Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the North Mankato City Council was held in the Municipal Building Council Chambers on February 6, 2017. Mayor Dehen called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. asking that everyone join in the Pledge of Allegiance. The following were present for roll call: Mayor Dehen, Council Members Freyberg, Whitlock, and Norland, City Administrator Harrenstein, Finance Director McCann, City Attorney Kennedy, Community Development Director Fischer, Public Works Director Swanson and City Clerk Van Genderen. Absent: Council Member Steiner.

Approval of Agenda

Mayor Dehen removed for separate consideration Consent Agenda Item K, Consider Resolution Adopting the City Council Handbook. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock, to approve the agenda with Agenda Item K removed for separate consideration. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval of Council Meeting Minutes

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of January 17, 2017. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Mayor Dehen thanked Amaya Thomas, representing Lasting Imprint, for attending and read the following proclamation into the record:

WHEREAS, the health and well-being of our children is of paramount importance; and

WHEREAS, each year in the United States, more than 40,000 babies are born with a congenital heart defect; and

WHEREAS, the medical community has identified congenital heart defects as the leading cause of birth defect-related deaths; and

WHEREAS, it is crucial that parents, pediatricians, and all those in the health profession have greater awareness of the potential for congenital heart defects among newborns and children; and

WHEREAS, Congenital Heart Defect Awareness Week provides the opportunity for families and patients affected by these conditions to share their experiences and knowledge with the public, so that we all may be made more aware of how this defect affects all our lives.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Mark Dehen, Mayor of the City of North Mankato, Minnesota, do hereby proclaim February 7-14, 2017, to be

in the City of North Mankato, and encourage all North Mankato residents to join me in this special observance.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock, to approve the Consent Agenda which included:

Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 13-17 Adopting the City Council Handbook. Mayor Dehen indicated public comments could be taken concerning the City Council Handbook. Kim Spears, 916 South Avenue, appeared before Council and reviewed his concerns about the City Council Handbook. He indicated Council Members should be able to offer dissent if they do not agree with the official position of the City Council. Mr. Spears stated he did not agree with the statement that all large requests for information should be directed to the City Administrator or the Mayor not directly to staff. Barb Church, 102 Wheeler Avenue, appeared before Council and stated she did not believe the document should have been added to the Consent Agenda and there were grammatical errors. Council Member Freyberg stated the City Council Handbook were guidelines for Council Members and it does not restrict the right of the individual to discuss alternative views. Mayor Dehen stated the City Council Handbook does not remove individual Council Member's rights to a dissenting view, but if the City asks a Council Member to act as an advocate, they should support the Council decision. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock to Adopt the City Council Handbook. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Public Comments

Tom Hagen, 927 Lake Street, appeared before Council and thanked the staff and Council for a much quieter Anthony Ford Pond Hockey Tournament. He indicated his continued desire for the development of a Historical Preservation Commission. Mr. Hagen reported the Nicollet County Historical Society conducted a survey in 1982 that identified 43 potential sites for preservation.

Business Items

Consider Approving the Spring Lake Swim Facility Request for Proposal. Administrator Harrenstein stated the RFP would begin the process to replace the old filtration system at the Spring Lake Swim Facility. John Kind, Executive Director of the YMCA, appeared before Council and thanked the City for their responsiveness to the YMCA request to improve the facility. Administrator Harrenstein indicated the City would also consider additional play features during the RFP process. He reported the Mankato Foundation \$50,000 matching grant would be used to improve hockey at Spring Lake Park and the City was considering improving and expanding the current bathhouse facility to accommodate a warming house during the winter. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock to approve the Spring Lake Swim Facility Request for Proposal. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approve the Addition of One New Street Maintenance I Employee. Public Works Director Swanson reviewed the request for an additional Street Maintenance I Employee which included the reduction of staff by three employees since 2013 while there were increased special projects and staffing special events. He indicated the addition of a street serviceman would allow the delegation of duties increasing the time for addressing future capital improvement plans. Council Member Whitlock stated the department is stretched thin. Council Member Freyberg moved, seconded by Council Member Norland to Approve the Addition of One New Street Maintenance I Employee. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Department maintains approximately 77 miles of roadways and last year 9 miles were seal coated, .8 miles overlayed along with 5 miles of roads crack sealed. He stated the Street Department maintains and inspects 87 miles of storm sewer, several detention ponds, and 62 miles of sanitary sewer mains. He reviewed the increase in recycling collection due to the introduction of recycling single sort in 2015 which corresponds with a decrease in solid waste collection. Public Works Director Swanson reviewed special projects the Street Department completed in 2016 including; City Hall ramp removal and parking lot improvements, construction of displays at the Children's Museum of Southern Minnesota, wood-chips for the Humane Society, and work with the Miracle League of North Mankato in the design and execution of the soon to be constructed all-inclusive Fallenstein Playground at Caswell Park. He reported community events included softball and soccer tournaments at Caswell north and south and traffic control for all Business on Belgrade Events, Fun Days parade, and the North Star Bike Race. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock to approve the 2016 Street Department Annual Report. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

2016 Water and Sewer Department Annual Report. Administrator Harrenstein stated he would be reviewing the annual report, with Superintendent Rader available to answer any questions. Administrator Harrenstein stated the Water and Sewer Department was responsible for the distribution of water to the citizens of North Mankato, maintaining the stormwater system, and the sanitary system. The City maintains five City wells, six distributions pumps, twenty chemical pumps, two water towers, four ground storage reservoirs, two separate main lift stations that pump to Mankato's treatment plant, two Corp stations and they inspect storm lines. A few highlights from 2016 included the completion of Well #9, Rehab of the Main Lift Station #1, Rehab of Well #7, there were 12 City Main Breaks, and 1595 Gopher State One Calls. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member

Whitlock to approve the 2016 Water and Sewer Department Annual Report. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

2016 Parks Department Annual Report. Administrator Harrenstein stated he would be reviewing the annual report, with Superintendent Rader available to answer any questions. Administrator Harrenstein reported the City of North Mankato has 21 parks, 250 acres of park space, 43 acres of prairie, 10.6 miles of trails, 12 ball fields, 67 playground structures and 9.3 miles of sidewalks. City Administrator Harrenstein reported highlights for the Parks Department included the planting of 70 trees and the removal of 80 trees, resurfacing of tennis courts in Wheeler Park, seeding of prairie in Bluff Park and park improvements to Caswell to bring the park up to building code compliance. He reported there were over 15,663 swimmers in the Spring Lake Park Swim Facility. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock to approve the 2016 Parks Department Annual Report. Vote on the motion: Freyberg, Whitlock, Norland and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

City Administrator and Staff Comments

Public Works Director Swanson stated crews were trimming Belgrade Avenue boulevard trees.

Mayor and Council Comments

Council Member Norland requested Administrator Harrenstein review where the City is at with historic preservation. Administrator Harrenstein indicated the Downtown Masterplan committee is reviewing options and will present recommendations in April.

Council Member Whitlock reported an increase in teams for the Anthony Ford Pond Hockey Tournament. He stated next year the committee was looking at dates that correspond with the Super Bowl.

Mayor Dehen reported 2018 would be the Anthony Ford Pond Hockey Tournament's ten year anniversary and they were looking at special events.

Mayor Dehen stated he received thank you notes from the Girl Scouts, School District 77 and the Echo Food Shelf for donations from the City's Charitable Gambling Fund.

Public Comments

Tom Hagen, 927 Lake Street, appeared before Council and requested the City consider a deer hunt. Mr. Hagen stated he believes the City has the worst boulevard trees and offered his advice on pruning trees.

Gary Zellmer, 1591 Sharon Drive, appeared before Council and indicated the Library Board would like to meet with City Council and the Administrator to discuss the resignation of the Library Director and the direction of the library.

There being no further business, on a motion by Council Member Norland, seconded by Council Member Whitlock, the meeting adjourned at 7:39 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 86, FOURTH SERIES

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA REVISING, UPDATING AND

COMPILING CERTAIN ORDINANCES OF THE CITY DEALING WITH THE SUBJECTS EMBRACED IN THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes Section 415.02 and 415.021 authorize the City to cause its ordinances to be revised, updated and compiled;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, ordains as follows:

- **Section 1**. All portions of the City of North Mankato Code will be revised as outlined in Exhibit A attached; and
- **Section 2.** Ordinance Nos. 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, 70, 71, 72, 73, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78, 79, 80, 81, 82, 83, 84, and 85, Fourth Series, are incorporated into the revised Code of Ordinances:
- **Section 3.** This ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances shall be a sufficient publication of any ordinance included in it and not previously published in the City's official newspaper. The City Clerk shall cause a substantial quantity of the amended Code of Ordinances to be printed for public distribution to the public at actual cost and shall furnish a copy of the amended Code of Ordinances to the County Law Library or its designated depository. The official copy of this amended Code of Ordinances shall be marked and kept in the Office of the City Clerk.
- **Section 4.** The Code of Ordinances is declared to be prima facie evidence of the law of the City and shall be received in evidence as provided by Minnesota Statutes by the Courts of the State of Minnesota.
- **Section 5.** This ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances shall take effect upon publication of this ordinance in the City's official newspaper.

EXHIBIT A TO ORDINANCE NO. 86, FOURTH SERIES UPDATING CODE OF ORDINANCES CITY OF NORTH MANKATO

CHAPTER 50: RULES AND REGULATIONS RELATING TO MUNICIPAL UTILITIES 50.04 Rules and Regulations Related to Municipal Utilities

(D) Ownership of municipal utilities. Ownership of all municipal utilities, plants, lines, mains, extensions, and appurtenances thereto shall be held by the city, and remain in the city, except for the service line from the structure to the city main, which shall be the property owner's responsibility. including the corporation stop, saddle, curb stop and curb box, which shall be the property owner's responsibility. Provided, however, that private facilities and appurtenances constructed on private property are not intended to be included in municipal ownership.

CHAPTER 111: ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES 111.206 PERSONS ALLOWED ON THE LICENSED PREMISES.

- (B) Age restrictions.
- (2) No person under 21 years of age may enter a licensed premises except to work, consume meals on premises that qualify as a restaurant, or attend social functions that are held in a portion of the premises where liquor is not sold. while accompanied by a legal guardian.

CHAPTER 150: BUILDING REGULATIONS 150.02 Building Permits

(G) Survey Drawing. For every new residential, commercial or industrial building constructed, a survey drawing prepared by a licensed surveyor showing the location of all buildings, parking areas, and storm water detention areas shall be submitted as part of the building permit application process.

150.04 Fees, Charges and Bond Requirements

(B) Start without a permit. Where work for which a permit is required is started or pursued prior to issuance of a permit, the building permit fees shall be doubled an investigative fee in the amount of the building fee, not including the state surcharge, will be added to the building cost due at the time the permit is issued. but the payment of such increased fee shall not relieve any persons from fully complying with the requirements of the law in the execution of the work, nor from any penalties prescribed herein.

CHAPTER 151: RESIDENTIAL RENTAL PROPERTY LICENSING CODE 151.06 Applications

All applications shall be made as follows:

- (A) All applications shall be made at the office of the City Clerk, upon forms which have been approved by motion of the City Council;
- (B) All such applications must be subscribed, sworn to, and include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - (1) Applicant's name, age, and citizenship;
 - (2) Applicant's present address and phone number and length of time at that address;
 - (3) Address of property to be rented;
 - (4) Sketch of property to be rented identifying all rental units by number;
 - (5) Parking plan showing the size and location of all off-street parking spaces;
 - (6) Name(s) of each occupant of each rental unit;
 - (7) Name of person (if other than applicant) responsible for the rental unit;
- (8) Whether or not applicant has ever been convicted of a felony or misdemeanor, including violation of a city ordinance but excluding traffic violations, and, if so, the date and place of conviction and the nature of the offense;
- (9) Social Security number and Minnesota business identification number of <u>the</u> applicant as required by Minnesota Statues 270C.72, Subd. 4
- (910) Such other information as the Council shall deem necessary considering the nature of the use for which the license application is made.

151.07 Action on Application for Rental License

Upon receipt of a completed application, and payment of all license fees, and compliance with all applicable property inspections the City Clerk, or his or her designee, shall issue a license to the applicant for the specified property. All residential rental property in North Mankato must obtain a license by January 1, 2003. Such licenses will be valid for a period of 1 year unless canceled or revoked pursuant to this chapter. From January 1, 2004, forward, all licensees will be required to obtain annual renewal of their residential rental licenses on or before January 1 of each year. If by January 1 of each year, a rental license has not been renewed, a \$100 reinstatement fee for each property will be charged in addition to the annual license fee. An annual rental license renewal will not be granted if the licensee does not provide the City with a Social Security number and Minnesota business identification number of the licensee as required by Minnesota Statutes 270C.72, Subd. 4

CHAPTER 156: ZONING CODE 156.035 Generally

(G) Accessory buildings. If an accessory building is attached to the main building, it shall be made a structural part of the main building and shall comply in all respects with the requirements of this chapter applicable to the main building. An accessory building, unless

attached to and made a part of the main building, shall not be closer than 5 feet to the main building or another accessory building. In no event shall an accessory building be permitted on a vacant lot or when not subordinate to and serving the principal use structure on the same lot.

- (1) An accessory building larger than $1\frac{2068}{68}$ square feet shall be accessible by a hard-surfaced driveway which meets all applicable setback regulations.
- (P) Storage or utility sheds. Permitted in any residential zoning district subject to the following:
 - (1) Maximum floor area shall not exceed 12068 square feet.
 - (2) Minimum setback is 5 feet from any rear or side property line.
 - (3) Located a minimum of 40 5 feet from any main or accessory building.
 - (4) Shall not be located within any front yard.
 - (5) Maximum height shall not exceed 14 feet.
 - (6) Overhangs shall not exceed 2 feet.
 - (7) Access door shall not exceed 6 feet in width.
 - (8) No more than 1 storage shed or utility shed is permitted on any lot.
 - (9) Minimum setback is 5 feet from any ravine breakline.
- (II) For every new attached or detached residential dwelling unit constructed, the following is required: an individual water service and shut off shall be installed for each dwelling unit. Multi-unit rental apartment buildings are not subject to this provision.
 - (1) An individual water service and shut-off shall be installed for each dwelling unit
- (2) An individual sanitary sewer service shall be installed for each dwelling unit Multi-unit rental apartment buildings are not subject to this provision.

(K) Residential driveways.

- (1) The maximum allowable driveway width measured at the <u>front</u> property line on residential property <u>having a width of less than 80 feet</u> shall not exceed 24 feet. <u>The maximum allowable driveway width measured at the front property line on a residential property having a width of 80 feet or more shall not exceed 30 feet. <u>Beginning at the front property line</u>, the <u>driveway width may be enlarged at an angle not greater than 45 degrees to a point not closer than 10 feet to the side property line</u>. There shall be a minimum of 20 feet of hard surfaced driveway located perpendicular from the face of any garage stall to the street. <u>with no greater than a 45 degree angle back to the main driveway</u>. All driveways shall conform to the required side yard building setbacks for the district it is within.</u>
- (X) Stormwater detention pond. For any residential, commercial or industrial development utilizing more than 1 acre of land, an on-site stormwater detention pond is required. Prior to issuance of a building permit, a stormwater drainage plan shall be submitted and approved by the Building Inspector. Setbacks for storm water ponds, rain gardens or other storm water retention areas shall be a minimum of are 10 feet from any property line.

156.053 Off-Street Parking and Loading

- (3) Construction and maintenance.
- (a) All residential, commercial and industrial parking areas, driveways and access drives shall be surfaced with either a concrete or a bituminous surface. All parking lots in any zoning district designed to accommodate more than six (6) vehicles, shall include B style curb and gutter. A drainage plan may be required for review by the Building Official. The owner of the property shall maintain all parking areas, driveways and access drives in a well_-kept condition.

156.054 Performance Standards

- (9) Fences. Fences are a permitted use in any zoning district, subject to the following.
- (a) Fences shall not be located on any property line <u>and shall be located on the property</u> in a manner that both sides can be maintained from the owner's property.
- (b) In all residential zones, fences located in front yard setbacks may not exceed 3 feet in height, except as regulated in (c). In all other yards, fences shall not exceed 6 feet in height and shall follow the unaltered natural terrain of the land.
- (c) where a lot is located at the intersection of two streets, fences shall be no higher than 3 feet for a distance equal to or greater than the front yard setback measured both directions from the corner property pin.
- (ed) Fences in commercial zoning districts shall not exceed 6 feet in height and shall follow the unaltered terrain of the land.
- (de) Fences in industrial zoning districts shall not exceed 8 feet in height. No barbed wire shall be located less than 6 feet from the ground.
 - (ef) All fences shall be constructed and maintained so as not to endanger life or property.
 - (g) Fences shall not interfere with traffic or pedestrian visibility

ORDINANCE NO. 87, FOURTH SERIES

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA, AMENDING NORTH MANKATO CITY CODE, TITLE IX, GENERAL REGULATIONS, CHAPTER 91, ANIMALS

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Sections of North Mankato City Code, Title IX, General Regulations, Chapter 91 Animals, are hereby amended as follows:

§91.19 PROHIBITION ON SUPPLEMENTAL DEER FEEDING

- (A) Findings. It is hereby determined that an increasing population of deer within the city poses a threat to public safety by:
 - (1) Increasing the likelihood of deer-vehicle collisions
 - (2)Contributing to the transmission of diseases to humans from deer
- (3) Posing a threat to native and ornamental plants and animal life by excessive foraging which disturbs natural ecological balances
 - (4) Posing a threat to the quality of life by deer-related damage to landscaping and vegetable gardens
- (B) Purpose: Prohibition on supplemental deer feeding, which results in unnatural concentrations of deer and can affect the normal movement of deer within the community.
- (C) Prohibition: No resident may place or permit to be placed on the ground, or within five (5) feet of the ground surface any grain, salt licks, fruit, vegetables, nuts, seeds, hay or other edible materials which may reasonably be expected to intentionally result in deer feeding, unless such items are screened or protected in a manner that prevents deer from feeding on them. Living fruit trees and other live vegetation shall not be considered as supplemental deer feeding.
- (C) Exemptions from Provisions
- (1) Veterinarians, city animal control officials or county, state or federal game officials who are in the course of their duties and have deer in their custody or under their management.
 - (2) Persons are feeding birds using self-enclosed feeding devices or containers.
- (3) The use of straw, hay or straw-related materials for erosion control, mulching, gardening or other landscape purposes.
- (4) Persons are maintaining a compost pile that is screened or protected to prevent deer from foraging.

Penalty, see §91.99 (C)

Section 2. After adoption, signing, and attestation, this Ordinance shall be published once in the official newspaper of the City and shall be in effect on or after the date following such publication.




The North Mankato Police Department is a 24/7 Police Agency. Officers are on duty at all times and prepared to respond to emergencies and other calls for assistance. The Police Department is staffed by 14 full time Police Officers and 19 Reserve Police Officers. The department members are assisted by 2 highly trained records specialists who manage the police department records and they assist the public in day to day questions and needs.



The following report outlines police activities for the calendar year 2016. North Mankato community members are the key to our success and the support provided by our residents and visitors is second to none. In 2017 we plan to continue our community outreach and will be looking at issues such as: Secession planning, strategic planning, body cameras, Reserve Officer recruitment, and online crime mapping.

Department Training

MN POST Board requires officers to complete a minimum of 48 hours of continuing education within the three-year licensing period to maintain and renew their licensing. Active officers are mandated to train annually in use of force and once every five years in emergency vehicle operations/pursuit driving.

In addition, officers of the North Mankato Police Department are required to complete annual firearms, Taser, defensive tactics training, and biennial 1st responder medical training. It is the officer's discretion which law enforcement related courses





In 2016, the North Mankato Police Department completed approximately 989 hours of online and classroom training including our biennial 1st responder training.

The three officers assigned to the River Valley Tactical Team completed approximately an additional 270 combined hours of specialized training as part of their monthly team training. Training includes but is not limited to: firearms, barricaded suspects/subjects and negotiation, high risk warrants, hostage negotiation and rescue, entry training, crowd control, active threats, VIP security, chemical/impact munitions, and distraction devices.

As part of their expanded role into emergency management, the lieutenants have completed approximately 140 hours of emergency management training and will be certified after two more classes in basic emergency management.

Officers Howe and Paulson completed a 30-hour leadership course hosted by MN Chiefs of Police at Camp Ripley.

Officer VonBerge completed a 30-hour Field Training Officer school, which was beneficial in training our three new hires this year and in the future.


Officer Hendrickson completed both handgun and rifle armor's and instructors course. In the past few years, Officer Hendrickson has been instrumental in building and ensuring our firearms program functions smoothly and our officers are trained to a high standard.

Several officers attended autism emergency preparedness, which provides strategies for officers in dealing with autism in emergency situations.

As the internet rapidly evolves so do social media, online fraud, online scams, and financial crimes. Our officers continue to listen and learn of ways we can investigate and combat the crimes that affect our technology driven community.

Our ability to attend training and the quality of training we are receiving has continually improved. We are confident in the ability of our officers to handle the variety of new challenges we face each day.

North Mankato Police Reserves



In 2016, The North Mankato Police Reserves consisted of 14 active members. In August, after sixteen years of service, Chief Eric Klompenhower retired. The reserve unit named Dave Krueger as the new Chief. Krueger previously held the position of Captain along with active member Eric Retzlaff. To assist with duty assignments, the unit promoted reserve officers Leonard Woelfel to Captain, James Vihstadt to Sergeant, and James Albright to Sergeant.

During the 2016 event year, the reserves worked a total of thirty-eight events and participated in eleven training sessions totaling over 1,002 hours of service. The reserves participated in a variety of events promoting community safety and policing keeping event functions safe. Some of the events worked included Fun Days and its Parade Detail, Polar Plunge, Kiwanis Lights, Security for Investigator Conference, Grand Prix Bicycle Race, Fourth of July Fireworks, and Multiple Community Fun Runs among many others. Some of these events were worked in collaboration with other neighboring agencies.

The reserves unit interviewed and hired new reserve candidates for the upcoming year. North Mankato Police Officers Steve Hlavac and Brad Schultz assisted the reserve unit with management and training during the past year.

North Mankato Police Reserves continued to perform as a critical component to the community, providing safety at the areas many events.

Community Outreach

The North Mankato Police Department prides itself in providing superior law enforcement services to the community. Some of the ways that this is done is through neighborhood supports activities such as but not limited to directed patrols, medication collection, animal control and public education.

Directed Patrols

Connecting with the community is a high priority for the North Mankato Patrol Officers. Through community outreach and directed patrols officers become positive role models for the community. In 2016, The North Mankato Police Department initiated over 251 directed patrols.

Medication Collection

In partnership with Nicollet County and Excel Energy, the North Mankato Police Department implemented a Medication Collection Program in 2015. A secure drop box allows citizens to anonymously dispose of waste pharmaceuticals and narcotics free of charge. All items collected are disposed at a licensed incinerator within the State of Minnesota.

Since inception, 589 pounds of pharmaceutical waste including but not limited to prescription, non-prescription, narcotics, vitamins, supplements and ointments have been collected and properly disposed. The collection drop box is available in the North Mankato Police Department lobby during normal business hours. In 2016, 240 pounds of waste were collected.

Animal Control

The North Mankato Patrol Officers are responsible for responding to all animal control issues. This includes animals at-large, animals disturbing the peace, animal abuse and animal neglect. The City of North Mankato maintains an Impound Agreement with Premier Veterinary Center of Mankato. In 2016, the North Mankato Police Department responded to 318 animal related reports and impounded 54 animals.
