


2020-2023 Transportation Improvement Program

The Sioux Falls Metropolitan Organization (MPO) and the South Dakota Department of Transportation (SDDOT) are in the process of drafting the 2020-2023 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and 2020-2023 Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), respectively. The TIP and STIP include prioritized listings of multimodal transportation improvement projects for streets and highways, public transportation, aviation, railroads, bicycles, and pedestrian.

The draft 2020-2023 TIP, which includes transportation improvement projects for the MPO area (Brandon, Crooks, Harrisburg, Hartford, Sioux Falls, Tea, and portions of Lincoln and Minnehaha counties), were presented to the MPO committees at the July 10th and 11th meetings, including a public hearing on Thursday, July 11th, at 2:00 p.m. Additional opportunities to participate in the TIP update are listed on the next page.

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

The State of South Dakota, including the southeast portion, has experienced extreme weather recently. The year started with a difficult winter and continued into spring with relentless rain that caused significant hardship and damage. Cities and counties have taken a long look at what can be done to prevent future damage. The recent tumultuous weather has provided insight as to where the "hot" spots are and weaknesses in the ability to mitigate against further damage. President Trump responded to Governor Noem's request and provided a Major Disaster Declaration for affected areas of the state. This declaration provides for the availability of Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) funds for all the counties in SECOG's district. The HMGP funds provide financial assistance to cities and counties to identify and mitigate against future losses.

Types of projects that may be eligible for funding include:

- Community Safe Rooms
- Drainage improvements (grade raises, culverts, channelization)
- Powerline Burials
- Acquisition/Relocation of Homes from a Floodplain
- Outdoor Early Warning Systems
- Generators for Shelters, Water Supplies and Sewer Systems

Projects must be cost effective, feasible, meet environmental planning and historic preservation requirements, and come from a jurisdiction that has a FEMA-approved pre-disaster mitigation plan.

Applications are accepted anytime.

Funding awarded to city of Irene

The Board of Water and Natural Resources recently approved a \$4,253,000 funding package for the city of Irene to make drinking water and wastewater system improvements. The funding package includes more than \$3,000,000 in principal forgiveness.

The funded project is the final phase of a multi-phase project to address water and wastewater upgrades in the city. The project also includes South Dakota Department of Transportation Community Access Grant funding of \$340,000.

Local Infrastructure Improvement Program Grant awarded to Turner County

Turner County was awarded a Local
Infrastructure Improvement Program grant
from the Governor's Office of Economic
Development in June.

The \$243,386 grant provides half of the funds necessary to improve a two-mile stretch of County Road 32 to support the expansion of Norway Pork.

Why and When to Grant a Variance?

Zoning ordinances are designed to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community, while treating both individuals and their properties as fairly and equally as possible. While they are typically written to serve as a reasonable baseline for everyone, they do so by setting area standards very broadly, rather than accounting for each property on an individual basis. As such, there may be cases where a property should be considered individually or is simply too physically unique to fit into generally applicable regulations. In such a situation, a city or county may consider whether a property deserves a variance.

A variance is a request to deviate from current zoning requirements. If granted, it allows the landowner to use the property in a manner not otherwise permitted by the zoning ordinance. It is not a change in the zoning law. Instead, it is a specific waiver of requirements of the zoning ordinance. There are generally two broad categories of variances used in local land use planning: area (or bulk) variances and use variances. An area variance is the most common type and results from problems caused by the physical features of the land. A use variance authorizes a principal land use not normally permitted by the zoning ordinance.

According to state law, variances are only to be used in cases where an "unwarranted hardship" creates "an unreasonable deprivation of use as distinguished from the mere grant of a privilege." SDCL 11-6-25. In City of Madison v. Clarke, 288 N.W.2d 312 (S.D., 1980), the South Dakota Supreme Court held that the hardship necessary for a variance must be "substantial and of compelling force, not merely for reasons of convenience or profit."

Why and When to Grant a Variance? continued More specifically, unwarranted hardship is demonstrated when an applicant proves that: (1) the land in question cannot yield a reasonable return if used only in the manner allowed in that zone; (2) the plight of the owner is due to unique circumstances and not to the general conditions in the neighborhood which may reflect the unreasonableness of the zoning ordinance itself; and (3) the variance will not alter the essential character of the locality. Cole v. Adj. of City of Huron, 616 N.W.2d 483, 2000 S.D. 119 (2000) (Sabers, J., dissenting).

Essentially, variances are designed for situations where they are needed to make reasonable or feasible use of the property, rather than as a backdoor mechanism to provide a landowner with extra benefits unavailable to his or her neighbors. The important thing to remember is that the nature of the hardship must be unique to the property itself in order to justify the variance, otherwise you may find yourself in a situation where arbitrarily enforcing portions of your zoning ordinance against a similarly situated property may become legally problematic.





Five-Year County Highway and Bridge Improvement Plan

The time has come again for Counties to prepare their Five-Year County Highway and Bridge Improvements Plan, commonly called the Transportation Plan. In order to maintain eligibility for the State BIG program, the plan needs to be updated on an annual basis with the previous plans projects being reviewed and status updates reported. The imposition of a wheel tax is also required to be eligible for Bridge Improvement Grant (BIG) funding. Completed plans are due to the State Department of Transportation on or before October 15, 2019.

Transportation planning is a cooperative process designed to foster involvement by all users of the system, such as the business community, community groups, the traveling public, freight operators, and the general public through a proactive public participation process conducted by the county. The planning process also fosters communication of local governments such as townships to jointly discuss transportation needs and coordinate improvements.

The Bridge Improvement Grant (BIG) program was created by the 2015 legislative session in Senate Bill 1 (SB 1). SB 1 dedicated \$7 million per year for the BIG program. This money comes from license plate fees and non-commercial vehicle fees. In addition, SDDOT sets aside \$8 million per year of state gas tax funds, for a total of \$15 million available for the BIG grants.

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




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
