2023-2026 TIP



The Sioux Falls Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the South Dakota Department of Transportation (SDDOT) are in the process of adopting the 2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and 2023-2026 Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), respectively. The TIP and STIP include prioritized listings of multimodal transportation improvement projects for streets and highways, public transportation, aviation, railroads, bicycles, and pedestrian.

The 2023-2026 TIP, which includes transportation improvement projects for the MPO area (Brandon, Crooks, Harrisburg, Hartford, Sioux Falls, Tea, and portions of Lincoln County and Minnehaha County), was approved by the MPO committees at the August 10th and 11th meetings. The SD Transportation Commission will consider approval of the STIP and Sioux Falls MPO TIP at its August 25th meeting.

Heat Wave; Water Grave

The clear, blue, and sunny skies of South Dakota make summer enjoyable for many South Dakotans. However, this summer was more than just sunshine. This summer brought many unique weather phenomena to our small corner of South Dakota, such as the derechos that swept through our local communities. In addition to the derechos, many communities are facing additional challenges from droughts. According to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Drought Monitor, Clay and Union counties are experiencing an extreme drought, Turner and Lincoln counties are experiencing a severe drought, while McCook and Minnehaha counties are experiencing an abnormally dry to moderate drought. While derechos are a rare phenomenon, droughts are more common in South Dakota and communities can plan local responses to severe drought conditions.

Droughts can impact a community's health, safety, and economy. Without rainwater, many natural water sources will dry-up which may cause a water shortage for local communities. Because of dry conditions and the high-winds of South Dakota, fires are easily spreadable during drought conditions. With possible water shortages due to droughts, local fire departments may face additional challenges to contain fires. In addition, droughts may also negatively impact tourism (fishing, fishing access, wildlife, and campgrounds) and reduce crop yields for farmers - both have significant economic impacts on respective communities.

Because of severe droughts in 2012 and 2013, South Dakota established the South Dakota Drought Task Force to prepare a drought mitigation plan. In November 2015, the South Dakota Drought Task Force, in partnership with South Dakota's Office of Emergency Management Department of Public Safety, developed the South Dakota Drought Mitigation Plan. The Drought Mitigation Plan provided various strategies to improve water availability during droughts, increase public knowledge on drought conditions, and assist individuals that will be disproportionately impacted by drought conditions. Even though the Drought Mitigation Plan promotes local planning for drought mitigation and water conservation, many communities have not yet created ordinances that help address these issues. It is imperative that communities consider their water usage during prolonged droughts.

To preserve water, some communities in South Dakota enacted municipal ordinances that either permanently or temporarily restrict citizens from using water for certain purposes. Prohibitions include: requiring hoses to have a nozzle or shutoff device to wash houses or cars; providing specific dates and times for sprinklers to water lawns; prohibiting water usage for ornamental fountains, waterfalls, and decorative ponds; and, under extreme circumstances, prohibiting all outside water usage.

Five-Year County Highway and Bridge Improvement Plan

The time has come for counties to update their Five-Year County Highway and Bridge Improvements Plan, commonly called the Transportation Plan. In order to maintain eligibility for the State Bridge Improvement Program (BIG), the plan needs to be updated on an annual basis. This annual update must include a review of the previous plan's projects and status updates. Updates are due to the State Department of Transportation on or before October 15, 2022.

Transportation planning is a cooperative process designed to foster involvement by all users of the system, including the business community, freight operators, and the general public through a proactive public participation process conducted by the county. The planning process also fosters communication of local governments such as townships to jointly discuss transportation needs and coordinate improvements.

The Bridge Improvement Grant (BIG) program was created during the 2015 legislative session in Senate Bill 1 (SB 1). SB 1 dedicated \$7 million per year for the BIG program. This money comes from the license plate fees and from non-commercial vehicle fees. In addition, SDDOT will set aside \$8 million per year of state gas tax funds, for a total of \$15 million available for the BIG grants.


