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


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



PUBLIC HEALTH TOTAL EXPENDITURES 2020-2022






SUBSTANCE USE PREVENTION TOTAL EXPENDITURES 2020-2022




Public Health WIC


AVERAGE MONTHLY WIC PARTICIPATION



The Maternal and Infant Health Program (MIHP), is a home-based visiting program tailored to the maternal and infant population that receive Medicaid benefits. This program combines both nursing and social work specialties to provide clients with support and education uniquely specific to their needs during pregnancy and through baby's first year of life.



Family Planning/STI Services



Family Planning is a federally and state funded program that provides individuals with confidential, low cost reproductive health screenings, education, birth control, and pregnancy testing. The goal of this program is to educate clients about their bodies and their choices in terms of reproductive health, provide preventative screenings such as pelvic/pap and breast exams, and to offer affordable contraception to a population that may not otherwise have access.



Sanilac County Health Department offers testing for HIV and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) by our professional nursing staff. In addition to testing, clients are also provided with extensive education, condoms, and treatmen indicated. While some testing is performed by court-order, these services are also offered anonymously to anyone who wants to be tested. The goal of our STI program is to educate, test, treat, and decrease the spread of infection. Clients are also screened and tested through our Family Planning program.




Immunizations




SCHD provides infant, childhood, and adult immunizations to all our county residents, both at the Department and through off-site immunization clinics. These shots include Hepatitis, HPV, Pneumococcal, influenza, tetanus, pertussis, varicella, zoster, measles, mumps, rubella, etc.

IMMUNIZATIONS PER YEAR, NOT INCLUDING COVID-19






IMMUNIZATIONS GIVEN BY YEAR



Covid-19







This graph represents the amount of reported positive Covid-19 tests reported in Sanilac County. Numbers include both rapid and PCR testing. Covid-19 testing was widely unavailable at the beginning of the pandemic and when Covid-19 tests became available over the counter in 2022, positive at home tests were not reported to the state, so amounts of actual cases, may be significantly under-reported. From the start of the Covid-19 pandemic until 12/31/2022, the total number of report positive Covid-19 cases for Sanilac County was 10,429.










As of Dec 31st, 2022, 18,341 Sanilac County residents received a complete primary series of Covid-19 vaccine. This equates to 44.6% of the population of Sanilac County as fully vaccinated against Covid-19.



As of December 31st 2022, 5,952,247 Michigan residents had completed a primary series of Covid-19 vaccination. This equates to 59.6% of Michigan's population being fully vaccinated against Covid-19









Communicable Disease



The Sanilac County Health Department monitors certain communicable diseases which must be reported by doctor's offices, and responds to complaints of animal bites, food borne illnesses, and other incidents. This work is documented in the Michigan Disease Surveillance System (MDSS), which is a valuable tool for tracking and analysis of communicable disease patterns. Observing these patterns is important not only for knowing what local needs are, but also spotting trends that may indicate more serious problems such as a pandemic event or biological attack














Hearing and Vision

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Our hearing and vision technician conducts these screenings in local schools, working with children from pre-school through 7th grade. When needed, children are referred for further testing.








Children's Special Health Care Services

This program provides services to families with children who are diagnosed with congenital or chronic health conditions. Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS) works closely with Medicaid Health Plans to assist with scheduling specialty doctor appointments, transportation, travel reimbursement, and lodging for appointments. CSHCS also helps families gain access to medical equipment such as wheelchairs, van lifts, and ramps.



Environmental Health



The department of Environmental Health provides services for Food Safety, Pools and Campgrounds, DHS inspections, bathing beach samplings, body art facility inspections, complaint investigations, well and sewer permits.

The Environmental Health Division of the Sanilac County Health Department is responsible for protecting the public health, and the health of our environment. This is accomplished by implementing state-mandated programs and also performing non-mandated services for the local community.

Each mandated program has minimum requirements set by the State of Michigan. These requirements must be met for the Sanilac County Health Department to be accredited.

Substance Use Prevention




The Sanilac County Health Department Substance Use Prevention Program is equipping the community to manage and alleviate the triggers of substance use and aid in recovery.

MALES AND FEMALES SERVED




