolution.
- 16. Story County shall file a copy of this agreement with the Secretary of State and the County Auditor of Story County, Iowa, and record a copy with the Story County Recorder pursuant to Section 28E.8 of the Code of Iowa. The city seal shall be affixed to the contract before returning to the county for filing.
- 17. This contract may be terminated by either party. Termination is effective at the end of the current quarterly billing cycle and must be preceded with a minimum 30 day written notice to either party. Notice shall be accomplished by certified mail or personal service.
- 18. Any amendments or addendums to this Agreement shall be created and passed in the same manner and with reference made to this original document.
- 19. The initial term of the Agreement shall be automatically extended for successive one-year periods upon the same terms and conditions provided by this Agreement for the initial term, unless this Agreement is terminated or modified by the express election of either City or County as hereinafter provided. Modification to this Agreement may be made by mutual consent of both parties.


