<u>COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR</u> Communication Highlights from the Mayor for the period ending June 18, 2012 GENERAL:

• <u>The Status of Eielson</u>: While there is no specific confirmation, there is reason to believe our efforts will lead to at least a year or two delay and more deliberative review process before any more changes are made at Eielson AFB. See the attached letters from Senator Murkowski, one dated today, the other June 1, 2012.

Also, <u>KeepTheF16s.com</u> is a joint outreach effort by the Fairbanks North Star Borough and the cities of North Pole and Fairbanks to inform concerned residents about the Air Force's plans to move the F-16 squadron and support staff from Eielson AFB to the Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson in Anchorage. The website (<u>http://www.keepthef16s.com</u>) and related Facebook page (<u>www.facebook.com/ KeepTheF16s /</u>) are also places where the public can share their comments, photos, and videos to help make the case that moving the F-16s from Eielson is the wrong solution for Fairbanks and the country.

• <u>The Status of Energy Relief and Projects</u>: Work is progressing on a community energy Authority that will be able to guide the efforts that are in the best interest of the community. The Governor has requested that Fairbanks Natural Gas, Flint Hills, and GVEA all get together to provide a solution but it can't be a serious request owing to the very different businesses involved (e.g. FNG is a minor provider—at latest report, they can be monetized to reach 2,200 structures of the 28,000 structures in the FNSB needing access to natural gas distribution).

I met with the News-Miner Editorial Board on June 7 and outlined the proposal for using Royalty Oil to alleviate the Interior's heating oil and electricity expense crisis. They favorably reviewed the information stating that the information I provided seemed complete and then asked, "Why won't the Governor do this?" I asked them to investigate that question. So far, no story, but we can be hopeful.

Both Mayor Hopkins and I are writing the Governor for clarification regarding the extent to which he will "aggressively work" with us during the next four to five months to find an immediate energy solution for our community this winter, as he promised us several weeks back. I will copy the council on my letter to him.

• <u>North Pole Economic Development Corp (NPEDC)</u>: 1. Won the bid for the IFSS World Championship Sled Dog competition! The decision was announced in Oslo, Norway on June 8. See the attached press release for more exciting details.

2. NPEDC hosted an invitation only luncheon with Congressman Don Young who spoke of the Congressional efforts to stop/slow any action at Eielson and also to bring the unmanned "Global Hawk" aerial vehicles here. He also spoke of the need for Alaska to invest in natural gas infrastructure in order to reduce energy costs, including a gasification plant on the North Slope that would generate a large of amount of electricity that could be transmitted to Interior Alaska. He also reminded us that "can't" never used to be in Alaska's vocabulary until after we got comfortable with one pipeline. He reminded us that we not only have to be a "can-do" state, but one that aggressively resists federal agency encroachment of the rights of the State. He spoke of the Conference Committee tackling the transportation bill and was hopeful he could re-instate funding for the Alaska Railroad that had been removed by the Senate. Take-away quote: "*If you don't think about the things that can be done, nothing will ever be done.*"

• <u>Fairbanks Regional Economic Partnership (FREP)</u>: had a very informative meeting. For those entrepreneurs and inventors seeking to get assistance with the various stages to start-up, including Idea, Technical Assistance (including patents), Funding Services, and Execution, the UAF's Office of Intellectual Property and Commercialization is gathering, and will make available, a catalogue of resources on one easy to access web site. In the meantime, if you or any of our constituents need access to these resources, I have a printed draft that can be emailed to them.

You have a financial statement for May. This is just a draft statement. I have not had time yet, to do any closing entries or the bank reconciliation for May. I attended the Government Finance Officers Association conference last week in Chicago. I attended several classes. A couple of the classes really pointed out the need for reserves and the corresponding policies to build, protect, and use these reserves. Since we are in the process of developing a Disaster Awareness Program, I attended a class on FEMA. I've worked with FEMA before, so it was a good refresher. FEMA reimbursements are very seldom 100%. It can easily take 6 months to 2 years to get your reimbursements for disaster related expenses. Again, they mentioned that having good reserves is essential in order to pay the bills on time. You have to pay the bills first, in order to get reimbursement from FEMA...FEMA won't pay them for you. I also attended a couple of classes on budgeting and one on preparing a PAFR - a Popular Annual Financial Report. This is an extremely condensed version of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. It's something this is on my list of items that I want to accomplish in the next year or two. It was a good informative conference.

FNSB Representative:

The Assembly met on June 14. Among the business passed were Resolution 2012-33 "against use of any Borough resource to assist any Alaska or United States Agency, TSA, or military armed force in implementing sections 1021 and 1022 of the National Defense Authorization Act of 2012 against any United States citizen and requesting that the Alaska State Legislature, Governor of Alaska and Congressional delegation preserve Habeas Corpus"; and Ordinance 2011-20-2U authorizing the use of \$628,099 from several pots of federal and state money to purchase equipment for the new Emergency Operations Center located by the Steese Fire House on Farmer's Loop. What was removed from the consent agenda and denied the ability to proceed to public comment was a proposal to place on the ballot an advisory vote to retain borough departments and funding.

The next regularly scheduled Assembly meeting is scheduled for June 28. I will be out of town and requesting a Pro-Tem to fill in.

- Public works is continuing with beautification efforts on Santa Claus Lane
 - Flowers planted in roundabouts and Weber Construction donated hydro-seeding
 - Next project is hydro-seeding ditch on mall side of road; will install first bench in alcove next to Richardson Highway (McDonalds side of Santa Claus Lane)
 - Benny Lin has authorized City to place wheel stops on border of Santa Claus Road rightof-way and Town & County Mall parking lot (Taco Bell & Pizza Hut parking lot) to prevent cars from ruining grass that will be planted there
 - Economic stimulus grant for energy saving building improvements will install new City Hall heating controls and install new thermostats; installation should begin in July
 - Bad news on construction projects. DOT has delayed to 2013 the following projects:
 - Paving-- East 5th Avenue; 1st Avenue/Lewis Street/2nd Avenue loop; Yukon Drive and a section of Cross Way.
 - * LED street light project phase 2: Has gone to bid but not required to be completed until July 2013
 - * Bus stop—Bus stop at North Pole Plaza Mall will not be replaced this year
- Community Development Block Grant for Santa's Senior Center Kitchen Upgrade Project:
 - Professional services contract is before the Council this evening
- Developing a proposal to create two-mile exercise trail that follows existing pedestrian paths
 - Concept is to install 20 exercise stations at four stops along the trail
 - Three exercise stations can be installed on City land, will approach the School Board to place a fourth station on their land along 8th Avenue
 - Looking for external sources to fund the trail

Utility Department

- Utility Garage Project
 - Foundation piers installed and underground plumbing scheduled to go in this week
- Utility's waste water discharge to the Tanana River
 - River flow continues in the discharge channel for the waste water treatment plant

Human Resource Dept.

- Mayor Isaacson appointed a new police Chief. We are very happy to say that Steve Dutra is now officially the Police Chief for North Pole Police Department. He will be sworn in tonight during the meeting.
- The Clerks office is in the process of doing an audit on the personnel records. I am going through each of the files to make sure that we have updated information and that the personnel files and health files are not co-mingled.

City Clerk's Office

- This summer I will be going through the code book to see where it needs to be updated and check on the grammatical errors and other portions of the code that are not in line with each other. Please be sure to check with me when you want to put an ordinance through so I can do a search to see where else in the code it may need to be changed. Will be working with Code Publishing to update the cross referencing.
- I am working on an ipad policy and hope to have it before council by the next meeting. There are only approximately 4 cities in Alaska that have implemented ipads. Together we are working to bring to our councils something that will be a fair and legal policy to the council members and the Cities.
- After researching our code and Robert's Rules of Order, the mayor was able to able to put together a policy to aid council in having better meetings. I plan to put together a Newly Elected Officials class for our members in October after the election
- The move from GWL/Cigna to AW Rehn is going smoothly. AW Rehn will have all the employee materials put together in a packet along with their ID cards that they should be receiving soon. Diana Stewart from Alaska USA Insurance will be in North Pole on Wednesday, June 27th at 10:00 a.m. to assist me in giving our employees an opportunity to ask questions regarding the new insurance program. We will be covering the health, life & disability insurance, and the prescription plan. All employees are urged to attend.
- In May I was asked to chair the Mentoring Committee for Alaska Association of Municipal Clerks. I took over those duties as of June 1st and have the opportunity to welcome and contact new clerks in Alaska and set them up with a mentor from their region to give them the resources they need to do the best job they can. AAMC provides

educational training and mentoring opportunities for municipal clerks along with leadership, communication, networking, and professional growth. Clerks are a close network of professional leaders who encourage each other and provide tools for each other to promote the professionalism and effectiveness of their role as the Clerk. I am excited to meet and mentor these women as they start on this exciting road of local government.

• The local election is fast approaching. We have three seats open this year. The Mayor's seat and two council seats. Local elections will be held on Tuesday, October 2, 2012.

• A \$25 non-refundable filing fee shall accompany the declaration of candidacy.

A person may not occupy more than one office at one time. A person shall not occupy or be a candidate for more than one seat on a body.

Communication Highlights from the Mayor for the period ending July 2, 2012

GENERAL:

• <u>The Status of Eielson</u>: As I reported pending last Council meeting, the Air Force has delayed any actions on moving assets from Eielson for at least one year. USAF Chief of Staff General Nordie Schwartz, explicitly stating that the language inserted in budget appropriations in both House and Senate subcommittees (by the Alaska congressional delegation at the urging of local and state officials) has led the Secretary of the Air Force to suspend all actions for planned for Eielson FY13 (Oct 1, 2012 to September 30, 2013). Further, unlike the current efforts to date to move the Eielson F16s, any future effort will be subjected to the more vigorous "procedural compliance" with NEPA, which we are pushing for it to mean that there will be an EIS that includes public solicitation and comments. The process will also include a "formal" housing study (versus the Google search performed for the SATAF report).

This action came on Tuesday, June 26, after I had telephonically participated by invitation in the Legislature's Joint Armed Services Committee hearing on actions the State can be taking to BRAC proof our military installations, especially Eielson. The emphasis from the hearing was to not just concentrate on removing Eielson from base closure actions but to increase its missions. This might seem outlandish to some who believe that once the government has made a decision it is irrevocable. However, it is not far-fetched considering the consultants the State has hired have been successful during the last two BRACs in not only eliminating their clients from the closure lists but in also significantly increasing the bases missions. Eielson becomes more of a significant national security asset considering that the President has declared that the future threats are coming from the Asia-Pacific region, a region where Eielson becomes extremely strategic.

The significance of the Air Force announcement is not that a final decision has been made but rather a more deliberative and open process is being taken that will allow local residents and businesses some breathing room from the stresses associated with possible job layoffs by several employers, energy costs, and the immediate potential of a loss in home values and ability to sell homes in the North Pole / Fairbanks area. Our local efforts are far from over and I will keep the Council apprised of developments.

Also, <u>KeepTheF16s.com</u> is a joint outreach effort by the Fairbanks North Star Borough and the cities of North Pole and Fairbanks to inform concerned residents about the Air Force's plans to move the F-16 squadron and support staff from Eielson AFB to the Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson in Anchorage. The website (<u>http://www.keepthef16s.com</u>) and related Facebook page (<u>www.facebook.com/ KeepTheF16s /</u>) are also places where the public can share their comments, photos, and videos to help make the case that moving the F-16s from Eielson is the wrong solution for Fairbanks and the country.

• <u>The Status of Energy Relief and Projects</u>: Before leaving on vacation, I sent a number of key Legislators, including the Interior delegation, a request to seriously look at AS 38.05 and 38.06 which gives the Commissioner of DNR the immediate ability to re-price Alaska's royalty oil for social and economic reasons. One key, long-time staffer remarked to me that she had never read the statutes – something that probably common to most legislators and their aides – which is why a

serious look at the use of royalty oil to provide relief this winter has never been taken up. I will keep you posted if anything comes of this

CITY OF NORTH POLE ORDINANCE 2012-16

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NORTH POLE, ALASKA AMENDING CHAPTER 5.12.030 OF THE NORTH POLE MUNICIPAL CODE OF ORDINANCES – SALE OF FIREWORKS – PERMIT REQUIRED

WHEREAS, changes to the North Pole Municipal Code is a continually changing requirement; and

WHEREAS, the City of North Pole Municipal Code should be amended to conform to the requirements of the City and to provide clarification as needed; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that our ordinances be maintained current.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of North Pole: Section 1. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature and shall be codified.

Section 2. General Provisions of the North Pole Municipal Code of Ordinances are amended as follows:

Chapter 5.12.030

FIREWORKS

Section:

5.12.030 Sale of fireworks--Permit required.

5.12.030 Sale of fireworks--Permit required.

Upon issuance of a state permit, a prospective retail vendor of Class "C" fireworks may apply for a city permit under the following terms and conditions:

A. Payment of a permit fee of one thousand five hundred *three thousand* dollars (*\$3,000*) for a single location within the city limits. An additional fee of two hundred dollars shall be paid during each permit period to the North Pole Fire Department Fire/Accident Prevention fund; (Ord. 01-07, 2001)

B. Registration for the collection and payment of sales tax as required by Chapter 4.08 of the North Pole Code of Ordinances;

C. Periods of sale are limited to June 20th through July 5th and December 15th through December 31st;

D. Retail vendors must comply with all applicable state and local fire safety codes;

E. The city shall be named as a coinsured on all insurance policies obtained by the vendor. The city shall require a two million dollar combined single limit policy for personal liability, injury and property damage. Insurance must be underwritten on an occurrence basis rather than a claims made basis;

F. The city reserves the right to halt the sale of any fireworks it deems hazardous or a nuisance upon twenty-four hours written notice to the vendor. If a hazard is deemed an

immediate hazard to persons or property by a fire department official, the sale of fireworks can be halted immediately until the hazard is corrected. Once corrected and inspected the vendor may reopen for the sale of fireworks; (Ord. 01-07,2001)

G. A permit issued under authority of this section may not be transferred and shall expire at midnight on December 31st of the year of issue. (Ord. 92-4 §2(part), 1992; Ord. 91-5 §3(part), 1991)

Section 3. Effective date

This ordinance shall be effective at 5:00 p.m. on the first City business day following its adoption.

13.08.010 Utility services.

A. The city water utility service provides a pressurized, piped water supply used by the citizens as a potable water supply and firefighting source of water. The city sewer utility provides a piped wastewater collection, treatment and disposal service in a manner which safeguards the health of the citizens of the city and protects the area's environment.(Ord. 00-16 §2, 2000); (Ord. 82-8 §1.B, 1982)

B. All utility improvements shall be in accordance with the Uniform Plumbing Code, City of North Pole Construction Standards and approved plans by a registered professional engineer. (Ord. 00-16 §2, 2000)

13.08.020 Management of the water and sewer utilities.

- A. The management of the North Pole Utility including billings, accounting and collections, review of applications for utility services, preparation of contracts for utility service, and enforcement of the rules and regulations of the utilities as established in the ordinance codified in this title shall be the responsibility of the mayor.
- B. The operation and maintenance of the utility system including the maintenance and repair of equipment, supervision of improvements to the systems, maintenance of records of operations and development of an annual operating budget shall be the responsibility of the city utility superintendent.
- C. Copies of all rates, rules and regulations which have been approved by the council shall be filed and maintained by the city clerk and shall be open for inspection by the public at the office of the clerk. (Ord. 82 8 §1.C, 1982)

13.08.030 Basis of the City utility rate structure.

The rate structure for the City utility services is set so as to make the utility self perpetuating without profit accumulation. (Ord. 82-8 §1.D, 1982)

13.08.040 Property of the City water and sewer utilities.

All equipment, meters, pipes, regulators, pumps, structures and other contrivances supplied by the City for the North Pole Utility shall remain the property of the North Pole Utility and may be removed whenever the City Council elects. (Ord. 82-8 §1.E, 1982)

13.08.050 Disposal of utilities, utility owned material or equipment.

The City may sell, lease or otherwise dispose of a municipal utility, utility owned material or equipment as per Section 13.4 of the City Charter. (Ord. 82-8 §1.F, 1982)

13.08.060 Authorized operations and maintenance personnel.

Only City employees and contractors approved by the utilities supervisor are authorized to install, repair, remove, inspect or exchange any portion of the City utility system. (Ord. 82-8 §1.G, 1982)

13.08.070 Right of inspection and access.

- A. Right of Inspection. The North Pole Utility reserves the right to perform an inspection of the customer's premises at any time it deems necessary to determine that all piping, fixtures and related utility structures are in proper operating condition. Such inspection shall be performed in normal business hours unless an emergency exists which may jeopardize the utility system or the health and welfare of the citizens of the City.
- B. Right of Access.
 - 1. The North Pole Utility reserves the right to access a customer's premises to disconnect the customer's water service in the event the account has become delinquent.
 - Tampering with the North Pole Utility disconnection devices shall result in a fine of \$500 (five hundred dollars) and/or termination of water utility service. (Ord. 08-25 §2 (part), 2008; Ord. 82-8 §1.H, 1982)

13.08.080 Service to areas outside City limits.

If not within the corporate limits of the City, a property owner can make application to the City for City utility service. As a condition of service, the property owner must agree to annexation of his property into the corporate limits of the City and abide by the rules and regulations of the utility. The Council will review all applications for utility service from property owners not within the corporate limits and reserves the right to refuse service to such applicants. (Ord. 82-8 §1.I, 1982)

13.08.090 Service to areas outside existing assessment districts.

- A. To the extent that a property or portion thereof is not levied an assessment from an existing assessment district, a tie-in fee shall be charged upon application to the City for connection to a municipally approved or constructed water or sewer main.
- B. Tie-In Charge Rates.
 - 1. For those residential properties or portions thereof connecting to a municipally approved or constructed water or sewer main the tie in charge shall be \$750 (seven hundred fifty dollars) for water and \$750 (seven hundred fifty dollars) for sewer.
 - 2. For those residential properties or portions thereof being served by a developer financed water or sewer facility the tie-in charge shall be \$500 (five hundred dollars) for water and \$500 (five hundred dollars) for sewer.
 - 3. For those commercial properties or portions thereof connecting to a municipally approved or constructed water or sewer main the tie-in charge shall be \$1,500 (one thousand five hundred dollars) for water and \$1,500 (one thousand five hundred dollars) for sewer.
 - 4. For those commercial properties or portions thereof being served by a developerfinanced water or sewer facility the tie-in charge shall be \$1,000 (one thousand dollars) for water and \$1,000 (one thousand dollars) for sewer.

Residential and commercial properties water and sewer tie-in fees shall be the following:

- C. Water service will be provided contingent upon connection to the City sewer facilities when sewer service is available (13.12.090). Sewer service may be provided independent of City water connection when City sewer service is not available.
- D. Application and payment in full of the tie-in charge shall be made before any construction commences. All construction shall be in accordance with Chapter 13.12. The tie-in charge includes the inspection fee. shall be in addition to the inspection fees charged in Section 13.24.090.
- E. Private Wastewater Disposal.
 - 1. Where a public sewer is not available under the provisions of the Uniform Plumbing Code (UPC), the building sewer shall be connected to a private wastewater disposal system complying with the same provisions and applicable City, State and Federal requirements.

2. Upon completion of construction of a sewer system extension in an area, the City shall publish a notice that sewer service is available to serve the property owners of that area. The owner of a property as defined in Section 13.20.020(A)(4), and served by a private wastewater disposal system shall have installed or cause to be installed, at his expense, a connection to the public sewer within no less than two years from the date such sewer service is declared to be available, or any other timetable as prescribed by City Council or City code. Prior to the sale of a property served by a wastewater service system, hook up to the wastewater service is required. The connection shall be of a type and installed in a manner consistent with this chapter. Monthly wastewater fees as established by City code shall begin at time of such connection. (Ord. 11-05 §2, 2011; Ord. 08-25 §2 (part), 2008; Ord. 01-03 §2 (part), 2003; Ord. 00-16 §2 (part) 2000; Ord. 00-8 §2 (part), 2000; Ord. 99-18 §2, 1999; Ord. 83-5, 1983; Ord. 82-8 §1.J, 1982)
