# Adult Drug Court

## **Eligibility Requirements**

**Voluntary**—Participants must consent to participate in JCADC as part of their probation/parole

**Criminal History**—Non-violent offenses, felony drug offenses or offenses where alcohol and/or drugs are known to be an underlying factor

**Risk**—Utilizing the COMPAS assessment tool, JCADC will assess prognostic risk and criminogenic needs to determine appropriateness for program admission

**Diagnosed** with a substance use disorder

**Residence**—Must be a resident of Juneau County

**Age**—18 years or older



## **Treatment Court Team**

The JCADC Program is made up of professionals from multiple disciplines. The individuals collaborate in a team setting to manage eligible participants.
