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POOL SEASON 2017 New Rules and Upcoming Events

At the May meeting of the Town Council there were changes made to pool fees to help offset rising costs. First, non-resident guest fees were increased by \$1.00, from \$3.00 to \$4.00. Additionally, a non-refundable fee of \$100.00 was adopted for all parties held at the pool. This fee is in addition to both the deposit of \$250.00 (refundable if the area is cleaned up and no damage is caused) and the \$4.00 per non-resident guest fee. For example, if there is a party at the pool with 15 guests, all residents, the fee is \$100.00, but if of the 15 guests, five are non-residents, then the fee is \$120.00.

As there had been a lot of feedback regarding both of these topics and how it affects residents, the Pool Committee addressed both of these topics again at our May 16 meeting. As such we are making the following recommendations to the Town Council and Mayor Slavin:

1. Guest Fees

a.) Exempt all full-time, contracted nannies, au pairs, babysitters, caregivers, etc. from the guest fee provided they are attending with the resident they care for.

- b.) Provide each resident with a credit on their pool account for 10 free guest visits per pool season.
- That a temporary Four Square court be chalked on the pool deck at the deep end of the pool until a Dry Deck court can be purchased and placed in the grassy area adjacent to the deep end of the pool.
- 3. That the Town Council approve implementing the organic mosquito and tick repellent treatment as recommended by Innovative Pest Management.

In addition, we are recommending that the website and party form be changed to reflect the definition adopted by the Council in June, 2015 that a party is a gathering of 10 or more non-residents.

Council Meeting Actions

The Town Council met in regular session on May 1, 2017. The Council took the following actions:

- 1. Approval of the Council liaison assignments for 2017-2018.
- 2. Approval of the March 6, 2017 Council meeting minutes.
- 3. Approval of the April 3, 2017 Council meeting minutes.
- 4. Approval of the FY18 budget and setting the property tax rate at .10 for the real property and 1.00 for the personal property.
- 5. Approval to plant 1 white oak Town tree at 4810 Essex Avenue as recommended by the Town Arborist.
- 6. Approval to remove the following Town trees as recommended by the Town Arborist:
 - Ash, 25" dbh at 4801 Falstone Avenue on Surrey Street
 - Red Maple, 24" dbh Tree # 488 at 5510 Greystone Street
 - Flowering Cherry, 16" dbh Tree # 613 at 4707 Trent Court
 - Flowering Cherry, 19" dbh Tree # 643 at 5509 Trent Street
 - Tulip Poplar, 21" dbh 5545 at Warwick Place, SE corner of pool facility
- 7. Approval to send a letter and submit testimony in relation to Montgomery County Council proposed legislation concerning short-term rentals. A copy of the letter will be placed on the Town website.
- 8. Approval of a Resolution establishing an application fee in the amount of \$100.00 for large pool parties as an addition to the current pool rules for large parties in place.
- 9. Approval of a Resolution setting the pool guest fee for 2017 at \$4.00 per guest, per day.
- 10. Approval of a proposal submitted by A.B. Veirs Paving to perform roadway crack sealing, curb repair, and sidewalk repair at a cost not to exceed \$27,350.00.
- 11. Approval of a proposal submitted by A.B. Veirs Paving for additional sidewalk repair at a cost not to exceed \$7,000.00.
- 12. Mayor Slavin and Town Manager Charnovich each provided their monthly reports. Mosquito treatment was discussed for the rear grassy area at the pool. The matter was tabled until the June Council Meeting for the Town Manager to obtain a proposal for organic treatment of the area. Town Manager Charnovich went over the latest update concerning a proposal for maintenance work on the bridge near the Town Pool. It was determined the full cost for the maintenance work would be moved to the FY18 budget. Next steps were discussed concerning the Town Code and Charter update project.

IN MEMORIAM

Flora Rose Blumenthal Atkin

May 15, 1919 — May 1, 2017 Somerset resident, 1957 — 2008

Flora Atkin moved to Uppingham Street in Somerset in 1957 from Silver Spring with her husband Maury and their three children, Joe (then 11) and twins Barrie and Jonathan (then 8). She and Maury lived in Somerset for 51 years, before moving to Maplewood Park Place in Bethesda in 2008. They celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary at Maplewood in December, 2011, with friends from Somerset in attendance.

Flora loved living in Somerset — the wonderful neighbors and lifelong friends, the friendly town, the sidewalks, the trees behind her house, the opportunity to have a garden and flowers. She found it to be a wonderful place to raise children. When the town pool was built, she and Maury used it often.

Our town was also a convenient location to get to her many activities — including directing and choreographing plays with Adventure Theater (a 60-year passion). During the years she was here, she wrote 10 plays, mostly for children, and was recognized with the Chorpenning Cup for an outstanding writer of children's plays who has received national recognition. She was also active in Adas Israel Synagogue, the Coast Guard Flotilla, and many other organizations. She was a world traveler — accompanying Maury on more than 20 vacations, plus trips to numerous countries that he visited as an international consulting economist.

After Maury died in 2012, Flora's children moved her to Chicago to be near her son Joe and his wife Carol and their children and grandchildren. In addition to her children, Flora leaves two granddaughters, and six great grandchildren.

Once again, I was totally impressed with the manner in which the Council members addressed the budget topics at the meetings---always being in attendance, well prepared and asking great questions---and of course with the expert assistance of our budget wizard, Town Manager Rich Charnovich.

This particular contest is sponsored by the Town and is part of a statewide contest conducted by the Maryland Municipal League.
