# VILLAGE ADOPTS FISCAL YEAR 2024-2025 BUDGET

At the Village Board meeting on April 22nd, the Village Board approved the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 budget. The FY 2024-2025 budget begins on May 1, 2024, and runs through April 30, 2025. The Village's budget is prepared through a collaborative effort by Village staff under the direction of the Village Administrator and is presented to the Village Board for review and adoption before the beginning of each fiscal year (May 1st). The Village's budget funds all major operating areas, such as police, administration, and public works. Additionally, the Village's budget accounts for all major capital improvements that are proposed within a 5-year increment.

The Village's budget consists of separate funds based on the various activities of the Village's operations. One of the biggest funds in the Village's budget is the General Fund. The General Fund provides several major municipal services, including administration, streets, building and grounds, engineering and building, and the police department.

The Village follows a priority-based budgeting approach where more funding is dedicated to line items and operating areas within the budget allocation based on achieving priorities identified by the Village Board and the community. This year's budget includes funding for the following goals:



#### Timely Repair of Streets & Driving Condition of Village Streets

This budget year marks a huge year for infrastructure projects, with over \$2.1 million invested in Village Streets. The Village has begun Phase I of the Lake Shore Drive Reconstruction Project, which will reconstruct the mainly rural road to a curb and gutter urban cross-section, while widening the roadways and improving stormwater drainage. Reconstruction of the roadway will also enhance pedestrian travel by extending the sidewalk from Beck Road. In addition to the Lake Shore Drive Reconstruction Project, 2.58 miles of Village streets will be resurfaced as part of the 2024 resurfacing schedule.

# FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK



Dominic Marturano Property Taxes Refresher

As Mayor, the Village Board and I often hear feedback from our residents expressing concern about high property taxes from the Village. Although we understand the concerns about your property taxes, it's important to clarify that while your property taxes do contribute to the Village's operation, it's only a small portion— about 3% (3 cents for every dollar) of property taxes paid.


So where *does* that 3% go?

- Police Pension- The Village is obligated by State law to fund our Police Officer's pensions. The amount for police pension contributions is determined annually by our actuaries.
- Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF)-The Village's portion to provide retirement benefits for all full-time, non-sworn, employees.
- Social Security- The Village's obligation as an employer.
- Liability Insurance- The Village's portion of liability and workers' compensation insurance premiums.
- Corporate Fund- After fulfilling the commitments above, the remaining portion contributes to the Village's corporate Fund, which supports Village operations for administration, police, buildings and grounds, building and

engineering, and street operations.

In December 2023, the Village Board passed the Village's 2023 Property Tax Levy (payable in 2024) in the amount of \$1,337,325. This amount can change slightly based on adjustments made by Lake County. For reference, we estimate the Village's property tax levy on a \$250,000 home will be approximately \$264.36, which is a 4.3% decrease when compared to the previous tax year.

Rest assured, we understand residents' concerns about their property taxes; that's why the Village is committed to being fiscally responsible by maintaining our low tax rate as compared to other taxing bodies.

# YARD WASTE COLLECTION BEGINS APRIL 1ST

Landscape waste collection with the Village's contracted waste hauler, Groot, began on Monday, April 1st. This service for residents will run weekly through November 25th. Residents can dispose of grass clippings, shrubbery, small tree limbs, weeds, and leaves through this program.

To participate in the landscape collection service, residents can utilize the following options:

- **Sticker Service:** Residents may purchase stickers at \$2.50 each to be placed on 32 gallon containers or a kraft bag. There is no limit to the number of containers that may be placed curbside that have a sticker on them. Stickers may be purchased at Village Hall (2301 E. Sand Lake Road) and CVS (2020 E. Grand Avenue).
- **Subscription Service:** Residents may opt into the subscription service for yard waste collection. This service is \$175 for 2024. With the subscription, residents may place up to four 32 gallon containers or kraft style bags each week; any additional containers would require a sticker. To set up this service, please contact Groot at 847-693-2700.



# 50/50 PROGRAMS

Lindenhurst offers reimbursement to residents that have planted a tree, added shoreline buffer plantings or purchased a rain barrel and/or compost bin.

- Program dollars will be dispersed by the Village to the homeowner after proof of purchase and residency.
- Households may participate one time during the Village's fiscal year (May 1- April 30).
- Residents must submit a receipt to Village Hall for reimbursement.
- First-come, first-served basis as budgeted funds are available.

These programs also help the Village further our sustainability efforts by enhancing our forestry landscape, preserving the shorelines of our lakes, improving stormwater drainage, and reducing water consumption. The first location for Village Hall was Trustee Skelton's house

on Fairfield Road. The Village had continued to use the homes of the Trustees until a developer, Mort Engle, offered for the Village to use an old outbuilding at the Lehmann Estate. After the building was destroyed by a fire in the 1970's, the Village relocated to the Lindenhurst Center (Plaza). The Village later purchased property just east of Sand Lake and Grand Avenue to construct Village Hall in 1974. Village hall was constructed the same year, and was able to house Village Administration, Police Department, Public Works, and the Park Department.

# STAY SAFE ON THE ROAD THIS SUMMER: TIPS FOR DRIVERS AND BIKERS

# SUSTAINABILITY TIP: PROTECTING OUR WATERSHED

With the weather getting nicer as summer goes on, many residents often use various ways to take care of their lawn. When maintaining your yard, please avoid using phosphorous fertilizers. When it rains, the phosphorous from the fertilizers is washed off lawns and ultimately flows into the lakes. This type of pollution from runoff is harmful to our lakes and can produce algal blooms that decrease the oxygen levels of the lake water and kill fish. Like many communities, the Village does not allow the use of fertilizers that contain phosphorous, but it is up to residents to confirm that the products they use are allowable.

# LAKE COUNTY HOUSING REPORT

According to a report sponsored by Lake County Partners in 2023, fostering a diverse housing stock is crucial for attracting and retaining residents and businesses in Lake County. The report recommends that communities in Lake County consider housing needs in various life stages, ages, income levels, and family sizes-- moving beyond the predominant owner-occupied single-family detached homes to ensure a range of housing options.

The lack of housing diversity poses a significant challenge in attracting and retaining a skilled workforce, a concern exacerbated by an aging population and a projected decline in the working-age population. Between 2018 and 2022, new residential development within the County averaged only 1,200 units per year, falling well below the near and long-term household projections. If left unaddressed, this trend will result in a significant housing shortage over time, potentially hindering the county's economic growth and business expansion. While Lake County is projected to experience modest growth in the next five years, the anticipated increase in senior households with incomes of \$50,000 or more and households under the age of 65 with incomes of \$100,000 or more will generate a demand of 17,700 market-rate owner and renter units.

Addressing the housing needs in all communities within Lake County is crucial for ensuring a high quality of life for residents and fosterina a conducive environment for new business growth and economic development. Having a diverse and affordable housing options can also attract and retain a talented workforce, enabling businesses to tap into a skilled labor pool. Additionally, new housing developments can spur commercial and retail growth which will help create a vibrant and thriving community that attracts further investment and economic activity.
