COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENT HEADS, BOROUGH REPRESENTATIVE

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Finance, Tricia Fogarty

Ms. Fogarty stated she has all the year-end budget documents finalized and that she will have Ms. Braniff send them out to Council. Ms. Fogarty shared that the back-to-back meetings has made getting everything finalized and wrapped up difficult.

Fire Department, Assistant Chief Tod Chambers

Assistant Chief Chambers reported on the current EMS training and shared that the Christmas Fire Truck is out and making its Christmas rounds.

Mr. Terch thanked AC Chambers for the Fire Truck and he shared that it is his favorite time of the evening when it rolls by his house.

Police Department, Lieutenant Jed Smith

Lieutenant Smith stated he does not have a lot to report since there was Council meeting the previous week but that the department had its annual Christmas party out at the VFW. He shared the Officer of the Year was selected by their peers in the department and Hunter Churness was selected. Lieutenant Smith reported the Employee of the Year for 2023 is Rachel Wing, he shared she has stepped up and done two jobs for a long time and that she is deserving of the recognition.

Director of City Services, Danny Wallace

Special Topics - Employee Evaluations — I finally was able to complete employee evaluations for this year. The evaluation period ended on December 1st. Evaluation discussions have occurred for all employees between the direct supervisor and staff (I directly supervise four individuals — the PW and Utilities Supervisors, the Utilities Accounting and Building Department Specialist, and the Utility Bill Clerk). It took a few months to get the evaluation system in place, and it was done in coordination with the previous HR.

Public Works - We've done our third snow plowing of the year (last Wed, Dec 13th) for City streets and sidewalks. The city continues to get positive comments about those operations, which generally start at 2am and initially focus on access to school roads, emergency services, and critical City facilities. We crosstalk with DOT to try and coordinate efforts, although they tend to focus on Priority 1 roads initially (the Richardson), and then within 18 hours, they should plow the Priority 2 roads in town (Santa Claus Lane and Badger Rd). St. Nicolas Dr., the Old Rich, Buzby and Laurance Road are Priority 3, which are generally cleared 24 hours after the end of a snow event. We anticipate doing hardpack removal in the next few weeks (similar to last year). One other item of note – the DOT snowplows hit and knocked over one of the Candy Cane poles on the Badger Road roundabout, on the north side of the Richardson Hwy. DOT is working on a plan for repair (no word yet), and we will keep you updated.

Building Department - We were contacted by Representative Prax's office about a stop work order that we issued in August. His legislative aide had received a call from the property owner – we had initially contacted this person in July after groundwork had begun on a site within City limits. I personally informed the individual on site and via email about the requirements for building permits – the process is simple, and we go out of our way to help individuals conform to the requirements. There were a number of emails between the City and the property owner, and, on the advice of our legal team, we opted to issue a Stop Work order in early August. We had not heard anything for four months on this issue until they contacted Rep. Prax's office. I discussed the situation with his aide, and they communicated the information to the property owner. As always, we are standing by to help

individuals and businesses who want to safely build here in North Pole.

Utilities - We are moving forward with efforts to replace all of the older water meter heads (antennas). This includes the needed replacement of over 600 ageing water meter heads and allows for advanced water monitoring by both the city and customers through online and remote monitoring systems.

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2023 Q3 Visitor Industry Report

(Unless indicated otherwise, all the below represents the months of July-Sep 2023)

Hotel/Motel Occupancy Rates and Average Daily Rates



Hotel/motel occupancy rates were essentially flat from the same period in 2022, with rates at 82% compared to 83%. August has been the highest performing month this year at 88% compared to 86% in August 2022. YTD occupancy rates through September are at 73% compared to 75% in 2022. Average daily rates (ADR) increased again with an ADR of \$232 compared to \$213, an increase of 8%. YTD through September ADR is \$194, a 9% increase over last year's amount of \$178. For revenue per available room (RevPAR), the average was \$189 compared to last year's average of \$179, with YTD comparisons of \$142 vs \$133.

Short-Term Rental Occupancy Rates and Average Daily Rates

Occupancy rates for short-term rentals were essentially flat at 61% compared to 60%. YTD through September occupancy rates were also flat with 50% compared to 51%, however, supply/listings are at 7,545 in 2023 compared to 5,741 listings in 2022, an increase of 31%. ADR for Q3 was \$177 compared to \$186, a decrease of 5%, while RevPAR was flat at \$108 compared to \$109. YTD for ADR and RevPar were also flat at \$170 and \$86, respectively.

Fairbanks International Airport (FAI) Arrivals and Departures

Combined arrivals and departures at FAI for Q3 increased by 4% over last year, with 328,589 compared to 315,537. In comparison to 2019, there was a decrease of 5%, with 2019 Q3 at 347,662. The month of September outperformed 2019 by 3% with 93,186 compared to 90,521, the highest number for September on record. YTD the airport is up by 15% over 2022 and down by 11% from 2019.

Alcan Border Crossings



Highway travel saw a dramatic increase, with the Alcan border reporting 64,350 passenger crossings for Q3, an increase of 176% over the 2022 number of 23,356 and a 29% increase over the 2019 number of 50,271. The month of August 2023 saw a record number with 37,514 passenger crossings. YTD saw an increase of 244% over 2022 and only down 6% compared to 2019. This year is the first time the Poker Creek/Top of the World border has opened since 2019, with a total passenger crossing

for Q3 of 10,012 compared to the 2019 number of 12,708, a decrease of 21%.



Morris Thompson Cultural and Visitors Center (MTCVC)

Visitation at MTCVC grew significantly over 2022, with a Q3 total of 51,024 compared to 41,112, an increase of 24% and a decrease of 23% when compared to 2019 numbers of 66,450. YTD total count is 101,814, a 24% increase over 2022 and a decrease of 25% compared to 2019 numbers of 135,544. Note that in 2019 MTCVC was open two more hours a day in the summer compared to 2023.

Alaska Railroad (AKRR)

For Q3, AKRR saw an increase of 13% in total passenger arrivals and departures at the Fairbanks depot, with 24,301 and 21,558 respectively, and a 30% increase over 2019 which had 18,718 total passengers. YTD AKRR reported an increase of 4% over 2022 and 18% over 2019.



Domestic Visitor Profile



Out of a sample size of 21,393 qualified arrivals*, 62% of Q3 visitors were from the Lower 48, with Washington being the number one state at 13%, Texas and California tied at 5%, Oregon at 4%, Florida at 3%, followed by Arizona, Georgia, Colorado and Illinois, all tied at 2%. Of the total sample size, 89% were overnight trips and the average length of stay was 3.4 days.

1 CITY OF NORTH POLE 2 **RESOLUTION 2024-01** 3 A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING THE CITY OF NORTH POLE LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR THE 34th 4 **LEGISLATURE 2024 REGULAR SESSION** WHEREAS, the City of North Pole considers resolutions through the year to support legislative and 5 6 policy actions of the State and other local governments; and 7 WHEREAS, the City of North Pole is concerned with Statewide and Federal issues that affect the City and its residents; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the following list is a list of issues that the City feels are important to residents of the City of North Pole, State of Alaska and Citizens of the United States; 10 #1 Priority, North Pole Fire Department building expansion 11 12 Cost: \$20,000,000 13 The existing City of North Pole fire station was built in the early 1980's and its structure has served the 14 citizens of the North Pole area for over forty years. It is approximately 7,500 square feet in size with 15 most of that space devoted to housing apparatus. Due to the growing population and the resulting 16 increase in emergency responses the fire department's staffing levels have increased. The office space 17 and staff quarters of the current fire station were not designed to accommodate today's staffing levels. 18 The COVID pandemic highlighted the seriousness of this situation, as social distancing for our essential 19 emergency responders was almost impossible. 20 Other departments within the City are experiencing similar difficulties and are also in need of larger 21 facilities. To meet this demand the City of North Pole has developed a plan to leverage existing 22 structures and property and address the needs of the fire department. This plan would utilize a vacant 23 portion of the current fire department property to build a new fire station that would meet the 24 community's needs for the next forty years. This would allow the city public works department to move 25 into the current fire station building, doubling their current square footage. The current public works building would then become a critically needed warm storage and training facility for the fire 26 27 department. The anticipated estimate for this facility is \$20,000,000. This plan has been developed with 28 the intent to grow and benefit multiple departments within our city. #2 Priority, Interior Training Facility (ITF) to assist interior state, federal and local law 29 30 enforcement, and other Public Safety organizations with a training facility to conduct firearms 31 training.: Cost: \$6,000,000

- 33 The Interior Training Facility will be a multiuse facility for training of federal, state, and local
- 34 public safety affiliates. The facility will also be used by said organizations to facilitate community
- outreach programs, education, and training. The facility will have space for firearms training. The
- training facility will include multi-bay shooting ranges from 25 to 100 yards security fencing,
- 37 secured access in the training building with lighting. The lighting will be needed for low-light
- 38 firearms qualifications to permit use during all 12 months of the year. We estimate the cost to
- complete this facility will be in the range of \$5 6 million dollars in a phased construction
- 40 approach. Price of construction is broad due to land development costs being dependent on
- 41 land acquired for the facility and final design requirements. Each large agency has made
- 42 promises to help pay for maintenance and upkeep of this facility. An indoor facility is the
- preferred option, but an outdoor facility would be a suitable replacement.
- 44 #3 Priority, North Pole Downtown Water Main Replacement Plan
- 45 Cost: \$28,200,000
- The City of North Pole must develop a plan to address aging water mains in its downtown area.
- 47 This priority funds a viable replacement plan to address this critical infrastructure problem.
- 48 The water mains were installed in the 1970s and early 1980s and consist of single-walled steel
- 49 piping. The mains are thin gauge steel resulting in significant leakage, which entails high costs to the
- 50 City. These pipes are at the end of their projected lifespan and are prone to failure. The combined

- water mains also supply water to the area's fire hydrants. Replacement of these aging water lines is
- essential to protect public health and safety. This project requires detailed surveys and planning as
- 54 it will include planning for tearing up streets, excavating the old mains, replacing them with new
- 55 pipes, and reconstructing the streets.
- The City has already funded a 15% conceptual phase to assess the current options available for
- 57 planning. During this phase we determined the overall scope of the planning for the project and
- formulated an initial plan with three independent phases. The first is focused on the oldest and
- 59 most vulnerable area (built in 1972) that habitually experiences failures and leaks. The second and
- 60 third phases replace pipes built in 1972 and 1982 which consistently show signs of pending failure.
- 61 Costs for each phase are \$6,500,000 (Phase 1), \$5,400,000 (Phase 2), and \$16,300,000 (Phase 3).
- The total cost of replacing the entire system is approximately \$28,200,000.
- Funding the City of North Pole's planning and construction efforts for all three phases addresses
- this ongoing concern. This project is directly tied to our efforts to ensure water is available for both
- customer and safety purposes. This funding is critical to solving this chronic problem of aging water
- 66 utility infrastructure.

- 69 PFAS are a group of synthetic fluorinated chemicals used in many industrial and consumer
- 70 products. Two compounds (Perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS) and perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA))
- 71 were components of aqueous film forming foam used by military, commercial and industrial
- 72 entities to control petroleum-fueled fires. Our Fire Department and the Department of Defense
- began using the foam in the 1970s, including at Eielson Air Force Base. These "forever
- 74 chemicals" pose significant health risks to our citizens to include kidney, prostate and testicular
- 75 cancer, thyroid disease, liver damage, asthma, and many others. The Air Force is currently
- 76 mapping the PFAS groundwater plume originating from Eielson Air Force Base and modeling
- 77 groundwater flow, which generally flows in a northerly direction in this area. PFAS groundwater
- 78 concentrations have been found within the Chena River Lakes Flood Control Project area,
- 79 located between the community of Moose Creek and the city of North Pole.
- 80 The City of North Pole is working directly with the Air Force, Alaska Department of
- 81 Environmental Conservation (ADEC), and Fairbanks North Star Borough to determine mitigation
- 82 efforts for the eventual contamination of our groundwater and well. In fact, the City of North
- 83 Pole already has PFAS contamination within our City limits in the ground near our Fire
- 84 Department. These funds will assist in planning for both the required cleanup of the NP Fire

Grantor: Federal awarding agency

Department: Alaska Department of Public Safety. Also known as the pass-through entity.

Grantee: entity receiving the subaward; also known as subgrantee, subawardee, subrecipient.

State administering agency (SAA): Many OJP formula grants are awarded directly to state governments, which then set priorities and allocate funds within that state. DPS is the SAA for many federal Department of Justice grants.

ARTICLE III - SCOPE OF WORK

- A. The Grantee agrees that it will fully implement the Project Description submitted with the application and considered a part of this Grant Agreement.
- B. The Grantee agrees to make no change in the project described in the final approved application without first submitting a written request to the Department and obtaining the Department's written approval of the requested change.

 Progress report: A description of the work accomplished to date, the methods and procedures used, and the impact of the project. Progress reports shall be submitted to the Department no later than fifteen days following the end of each report period. Final reports are due no later than 60 days following the end of each report period. Reports are to be submitted through the Office of Justice Programs Performance Measurement Platform at https://ojpsso.ojp.gov/.

- 2. **Other information** specified by the Department or as may be of assistance to the Department in its evaluation, such as Project Equipment Reports.
- 3. Changes in Key Personnel: The Grantee shall report any changes to key personnel to the Department within 30 days of the change.

ARTICLE VI - FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION

- A. The Grantee must establish and maintain separate accounting for the use of grant funds. The use of funds in any manner contrary to allowable grant activities shall result in the termination of the grant and relinquishment of right to any remaining balance of funds. It shall also result in the Grantee being required to return to the State any funds spent on items determined to be not allowed.
- B. **Reimbursement Requests**: The Grantee shall submit a request for reimbursement no later than 15 calendar days after the end of a quarter. Reimbursement requests shall be submitted quarterly unless a different schedule has been approved by the department. A Final Request for Reimbursement must be submitted no later than 60 calendar days following the end of the subaward period of performance.

Reimbursement Requests must be:

- 1. For expenses incurred within the period covered by the grant agreement;
- For expenses incurred and paid by the Grantee within the project period specified on the Grant Award;
- 3. Submitted in a format provided or approved by the Department, and must be provided by a responsible signatory of the Grantee;
- 4. Based upon the Grantee's accounting system; a financial report generated from the accounting system must be attached to the request for reimbursement.
- 5. Supported by appropriate source documentation including, but not limited to: vendor billings, time sheets, travel authorizations, cancelled checks, tickets, payroll records, or other applicable information necessary to substantiate expenditures. Department staff may request copies of source documentation prior to or after payment for any Reimbursement Requests.
- C. The Grantee must use direct charging on timesheets for all time spent on grant related activity or must use a methodology for the allocation of personal services costs approved by the Department. The Grantee must use a cost allocation methodology approved by the Department for any other shared costs charged to the grant and must

provide the Department with appropriate documentation supporting the methodology used. The Grantee shall contact the Department for additional guidance or technical assistance.

D. No advance payments are authorized under this Agreement, unless approved by the Department.

ARTICLE VII - BUDGET

A. The Department is not liable for Grantee-incurred costs or services that exceed the approved subaward budget. The Department will not honor requests for payments in excess of the original grant award. It is the responsibility of the Grantee to secure a properly executed grant budget revision to the grant agreement when circumstances require changes to the budget. The Grantee will in no case exceed in expenditure or in commitment the total dollar amount agreed upon in the grant agreement. The Grantee is responsible for all over-expenditures and for any disallowed costs that it may incur.

ARTICLE VIII - FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

- A. The Grantee and any sub-recipient shall adhere to generally accepted accounting principles. The Grantee's financial management system shall

No member, officer, or employee of the Grantee, or its designees or agents, no member of the governing body of the locality in which the program is situated, and no other public official of such locality or localities who exercises any functions or responsibilities with respect to the program during his or her tenure or for one year thereafter, will have any interest, direct or indirect, in any contract or subcontract, or the process thereof, for work to be performed in connection with the program assisted under the grant, and the Grantee shall incorporate, in all such contracts or subcontracts, a provision prohibiting such interest pursuant to the purposes of this certification.
- E. The Grantee certifies that the programs contained in its application and Project Description meet all the requirements of the 1988 Anti-Drug Abuse Act, that all information is correct, that the applicant will comply with all provisions of the Act and all other applicable Federal and State laws, regulations, and guidelines.
- F. The recipient (and any subrecipient at any tier) must—
 - A. Ensure that, as part of the hiring process for any position within the United States that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds, the recipient (or any subrecipient) properly verifies the employment eligibility of the individual who is being hired, consistent with tht provisions of 8 U.S.C. 1324a(a)(1).

The Grantee agrees to the following: to forward to the Alaska Department of Public Safety for submission to the Department for Civil Rights, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice any finding of discrimination against the Grantee by a federal or state court or federal or state administrative agency on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex and to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities to individuals who are Limited English Proficient.

- I. The Grantee assures that it will comply (and will require any subgrantees or contractors to comply) with any applicable statutorily-imposed nondiscrimination requirements, which may include the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (34 U.S.C. 10101-10741); the Victims of Crime Act (34 U.S.C. 20101-20111); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974 (34 U.S.C. 11101-11322); the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d); the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. § 794); the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. § 12132); the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. § 1681); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 U.S.C. § 6102); and the Department of Justice regulations on the Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations (28 CFR part 38).
- J. The Grantee assures that in accordance with federal civil rights laws, the Grantee shall not retaliate against individuals for taking action or participating in action to secure rights protected by the laws referenced in Article XI above.

ARTICLE XIII - PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

A. Management

The Department shall make every effort not to disturb or disrupt any program or activity beyond that necessary to secure relevant data and make a reasonable assessment of the Grantee's performance.
- B. Monitoring by the Department may be performed on a continuing basis throughout the grant period and may involve electronic contact, written communication, analysis of submitted reports, and on-site visits.
- C. It shall be the purpose of monitoring by the Department to reinforce, improve, and augment the Grantee's capacity to administer this grant by identifying potential problem areas and recommending corrective action to prevent deficiencies.
- D. At the conclusion of a formal site review or electronic monitor, the Department shall provide a Monitoring Report in writing to the Grantee which outlines review findings and identifies any required corrective action and the date by which the corrective action must be completed.
- E. When the Department has confirmed that the appropriate corrective action has been taken, a letter shall be sent to the Grantee stating that the finding(s) has been closed.

ARTICLE XVI - PUBLICATION OF PROJECT ACTIVITIES AND RESULTS

When publicizing project activities and results, the Grantee shall include the following statements:

- A. "The opinions, findings and conclusions or recommendations expressed in this publication/program/exhibition are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect the views of the Department of Public Safety or the Department of Justice."
- B. "This project was supported by a grant awarded by the Alaska Department of Public Safety, through funding from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Administration"

ARTICLE XVII - WRITTEN DESCRIPTIONS OF PROGRAMS

When issuing statements, press releases, requests for proposals, bid solicitations, and other documents describing projects or programs funded in whole or part with Federal funds, the Grantee shall clearly state the following:

- A. The percentage of the total cost of the program or project which is or will be financed with Federal money; and
- B. The dollar amount of Federal funds for the project or program.

PROJECT NARRATIVE: Please provide answers to the project bulleted list below:

a. Project Overview: A NPPD Detective will be assigned to the Fairbanks Area Narcotics Team (FANT) to work full-time with the Alaska State Troopers and other LEO partners assigned to the unit. Their mission is to mitigate the transport of illegal drugs into the State of Alaska. The FANT's main target is the area of Fairbanks and North Pole, with emphasis also placed on neighboring communities, and northern regions of Alaska extending all the way to the Canadian Border. The primary role of FANT is to develop leads and conduct investigations into the importation, manufacturing, and sale of illicit drugs. The multijurisdictional team also investigates serious crimes related to the illegal importation and sale of alcohol. To integrate with the team successfully, NPPD has developed specific goals and objectives, which have much in common with the priorities set forth in the Alaska JAG program.

This project was implemented to:

- 1) Coordinate efforts and resources from local, state, and Federal agencies through the use of a statewide multijurisdictional task force.
- 2) Interdict and seize controlled substances and alcohol that are being illegally distributed throughout the interior of Alaska.
- 3) Investigate, apprehend, and successfully prosecute local distributors of controlled substances and illegal alcohol.

b. Statement of Need

The North Pole Police Department (NPPD) is continually seeking to analyze its efforts and successes to make improvements and enhance a proactive approach to law enforcement. According to 2023 data from the US census, the current population of North Pole is approx. 2386. This population doubles during the day due to the presence of multiple public schools, shopping centers, restaurants, and businesses. The number of City and area residents is also projected to continue to increase over the next 3-5 years due to continued expansion of area military bases. Because of this population growth, more serious crimes are on the rise in the City of North Pole. There is also a noticeable increase in the complexity of criminal activity. The criminal element has also been emboldened by ever fluctuating State statute and substantially reduced penalties. This has created a situation that taxes law enforcement's ability to proactively root out criminal behavior and also impacts the area residents. The ongoing analysis of NPPD cases reveals that approx. 88 percent of arrests are made on perpetrators that reside outside the City limits of North Pole. This trend will only continue as the population increases.

Numerous high-profile drug cases have spotlighted the City of North Pole through the years including the following examples. NPPD responded to a burglary of multiple apartments. Investigation revealed the suspects were targeting a drug dealer in the complex, who was using that apartment as a stash house. NPPD and the Fairbanks Area Narcotics Team (FANT) seized a substantial quantity of a substance suspected to be crack cocaine. The City of North Pole had the first marijuana butane extraction explosion in the State of Alaska. A planned drug exchange took a bad turn and resulted in a strongarmed robbery and a shooting, which left one suspect in the hospital with gunshot wounds.

A large amount of vehicular traffic passes through the City of North Pole on the Richardson Highway, with AADT reporting more than 17,000 vehicles in 2022. This reflects a substantial upward trend with thousands of new personnel

continuing to arrive for support operations at Eielson Air Force Base (EAFB). Property crimes which tend to be fueled by the drug trade continue to fluctuate substantially based on enhanced enforcement activities. Recent stats peak in 2020 with a 25% increase in burglaries occurring between 2021 and 2022. Larcenies were mitigated by 22%.

The increase of drug possession and distribution cases taken in North Pole schools is alarming with a 50% increase in drug cases seen at the Middle School and a 200% increase seen at the High School. The continued proliferation, trafficking, and abuse of dangerous synthetic drugs, and the chronic scourge of methamphetamine, cocaine, heroin, and fentanyl nationwide make it critically important to maintain an aggressive enforcement stance against narcotics. The State of Alaska as a whole continues to see the development of some alarming drug trends. In 2020 the Statewide Drug Enforcement Unit (SDEU) reported over 21,854 grams of heroin seizures, over 3,465 grams of cocaine seizures and over 29,969 grams of methamphetamine seizures. Fentanyl abuse is also on the rise, with over 7,922 grams seized in 2021.

NPPD, through calls and service requests made by the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) and the Alaska State Troopers (AST), serves not only the City proper but the area surrounding North Pole. This area has a population in excess of 27,000 living within a 10-mile radius. These calls for service are a significant drain on patrol resources and have a significant impact on the quality of investigations and apprehension of suspects. The North Pole area, to include the City of North Pole, has already begun to see a population explosion due to the assignment of an F-35 fighter jet squadron to EAFB with military personnel, support staff, and families flooding into the area. A substantial portion of this population is expected to settle in and around the city. NPPD expects the drug and crime rates to continue to increase with the current influx of people.

To help address the needs of the community at large, the City of North Pole authorized the creation of a full-time position with the multi-jurisdictional drug

unit in 2008 and has dedicated a Detective to this assignment every year since then. NPPD intends to continue this position indefinitely. NPPD's participation with the FANT has proven highly successful every year. In order to help facilitate this additional position, NPPD is requesting support from the State of Alaska Department of Public Safety pass through JAG sub-grant from Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program to help fund a portion of the salary and benefits for FY 2024. The continuation of this position greatly enhances the City's ability to meet local law enforcement needs that will impact the criminal elements that impact our area and every community in the State of Alaska.

The goal of this position is to facilitate joint law enforcement and prosecution efforts involving multiple criminal justice agencies across several jurisdictions. These agencies share the common goal of addressing drug enforcement and violent crime problems in and around North Pole, Fairbanks, and other interior Alaskan communities. NPPD wishes to enhance its abilities by fostering better communications, intelligence sharing, and coordinate activities with all Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies in the State.

NPPD has demonstrated the ability to competently manage an annual budget in excess of \$2.2 million and has managed COPS, Homeland Security, Alaska Highway Safety, and JAG grants in the past. NPPD is equipped to handle local, state, and federal grants through an internal record keeping system that is filed within the Department and simultaneously in the City Accountant's Office. Negotiations, awards, contracts, program/progress records/reports, procurements, invoicing, payments, time sheets, and other fiduciary aspects of grant management are in this system.

The City implements internal controls to ensure compliance with applicable laws and regulations related to all its grant-funded programs. The City recognizes grant revenues when qualifying expenditures are incurred. All of this helps the city meet the requirements of grant agreements and corresponding federal and state laws. The City's accounting system records all

costs associated with each of its grants in separate, self-balancing accounts. The accounting records are used as a basis for completing required grant reports. Before posting any results, grant costs are reviewed for reasonableness, allowability, and allocability to each grant project. Grant project accounts are broken into sub-accounts by program element and cost objective. Appropriate documentation is maintained for personnel costs, fringe benefits, travel, purchases of professional services/consultants, materials, supplies and equipment, and other costs. The accounting records are subject to annual independent financial statement and single audit.

The City also has formal procurement procedures to assure that professional services, consultants, equipment, materials, and supplies are obtained on a competitive basis and has procedures to assure that the types of contracts unacceptable to the federal government are not utilized. Quotations are reviewed to assure that the proposed price is reasonable to the contractor, the recipient, and the party providing the funding.

c. Project Activities

NPPD's goals and objectives for this project are to continue to participate in the FANT program by securing funds to augment our budget in FY 2023-24. NPPD's participation in street level drug enforcement and the multijurisdictional task force program will concentrate on enforcement and prosecution of illegal drug and alcohol crimes, particularly drug and alcohol trafficking. NPPD met this goal in FY 2022 by maintaining its participation efforts in FANT. Continued support of the program currently in place has proven highly beneficial and serves to coordinate NPPD's law enforcement efforts with AST, FPD, University Police, Airport Police, Fort Wainwright Police, EAFB Security Forces, and Federal agencies in a multijurisdictional effort to curb drug, alcohol, and related crimes on a regional and local basis.

The objectives have been met each year. NPPD's current and past FANT Detectives have enhanced cross-jurisdictional information sharing by supplying NPPD's Officers with vital information related to current North Pole cases.

FANT detectives have been a vital link in closing the gap between agencies that has existed for years. NPPD's FANT Detective has been instrumental in facilitating collaboration and increased communication on drug related cases; these cases have also frequently proven to be related to other serious crimes within the City of North Pole.

d. Performance Measure/Evaluation

Goal #1: Participate in the FANT program and assist with intelligence gathering, undercover operations, case work and arrests.

Objective:

1. Reaffirm the appointment of NPPD's Detective to the FANT position and allocate necessary budget monies to fund the position remaining costs for the fiscal year.

Performance Measures:

- 1. Reaffirm the appointment of one NPPD Detective to FANT.
- 2. Approval of funds in the FY 2024 budget to offset actual costs.

During the past year, NPPD used the Byrne funds to pay personnel and fringe benefit costs for its FANT Detective. The FANT Detective assisted with intelligence gathering and undercover operations, resulting in an increased case load and number of violator arrests. In previous years, NPPD's FANT Detective was instrumental in bolstering ephedrine monitoring, as it is commonly used in the production of methamphetamine.

Goal #2: Facilitate and improve information sharing between Federal, State, and local law enforcement agencies.

Objectives:

1. Maintain current strategies to increase information sharing abilities between Federal, State, and local law enforcement to decrease criminal activity involving drugs and alcohol.

2. Maintain strong, permanent partnerships with Federal, State, and local law enforcement.

Performance Measures:

1. Maintain Memorandums of Agreement (MOAs) with various law enforcement agencies.

2. FANT Detective facilitates training and education of all NPPD personnel. Training will be focused on increasing the quality of collection and data entry abilities of patrol Officers and Detectives.

3. Data sharing between groups will be evaluated for efficiency.

NPPD has maintained the Memorandums of Agreement with all participating agencies. Improving information sharing is an ongoing process. NPPD has continued to seek ways to improve this process and allow Patrol Officers access to FANT drug information. The NPPD FANT Detective conducted numerous briefings with various shifts of NPPD Patrol personnel, discussing what clues to look for during traffic contacts, who the local drug pushers and users were, and better ways to improve data entry procedures for police contacts.

Goal #3: Maintain or increase the number of arrests and successful prosecution of violations of State alcohol and drug laws.

Objectives:

- 1. Facilitate the exposure of underground, illicit drug, and alcohol culture within the Interior of Alaska.
- 2. Reduce illegal alcohol and/or drug use within the North Pole and Fairbanks area.

Performance Measure:

1. Increase or maintain the number of arrests of illegal alcohol or drug use, possession, distribution, and or importation.

NPPD's FANT Detective has had regular exposure to underground illicit drug use through intelligence sharing with other agencies, partnering with agencies to conduct traffic stops on drug buyers trafficking at known drug houses, and targeting known distributors. These activities have resulted in the seizure of guns, drugs, and money.

Deliverables

- Reaffirm the appointment of NPPD's full time Detective to FANT.
- Plan routine communications from NPPD FANT Detective to NPPD Officers.
- Enforce the current policy and procedures for patrol officers to be required to forward all drug related case information to FANT to help facilitate information sharing, specifically targeting information provided into Alaska Law Enforcement Information Sharing System.

Evaluation

Evaluation for effectiveness is an ongoing process. The NPPD Lieutenant will review shift logs, reports, statistical compilations from the Records Division, and comments from NPPD meetings. His/her regular meetings with the FANT Detective will contribute to an ongoing evaluation process.

NPPD's evaluation process includes review of statistical information regarding arrests and incidents (RMS and or APSIN) and a review of the reports from the State of Alaska District Attorney's Office regarding successful prosecutions. NPPD will engage in routine review of available statistics to chart progress toward stated objectives.

The Lieutenant will monitor each performance indicator as detailed in the Evaluation and Performance Measures. All activities will be monitored on a regular basis. Evaluation of the project will also occur through the AST FANT Sergeant's progress reports (reports prepared for the Chief, the FANT detective, and the City Accountant).

Time sheets, arrests and any problems will be noted and reported to DPS or other designated persons. The City Accountant will ensure all monetary records are correct and all funds and expenses are accounted for.

The North Pole Police Department has provided one fulltime Detective to work in the Fairbanks Area Narcotics Team which is crucial to the multijurisdictional team stationed in the interior of Alaska. The FANT works to interdict illicit drugs and alcohol and helps curb organized drug racketeering and assists with decreasing the overall drug use in the interior through active drug interdiction.

Throughout 2021 and 2022, the North Pole Police Department remained committed to working with our Federal, State, and local partners to help combat criminal enterprises which are fixated on the importation and trafficking of illicit drugs and alcohol. The goal of this project was to decrease the harm that illicit drugs and alcohol cause to the residents of Alaska.

Over the past year, the NPPD FANT Detective has worked multiple major drug seizures, served multiple search and arrest warrants, and conducted investigations that led to the prosecution of significant drug dealers and users. Our Detective further supported the efforts of every police agency in the interior, including Federal partners, and fostered solid relationships and information sharing amongst all the different agencies in the interior.

Budget

The following Budget Detail is based on actual cost and overtime estimates for FY2023. All figures are based on full time devotion of one Detective to the FANT position. All figures are rounded to the nearest whole dollar.

Personnel- Lists the projected costs for FANT Detective Wages' salary range and projected overtime costs for FY 2023.

Regular salary costs are projected to be \$110,219.00. This cost is based on the hourly rate of \$52.98 multiplied by the 2080 total hours worked each year. (\$9,184.00 multiplied by 12 months equals approximately \$110,219.00 in salary per calendar year rounded to the nearest whole dollar. These expenses include vacation accrual, which will be billed at the time it is used as a salary expense.

Overtime costs are projected to be \$3,975.00. This cost is based on 50 projected hours of overtime. FY 2023 hourly overtime rate for FANT Detective Wages' is \$79.47. (\$52.98 regular hourly wage x 1.5 = \$79.47 per hour) Total projected overtime cost equals \$3,975.00 (\$79.47 x 50 hours = \$3,975.00).



 - (a) Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in its workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
 - (b) Establishing an on-going drug-free awareness program to inform employees about—
 - (1) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - (2) The Applicant's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - (3) Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and

- (4) The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
- (c) Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the award be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph (a);
- (d) Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph (a) that, as a condition of employment under the award, the employee will—
 - (1) Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - (2) Notify the employer in writing of the employee's conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statute occurring in the workplace no later than five calendar days after such conviction;
- (e) Notifying the Department, in writing, within 10 calendar days after receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title of any such convicted employee to the Department, as follows:

For COPS award recipients - COPS Office, 145 N Street, NE, Washington, DC, 20530;

For OJP and OVW award recipients - U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, ATTN: Control Desk, 810 7th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20531.

Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected award;

- (f) Taking one of the following actions, within 30 calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2), with respect to any employee who is so convicted:
 - (1) Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or
 - (2) Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency; and
- (g) Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (f).
