Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the North Mankato City Council was held in the Municipal Building Council Chambers on June 15, 2020. City Administrator Harrenstein on March 31, 2020, under MN Statute Section 13D.021, declared the use of electronic meetings due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Mayor Dehen called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm, asking that everyone join in the Pledge of Allegiance. The following were present remotely through Zoom for roll call: Council Members Oachs, Whitlock, Steiner, City Attorney Kennedy, Finance Director McCann, Community Development Director Fischer, Library Director Heintz, Caswell Sports Director Tostenson, and Police Chief Gullickson, Public Works Director Host, present in the Council Chambers for roll call: Council Member Norland, Mayor Dehen, City Administrator Harrenstein, and City Clerk Van Genderen. Citizen participation was available through teleconference and live stream of the meeting.

Approval of Agenda

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the agenda. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval of Emergency Council Minutes from the May 30, 2020, Emergency Council Meeting.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the minutes of the Emergency Council meeting of May 30, 2020. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval Council Minutes from the June 1, 2020, Council Meeting.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the minutes of the Council meeting of June 1, 2020. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Approval Council Work Session Minutes from the June 8, 2020, Council Session.

Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to approve the minutes of the Council Work Session of June 8, 2020. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Public Comments Concerning Business Items on the Agenda None.

Business Items

Z-2-20 Request to Zone Part of Sections 1&2 as R-1, One-Family Dwelling. Ordinance No. 129 Fourth Series Zoning Part of Sections 1 & 2 As R-1, One-Family Dwelling.

Community Development Director Fischer reported the applicant recently annexed 109 acres of land into the City limits to accommodate future single-family residential development. As the property is now in the City limits, it is necessary to provide a zoning classification based on the intended use of the property. The applicants' are proposing to zone the property as R-1, One-Family Dwelling. Included in the packet is the Future Land Use Map, which is in the Comprehensive Plan that guides the future use and zoning of the land. The applicants' property is guided for Low-Density Intermediate Residential. The minimum lot size requirements in City Code for R-1 lots are as follows: Lot width-90 feet, Lot depth-100 feet, and Lot size-9,000 square feet. Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Oachs, to adopt Ordinance No. 129 Fourth Series Zoning Part of Sections 1 & 2 as R-1, One-Family Dwelling. Mayor Dehen noted that there were several large open spaces between lots, and questioned their use? Community Development Director Fischer reported those would be reserved for stormwater holding ponds. Mayor Dehen asked clarification on the termination of Haughton into a piece of property that is not being annexed into the City. Community Development Director Fischer reported the property is not annexed, and there would be a cul-de-sac at that point. Council Member Norland commented on the letters included in the packet, which were concerned with traffic and speed. Council Member Norland noted she drove on the property and indicated she was concerned about the speed of those driving on the street. Council Member Oachs said this is for zoning, and the question could be considered during the Development Agreement discussion. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried. City Administrator Harrenstein suggested discussing the Preliminary Plat of Prairie Heights before the development agreement to answer some of the questions that were being discussed.

Consider Approving Preliminary Plat of Prairie Heights.

City Administrator Harrenstein stated the comments received from the surrounding neighborhood were thoughtful and consisted of two primary concerns: safety and parkland. He noted the plat does not include a park area. The North Mankato Parks Plan reveals that there are more acres of parkland per population than the national average and the area in question is served by the Walter S. Farm Park. City Administrator Harrenstein reported Countryside is one of the last rural roads in the community and the project will improve the road to an urban section. The development will be completed in phases so that traffic would increase slowly and any problems that arise can be addressed. Currently, there are no immediate concerns. The new road will improve the safety of the street with sidewalks on both sides and an on-street bike sharrow. Mayor Dehen reported based on the City's size and population, the City should have 18 acres parkland, and the City has 23 acres. As the development slowly increases/grows, the City can implement stop signs and other options to slow the speed of traffic. City Engineer Sarff stated he reviewed the comments, and most were related to Countryside Drive, not having the correct functionality for the expanded development. He reported most of those concerns would be addressed with the improvement to the road, but the area will be monitored to determine if additional traffic controls should be added. City Administrator Harrenstein commented that the plat shows several outlots that may need to be connected as stormwater holding ponds and a replat may occur later. Phase 1 has 46 lots and will be an attractive addition and will be good for the community. Community Development Director Fischer reported the ravines would either be dedicated to the City or put in a conservation easement to ensure the City can protect and maintain the ravines. The Planning Commission will review that information when it has the Final Plat. Further discussion was held concerning traffic control when the new 45 houses are built, and it was decided staff could continue to monitor the traffic as the development grows. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock, to Approve the Preliminary Plat of Prairie Heights. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Consider the Development Agreement for Prairie Heights.

City Administrator Harrenstein reported the Development agreement was between the City of North Mankato and Prairie Heights Development, LLC. The City's responsibilities include the reconstruction of a portion of Countryside Drive from Haughton Avenue to Coventry Lane, construct oversized stormwater ponds to provide stormwater management for Countryside Drive, excess stormwater discharge rate control, stormwater treatment, any wetland mitigation, and assess costs in accordance with the assessment policy. The developer will privately construct and finance the improvement and will be completed within 12 months of the date of the agreement. The developer agrees to build five homes annually until all phases of the development are completed. The proposed development property currently has \$352,598.75 in outstanding deferred assessments, and the developer agrees to pay all outstanding deferred assessments prior to the City beginning reconstruction of the Countryside Drive and within seven calendar days of the final plat for phase one of the Prairie Heights Subdivision being approved by the North Mankato City Council. The developer will begin construction of Prairie Heights Phase 2 Subdivision consisting of 46 lots within 36 months of the date of this agreement. The City will defer the special assessments for the public improvements described in the agreement that benefit the lots adjacent to Countryside Drive that are included in Phase 2 until construction begins on Phase 2 or 36 months of the date of this agreement. City Administrator Harrenstein thanked Rich Weyhe from Prairie Heights Development for working with the City to develop the land and create an asset. Mayor Dehen stated this is a great infill project, and the collection of the deferred assessments will help the budget. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Steiner, to adopt the Development Agreement for Prairie Heights. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Res. No. 54-20 Accepting Bid Dakota Meadows Middle School Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Improvement Project SP 150-090-003, MINN. PROJ. NO. TA 5220 (152) City Project NO. 19-07 DE.

City Engineer Sarff reported bids were received and opened on Thursday, May 28^{th,} at 11:00 am. Three bids were received below is the tabulation:

Nielsen Concrete, LLC \$627,574.54 W.W. Blacktopping, Inc \$670,008.09 Dirt Merchant, Inc. \$672,022.58

The winning bid was Nielsen Concrete, LLC, which is 17% below the engineer's estimate of \$753,558.95. City Engineer Sarff requested the resolution be amended to include that the contract will be awarded following MnDOT award approval. City Administrator Harrenstein stated the trail would continue the plan to connect the City. Council Member Steiner moved, seconded by Council Member Norland, to adopt Res. No. 54-20 Accepting Bid Dakota Meadows Middle School Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Improvement Project SP 150-090-003, MINN. PROJ. NO. TA 5220 (152) City Project NO. 19-07 DE amended with language stating the contract will not be awarded

until after MnDOT award approval. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Discuss City Facility Reopening Guidelines.

City Administrator Harrenstein reported the document presented is nearly identical to one reviewed by City Council a few weeks earlier at a meeting. He stated the document includes plans for reopening City Hall, the Police Annex, the Library, Caswell Park, and references to the swim facility. The plan would be to open everything on Wednesday, June 17th. City Administrator Harrenstein reviewed the specific policies and requested clarification on if the City Council would be comfortable reopening. He stated it was unclear from the State whether Caswell softball leagues should begin reopening. He noted the association and staff are comfortable with the reopening, but no definitive guidance has been provided from the State, he noted neither he nor the staff could recommend opening but would defer to the Council's desire on whether to open. Council Member Oachs encouraged the public to understand that there will be changes with how customer service is managed, and that staff may need additional time to adjust. A discussion was held concerning managing social distancing at the swim facility and how staff will manage those issues. Library Director Heintz reported the swim facility staff was trained and felt comfortable managing the problems and directing difficult problems or situations to those in charge. She commented that the library staff is ready and feels comfortable with the opening. Mayor Dehen requested clarification on if the Blue Earth County Library would be opening also. Library Director Heintz stated they were not comfortable opening at this time, but St. Peter and New Ulm Libraries were opening on June 15th. She did request permission to remain closed on Saturday. Caswell Sports Director Tostenson reported Caswell Park has an opportunity to host a small tournament on the weekend of June 20th. Clear protective measures would be taken to protect players. Still, he noted the State had not provided clear guidance that the ballpark could open. A discussion was held concerning other outdoor activities being allowed, clear direction to all players being established, and the use of a waiver of liability for added protection for the City. Attorney Kennedy reported a City has certain immunities, but the insurance company would encourage the use of the waiver. A continued discussion was held concerning if the City would permit the opening of softball and volleyball even without clear state guidance. Council Member Oachs stated she would be comfortable if there is clear guidance. Council Member Steiner requested clarification on if the Governor's office has provided guidance. Mayor Dehen commented the office has been mute, but gatherings of up to 250 people are allowed. Council Member Steiner stated he was comfortable if the players stay within the guidelines and practice social distancing. Council Member Whitlock stated he was comfortable. Mayor Dehen said he would also approve if a waiver is signed by all participants. Council Member Norland stated she agreed that they should try to move forward with the games. Council Member Norland moved, seconded by Council Member Whitlock to Open Softball and Volleyball Leagues and Tournaments at Caswell with Social Distancing and Every Participant Signing a Waiver. Vote on the motion: Whitlock, Steiner, Norland, Oachs, and Dehen aye; no nays. Motion carried.

Open Forum

None.

City Administrator and Staff Comments

City Administrator Harrenstein thanked Library Director Heintz and Aquatics Programming Director Sands for their work at the swim facility. He thanked Library Director Heintz for putting the Drive-In-Movie together.

Public Works Director Host reported the Spring Drop Off event was a well-attended event with 2,360 vehicles going through the gate, which averages out to 450 vehicles a day. He stated 255.79 tons of garbage was disposed of during the long weekend. Public Works Director Host reported the mill and overlay projects for 2020 would be concluded within the week. Additional projects would begin in the next few weeks, including the Monroe Avenue reconstruction and the Dakota Meadows project.

Finance Director McCann reviewed COVID-19 Budget impact information reporting the City is anticipating a \$950,000 revenue shortfall across all funds. He noted that Caswell Sports revenue is tied to expenditures, and that will work out. He stated the Department Heads were requested to reduce their budgets by 5% to reflect the loss in the General Fund. Department Heads have made adjustments and are following the new budgets. Most cut supplies, personnel, travel, and training. He stated additional information would be forthcoming as work continues on the budget.

Library Director Heintz reported the library and swim facility were looking forward to opening the facilities.

Community Development Director Fischer reported North Mankato had had a self-response rate for the 2020 Census of 80%. The State of Minnesota has a response rate of 70%, and nationally the response rate is 61%, so North Mankato is doing a great job of reporting.

Police Chief Gullickson reported the reserve police force had begun park patrols on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. They are a visible presence in the park and are helping to police the dog issues that have been reported. The reserves are also working on meeting the public and providing a positive presence.

Mayor and Council Comments

Council Member Oachs reported she would like to begin the Budget Work Sessions as this budgeting year will be difficult.

Council Member Oachs encouraged people to get out and look at the new sculptures.

Council Member Whitlock thanked the Police Reserves for patrolling the park and providing a positive interaction opportunity.

Council Member Steiner requested information on if a final location for Sitting Bull statue has been established. City Administrator Harrenstein reported he completed a tour with local native American representatives who took pictures of possible places and forwarded those possibilities to the Hauk Papa tribe for direction.

Mayor Dehen commented that the new City Art looked good but encouraged residents to visit Commerce Drive to view the new statues associated with the Commerce Drive project.

Council Member Norland commented that she had walked around the drive-in movie, and it was an exciting event.

Council Member Norland stated she was grateful for how well the drop-off went.

Council Member Norland encouraged residents to be mindful of how much plastic we consume and to reduce the use as the plastic is finding its way into our food source.

Mayor Dehen requested clarification on if City staff have direction on when to open the Council Meetings back to in-person meetings. City Administrator Harrenstein stated staff do not have recommendations but will review what other cities are doing and provide a recommendation at the next Council Meeting on July 6, 2020.

At 8:36 pm on a motion by Council Member Norland, seconded by Council Member Steiner, the Council Meeting was adjourned.

Audio Permit

About:

An audio permit is required for anyone operating outdoor amplified sound (i.e., a loudspeaker, public address system, or sound amplifying equipment). All Audio Permits must be approved by the Council. The sound system cannot be operated before 7:00 am or after 10:00 pm. There is a \$25 fee.

Audio Permit Responsibilities:

- An onsite event coordinator must be available by mobile during the event.
- An applicant will provide a schedule of any music or entertainment proposed to occur during the event.
- A beginning and end time must be supplied on the application, and the event coordinator must ensure compliance.
- Applicants must comply with City Code Ordinance 90.045 and Minnesota Rules Chapter 7030, which limits noise.
- Noise levels cannot exceed 60 dBA more than 50 percent of the time.

What happens if there is a noise complaint?

- A North Mankato Patrol Officer will meet with the complainant and evaluate and measure the noise using a decibel reader at the location of the complainant.
- If the noise is found out of compliance, the Patrol Officer will contact the onsite event coordinator, and the amplified sound must be turned down.
- If the onsite event coordinator does not comply, the event will be immediately terminated, and the group will be disbursed.
- Failure to comply will affect future ability to obtain an audio permit.

- (4) the City anticipates awarding the sale of the Bonds to the bidder who submits a firm offer to purchase the Bonds at the highest price (or lowest cost), as set forth in this Notice of Sale.

Any bid submitted pursuant to this Notice of Sale shall be considered a firm offer for the purchase of the Bonds, as specified in the bid.

In the event that the competitive sale requirements are not satisfied, the City shall promptly so advise the winning bidder. The City may then determine to treat the initial offering price to the public as of the award date of the Bonds as the issue price of each maturity by imposing on the winning bidder the Hold-the-Offering-Price Rule as described in the following paragraph (the "Hold-the-Offering-Price Rule"). Bids will <u>not</u> be subject to cancellation in the event that the City determines to apply the Hold-the-Offering-Price Rule to the Bonds. Bidders should prepare their bids on the assumption that the Bonds will be subject to the Hold-the-Offering-Price Rule in order to establish the issue price of the Bonds.

By submitting a bid, the winning bidder shall (i) confirm that the underwriters have offered or will offer the Bonds to the public on or before the date of award at the offering price or prices (the "Initial Offering Price"), or at the corresponding yield or yields, set forth in the bid submitted by the winning bidder and (ii) agree, on behalf of the underwriters participating in the purchase of the Bonds, that the underwriters will neither offer nor sell unsold Bonds of any maturity to which the Hold-the-Offering Price Rule shall apply to any person at a price that is higher than the Initial Offering Price to the public during the period starting on the award date for the Bonds and ending on the earlier of the following:

- (1) the close of the fifth (5th) business day after the award date; or

By submitting a bid, each bidder confirms that: (i) any agreement among underwriters, any selling group agreement and each retail distribution agreement (to which the bidder is a party) relating to the initial sale of the Bonds to the public, together with the related pricing wires, contains or will contain language obligating each underwriter, each dealer who is a member of the selling group, and each broker-dealer that is a party to such retail distribution agreement, as applicable, to comply with the Hold-the-Offering-Price Rule, if applicable, in each case if and for so long as directed by the winning bidder and as set forth in the related pricing wires, and (ii) any agreement among underwriters relating to the initial sale of the Bonds to the public, together with the related pricing wires, contains or will contain language obligating each underwriter that is a party to a retail distribution agreement to be employed in connection with the initial sale of the Bonds to the public to require each broker-dealer that is a party to such retail distribution agreement to comply with the Hold-the-Offering-Price Rule, if applicable, in each case if and for so long as directed by the winning bidder or such underwriter and as set forth in the related pricing wires.

Notes: Sales of any Bonds to any person that is a related party to an underwriter shall not constitute sales to the public for purposes of this Notice of Sale. Further, for purposes of this Notice of Sale:

- (1) "public" means any person other than an underwriter or a related party,
- (2) "underwriter" means (A) any person that agrees pursuant to a written contract with the City (or with the lead underwriter to form an underwriting syndicate) to participate in the initial sale of the Bonds to the public and (B) any person that agrees pursuant to a written contract directly or indirectly with a person described in clause (A) to participate in the initial sale of the Bonds to the public (including a member of a selling group or a party to a retail distribution agreement participating in the initial sale of the Bonds to the public).
- (3) a purchaser of any of the Bonds is a "related party" to an underwriter if the underwriter and the purchaser are subject, directly or indirectly, to (i) at least 50% common ownership of the voting power or the total value of their stock, if both entities are corporations (including direct ownership by one corporation or another), (ii) more than 50% common ownership of their capital interests or profits interests, if both entities are partnerships (including direct ownership by one partnership of another), or (iii) more than 50% common ownership of the value of the outstanding stock of the corporation or the capital interests or profit interests of the partnership, as applicable, if one entity is a corporation and the other entity is a partnership (including direct ownership of the applicable stock or interests by one entity of the other), and
- (4) "sale date" means the date that the Bonds are awarded by the City to the winning bidder.

ADJUSTMENTS TO PRINCIPAL AMOUNT AFTER PROPOSALS

The City reserves the right to increase or decrease the principal amount of the Bonds. Any such increase or decrease will be made in multiples of \$5,000 and may be made in any maturity. If any maturity is adjusted, the purchase price will also be adjusted to maintain the same gross spread. Such adjustments shall be made promptly after the sale and prior to the award of Proposals by the City and shall be at the sole discretion of the City. The successful bidder may not withdraw or modify its Proposal once submitted to the City for any reason, including post-sale adjustment. Any adjustment shall be conclusive and shall be binding upon the successful bidder.

OPTIONAL REDEMPTION

Bonds maturing on February 1, 2029 through 2036 are subject to redemption and prepayment at the option of the City on February 1, 2028 and any date thereafter, at a price of par plus accrued interest. Redemption may be in whole or in part of the Bonds subject to prepayment. If redemption is in part, the maturities and principal amounts within each maturity to be redeemed shall be determined by the City and if only part of the Bonds having a common maturity date are called for prepayment, the specific Bonds to be prepaid shall be chosen by lot by the Bond Registrar.

CUSIP NUMBERS

If the Bonds qualify for assignment of CUSIP numbers such numbers will be printed on the Bonds, but neither the failure to print such numbers on any Bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for a failure or refusal by the successful bidder thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the Bonds in accordance with terms of the purchase contract. The CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the assignment of CUSIP identification numbers shall be paid by the successful bidder.

DELIVERY

Delivery of the Bonds will be within thirty days after award, subject to an approving legal opinion by Taft Stettinius & Hollister, Bond Counsel. The legal opinion will be paid by the City and delivery will be anywhere in the continental United States without cost to the successful bidder at DTC.

TYPE OF PROPOSAL

Proposals of not less than \$3,366,000 (99.00%) and accrued interest on the principal sum of \$3,400,000 must be filed with the undersigned prior to the time of sale. A good faith deposit (the "Deposit") in the amount of \$68,000 in the form of a federal wire transfer (payable to the order of the City) is only required from the apparent winning bidder, and must be received within two hours after the time stated for the receipt of Proposals. The apparent winning bidder will receive notification of the wire instructions from the Municipal Advisor promptly after the sale. If the Deposit is not received from the apparent winning bidder in the time allotted, the City may choose to reject their Proposal and then proceed to offer the Bonds to the next lowest bidder based on the terms of their original proposal, so long as said bidder wires funds for the Deposit amount within two hours of said offer.

The City will retain the Deposit of the successful bidder, the amount of which will be deducted at settlement and no interest will accrue to the successful bidder. In the event the successful bidder fails to comply with the accepted Proposal, said amount will be retained by the City. No Proposal can be withdrawn after the time set for receiving Proposals unless the meeting of the City scheduled for award of the Bonds is adjourned, recessed, or continued to another date without award of the Bonds having been made.

AWARD

The Bonds will be awarded on the basis of the lowest interest rate to be determined on a true interest cost (TIC) basis. INFORMATION FROM SUCCESSFUL BIDDER

The successful bidder will be required to provide, in a timely manner, certain information relating to the initial offering price of the Bonds necessary to compute the yield on the Bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT

By awarding the Bonds to any underwriter or underwriting syndicate submitting a Proposal therefor, the City agrees that, no more than seven business days after the date of such award, it shall provide to the senior managing underwriter of the syndicate to which the Bonds are awarded, the Final Official Statement in an electronic format as prescribed by the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board (MSRB).

FULL CONTINUING DISCLOSURE UNDERTAKING

The City will covenant in the resolution awarding the sale of the Bonds and in a Continuing Disclosure Undertaking to provide, or cause to be provided, annual financial information, including audited financial statements of the City, and notices of certain material events, as required by SEC Rule 15c2-12.

BANK QUALIFICATION

The City will designate the Bonds as qualified tax-exempt obligations for purposes of Section 265(b)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

BOND INSURANCE AT UNDERWRITER'S OPTION

If the Bonds qualify for issuance of any policy of municipal bond insurance or commitment therefor at the option of the successful bidder, the purchase of any such insurance policy or the issuance of any such commitment shall be at the sole option and expense of the successful bidder of the Bonds. Any increase in the costs of issuance of the Bonds resulting from such purchase of insurance shall be paid by the successful bidder, except that, if the City has requested and received a rating on the Bonds from a rating agency, the City will pay that rating fee. Any other rating agency fees shall be the responsibility of the successful bidder. Failure of the municipal bond insurer to issue the policy after the Bonds have been awarded to the successful bidder shall not constitute cause for failure or refusal by the successful bidder to accept delivery on the Bonds.

The City reserves the right to reject any and all Proposals, to waive informalities and to adjourn the sale.

Issue Overview

Purpose

Proceeds from the Bonds will be used to fund improvements to Monroe Avenue, Countryside Drive, and the Dakota Meadows Safe Routes to School/Howard Dr. surface improvements. The Bonds have been sized based on estimates provided by City staff on June 12, 2020. The table below contains the sources and uses of funds for the bond issue.

Authority

The Bonds will be issued pursuant to the authority of Minnesota Statutes, Chapters 475 and 429.

Structure

The Bonds have been structured to result in relatively level annual debt service payments over the life of the Bonds.

The proposed structure for the bond issue and preliminary debt service projections are illustrated in Attachment 1.

Security and Source of Repayment

The Bonds will be general obligations of the City. The finance plan relies on the following assumptions for the revenues used to pay debt service, as provided by City staff:

- <u>Special Assessments</u>. The City is expected to levy special assessments against benefited properties in the amount of \$741,000 (City's estimate as of June 12, 2020). The assessments will be payable over 15 years, with an interest rate of 2% over the average coupon on the Bonds (currently assumed to be 3.25%), and structured for level annual payments of principal and interest. The assessments will be levied in 2020 for initial payment in 2021.
- Property Taxes. The remaining revenues needed to pay debt service on the Bonds are expected to come from property tax levies. The initial projections show an annual tax levy, averaging \$200,972 annually, is needed, which includes the statutory requirement of 105% of debt service, after accounting for assessments. The levy will be adjusted annually based on actual special assessment collections, and additional monies in the debt service fund. The initial tax levy will be made in 2020 for taxes payable in 2021.

The table in Attachment 2 shows the estimated flow of funds, including the 5% overlevy.

Plan Rationale

The Finance Plan recommended in this report is based on a variety of factors and information provided by the City related to the financed projects and City objectives, Northland's knowledge of the City and our experience in working with similar cities and projects. The issuance of General Obligation Improvement Bonds provides the best means of achieving the City's objectives and

cost effective financing. The City has successfully issued and managed this type of debt for previous projects.

Issuing Process

Northland will receive bids to purchase the Bonds on Monday, August 17, 2020 at 10:30 AM. Market conditions and the marketability of the Bonds support issuance through a competitive sale. This process has been chosen as it is intended to produce the lowest combination of interest expense and underwriting expense on the date and time set to receive bids. The calendar of events for the issuing process can be found in Attachment 4.

Attachment 3 - Related Considerations

Bank Qualification

We understand the City (in combination with any subordinate taxing jurisdictions or debt issued in the City's name by 501(c)3 corporations) anticipates issuing \$10,000,000 or less in tax-exempt debt during this calendar year. Therefore the Bonds will be designated as "bank qualified" obligations pursuant to Federal Tax Law.

Arbitrage Compliance

The Bonds are expected to qualify for the "24-month spending" exemption related to arbitrage rebate.

The City should become familiar with the various Arbitrage Compliance requirements for this bond issue. The Resolution for the Bonds prepared by Bond Counsel explains the requirements in greater detail.

Continuing Disclosure

Type: Full

Dissemination Agent: Northland Securities

The requirements for continuing disclosure are governed by SEC Rule 15c2-12. The primary requirements of Rule 15c2-12 actually fall on underwriters. The Rule sets forth due diligence needed prior to the underwriter's purchase of municipal securities. Part of this requirement is obtaining commitment from the issuer to provide continuing disclosure. The document describing the continuing disclosure commitments (the "Undertaking") is contained in the Official Statement that will be prepared to offer the Bonds to investors.

The City has more than \$10,000,000 of outstanding debt and is required to undertake "full" continuing disclosure. Full disclosure requires annual posting of the audit and a separate continuing disclosure report, as well as the reporting of certain "material events." Material events set forth in the Rule, including, but not limited to, bond rating changes, call notices, and issuance of "financial obligations" (such as PFA loans, leases, or bank placements) must be reported within ten business days of occurrence. The report contains annual financial information and operating data that "mirrors" material information presented in the Official Statement. The specific contents of the annual report will be described in the Undertaking that appears in the appendix of the Official Statement. Northland currently serves as dissemination agent for the City, assisting with the annual reporting. The information for the Bonds will be incorporated into our reporting.

Premiums

In the current market environment, it is likely that bids received from underwriters will include premiums. A premium bid occurs when the purchaser pays the City an amount in excess of the par amount of a maturity in exchange for a higher coupon (interest rate). The use of premiums reflects the bidder's view on future market conditions, tax considerations for investors and other factors. Ultimately, the true interest cost ("TIC") calculation will determine the lowest bid, regardless of premium.

A premium bid produces additional funds that can be used in several ways:

 The premium means that the City needs less bond proceeds and can reduce the size of the issue by the amount of the premium.

- The premium can be deposited in the Construction Fund and used to pay additional project costs, rather than used to reduce the size of the issue.
- The premium can be deposited in the Debt Service Fund and used to pay principal and interest.

Northland will work with City staff on the sale day to determine use of premium (if any).

Rating

A rating will be requested from Standard and Poor's (S&P). The City's general obligation debt is currently rated "AA" by S&P. The rating process will include a conference call with the rating analyst. Northland will assist City staff in preparing for and conducting the rating call.

Attachment 5 - Risk Factors

Property Taxes: Property tax levies shown in this Finance Plan are based on projected debt service and other revenues. Final levies will be set based on the results of sale. Levies should be reviewed annually and adjusted as needed. The debt service levy must be included in the preliminary levy for annual Truth in Taxation hearings. Future Legislative changes in the property tax system, including the imposition of levy limits and changes in calculation of property values, would affect plans for payment of debt service. Delinquent payment of property taxes would reduce revenues available to pay debt service.

Special Assessments: Special assessments for the financed project have not been levied at this time. This Finance Plan is based on the assumptions listed earlier in this report. Changes in the terms and timing for the actual assessments will alter the projected flow of funds for payment of debt service on the Bonds. Also, special assessments may be prepaid. It is likely that the income earned on the investment of prepaid assessments will be less than the interest paid if the assessments remained outstanding. Delinquencies in assessment collections would reduce revenues needed to pay debt service. The collection of deferred assessments (if any) have not been included in the revenue projections. Projected assessment income should be reviewed annually and adjusted as needed.

General: In addition to the risks described above, there are certain general risks associated with the issuance of bonds. These risks include, but are not limited to:

- Failure to comply with covenants in bond resolution.
- Failure to comply with Undertaking for continuing disclosure.
- Failure to comply with IRS regulations, including regulations related to use of the proceeds
 and arbitrage/rebate. The IRS regulations govern the ability of the City to issue its bonds as
 tax-exempt securities and failure to comply with the IRS regulations may lead to loss of taxexemption.

MUNICIPAL ADVISORY SERVICE AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF NORTH MANKATO, MINNESOTA AND NORTHLAND SECURITIES, INC.

This Agreement made and entered into by and between the City of North Mankato, Minnesota (hereinafter "City") and Northland Securities, Inc., of Minneapolis, Minnesota (hereinafter "NSI").

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the City desires to have NSI provide it with advice on the structure, terms, timing and other matters related to the issuance of the General Obligation Improvement Bonds, Series 2020B (the "Debt") serving in the role of municipal (financial) advisor, and

WHEREAS, NSI is a registered municipal advisor with both the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") and the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board ("MSRB") (registration # 866-00082-00), and

WHEREAS, NSI will act as municipal advisor in accordance with the duties and responsibilities of Rule G-42 of the MSRB, and

WHEREAS, the MSRB provides a municipal advisory client brochure on its website (www.msrb.org) that describes the protections that may be provided by the MSRB rules, including professional competency, fair dealing, duty of loyalty, remedies for disputes and how to file a complaint with an appropriate regulatory authority, and

WHEREAS, the City and NSI are entering into this Agreement to define the municipal advisory relationship at the earliest opportunity related to the inception of the municipal advisory relationship for the Debt, and

WHEREAS, NSI desires to furnish services to the City as hereinafter described,

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the parties as follows:

SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY NSI

NSI shall provide the City with services necessary to analyze, structure, offer for sale and close the Debt. The services will be tailored to meet the needs of this engagement and may include:

Planning and Development

- 1. Assist City officials to define the scope and the objectives for the Debt.
- 2. Investigate and consider reasonably feasible financing alternatives.
- 3. Assist the City in understanding the material risks, potential benefits, structure and other characteristics of the recommended plan for the Debt, including issue structure, estimated debt service payments, projected revenues, method of issuance, bond rating, sale timing, and call provisions.

- Prepare a schedule of events related to the issuance process.
- 5. Coordinate with bond counsel any actions needed to authorize the issuance of the Debt.
- 6. Attend meetings of the City Council and other project and bond issue related meetings as needed and as requested.

Bond Sale

- 1. Assist the City with the preparation, review and approval of the preliminary official statement (POS).
- 2. Assist the City and bond counsel with preparing and publishing the Official Notice of Sale if required by law.
- 3. Prepare and submit application for bond rating(s) and assist the City with furnishing the rating agency(s) with any additional information required to conduct the rating review. Assist the City with preparing and conducting the rating call or other presentation.
- 4. Assist the City in receiving the bids, compute the accuracy of the bids received, and recommend to the City the most favorable bid for award.
- 5. Coordinate with bond counsel the preparation of required contracts and resolutions.

Post-Sale Support

- 1. Assist the City with the preparation of final official statement, distribution to the underwriter and posting on EMMA.
- 2. Coordinate the bond issue closing, including making all arrangements for bond printing, registration, and delivery.
- 3. Furnish to the City a complete transcript of the transaction, if not provided by bond counsel.

There are no specific limitations on the scope of this agreement.

COMPENSATION

For providing these services with respect to the Debt, NSI shall be paid a lump sum of \$25,500. The fee due to NSI shall be payable by the City upon the closing of the Bonds.

NSI agrees to pay the following expenses from its fee:

- Out-of-pocket expenses such as travel, long distance phone, and copy costs.
- Production and distribution of material to rating agencies and/or bond insurance companies.
- Preparation of the bond transcript.

The City agrees to pay for all other expenses related to the processing of the bond issue(s) including, but not limited to, the following:

- Engineering and/or architectural fees.
- Publication of legal notices.
- Bond counsel and local attorney fees.
- Fees for various debt certificates.
- The cost of printing Official Statements, if any.
- City staff expenses.
- Airfare and lodging expenses of one NSI official and City officials when and if traveling for rating agency presentations.
- Rating agency fees, if any.
- Bond insurance fees, if any.
- Accounting and other related fees.

It is expressly understood that there is no obligation on the part of the City under the terms of this Agreement to issue the Debt. If the Debt is not issued, NSI agrees to pay its own expenses and receive no fee for any municipal advisory services it has rendered pursuant to this Agreement.

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

NSI is not aware of any material conflicts of interest that could reasonably be anticipated to impair NSI's ability to provide advice to or on behalf of the City in accordance with the standards of conduct for municipal advisors.

The compensation for services provided in this Agreement is customary in the municipal securities market, but may pose a conflict of interest. Since the fee is payable at closing and only if the Debt is issued, NSI may have an incentive to encourage issuance. Compensation linked to the size of the transaction may provide incentive to increase the amount of the Debt. Compensation considerations will not impair NSI's ability to provide unbiased and competent advice or to fulfill its fiduciary duty to the City. In executing this Agreement, the City acknowledges and accepts the potential conflicts of interest posed by the compensation to NSI.

Northland Capital Holdings is the parent company of NSI. Another subsidiary of Northland Capital Holdings is Northland Trust, Inc. Northland Trust provides paying agent services to issuers of municipal bonds. The City is solely responsible for the decision on the source of paying agent services. Any engagement of Northland Trust is outside the scope of this Agreement. No compensation paid to Northland Trust is shared with NSI.

NSI does not provide executive search, organizational development, compensation systems or other management consulting services that may directly or indirectly affect City staff that recommend the engagement of municipal advisor services and may pose a conflict of interest.

LEGAL AND DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

There are no legal or disciplinary events reported by the Securities and Exchange Commission contained in Form MA or Form MA-I. The City can find information about these forms and accessing information related to NSI at www.sec.gov/municipal/oms-edgar-links.

SUCCESSORS OR ASSIGNS

The terms and provisions of this Agreement are binding upon and inure to the benefit of the City and NSI and their successors or assigns.

TERM OF THIS AGREEMENT

This Agreement may be terminated by thirty (30) days written notice by either the City or NSI	and it
shall terminate sixty (60) days following the closing date related to the issuance of the Debt.

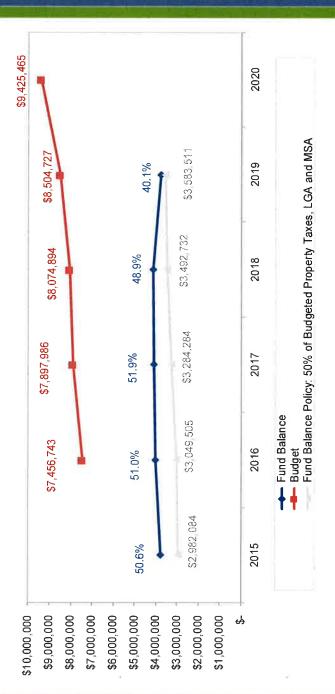

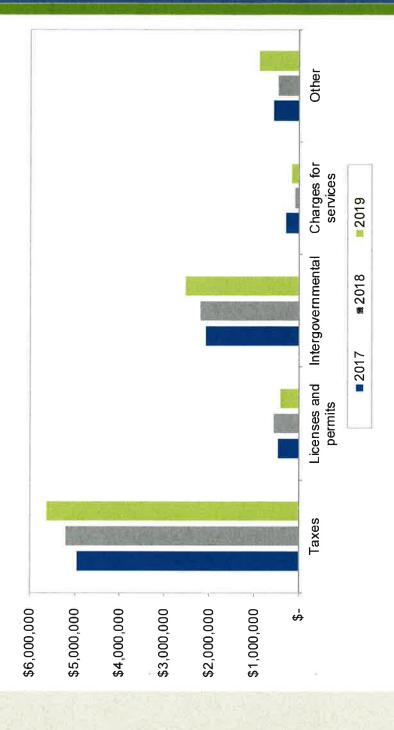

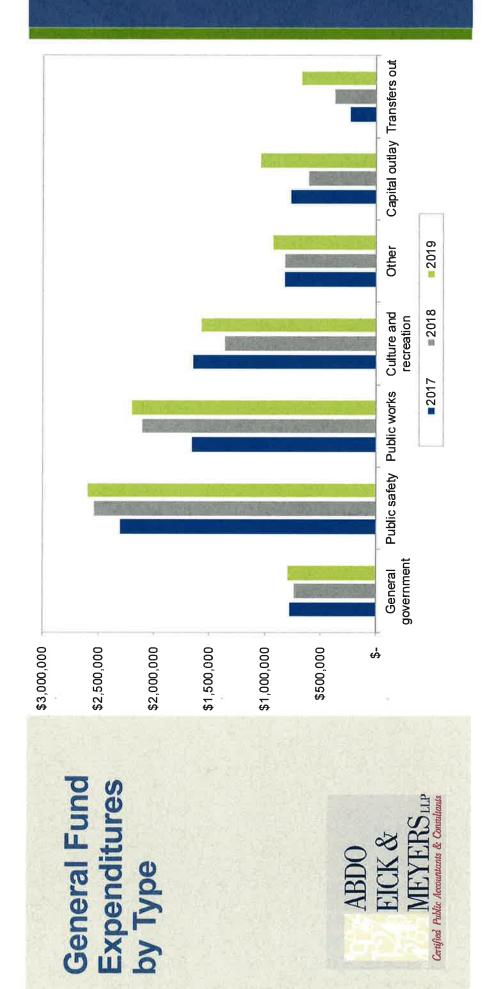

General Fund Revenues by Type



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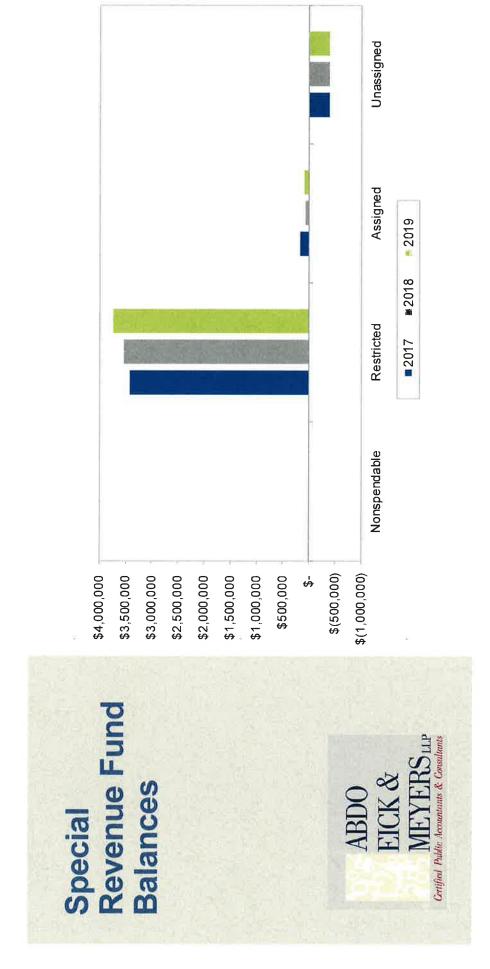

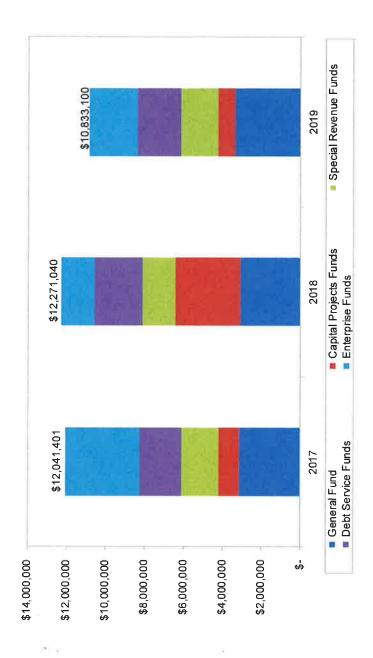


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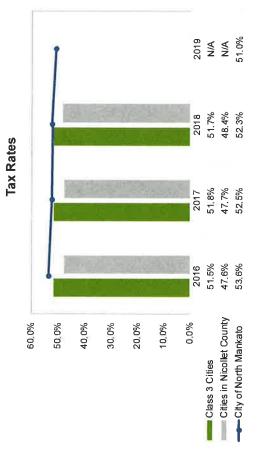
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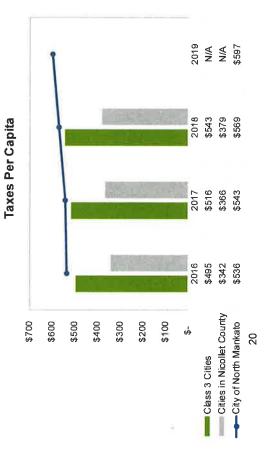
Cash and Investments Balances by Fund Type







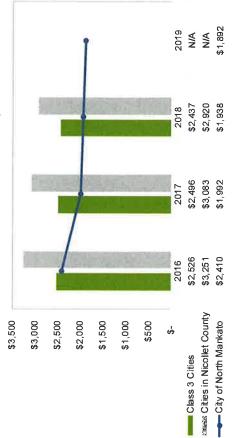




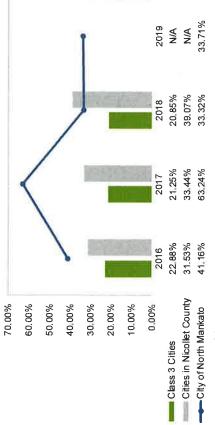

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Long term Debt - Per Capita

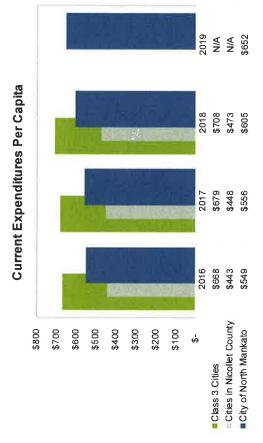


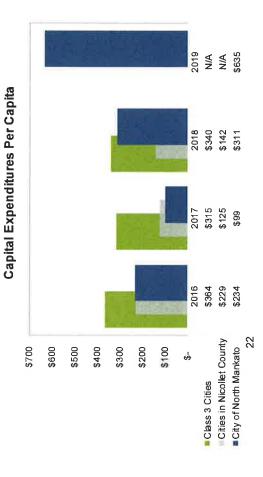
Debt Service Expenditures as a Percent of Current **Expenditures**

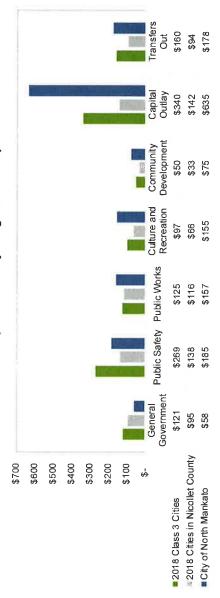




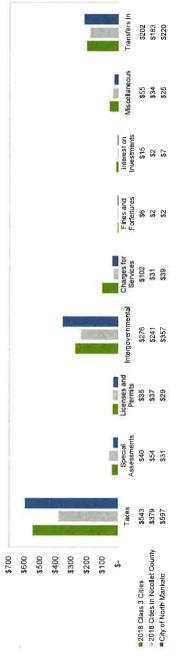


Key Ratio

DEMOGRAPHICS

Introduction -

The City of North Mankato is growing at a rate similar to many comparable geographies including Nicollet County, the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA), and the State of Minnesota. However, the City's growth rate overall has decreased over the past couple decades from 16.1% over the 1990-2000 period, to 13.5% over the 2000-2010 period, and, lastly, 6.7% over the 2010-2019 period. North Mankato is not alone, as this trend is similar to other geographies. Also, the City exhibits the fifth highest growth rate among the 17 comparable geographies identified in this study, surpassing both Nicollet County and the MSA according to 2019 data.

The median age has increased 2.4 years over the nine-year period from 2010 to 2019 from 35.5 to 37.9. Esri 2019 estimates indicate that North Mankato's population age groups fall within 2.5% of the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) in the Youth, Retiree/Seniors, and Elderly age ranges. The College age group has 7% less residents than the MSA and the Working Age group has 7% more than the MSA. **Table 1** identifies key age groups in the City.

The City remains predominantly White which represents 90.3% of the total City population. Nicollet County, the MSA, and the State all show similar characteristics for race with the State showing slightly greater percentages of minority populations in some instances. While non-White populations are low, groups have grown 50% to 100% from 2010-2019 which indicates the area is slowly diversifying.

The number of households in North Mankato increased by 7.3% or approximately 410 between 2010-2019 which accounted for 11% of all household growth in the MSA. Despite this, the average number of persons per household in North Mankato stayed relatively flat at 2.38 in 2019 compared to 2.39 in 2010. In 2019, there were 82 less households in the 15-24 age range, 138 more households in the 25-44 age groups, 149 less households in the 45-54 age range and 495 more households in 55+ range when compared to 2010. While this may indicate the City has an aging population, it also may indicate that North Mankato residents wish to stay in the community as they become empty nesters and that more and more young families are choosing to reside in the City to raise their families.

Population Trends

Recent estimates for population are available from various sources. **Table 2** and **Figure 1** present population growth trends among 17 different geographies with 2019 estimates from Esri being presented as the most recent available data.

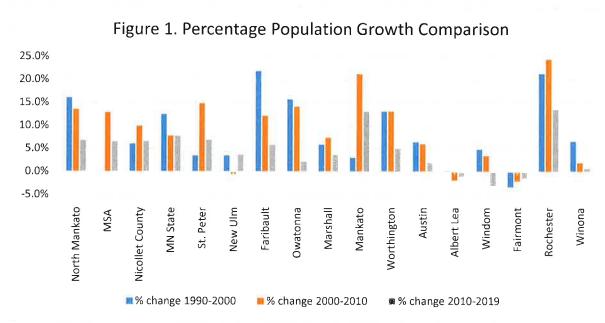

For North Mankato, there is relative consistency between the available data sources on total population. Esri's estimate for 2019 showed 14,296 people living in the City. For comparison, the State Demographer's 2018 estimate for the City was 14,059 people, and the Census Bureau's 2018 estimate was 13,914. To understand how estimates compare, they were reduced to an annual average to adjust for the one-year time difference and normalize the data. These data indicate the City has been adding between 65 and 100 people annually since 2010. Estimates from Esri and the State Demographer are more similar and near the upper end of this range, with average growth of approximately 83 to 100 people per year.

The City of North Mankato has been exhibiting population growth, but at a decreasing rate. The City grew by over 1,600 individuals in both periods from 1990 to 2000 and 2000 to 2010, while only adding

900 residents over the timeframe from 2010 to 2019. However, North Mankato isn't the only community exhibiting this trend. Cities such as Faribault, Owatonna, Austin, and Winona are trending similarly. In fact, among a list of 17 comparison geographies, North Mankato ranks in the top five on the list in terms of percentage growth in 2019. This is slightly more than Nicollet County and the MSA while slightly less than the state of Minnesota.



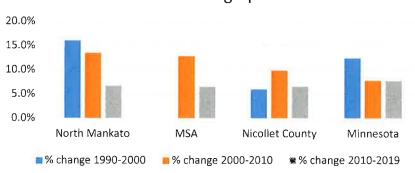

Table 3 shows North Mankato leading in growth rate between 1990 and 2000 over the MSA, Nicollet County, and the State. North Mankato also grew at a higher percentage between 2000 and 2010. Growth percentages between 2010 and 2019 were similar between each geography with the State leading slightly.

<u>Key Takeaway for Population Trends:</u> While North Mankato's growth rate is decreasing over time, the City is still growing at a rate that is faster than many comparable geographies including Nicollet County and the MSA.

Median Age

The City of North Mankato's median age is estimated to be 37.9 in 2019 compared to 35.5 in 2010. North Mankato's median age is within 4.5 years of the MSA, exhibiting a median age of 33.4, and within 1 year of the State, exhibiting a median age of 38.7. Generally, these populations exhibit similar median age characteristics. **Table 4** identifies median age among comparable geographies.

<u>Key Takeaway for Median Age:</u> The City's Median Age rose 2.4 years over the last decade which may provide some indication of an aging population. All comparison geographies exhibited similar increases.

Post-Secondary Student Population

The Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS) Survey includes an estimate of the number of residents enrolled in some type of post-secondary educational program, including undergraduate and

graduate school programs. In addition to the actual number of people, this information can be compared to the total population level to provide information of the percentage of students. The ACS total population estimate has also been used when calculating the percentage. The most recent data release from the ACS is for 2018 (**Table 5**).

According to the 2018 ACS, there were 629 post-secondary students living in North Mankato. When compared to the total population estimate for the City, fewer than 5% of the City's residents were enrolled in college as an undergraduate, graduate or professional school program. Presumably the student population would include people enrolled at South Central College in North Mankato, as well as Minnesota State University and Bethany Lutheran College in Mankato. In the MSA, students in St. Peter would also be reflected which includes students from Gustavus Adolphus College. Of the entire post-secondary population living in the MSA, nearly 72% lived in the City of Mankato while only 4% lived in North Mankato.

<u>Key Takeaway for Post-Secondary Student Population:</u> 629 post-secondary students lived in North Mankato in 2018 representing 4.6% of the total population.

Population by Age

Table 6 shows age distribution for the City of North Mankato from 2000 to 2019. Data for 2000 and 2010 is derived through respective Decennial Census results from the US Census Bureau while 2019 data is derived from Esri 2019 estimates.

Data shows that populations of those ages 0-24 have remained somewhat steady since 2000, fluctuating only slightly. Numbers of those ages 55+ have increased significantly since 2000 with those ages 55-74 exhibiting the highest growth. Data may suggest North Mankato is an aging community that will require more senior living options. Data may also indicate that residents are choosing to stay in North Mankato during their retirement years due to quality of life. Increases in the 25-44 age groups may indicate more families are choosing to call the City their home.

Table 7 and **Figure 4** use Esri's 2019 population estimates to show the percentage distribution by age for North Mankato, the MSA, Nicollet County, and the State.

Figure 3. North Mankato Percentage Population by Age 2000-2019

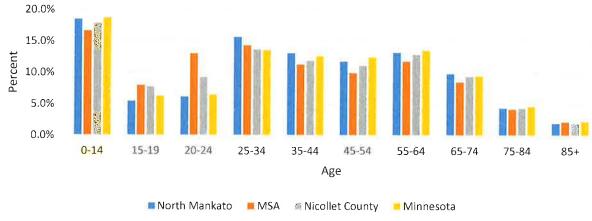

North Mankato has a smaller population distribution in the secondary and post-secondary student age ranges than other geographies included in the comparison. The comparison of age group populations for North Mankato, the MSA, Nicollet County, and the State shows age distribution is generally within a range of 2.5% of each other showing overall similarities between these geographies. One exception to this is the 20-24 age group, indicating the MSA stands out in the 20-24 age group exhibiting 13.1% which is 6.9% higher than North Mankato.

<u>Key Takeaway for Population by Age:</u> Data indicate that North Mankato's population age groups fall within 2.5% of the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) in the Youth, Retiree/Seniors, and Elderly age ranges. The College age group has 7% less residents than the MSA and the Working Age group has 7% more than the MSA.

Population by Race

The City of North Mankato is predominantly White, as is Nicollet County, the MSA, and the State of Minnesota. 2019 estimates from Esri indicate that White individuals made up 90.6% of the City's population. Nicollet County and the MSA showed similar proportions with White individuals making up 90.3% and 89.5% respectively. The State of Minnesota, however, has a White population of 81.5%, which is significantly lower that other geographies but still predominantly White. **Table 7** and **Figure 5** illustrate population distribution by Race

Those identifying as Black or African American make up the second largest demographic in the City at 543, or 3.8%, of the population. Nicollet County and the MSA have a Black or African American population slightly higher than the City at 3.9% and 4.4% of the population respectively. The State has the highest of the geographies with 6.8% of the population being Black or African American.

The American Indian/Alaskan Native group made up a very small portion of the population at 42 (0.3%). Other geographies have similar populations aside from the State which was slightly higher at 1.2% of the population being American Indian/Alaskan Native.

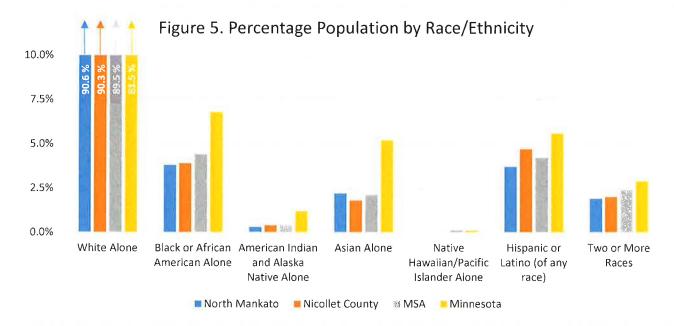
Asians made up roughly two percent of the population for North Mankato, Nicollet County, and the MSA. The State had a slightly higher percentage at 5.2%.

Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander populations were almost non-existent in all geographies with zero reporting in North Mankato and Nicollet County and 0.1% in the MSA and the State.

There were 528 (3.7%) in the City who identify as Hispanic/Latino. This is the third largest demographic group in the City. Other geographies had slightly higher populations of Hispanic/Latino individuals including Nicollet County with 4.7%, the MSA with 4.2% and the State with 5.6%.

As mentioned before, the City of North Mankato continues to grow in population, but at a decreasing rate. However, despite this trend, the population is slowly diversifying as more minority populations are choosing to call North Mankato home. **Table 8** and **Figure 6** illustrate percentage change of population by Race/Ethnicity.

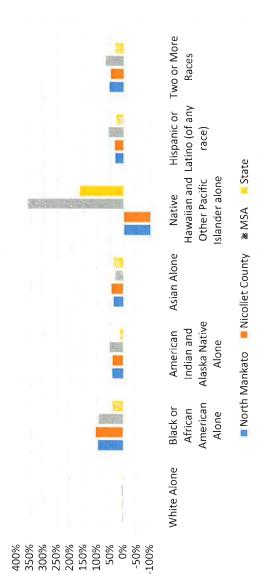
Trends indicate a 96% increase in the number of Black or African American residents, which is much higher than the 3% increase in White populations. While Black or African American residents only make up 4% of the population to date, this will increase significantly if trends continue. All other races and ethnicities are increasing as well with the exception of Native Hawaiian, and Other Pacific Islander in which no residents claimed as their origin.

Key Takeaways for Population by Race: North Mankato is predominantly White. However, non-White populations have shown some increase over the last decade with some Races/Ethnicities nearly doubling in size indicating that more of these individuals are choosing to make North Mankato their home.

According to Esri, there were 5,983 households in North Mankato in 2019. When compared to the 2010 Census, this was an increase of approximately 410 households, or an annual average of 45 households per year over the decade. The MSA, containing all of Blue Earth and Nicollet Counties, shows an increase of 3,876 households over the same time period representing average annual growth of 431 households. This indicates North Mankato represents nearly 11% of household growth in the MSA.

Similar to population growth, the number of households has continued to increase but at a decreasing rate. Between 1990 and 2000 the City of North Mankato experienced a faster rate of household growth than the MSA, Nicollet County, and the State compared to the lower rate of growth in the past ten years (**Table 10**).

<u>Key Takeaway for Household Trends:</u> The number of households in North Mankato increased by 7.3% or approximately 410 between 2010-2019 and this accounted for 11% of all household growth in the MSA.

Average Household Size

Table 11 provides decennial Census information on household size. The State Demographers 2018 estimates and Esri's 2019 estimates have also been provided.

Household formation has generally been occurring at a different rate than population change in recent decades due to a steady decrease in average household size. This has been caused by household composition changes, such as more single person households and single parent families, fewer children per family, and more senior households due to longer life spans. These patterns have been present in North Mankato, as the City's average household size has decreased since the year 2000 when it was 2.48. However, the most recent estimate from Esri shows only a minor decrease since 2010.

<u>Key Takeaway for Average Household Size:</u> The average number of persons per household in North Mankato stayed relatively flat at 2.38 in 2019 compared to 2.39 in 2010.

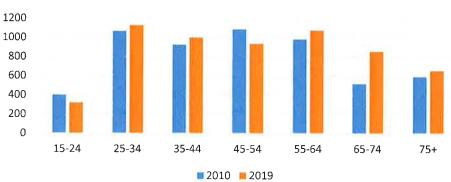

Figure 7. North Mankato Households by Age of Householder: 2010 to 2019



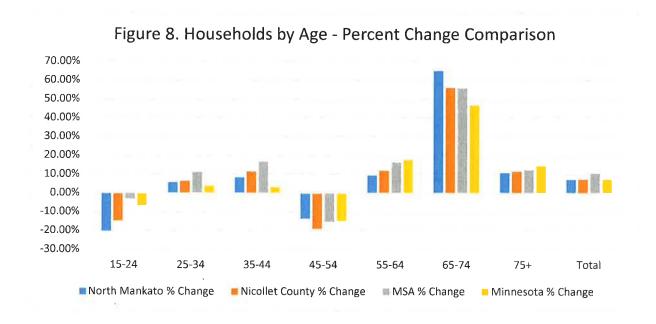

As traced by Esri, the largest numeric age-based change among households in North Mankato has occurred within the senior citizen age group between 65 and 74 years old which increased over 65% from 2010 to 2019. Esri estimates that the City has had a net decrease of 93 households in the age range of 45-54 and younger and an increase of 495 households between the age range of 55 and older since 2010. **Table 13** and **Figure 8** show a comparison of age of householder trends between the City, Nicollet County, the MSA, and the State.

All geographies saw decline in the 15-24 age range with North Mankato exhibiting the most loss of householders in that age group. The 25-34 and 35-44 age ranges exhibited somewhat similar increases with the MSA showing the largest increase in these age ranges and the State showing the least. All geographies exhibited similar decline in the 45-54 age range. While all geographies exhibited growth in the 55-64 age group, North Mankato showed the least growth. All geographies grew quite significantly in the 65-74 age groups, almost all growing 50% or more. North Mankato showed the greatest growth in this group with 65.25%. All geographies are experiencing growth in 55+ ages suggesting this is not a phenomenon exclusive to North Mankato but a larger trend. Agencies will need to increase senior housing options.



<u>Key Takeaway for Households by Age Trends:</u> In 2019 there were 82 less households in the 15-24 age range, 138 more households in the 25-44 age groups, 149 less households in the 45-54 age range and 495 more households in 55+ range when compared to 2010.
