2023 Road Resurfacing Wrap-Up

The 2023 Road Resurfacing Project has come to a close. This year's road project covered 1.2 miles of Village streets that included:

- Constitution Drive (West of Independence)
- Constitution Court (West of Independence)
- Gettysburg Court
- Providence Lane
- Springhill Lane
- Mallard Drive
- Munn Road (South of Mallard Ridge)

In addition to the 1.2 miles of roadway that was resurfaced, the contractors on the project replaced 2,290 feet of curb, 4,800 lineal feet of sidewalks, and reconstructed 22 sanitary and stormwater manholes. We appreciate resident's patience and understanding while the resurfacing project took place to improve our Village streets. Citizens' Academy Recap The Village of Lindenhurst successfully concluded the 2023 Citizens' Academy Program, marking its return after a hiatus since 2019. This initiative aims to foster a deeper understanding of the Village's daily operations among its residents, ultimately promoting greater transparency and community engagement.

The Citizens' Academy Program is designed to educate participants on the inner workings of Village departments, including Administration, Police, and Public Works. Through a series of informative workshops, residents had the opportunity to gain insights into the policies and procedures of each department.

Throughout the eight weeks of workshops, residents gained an in-depth understanding on the Village's financial and management policies, along with learning about the Police Department's patrol operations.

Additionally, residents learned about street maintenance, snow operations, and water distribution. Participants also toured the Wastewater Treatment Plant to learn about the treatment process.

Landscape Collection Now- Nov 27

Landscape waste collection with the Village's contracted waste hauler, Groot began on April 3rd. This service for residents will run weekly through November 27th. Landscape waste includes grass, shrubbery, small tree limbs and weeds. **Residents may have unlimited bags or 33 gallon cans of leaves from October 16th – November 27th; no stickers needed.**

To participate in landscape collection services, residents can utilize the following options:

- <u>Sticker service</u>: Each sticker is \$2.50, and one must be affixed to each 32-gallon container or Kraft bag placed curbside each week. There is no limit to the number of containers that may be placed curbside with sticker service.
- <u>Subscription service:</u> This service is \$170 for 2023. Residents may place up to four 32-gallon containers or Kraft style bags curbside each week; any additional containers would require a sticker.

The next time you're on a "Dunkin' Run", consider the history behind the crossroads of Sand Lake Road and Route 45. Originally known as "Dodges Corners" in the mid 1800's, this area was home to Reverend William Dodge, head pastor of the Millburn Congregational Church and President of

50/50 Programs

Lindenhurst offers reimbursement to residents that have planted a tree, added shoreline buffer plantings or purchased a rain barrel and/or compost bin.

- Program dollars will be dispersed by the Village to the homeowner after proof of purchase and residency.
- Households may participate one time during the Village's fiscal year (May 1- April 30).
- Residents must submit a receipt to Village Hall for reimbursement.
- First-come, first-served basis as budgeted funds are available.


Utility Bill Online Payment Options

Residents can take advantage of the Village's online utility bill system, at no additional cost. Sign Up For Smart911

Plan ahead for any emergency by signing up for Smart911. Smart911 is a free online sign-up service for anyone with a phone.

Signing up for Smart911 allows users to create a profile that includes important information, such as pets in the home, vehicle descriptions, emergency contacts, and medical conditions. If responding to an emergency call, first responders can see this information within Smart911 and provide a more detailed and rapid response to that specific individuals. Winter is Coming!

With the winter months quickly approaching, the Village's Public Works Department wanted to offer a few reminders and some tips as you prepare your household for the season.

Snow Season Preparation

- When doing yard work, be sure not to blow or rake the fallen leaves onto the road. Instead, take advantage of Groot's free leaf collection service! Residents are able to place leaves into a container or yard waste bag for pickup through November 27th. Without proper disposal, the leaves may clog the catch basins and impact the Village's storm sewer system.
- Relocate basketball hoops placed at the end of driveways. Basketball rims are often set to regulation height of 10 feet, which is the perfect height to take out a side mirror on a snow plow truck.

Snow Season Reminders & Tips

 During snow operations, mailboxes can fall prey to the path of the snow created by the snow plow. Inspect your mailbox post to ensure it is in good condition and is set properly. A proper mailbox is set 6-8 inches behind the curb or edge of gravel and is 41-46 inches off the ground when measuring from the door opening of a mailbox.

- When shoveling or snow blowing your driveway, remember not to deposit the snow onto the roadway. Depositing the snow in the roadway increases the chance of the snow bonding to the roadway and increases the time spent cleaning the roads with the addition of deicing agents.
- Snow plow operations will deposit a windrow of snow, which results in the creation of a piled trail of snow from the angle of the plow, into the approach of your driveway. This step is unavoidable when performing snow operations to ensure clearing the roads for travel. To lesson the amount of snow that may be deposited in your driveway, shovel 4-6 feet of the shoulder of the approaching lane of travel. This will open a pocket for snow to roll off the plow blade sooner and not enter the approach of your driveway.
