

Your Website—Use It or Lose It



Does your county or municipality have a website? If yes, do you know whether it complies with South Dakota's Open Meetings Law? According to SDCL 1-25-1.1, "All public bodies...shall provide public notice, with proposed agenda, that is visible, readable, and accessible for at least an entire, continuous twenty-four hours immediately preceding any meeting, by posting a copy of the notice, visible to the public at the principal office of the public body holding the meeting. The proposed agenda shall include the date, time, and location of the meeting. The notice shall also be posted on the public body's website upon dissemination of the notice, if such a website exists." (emphasis added). This article is designed to provide you with a basic understanding of which public bodies are subject to the law and what may constitute a "public body's website" for purposes of this statute.

What is a Public Body? According to SDCL 1-25-1, a public body refers to "any association, authority, board, commission, committee, council, task force, school district, county, city, town, township, or other agency of the state, which is created or appointed by statute, ordinance, or resolution and is vested with

the authority to exercise any sovereign power derived from state law." As such, this definition is quite broad and likely includes your primary governing body, the appointed planning commission, and board of adjustment created by the zoning ordinance. Therefore, the proposed agenda for any official meetings of these groups is required to be posted on your website, if such a website exists.

What is a Public Body's Website?

This is a subject without much, if any, elaboration by the courts; however, a "public body's web-

site" is potentially any website that a reasonable person may infer the local government entity owns or controls, even if this is, in fact, not the case. For example, a municipal employee may have taken the initiative and used public funds to set up an officiallooking website years ago, but it has long since been abandoned either intentionally or simply because the municipality never formally recognized its existence. Assuming it still exists on the internet, it's possible that failure to post relevant meeting notices on this website may, at a minimum, be deemed a violation of the Open Meetings Act. It's also possible that such a ruling may serve as grounds for invalidating an ordinance or determination if a court feels that failure to provide notice of the relevant meeting on the website equates to a failure of the local government entity to follow proper procedures in accordance with state law. Whether your website complies with the Open Meetings Act is a matter to be addressed with your attorney; however, if you have any questions about your local regulations generally, please contact Patrick Andrews at patrick@secog.org or (605) 367-5390.

She is president of the National Association of Development Organizations, serves on the Sioux Falls MPO Technical Advisory Committee and is a member of the Des Moines Federal Home Loan Bank Housing Advisory Board. Keller Forbes teaches Junior Achievement, is a volunteer driver for the Drive to Help program and is a United Way Heart Club member. She earned a Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration from St. Leo College in St. Leo, Florida, and a Juris Doctor from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. She is also a licensed real estate broker and certified economic development and housing development finance professional.

Recent Funding in SECOG Region

DENR Awards: At its March 30th and 31st board meetings, the state Board of Water and Natural Resources approved a total of \$94.6 million in grants and loans for water and waste projects. Grants and loans were awarded to the following communities:

- ♦ Centerville A \$240,000 loan for Main Street storm sewer improvements.
- Colton A \$1.385 million loan for sanitary sewer replacement and an \$815,000 grant and \$500,000 loan for drinking water main replacement for the 1st and Main Street projects
- Humboldt A \$272,000 loan for water meter replacement.
- Sioux Falls A \$11 million loan for primary digester cover and mixer improvements and \$559,125 for nonpoint source improvements in the Big Sioux River Basin.
- Salem A \$2.556 million loan for wastewater collection improvements and a \$500,000 grant and \$302,000 loan for drinking water distribution improvements.
- ♦ **Worthing** A \$120,000 loan with \$90,000 in principal forgiveness for water meter replacement.

GOED Economic Development Partnership Program (EDPP): SEDF was awarded a \$166,667 EDPP grant from GOED to recapitalize SEDF's regional revolving loan fund.

SEDF Receives IRP Loan

Small Community Planning Grant

DENR established the Small Community Planning Grant to fund project specific engineering reports that allow a community to take a proactive approach to water and wastewater infrastructure management. The funds may also be used to conduct a utility rate analysis and review using the Show-me RatemakerTM.

The Small Community Planning Grants are available to those communities serving a population of 2,500 or fewer. Eligible communities may receive up to 80 percent of the cost of the study once the study is complete with a limit of \$8,000 for drinking water studies and \$10,000 for wastewater-related studies. This grant is not available for projects already on the State Water Plan.

Planners at the SECOG are available to help eligible communities prepare funding applications. Applications are accepted year-round and funded any time after DENR review of the application. Sioux Falls MPO 2016 Year End Report

The Sioux Falls Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) receives federal funding to conduct continuous, comprehensive, and cooperative transportation planning and programming activities for its study area, including the Cities of Brandon, Crooks, Harrisburg, Hartford, Sioux Falls, and Tea, as well as portions of Lincoln and Minnehaha Counties.

The 2016 Year End Report for the Sioux Falls MPO is now posted at: http://siouxfallsmpo.org/ resources/publications/. Highlights of the transportation planning activities from 2016 include: continued work on the I-229 Major Investment Study and the I-29 Exit 77 (41st Street) Interchange Study, and continued efforts to implement work activities to address the priorities identified in the Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Transportation Plan. Overall, the Sioux Falls MPO completed just under \$2 million in transportation planning activities in 2016, which continues work to improve a coordinated multi-modal transportation system in the region.

2018-2021 TIP

The Sioux Falls Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the South Dakota Department of Transportation (DOT) are in the process of drafting the 2018-2021 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The TIP and STIP include prioritized listings of multimodal transportation improvement projects for streets and highways, public transportation, aviation, railroads, bicycles, and pedestrian.

Communities in the SECOG region (Clay, Lincoln, McCook, Minnehaha, Turner, and Union Counties) are encouraged to attend the meeting scheduled for Tuesday, June 27th, at 3:00 p.m. in the SECOG Board Room. At this meeting, DOT staff will present the transportation improvements projects included in the draft 2018-2021 STIP for the SECOG region. There will also be time for discussion and questions.

The draft 2018-2021 TIP, which includes transportation improvements projects for the MPO area (Brandon, Crooks, Harrisburg, Hartford, Sioux Falls, Tea, and portions of Lincoln and Minnehaha Counties), will be presented to the MPO committees in July, including a public hearing to be held during the meeting of the Technical Advisory Committee.

DOT will also be holding public meetings across the State and via webinar to present the draft 2018-2021 STIP. The schedule of public meetings can be viewed at http://sddot.com/transportation/highways/planning/stip/docs/STIP-pmdates20182021.pdf.
