Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the North Mankato City Council was held in the Municipal Building Council Chambers on March 21, 2016. Acting Mayor Steiner called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. asking that everyone join in the Pledge of Allegiance. The following were present for roll call: Council Members Norland, Freyberg, Spears and Steiner, City Administrator Harrenstein, Attorney Kennedy, City Planner Fischer, Public Works Director Swanson and City Clerk Van Genderen. Absent: Finance Director Thorne. Mayor Dehen arrived at 7:40 p.m.

Approval of Agenda

Council Member Spears requested discussion on Item #9I Resolution Authorizing City
Attorney to Subscribe to Minnesota Government Access with Minnesota Court Data Services. Council
Member Spears requested clarification on the cost for the subscription. Attorney Kennedy indicated he
did not have an exact price but the Court system was mandating that all records be accessed online and
in order for the Attorneys to perform their duties they must have access to the online database.
Attorney Kennedy indicated he would provide the price for the subscription. Council Member
Spears, seconded by Council Member Norland to table Item #9I for consideration at a later date.
Vote on the motion: Norland and Spears aye; Freyberg and Steiner nay. Motion failed. Council
Member Freyberg moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to approve the agenda as
presented with Item #9I included in the Consent Agenda. Vote on the motion: Steiner, Norland,
Freyberg and Spears aye; no nays. Motion earried.

Approval of Minutes

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Freyberg to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of March 7, 2016. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears and Steiner aye; no nays. Motion earried.

Presentation of Award

Administrator Harrenstein and Public Works Director Swanson presented Dale Seath, Shop Foreman, with a plaque recognizing his 30 years of service to the City of North Mankato.

Public Hearing, 7 pm-Wellhead Protection Plan Part I.

City Engineer Herman Dharmarajah appeared before Council and reported on Part I of the Wellhead Protection plan which included information on the delineation of the wellhead protection area, the drinking water supply management area boundary and the well and drinking water supply management area and vulnerability assessment. City Engineer Dharmarajah indicated the chance of well contamination was low due to the depth of the wells. He stated the City has 6 high capacity wells and there are a total of 23 wells within the management area. City Engineer Dharmarajah reported the greatest risk of contamination came from wells that were no longer maintained or in use. Council Member Spears requested clarification on how contamination could occur. Karen Voz from the Minnesota Department of Health reported that as long as wells are maintained there is little chance of contamination. Contamination could occur when wells were no longer maintained as they become conduits for contamination. Council Member Spears requested clarification on the source of the water. Ms. Voz indicated the Mount Simon Aquafer was the source of the City's water and there was little knowledge of how the aguafer was recharged, she stated the DNR has observation wells and would be able to provide more information on the supply. Ms. Voz stated the Department of Health was concerned with quality not quantity. Acting Mayor Steiner opened the meeting to the public with no one else appearing the hearing was closed.

Public Hearing, 7 pm-Utility Easements Vacation between Lots 3 and 4 of Block 3 of the Landing North Phase 1.

City Planner Fischer reported the applicants recently purchased Lots 3 and 4, Block 3, The Landing North Phase 1. The applicants plan to construct a new single-family home, it is the intent of the applicant's to replat these two lots by combining them together as one lot by eliminating the internal lot line. As part of the vacation process utility companies were informed. One local company has equipment in the area and the company and the applicant are working together to remove the box from the requested vacation area. With no one else appearing before Council the hearing was closed.

Public Comments

Lucy Lowry, Library Director appeared before Council and announced the 5th Annual Community Read as **The Boys in the Boat** by Daniel James Brown. Library Director Lowry indicated 500 free copies of the book would be available at participating businesses beginning on March 22, 2016 and events related to the book would occur in April.

<u>Barb Church, 102 Wheeler Avenue</u>, appeared before Council and stated the Belgrade Avenue Planning Steering Committee lacked diversity.

Tom Hagen, 927 Lake Street appeared before Council and requested a moratorium on audio permits until a new policy was adopted.

Public Hearing, 7 pm-Project No. 15-02ABCDE 2016 Roe Crest Drive Improvement Project.

City Engineer Dan Sarff appeared before Council and stated engineering and City staff reviewed the options for Roe Crest Drive and were introducing a modification for option 2. The modified option 2 would include a 40 foot street and a 5 foot sidewalk with the goal of limiting impact on the established trees and minimizing impact on properties. He stated the narrower street would help decrease speed on the busy street while still accommodating parking on both sides and bike traffic. Christopher Schmidt, 2024 Roe Crest Drive, appeared before Council and stated Option 1 with no sidewalk or trail was what the residents wanted. Lynn Ehalt, 2040 Roe Crest Drive, appeared before Council and stated a sidewalk was necessary for safety purposes, but if the City built a trail behind the houses on the west side of Roe Crest she would not have access. With no one else appearing before Council Mayor Dehen closed the Public Hearing.

Business Items

Res. No. 30-16 Vacating Utility Easements-Lots 3 and 4, Block 3 of the Landing North Phase 1. Council Member Freyberg moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner to adopt Res. No. 30-16 Vacating Utility Easements-Lots 3 and 4, Block 3 of the Landing North Phase 1. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion earried.

Approve Preliminary and Final Plat of the Landing West: a Request from Bruce and Carol Walters. City Planner Fischer reported the applicants Bruce and Carol Walters purchased lots 3 and 4 of Landing North Phase 1 in the reserve. The applicants intend to combine the lots and construct a single family home. The Planning Commission reviewed the plans and recommended Council approval. Council Member Freyberg moved, seconded by Council Member Norland to approve the Preliminary and Final Plat of the Landing West. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Consider B-1, B-2 and B-3 Setbacks: A Request from the City of North Mankato. City Planner Fischer indicated at the last Planning Commission meeting staff requested the consideration of changing the setbacks in B-1, B-2 and B-3. The Planning Commission held intense discussion and did not recommend the changes to Council at this time.

Res. No. 31-16 Adopting Special Assessment Policy. City Engineer Sarff reported the Special Assessment Policy was ready for adoption. The public comments were taken into consideration and changes made. This was the clean version and ready for Council approval. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner to adopt Res. No. 31-16 Special Assessment Policy. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 32-16 Accepting the Offer of the Minnesota Public Facilities Authority to Purchase a General Obligation Water Revenue Note, Series 2016, in the Original Aggregate Principal Amount of \$121,833; Providing for its Issuanee; and Authorizing the Execution of a Project Loan Agreement. City Engineer Sarff stated the funds would be used to complete the Well and Well House #9. Unexpected issues occurred while drilling Well #9 and the Public Facilities Authority is offering to finance the remaining cost of the project with a low interest loan. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Freyberg to Adopt Res. No. 32-16 Accepting the Offer of the Minnesota Public Facilities Authority to Purchase a General Obligation Water Revenue Note, Series 2016, in the Original Aggregate Principal Amount of \$121,833; Providing for its Issuance; and Authorizing the Execution of a Project Loan

The resolution before Council only appoints 7 individuals to the Steering Committee but all applicants will be included in the process. Mayor Dehen indicated the Steering Committee would be used to organize the larger committee and the public meetings. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Freyberg to Adopt Res. No. 33-16 Appointing Members of the Belgrade Avenue Master Plan Steering Committee. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Spears, Steiner and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion earried.

Res. No. 34-16 Ordering Improvement and Preparation of Plans and Specifications for Improvement Project No. 15-02ABCDE Roe Crest Drive Project. Council Member Freyberg moved, seconded by Council Member Norland to Adopt Res. No. 34-16 Ordering Improvement and Preparation of Plans and Specifications for Improvement Project No. 15-02ABCDE Roe Crest Drive Project with Option 2 to include a 5 Foot Sidewalk and a 40 Foot Street. Council Member Spears requested clarification on if the sidewalk and street were within the right-of-way. City Engineer Sarff stated it would all be in the right-of-way. Mayor Dehen stated the City was unable to secure an easement for the proposed trail. The street is over 50 years old and needs to be rebuilt and with traffic volume and its proximity to the school Council should consider including a sidewalk. Vote on the motion: Norland, Freyberg, Steiner, and Dehen aye; Spears nay. Motion carried.

City Administrator and Staff Comments

Public Works Director Swanson reported Spring Clean-up would be April 18-29, 2016.

Mayor and Council Comments

Council Member Freyberg requested clarification on the status of the compost site. Public Works Director Swanson reported the site was now open.

Council Member Norland thanked the North Mankato Police Department for their calm and help with medical emergencies.

Council Member Norland stated the pursuit of a law against talking on your cell phone while driving would be pursued.

Mayor Dehen reported the City received a thank you from Pedal Past Poverty. The event raised more than \$103,000.

Mayor Dehen stated Community Garden plots were available at 2000 Howard Drive in North Mankato.

Public Comments

<u>Karen Dubke, 2041 Roe Crest Drive</u>, stated she was disappointed that a sidewalk would be added to the Roe Crest Drive Reconstruction but thanked the Council for their work.

<u>Sarah Sanders, 2224 Clare Drive</u>, appeared before Council and stated she was disappointed that a sidewalk was included in the Roe Crest Drive improvement.

Randy Lundston, 2043 Roe Crest Drive, appeared before Council and stated he was disappointed that the Council did not agree with the residents of Roe Crest Drive and decided to include a sidewalk in the reconstruction.

There being no further business, on a motion by Council Member Norland, seconded by Council Member Steiner, the meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m.



The starting and ending points of this run will be near the Mankato Brewery. Run participants will receive a drink ticket as part of their entry fee for the race.





1. Introduction

The City of Mankato and City of North Mankato participated in a joint citizen participation process due to the proximity of the communities. This provided the opportunity for local agencies interested in providing input into the consolidated plan process to attend one meeting verses separate meetings for each community. Three meetings were held targeting economic development and local government, homeless and housing providers, and social service providers. The public and local agencies were welcome to attend any of the meetings. Flyers were distributed to 58 local groups including nonprofit agencies, public entities, and for profit groups. Also every Chair from Envision 2020 was provided a flyer to distribute to stakeholders. Envision 2020 is a long-range community plan that began in 2006 and involved over 400 community stakeholders. Participants continue to track progress on 34 goals in 6 Key Performance Areas: Education, Economic Development, Transportation, Health & Human Services, Livability, and Community Planning/Regional Governance.

Participation in the three meetings was strong with a total of 31 unduplicated participants, as some individuals opted to attend multiple meetings. Written comments were received from an additional 8 individuals. Following the meetings, the facilitator summarized the meeting notes and provided these and the written comments to each community to review and incorporate as part of their plan. The citizen participation meetings provided the opportunity for each community to hear from a variety of local organizations who represent a diverse clientele. It provided the opportunity to better understand the challenges that face certain populations. Each community will give consideration to the comments and feedback received in the development of the Consolidated Plan.

The Community Development Department of the City of North Mankato has a strong working relationship with other supportive housing providers in the area. The Family Homeless Prevention and Assistance Program (FHPAP) is administered by Blue Earth County Human Services and Minnesota Valley Action Council (MVAC) and serves a nine county area including Nicollet County/North Mankato. Through the Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCV), staff communicates regularly with area property owners, social service providers, and assisted living facilities. The City owned Koppen Gardens is a 74-unit public housing unit accepting section 8 vouchers through the SCMMCHRA.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

North Mankato is a part of the Southeast Minnesota Regional Continuum of Care. The City of North Mankato understands the importance of helping extremely low- and low-income families who are at imminent risk of becoming homeless. The City will continue to analyze updated data, work with local organizations, and explore ways to help these families, households, and individuals. Currently there are several programs to address the needs of the long-term homeless that have been endorsed by the CoC.

Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction's area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS

As a member of the CoC, staff participate in the decision making involved in ranking projects that serve the homeless in the Southeast region of Minnesota. Standards, policies and procedures are developed by CoC staff and approved by the CoC membership. The required HUD submissions are written and turned over to the CoC membership before submission.

The North Mankato Patrol Officers are responsible for responding to all animal control issues. This includes animals at-large, animal abuse/neglect, and animals disturbing the peace.

In 2015, the North Mankato Police Department responded to 209 animal related reports and impounded 99 animals compared to 83 impoundments in 2014 for a cost of \$3,813.40 compared to \$2,761.84 in 2014.








North Mankato Police Reserves

The North Mankato Police Department has a long history of having a reserve program. The Special Police Reserve Unit was established during the Minnesota River Floods of April of 1965. The Special Police were formed to patrol the City to secure the homes and businesses. The dikes were patrolled and inspected and assistance was given to many volunteers who helped build and maintain the dikes. First aid, meals, and transportation were also provided by the Reserves.

The Reserve unit was made permanent in the fall of 1965 and training was established for traffic control along with crowd control. North Mankato Fun Days and other events were provided with policing to supplement the regular police force.

Today, our reserve officers are still a volunteer position with the City of North Mankato. Reserve officers provide the City with traffic and crowd control during the many parades and races held throughout the year. All of our reserve officers have other employment and we are very grateful for the time and service they provide us.

We currently have 15 Reserve Officers dedicated to the community. These Reserve Officers collectively volunteered over 1,200 hours this past year.

In 2015, The North Mankato Police Reserves assisted the community with a variety of events including but not limited to the following; North Mankato Fun Days, Fun Days Triathlon, Kiwanis Holiday Lights, MCHS Bike
