RENTAL PROPERTY REMINDER: **AUTOMATIC WATER METERS**

Please remember that lower North Mankato rentals must convert from manual read to automatic read meters by the end of 2023!

In December of 2022, the City Council adopted an ordinance requiring all properties, with or applying for a residential rental license, to obtain and install automatic read water meters for both interior and exterior meters. Lower North must finish the conversion in 2023, and upper North must finish the conversion in 2024.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

The City of North Mankato is constantly working to improve the quality of life for its citizens. This is accomplished through various planning initiatives undertaken by the Community Development Department and City Administration, often in conjunction with area planning partners. Planning initiatives are usually extensive; targeted over a specific growth location, area of commerce, or vital transportation corridor in our community, and can take several months to over a year to complete in many instances.

Plans, studies, and other city planning initiatives require robust public involvement. City staff rely not only on area stakeholders (those property and/or business owners with potential for direct impacts) but all citizens for input to shape a vision for the future. This ensures community needs and desires are reflected in the vision. Citizens help guide:

- City Growth Planning Parks and Recreation Planning
- Area Development and Redevelopment Planning
- City Ordinance Development
- Transportation Improvement Planning

This list is not exhaustive. All efforts are aimed at maximizing quality of life for North Mankato residents. The following table outlines current and upcoming planning initiatives underway at the city:

It has been a busy summer with our department welcoming new members that are the lifeblood of keeping our organization dynamic. The summer concentration for training included an emphasis on vehicle extrication. with the addition of a new set of Hurst extrication tools and support struts for stabilizing vehicles. These tools will be added to trucks along with our current tools for vehicle incidents. These additions to our list of services would not be possible without our citizens' help. We will have these tools on display at our annual open house in October.

Now that Fall is upon us, our firefighters are visiting or hosting the North Mankato elementary schools, daycares, preschools, programs for adults, and many businesses to teach about fire prevention. We will also host our annual Fire Prevention Month Open House on Sunday, October 8th. Please come and join us for some community togetherness.

The North Mankato Fire Department encourages all residents to embrace the

"Cooking safety starts with YOU." A cooking fire can grow quickly. We have seen many residences damaged by fires that could easily have been prevented; last year in Minnesota, the leading cause of structure fires was cooking and caused nearly \$6 million in damage.

North Mankato Fire Department offers these key safety tips to help reduce the risk of a cooking fire.

- 1. Watch what you heat. Always keep a close eye on what you are cooking. Set a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- 2. Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove. Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner.
- 3. Have a "kid and pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove or grill and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
- According to NFPA, cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Unattended cooking is the leading cause of cooking fires and deaths. Year after year, cooking remains the leading cause of home fires by far, accounting for half (49 percent) of all U.S. home fires.

An additional area that is getting a lot of attention recently is the issue of Lithium battery fires. The increased possibility of incidents with rechargeable items is due to many popular items powered from these batteries including smart phones, laptops. e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode. Some of the cautions include:

 Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.

- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- · Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

One of the most basic fire protection devices that you never want to neglect is the basic smoke detector. New smoke detectors are available as 10-year life units that only need testing monthly. Homes that have installed hardwired detectors have a backup battery system that needs to be changed regularly- at a minimum, once a year. Detectors that are reaching the 10-year mark give an end-of-life signal. usually a chirp every 30 seconds. If you hear chirping, check the back for dates and replace the detector.

The North Mankato Fire Department calendars are in the development process and will be delivered to residences before October. HOWARD DR/LOR RAY DR ROUNDABOUT

For those students who attend DMMS. I want to specifically mention the new roundabout at the intersection of Howard Dr and Lor Ray Dr. This intersection will be staffed with a crossing guard to help middle schoolers cross the road, but parents should teach their children how to properly and safely cross roundabouts as they (like all of us) have been used to the 4-way stop at this intersection which has been in place for decades.

Here are some good tips provided by the MN Dept of Transportation relating to navigating roundabouts.

PEDESTRIANS

- Cross only at crosswalks, and always stay on the designated walkways.
- Never cross to the central island.
- Cross the roundabout one approach at a time. Use the median island as a halfway point where you can check for approaching traffic.
- Children on bicycles should use the available crosswalks and not ride within the traffic lanes.

DRIVERS

- Slow down when approaching a roundabout. For multi-lane roundabouts, as with any intersection, get into the appropriate lane.
- Yield to pedestrians in the crosswalk.
- Yield to vehicles already in the roundabout. Merge into the traffic flow when it is safe.
- Continue through the roundabout until you reach your exit. Do not stop or pass in a roundabout.
- Exit the roundabout immediately if an emergency vehicle approaches, and then pull over. Do not stop in the roundabout.

Give large trucks extra space in a roundabout. Large trucks may straddle both lanes while driving through a multi-lane roundabout.

City crews will begin collection in early October and will continue until leaves are picked up or the weather prevents collection. • Rake your leaves onto the boulevard. (The City will not pick up bagged leaves, they need to be brought to the compost site.)

• Bring pumpkins, brush, twigs, and branches to the Compost Site at 600 Webster Avenue.

- Do NOT rake leaves into the gutter.
- Do NOT put sticks and brush on the boulevard.
- Please do not commingle leaves with brush.

WATER MAIN FLUSHING OCTOBER 2nd - 20th

The North Mankato Water Department will be flushing water mains for both the valley and hilltop areas.

Flushing will begin for both the valley and the hilltop on October 2nd, 2023, and the valley will finish on October 6th and the hilltop

will finish on October 20th. Water main flushing is done twice a year to remove sediment and minerals that may have accumulated in the water mains. You may notice some discoloration of the water during the period we are working in your area.

The water is safe to drink; however, we suggest that you refrain from laundering clothes for several hours until the water has had a chance to settle out, as the water may stain. When the Water Department is actively flushing

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FALL LAWN CARE TIP SHEET

Don't leave lawn care 'til spring!

Fall is the best time of year to fertilize your lawn and control weeds. In fact, healthy lawns help area lakes and streams. Thick grass prevents soil erosion and absorbs rainwater. By soaking up rainwater, lawns decrease the amount of stormwater runoff funneling pollutants into lakes and streams.

Here's how to keep your lawn healthy in the fall:

Mow. Mow your grass at a height of two to three inches.

Water. Even though it is cooler in the fall, lawns still need regular watering to maintain plant health and survive winter conditions. Water until the ground begins to freeze.

Fertilize. Fall is the best time of year to fertilize your lawn. Fertilizer provides grass with nutrients for spring growth. Water for one to two hours after fertilizer application.

Soil test. Find out what is needed: Test the soil. A soil test is a good idea, especially when concerned that a lawn may need phosphorus.

Control weeds. September is the best time of year to treat dandelions, plantain, clover and creeping charley. Limited numbers of weeds should be removed by hand or spot-treated with herbicide.

Sweep-up. Sweep up and reuse lawn care products that fall on streets, sidewalks and driveways

Here's how to recycle your leaves:

Compost. Composting recycles nutrients and helps keep leaves out of streets and storm sewers

Mulch. You can use leaves, whole or shredded by a power mower, as winter or spring mulch.

Mow. If you have less than two inches of leaves covering your lawn, you can leave them in place and make several passes over them with a power mower. By shredding them into a fine, thin layer, you will provide your grass with valuable nutrients and end up with a lawn that looks like it was just raked. Gradually reduce mowing height to two inches to prevent winter turf damage.

Curbside Pickup The City of North Mankato will be providing curbside leaf pickup service. The City of North Mankato will notify residents concerning collection times.

RAVINE CARE

Properly caring for ravines and bluffs helps protect the integrity of the City's drainage system, preserves the special character of our neighborhoods, and helps maintain and enhance the value of individual properties. Ravines, bluffs, and hillsides are an important ecosystem, but they are subject to erosion when buildings, roads, or the dense shade of crowded trees disturb the native plant community and alter the natural water flow. Erosion can be a dangerous problem.

TIPS TO CARE FOR YOUR RAVINES:

- ✓ Thin non-native trees to allow sunlight to reach the woodland floor and promote ground-cover. Divert water from draining over the edge if possible.
- ✓ Consider adding check dams to the ravine. Check dams decrease the speed of the flow of water and as a result, reduce erosion in channel bottoms.
- ✓ Plant and maintain vegetation on the slope of the ravine.
- ✓ Do not throw brush, leaves, or grass clippings into the ravine. If gutters/footing tile is draining to the ravine, make sure it is piped to the bottom to eliminate erosion.
- ✓ Install gutters and downspouts to properly direct rainwater to minimize erosion.

Please keep in mind that according to City Code Chapter 155.50, The filling, altering, diverting, stripping of vegetation, topping of trees or otherwise changing of any public or private hillsides, ravines, or slopes of bluff land are prohibited. Alterations of any kind made to dedicated public lands of the character described above are prohibited except by the city for purposes of stabilization, erosion control and stormwater

City staff have reviewed portions of the ravine system in North Mankato. Staff discovered a variety of erosion issues including areas of erosion due to drainage lines not being piped to the bottom of the ravines. Please make sure your foundation drainage sump pump follows City Code Chapter 156.035 with the discharge line located at the bottom of the ravine









Snow Safety Reminders

HELP US, HELP YOU!



North Mankato City Code requires owners or occupants of private property to clear public sidewalks of accumulated snow within 48 hours after it stops snowing. You are also responsible for removing ice from public sidewalks.

- If possible, please park cars in driveways off the street.
- Do not leave vehicles parked on city streets longer than 48 hours. If your vehicle is parked on the street and blocked in by snow, please move it so crews can clean the street curb to curb. Cars parked on city streets longer than 48 hours, or during a declared snow emergency, are subject to ticket and tow.
- If you are able, please adopt a fire hydrant and keep it clear of snow.
- Keep a safe distance between plow trucks and other vehicles. If you cannot see their mirrors, they cannot see you!

Garbage & Recycling Reminders




Heavy snow accumulation, icy roads. and poor visibility create difficult conditions for snowplows to avoid garbage carts placed in the street. Please follow these tips to ensure efficient plowing of our streets.

- When removing snow from your property, be sure to dig out a spot for your garbage and recycling
- Place carts at least 3 to 5 feet from the street onto your driveway or yard, out of the way of the snowplow. Most garbage trucks are equipped with a hydraulic extending arm that allows them to reach out and grasp carts.
- DO NOT place carts on top of snow piles. This may cause your cart to tip over and litter garbage along the street. It is also difficult for garbage trucks to set the cart back down on snow piles.
- After your carts have been serviced, please remove them as soon as you are able. Empty carts are vulnerable to wind and snow removal operations, and could cause a hazard if knocked into the roadway.


