

POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEES OF THE JUNEAU COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

General Provisions for Committees of the County Board (Including Statutory Boards or Commissions)

1. **General:** The powers of the County are exercised by the County Board of Supervisors, as a body politic, through the adoption of ordinances, resolutions, or motions. When it will serve the best interests of the County, the County Board may delegate authority over the conduct of specific items of Business through a committee.

The term "committee" as used herein includes elected committees, statutory committees, standing committees, and boards and commissions.

The County Board may, by resolution, establish the purpose, duties and manner of reporting of the Committees.

- 2. **Appointment:** unless otherwise provided, members of Committees shall be appointed by the County Board Chairperson.
- 3. **Minutes:** Each Committee shall prepare and keep minutes of the proceedings of its meetings, and shall provide the County Clerk with a copy of same.
- 4. **Notice of meetings:** All notices of meetings shall be placed on an information board in the Courthouse at least 24 hours prior thereto. Such notice shall set forth the subject matter of said meeting as required by Sec.19.84 and 19.85 Wisconsin Statutes.

An information copy of the meeting notice shall be mailed to the official newspaper of the Juneau County Board, and to all other media outlets requesting such copies, by the sponsoring committee.

The County Board by ordinance may establish a separate procedure for convening the County Board in a "declared emergency" as defined by county ordinance.

- 5. Schedule: All committees shall meet regularly.
- 6. **Duties and Responsibilities:** The duties and responsibilities of committees shall be as established by the County Board, is-so-far as they are delegable and do not conflict with the laws of the State of Wisconsin.
 - a. All committees of the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall have the authority to acquire and hold, lease or rent real and personal property for public uses or purposes of any nature, within the limits and purposes of their respective department budgets.

All purchases made by a committee on behalf of its respective department shall be made by said committee and upon the signature of its Chairperson.

- b. All committees of the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall have the authority to terminate, replace, or discontinue personnel in accordance with the Personnel Policy of Juneau County, and in accordance with the guidelines set forth by the Equal Rights Division of the Wisconsin Department of Industry, Labor & Human Relations.
- c. All committees of the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall refer all civil or criminal actions, to which the County is a party, to the Corporation Counsel or to the District Attorney.

- d. Questions regarding policy or the powers or duties of any committee of the County Board shall be brought before the County Board for resolutions.
- 7. **Review Responsibility:** committees shall evaluate programs under their jurisdiction to determine program definition, goals and objectives, costs, efficiency and effectiveness.

Committees shall recommend an annual budget for each department under their jurisdiction to the Finance Committee and the County Board.

8. **Open Meetings.** All committees shall comply with the provisions of the Wisconsin Open Meetings Law. Notices of meetings, including agendas, and minutes of committee meetings shall be timely provided to the county clerk, who shall keep the county's online website as up-to-date as possible.

ELECTED COMMITTEES

Highway and Public Works Committee.

The highway and public works committee shall consist of five county board members who shall be elected at the annual meeting of the county board for a term of two years to represent the county as follows:

One county board member to represent the northern region;

One county board member to represent the east central region;

One county board member to represent the west central region;

Two county board members elected at large.

The powers and duties of the highway and public works committee shall be to function pursuant to the provisions of Wis. Stats. § 83.015, and to report to the county board on matters pertinent to the highway department and the landfill.

STANDING AND STATUTORY COMMITTEES

Standing committees are considered to be committees of the County Board to which subjects brought before the County Board are referred to for review, study, recommendation or action.

Statutory Committees may be defined as those which are specified in state law IF the County provides a particular service or when a statute mandates a particular committee to be established.

General duties of committees, boards, and commissions are as follows:

- a. Review and recommend the annual budget for county departments
- b. Review of department financial reports for each of the county departments within the committee's oversight
- c. Direct and guide policy and accountability of the departments within the committee's oversight
- d. Approve departmental policies
- e. Review and recommend staffing levels and hours
- f. Review and recommend grant applications and acceptances
- g. Approve departmental fee schedules which are not governed by other law
- h. review and recommend departmental short and long range goals
- i. Approve and bring forth intergovernmental agreements and contracts as necessary or as otherwise authorized by law
- j. Approve and bring forth resolutions and ordinances for action by the county board

k. Allow any member of the county board to review any county financial record upon request, subject to HIPPA or other confidentiality rules

1. Agriculture, Extension Education & Land Conservation Committee

A committee on Agriculture & Extension Education is authorized to be created by Sec. 59.56 (3) Wisconsin Statutes; a Land Conservation Committee is mandated by Sec. 59.70 (19)(20) and 92.06, Wisconsin Statutes.

This joint Committee shall consist of four county board members.

The duties of this committee shall be to:

- (1) Function in accordance with Sec. 59.56 (3) Wisconsin Statutes in all matters relating to the personnel, duties and activities of the Agriculture & Extension Education Department.
- (2) Serve as members of the Land Conservation Committee and function in accordance with provisions of Chapter 92 Wisconsin Statutes.
- (3) Serve as committee of jurisdiction in matters relating to the Farmland Preservation Law, Chapter 91, Wisconsin Statutes.

2. Audit and Claims Committee

This committee shall consist of three county board members.

The duties of the audit and claims committee shall be to:

- (1) Meet at least once a month.
- (2) Audit and recommend in writing the allowance or disallowance of all claims filed against the county in accordance with Wis. Stats. § 59.52(12) before any action shall be taken on said claim by the county board of supervisors, except when unanimous consent of the county board is secured for the allowance or disallowance of a claim filed against the county without referring same to the audit committee.
- (3) Review county financial reports, especially those not already reviewed by any other standing committee.

3. Personnel and Insurance Committee

This committee shall consist of four county board members.

- (a) The duties of the personnel and insurance committee in regard to personnel shall be to:
- (1) Recommend to the county board of supervisors the salaries and other compensation to be paid to all county officers and employees.
- (2) Confer with the various committees, offices and departments upon the creation of new positions as well as classification and salary thereof.
- (3) Review requests for position reclassification and make recommendations to the county board for the acceptance, rejection or modification of same.
- (4) Consider and make recommendations to the county board regarding organization of departments, reorganization and staffing levels.
 - (5) Hear grievances when authorized by union contracts or by the county personnel policy.
- (6) Establish an employment policy, which conforms to state and federal laws, and provide for the screening, testing and selection of qualified personnel for employment by the county.
 - (7) Develop a code of ethics as may be deemed necessary by the county board of supervisors.
- (b) The duties of this committee in regards to insurance shall be to:
- (1) Determine the amount of bonds to be furnished by the various officers to the county, and report on the sufficiency of each bond to the county board.

- (2) Supervise the placing of all types of insurance upon all county buildings and properties required for the protection of the county, with the approval of the county board supervisors.
- (3) Review annually all bonds, liability and all other types of insurance carried by the county and make recommendations to the county board as is deemed necessary.
 - (4) Administer a countywide safety program in accordance with prescribed health and safety standards.
 - (5) Monitor the property inventory of the county for insurance purposes.
 - (6) Review all liability claims against the county.

4. Building Committee

The building committee shall consist of three county board members.

The duties of the building committee shall be to:

- (1) Inspect, from time to time, all county buildings, except those under the jurisdiction of another committee, and to ensure the proper repairs and maintenance of such buildings
 - (2) Coordinate the re-allocation of office spacing in county buildings.
- (3) Receive bids, where necessary, or otherwise let contracts on time and materials, using its best judgment, for the proper maintenance and repair of county buildings. All contracts, bids and specifications shall be let in accordance with Wis. Stats. §§ 59.52(29) and 66.0901, where applicable, and when approved by the county board. The original copy of each contract shall be filed in the county clerk's office.
 - (4) Supervise the maintenance staff of buildings not under the jurisdiction of any other committee.

5. Emergency Management Committee

An emergency management committee is mandated by Wis. Stats. § 323.14(1)(a)3. The emergency management committee shall consist of three county board members.

The duties of this committee shall be to:

- (1) Ensure the coordination of efforts with the state office of emergency government and county and local emergency government officials.
- (2) Make recommendations to the county board of supervisors relative to the county's responsibilities in regard to emergency government in accordance with Wis. Stats. ch. 323, with the assistance of the emergency government director.

6. Executive Committee

This executive committee shall consist of the elected chairperson and two vice-chairpersons of the county board.

The duties of this committee shall be to:

- (1) Prepare the agenda for each county board meeting.
- (2) Consider and evaluate resolutions to be taken up at the county board meeting.
- (3) Consider and resolve all special problems that may arise between sessions of the county board that do not fall in the province of a regular committee; or to act when the county board has not taken action to appoint a special committee; or to take action on matters of an emergency nature between sessions of the county board.
- (4) Act as the oversight committee for all the elected officials of the county and the corporation counsel.

7. Finance and Computer Committee

This committee shall consist of three county board members.

The power vested in the county board in Wis. Stats. § 65.90 with regard to budgetary policy is delegated in part to this committee, whose duties shall be to:

- (1) Prepare an annual budget for the county, submit same to the county board for its consideration and arrange for its publication and notice of hearing.
- (2) Transfer funds between budgeted items of a county department, if such budgeted items have been separately appropriated, up to \$15,000.00.
- (3) Supplement the appropriations for a particular office, department or activity by transfers from the contingent fund. Such committee transfers shall not exceed the amount set up in the contingent fund as adopted in the annual budget, nor aggregate in the case of an individual office, department or activity in excess of \$15,000.00 of the funds originally provided for such office, department or activity.
- (4) Review and make recommendations to the county board for appropriation to a current year budget for a purpose that was not anticipated in the budget. A vote of two thirds of the county board is required to approve such an appropriation.
- (5) Examine the financial condition of the county on a timely basis and advise departments, and the county board thereof.
- (6) Monitor the investment of the county's funds with the county treasurer, and recommend to the county board such investment procedures and use of depositories as will be most beneficial to the county.
- (7) Select and negotiate a contract for the annual audit of the accounts of county with a recognized independent audit firm, and recommend same to the county board of supervisors.
- (8) Meet with the independent auditor after completion of each annual audit and arrange for the auditor to review the findings of his audit with the county board of supervisors upon request of any county board member.
- (9) Set policy and ensure proper administration and application of computer services in the various departments of the county government.

8. Board of Health

The board of health shall consist of three county board members and three non-members, of which two shall be from the medical profession.

The duties of this board of health shall be to generally supervise the programs of the county health department to ensure compliance with Wis. Stats. chs. 251, 252, 253, 254 and 255 as they apply to the county health department.

9. Industrial & Recreation Committee

This committee shall consist of three county board members.

The duties of the industrial and recreation committee shall be to:

- (1) Cooperate with the industrial development corporations within the county.
- (2) Recommend programs to the county board for the improvement and development of recreational sites for the good of the county.
- (3) Perform the duties stated in Wis. Stats. §§ 59.56, 59.57 and 59.71.

10. Land, Forestry, Parks & Zoning Committee

This committee shall consist of five county board members.

The duties of the land, forestry, parks and zoning committee shall be to:

- (1) Ensure the proper management of all county forest lands, including special use lands, as provided in Wis. Stats. § 28.11, the county forestry ordinance, and the comprehensive ten-year forest management plan.
- (2) Work with the area forester to develop acceptable forestry practices, multiple use projects and outdoor recreational developments.
- (3) Cooperate with the department of natural resources on the conservation aid program and other conservation matters.
- (4) Provide for the appraisal, advertising, sale and closure of sales of all county lands as provided in Wis. Stats. §§ 59.52(6) and 75.35(2).
- (5) Supervise the construction, improvement and maintenance of all county-owned parks and exercise jurisdiction over park personnel, policies and schedules.
- (6) Coordinate matters of importance with the county surveyor.
- (7) Recommend to the county board the enactment, amendment or repeal of such ordinances as in its opinion are in the best interests of the people of the county in all matters pertaining to zoning.
- (8) Carry out comprehensive plans; perform such additional duties and have such additional authority as the county board of supervisors may confer upon them.
- (9) Ensure compliance with Wis. Stats. ch. 59, subch. VII.
- (10) Receive applications for and recommend appointments of the zoning administrator.
- (11) To act as called for under §§ 6-75, 6-77(b), and 6-97 of the Juneau County Code of Ordiances.

11. Sheriff and Jail Committee

This committee shall consist of three county board members.

The duties of the sheriff and jail committee shall be to:

- (1) Ensure proper supervision of the sheriff's office and make such recommendations to the sheriff and to the county board, as they shall from time to time deem advisable and in the best interests of the county.
- (2) Recommend to the county board the number of deputy sheriffs that should be maintained in the county.
- (3) Review the operation of and establish internal operating policies for the proper administration of the sheriff's department and the jail.
- (4) Review all requests for equipment, services, salaries, wages or other compensations applying to the sheriff's department, the sheriff, the deputies, the undersheriff, and the jail, and approve/disapprove, or make recommendations to the county board on same.
- (5) Regulate and monitor the enforcement of Wis. Stats. ch. 174 pertaining to stray dogs in the county.
- (6) Coordinate the installation, maintenance and operation of the emergency 911 telephone system and tower communication system in accordance with Wis. Stats. §§ 59.54(9) and 256.35 and a rural numbering system in accordance with Wis. Stats. § 59.54(4).

12. Veterans Committee

The veterans committee shall consist of three county board members appointed by the county board chairperson.

The duties of the veterans committee shall be to:

- (1) Ensure proper administration of the veteran's service office in accordance with Wis. Stats. § 45.001 et seq.
- (2) Receive applications for, and recommend appointment of the veteran's service officer to the county board.

13. Local Emergency Planning Committee

The local emergency planning committee is mandated by Wis. Stats. § 59.54(8). The membership shall consist of two county board members and two non-members.

The powers and duties of the local emergency planning committee shall be as outlined in Wis. Stats. § 59.54(8).

14. Committee on Aging and Disability

This committee shall consist of three county board members plus up to 12 additional non-members who serve in an advisory capacity.

The governing board of the county office of the Aging and Disability Resource Center of Southwest Wisconsin shall be known as the committee on aging and disability, and it shall consist of ten persons, three of whom are county board members, also known separately as the aging and disability resource center (ADRC) advisory council. The committee on aging and disability shall enact bylaws consistent with the statutes and regulations applicable to the family care program administered by the state department of health services.

- (a) The members of the committee on aging and disability shall be appointed by the county board at its annual organizational meeting or at time of vacancy for a term ending the following calendar year. At least 51 percent of the committee shall be persons age 60 years or over and shall be non-elected officials. The committee members shall represent all income levels and minority backgrounds of the older adult population in the county, including at least one public member representing the elderly, at least one public member representing disabled individuals, and at least one public member representing individuals with mental illness.
- (b) The ADRC board's public members shall serve three-year staggered terms. No member may serve more than two consecutive terms.

In addition to its other duties, including duties as prescribed in Wis. Stats § 46.82, the committee on aging and disability shall:

- (1) Develop and implement an annual, comprehensive, coordinated county aging plan for programs for older people.
- (2) Give policy direction to staff for the county aging unit to carry out activities consistent with the purpose of this section.
- (3) Review and approve proposals relating to matters affecting older people that are considered by the county board.
- (4) Identify and encourage the development of opportunities which enable older people to fully contribute to the welfare of the community.
 - (5) Nominate persons to serve on the ADRC advisory council.

The **Nutrition Project Council** serves under the Committee on Aging and Disability. The Council is comprised of the same three members of the county board serving on the Committee on Aging and Disability plus up to 9 additional non-members serving in an advisory capacity.

The duties of the council shall be to:

- (1) Ensure proper management of the county nutrition sites.
- (2) Coordinate activities with the District 1 Area Agency on Aging, Age Advantage, Madison, Wisconsin.
- (3) Ensure the proper administration of all programs under title III of the Older Americans Act.
- (4) Make timely reports and recommendations to the county board of supervisors on matters of interest to senior citizens of the county.

No supervisor may serve more than three terms on the council.

15. Affirmative Action

The Affirmative Action Officer for Juneau County shall be a county board member whose duties shall be to assure the proper administration of the Juneau County Affirmative Action Plan.

16. Safety Committee

This committee shall consist of two county board members.

The duties of this committee shall be to review and administer all requirements and programs relating to the safety and health of Juneau County employees in the workplace.

17. Negotiating Committee

This committee shall consist of five county board members.

The duties of this committee shall be to:

- (1) Prepare labor agreement proposals and negotiate same with the represented labor organizations.
- (2) Act as the committee to hear grievances when same is required by a specific labor agreement, or the personnel policy.

18. Land Information Council

The land information council shall consist of three county board members and relevant county department heads.

The duties of the land information council shall be to:

- (1) Establish a land information office for the county to develop, implement and maintain a countywide plan for land records modernization.
- (2) Make periodic reports to the county board of supervisors on the progress of this program.

19. Peace and Good Order Committee

This committee shall consist of three county board members.

The duties of this committee shall be to:

- (1) Oversee the implementation of the county junkyard ordinance.
- (2) Oversee implementation and administration of the county's adult entertainment ordinance.
- (3) Consider issues where ordinances should be revised, created or eliminated to address changing needs and circumstances in the county.
 - (4) Review the provisions of this Code and recommend updates and revisions to the Code as warranted.

BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Community Action

This community action committee shall consist of one county board member.

The duties of this committee shall be to attend meetings of the Central Wisconsin Community Action Council and make timely reports to the county board about the various federal programs of interest to the people of the county.

Drainage Board

This drainage board shall consist of five persons appointed by the circuit court judge of the county.

The duties of the drainage board shall consist of the responsibilities outlined in Wis. Stats. ch. 88.

Housing Authority

The county housing authority shall consist of five members. At least one member shall be a county board member, and three members shall not be members of the county board to be appointed for a term of five years.

The duties and responsibilities of the housing authority shall be as outlined in Wis. Stats. §§ 59.53(22) and 66.1201 through 66.1211.

Juneau County Human Services Board

The county human services board shall be and hereby is established in accordance with Wis. Stats. § 46.23(4).

The human services board shall consist of seven members. Four of the members shall be county board members and three of the members shall be non-members of the county board appointed for a term of three years.

The human services board, created by the county board of supervisors pursuant to authority contained in Wis. Stats. § 46.23(4), shall have the following powers and duties:

- (1) Delivery of human services in accordance with Wis. Stats. § 46.23(3).
- (2) Perform the services required by Wis. Stats. chs. 46, 48, 49 and 51.
- (3) Prepare and submit an annual budget to the county board of supervisors in support of the human services department, and the human services board.
 - (4) Appoint advisory committees to recommend policy to the human services board.

Winding Rivers Library Board

This board shall be comprised of representatives of the several counties in the Winding Rivers Library delivery system, of which two members shall be appointed by the county board chairperson to represent Juneau County; one being a county board member, and one being a non-member.

The duties of these representatives shall be to represent the county on the Winding Rivers Library System Board, and to periodically report to the Juneau County Board of Supervisors.

Traffic Safety Commission

The establishment of a traffic safety commission is mandated by Wis. Stats. § 83.013.

The traffic safety commission shall be composed of the county highway commissioner or a designated representative; the chief county law enforcement officer or a designated representative; the county highway safety coordinator and a representative designated by the county board from each of the disciplines of education, medicine and law, and three representatives involved in law enforcement, highways and highway safety designated by the secretary of transportation.

Zoning Board of Adjustment

The zoning board of adjustment is created in the Shoreland-Wetlands Zoning Ordinance. See Appendix A, § 14.5, of the Juneau County Code of Ordinances.

This board shall consist of five persons who are not members of the county board, to be appointed by the chairperson of the county board.

Veterans Service Commission

The veteran's service commission shall consist of at least three residents of the county who are veterans, who may or may not be members of the county board, and are appointed for staggered 3-year terms by the county board chairperson.

The duties of the veteran's service commission shall be as prescribed in Wis. Stats. ch. 45.

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has been ordered by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to eliminate the program by January 31, 2021, and

WHEREAS, the State has developed a program called CDBG-CLOSE to allow municipalities to close out these funds and apply for a CDBG grant in the amount of the cash on hand and loan balances with no matching fund requirements, and

WHEREAS, the amount of the grant allowed is the cash on hand in the RLF-ED fund, along with the amount of loans receivable, if the municipality chooses to buy them out, and

WHEREAS, the program has two options for dealing with the outstanding RLF-ED loans to local businesses. Option one is to turn over the loans to the state, with the municipality responsible for collection of payments, remittance of payments to the State and any collection costs involved in collection of delinquent loans. Option two is for the municipality to buy out the loans and remit the outstanding loan balance to the state, along with the cash on hand, and increase the amount of the grant by the loan receivable balance. The municipality then maintains the control over the loans receivable and keeps the payments remitted to them, and

WHEREAS, the Finance and Computer Committee with input from the RLF Committee, determined that it is in the County's best interest to choose option two and to buy out the loans and get the additional funding for the CDBG grant, and

WHEREAS, the County's current loan receivable balance is approximately \$600,000, the exact amount will be determined as the final report is filed;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does approve the aforesaid buyout of the RLF loans receivable as of the date of the submission of the CDBG Grant paperwork.



JUNEAU COUNTY LAND, FORESTRY & PARKS 2021 WORK PLAN

The following is the proposed 2021 Juneau County Forest Work Plan. The plan is a requirement of the County Forest Administrator Grant Program implemented by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The plan supplements the County Forest 15-year Comprehensive Land Use Plan and focuses on the present needs of the County Forest and Recreation Program for the current year.

OUR MISSION:

The public resources contributing to the Juneau County Forest and Park system provide a major component for addressing the ecological and socioeconomic needs of the community. The mission of the Juneau County Land, Forestry and Parks Department is to manage, conserve and protect this natural resource base on a sustainable basis for present and future generations. The Department strives to provide quality recreational opportunities for the public while balancing broader State and National concerns for wildlife, endangered resources, water quality, soil conservation, and cultural heritage preservation.

2020 GOALS

Establish timber sales to meet our allowable cut acres and management objectives

The Juneau County Land, Forestry and Parks Department will implement forestry practices that promote sustainability and multiple use of the forest. Timber sales on County lands are the main source of revenue for the County's Forest and Parks Program and also contribute towards reducing the tax levy. Harvesting timber is also very important for maintaining the health and vigor of the forest resources under County ownership. Protecting the local ecological integrity in the area of a timber sale is carefully considered before and during sale establishment.

The overarching desired future condition for the Juneau County Forest is to plan for and maintain the current distribution of cover types and age classes. Productive pine plantations will be rotated and replanted back to valuable timber species that are native and have historically done well. The Department also anticipates that overtime some change in specie distribution will occur naturally due to forest succession or changes in environmental conditions. When encountering a disease or pest infestation, consideration will be given to seed areas to jack pine after harvest to promote a species that benefits wildlife and has seen decline in Juneau County. Below the past, present and projected future conditions by acre of the Juneau County Forest timber types are presented in report # 207.



Another major consideration for us in planning forest management on the Juneau County Forest is the rotation age of red pine plantations. There are approximately 3,957 acres of red pine standing on the forest with 20% over 70 years old and another 25% of the acres between 50-70 years old.

Based on our own observation and discussions with colleagues, we suspect overall volume growth in our 75+ year old red pine plantations have slowed, leveled off or even gone into decline. To capture the value of our timber before losing volume we are implementing a plan to rotate the older stands and then replant those harvested sites. Report 103 below shows the age distribution of red pine planted on the Juneau County Forest. Pine plantations planted in the 1940s are nearing rotation age.



When looking at which County Forest stands may need management in the near future we consider timber type, age, species longevity, stand density and forest health. A tool developed by the WI DNR to assist foresters pinpoint eligible stands based on forest reconnaissance data is the Wisconsin Forestry Inventory and Reporting System or WisFIRS. The WisFIRS forest inventory system was used establish a 2021 harvest schedule by filtering out stands across the county forest that are nearing the age that will trigger a management action or timber harvest. The next step is to evaluate the forest stands scheduled in the 2021 harvest schedule to verify the results on the ground. After the harvest schedule is confirmed and any other forest management needs are considered, we establish timber sales to meet the harvest schedule and management objectives recommended by the inventory system. Below is a list of forest stands evaluated for harvest in 2021.

Nine timber sales will be established from the harvest and thinning treatments for a total of 418 acres. County and DNR Forestry staff will prepare all timber sales for a competitive bid opening to occur during the Land, Forestry and Parks Committee March meeting.

Monitor harvest activity to ensure timber sales are following contracts, avoiding damage and are paid for in accordance to our policies

Timber sale administration and contract compliance is primarily the responsibility of the Juneau County Forestry staff, with help from DNR Foresters when needed. The Forestry Department will actively seek to ensure compliance with the cutting prescriptions developed for each timber sale when harvest activity is occurring to reduced mistakes and avoid excessive damage.

Juneau County receives 534 hours of forestry assistance from our DNR Liaison Forester and local Forestry Technicians each fiscal year. Currently over 362 hours (67%) of forestry assistance has already been provided in fiscal year 2020-2021. This has mainly been in the area of timber sale establishment, marking, cruising and jack pine seeding. Approximately 172 hours remain to be completed before June 30th, 2021. The remaining hours of technical assistance will be dedicated to preparing timber sale cutting notices, updating field reconnaissance and karner blue butterfly surveys.

To regenerate harvested areas back to fully stocked stands when needed

Reforestation is an important management activity that helps to assure that desirable timber species return to areas that have been harvested. In the fall of 2020 DNR Forestry/Fire Technician Scott Wilhorn and colleagues seeded approximately 25 acres of County Forest to jack pine after it was harvested. Equipment and operators to complete the seeding project were donated by the WI DNR. Additional jack pine seeding in 2021 is probable and will depend on sites being harvested before the fall.

During the spring 2021 planting season we aim to replant two sites in Armenia; a 70 acre red pine plantation on 4th Street, and a second 55 acre site on 8th Street. Together this effort will see approximately 138,000 tree seedlings planted. The Juneau County Forestry Department applied for and will receive a Sustainable Forestry Grant of \$8,150 dollars to assist funding the second 55 acre planting site.

Update the Juneau County 15-year County Forest Land Use Plan

During the course of 2020 the Department began to update the current County Forest Comprehensive Land Use Plan (2006-2020) for the next 15-year period (2021-2035). The Plan is the official County Forest authority and provides policy guidance for management, recreation and protection. Currently more than half of the Chapters have been updated and have been posted on the Juneau County Forestry Department website. The remaining chapters will be reviewed and updated over the first quarter of 2021. Once the chapters are complete they will be available for public comment and review by the Land, Forestry, Parks and Zoning Committee. Once approved by Committee the County Board will be ask to approve the Plan before submitting the document to the WI DNR.

To provide for protection of the Juneau County Forest Lands and uphold forest certification standards

In 2021 we will focus on the spread of invasive species on the Juneau County Forest and work to map their locations and concentrations. The more pressing concerns currently are with the spread of Buckthorn on County Forest Land in Necedah and Cutler Township, as well as Black Locust and Spotted Knapweed around the Wilderness Park grounds and surrounding County lands. During the new year we plan to work with our County Forest Liaison and WI DNR partners to develop strategies that will help control and reduce these invasive species before becoming well established.

During the summer of 2020 the Juneau County Forest was audited by the Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI) and Forest Stewardship Council (FSC), two of the most widely recognized forest certification systems in North America. The Forestry Department organized a tour of ten different sites across the Juneau County Forest demonstrating different timber harvest, recreation and reforestation projects. The results for Juneau County and 3 other counties involved in the audit was a 2nd consecutive clean sheet for the Wisconsin County Forest Association. There were no negative

tindings or mandatory corrections reported between the two SFI and FSC auditors. The value of forest certification means that these forests conform to strict environmental, social and economic standards.

To ensure that the County Forest Roads are maintained in a safe and useable condition

Juneau County has two permanent primary forest roads, 3.25 miles in Armenia and 2.34 miles in Cutler and Necedah Township. In total, the 5.59 miles of County Forest road qualify for the County Forest Road Aids Program and receive funding to maintain the road surface in an open and safe condition for the public. These roads often serve a variety of uses including forest management, fire protection and recreation. During 2021 we plan to inspect each road in the spring and fall, perform any grading or maintenance needed and mow back the road shoulders before the deer hunting season.

To oversee the Juneau County's Snowmobile trail system and work closely with the Juneau County Snowmobile Council to provide safe snowmobile riding opportunities

The Juneau County Snowmobile Council helps maintain 247 miles of snowmobile trail in the county. The partnership between the council and Juneau County Land, Forestry and Parks Department will continue to work towards improving the trail system for safety and enjoyment.

In 2020, we applied and received funding for the snowmobile trail maintenance grant totaling \$74,220.00 dollars. This grant will fund trail clearing, grooming, signing and minor bridge repairs throughout the 2020 - 2021 winter snowmobiling season.

Additionally, through snowmobile grants awarded in a previous year the Department recently was able to repair the Yellow River snowmobile bridge and approach ensuring continued use of the bridge and Finley trails this season and into the future.

To ensure that Juneau County's park and trail facilities are maintained in a safe, clean, and useable condition

Each year the Juneau County parks and trails provide tremendous opportunities for recreational pursuits and benefits to the local economy. The Department staff will continue to maintain these facilities, and improve on safety and public enjoyment. Among our many park goals will be to work on fixing the heavily travel park roads at Castle Rock and Wilderness. Many reoccurring potholes have begun to plague both park entrances and most heavily traveled roadways. Coordination and help from the Highway Department will hopefully address this concern and lead to a plan to repave park roads in the near future.

At Kennedy Park we look to install a new vault pit toilet near the pavilion, a project that has been on hold. This will be the first major improvement to the park in decades. Another goal for Kennedy Park will be to develop a winter parking area for the public. The need for a nearby winter space to snowshoe, hike and dog walk has been growing and a space for winter parking is not currently available at Kennedy. This improvement would see more people take advantage of the park in the off season.

Developing a canoe/kayak access on the Yellow River has been discussed but not put into development of yet. County Forest land in Finley that runs to the Yellow River will be assessed for a possible access point in hopes of connecting to the river corridor.

In 2021 there is also a need to continue work in the area of maintaining and improving our current park facilities. Examples of this include replacing old fire rings, replacing boards on picnic tables, painting and repairing signs throughout the campgrounds and parks. These tasks are ongoing and will see more of a focus this year to refurbish and repair infrastructure that has aged.

WHEREAS, the Personnel & Insurance Committee has determined that the Personnel Policy should be updated in the following areas; and

WHEREAS, the following proposed changes to Sections 3.1 and 5.1b(E) were suggested by the Public Works Director with approval from the Highway Committee; and

WHEREAS, Section 6.2 and 6.3 were also reviewed, and it was determined that the following proposed updates would better serve Juneau County to work closer with Department Heads in staffing; and

WHEREAS, the recommended changes to be made are as follows:

•The last paragraph in Section 3.1 shall be amended to read as follows:

"Highway Department: In the filling of vacant positions, the most qualified based on experience, education, licensure, or other standards related to the needs of the vacant position will be awarded the position. A testing procedure will be implemented, and there shall be a probation period of 160 120 working hours for Equipment Operators and Mechanics, and 40 working hours for Patrolmen."

•Section 5.1b shall be amended to correct for the mislabeling of subparagraphs D, E, and F, which should be labeled subparagraphs C, D, and E, and the new subparagraph D shall be amended to read as follows:

"Call-In: Whenever a section employee is needed outside of regular working hours, the patrolman for incidents in his/her assigned section shall be called first, followed by the next closest section patrolman to the incident, followed by the most logistical available employee. Whenever an operator is needed, the operator classified, assigned or appointed to the machine needed shall be called first, followed by the next closest qualified operator. Employees called will be based on response time to incident and availability not seniority. Employees called in will be paid a minimum of two (2) hours call in pay for hours that are not connected to the regular work hours."

- •The second-to-last sentence in the fourth paragraph of Section 6.2 shall be changed to read as follows:
- "A general review of the classification plan will be conducted annually as is found necessary by the Human Resource Director and/or Personnel Committee."

•The heading of Section 6.3 shall be amended to read as follows: "RECLASSIFICATION/REORGANIZATION", and the first three paragraphs of that section shall be amended to read as follows:

"If the duties and responsibilities of a position significantly increase or decrease to the extent that they substantially exceed or are less than the normal requirements for the present grade, a reclassification may be in order. An employee may request his/her position be reclassified Department Heads shall periodically review job descriptions in their department to determine if a reorganization or a reclassification is needed. Forms for reclassification are available in the Personnel Office. Information with regard to the The explanatory forms and a new job description including changes should be completed and approved by the appropriate Committee and Department Head and submitted to the Personnel Committee by May-July 1st.

"The Personnel Committee will review and analyze the duties, responsibilities, and consider the recommendations from the Department Head and appropriate Committee and decide by September August 1st. If the position/unit warrants reclassification/reorganization, the new recommended grade and reclassification then would be indicated separately in their proposed budget and if approved will be effective the following January 1st (if approved by the County Board).

"Employees who are reclassified by county board resolution shall first receive the across the board wage increase or decrease, if any, and then be placed in the lowest step in the new grade at the rate that gives them an increase or decrease over that adjusted wage unless a step in the grade has previously been determined and approved."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does approve, authorize, and adopt the above-indicated amended provisions of Sections 3.1, 5.1b(E), 6.2, and 6.3 of the Juneau County Personnel Policy.



SYNOPSIS: Supporting Efforts of Four State-wide Organizations to Introduce Clean Water Legislation this Term

WHEREAS, four long-established and well-respected statewide groups (WI Land+Water Conservation Association, Clean Wisconsin, the Dairy Business Association, and The Nature Conservancy) have joined forces to implore legislative action outlined below; and

WHEREAS, conservatively, 10% of rural wells and some municipal wells in Wisconsin are polluted with nitrates; and

WHEREAS, excess nitrates in groundwater and phosphorus in surface water have led to algae blooms on inland lakes and streams which may have the effect to reduce tourism and recreational pursuits; and

WHEREAS, excess nitrates produce threats to human health that are well-documented; and

WHEREAS, specific actions need to be instituted such as managing unintended agricultural runoff, supporting farms that meet water quality standards, only permitting those agri-businesses that do, helping farmers to grow foods with fewer negative environmental impacts, encouraging innovative farming practices, and recognizing that on sensitive soils farming practices will have to change more dramatically in order to protect our water resources; and

WHEREAS, remediation of polluted waterways and groundwater will take years to accomplish; and

WHEREAS, growers like the WPVGA in Central Wisconsin realize the magnitude of the problem, are conducting research, and are encouraging farmer-led initiatives directed toward "best practices" independent of legislative action; and

WHEREAS, recommendations of the Speakers Task Force on Water Quality have, as yet, not been implemented;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does declare that it is time for the state legislature to codify specific, needed, water-protection measures outlined by the statement from the four organizations listed above, and to put timelines into effect; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution shall be sent to all other Wisconsin counties, to state lawmakers in the Senate & Assembly, to Gov. Evers, to the Wisconsin Counties Association, and to the Wisconsin Towns Association.



ORDINANCE No. 21 - 02

DATE: April 20, 2021

INTRODUCED BY: Executive Committee and Sheriff & Jail Committee

SYNOPSIS: An Ordinance Adopting and Enacting Section 20-35 of the Juneau County Code of Ordinances Regarding Underage Drinking

WHEREAS, the Juneau County Sheriff's Department and other law enforcement agencies in Juneau County currently do not have the option of charging offenses related to underage drinking as ordinance violations instead of state crimes under Wis. Stats. § 125,07 (2019); and,

WHEREAS, Juneau County Sheriff Brent Olson and the Juneau County Sheriff & Jail Committee believe it to be in the best interests of law enforcement in Juneau County and the citizens of Juneau County to have the option of charging underage drinking offenses as ordinance violations instead of criminal offenses, depending upon the facts of each case; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed new ordinance, to become Section 20-35 of the Juneau County Code of Ordinances, is identical in basic form and content to the state statue regulating underage drinking, Wis. Stats. § 125.07; and,

WHEREAS, the Sheriff & Jail Committee and the Executive Committee recommend the adoption and enactment of the proposed Section 20-35 of the Ordinances to the full County Board of Supervisors;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does ordain that the Juneau County Code of Ordinances shall be and hereby is amended to create Section 20-35, as set forth in full on the addendum attached to this document, effective upon the date of its enactment.

Section 20-35. Underage and intoxicated persons; presence on licensed premises; possession; penalties.

- (1) Alcohol beverages; restrictions relating to underage persons.
 - (a) Restrictions.
 - 1. No person may procure for, sell, dispense or give away any alcohol beverages to any underage person not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or spouse who has attained the legal drinking age.
 - 2. No licensee or permittee may sell, vend, deal or traffic in alcohol beverages to or with any underage person not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or spouse who has attained the legal drinking age.
 - 3. No adult may knowingly permit or fail to take action to prevent the illegal consumption of alcohol beverages by an underage person on property, including any premises, owned and occupied by the adult or occupied by the adult and under the adult's control. This subdivision applies at a lodging establishment, as defined in s. 106.52 (1) (d), only if the adult has furnished payment or security for lodging. This subdivision does not apply to alcohol beverages used exclusively as part of a religious service.
 - 4. No adult may intentionally encourage or contribute to a violation of sub. (4) (a) or (b).
 - (b) Penalties.
 - 1. In this paragraph, "violation" means a violation of this subsection or of a local ordinance that strictly conforms to par. (a) if the violation results in an imposition of a forfeiture or a conviction. For purposes of determining previous violations under subd. 2., the 30-month period shall be measured from the dates of violations that resulted in an imposition of a forfeiture or a conviction. For the purpose of determining whether or not a previous violation has occurred, if more than one violation occurs at the same time all those violations shall be counted as one violation.
 - 2. A person who commits a violation may be:
 - a. Required to forfeit not more than \$500 if the person has not committed a previous violation within 30 months of the violation.
 - b. Fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned for not more than 30 days or both if the person has committed a previous violation within 30 months of the violation.

- c. Fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned for not more than 90 days or both if the person has committed 2 previous violations within 30 months of the violation.
- d. Fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisoned for not more than 9 months or both if the person has committed 3 or more previous violations within 30 months of the violation.
- 3. A court shall suspend any license or permit issued under this chapter to a person for:
- a. Not more than 3 days, if the court finds that the person committed a violation within 12 months after committing one previous violation;
- **b.** Not less than 3 days nor more than 10 days, if the court finds that the person committed a violation within 12 months after committing 2 other violations; or
- c. Not less than 15 days nor more than 30 days, if the court finds that the person committed the violation within 12 months after committing 3 other violations.
- 4. The court shall promptly mail notice of a suspension under this paragraph to the department and to the clerk of each municipality which has issued a license or permit to the person.
- 5. A person who holds a Class "A" license, a Class "B" license or permit, a "Class A" license or a "Class B" license or permit who commits a violation is subject to subd. 3. but is not subject to subd. 2. or s. 125.11.

6.

- a. Notwithstanding subd. 1., in this subdivision, "violation" means a violation of par. (a) or of a local ordinance that strictly conforms to par. (a).
- **b.** Subject to subd. 6. c., only one penalty may be imposed under this paragraph for each underage person who is provided alcohol beverages contrary to this section or a local ordinance in conformity with this section.
- c. If a violation occurs on licensed premises and the violation is detected by means of an undercover underage person employed by or assisting a law enforcement agency, only the individual responsible for providing the alcohol beverages to the underage person may be issued a citation for, or charged with, the violation.
- (2) Sales of alcohol beverages to intoxicated persons.
 - (a) Restrictions.

- 1. No person may procure for, sell, dispense or give away alcohol beverages to a person who is intoxicated.
- **2.** No licensee or permittee may sell, vend, deal or traffic in alcohol beverages to or with a person who is intoxicated.
- (b) Penalties. Any person who violates par. (a) shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 or imprisoned for not more than 60 days or both.
- (3) Presence in places of sale; penalty.
 - (a) Restrictions. An underage person not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or spouse who has attained the legal drinking age may not enter, knowingly attempt to enter or be on any premises for which a license or permit for the retail sale of alcohol beverages has been issued, for any purpose except the transaction of business pertaining to the licensed premises with or for the licensee or his or her employee. The business may not be amusement or the purchase, receiving or consumption of edibles or beverages or similar activities which normally constitute activities of a customer of the premises. This paragraph does not apply to:
 - 1. An underage person who is a resident, employee, lodger or boarder on the premises controlled by the proprietor, licensee or permittee of which the licensed premises consists or is a part.
 - 2. An underage person who enters or is on a Class "A" or "Class A" premises for the purpose of purchasing items other than alcohol beverages. An underage person so entering the premises may not remain on the premises after the purchase.
 - 3. Hotels, drug stores, grocery stores, bowling centers, movie theaters, painting studios, billiards centers having on the premises 12 or more billiards tables that are not designed for coin operation and that are 8 feet or longer in length, indoor golf simulator facilities, indoor golf and baseball facilities on premises for which the only alcohol beverage license issued is a Class "B" license, service stations, vessels, cars operated by any railroad, regularly established athletic fields, outdoor volleyball courts that are contiguous to a licensed premises, stadiums, music festival venues during an event with a projected attendance of at least 2,500 persons, public facilities as defined in s. 125.51 (5) (b) 1. d. which are owned by a county or municipality or centers for the visual or performing arts.

3m. Premises having an indoor volleyball court that measures at least 9 meters by 18 meters in area. The exception under this subdivision does not authorize an underage person to loiter in any room that is primarily used for the sale or consumption of alcohol beverages.

- 3r. Any privately owned business that exists to provide recreational fishing opportunities to the public for a fee and that is registered under s. 95.60 (3m) if the sale of alcohol beverages accounts for less than 30 percent of the business's gross receipts.
- 4. Premises in the state fair park, concessions authorized on state-owned premises in the state parks and state forests as defined or designated in chs. 27 and 28, and parks owned or operated by agricultural societies.
- 5. Ski chalets, golf courses and golf clubhouses, racetracks licensed under ch. 562, curling clubs, private soccer clubs and private tennis clubs.
- 6. Premises operated under both a Class "B" or "Class B" license or permit and a license under s. 97.30 for a restaurant where the principal business conducted is that of a restaurant. If the premises are operated under both a Class "B" or "Class B" license or permit and a license under s. 97.30 for a restaurant, the principal business conducted is presumed to be the sale of alcohol beverages, but the presumption may be rebutted by competent evidence.

6m. Premises operating under both a "Class C" license and a license under s. 97.30 for a restaurant.

- 7. An underage person who enters or remains on a Class "B" or "Class B" premises for the purpose of transacting business at an auction or market, if the person does not enter or remain in a room where alcohol beverages are sold, furnished or possessed.
- 8. An underage person who enters or remains in a room on Class "B" or "Class B" licensed premises separate from any room where alcohol beverages are sold or served, if no alcohol beverages are furnished or consumed by any person in the room where the underage person is present and the presence of underage persons is authorized under this subdivision. An underage person may enter and remain on Class "B" or "Class B" premises under this subdivision only if the municipality which issued the Class "B" or "Class B" license adopts an ordinance permitting underage persons to enter and remain on the premises as provided in this subdivision and the law enforcement agency responsible for enforcing the ordinance issues to the Class "B" or "Class B" licensee a written authorization permitting underage persons to be present under this subdivision on the date specified in the authorization. Before issuing the authorization, the law enforcement agency shall make a determination that the presence of underage persons on the licensed premises will not endanger their health, welfare or safety or that of other members of the community. The licensee shall obtain a separate authorization for each date on which underage persons will be present on the premises.

- 9. A person who is at least 18 years of age and who is working under a contract with the licensee, permittee or corporate agent to provide entertainment for customers on the premises.
- 10. An underage person who enters or remains on Class "B" or "Class B" licensed premises on a date specified by the licensee or permittee during times when no alcohol beverages are consumed, sold or given away. During those times, the licensee, the agent named in the license if the licensee is a corporation or limited liability company or a person who has an operator's license shall be on the premises unless all alcohol beverages are stored in a locked portion of the premises. The licensee shall notify the local law enforcement agency, in advance, of the times underage persons will be allowed on the premises under this subdivision.
- 11. An underage person who enters or remains in a dance hall or banquet or hospitality room attached to Class "B" or "Class B" licensed premises for the purpose of attending a banquet, reception, dance, or other similar event.
- **12.** An underage person who enters and remains on premises for which a temporary Class "B" license is issued under s. 125.26 (6) if the licensee is authorized by the official or body of the municipality that issued the license to permit underage persons to be on the premises under s. 125.26 (6) and if the licensee permits underage persons to be on the premises.
- 12m. An underage person who enters and remains on premises covered by a temporary "Class B" license issued as provided in s. 125.51 (10) (b) if all of the following apply:
- a. The municipal governing body issuing the license, or an official or body authorized by the municipal governing body, authorizes the licensee to permit underage persons to be on the licensed premises for the purpose of acting as designated drivers.
- **b.** The licensee permits, on the licensed premises, unaccompanied underage persons to be present only for the purpose of acting as designated drivers and the licensee provides a means of identification, such as a wrist band, to identify these underage persons as designated drivers.
- c. The underage person is present on the licensed premises to act as a designated driver and displays the means of identification specified in subd. 12m. b.
- 13. An underage person who enters or remains in a banquet or hospitality room on brewery premises for the purpose of attending a brewery tour.
- 14. An underage person who enters or remains on licensed premises at the Eagle Ridge Festival Grounds in the city of Chippewa Falls.

- 15. An underage person employed by or assisting a law enforcement agency in carrying out enforcement activities to determine compliance with, or investigate potential violations of, the provisions of this section.
- 16. An underage person who enters or remains in a banquet or hospitality room on winery premises operated under a "Class A" or "Class B" license for the purpose of attending a winery tour.
- (b) Penalties. A licensee or permittee who directly or indirectly permits an underage person to enter or be on a licensed premises in violation of par. (a) is subject to a forfeiture of not more than \$500.
- (4) Underage persons; prohibitions; penalties.
 - (a) Any underage person who does any of the following is guilty of a violation:
 - 1. Procures or attempts to procure alcohol beverages from a licensee or permittee.
 - 2. Unless accompanied by a parent, guardian or spouse who has attained the legal drinking age, possesses or consumes alcohol beverages on licensed premises.
 - 3. Enters, knowingly attempts to enter or is on licensed premises in violation of sub. (3) (a).
 - 4. Falsely represents his or her age for the purpose of receiving alcohol beverages from a licensee or permittee.
 - (b) Except as provided in par. (bm), any underage person not accompanied by his or her parent, guardian or spouse who has attained the legal drinking age who knowingly possesses or consumes alcohol beverages is guilty of a violation.
 - (bg) Paragraphs (a) and (b) do not apply to an underage person employed by or assisting a law enforcement agency in carrying out enforcement activities to determine compliance with, or investigate potential violations of, the provisions of this section.
 - (bm) An underage person may possess alcohol beverages in the course of employment during his or her working hours if employed by any of the following:
 - 1. A brewer or brewpub.
 - 2. A fermented malt beverages wholesaler.
 - 3. A permittee other than a Class "B" or "Class B" permittee.

- 4. A facility for the production of alcohol fuel.
- 5. A retail licensee or permittee under the conditions specified in s. 125.32 (2) or 125.68 (2) or for delivery of unopened containers to the home or vehicle of a customer.
- 6. A campus, if the underage person is at least 18 years of age and is under the immediate supervision of a person who has attained the legal drinking age.
- (bs) Subject to sub. (5), any person violating par. (a) is subject to the following penalties:
- 1. For a first violation, a forfeiture of not less than \$250 nor more than \$500, suspension of the person's operating privilege as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 1., participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties.
- **2.** For a violation committed within 12 months of one previous violation, either a forfeiture of not less than \$300 nor more than \$500, participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties. In addition, the person's operating privilege may be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 2., except that if the violation of par. (a) involved a motor vehicle the person's operating privilege shall be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 2.
- 3. For a violation committed within 12 months of 2 previous violations, either a forfeiture of not less than \$500 nor more than \$750, participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties. In addition, the person's operating privilege may be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3., except that if the violation of par. (a) involved a motor vehicle the person's operating privilege shall be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3.
- 4. For a violation committed within 12 months of 3 or more previous violations, either a forfeiture of not less than \$750 nor more than \$1,000, participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties. In addition, the person's operating privilege may be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3., except that if the violation of par. (a) involved a motor vehicle the person's operating privilege shall be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3.
- (c) Subject to sub. (5), any person violating par. (b) is subject to the following penalties:
- 1. For a first violation, a forfeiture of not less than \$100 nor more than \$200, suspension of the person's operating privilege as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 1., participation

in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties.

- 2. For a violation committed within 12 months of one previous violation, either a forfeiture of not less than \$200 nor more than \$300, participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties. In addition, the person's operating privilege may be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 2., except that if the violation of par. (b) involved a motor vehicle the person's operating privilege shall be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 2.
- 3. For a violation committed within 12 months of 2 previous violations, either a forfeiture of not less than \$300 nor more than \$500, participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties. In addition, the person's operating privilege may be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3., except that if the violation of par. (b) involved a motor vehicle the person's operating privilege shall be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3.
- **4.** For a violation committed within 12 months of 3 or more previous violations, either a forfeiture of not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000, participation in a supervised work program or other community service work under par. (cg) or any combination of these penalties. In addition, the person's operating privilege may be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3., except that if the violation of par. (b) involved a motor vehicle the person's operating privilege shall be suspended as provided under s. 343.30 (6) (b) 3.
- (cd) For purposes of par. (bs) or (c), all violations arising out of the same incident or occurrence shall be counted as a single violation.

(cg)

1. A supervised work program ordered under par. (bs) or (c) shall be administered by the county department under s. 46.215 or 46.22 or by a community agency approved by the court. The court shall set standards for the supervised work program within the budgetary limits established by the county board of supervisors. The supervised work program may provide the person with reasonable compensation reflecting the market value of the work performed or it may consist of uncompensated community service work. Community service work ordered under par. (bs) or (c), other than community service work performed under a supervised work program, shall be administered by a public agency or nonprofit charitable organization approved by the court. The court may use any available resources, including any community service work program, in ordering the person to perform community service work under par. (bs) or (c).

- 2. The supervised work program or other community service work shall be of a constructive nature designed to promote the person's rehabilitation, shall be appropriate to the person's age level and physical ability and shall be combined with counseling from a member of the staff of the county department, community agency, public agency or nonprofit charitable organization or other qualified person. The supervised work program or other community service work may not conflict with the person's regular attendance at school. The amount of work required shall be reasonably related to the seriousness of the person's offense.
- (cm) When a court revokes or suspends a person's operating privilege under par. (bs) or (c), the department of transportation may not disclose information concerning or relating to the revocation or suspension to any person other than a court, district attorney, county corporation counsel, city, village or town attorney, law enforcement agency, driver licensing agency of another jurisdiction, or the person whose operating privilege is revoked or suspended. A person entitled to receive information under this paragraph may not disclose the information to any other person or agency.
- (d) A person who is under 17 years of age on the date of disposition is subject to s. 938.344 unless proceedings have been instituted against the person in a court of civil or criminal jurisdiction after dismissal of the citation under s. 938.344 (3).

(e)

- 1. In this paragraph, "defendant" means a person found guilty of violating par. (a) or (b) who is 17, 18, 19 or 20 years of age.
- 2. After ordering a penalty under par. (bs) or (c), the court, with the agreement of the defendant, may enter an additional order staying the execution of the penalty order and suspending or modifying the penalty imposed, except that the court may not stay, suspend or modify the suspension of a person's operating privilege required under par. (bs) or (c). The order under this subdivision shall require the defendant to do any of the following:
- a. Submit to an alcohol abuse assessment that conforms to the criteria specified under s. 938.547 (4) and that is conducted by an approved treatment facility. The order shall designate an approved treatment facility to conduct the alcohol abuse assessment and shall specify the date by which the assessment must be completed.
- b. Participate in an outpatient alcohol abuse treatment program at an approved treatment facility, if an alcohol abuse assessment conducted under subd. 2. a. recommends treatment.
- c. Participate in a court-approved alcohol abuse education program.

- 3. If the approved treatment facility, with the written informed consent of the defendant, notifies the agency primarily responsible for providing services to the defendant that the defendant has submitted to an assessment under subd. 2. a. and that the defendant does not need treatment or education, the court shall notify the defendant of whether or not the penalty will be reinstated.
- 4. If the defendant completes the alcohol abuse treatment program or court-approved alcohol abuse education program, the approved treatment facility or court-approved alcohol abuse education program shall, with the written informed consent of the defendant, notify the agency primarily responsible for providing services to the defendant that the defendant has complied with the order and the court shall notify the defendant of whether or not the penalty will be reinstated. If the court had ordered the suspension of the defendant's operating privilege under par. (bs) or (c), the court may order the secretary of transportation to reinstate the operating privilege of the defendant if he or she completes the alcohol abuse treatment program or court-approved alcohol abuse education program.
- 5. If an approved treatment facility or court-approved alcohol abuse education program, with the written informed consent of the defendant, notifies the agency primarily responsible for providing services to the defendant that the defendant is not participating in the program or that the defendant has not satisfactorily completed a recommended alcohol abuse treatment program or an education program, the court shall hold a hearing to determine whether the penalties under par. (bs) or (c) should be imposed.

(f)

- 1. Except as provided in subd. 2., and subject to subds. 3. to 5., if an underage person engages in conduct that violates par. (a) on the premises of a licensee, the licensee may bring a civil action against the underage person. If judgment is entered in favor of the licensee, the court shall award to the licensee damages in the amount of \$1,000 and, notwithstanding s. 814.04 (1), the costs of the action. A licensee may bring an action under this paragraph regardless of whether the underage person has been convicted of, or received a citation for, the violation of par. (a), but the licensee has the burden of proving, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the underage person's conduct was in violation of par. (a).
- 2. If the underage person who engages in conduct that violates par. (a) on the licensee's premises is less than 18 years of age and is not an emancipated minor, the licensee may bring the civil action against the underage person's parent, as defined in s. 46.56 (1) (j).
- 3. A licensee may not bring a civil action under this paragraph unless the licensee has first provided notice to the underage person or the underage person's parent, as

applicable, of the licensee's intent to bring the action. The notice shall be mailed to the last-known address of the underage person or underage person's parent, as applicable, at least 15 days prior to filing the action and shall include a demand for the relief described in subd. 1. The department may, by rule, prescribe a form for this notice.

- 4. A licensee may not bring a civil action under this paragraph if the licensee has been convicted of, or received a citation for or been charged with, a violation of sub. (1) or (3) related to the same incident, occurrence, or conduct giving rise to the underage person's violation of par. (a), unless the licensee is entitled to a defense under sub. (6). A licensee that asserts a defense under sub. (6) has the burden of proving the defense by a preponderance of the evidence.
- 5. A licensee may not bring a civil action under this paragraph unless the licensee or the licensee's employee reports to law enforcement the conduct suspected to be in violation of par. (a) at or near the time that the conduct occurs or is first discovered.

INTRODUCED BY: Executive Committee and Sheriff & Jail Committee

SYNOPSIS: An Ordinance Adopting and Enacting Sections 20-36, 20-37, and 20-38 of the Juneau County Code of Ordinances Regarding Disorderly Conduct and Related Offenses

WHEREAS, the Juneau County Sheriff's Department and other law enforcement agencies in Juneau County currently do not have the option of charging offenses related to disorderly conduct as ordinance violations instead of state crimes under Wis. Stats. § 947.01 (2019); and,

WHEREAS, the Juneau County Sheriff's Department and other law enforcement agencies in Juneau County currently do not have the option of charging offenses related to unlawful use of a telephone as ordinance violations instead of state crimes under Wis. Stats. § 947.012 (2019); and,

WHEREAS, the Juneau County Sheriff's Department and other law enforcement agencies in Juneau County currently do not have the option of charging offenses related to unlawful use of computerized communication systems as ordinance violations instead of state crimes under Wis. Stats. § 947.0125 (2019); and,

WHEREAS, Juneau County Sheriff Brent Olson and the Juneau County Sheriff & Jail Committee believe it to be in the best interests of law enforcement in Juneau County and the citizens of Juneau County to have the option of charging the above-noted offenses as ordinance violations instead of criminal offenses, depending upon the facts of each case; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed new ordinances, to become Sections 20-36, 20-37, and 20-38 of the Juneau County Code of Ordinances, are identical in basic form and content to the state statue regulating these matters, Wis. Stats. §§ 947.01, 947.012, 947.0125; and,

WHEREAS, the Sheriff & Jail Committee and the Executive Committee recommend the adoption and enactment of the proposed Sections 20-36, 20-37, and 20-38 of the Ordinances to the full County Board of Supervisors;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does ordain that the Juneau County Code of Ordinances shall be and hereby is amended to create Sections 20-36, 20-37, and 20-38, as set forth in full on the addendum attached to this document, effective upon the date of its enactment.

Sec. 20 - 36 Disorderly conduct.

- (1) Whoever, in a public or private place, engages in violent, abusive, indecent, profane, boisterous, unreasonably loud or otherwise disorderly conduct under circumstances in which the conduct tends to cause or provoke a disturbance is guilty of a violation.
- (2) Unless other facts and circumstances that indicate a criminal or malicious intent on the part of the person apply, a person is not in violation of, and may not be charged with a violation of, this section for loading a firearm, or for carrying or going armed with a firearm or a knife, without regard to whether the firearm is loaded or the firearm or the knife is concealed or openly carried.

Sec. 20 - 37 Unlawful use of telephone.

- (1) Whoever does any of the following is guilty of a violation:
- (a) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten, abuse or harass, makes a telephone call and threatens to inflict injury or physical harm to any person or the property of any person.
- (b) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten or abuse, telephones another and uses any obscene, lewd or profane language or suggests any lewd or lascivious act.
- (c) Makes a telephone call, whether or not conversation ensues, without disclosing his or her identity and with intent to abuse or threaten any person at the called number.
 - (2) Whoever does any of the following is subject to a Class B forfeiture:
- (a) With intent to harass or offend, telephones another and uses any obscene, lewd or profane language or suggests any lewd or lascivious act.
- (b) Makes or causes the telephone of another repeatedly to ring, with intent to harass any person at the called number.
- (c) Makes repeated telephone calls, whether or not conversation ensues, with intent solely to harass any person at the called number.
- (d) Makes a telephone call, whether or not conversation ensues, without disclosing his or her identity and with intent to harass any person at the called number.
- (e) Knowingly permits any telephone under his or her control to be used for any purpose prohibited by this section.

Sec. 20 - 38 Unlawful use of computerized communication systems.

- (1) In this section, "message" means any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data or intelligence of any nature, or any transfer of a computer program, as defined in Wis. Stats. § 943.70 (1) (c).
 - (2) Whoever does any of the following is guilty of a violation:

- (a) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten, abuse or harass another person, sends a message to the person on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system and in that message threatens to inflict injury or physical harm to any person or the property of any person.
- (b) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten, abuse or harass another person, sends a message on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system with the reasonable expectation that the person will receive the message and in that message threatens to inflict injury or physical harm to any person or the property of any person.
- (c) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten or abuse another person, sends a message to the person on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system and in that message uses any obscene, lewd or profane language or suggests any lewd or lascivious act.
- (d) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten or abuse another person, sends a message on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system with the reasonable expectation that the person will receive the message and in that message uses any obscene, lewd or profane language or suggests any lewd or lascivious act.
- (e) With intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten or abuse another person, sends a message to the person on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system while intentionally preventing or attempting to prevent the disclosure of his or her own identity.
- (f) While intentionally preventing or attempting to prevent the disclosure of his or her identity and with intent to frighten, intimidate, threaten or abuse another person, sends a message on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system with the reasonable expectation that the person will receive the message.
 - (3) Whoever does any of the following is subject to a Class B forfeiture:
- (a) With intent to harass or offend another person, sends a message to the person on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system and in that message uses any obscene, lewd or profane language or suggests any lewd or lascivious act.
- (b) With intent to harass or offend another person, sends a message on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system with the reasonable expectation that the person will receive the message and in that message uses any obscene, lewd or profane language or suggests any lewd or lascivious act.
- (c) With intent solely to harass another person, sends repeated messages to the person on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system.
- (d) With intent solely to harass another person, sends repeated messages on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system with the reasonable expectation that the person will receive the messages.
- (e) With intent to harass another person, sends a message to the person on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system while intentionally preventing or attempting to prevent the disclosure of his or her own identity.
- (f) While intentionally preventing or attempting to prevent the disclosure of his or her identity and with intent to harass another person, sends a message on an electronic

mail or other computerized communication system with the reasonable expectation that the person will receive the message.

(g) Knowingly permits or directs another person to send a message prohibited by this section from any computer terminal or other device that is used to send messages on an electronic mail or other computerized communication system and that is under his or her control.

ONLINE DOG LICENSING SYSTEM AGREEMENT

OVERVIEW. This is an agreement between the County Clerk of Juneau County, Wisconsin (CUSTOMER) of 220 East State St, Rm 112, Mauston, Wisconsin 53948 and Fairfield Computer Services, LLC (FCS) of 144 Forrer Blvd, Oakwood, Ohio 45419 for use of the Online Dog Licensing System (SYSTEM).

DURATION. This agreement is in force for an initial term of two (2) years from the date of signing. This agreement automatically renews for three (3) successive one (1) year terms, unless terminated. Either party may terminate this agreement with a written sixty (60) day notice. At the expiration or termination of this agreement, FCS discontinues access to SYSTEM immediately.

SPECIFICATIONS. FCS configures SYSTEM in accordance to the terms given in "Exhibit 1. System Specifications."

DELIVERY. FCS uses reasonable diligence to make SYSTEM available for use by CUSTOMER no later than eight weeks after receiving from CUSTOMER all the necessary information relating to configuring SYSTEM as described in in "Exhibit 1. System Specifications." CUSTOMER acknowledges that this is an estimate and not a guarantee of the delivery time.

DATA SECURITY. FCS shall implement and maintain appropriate administrative, technical, and organizational security measures to safeguard against unauthorized access, disclosure, or theft of data contained in SYSTEM. Such security measures shall be in accordance with recognized industry practice.

DATA BACKUP. FCS shall routinely back up SYSTEM. Such backups shall be made to enable a full recovery of SYSTEM as of the date the backup was taken. The backup practice shall be in accordance with recognized industry practice.

LICENSE DATA is defined as data on licenses, license holders, licensing transactions, license enforcement, and animal control collected and stored in SYSTEM pursuant to this agreement. Specifically, but without limitation, this includes data on 1) license descriptions, issue dates, numbers and expiration dates; 2) names, addresses, telephone numbers, and email address of license holders; 3) order numbers, items purchased, fees for purchases, payment methods, and totals; 4) license enforcement and animal control activity; 5) other administrative notes of CUSTOMER.

UPLOADED DATA is defined as electronic files transferred to and stored in SYSTEM pursuant to this agreement by CUSTOMER, their agents, and the public. Specifically, but without limitation, this includes files 1) needed as proofs for licensing; 2) having information on account holders needed to be kept on file by law; 3) used for descriptive purposes relating to license enforcement or animal control.

CREDIT CARD DATA is defined in this agreement as the information related to performing and managing credit card transactions executed in SYSTEM pursuant to this agreement. Specifically, but without limitation, this includes 1) credit card numbers and expiration dates; 2) credit card holder names; 3) credit card security codes; 4) reference numbers exchanged between the credit card processor and FCS. CUSTOMER DATA and UPLOADED DATA expressly do not include CREDIT CARD DATA.

OWNERSHIP. CUSTOMER owns LICENSE DATA. CUSTOMER retains intellectual property rights in any material they hold in UPLOADED DATA. FCS shall not sell, share, or make available LICENSE DATA or UPLOADED DATA to any party without the express consent of CUSTOMER or except as is directly necessary for the proper operation of SYSTEM or as required by law. FCS does not review material held in UPLOADED DATA. UPLOADED DATA is the responsibility of CUSTOMER. FCS holds all right, title, and interest in SYSTEM which includes without limitation all interfaces, menu arrangements, software and data designs, and all components of any source or object computer code that make up SYSTEM. CUSTOMER has a nonexclusive and nontransferable lease for use of SYSTEM for the duration of this agreement. CUSTOMER shall do nothing

which may infringe upon or in any way undermine the right, title, and interest of FCS in SYSTEM. FCS owns CREDIT CARD DATA.

DATA DISPOSITION. At the expiration or termination of this agreement, FCS shall 1) transmit LICENSE DATA and UPLOADED DATA to CUSTOMER in an electronic and reasonably organized format; 2) securely store an archival representation of LICENSE DATA and UPLOADED DATA for records retention purposes; 3) and remove LICENSE DATA and UPLOADED DATA from SYSTEM.

SETUP MATERIAL. CUSTOMER warrants that all documents, images, artwork, or other material it transmits to FCS for use in configuring SYSTEM is legally owned by or licensed to CUSTOMER.

COMPENSATION. For the services provided under this agreement, CUSTOMER compensates FCS in accordance to the terms given in "Exhibit 2. Cost Summary."

FCS BRAND. CUSTOMER allows FCS to place on the public website of SYSTEM an inconspicuous phrase or mark identifying FCS as the developer and owner of SYSTEM with a hyperlink to the website of FCS.

DISCLAIMER. FCS disclaims all warranties not expressly contained in this agreement. This includes without limitation any warranty as to the suitability, merchantability, fitness for any particular purpose, or non-infringement of the equipment, software, or services provided hereunder. FCS does not warrant that the equipment or software will operate uninterrupted or error-free. FCS does not warrant that SYSTEM will work on all platforms. No representation or other affirmation of fact, including without limitation statements regarding capacity, suitability for use, or performance of SYSTEM, whether made by employees of FCS or otherwise that is not contained in this agreement is deemed a warranty by FCS for any purpose or give rise to any liability of FCS whatsoever.

LIMITATION. In no event is FCS or CUSTOMER liable to the other for any lost or anticipated profits, or any indirect, incidental, exemplary, special, reliance, punitive, or consequential damages arising out of or in connection with this agreement, regardless of whether FCS or CUSTOMER has been advised or has reason to know of the possibility of such damages. Notwithstanding any provision contained herein to the contrary, the maximum liability of FCS to CUSTOMER or any person whatsoever arising out of or in connection with this agreement or any use of or inability to use services, whether such liability arises from any claim based upon contract, warranty, tort, or otherwise, shall not exceed the actual amount paid to FCS by CUSTOMER. The foregoing limitations of liability does not apply to claims for personal injury caused by FCS's intentional misconduct or negligence, or claims for infringement, whether actual or alleged.

FORCE MAJEURE. FCS shall not have any liability whatsoever or be deemed to be in default for any delay or failure in performance under this agreement resulting from acts beyond the control of FCS, including without limitation acts of God, emergency, accident, fire, lightning, riot, strikes, lock-outs, industrial disputes, or epidemics.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This agreement, together with the attached exhibits, constitutes the entire agreement between FCS and CUSTOMER with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes any prior agreement, oral or written, between FCS and CUSTOMER in connection with this agreement.

AMENDING. Except as expressly provided herein, this agreement may not be changed or amended except by a writing executed by authorized representatives of both parties.

SEVERABILITY. If any provision herein is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions will continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way. The parties agree to replace any invalid or unenforceable provision with another which closely approximates the intent and economic effect of the invalid or unenforceable provision.

NON-WAIVER. Both parties agree that the failure of the other to enforce any provision of this agreement is not a waiver of that provision or any other provision contained herein.

REMEDIES. All remedies available to either party are cumulative and not exclusive. Termination or expiration of this agreement shall not limit either party from pursuing other remedies available at law or in equity. Neither party may institute any action in any form arising out of this agreement more than fifteen (15) years after the cause of action has arisen.

ASSIGNMENT. This agreement may not be assigned by either party without the prior written consent of the other party, provided, however, that the foregoing shall not prohibit FCS from assigning this agreement or its rights hereunder, nor require the consent of the CUSTOMER, in connection with any change of control, corporate reorganization, merger or consolidation of FCS. Any purported assignment, transfer, or delegation in violation of this section shall be null and void. Subject to the foregoing, this agreement shall be binding upon, insure to the benefit of, and be enforceable by the parties and their respective successors and assigns.

GOVERNING LAW AND JURISDICTION. The laws of the State of Ohio govern this agreement and CUSTOMER and FCS hereby submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the Ohio courts.

ACCEPTANCE. By signature below, the parties agree to the provisions in this document. Parties further agree that they are authorized to act on behalf of their respective organizations and to bind said organizations to the provisions herein.

CUSTOMER acknowledges that CUSTOMER has read this agreement, understands it, and agrees to be legally bound by it.

WHEREFORE, the parties have caused this agreement to be executed by their duly authorized representatives.

Exhibit 1. System Specifications

FCS has a system for managing dog licenses and other license types. The system is made available for use to CUSTOMER who manages licensing and related activities by accessing an administrative website of the system using a web browser over the Internet.

The system stores current and historical information on licenses, license holders, orders, payments, and other license-related information. It generates blank license applications, pre-filled renewal applications, and license receipts. It supports barcode reading and batch file input for rapid processing of renewal applications. It supports email communication for sending renewal notices and receipts to license holders. It contains reports and facilities for license enforcement and animal control. It supports the uploading of files to various system entities such as license holders, orders, and incident reports. It provides numerous reports on license holders, licenses, orders, and payments. It has different tiers of administrative access and maintains a detailed audit trail on system activity.

In addition to an administrative website, there is a public website. The public website often contains information on licensing; links to relevant officials' web pages and other related web pages; and blank applications which can be printed and used for filling out by hand. The public website also may feature a license search capability, allowing the public to search the license database using a license number to find a license holder's contact information. Finally, if the CUSTOMER elects to allow online licensing, the public website is where the public goes to renew and purchase new license online via a credit card.

Fees for licenses purchased online are remitted to CUSTOMER by the end of business Monday for transactions done the prior week. Remittance is in the form of a paper check or an ACH transfer. In the event Monday is a holiday, fees are remitted on the next business day.

The administrative and public websites are available on the Internet at

https://www.doglicenses.us/WI/Juneau

Once an agreement is signed, FCS provides CUSTOMER a set-up questionnaire. Based upon it, an instance of the system is configured. Into this is loaded the existing license and license holder data of CUSTOMER, provided such data is in an electronic and reasonably organized format. Applications, receipts, and the public website are marked up as appropriate for CUSTOMER. On the public website, FCS adds three to five web pages in support of licensing, typically these include a home page, an FAQ on licensing, blank applications, and other related forms and hyperlinks.

The following items are needed from CUSTOMER for FCS to successfully set up the system. The list is not necessarily exhaustive.

- 1. The signed agreement.
- 2. The identity of the person who will lead the set-up from the side of CUSTOMER.
- 3. The completed set-up questionnaire.
- 4. Digital copies of all images to use on the website, such as the seal and any photos.
- 5. Digital copies of all forms to post to the website.
- 6. Data files on license holders and licenses.
- 7. Data files on related licensing information, such as breeds, colors, and vet clinics.



WHEREAS, said real estate was the site of an illegitimate electronic recycling business that violated State solid and hazardous waste laws. Large quantities of hazardous electronic waste, broken cathode ray tube (CRT) glass containing lead, TV monitors and plastics were discarded on the property by the former occupants. Prior to tax foreclosure, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources worked with the previous owner of the property on cleanup, but a significant amount of hazardous and solid waste remains today. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has notified Juneau County of the past violations and is enforcing the remaining cleanup and disposal of the hazardous waste. Failure by the County to act to correct the violations could lead to court ordered compliance and penalties; and

WHEREAS, North Shore Environmental Construction, Inc. -- having experience and expertise working on hazardous waste cleanup and having assisted in prior cleanup at this location -- were asked to provide a proposal for the packaging, transportation and disposal of the remaining hazardous waste on site. The said proposal is attached to this resolution and provides an estimated cost range for cleanup of the property; and

WHEREAS, The Lands, Forestry, Parks and Zoning Committee and the Finance & Computer Committee reviewed the need for the proposed project and approved funding not to exceed \$70,000.00 to cover the higher cost estimate should it be required.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The objective of this project is to consolidate, package and dispose of the various CRT glass piles, electronic and universal waste. The waste will be containerized and disposed as either solid, electronic, universal, or hazardous depending on material condition and analytical if needed. The waste management process will be conducted utilizing industry standards and procedures related electronics, hazardous and solid waste materials. The following steps will be conducted to accomplish this task.

- *Development of a site specific health and safety plan that addresses the potential physical, chemical and environmental hazards associated with the waste packaging process.
- *Development of a work plan including methods and procedures.
- *Upon approval of the work plan, NSEC will mobilize the necessary personnel, equipment and supplies to the site.



The proposed budget for 2022, as approved by the Finance and Computer Committee is attached. This budget represents the collaborative effort of the Department Heads, their governing committees, and the Finance and Computer Committee to prepare a budget that meets the State of Wisconsin's levy limit law, while providing the highest quality of service to the citizens of Juneau County.

The State budget that is in effect for 2022 includes levy limits. For 2022, the Counties are limited to new construction. Juneau County's new construction for 2022 is 1.332%, so we are only able to increase our operating levy by 1.332% in dollars over the 2021 budget. This budget represents an operating levy dollar increase of \$182,113 over 2021 with an operating mil rate of \$4.5882, which is a decrease of \$0.336 from 2021. Also, the equalized valuation, excluding the TIF districts, of Juneau County increased by \$206,951,700. This is the amount on which the County property tax rate is based. The debt levy for 2022 increased by \$2,457,264. This represents a 114.69% increase in the debt levy from 2021. The increase will be explained below.

The 2022 budget includes a 6% wage increase in January for all employees, excluding elected officials. The Finance and Computer Committee applied a total of \$300,000 from the Land Sales Capital Projects fund and \$336,000 from the Capital Improvements Fund to pay for capital outlay items and balance the budget. The Committee also applied \$51,000 from the ATC Badger Coulee Transmission Line funding to the 2022 budget to fund capital outlay items for the Parks. After asking Departments for further cuts, and cutting \$99,570 from the appropriation for JCEDC and \$43,600 from the Extension budget for the vacant CRD agent, the Finance and Computer Committee made the difficult decision to fund the capital items for IT, Sheriff and Highway, as well as some of the road contruction type projects for the Highway Department with a short term note. The total amount of of the short term note is \$2,515,000, consisting of \$1,557,221 for the 2022 budget, \$934,477 for borrowing approved for the 2021 budget, which has not been done yet and \$23,302 for legal and financial fees associated with the note.

This 2022 Budget Book includes information that more fully explains the historical data for Juneau County, as well as the details for the 2022 budget. Page 2 shows a ten year comparison of equalized values, property tax levies, and property tax rates. Page 3 shows the 2019-2022 budget trend, as well as 2019 and 2020 actual expeditures by department. Page 4 shows the same information by fund for all revenues, except the property tax levy and page 5 shows the four year budgeted property tax levy by department. Page 6 shows revenues, expenditures and property tax levies by fund for 2022. Pages 7 through 17 show the 2022 budget by expense account number. These pages summarize the budget expenses with their offsetting revenues and calculating the property tax levy by account number. The report also shows a comparision to the 2021 budgeted property tax levy and the percentage increase or decrease. Page 18 lists the capital outlay items requested and proposed by the Finance and Computer Committee for 2022.

1. Levy Limit Challenges for Operating Budget

- Restricts County's ability to generate additional revenue to pay expenses inside the operating budget.
- > Expenses inside the operating budget include: 1. Operational Expenses; and 2. Capital Expenses
- ➤ Debt Service Levy for general obligation debt service is calculated as a separate levy outside of levy limits.

2. Borrowing for Recurring Capital Projects

Like other annual operating expenses, certain capital projects require an annual expenditure to maintain County operations, equipment or highways. They would be considered "recurring" expenses. Some of Juneau County's "recurring" expenses would include I.T. infrastructure, vehicles (Sheriff and highway), highway improvements and building maintenance.

Also, the completion of highway projects each year, impacts the GTA formula, which determines aid the County is eligible to receive.

Because these expenses are "recurring" any borrowing would be done as a short-term, general obligation promissory note. The short-term borrowing would need to occur each year as a "recurring" practice to fund the "recurring" expenses.

The Capital Projects Identified for the 2021 Borrowing are as follows:

Highway road improvements Sheriff vehicles Highway equipment and vehicles IT equipment

THE BORROWING <u>CAN NOT</u> PROVIDE FUNDS FOR OPERATING EXPENSES - THE COUNTY MUST CONTINUE TO ADDRESS RISING OPERATIONAL COSTS WITHIN THE OPERATING BUDGET

3. 2021 Short-Term Borrowing Structure

The County would issue "Taxable General Obligation Promissory Notes" in December 2021 with a repayment date of March 1, 2022. As a General Obligation Promissory Note, the County is allowed to levy a tax to repay the entire principal and interest on the Note, <u>outside</u> of levy limits.

The Notes are issued as a "taxable" note, which has no time limit for spending the funds.

The Notes will provide funding for the capital projects and to pay expenses of issuance including underwriting, Municipal Advisor and Bond Counsel.

The 2021 Notes will <u>not</u> be rated by S&P Global Ratings due to its short-term.

WHEREAS, on November 2, 2021, the County Board of Supervisors of Juneau County, Wisconsin (the "County") adopted an initial resolution (the "Initial Resolution") authorizing the issuance of general obligation promissory notes in an amount not to exceed \$2,515,000 for the public purpose of financing capital improvement projects, including construction of highway improvements and acquisition of Sheriff vehicles, highway equipment and vehicles and IT equipment (collectively, the "Project");

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that the Project is within the County's power to undertake and therefore serves a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b), Wisconsin Statutes;

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow money and issue general obligation promissory notes for such public purposes;

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the Notes shall be used to fund the operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund the operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by the property taxes;

WHEREAS, due to certain provisions contained in the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, it is in the best interest of the County to issue such Notes on a taxable rather than tax-exempt basis;

WHEREAS, the County has directed Wisconsin Public Finance Professionals, LLC ("WPFP") to take the steps necessary to sell taxable general obligation promissory notes (the "Notes") to pay the cost of the Project;

WHEREAS, WPFP, in consultation with the officials of the County, prepared an Official Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference) setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Notes and indicating that the Notes would be offered for public sale on December 21, 2021;

WHEREAS, the County Clerk (in consultation with WPFP) caused a form of notice of the sale to be published and/or announced and caused the Official Notice of Sale to be distributed to potential bidders offering the Notes for public sale on December 21, 2021;

WHEREAS, the County has duly received bids for the Notes as described on the Bid Tabulation attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B</u> and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Bid Tabulation"); and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid proposal (the "Proposal") submitted by the financial institution listed first on the Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the Official Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. WPFP has recommended that the County accept the Proposal. A copy of said Proposal submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by this reference.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of Juneau County that:

Section 1. Ratification of the Official Notice of Sale and Offering Materials. The County Board of Supervisors hereby ratifies and approves the details of the Notes set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto as and for the details of the Notes. The Official Notice of Sale and any other offering materials prepared and circulated by WPFP are hereby ratified and approved in all respects. All actions taken by officers of the County and WPFP in connection with the preparation and distribution of the Official Notice of Sale, and any other offering materials are hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 1A. Award of the Notes. For the purpose of paying the cost of the Project, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, the principal sum of TWO MILLION FIVE HUNDRED FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$2,515,000) from the Purchaser in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Proposal. The Proposal of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Notes for the sum set forth on the Proposal, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, resulting in a true interest cost as set forth on the Proposal, is hereby accepted. The Chairperson and County Clerk or other appropriate officers of the County are authorized and directed to execute an acceptance of the Proposal on behalf of the County. The good faith deposit of the Purchaser shall be applied in accordance with the Official Notice of

Sale, and any good faith deposits submitted by unsuccessful bidders shall be promptly returned. The Notes shall bear interest at the rate set forth on the Proposal.

Section 2. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "Taxable General Obligation Promissory Notes"; shall be issued in the principal amount of \$2,515,000; shall be dated December 30, 2021; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered R-1; and shall bear interest at the rate per annum and mature on March 1, 2022 as set forth on the Pricing Summary attached hereto as Exhibit D-1 and incorporated herein by this reference. Interest shall be payable at maturity. Interest shall be computed upon the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and will be rounded pursuant to the rules of the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. The schedule of principal and interest payments due on the Notes is set forth on the Debt Service Schedule attached hereto as Exhibit D-2 and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Schedule").

Section 3. Redemption Provisions. The Notes are not subject to optional redemption.

Section 4. Form of the Notes. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Tax Provisions.

- (A) Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the year 2021 for the payments due in the year 2022 in the amount set forth on the Schedule.
- (B) Tax Collection. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the County shall be and continue without power to repeal such levy or obstruct the collection of said tax until all such payments have been made or provided for. After the issuance of the Notes, said tax shall be, from year to year, carried onto the tax roll of the County and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected, except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.
- (C) Additional Funds. If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said Notes when due, the requisite amounts shall be paid from other funds of the County then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

Section 6. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account.

(A) Creation and Deposits. There be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the County, if one has not already been created, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted

accounting principles. Debt service or sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the County may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund.

87

Within the debt service fund, there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Fund Account for Taxable General Obligation Promissory Notes" (the "Debt Service Fund Account") and such account shall be maintained until the indebtedness evidenced by the Notes is fully paid or otherwise extinguished. There shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund Account (i) all accrued interest received by the County at the time of delivery of and payment for the Notes; (ii) any premium which may be received by the County above the par value of the Notes and accrued interest thereon; (iii) all money raised by the taxes herein levied and any amounts appropriated for the specific purpose of meeting principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (iv) such other sums as may be necessary at any time to pay principal of and interest on the Notes when due; (v) surplus monies in the Borrowed Money Fund as specified below; and (vi) such further deposits as may be required by Section 67.11, Wisconsin Statutes.

(B) Use and Investment. No money shall be withdrawn from the Debt Service Fund Account and appropriated for any purpose other than the payment of principal of and interest on the Notes until all such principal and interest has been paid in full and the Notes canceled; provided (i) the funds to provide for each payment of principal of and interest on the Notes prior to the scheduled receipt of taxes from the next succeeding tax collection may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America maturing in time to make such payments when they are due or in other investments permitted by law; and (ii) any funds over and above the amount of such principal and interest payments on the Notes may be used to reduce the next succeeding tax levy, or may, at the option of the County, be invested by purchasing the Notes as permitted by and subject to Section 67.11(2)(a), Wisconsin Statutes, or in permitted municipal investments under the pertinent provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes ("Permitted Investments"), which investments shall continue to be a part of the Debt Service Fund Account.

(C) Remaining Monies. When all of the Notes have been paid in full and canceled, and all Permitted Investments disposed of, any money remaining in the Debt Service Fund Account shall be transferred and deposited in the general fund of the County, unless the County Board of Supervisors directs otherwise.

Section 7. Proceeds of the Notes; Segregated Borrowed Money Fund. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into a special fund (the "Borrowed Money Fund") separate and distinct from all other funds of the County and disbursed solely for the purpose or purposes for which borrowed. In no event shall monies in the Borrowed Money Fund be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes. Monies in the Borrowed Money Fund may be temporarily invested in Permitted Investments. Any monies, including any income from Permitted Investments, remaining in the Borrowed Money Fund after the purpose or purposes for which the Notes have been issued have been accomplished, and, at any time, any monies as are not needed and which

obviously thereafter cannot be needed for such purpose(s) shall be deposited in the Debt Service Fund Account.

Section 8. Execution of the Notes; Closing; Professional Services. The Notes shall be issued in printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by the Fiscal Agent (defined below), sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery (the "Closing"). The facsimile signature of either of the officers executing the Notes may be imprinted on the Notes in lieu of the manual signature of the officer but, unless the County has contracted with a fiscal agent to authenticate the Notes, at least one of the signatures appearing on each Note shall be a manual signature. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the Closing, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until the Closing. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized and directed to do all acts and execute and deliver the Notes and all such documents, certificates and acknowledgements as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing. The County hereby authorizes the officers and agents of the County to enter into, on its behalf, agreements and contracts in conjunction with the Notes, including but not limited to agreements and contracts for legal, trust, fiscal agency, disclosure and continuing disclosure, and rebate calculation services. Any such contract heretofore entered into in conjunction with the issuance of the Notes is hereby ratified and approved in all respects.

Section 9. Payment of the Notes; Fiscal Agent. The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid by the County Clerk or County Treasurer (the "Fiscal Agent").

Section 10. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall cause books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes to be kept by the Fiscal Agent. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the Fiscal Agent, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the Fiscal Agent shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The Fiscal Agent shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

Section 11. Record Date. The 15th day of the calendar month next preceding the interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes (the "Record Date"). Payment of interest on

the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the Record Date.

Section 12. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations, which the County Clerk or other authorized representative of the County is authorized and directed to execute and deliver to DTC on behalf of the County to the extent an effective Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations is not presently on file in the County Clerk's office.

Section 13. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Notes and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" as of its date for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"). All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda to it or final Official Statement are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the Closing, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and any addenda or final Official Statement to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 14. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the owners of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") required by the Rule to provide continuing disclosure of timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the owners of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such owners (provided that the rights of the owners and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

To the extent required under the Rule, the Chairperson and County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 15. Record Book. The County Clerk shall provide and keep the transcript of proceedings as a separate record book (the "Record Book") and shall record a full and correct statement of every step or proceeding had or taken in the course of authorizing and issuing the Notes in the Record Book.

Section 16. Bond Insurance. If the Purchaser determines to obtain municipal bond insurance with respect to the Notes, the officers of the County are authorized to take all actions necessary to obtain such municipal bond insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as the bond insurer may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Note proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond

insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Notes by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, any reference required by the bond insurer to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Note provided herein.

Section 17. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

Excerpts of Minutes of Meeting of the County Board of Supervisors of Juneau County

A meeting of the County Board of Supervisors of Juneau County, Wisconsin, was duly called, noticed, held and conducted in the manner required by the County Board of Supervisors and the pertinent Wisconsin Statutes on December 21, 2021. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. The Chairperson and 18 other members were present. The following members were absent: Tim Cottingham

The following resolution was then moved by Chris Zinder Fand seconded by James Parist :

RESOLUTION NO. 21-75

SYNOPSIS: Authorizing Juneau County to Enter Into the Settlement Agreements with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Corporation, Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho-McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and Janssen Pharmaceutica, Inc., Agree to the Terms of the MOU Allocating Settlement Proceeds, and Authorize Entry Into the MOU with the Attorney General

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors has authorized the County to enter into an engagement agreement with von Briesen & Roper, s.c., Crueger Dickinson LLC and Simmons Hanly Conroy LLC (the "Law Firms") to pursue litigation against certain manufacturers, distributors, and retailers of opioid pharmaceuticals (the "Opioid Defendants") in an effort to hold the Opioid Defendants financially responsible for the County's expenditure of vast money and resources to combat the opioid epidemic; and

WHEREAS, on behalf of the County, the Law Firms filed a lawsuit against the Opioid Defendants; and

WHEREAS, the Law Firms filed similar lawsuits on behalf of 66 other Wisconsin counties and all Wisconsin cases were coordinated with thousands of other lawsuits filed against the same or substantially similar parties as the Opioid Defendants in the Northern District of Ohio, captioned *In re: Opioid Litigation*, MDL 2804 (the "Litigation"); and

WHEREAS, four (4) additional Wisconsin counties (Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, and Walworth) hired separate counsel and joined the Litigation; and

WHEREAS, since the inception of the Litigation, the Law Firms have coordinated with counsel from around the country (including counsel for Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, and Walworth Counties) to prepare the County's case for trial and engage in extensive settlement discussions with the Opioid Defendants; and

WHEREAS, the settlement discussions with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Corporation, Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho-McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and Janssen Pharmaceutica, Inc. (the "Settling Defendants") resulted in a tentative agreement as to settlement terms pending agreement from the County and other plaintiffs involved in the Litigation; and

WHEREAS, copies of the Distributors Settlement Agreement and Janssen Settlement Agreement (collectively "Settlement Agreements") representing the terms of the tentative settlement agreements with the Settling Defendants have been provided with this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Settlement Agreements provide, among other things, for the payment of certain sums to Participating Subdivisions (as defined in the Settlement Agreements) upon the occurrence of certain events detailed in the Settlement Agreements; and

WHEREAS, the County is a Participating Subdivision in the Settlement Agreements and has the opportunity to participate in the benefits associated with the Settlement Agreement provided the County (a) approves the Settlement Agreements; (b) approves the Memorandum of Understanding allocating proceeds from the Settlement Agreements among the various Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions, a copy of which is attached to this Resolution (the "Allocation MOU"); (c) approves the Memorandum of Understanding with the Wisconsin Attorney General regarding allocation of settlement proceeds, a copy of which is attached to this Resolution (the "AG MOU"); and (d) the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance approves the terms of the Settlement Agreements and the AG MOU; and

WHEREAS, 2021 Wisconsin Act 57 created Section 165.12 of the Wisconsin Statutes relating to the settlement of all or part of the Litigation; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2), the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance is required to approve the Settlement Agreements and the AG MOU; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2), the proceeds from any settlement of all or part of the Litigation are distributed 70% to local governments in Wisconsin that are parties to the Litigation and 30% to the State; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 165.12(4)(b)2. provides the proceeds from the Settlement Agreement must be deposited in a segregated account (the "Opioid Abatement Account") and may be expended only for approved uses for opioid abatement as provided in the Settlement Agreements; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. § 165.12(7) bars claims from any Wisconsin local government against the Opioid Defendants filed after June 1, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the definition of Participating Subdivisions in the Settlement Agreements recognizes a statutory bar on claims such as that set forth in Wis. Stat. § 165.12(7) and, as a result, the only Participating Subdivisions in Wisconsin are those counties and municipalities that were parties to the Litigation (or otherwise actively litigating a claim against one, some, or all of the Opioid Defendants) as of June 1, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance is not statutorily authorized or required to approve the allocation of proceeds of the Settlement Agreements among Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, the Law Firms have engaged in extensive discussions with counsel for all other Wisconsin Participating Subdivisions resulting in the proposed Allocation MOU, which is an agreement between all of the entities identified in the Allocation MOU as to how the proceeds payable to those entities under the Settlement Agreements will be allocated; and

WHEREAS, there is provided with this Resolution a summary of the essential terms of the Settlement Agreements, the deadlines related to the effective dates of the Settlement Agreements, the ramifications associated with the County's refusal to enter into the Settlement Agreements, the form of the Allocation MOU, the form of the AG MOU, and an overview of the process for finalizing the Settlement Agreements; and

WHEREAS, the County, by this Resolution, shall establish the Opioid Abatement Account for the receipt of the proceeds of the Settlement Agreements consistent with the terms of this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the County's Opioid Abatement Account shall be separate from the County's general fund, shall not be commingled with any other County funds, and shall be dedicated to funding opioid abatement measures as provided in the Settlement Agreements; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the County's engagement agreement with the Law Firms, the County shall pay up to an amount equal to 25% of the proceeds from successful resolution of all or part of the Litigation, whether through settlement or otherwise, plus the Law Firms' costs and disbursements, to the Law Firms as compensation for the Law Firms' efforts in the Litigation and any settlement; and

WHEREAS, the Law Firms anticipate making application to the national fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements seeking payment, in whole or part, of the fees, costs, and disbursements owed the Law Firms pursuant to the engagement agreement with the County; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated the amount of any award from the fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements will be insufficient to satisfy the County's obligations under the engagement agreement with the Law Firms; and

WHEREAS, the County, by this Resolution, and pursuant to the authority granted the County in the applicable Order emanating from the Litigation in relation to the Settlement Agreements and payment of attorney fees, shall execute an Escrow Agreement, which shall among other things direct the escrow agent responsible for the receipt and distribution of the proceeds from the Settlement Agreements to establish an account for the purpose of segregating funds to pay the fees, costs, and disbursements of the Law Firms owed by the County (the "Attorney Fees Account") in order to fund a state-level "backstop" for payment of the fees, costs, and disbursements of the Law Firms; and

WHEREAS, in no event shall payments to the Law Firms out of the Attorney Fees Account and the fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements exceed an amount equal to 25% of the amounts allocated to the County in the Allocation MOU; and

WHEREAS, the intent of this Resolution is to authorize the County to enter into the Settlement Agreements, the Allocation MOU, and the AG MOU, establish the County's Opioid Abatement Account, and establish the Attorney Fees Account; and

WHEREAS, the County, by this Resolution, shall authorize the County's corporation counsel to finalize and execute any escrow agreement and other document or agreement necessary to effectuate the Settlement Agreements and the other agreements referenced herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does approve:

- The execution of the Distributors Settlement Agreement and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Board Chair to execute same.
- 2. The execution of the Janssen Settlement Agreement and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Board Chair to execute same.
- 3. The final negotiation and execution of the Allocation MOU in form substantially similar to that presented with this Resolution and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Board Chair to execute same upon finalization provided the percentage share identified as allocated to the County is substantially similar to that identified in the Allocation MOU provided to the Board with this Resolution.
- 4. The final negotiation and execution of the AG MOU in form substantially similar to that presented with this Resolution and any and all documents ancillary thereto and authorizes the Board Chair to execute same.
- 5. The corporation counsel's negotiation and execution of the Escrow Agreement for the receipt and disbursement of the proceeds of the Settlement Agreements as referenced in the Allocation MOU.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: the County hereby establishes an account separate and distinct from the County's general fund which shall be titled "Opioid Abatement Account." All proceeds from the Settlement Agreements not otherwise directed to the Attorney Fees Account established under the Escrow Agreement shall be deposited in the Opioid Abatement Account. The Opioid Abatement Account shall be administered consistent with the terms of this Resolution, Wis. Stat. § 165.12(4), and the Settlement Agreements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: the County hereby authorizes the escrow agent under the Escrow Agreement to establish an account separate and distinct from any account containing funds allocated or allocable to the County which shall be referred to by the County as the "Attorney Fees Account." The escrow agent shall deposit a sum equal to up to, but in no event exceeding, an amount equal to 20% of the County's proceeds from the Settlement Agreements into the Attorney Fees Account. If the payments to the County are not enough to fully fund the Attorney Fees Account as provided herein because such payments are made over time, the Attorney Fees Account shall be funded by placing up to, but in no event exceeding, an amount equal to 20% of the proceeds from the Settlement Agreements attributable to Local Governments (as that term is defined in the Allocation MOU) into the Attorney Fees Account for each payment. Funds in the Attorney Fees Account shall be utilized to pay the fees, costs, and disbursements owed to the Law Firms pursuant to the engagement agreement between the County and the Law Firms provided, however, the Law Firms shall receive no more than that to which they are entitled under their fee contract when considering the amounts paid the Law Firms from the fee fund established in the Settlement Agreements and allocable to the County. The Law Firms may make application for payment from the Attorney Fees Account at any time and the County shall cooperate with the Law Firms in executing any documents necessary for the escrow agent to make payments out of the Attorney Fees Account.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all actions heretofore taken by the Board of Supervisors and other appropriate public officers and agents of the County with respect to the matters contemplated under this Resolution are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

WISCONSIN STATE-LOCAL GOVERNMENT MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin ("State"), its communities, and their people have been harmed by misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance committed by certain entities that engage in or have engaged in the manufacture, marketing, promotion, distribution or dispensing of an opioid analgesic, including but not limited to those persons or entities identified as Defendants in the matter captioned *In re: Opioid Litigation*, MDL 2804 pending in the United States District Court for the Northern District of Ohio ("Litigation");

WHEREAS, certain Wisconsin local governments identified on the attached Exhibit A ("Local Governments"), through their counsel, and the State of Wisconsin, through its Attorney General, are separately engaged in investigations, litigation, and settlement discussions seeking to hold the Defendants in the Litigation accountable for the damage caused by their misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance;

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin and the Local Governments share a common desire to abate and alleviate the impacts of the misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance described above throughout the State of Wisconsin and in its local communities;

WHEREAS, the settlement discussions with McKesson Corporation, Cardinal Health, Inc., AmerisourceBergen Corporation, Johnson & Johnson, Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Ortho-McNeil-Janssen Pharmaceuticals, Inc., and Janssen Pharmaceutica, Inc. ("Settling Defendants") resulted in tentative agreements as to settlement terms ("Settlement Agreements") pending agreement from the State of Wisconsin, the Local Governments and other parties involved in the Litigation;

WHEREAS, the Settlement Agreements provide, among other things, for the payment of certain sums to Participating Subdivisions (as defined in the Settlement Agreements) upon the occurrence of certain events detailed in the Settlement Agreements;

WHEREAS, while the Local Governments and the State recognize that the sums which may be available from the aforementioned Settlement Agreements will likely be insufficient to fully abate the public health crisis caused by the Opioid epidemic, they share a common interest in dedicating the most resources possible to the abatement effort;

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin enacted Wis. Stat. § 165.12 which provides for an allocation of opioid settlement proceeds; and

WHEREAS, the State and the Local Governments intend this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") to effectuate the terms of the Settlement Agreements in a manner consistent with Wis. Stat. § 165.12(2).

NOW, THEREFORE, the State and the Local Governments, enter into this MOU upon the terms described herein.

A. Settlement Proceeds

- 1. As used in this MOU, the term "Opioid Settlement Proceeds" shall mean all funds allocated by a Settlement Agreement to the State or Local Governments for purposes of opioid remediation activities, as well as any repayment of those funds and any interest or investment earnings that may accrue as those funds are temporarily held before being expended on opioid remediation strategies. "Opioid Settlement Proceeds" do <u>not</u> include the "additional restitution," reimbursement of the United States Government, or separate funds identified in the Settlement Agreements as payment of the Parties' litigation fees, expenses, and/or costs.
- 2. The Settlement Administrator shall directly distribute the Opioid Settlement Proceeds to the State and to Local Governments in such proportions and for such uses as set forth in this MOU.
- 3. Opioid Settlement Proceeds shall be allocated as follows: (i) 30% to the State of Wisconsin ("State Share"); and (ii) 70% to Local Governments ("LG Share"). Opioid Settlement Proceeds shall not be considered funds of the State or any Local Government unless and until such time as each annual distribution is made.
- 4. 100% of the "Additional Restitution Amount" identified in both Settlement Agreements shall be paid to the State and deposited with the Department of Health Services.
- 5. Except for Opioid Settlement Funds expended in payment of attorney fees as provided in Wis. Stat. § 165.12(6), all Opioid Settlement Proceeds, regardless of allocation, and the entire "Additional Restitution Amount," shall, consistent with Wis. Stat. § 165.12(3) and (4), be utilized only for purposes identified as approved uses for abatement in the Settlement Agreements.
- 6. If any portion of the LG Share is used for the payment of owed attorney fees as authorized under Wis. Stat. § 165.12(6), the Local Governments shall report to the Attorney General and the Joint Committee on Finance the amount of the payment(s) and provide the contract(s) under which the attorney fees are purportedly owed.
 - Notwithstanding any limitations or characterization of funds herein to the contrary, any payments for attorneys' fees and expenses may only be paid for out of the owing Local Governments' share.
- 7. The LG Share shall be paid to each Local Government by the Settlement Administrator based on the allocation created and agreed to by the Local Governments which assigns

- each Local Government a percentage share of the LG Share, less any applicable attorney fees as authorized under Wis. Stat. § 165.12(6) and referenced above.
- 8. Nothing in this MOU is intended to alter or change any Local Government's right to pursue its own claim. Rather, the intent of this MOU is to provide a mechanism for the receipt and expenditure of Opioid Settlement Proceeds. Notwithstanding the foregoing, only Local Governments who are Participating Subdivisions under the Settlement Agreements, and who agree to the terms of this MOU may directly receive Opioid Settlement Proceeds.
- 9. Notwithstanding any limitations or characterization of funds herein to the contrary, any payments for attorney's fees and expenses may be applied only to the LG Share or any Local Government share of the LG Share. The State shall have no responsibility for payment of attorneys' fees or litigation expenses.
- 10. The parties understand that the United States may claim a portion of the Opioid Settlement Proceeds for Medicaid reimbursement. The parties agree that, to the extent a claim for Medicaid reimbursement is made, the parties shall bear the liability for the reimbursement on a pro rata basis based upon the particular claims made by the United States related to the Medicaid reimbursement. The parties agree to meet, confer, and cooperate in good faith concerning the allocation of any such liability.
- 11. This MOU may be executed in counterparts. Electronic signatures shall in all respects be considered valid and binding.
