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# Somerset Now Has Its Own "Little Free Library"

Somerset recently acquired its very own Little Free Library. This free neighborhood library provides for the exchange of books from neighbor to neighbor. According to its website (www.LittleFreeLibrary. org) the Little Free Library is a non-profit organization that inspires a love of reading, builds community, and sparks creativity by fostering neighborhood book exchanges around the

world. On June 11, **Mayor Jeffrey Slavin** (Warwick) cut the ribbon and the library officially opened its *wee little* door to the adults, youth, and kids of Somerset. **Marta Wosinska** and **Daniel Butts** generously offered to have the little structure positioned near their home at 5803 Warwick Place, just down the block from Somerset Elementary.

I started dreaming of a Little Free Library (LFL) last summer when I saw one of them in downtown D.C. near the Phillips Collection. The idea of having access to books through the concept of *Take a book*, *Leave a book* was so simple and at the same time so powerful. I then decided that I would try to figure out how to obtain one for the Town.

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# **Pool News**

At its June meeting, the Town Council approved two of the Pool Committee's recommendations:

- Approval of a proposal to twice per month spray organically for mosquitoes at the Town Pool, at the rear green space area during the pool season, as recommended by Innovative Pest Management.
- Exempt all full-time/contracted nannies, au pairs, babysitters, and caregivers from the non-resident guest fee provided they are attending with the resident they take care of.

Regarding the first recommendation, the organic mosquito and gnat treatment began on June 12th and will continue every two weeks into September. Regarding the second recommendation, while the Council approved this specific language, they also asked the Pool Committee to add some additional language that would exempt all, not only full-time/contracted, nannies,

Many thanks to the **Daniel Butts and Marta Wosinska** (Warwick) family for offering to house the library close to their own home. In this little library, you will find books of interest to everyone in your household. Please take a book and remember to bring a book of your own to donate.

So please visit our little library on a regular basis and when you have time, volunteer for one of the upcoming weeks when you can provide the necessary support. I am excited about taking a turn at this in September.

Volunteers can sign up at <a href="http://www.signupgenius.com/go/20f0d44abab9-little">http://www.signupgenius.com/go/20f0d44abab9-little</a> and choose to be in charge for one or more weeks at a time. Interested volunteers could also contact me directly at cinziafurlanetto@mac.com with their availability. However, since the library belongs to all of us, everyone is welcome to check the status of the library and take care of it at any time.

A Little Free Library belongs to everyone, and the books are always free. However, books should always be in good condition when deposited inside the library. People can return the same book or a different book. In either case, they should share a book that they would recommend to their children or friends. They may also leave a note inside the book. We have a personalized Somerset book stamp to use for stamping all our Library books. Who knows...we may be able to find books from our Somerset Library in Italy during the summer!

### Pool News from page 1

au pairs, babysitters, and caregivers. We discussed this request when the Pool Committee held its third meeting of the year on Monday, June 12. As a result, the Pool Committee has developed the following three recommendations for consideration by the Town Council:

From the previously approved exemption remove the words, "full-time/contracted" and add additional language so that it would read: "Exempt all nannies, au pairs, babysitters, and caregivers from the non-resident guest fee provided they are attending with the resident they take care of. It is the resident's responsibility to ensure that said nannies, au pairs, babysitters, and caregivers are familiar with and understand the rules of the pool. The nannies, au pairs, babysitters, and caregivers are expected to supervise in accordance with rules IV.1.c. and IV.3.b." Rule IV.1.c in summary states that adults supervising children age 4 and older must either be in the water with the child or sitting poolside within a few feet of the child. Rule IV.3.b in summary states that children age 3 and younger must be constantly supervised by an adult at all times and when the child is in the water the adult must also be in the water within an arms-length at all times. This was approved unanimously by the committee after confirming with pool management that they would be able to administer it easily. It is our hope that residents will understand that the

- exemption is for the safety and benefit of all and not try to take advantage of/abuse the policy.
- We all know how popular Four Square is and has been at the pool. In an effort to maintain the game in a safe manner while still abiding by the pool rules, we recommend the purchase of a Dry Dek Four Square Court as proposed by Community Pools. We recommend this be placed in the large grassy area safely away from the pool deck but not interfering with the existing Corn Hole game and newly purchased soccer goals and balls. Dry Dek can both weather the elements as well as not be damaged by chlorine. Additionally, it could be moved and or removed at any time.
- Some of you have noticed that the pool is not as clean as it has been in years past. This is due to the fact that the pool vacuum is broken. Therefore, we recommended the purchase of a new automatic pool cleaner/vacuum as proposed by Community Pools. We also recommend that this vacuum be known as *The Dolphin*!

We hope the Town Council will approve these recommendations at their July meeting. In the meantime, feel free to contact me at *matthew.zaft@ms.com* with any questions.

# Council to Consider Conversion to LED Street Lights

Somerset has been discussing the conversion from our current mercury vapor street lights to more energy-efficient lights for years, and will consider a resolution supporting conversion at the July Council meeting. Since we first talked about converting to more efficient bulbs and Pepco installed a set of LED lights as a pilot on Dorset Avenue near Little Falls Parkway, the environment for doing the conversion has improved. In the past it was difficult to agree on a price for replacing the lamps, which Pepco owns and has placed on its poles. Now, Pepco has LED lights among its options and has a new financing program to help municipalities pay for them over time.

Because Somerset has a very small staff, we have been monitoring the actions of the City of Takoma Park to see if it developed a model we could follow. This past year, the Takoma Park Council considered options for replacing its old lights with LED lights. Among the three options were: 1) converting through Pepco, 2) doing the project and owning their own lights including setting up a required call center, and 3) hiring a third party to manage the conversion and oversee the system. Takoma Park decided the most affordable option was to work with Pepco and have Pepco purchase and install the lamps and build the cost of the new fixtures into their current monthly Pepco bills.

At the July Council Meeting, the Town Council will be discussing purchasing and financing LED lights through Pepco. If we decide to do this, we will need to pass a resolution indicating that choice. The next step with Pepco would be to request an account manager to work with us on cost estimates and financing costs. At a future Council meeting, the Council will consider a contract with a consultant who can assess the adequacy of our current lighting and suggest what LED lamps would be appropriate to provide better lighting on our streets and sidewalks. This could include adding lamps to poles which currently do not have lamps and possibly even adding a few additional poles.

Adequate lighting involves balancing the desire for safety on our streets and sidewalks with a desire for "dark skies." Upgrading our lighting will take time so residents can participate in the discussion about what choices will be best for our Town.

# Proposed Renovation of Second Floor of the Town Hall

At its June 5, 2017 meeting, the Council discussed a concept plan, submitted by Lou Balodemas of Balodemas Architects, to renovate the second floor of the Town Hall. The Council has been discussing a possible renovation of this space since January, and this year's budget allocated funds for this purpose.

The Town Hall holds quite a bit of history for Somerset, but the second floor of the building has been neglected for more than 20 years, and is not usable for public or Council use. The second floor is not heated or air conditioned, and recently pipes on the second floor burst because of the lack of temperature control. This has created maintenance issues for the first floor. In addition, there is some concern that the second floor is at risk of collapsing, as the beams and floor may not be strong enough to hold the many Town files stored there.

The Balodemas Architects' concept plan for the second floor includes a renovated staircase, new windows, power and lighting upgrades, an HVAC system, fire alarm system, carpet, insulation, renovated bathroom, creation of a file room, as well as a new meeting room for Council, committees, or residents. The total recommended bid for the second floor project is \$242,726. In addition, some exterior maintenance work is necessary to make the building weather tight, including painting, caulking and replacement of some of the wood siding. The extent and cost of this work is not known yet. At the July Council meeting, Lou Balodemas will present his recommendations concerning the exterior of the Town Hall.

# **Council Meeting Actions**

The Town Council met in regular session on June 5, 2017. The Council took the following actions:

- 1. Approval of Sara Anderson to serve on the Parks and Natural Resources Committee for a term ending December 31, 2018.
- 2. Approval of a recommendation of the Town Council, acting as the Local Advisory Panel to the Historic Preservation Commission, on an application submitted for 4721 Essex Avenue. The applicants are proposing to: add a two story addition at the rear of the house, construct a one story garage at the rear of the house, rebuild the existing retaining wall and front walk, demolish the existing deck, shed, and tree house at the rear of the house, construct a fence around the garden, and remove several trees depending in the final plan submitted.
- 3. Approval of a recommendation of the Town Council, acting as the Local Advisory Panel to the Historic Preservation Commission, on an application submitted for 5710 Surrey Street. The applicants are proposing to: demolish the existing rear sunroom, screened porch, and deck, construct a new 2 story addition entirely at the rear of the existing historic resource, and relocate the garage in the rear yard.
- 4. Approval of a building permit application at 4722 Dorset Avenue to construct an addition at the rear of the house.
- Approval of a permit request submitted by WSSC to complete sewer lateral work near the following locations: Uppingham Street in the vicinity of 5511 Uppingham, and Trent Street in the vicinity of addresses 5508, 5509, and 5511.
- 6. Approval to remove the following Town Trees as recommended by the Town Arborist:
  - Pin Oak, 28" dbh at Tree # 394 at 4714 Essex Avenue
  - Red Maple, 14" dbh Tree# 765 at 5609 Warwick Place
  - Red Oak, 26" dbh Tree# 422 at 4906 Falstone Avenue

- Ash, 26" dbh Tree# 636 at 5419 Uppingham Street on Trent Street
- Pin Oak 15" dbh Tree# 154 at 4514 Dorset Avenue
- 2 small dogwoods at 5812 Warwick Place
- 7. Approval of a proposal to twice per month spray organically for mosquitoes at the Town Pool, at the rear green space area, during the pool season, as recommended by the Pool Committee.
- 8. Approval of an amendment to the Pool Rules, Section VIII, to exempt all full time/contracted nannies, au pairs, babysitters, and caregivers from the non-resident guest fee providing they are attending with the resident they take care of, as recommended by the Pool Committee.
- 9. Approval of a contract with Backyard Bounty to develop a conservation landscape plan near the Town parking lot and tennis courts as recommended by the Parks and Natural Resources Committee.
- 10. Approval of a proposal submitted by Lindsey and Associates to complete the FY17 audit.
- 11. Approval of a contract with Town Attorney Ron Bolt that will cover FY18, from July 1, 2017 thru June 30, 2018.
- 12. Mayor Slavin and Town Manager Charnovich each provided their monthly reports. Next steps were discussed concerning the Town Code and Charter update project. A concept plan concerning proposed work on the second floor of the Town Hall was discussed with Lou Balodemas of Balodemas Architects. A copy of the current concept plan can be viewed in the Town Hall. A closed session was held at the end of the meeting with Town Attorney Ron Bolt to discuss Town right of ways/easements, responsibilities concerning public right of ways, and related legal issues. No action was taken on this topic following the closed session.

colony of birds we have in Somerset, largely a result of our wonderful trees. But did you know that free-ranging domestic cats in the U.S. kill 1.3–4.0 billion birds and 6.3–22.3 billion mammals annually? (Estimate from a paper published by Loss, Will and Mara in "Nature Communications," January 2013) The authors go on to say that the major part of this predation is done by 'wild' cats, but even a minor role for the domestic cat is significant. How about slipping on your cat a collar with a small bell attached, before allowing it out for a prowl?

Finally, a small somewhat quizzical gripe. After discussions with our immediate neighbor, we decided the old mulberry tree on our mutual boundary had to go. I canvassed all my immediate neighbors, filed the requisite Somerset forms, had a visit from the Town Arborist who approved the decision, and received an email from the Town Office giving me the green light for the tree to be removed. The tree was removed
