Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the North Mankato City Council was held in the Municipal Building Council Chambers on March 7, 2022. Mayor Dehen called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm, asking that everyone join in the Pledge of Allegiance. The following were present for roll call: Council Members Norland, Oachs, Whitlock and Steiner, Interim City Administrator Fischer, Finance Director McCann, and City Clerk Van Genderen.

Approval of Agenda

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to approve the agenda as presented. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval of Council Minutes from February 22, 2022, Council Meeting.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the Council meeting minutes of February 22, 2022. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval of Council Work Session Minutes from February 28, 2022, Meeting.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to approve the Council Work Session Minutes from February 28, 2022. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval of Special Council Meeting Minutes from February 28, 2022, Meeting.

Council Member Oachs, moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to approve the Special Council Meeting Minutes from February 28, 2022. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Public Hearing, 7 pm. Consider Amending City Code Chapter 11: Precinct Boundaries.

City Clerk Van Genderen reported that since the State redistricting plan has been adopted, all cities must establish or reestablish their precinct boundaries and designate their polling places as required under Minn. Stat. 204B.14 subd. 3 (e). The City must complete the process by March 29, 2022. The City of North Mankato has the City's precinct boundaries codified, so the City must adopt an Ordinance to change the precinct boundaries. The proposed boundary changes will assist with the organization of the election process. Precincts are basic geographic areas for organizing and administering elections. Each precinct has separate voting rosters and voting ballot styles. Precincts are not tied to population size. The City does not have to redistrict, but the City can redistrict to accommodate population growth and changes. Several of the Cities precincts are approaching 2,000 registered voters, so the staff proposes changes to manage the growth. The preferred precinct plan is included in the packet. With no one appearing, the Mayor closed the Public Hearing.

Consent Agenda

Council Member Oachs moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to approve the Consent Agenda.

Council Member Steiner questioned the \$34,500 paid to Taft Law and requested Attorney Kennedy return to the City Council Meetings. Mr. Steiner did not believe Attorney Weinberg should be acting as City Attorney. Finance Director McCann reported that he believes the majority of the payment to Taft was payment to the bond attorneys, not for Attorney Weinberg's services. Bond attorneys are very specialized, and there are only two or three in the region. Additional discussion was held concerning attorney presence at the meeting.

Vote on the motion Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen, aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Public Comments Concerning Business Items on the Agenda. None.

Business Items

Ordinance No. 148 An Ordinance of North Mankato, Minnesota Amending North Mankato City Code Chapter 11.01 Precinct Boundaries.

Mayor Dehen commented that the staff presented two options, and the preferred option captures the growth and allows for additional growth in areas destined to grow.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Oachs, to Adopt Ordinance No. 148 An Ordinance of North Mankato, Minnesota Amending North Mankato City Code Chapter 11.01 Precinct Boundaries. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 25-22 Establishing Precincts and Polling Places.

City Clerk Van Genderen noted that the City must also designate polling locations with the redistricting of the precinct boundaries. She pointed out that the City no longer utilizes the assisted living locations for Precinct 4 or Precinct 7. Instead, the City will use River Ridge Evangelical Church located at 354 Carol Court for precinct 4 and South Central Services Cooperative at 2075 Lookout Drive for precinct 7. City Clerk Van Genderen commented that the two residences in Blue Earth County are precinct 30 and a part of a mail district.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Oachs, to Adopt Res. No. 25-22 Establishing Precincts and Polling Places. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Receive Updates on the MAPO Highway 169 Corridor Study.

Angie Bersaw, Bolton & Menk appeared before Council to present the Hwy 169 Corridor Study. She reported that the study had been completed, and MAPO is reporting the plan results to the Cities and Counties impacted by the study. The study area is from Lake Street to the Highway 60/169 interchange. The study was divided into three subareas. The Northern Subarea is from Lake Street to the Veteran's Bridge. Ms. Bersaw noted the study provided several recommendations. Recommendations at the Highway 14/169 intersection included the installation of a stoplight to facilitate movement. Recommendations also included closing Lind Street and moving the intersection to North River Lane with a roundabout or signals. The intersection at Webster Avenue would remain fully open with either a roundabout or signals. Ms. Bersaw noted that the timing of the improvements would be dependent on MnDOT funding. The Middle Subarea includes the Veteran's Bridge access onto Belgrade. She said there were several recommendations and included the possibility of a roundabout. There are improvements planned in 2025 for pedestrian mobility improvements on the

Veteran's Bridge. Ms. Bersaw reviewed the recommendation for Riverfront Dr. in Mankato as part of the Middle Subarea. She also reviewed the Southern Subarea reviewing proposals which are located in Mankato. She noted the next steps would be to pursue funding for the project, and partner agencies would need to conduct additional planning/design work as required.

Rhonda Allis, District 7 Planning Director from MnDOT, appeared before Council and reviewed the MnDOT funding process. Ms. Allis noted that the North Mankato City staff worked with MnDOT to review the ramp at Belgrade/Hwy 169. An I.C.E. study was conducted to examine the consideration of a roundabout at the intersection. She stated MnDOT would like to present the information to the City Council.

Council Member Oachs requested clarification on the City's contribution to the proposed changes. Ms. Allis reported there would be cost participation if the project extended beyond MnDOT property.

Res. No. 26-22 Resolution of Support for the Mankato/North Mankato Area Planning Organization (MAPO) Highway 169 Corridor.

Interim City Administrator Fischer reported that the resolution would support the MAPO Highway 169 Corridor Study. He noted all the other partners had passed similar resolutions of support. Mayor Dehen commented that the Resolution preserves the Webster Avenue/169 full access.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland adopted Res. No. 26-22 Resolution of Support for the Mankato/North Mankato Area Planning Organization (MAPO) Highway 169 Corridor. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 27-22 Approving Plans and Specifications and Ordering Advertisement for Bids Project No. 21-05 ABCDEF Lor Ray Drive Improvement Project.

City Engineer Sarff reported the plans and specifications had been prepared for the Lor Ray Drive Improvement Project. The proposed improvements are essentially the same as those presented with the Preliminary Engineering Report and subsequent City Council discussions. He reported the project location is from Lor Ray Drive from approximately 250 feet north of White Oak Drive to Somerset Lane. He noted the improvements include Sanitary Sewer, Watermain, Storm Sewer, and Street and Surface improvements. The estimated construction amount is \$3,764,000. Additional expenses include a right of way/easement costs of \$76,000 and Street Light Poles and Fixtures purchased directly by the City of \$32,000 for a total estimated project cost of \$3,872,000. He reported estimated funding includes \$1,100,000 from the Coronavirus Relief Fund, \$575,000 from the Local Road Improvement Program Grant, \$400,000 from the Municipal State Aid Funds, and the Remaining \$1,797,000 from assessments and GO Bonds.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Oachs, to adopt Res. No. 27-22 Approving Plans and Specifications and Ordering Advertisement for Bids Project No. 21-05 ABCDEF Lor Ray Drive Improvement Project. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 28-22 Declaring Costs to be Assessed, and Ordering Preparation of Proposed Assessment Project No. 21-06 ABCDEF McKinley Avenue Street & Utility Improvement Project.

City Engineer Sarff appeared before Council and stated he would discuss Res. No. 28-22 and 29-22. He reported bids were received and opened on Tuesday, March 1 at 11:00 am for the McKinley

Avenue Street & Utility Improvement Project. This project includes street and utility reconstruction of McKinley Avenue from Sherman Street to Range Street. Two bids were received:

Kuechle Underground, Inc.	\$1,895,195.50

The engineer's estimate was \$1,373,100. The low bidder for the project is Holtmeier Construction, Inc. from Mankato, Minnesota. Based on the past performance with Holtmeier Construction, Inc., staff recommends awarding the bid to Holtmeier Construction. Standard city practice for projects involving special assessments is to hold the assessment hearing before awarding the contract for the project. Finance Director McCann has prepared the proposed assessment roll. Staff is requesting Council adopt the resolution declaring costs to be assessed and setting the Public Hearing for April 4, 2022, at 7 pm.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to adopt Res. No. 28-22 Declaring Costs to be Assessed, and Ordering Preparation of Proposed Assessment Project No. 21-06 ABCDEF McKinley Avenue Street & Utility Improvement Project. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 29-22 For Hearing on Proposed Assessment Project No. 21-06 ABCDEF McKinley Avenue Street & Utility Improvement Project.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to Adopt Res. No. 29-22 For Hearing on Proposed Assessment Project No. 21-06 ABCDEF McKinley Avenue Street & Utility Improvement Project. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 30-22 Accepting Bid Splashpad Installation Project.

Finance Director McCann reported the Splashpad was scheduled in the 2022-2026 CIP. The City received a \$150,000 donation from the Ward Family Foundation and plans on utilizing \$150,000 in AARPA Funds for the remaining balance from the General Fund-Parks. The City purchased the equipment through the State bidding process for \$149,375,00, so the bids are only for construction. The total cost for the project is estimated at \$355,903.94.

Finance Director McCann reported two bids were received:

Council Member Norland requested clarification on the significant difference in quotes. Finance Director McCann reported CRS specializes in this type of construction, while APEX does not have experience.

Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to adopt Res. No. 30-22 Accepting Bid Splashpad Installation Project. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Highway 14 Pedestrian Bridge Study.

City Planner Lassonde appeared before Council and reviewed the Highway 14 Pedestrian Bridge Study. He noted it is a feasibility study to determine the project's feasibility. City Planner Lassonde reviewed the options, including an underground tunnel, which was dismissed, a clear span bridge, and a pier-supported bridge. He noted different approach types, including a traditional abutment and helical approach. The preferred location is between Lor Ray and Lookout Drive and would help connect Tower Boulevard and Fallenstein Playground. The bridge would provide additional safe routes for children going to and from Dakota Meadows. City Planner Lassonde reviewed three options ranging from \$3 million to \$3.9 million. The preferred option cost \$3.9 million, utilized helical approaches with a clear span or pier supported bridge and crossed over Highway 14 at Caswell Park. He noted the next step would be to research funding options. City Planner Lassonde requested the Council adopt the plan so that when they begin applying for grants, a feasibility study is ready, increasing the City's chances of obtaining the funding.

Council Member Whitlock moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to Adopt the Highway 14 Pedestrian Bridge Study. Vote on the Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

City Administrator and Staff Comments

Interim City Administrator Fischer reported the Connecting Commerce Business Association held their annual "Love our Firefighters Raffle" event in February. They donated \$861.00 to the Fire Department.

The Swim lesson schedule is now up, and registration for classes begins on Monday, March 21 at 9:00 am.

The City is hiring for multiple summer positions right now. Visit the City website for more information or to apply.

City Clerk Van Genderen reported Absentee Voting is now available for the Nicollet County Commissioner District 3 Special Election. This special election is only for North Mankato residents in Precincts 1, 2, and 3 and will be held on Tuesday, April 12. Polls will open at 7:00 am and close at 8:00 pm. Absentee Voting will be open through April 11. To request an absentee ballot, visit the Nicollet County website.

Mayor and Council Comments

Council Member Whitlock reported he visited the State Capitol last Wednesday and met with both Senator Frentz and Senator Draheim and indicated that they supported the bonding request.

Council Member Steiner requested clarification on the appointment of the City Attorney.

Council Member Oachs reported she would know more about the All Seasons Arena plans after their next meeting and bring anything she learns to the Council.

Mayor Dehen commented that curbside pickup had resumed this year. He thanked the staff for participating in Pedal Past Poverty.

At 8:30 pm, on a motion by Council Member Norland, seconded by Council Member Oachs, the Council Meeting was adjourned.

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a Council Work Session of the North Mankato City Council was held in the Council Chambers on March 14, 2022. Mayor Dehen called the meeting to order at 12:00 pm. The following were present for roll call: Council Members Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Mayor Dehen, Interim City Administrator Fischer, Caswell Sports Director Tostenson, Culture, Recreation & Quality of Life Director Heintz, and City Clerk Van Genderen.

Taylor Library & Swim Facility 2021 Report

Culture, Recreation & Quality of Life Director Heintz reported 2020 was challenging, but the Swim Facility thrived in 2021. There were 40,054 visitors to the swim facility in 2021, in the 82 days the facility was open. The facility offered 210 swim lessons with 940 kids attending. The pool, in cooperation with Connecting Kids, gave out 105 sponsorships. The facility had multiple events. The pool's concession stand sales were \$97,413. In 2022 the facility aims to have 48,000 people at the pool with 85 days open. The facility team is also creating additional event days and fitness opportunities. Membership costs will remain the same in 2022, but the day pass will increase from \$5.00 to \$6.00. The increased price will help cover chemicals and staffing. Mayor Dehen stated it is incredible the number of people enjoying the facility. Interim City Administrator Fischer requested an update on the banner sales. Director Heintz reported the goal is the sale of \$30,000 in banner sales for 2022, and the team is well on the way to meeting that goal.

Culture, Recreation & Quality of Life Director Heintz reported the North Mankato Taylor Library's circulation in 2021 was 105,297, with approximately 71,079 people coming into the Library. The Library's circulation remains on par with other regional libraries. Overdrive eBook circulation was 13,841, and Hoopla circulation was 5,687. Both electronic services continue to increase every year. The Library hosted 519 events/programs in 2021, with 20,052 people attending those events. The library collection increased by 5,643 items in 2021, and 791 items were added to Overdrive. Director Heintz reported several goals for 2022. She stated the total circulation goal is 64,000, with 75,000 people visiting the Library. The Library would like to host 500 programs and have 15,000 people attend those events/programs. Director Heintz noted some of the events that have been under the Library umbrella, like Music in the Park, will move under the Culture, Recreation & Quality of Life umbrella.

Caswell Sports Director Tostenson reviewed Caswell Sports 2021 year. He noted that the park hosted 19 events with an economic impact estimated at \$7 million. Director Tostenson reported the Minnesota State High school League Girls' State Tournament returned in 2021, and Caswell Sports has secured the tournament for an additional 5-years. The park also hosted four state tournaments and two national tournaments. There was a total of 30,230 event visitors in 2021, with an estimated 9,449 room nights. Director Tostenson reported the renovations have started to expand the concession stands and upgrade the restroom facilities, which will need to be completed by April 23 for the first tournament in 2022. The rest of the Caswell Park renovations will start on August 1, with tournaments and league playing ending around mid-August. Caswell Sports has created two new events: two high school invitationals. There will also be a 10U and 12 U national qualifying tournament to promote Caswell's national tournaments being hosted in 2022 and 2023.

Caswell Sports Director Tostenson reviewed the Caswell North Soccer Complex 2022 season, including hosting 223 games during the summer and 68 during the fall. The championship field underwent major reconstruction with the addition of an artificial turf surface,

new LED lighting, and a new press box and bleachers with seating for up to 240 people. Mankato United contributed \$500,000 spread over 15 years for the project. In 2022 Caswell North will work with Mankato United to host a college showcase tournament or an event that will bring spectators and users for multiple days. The team is also developing a high school showcase of area school teams.

Caswell Sports Director Tostenson reviewed the newly acquired sports recreation programs, including Mankato/North Mankato Youth Football League, Mankato Area Youth Wrestling Association, Junior Tennis Camps, and Youth Soccer. The adult recreation team had 98 adult summer softball teams, 88 sand volleyball teams, and 34 adults fall softball teams. Director Tostenson reported Caswell Sports would continue to look for opportunities to expand adult and youth recreation opportunities.

Interim City Administrator Fischer said that the City staff would be learning with this being the first year of the Culture, Recreation, and Quality of Life Department. Still, staff will monitor and manage as necessary.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Oachs, to adjourn the Council Work Session at 12:28 pm.

An audio permit is required for anyone operating outdoor amplified sound (i.e., a loudspeaker, public address system, or sound amplifying equipment). All Audio Permits must be approved by the Council. The sound system cannot be operated before 7:00 am or after 10:00 pm. There is a \$25 fee.

Audio Permit Responsibilities:

- An onsite event coordinator must be available by mobile during the event.
- An applicant will provide a schedule of any music or entertainment proposed to occur during the event.
- A beginning and end time must be supplied on the application, and the event coordinator must ensure compliance.
- Applicants must comply with City Code Ordinance 90.045 and Minnesota Rules Chapter 7030 which limits noise.
- Noise levels cannot exceed 60 dBA more than 50 percent of the time.

What happens if there is a noise complaint?

- A North Mankato Patrol Officer will meet with the complainant and evaluate and measure the noise using a decibel reader at the location of the complainant.
- If the noise is found out of compliance, the Patrol Officer will contact the onsite event coordinator, and the amplified sound must be turned down.



Subject: Water Treatment Plant No. 2 Filter Rehabilitation Project City Project No. 22-01

Improvements to the existing two existing water filters in Water Treatment Plant No. 2 are necessary and are included in the City of North Mankato's 2022/2023 Capital Improvement Program. The proposed improvements include:

- 1. Remove and replace filter media
- 2. Remove and replace air scour grids, including new support angles and attachment hardware
- 3. Remove and replace underdrain nozzles
- 4. Remove and replace media retaining nozzles
- 5. Remove and replace the existing Tonka Equipment Company Filter Control panel.
- 6. Repainting of existing steel filters (interior only).

Both filter rehabilitations would be bid in one contract and constructed separately during non-peak water usage months over two construction seasons such that the water treatment plant can remain in service while the rehabilitation work is being done. Total estimated construction cost of the improvements is \$750,000 to \$800,000.

The plans and specifications will need to be sent to the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) for review and approval. It is anticipated that the plans and specifications would be submitted to MDH for approval in late July,2022. Bids would be received and the project awarded in September, 2022. Phase 1 work (Filter No. 1) would start around the first of November 2022. Phase 2 work (Filter No. 2) would start around the first of January 2023. All work would be completed and both filters would be back online by early spring.

Recommended Action: Adopt resolution authorizing plans and specifications. Copy of resolution is included in Council Packet.

Request for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to operate an automobile repair business at 1620 Commerce Drive

COMMENT

In 1986, a Conditional Use Pemit (CUP) was issued to Lynn and Darla Austin to operate an automobile repair business at 1620 Commerce Drive (Austin's Auto Repair). The conditions were as follows:

- 1. The CUP is not transferable to any other party and is issued personally to Lynn and Darla Austin.
- 2. There will be no exterior overnight storage of partially dismantled or obvious damaged vehicles or parts.
- 3. Applicant is required to plant, maintain, and replace 15 Black Hills Spruce or Colorado Blue Spruce trees 12 feet on center along the east property line. The trees should be approximately 6 feet in height and planted prior to June 1, 1987.
- 4. No gasoline will be sold on the premises.
- 5. If any work is done between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., all doors to the building must be shut.

Typically, CUP's are transferable to subsequent owners of the property. However, condition #1 states the CUP granted in 1986 is not transferable. As the Austin's are selling the business and property to Matt Ballman, it is necessary to consider a new CUP based on the change of ownership. According to Mr. Ballman, the business will operate no differently and there will be no sale of gasoline or vehicles.

In review of the conditions placed on the property in 1986, the current business has operated in conformance with the conditions including the planting of trees

on the east side of the property. However, based on the change of ownership, it is necessary reestablish reasonable conditions for the operation of an automobile repair business.

In review of the current operations of this business, attached is a recent aerial photo of the property showing several vehicles parked on grass. According to the City Code, all vehicles must be parked on a hard surface constructed of asphalt or concrete.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the conditions placed on the property in 1986 and conditions placed on automobile repair businesses since 1986, staff recommends approval of CU-2-22 subject to the following conditions:

- 1. All parts, equipment and materials shall be stored indoors or within an entirely screened in area
- 2. All automobile work shall be preformed within an enclosed building
- 3. There shall be no exterior overnight storage of partially dismantled or obvious damaged vehicles
- 4. If any repair work is done between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., all doors to the building must be shut
- 5. All vehicles and trailers stored out of doors shall be parked on a hard surface constructed of asphalt or concrete

<u>COMMENT</u>

The applicant owns 40 acres of farmland in a location shown on Exhibit A which is located outside of the current City limits. According to the Future Land Use Map within the Comprehensive Plan, the property is guided for future Low Density Residential development when it becomes part of the City. The Future Land Use Map is shown on Exhibit B. According to the Comprehensive Plan, the Low-Density Residential land use classification is consistent with single-family housing development and R-1, One-Family Dwelling zoning classification.

The applicant is considering the sale of the property to a developer who proposes to construct a combination of single-family homes and two-family homes. The proposed layout of that development is shown on Exhibit C. Due to the fact that two-family dwelling construction would not be consistent with R-1 zoning, the applicant is requesting an amendment to the Future Land Use Map which guides the applicant's property from Low Density Residential to Medium Density Residential. This amendment would allow for the construction of two-family dwellings as shown on Exhibit C.

Property guided as Medium Density is associated with R-2, One-and Two-Family Dwelling or R-3A, Medium Density zoning classifications. Permitted uses within these zoning districts include; single-family homes, two-family homes, attached townhomes and small apartments. When the Future Land Use Map was created in 2015, there was no land guided for multi-family housing. In response, the following language is taken from the Comprehensive Plan:


"As shown on the Future Land Use Map, Figure 3-2, all areas guided for residential development outside the current City limits are shown as low density residential. Should it be determined in the future that any area guided for low density residential is better suited for medium or high-density residential development, the Planning Commission and City Council will openly consider amendments to the Future Land Use Map".

Should the applicant be successful in amending the Future Land Use Map, it is expected that a developer will be submitted a Planned Unit Development (PUD) application for the development of the property similar to what is shown on Exhibit C.

In summary, as part of the City's Comprehensive Plan, areas outside of the City limits are guided for specific types of development upon annexation. The property in question is currently guided for future Low Density Residential development (single-family homes). The applicant is requesting to amend this map to change the future land use to Medium Density Residential. This change would allow the property to developed in a combination of single-family and two-family homes as shown on the second attachment.

This request will be considered by the North Mankato Planning Commission on Thursday, March 10, 2022, and by the City Council on Monday, March 21, 2022. 


