### Debut of Official Town Listserv

For many years now, Town residents have been making extensive and productive use of the unofficial but Town "endorsed" listserv, (Somerset\_list@ yahoogroups.com), moderated by founder Sarah Morse (Dorset). On this listserve, Somerseters have been able to freely exchange recommendations for commercial services like plumbers, electricians and carpenters in addition to making political statements and supporting candidates.

Ethically, the Town needs to be independent of any such recommendations, and this listserv has always been totally separate from our government. Elected officials and staff do not monitor it. Alternately, there are various other means of communication for this purpose.

However, because of the unofficial listserv's popularity and ease of use, over the years residents have found it convenient to make service requests of the Town in this manner and to provide input on current or pending public policies or legislative proposals. This has often resulted in service delays, and elected officials and Town staff have frequently missed valuable comments that should have been brought to the government's attention in a timely manner.

Accordingly, several months ago our Communications Committee recommended to the Town Council that, in order to solve this problem, an official Somerset Town listserve be established. Action was swiftly taken! And I volunteered to be the moderator.

This month we will inaugurate this new listserv. It is hoped that this will become the best way to let us know when you need assistance from Town Hall, or want to make a statement on a Town policy or a pending Code amendment. This communication will become part of the official record, where appropriate. You will also be able to receive late-breaking news.

We want to encourage discourse among residents on the new listserv on topics under Somerset's authority. We trust that the conversation will be respectful and responsible. At the same time, all in Town leadership want the unofficial listserv to continue to thrive.

It is my desire for all residents to sign up for this new communications device. The Town will contact current residents about the sign-up procedure. New residents should provide the Town with an email address to receive sign-up instructions.

I want to thank the Committee for its hard work, too. When and if the need arises we might also see Facebook and Twitter accounts in the future. Stay tuned, all.

### Halloween on "Big Cumberland" in 2018

The Town Council adopted recommendations from the Halloween Safety Committee for the vicinity of "Big Cumberland" on Halloween night, October 31. Plan details are as follows:

- Cumberland Avenue from Warwick Place to Devon Lane will be closed to traffic from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm
- Police officers will be stationed at three intersections with Cumberland at Warwick Place, Surrey Street, and Devon Lane
- Local traffic and emergency vehicles will be able to enter and leave during this time period
- This will be a two-year experiment

### Town Hall Renovation Project and Rentals

A large-scale construction project was approved at the September 2018 Town Council Meeting for the exterior and interior of the Town Hall. Work is anticipated to start sometime in October of 2018 and is expected to take six to eight months to complete. During the construction period, the Town Hall will not be available for rental or for use by outside groups for meetings.

### Flu Shot Clinic in October

The Town office is in the process of finalizing details for a flu shot clinic to take place in the Town Hall on October 19 starting at 2:45 pm. Please tentatively mark your calendars for this date and follow further email publications concerning the final details. Once details are finalized, a notice will be sent out about scheduling appointment times. Should the date and timeframe need to change, this will also be publicized.

### New Town Directory to be Finalized Soon

Please be on the lookout for your new A Guide to Somerset: Handbook and Directory, which will be coming by mail. This new version will incorporate all the changes that have been brought to the attention of the Town Hall. Thank you to all for your participation to ensure the directory is as up-to-date as possible.

### Parking in No Parking Zones

Lately I have been contacted more frequently about cars parking in No Parking zones in the community. Please make sure your household, visitors, and contractors are parking in legal spots on the street. We have been reviewing all of these complaints and will likely begin to report violations to the police department for enforcement and ticketing, when warranted.

### Parking near Driveways: Five-Feet Rule

I am periodically notified of vehicles being parked too close to driveways. Please be mindful of this. Montgomery County police law says vehicles cannot be parked within five feet of a driveway. This can be reported to the police department, and a vehicle could be towed for this offense. However, towing is at the discretion of the police officer.

# All About People

This month's column introduces six new families who moved into Somerset from late July through the end of August. Before diving into the details, however, I want to briefly recap the newcomers' party at the pool on the afternoon of Saturday, September 8. It was a "red vs. blue" event although nothing political! The newcomers wore blue name tags, and the old timers wore red. The event included a fine assortment of food and refreshments and great camaraderie. The covered picnic area at the pool worked well, given the light drizzle. Midway through the affair, Mayor Slavin and Debbie Berger Fox (Cumberland) introduced the new families and asked each to say a few words. With several children joining the act, the overall presentation was informative and delightful. You will find photos from the event elsewhere in this edition of the Journal.

Spring and summer are popular seasons for moving, and this year was no exception for Somerset. I covered the arrivals of six new families in the August Journal. In addition to six more below, we have had some more moves close to press time, so stay tuned.

In late July, **Colby and Danielle Carrier** moved into a house on Cumberland with their two children, **Parker** (9) and **Everly** (3). Most recently, the family lived in Newton, Massachusetts, not far from Boston. Colby attended the Naval Academy in Annapolis and is still in the Navy. He has served as a helicopter pilot and is currently assigned to the Pentagon. Danielle is a psychiatric social worker with substantial experience in hospital emergency medicine departments. Synne worked for three large theaters in Copenhagen (most recently the two stages at Tivoli Gardens), primarily in marketing and public relations but also reviewing scripts. Not surprisingly, the family loves to travel – seeing new places and enjoying new experiences.

Around the same time, **Catherine Saul** became a new resident on Wisconsin along with her three children, **Alexander** (15), **Olivia** (11), and **Shaye-Harlowe** (8). Catherine grew up locally but lived in Los Angeles for 22 years before her recent return. She knew Somerset from her youth, and her father's office was close by. Returning to the area, she was attracted to the Town's neighborhood feel and proximity to good public schools and urban amenities. Catherine is a real estate investor and also runs a design and project management firm. The family loves outdoor activities – hiking, going to the pool, and bicycling. They also enjoy working on projects in the home including sewing, cooking, and arts and crafts. Alexander especially loves all things baseball and basketball.
