

- The Southern Minnesota Tourism Association (SMTA) is a tourism promotional organization made up of representatives from 36 counties in the geographic area identified as the Southern Minnesota Region.
- The organization was formed in 1992 and is funded by a \$.05 per capita request from the 36 counties in the Southern Minnesota Tourism region; the per capita amount has remained the same ever since.

- The Region served by Southern Minnesota Tourism Association encompasses the following 36 counties: Big Stone, Blue Earth, Brown, Chippewa, Cottonwood, Dodge, Faribault, Fillmore, Freeborn, Goodhue, Houston, Jackson, Lac Qui Parle, Le Sueur, Lincoln, Lyon, Martin, Mower, Murray, Nicollet, Nobles, Olmsted, Pipestone, Redwood, Renville, Rice, Rock, Sibley, Steele, Swift, Traverse, Wabasha, Waseca, Watonwan, Winona, and Yellow Medicine.
- Funding requests are mailed to each county in the spring for consideration in next year's budget.
 Invoices for payments are mailed in December/January and payable by July 31st.
- Marketing Programs are determined and developed with input from the SMTA Marketing
 Committee who oversees the print, digital, content development, and other marketing strategies.
- The organization holds regular quarterly meetings each year with educational programming component. Two meetings are in/person and zoom and two meetings are only offered via zoom.
 The SMTA Annual Meeting is held in March which includes the election of officers and executive committee.
- Since September 2023, DAWN SCHREIBER has served as SMTA staff and she coordinates the organization's operations.
- SMTA contracts with a licensed CPA firm (Baumgard, Rose & Associates formerly Schoeppner & Associates) to handle all of our financial transactions including all Federal and State required reporting.

- SMTA supports tourism officials through presentations by professional speakers at organization meetings and through enhanced communication through Explore Minnesota.

The County Engineer reported on the Eastside Corridor Federal Funding. Steele County was awarded \$3.96M dollars in Federal Funding for the Eastside Corridor project. The Engineer reviewed the stringent deadlines mandated by the federal government in order to use the funds. As a result of many delays and setbacks, the project team is not confident they can complete the required tasks on time, so the dollars are at risk of being lost. The Engineer provided examples of the setbacks, including but not limited to additional reporting and more detailed reports required by the Federal Government. The Engineer is requesting the Southeast Minnesota Area Transportation Partnership (ATP) shift the Federal funding to the Main Street project that is likely to meet the deadlines. If the change is approved, funds earmarked for the Main Street project could be used for the Eastside corridor project. If this shift is not approved by ATP, the county will need to look to other funding sources for future projects.

Motion by Commissioner Krueger, seconded by Commissioner Glynn to approve Delegation of Authority to hire and appoint budgeted positions to the Administrator. Four voted in favor thereof, Abbe voting against. Motion passes.

Motion by Commissioner Glynn, seconded by Commissioner Abbe to approve position reclassification from a Highway Tech to Highway Accountant and from a part time .8 to a full-time position. Ayes all.

Motion by Commissioner Krueger, seconded by Commissioner Brady to table the Resolution for Parking Restrictions on CSAH 46 till the April 22 meeting. Four voted in favor thereof, Glynn voting against. Motion passes.

The Steele County Board of Commissioners held a Work Session at 4:00 p.m. on April 8, 2025 with Commissioner's Glynn, Prokopec, Abbe, Krueger and Brady present. Also present were County Engineer Paul Sponholz, Human Resources Director Gina McGuire, Finance Director Candi Lemarr, County Assessor Brian Anderson, County Attorney Robert Jarrett, Public Health Director Amber Aaseth, IT Director Dave Purscell, MNP Director Tara Reich, County Administrator Renae Fry and Executive Assistant Rebecca Kubicek.

Brandon Theobald and Brandyn Chezick from WHKS spoke regarding the Havana intersection. The 2025-2029 Highway Capital Improvement Plan includes a project to improve the intersection of CSAH 2, CSAH 43, CR 171 and CR 180 in Havana Township. The skewed and closely spaced intersections of the county highways, along with poor intersection site lines and the close proximity to a railroad crossing, contributes to the intersection having the highest crash rates in the county. The County retained WHKS to complete a feasibility study, studying possible alternatives, and then recommend an alternative for construction. The Department held two public information meetings receiving feedback on the alternatives. WHKS has completed a draft report with four recommendations. A fifth recommendation was added by the public. The project team evaluated and talked about the 5 alternatives ranking the 4th alternative as recommended. The Commissioners asked questions and requested the item come back to the Board on April 22.

Renae updated the commissioners regarding actions taken in response to the Board's action to adopt a resolution to terminate the MNPrairie Joint Powers Agreement. Renae sent letters to the commissioners of DHS and DCYF and is waiting for instruction from the two agencies. She sent emails to the board chairs of Waseca and Dodge Counties asking that each board consider adopting their own resolution to terminate the JPA. The Steele County resolution is on the MNPrairie Joint Powers Board meeting agenda for April 15, but there has been no response from Dodge and Waseca Counties as to when their boards might consider the request to approve a resolution. Work is underway to activate an information helpline in the form of a phone number and email address. The system should be up and running soon and will serve as a resource for MNPrairie employees as well as Steele County employees with questions about the county's work to set up its own human services department. Renae, Gina, Rob and Candi interviewed HMA, a

consulting firm that specializes in human services. HMA representatives will attend the April 22 work session to introduce themselves and their organization. Staff will bring a proposed master services agreement to the board work session on April 22 for review. The specific scope of work addenda should be available for board review and consideration at the May 13 work session and board meeting.

Background (Including Budget Impact):

In 1971 Steele County entered an agreement with property owners along CSAH 6 to construct a drainageway to benefit all parties. The agreement did not provide for continued maintenance of the drainageway. Recently the County cleaned out the highway ditches along CSAH 6 to restore them to constructed elevations. The current property owner Marvin Spindler claims that the ditch cleaning has negatively affected drainage through the drainageway and asks that the County clean out the drainageway. Aerial photos of the property in 2010 show a well maintained and grass lined drainageway. Then in 2013, aerial photos show that the land owner plowed through the drainageway and aerial photos afterwords continue to show no maintenance of the drainageway. Staff recommends an agreement to allow right of entry to the property so County equipment and staff be used to reshape the drainageway. The agreement specifically states that the county will not be responsible for any future maintenance.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this ______ day of April, 1971, by and between Ole J. Prestegard and Helen Prestegard, husband and wife, hereinafter known as Prestegards; and Orie Jensen, a single man, Roger Jensen and Katherine Jensen, husband and wife, hereinafter known as Jensens; and the County of Steele, State of Minnesota, hereinafter known as the County; WITNESSETH:

Whereas, Prestegards have an outlet and 12" tile and 14" tile installed on their property located in the Southwest Quarter of Section 4, Township 106 North, Range 19 West, north of County State Aid Highway #6;

And, whereas, Jensens own property in the Southeast Quarter of Section 4, Township 106 North, Range 19 West, which property contributes water to the watershed having its outlet on the Prestegard property;

And, whereas, Steele County State Aid Highway #6 abuts the above properties along their southern boundaries and is in need of drainage. improvements:

And, whereas, the United States Department of Agriculture through the Agricultural Conservation Stabilization Office will participate financially with the above named parties to upgrade their land;

And, whereas it would be a benefit to all parties concerned to construct a waterway with tile support beginning at County State Aid Highway #6, through the Jensen property to the outlet on the Prestegard property;

BE IT AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Prestegards and Jensens will apply to the Department of Agriculture with its Agricultural Conservation Stabilization Office for financial participation in the waterway and tile support, and in the event this financial participation is granted by the Department Agriculture this Agreement shall continue in force and effect. If this

financial support is not granted, this Agraement shall be null and void.

- 2. That the Prestegards shall supply the outlet and the 12" tile and the 14" tile that is presently in place.
 - 3. That the Jensens shall contribute \$550.00 to the project.
- 4. That the County shall advertise for bids, and will contribute the remainder needed for completion of the above project.
 - 5. That the breakdown of estimated costs are as follows:

Agreement Between Steele County, Minnesota, and Marvin and Debra Spindler

This Agreement is made and entered into as of the ____ day of ____, 2025, by and between Steele County, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota (hereinafter referred to as "County"), and Marvin and Debra Spindler residing at 5575 SE 54th Avenue, Owatonna, MN 55060 (hereinafter referred to as "Property Owner").

Recitals

WHEREAS, the Property Owner is the owner of certain real property located at 5575 54th Avenue SE, legally described as

The Southwest Quarter (SW 1/4) of Section Four (4), Township One Hundred and Six (106) North, Range Nineteen (19) West, Steele County, Minnesota; EXCEPT: All that part of the SW 1/4 of Section 4, T 106 N, R 19 W; Steele County, Minnesota, described by: Commencing at the northwest corner of said SW 1/4; thence S 00°07' 47" W, assumed bearing, 918.06 feet along the west line of said SW 1/4 to the True Point of Beginning; thence S 00°07' 47" W 33.60 feet along the west line of said SW 1/4; thence S 79°01' 40" E 1105.32 feet; thence S 77°19'10" E 613.80 feet; thence S 00°00'00" W 205.85 feet; thence S 90°00'00" E 377.19 feet; thence N 00°00'00" E 91.28 feet; thence N 76°46'38" W 213.02 feet; thence N 04°07'38" E 60.64 feet; thence N 77°19'10" W 785.41 feet; thence N 79°01' 40" W 1112.13 feet to said True Point of Beginning. Containing 2.72 acres, more or less.

(hereinafter referred to as "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the County desires to enter the Property for purposes related to grading a drainage way; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to clarify their respective rights and obligations concerning the Property.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. Right of Entry

The Property Owner hereby grants the County, its agents, employees, and contractors, the right to enter upon the Property at reasonable times and upon reasonable notice for the purpose of grading a drainageway. This right of entry shall remain in effect until December 31, 2025 or when work is completed, whichever is earlier.

2. No Obligation to Maintain

The County shall have no obligation to maintain, repair, or otherwise care for the Property or any improvements thereon. The Property Owner acknowledges that any prior agreements

between the parties were solely for the construction of a drainageway and not for its future maintenance.

3. Indemnification

The Property Owner agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the County, its officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, or causes of action of any kind, including reasonable attorney's fees, arising out of or related to the County's entry onto the Property, except to the extent caused by the County's negligence or willful misconduct.

4. Prior Agreements

The parties acknowledge that any prior agreements between them were solely for the construction of a drainageway on the Property and did not impose any obligation on the County to maintain the drainageway or any other part of the Property.

5. Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota.

6. Entire Agreement

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings, whether written or oral, relating to such subject matter.

7. Merger and Modification

- a) It is understood and agreed that the entire Agreement between the parties is contained here and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and negotiations between the parties relating to the subject matter. All items referred to in this Agreement are incorporated or attached and are deemed to be part of this Agreement.
- b) Any material alterations, variations, modifications, or waivers of provisions of this Agreement shall be valid only when they have been reduced to writing as an amendment and signed by the parties.

7. Amendments

This Agreement may be amended only by a written instrument executed by both parties.

8. Severability

If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

9. Data Practices

All data collected, created, received, maintained, or disseminated for any purposes by the activities of Property Owner because of this contract are governed by the Minnesota

Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13, as amended, the Minnesota Rules implementing such act now in force or as adopted, as well as federal regulations on data privacy.

10. Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

11. Binding Effect and Recording

This Agreement shall run with the land and be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns. The Property Owner agrees to record this Agreement with the Steele County Recorder's Office to ensure that it is binding on future owners of the property.

2025 STATE OF MINNESOTA FEDERAL BOATING SAFETY SUPPLEMENTAL EQUIPMENT GRANT CONTRACT AGREEMENT

This grant contract agreement is between the State of Minnesota, acting through its Commissioner of Natural Resources, Enforcement Division ("State") and Steele County Sheriff's Office, 204 E. Pearl St., Owatonna, MN 55060 (DUNS HL8DTMNGN5T5) ("Grantee"). The payment address for this grant agreement is Steele Co. Treasurer, 630 Florence Ave., Owatonna, MN 55060-0890.

Recitals

- 1. Under Minnesota Statute §84.026, §86B.101 and Department of Homeland Security through the Recreational Boating Safety Financial Assistance program to states, commonwealth and territories (FAIN 3319FAS190127), (CFDA number 97.012) in U.S.C. 13101-13110 the State received a federal award of \$192.00 on December 1, 2024 for the Federal Boating Safety Supplemental Equipment Grant. This grant contract agreement is a non-research and non-developmental grant.
- 2. The State will make available supplementary funding in the amount noted in this grant contract agreement to cover the cost of the specific items for recreational boating safety.
- 3. The Grantee represents that it is duly qualified and agrees to perform all services described in this grant contract agreement to the satisfaction of the State. Pursuant to Minn.Stat.\$16B.98, Subd.1, the Grantee agrees to minimize administrative costs as a condition of this grant contract agreement.

Grant Contract Agreement

1 Term of Grant Contract Agreement

- 1.1 Effective date: December 1, 2024, Per Minn. Stat. §16B.98, Subd. 5, the Grantee must not begin work until this grant contract agreement is fully executed and the State's Authorized Representative has notified the Grantee that work may commence. Per Minn. Stat. §16B.98 Subd. 7, no payments will be made to the Grantee until this grant contract agreement is fully executed. Reimbursements will only be made for expenditures made according to the terms of this grant contract agreement.
- 1.2 Expiration date: August 1, 2025, or until all obligations have been satisfactorily fulfilled, whichever occurs first. The Grantee shall submit a final billing invoice within 30 days of the expiration of the grant contract agreement as specified herein.
- 1.3 Survival of Terms. The following clauses survive the expiration or cancellation of this grant contract agreement: 8. Liability; 9. State Audits; 10. Government Data Practices; 12. Publicity and Endorsement; 13. Governing Law, Jurisdiction, and Venue; and 15. Data Disclosure.

2 Grantee's Duties

The Grantee, who is not a state employee, will comply with required grants management policies and procedures set forth through Minn.Stat.\$16B.97, Subd. 4 (a) (1). Grantee will be reimbursed, as specified in Exhibit A which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement, for the purchase of the items noted there. The Grantee will submit to the State the required documents noted in Exhibit A which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement. The State will make available supplementary funding in the amount noted in this grant contract agreement to cover the cost of the specific items for recreational boating safety noted in Exhibit A which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement. See Exhibit A which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement and allowable expenditures specific to this grant. See Exhibit B which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement for specific federal requirements that affect this grant contract agreement. The Grantee is responsible for maintaining an adequate conflict of interest policy throughout the term of this grant contract agreement. The Grantee shall monitor and report any actual, potential or perceived conflicts of interest to the State's Authorized Representative.

Reporting Requirements: The Grantee is bound to financial and performance requirements as noted in this grant contract agreement and Exhibit A which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement.

3 Time

The Grantee must comply with all the time requirements described in this grant contract agreement. In the performance of this grant contract agreement, time is of the essence.

4 Consideration and Payment

- 4.1 Consideration. The State will pay for all services performed by the Grantee under this grant contract agreement as follows:
 - (a) Compensation. The Grantee will be paid for all boat and water safety activities performed by the Grantee during the term of the grant contract agreement up to One hundred ninety two.
 - (b) Total Obligation. The total obligation of the State for all compensation and reimbursements to the Grantee under this grant contract agreement will not exceed One hundred ninety two.

4.2 Payment

Invoices. The State will promptly pay the Grantee after the Grantee presents an itemized invoice for the services actually performed and the State's Authorized Representative accepts the invoiced services. Invoices shall be submitted timely in a form prescribed by the State within the dates previously noted in "Term of Grant Contract Agreement" in this grant contract agreement. Invoice procedures are specified in Exhibit A which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement.

(b) Federal funds. Payments under this grant contract agreement will be made from federal funds obtained by the State through the U.S. Coast Guard, Department of Homeland Security – through the Recreational Boating Safety Financial Assistance program to states, commonwealth and territories (FAIN 3319FAS190127), (CFDA number 97.012) in U.S.C. 13101-13110. See Exhibit B which is attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement for specific federal requirements that affect this grant contract agreement. The Grantee is responsible for compliance with all federal requirements imposed on these funds and accepts full financial responsibility for any requirements imposed by the Grantee's failure to comply with federal requirements.

5 Conditions of Payment

All services provided by the Grantee under this grant contract agreement must be performed to the State's satisfaction, as determined at the sole discretion of the State's Authorized Representative and in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations. The Grantee will not receive payment for work found by the State to be unsatisfactory or performed in violation of federal, state, or local law.

6 Authorized Representative

The State's Authorized Representative is <u>Adam Block</u>, <u>Boating Law Administrator</u>, <u>Enforcement Division</u>, <u>Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR)</u>, <u>500 Lafayette Rd.</u>, <u>St. Paul, MN 55155-4047</u>, <u>adam.block@state.mn.us</u>, or his/her successor, and has the responsibility to monitor the Grantee's performance and the authority to accept the services provided under this grant contract agreement. If the services are satisfactory, the State's Authorized Representative will certify acceptance on each invoice submitted for payment.

The Grantee's Authorized Representative is <u>Sheriff Lon Thiele, Steele County Sheriff's Office, 204 E. Pearl St., Owatonna, MN 55060 or his/her successor.</u> If the Grantee's Authorized Representative changes at any time during this grant contract agreement, the Grantee must immediately notify the State.

7 Assignment, Amendments, Waiver, and Grant Contract Agreement Complete

- 7.1 Assignment. The Grantee shall neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this grant contract agreement without the prior written consent of the State, approved by the same parties who executed and approved this grant contract agreement, or their successors in office.
- 7.2 Amendments. Any amendments to this grant contract agreement must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been executed and approved by the same parties who executed and approved the original grant contract agreement, or their successors in office.
- 7.3 Waiver. If the State fails to enforce any provision of this grant contract agreement, that failure does not waive the provision or the State's right to enforce it.
- 7.4 *Grant Contract Agreement Complete.* This grant contract agreement, including Exhibits A and B which are attached and incorporated into this grant contract agreement, contains all negotiations and agreements between the State and the Grantee. No other understanding regarding this grant contract agreement, whether written or oral, may be used to bind either party.

8 Liability

The Grantee must indemnify, save, and hold the State, its agents, and employees harmless from any claims or causes of action, including attorney's fees incurred by the State, arising from the performance of this grant contract agreement by the Grantee or the Grantee's agents or employees. This clause will not be construed to bar any legal remedies the Grantee may have for the State's failure to fulfill its obligations under this grant contract agreement.

9 Audits (State and Single)

Under Minn. Stat. \$16B.98, Subd. 8 and 2 CFR 200.337, the Grantee's books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices of the Grantee or other party relevant to this grant contract agreement or transaction are subject to examination by the State and/or the State Auditor or Legislative Auditor, as appropriate, for a minimum of six years from the end of this grant contract agreement, receipt and approval of all final reports, or the required period of time to satisfy all state and program retention requirements, whichever is later.

All state and local governments, colleges and universities, and non-profit organizations that expend \$750,000 or more of Federal awards in a fiscal year must have a single audit according to the OMB Uniform Guidance: Cost Principles, Audit, and Administrative Awards Requirements for Federal Awards. This is \$750,000 total Federal awards received from all sources. If an audit is completed, forward a copy of the report to both the State's Authorized Representative and the State Auditor.

10 Government Data Practices

Government Data Practices. The Grantee and State must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 13, as it applies to all data provided by the State under this grant contract agreement, and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the Grantee under this grant contract agreement. The civil remedies of Minn. Stat. §13.08 apply to the release of the data referred to in this clause by either the Grantee or the State. If the Grantee receives a request to release the data referred to in this Clause, the Grantee must immediately notify the State. The State will give the Grantee instructions concerning the release of the data to the requesting party before the data is released. The Grantee's response to the request shall comply with applicable law.

11 American Disabilities Act

The Grantee is subject to complying with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) and all applicable regulations and guidelines.

12 Non-Discrimination Requirements

No person in the United States must, on the ground of race, color, national origin, handicap, age, religion, or sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under, any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance. Including but not limited to:

- (a) Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq.) and DOC implementing regulations published at 15 C.F.R. Part 8 prohibiting discrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin under programs or activities receiving Federal financial assistance; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. § 1681 et seq.) prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex under Federally assisted education programs or activities;
- (b) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S.C. § 794), and DOC implementing regulations published at 15 C.F.R. Part 8b prohibiting discrimination on the basis of handicap under any program or activity receiving or benefiting from Federal assistance.
- (c) The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 6101 et seq.), and DOC implementing regulations published at 15 C.F.R. Part 20 prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age in programs or activities receiving Federal financial assistance:
- (d) Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 which prohibits discrimination against qualified individuals with disabilities in services, programs, and activities of public entities.
- (e) Any other applicable non-discrimination law(s).

13 Workers Compensation

The Grantee certifies that it is in compliance with Minn. Stat. §176.181, Subd. 2, pertaining to workers' compensation insurance coverage. The Grantee's employees and agents will not be considered State employees. Any claims that may arise under the Minnesota Workers' Compensation Act on behalf of these employees and any claims made by any third party as a consequence of any act or omission on the part of these employees are in no way the State's obligation or responsibility.

14 Publicity and Endorsement

- 14.1 *Publicity*. Any publicity regarding the subject matter of this grant contract agreement must identify the State as the sponsoring agency and must not be released without prior written approval from the State's Authorized Representative. For purposes of this provision, publicity includes notices, informational pamphlets, press releases, research, reports, signs, and similar public notices prepared by or for the Grantee individually or jointly with others, or any subcontractors, with respect to the program, publications, or services provided resulting from this grant contract agreement. All projects primarily funded by state grant appropriations must publicly credit the State of Minnesota, including on the grantee's website when practicable.
- 14.2 Endorsement. The Grantee must not claim that the State endorses its products or services.

15 Governing Law, Jurisdiction, and Venue

Minnesota law, without regard to its choice-of-law provisions, governs this grant contract agreement. Venue for all legal proceedings out of this grant contract agreement, or its breach, must be in the appropriate state or federal court with competent jurisdiction in Ramsey County, Minnesota.

16 Termination

- 16.1 *Termination by the State.* The State may terminate this grant contract agreement without cause, upon 30 days' written notice to the Grantee. Upon termination, the Grantee will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed.
 - (a) Without Cause. The State may terminate this grant contract agreement without cause, upon 30 days' written notice to the Grantee. Upon termination, the Grantee will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed.
 - (b) With Cause. The State may immediately terminate this grant contract agreement if the State finds that there has been a failure to comply with the provisions of this grant contract, that reasonable progress has not been made or that the purposes for which the funds were granted have not been or will not be fulfilled. The State may take action to protect the interests of the State of Minnesota, including the refusal to disburse additional funds and requiring the return of all or part of the funds already disbursed.
- 16.2 *Termination by The Commissioner of Administration*. The Commissioner of Administration may and unilaterally cancel this grant contract agreement if further performance under the agreement would not serve agency purposes or is not in the best interest of the State.
- 16.3 Termination for Insufficient Funding. The State may immediately terminate this grant contract agreement if:
 - (a) Funding for grant from the <u>U.S. Coast Guard</u>, <u>Department of Homeland Security through the Recreational Boating Safety Financial Assistance program to states, commonwealth and territories (FAIN 3319FAS190127), (CFDA number 97.012) in U.S.C. 13101-13110 is withdrawn. It does not obtain funding from the Minnesota Legislature.</u>
 - (b) Or, if funding cannot be continued at a level sufficient to allow for the payment of the services covered here. Termination must be by written notice to the Grantee. The State is not obligated to pay for any services that are provided after notice and effective date of termination. However, the Grantee will be entitled to payment, determined on a pro rata basis, for services satisfactorily performed to the extent that funds are available. The State will not be assessed any penalty if the grant contract agreement is terminated because of the decision of the Minnesota Legislature, or other funding 2001 25,500

to appropriate funds. The State must provide the Grantee notice of the lack of funding within a reasonable time of the State's receiving that notice.

17 Data Disclosure

Under Minn. Stat. § 270C.65, Subd. 3, and other applicable law, the Grantee consents to disclosure of its social security number, federal employer tax identification number, and/or Minnesota tax identification number, already provided to the State, to federal and state tax agencies and state personnel involved in the payment of state obligations. These identification numbers may be used in the enforcement of federal and state tax laws which could result in action requiring the Grantee to file state tax returns and pay delinquent state tax liabilities, if any.

18 Invasive Species Prevention

The DNR requires active steps to prevent or limit the introduction, establishment, and spread of invasive species during contracted work. The contractor shall prevent invasive species from entering into or spreading within a project site by cleaning equipment prior to arriving at the project site.

If the equipment, vehicles, gear, or clothing arrives at the project site with soil, aggregate material, mulch, vegetation (including seeds) or animals, it shall be cleaned by contractor furnished tool or equipment (brush/broom, compressed air or pressure washer) at the staging area. The contractor shall dispose of material cleaned from equipment and clothing at a location determined by the DNR Contract Administrator. If the material cannot be disposed of onsite, secure material prior to transport (sealed container, covered truck, or wrap with tarp) and legally dispose of offsite.

The contractor shall ensure that all equipment and clothing used for work in infested waters has been adequately decontaminated for invasive species (ex. zebra mussels) prior to being used in non-infested waters. All equipment and clothing including but not limited to waders, tracked vehicles, barges, boats, turbidity curtain, sheet pile, and pumps that comes in contact with any infested waters must be thoroughly decontaminated.

19 Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion - Lower Tier Covered Transactions

- 19.1 The prospective lower tier participant certifies, by submission of this agreement, that neither it nor its principals is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any Federal department or agency.
- 19.2 Where the prospective lower tier participant is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, such prospective participant shall attach an explanation to this agreement.

20 Whistleblower Protection Rights

- 41 USC §4712, Enhancement of Recipient and Subrecipient Employee Whistleblower Protection
- (a) This award and employees working on this financial assistance agreement will be subject to the whistleblower rights and remedies in the pilot program on Award Recipient employee whistleblower protections established at 41 U.S.C. 4712 by section 828 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2013 (Pub.L. 112-239).

2025 STATE OF MINNESOTA FEDERAL BOATING SAFETY SUPPLEMENTAL EQUIPMENT GRANT CONTRACT AGREEMENT (CFDA #97.012)

- 1. The purpose of this grant is to provide supplementary funding to the Grantee, not exceeding the amount specified in Clause 4 of the grant contract agreement, to purchase the following specific equipment or other items that will be used for recreational boating safety activities:
 - + Rescue Mate Throw Bags
 - * means trade-in or cost share by county
 - ** means 25% county dive equipment cost share requirement
- 2. The program shall begin on December 1, 2024 or date grant contract agreement is fully executed and the State's Authorized Representative has notified the Grantee that work may commence. The purchase, delivery and payment of approved items must be completed by August 1, 2025. An extension beyond that date for purchase, delivery and payment may be granted, if requested by the Grantee in writing to the State's representative. If approved by the State's representative, an amendment form is created which requires signatures by Grantee and State's representative. Requests submitted after August 1, 2025, that have not been granted an extension from the State, are not eligible for reimbursement and will become the Grantee's sole responsibility. The Grantee shall submit a final billing invoice within 30 days of the expiration of the grant.
- 3. The Grantee must first purchase the item as specified in this grant, follow any specific county purchasing procedures and pay for it from the Grantee's funds. The Grantee must then submit the following for reimbursement by the deadline noted in #2 above:
 - a. An invoice from the Grantee, dated no earlier than December 1, 2024 or date grant is fully executed and not later than August 1, 2025, with a description of all the item(s) being requested for reimbursement. The purchase/invoice deadline may be modified if an extension, as noted in clause #2 above, is granted and approved by the State's representative.
 - b. A copy of the invoice(s) from the vendor(s) showing the amount the Grantee actually paid, including shipping, sales tax and any setup costs.
 - c. If the item is valued over \$5,000, the Grantee's asset number(s) & equipment serial number(s) must also be included on the invoice.

- 8. Items purchased under this grant may not be sold, traded or disposed of without prior written permission and instructions from the State as to the disposition of the item(s), and any funds derived from their sale or

- trade. The Grantee must promptly notify the State's representative if any item over \$5,000 purchased through this grant is lost or stolen.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

I. Purpose of the Agreement

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) sets out the terms by which Steele County Public Health, Spero, and United Way of Steele County will collaborate on the Capacity Building Program grant received from MN Housing to create a Housing Crisis Line Pilot. The purpose of this MOU is to establish a commitment from Steele County Public Health to partner with Spero and United Way of Steele County in setting a strong foundation for the pilot program.

II. Roles and Responsibilities

Responsibilities of Spero and the United Way of Steele County:

- 1. Manage grant expectations and ensure compliance with all grant requirements.
- 2. Coordinate and facilitate all required training sessions as outlined in the grant.
- 3. Organize and lead all work sessions related to the Housing Crisis Line Pilot.
- 4. Handle all grant reporting and documentation.
- 5. Cover all necessary and allowable fees and expenses through the grant funds.
- 6. Keep coalition members informed of all program work, with open, transparent, communication.
- 7. Follow up with organizations that are missing from the table to ensure we have representation.

Responsibilities of Steele County Public Health:

- 1. Integrate the utilization of the HMIS system into current processes as it applies to their organization.
- 2. Complete all the training required as outlined in the grant.
- 3. Commit to the creation and development of the Housing Crisis Line Pilot Program by utilizing best practices through a DEIJ lens.
- 4. Participate in the pilot program once it is established.
- 5. Be willing to take collaborative action on what we hear and learn in partnership with the community and engage in dignified and respectful interactions.
- 6. Collaborate with Spero and the United Way of Steele County in all related activities and attend at least 75% of Coalition meetings per year.
- 7. If there is a change in staffing, will notify Spero and United Way of Steele County so we can update the communications listing.

III. Payment and Funding

All necessary fees and expenses for the training and development of the Housing Crisis Line Pilot Program will be covered by the grant funds. Steele County Public Health is not expected to provide any funding for this process.

A \$25 stipend (if allowable) for every full meeting attended will be paid quarterly to the organization for their participation (one payment per organization). Mileage and food will not be reimbursed.

IV. Duration of the Agreement

This Amendment is made and entered into by and between Steele County Sheriff's Office ("Client"), and Summit Food Service, LLC ("Company") (collectively "the Parties").

WHEREAS, the Parties have entered into a certain Food Service Management Agreement (the "Agreement"), effective February 1, 2007;

WHEREAS, the Parties have agreed to extend the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Parties now desire to amend said Agreement upon the terms and conditions stated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties, intending to be legally bound hereby, mutually agree as follows:

- 4. <u>Terms of the Agreement.</u> Section 1. of the Agreement shall be amended to include sub-section <u>"1.D Voluntary Termination"</u> with the following language: Either Party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause by written notice to the other party given not less than sixty

(60) days prior to the effective date of termination. If Company's cause to terminate is due to a subcontractor's cancellation and inability to perform the contract (i.e., Subcontract where meals are prepared is cancelled), the written cancellation notice period shall be adjusted through a negotiation of the Parties. Provided in instances where the Company is claiming termination due to subcontractor cancellation and inability to perform under the contract, the Company shall notify Client of the subcontractor cancellation within seven (7) days upon Company's discovery of the cancellation.

This Amendment shall take effect upon date of execution by the Parties. All other terms and conditions of the original Agreement (as modified from time to time) shall remain in full force and effect unless otherwise amended as provided in the Agreement.

The department received a complaint about vehicles parking on CSAH 46 that impedes traffic. The pavement and shoulders of CSAH 46 (from CSAH 15 to MN-30) may not provide adequate width for parking on either side of the highway.

Parking is available off CSAH 46. The school district has built a parking lot on the west side of CSAH 46 and has built Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible sidewalks from parking on the east side of the school building to the athletic fields.

CSAH 46 is a low volume road with only an Annual Average Daily Traffic count of 405 vehicles per day. Parking along the road during athletic events has been occurring for many years. Attendees to the Blooming Prairie High School athletic fields desire to park closer near athletic fields along CSAH 46 during events.

The department received input from many stakeholders both for and against parking. Banning parking on the west side is a compromise that will allow some parking but make some more room for traffic.

Adopt Resolution requesting MnDOT to perform a speed study on CSAH 1 (CSAH 34 to CSAH 9)

Background (Including Budget Impact):

Minnesota State Statute 169.14, Subd. 5 gives the Minnesota Transportation Commissioner the authority to establish speed limits on County highways.

The County has no record of Speed Limit Authorizations from the Commissioner of Transportation for CSAH 1 from CSAH 34 to CSAH 9. The County recently reconstructed the intersection of CSAH 1 and CSAH 34 with a roundabout. Since the 1990's, the land use in the area around and to the north of the intersection has changed from rural farmland to commercial and residential use and the area annexed into the City of Owatonna. These changes in the roadway and surrounding land uses could potentially affect the speed limits on CSAH 48 from US 14 to Chambers Avenue.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) requires a County Board resolution requesting MnDOT conduct a speed study for the Transportation Commissioner to issue a Speed Limit Authorization.

Depending on the results of the study, the Transportation Commissioner may lower or raise the speed limit. More information on how MnDOT establishes speed limits is found in the attached brochure.

WHAT ARE SPEED LIMITS?

Speed limits are used to set the legal speed at which a vehicle may travel. The goal of a speed limit is to account for traffic safety and mobility to determine the safe and reasonable speed for the roadway.

HOW ARE SPEED LIMITS SET?

There are two ways that speed limits are set in Minnesota, by statute and by traffic investigation. Minnesota state law establishes statutory speed limits for specific roadways.

A traffic investigation evaluates:

- Driver behavior
- Roadway information

Adopt Resolution requesting MnDOT to perform a speed study on CSAH 48 (US 14 to Chambers Avenue)

Background (Including Budget Impact):

Minnesota State Statute 169.14, Subd. 5 gives the Minnesota Transportation Commissioner the authority to establish speed limits on County highways.

The County recently reconstructed the intersection of CSAH 48 Bixby Road at SE 18th Street with a roundabout. The county also recently resurfaced CSAH 48 and restriped the roadway pavement markings adding left turn lanes and reducing travel lane widths from 12 feet to 11 feet. Also, the land use around the area has changed from rural farmland to residential subdivisions. These changes in the land use and the roadway could potentially affect the speed limits on CSAH 48 from US 14 to Chambers Avenue.

The Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) requires a County Board resolution requesting MnDOT conduct a speed study for the Transportation Commissioner to issue a Speed Limit Authorization.

Depending on the results of the study, the Transportation Commissioner may lower or raise the speed limit. More information on how MnDOT establishes speed limits is found in the attached brochure.

Speed limits are used to set the legal speed at which a vehicle may travel. The goal of a speed limit is to account for traffic safety and mobility to determine the safe and reasonable speed for the roadway.

Background (Including Budget Impact):

The 2025-2029 Highway Capital Improvement Plan includes a project to improve the intersection of CSAH 2, CSAH 43, CR 171 and CR 180 in Havana Township. The skewed and closely spaced intersections of the county highways, along with poor intersection site lines and the close proximity to a railroad crossing, contributes to the intersection having the highest crash rates in the county. The County retained WHKS to complete a feasibility study, study possible alternatives, and then recommend an alternative for construction. The Department has held two public information meetings receiving feedback on the alternatives. WHKS has completed a draft report with recommendations. In summary, the project team evaluated 5 alternatives. The project team has selected Alternative 4 as the preferred alternative after considering public input and balancing project costs and impacts. An analysis of the alternatives and the cost estimates are available in the report. The study report and preferred alternative were presented to the County Board Work Session April 8.

Project Location

The project encompasses three intersections located in the village of Havana, approximately 3 miles southeast of the City of Owatonna. The main intersection includes County State Aid Highway 2 (CSAH 2) / County Road 180 (CR 180) and County State Aid Highway 43 (CSAH 43). The second intersection of 18th Street SE and CSAH 43 is located 160 feet to the south of CSAH 2 / CR 180. The third intersection of County Road 171 (CR 171) and CSAH 43 and 110 feet north of CSAH 2 / CR 180. A railroad crossing for the Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC) Railroad is located between the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43, and the intersection of 18th Street SE and CSAH 43.

Project Need

Safety

Multiple vehicular crashes have been reported at the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43. The 2040 Transportation Plan prepared by Steele County identified the intersection as the top ranked crash location in the county based on 2016 – 2020 crash data. Another study, the 2012 County Road Safety Plan also showed the intersection as a high-risk intersection.

The project area includes three intersections and a railroad crossing that are spaced close together, resulting in multiple decisions that need to be processed by a driver in a short amount of time. CSAH 2 / CR 180, CSAH 43 and CR 171 are all high-speed roadways, and have less time to react to cross-traffic that pulls out onto the road at the wrong time. The distance between the railroad crossing and CSAH 2 / CR 180 is approximately 80 feet, which limits the storage space available for vehicles to wait when a train is traveling through the railroad crossing. This distance is especially tight for semi-trailers, which frequently use the intersection to turn right from northbound CSAH 43 to eastbound CSAH 2 / CR 180. The alignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 runs at a 20-degree skew in relation to CSAH 43 and causes poor sight distance when drivers travelling along CSAH 43 need to watch for cross traffic on CSAH 2 / CR 180.

Changes to Traffic

In 2021, MnDOT reconstructed US Highway 14 (US 14) between Dodge Center and Owatonna. The project expanded the number of lanes from 2 to 4 and reduced the number of access points for local and county roads to the highway. As a result, CSAH 43 is now the only location for local traffic to access US 14 for a 9.5 mile stretch between Claremont and Owatonna. This has led to an increase in traffic on CSAH 43, in addition to an increase in semi-truck traffic using northbound CSAH 43 to eastbound CR 180 to access the Al-Corn Clean Fuel facility just outside of Claremont. The old US 14 roadway was turned back to the County, and became CSAH 2, which also lead to a change in traffic volumes on CSAH 2 / CR 180.

CSAH 43 was also designated as the future location of a major beltline as the City of Owatonna residential development expands to the east. The 2011 Owatonna East Beltline Corridor Study conducted by WSB concluded that the existing alignment of CSAH 43 should be used as the beltway and anticipated an increase in traffic volumes travelling along the roadway. The County has also planned to eventually expand CSAH 43 to a 4-lane roadway, and MnDOT has committed to building an interchange at the intersection of US 14 and CSAH 43 as traffic grows.

The County is also planning to improve a railroad underpass along CR 180 to the west of the project intersection. This project would increase the vertical clearance between the railroad bridge and CR 180 to meet state aid standards and is expected to increase the amount of truck traffic traveling along CR 180.

The combination of crash history at the intersection and anticipated increases in traffic along both corridors indicates a clear need to improve the intersection.



Proposed Concept Alternatives

Four different intersection layouts were explored as alternatives to the existing intersection layout to improve safety. The goal of each alternative was to try and either improve the geometric layout of the existing intersection, reduce the number of intersections, or provide additional spacing between the intersections to reduce driver speed crossing the intersections, reduce the number of decisions made by the driver and create additional time to make those decisions.

Alternative 1 - Roundabout

The first alternative looked at replacing the intersections of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 and CR 171 and CSAH 43 with a five-legged roundabout. Roundabouts are a very effective traffic control measure that can be implemented to reduce the number of severe right-angle crashes at an intersection. The intersection of 18th Street SE and CSAH 43 would remain as side street stop control but would be relocated further south of the existing intersection. A display of Alternative 1 can be found in Appendix A.

Alternative 2 - Realign CSAH 2 / CR 180 to CR 171

The second alternative shifted the alignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 to the north, running through the middle of a farm field, then parallel to the existing alignment of CR 171. The proposed CR 171 would intersect as a tee intersection into the new alignment for CSAH 2 / CR 180, and the new intersection for CSAH 2 / CR 180 would be relocated to the north of the existing intersection with side street stop control. Right and left turn lanes would be added to CSAH 43 for northbound and southbound traffic at the intersection with CSAH 2 / CR 180. The intersection of 18th Street SE and CSAH 43 would remain as side street stop control but would be relocated further south of the existing intersection. An additional intersection off the new alignment for CSAH 2 / CR 180 would be added to provide access to the residential houses along the existing CSAH 2 / CR 180 alignment. The CPKC railroad crossing would be widened to accommodate the northbound turn lanes for CSAH 43 traffic. A display of Alternative 2 can be found in Appendix A.

Alternative 3 – Realign CSAH 2 / CR 180 slightly north of CR 171

The third alternative shifted the alignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 farther north of the existing CR 171 intersection. The new alignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 would run along the southwest edge of a farm field and through the backyards of some residential lots. The proposed CR 171 would intersect as a tee intersection into the new alignment for CSAH 2 / CR 180, and the new intersection for CSAH 2 / CR 180 would be relocated to the north of the existing intersection with side street stop control. Right and left turn lanes would be added to CSAH 43 for northbound and southbound traffic at the intersection with CSAH 2 / CR 180. The intersection of 18th Street SE and CSAH 43 would remain as side street stop control but would be relocated further south of the existing intersection. An additional intersection off the new alignment for CSAH 2 / CR 180 would be added to provide access to the residential houses along the existing CSAH 2 / CR 180 alignment. The CPKC railroad crossing would be widened to accommodate the northbound turn lanes for CSAH 43 traffic. A display of Alternative 3 can be found in Appendix A.

Alternative 4 - Realign CSAH 2 / CR180 & CSAH 43 farther north of CR 171

The fourth alternative shifted the alignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 far enough north that the proposed CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 intersection/turn lanes are out of the existing CR 171 intersection. The proposed CSAH 43 intersection would utilize side street stop sign control on CSAH 2 / CR 180. The new alignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 would run along the southwest edge of one farm field and through the middle of two farm fields. The proposed CR 171 would intersect into the new alignment for CSAH 2 / CR 180. Right and left turn lanes would be added to CSAH 43 for northbound and southbound traffic



at the intersection with CSAH 2 / CR 180. The intersection of 18th Street SE and CSAH 43 would remain as side street stop control but would be relocated further south of the existing intersection. An additional intersection off the new alignment for CSAH 2 / CR 180 would be added to provide access to the residential houses along the existing CSAH 2 / CR 180 alignment. The CPKC railroad crossing would remain as-is. A display of Alternative 4 can be found in Appendix A.

Alternative 4B - Realign CSAH 2 / CR 180 to the north property line of adjacent farmland

Another alternative was briefly considered to shift CSAH 2 / CR 180 even further north to minimize the acquisition impacts to the farmland on the northwest and northeast sides of the existing CSAH 43 and CR 171 intersection. See the Open House #2 section of this report for additional analysis. A display of Alternative 4B can be found in Appendix A.

Traffic Control Analysis

WHKS prepared an Intersection Control Evaluation (ICE) Report for the intersection to determine which traffic control is desirable at the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43.

Traffic Volume

24-hour traffic counts were recorded at all three intersections and extrapolated the future 20-year volumes on all roadways based on annual compounding growth and the anticipated growth provided in the 2011 Beltline Corridor Study. The volumes of each intersection can be found in Appendix F. The data determined that CSAH 43 had the highest peak hour traffic, then CSAH 2 / CR 180, then CR 171 and finally 18th Street SE.

Crash History

The report also analyzed the previous 10 years (2014 – 2024) of crash history at the intersection using MnDOT's MnCMAT database. From 2014 to 2024, there were 15 recorded crashes at the three intersections: nine crashes at the CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 intersection, four crashes at the CR 171 and CSAH 43 intersection, and two crashes at the 18th Street SE and CSAH 43 intersection. Most of the crashes (47%) were right angle crashes, with eight crashes resulting in some type of injury. A detailed list of crash data can be found in Appendix F.

The crash data was entered into MnDOT's online crash calculator to determine the intersection crash rate per million vehicles entering the intersection. This crash rate is compared to the state's crash rate goal of 1.0 crash per million entering vehicles (MEV) for all intersections. Based on the current traffic counts and crash data, the crash rate at the location was 1.81 MEV. This result is higher than MnDOT's crash rate goal and was consistent with crash data from the 2040 Transportation Plan.

Level of Service/ Capacity

The ICE Report used the 20-year volumes calculated from the traffic counts and analyzed the average delay in vehicles per second for a roundabout, traffic signal, multi-way stop, and side street stop control at the intersection. This analysis is based on Highway Capacity Manual methodology, where Level of Service is given a letter grade based on the delay at an intersection. An intersection at LOS A represents good operations (less delay) and an intersection at LOS F represents poor operations (more delay). An intersection at LOS E is considered at capacity. A summary of LOS for each traffic control alternative can be found in Appendix F.



The analysis for all forms of traffic control provided an acceptable LOS.

Warrant Analysis

The Minnesota Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MnMUTCD) lists a variety of warrants that can be examined at a particular intersection to determine if multi-way stop control or traffic signal control is warranted for traffic control. There are no warrants for the installation of roundabouts. However, MnDOT's current policy states that roundabouts are considered warranted if traffic volumes meet the criteria for either multi-way stop or traffic signal control warrants. The warrant summary for the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 can be found in Appendix F.

None of the Multi-way Stop Warrants were met based on the criteria.

Signal Control warrants 1-8 were not met based on the criteria. Warrant 9 would be met if future traffic is observed and the current intersection alignment is not improved. The existing queue distance between the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 and the railroad crossing is only 65 feet, where 130 feet would be required. All four proposed alternative layouts meet the queue distance requirement, so Warrant 9 would not be met.

NCHRP report 825 Exhibit 17 suggests that two-way stop control is appropriate for all proposed alternatives.

Right of Way Impacts

All the proposed alternatives will result in Right of Way impacts to adjacent property owners. A project map of all adjacent parcels can be found in Appendix C.

Fee Acquisition & Relocation

Alternative 1 will require the acquisition and relocation of four parcels that contain single unit residential homes. Parcels 07-018-2201, 07-017-3301, and 07-020-4411 would be required to construct the roundabout; and parcel 07-019-1103 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

Alternative 2 will require the acquisition and relocation of four parcels: three containing single unit residential homes, and one containing multi-unit residential apartments. Parcels 07-018-2201, 07-017-3301, and 07-020-4412 would be required to construct the re-aligned CSAH 2 / CR 180 intersection; and parcel 07-019-1103 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

Alternative 3 will require the acquisition and relocation of three parcels that contain single unit residential homes. Parcels 07-018-2201 and 07-017-3301 would be required to construct the re-aligned CSAH 2 / CR 180 intersection; and parcel 07-019-1103 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

Alternative 4 will require the acquisition and relocation of one parcel that contains a single unit residential home. Parcel 07-019-1103 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

It should be noted that in Alternatives 2, 3, and 4, Parcel 07-020-4411 would need to be purchased to construct the cul-de-sac or curve option along Claremont Road (existing CSAH 2 / CR 180) as shown on Inset A of each display. The installation of a hammerhead, as shown on the main displays, would not require the acquisition of parcel 07-020-4411.

The property owner of parcel 07-019-1103 has previously been in contact with Steele County about selling the property.



Relocation assistance and benefits for the relocation of a property owner require extensive requirements and special knowledge to perform relocation services. It is recommended that the County work directly with MnDOT Office of Land Management regarding the handling of property relocation.

Fee Acquisition

Alternative 1 will require partial acquisition of farmland from two parcels. Part of parcel 07-017-3300 would be required to construct the roundabout, and part of parcel 07-019-1100 would be required to realign 18th Street SE.

Alternative 2 will require partial acquisition of farmland from five parcels. Part of parcels 07-017-3300, 07-017-2400, 07-020-4100, and 07-020-1100 would be required to re-align CSAH 2 / CR 180 and part of parcel 07-019-1100 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

Alternative 3 will require partial acquisition of seven parcels: four parcels containing farmland and three parcels containing the backyard of a single unit residential home. Part of Parcels 07-018-2200, 07-017-3300, 07-020-4406, 07-020-4404, 07-020-4401, and 07-020-4100 would be required to re-align CSAH 2 / CR 180 and part of parcel 07-019-1100 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

Alternative 4 will require partial acquisition of farmland from five parcels. Part of parcels 07-018-2200, 07-017-3300, 07-017-2400, and 07-020-4100 would be required to re-align CSAH 2 / CR 180 and part of parcel 07-019-1100 would be required to re-align 18th Street SE.

Partial acquisition of all properties would need to follow the Acquisition process provided in Chapter 5.2 of the MnDOT State Aid Manual.

Temporary Easement

All four alternatives will require temporary easement from multiple parcels for grading work during construction.

A summary of Right of Way Impacts can be found below:

Engagement and Input

WHKS and the County met with residents of Havana and additional members of the public on two separate occasions to discuss the project, share the proposed alternatives, and receive feedback. The first open house was held on October 10, 2024, and the second open house was held on January 30, 2025. Both open houses were held at the Havana Town Hall. All four project alternatives were also shared with CPKC Railroad for their comments and feedback. A preliminary utility information meeting was held on January 23, 2025, with companies that have utilities within the project limits to inform them of the project and the anticipated improvements. Additional utility coordination will be required during the final design process.

Open House #1

At the first open house, the design team presented Alternatives 1, 2, 3, and 4 to all open house attendees and collected comments and feedback. The following is a summary of comments that were received. A list of attendees to the first open house can be found in Appendix D.

Alternative 1:

- Residential owners whose homes were impacted by the project strongly objected to relocating due to construction of the roundabout.
- One residential owner had concerns about the raised median of the roundabout approach section limiting access in and out of their driveway.
- The residential house located on parcel 07-019-1103 is a rental. The property owner has been in contact with Steele County about selling the property.

Alternative 2:

- Residential owners whose homes were impacted by the project strongly objected to relocating due to the realignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180.
- The owner of parcel 07-020-4100 disliked how the realignment of CSAH 2 / CR 2180 in this alternative cut through the middle of his farm. It would make the parcel unfarmable.
- There was a request to terminate Claremont Road (existing CSAH 2 / CR 180) using a hammerhead instead of a cul-de-sac to prevent relocating the property owner of parcel 07-020-4411.
- There was a request to explore realigning CSAH 43 and the CSAH 2 / CR 180 intersection to the east, through parcel 07-020-4409. According to residents, the house on the property was not in use, only the garage was being used. They would rather see this property acquired than the other properties with homes that were occupied.

Alternative 3:

- Residential owners whose homes were impacted by the project strongly objected to relocating due to the realignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180.
- Owners of farmland on parcels 07-017-3300 and 07-020-4100 preferred this alternative due to the minimal impacts to their farmable land.
- The owner of parcel 07-017-3301 would rather sell his rental house on this property with Alternatives 1, 2, and 3 than lose more farmland with Alternative 4.
- The property owners on parcels 07-020-4404 and 07-020-4401 strongly objected to this alternative because the realignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 ran through a sizeable portion of their backyards. They also believed the realignment would impact their septic systems and additional underground utilities. The owner of parcel 07-020-4401 stated he would want to be bought out completely and relocated if this option was selected.



Alternative 4:

- Residential owner of Parcel 07-020-4411 disliked the curve shown in this option because it would take out his house. The owner preferred the construction of two hammerheads to save his house and was open to a future purchase agreement with the County to be executed when the house changes occupancy or ownership
- The owner of parcel 07-017-3300 strongly objected to this alternative due to the large impacts to his farmable land. The realignment of CSAH 2 / CR 180 also went through the septic system of his house, and ran through the location of a future shed, house, and septic system he planned to build.
- The owner of parcel 07-017-3201 was concerned about the re-aligned roadway being closer to her house as she has children playing in the yard.
- There was a request to explore relocating CSAH 2 / CR 180 up to Havana Road and turning the existing intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 into a tee intersection.
- There was a request made by multiple residents to convert the stop control at the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 to multi-way stop control instead of realigning the intersection.

The design team made the following changes to each alternative based on feedback from the first open house:

Alternative 1:

 Explored providing median access on the approach legs of the roundabout to allow full access into residential driveways

Alternative 2:

- Replaced the cul-de-sac ending on Claremont Road (existing CSAH 2 / CR 180) with a hammerhead to avoid additional residential property acquisitions and relocations.
- Explored realigning CSAH 43 to the east. This option was ultimately abandoned due to the size
 of horizontal curve needed on CSAH 43, the relocation of a railroad crossing, and the
 recommendation of the 2011 Owatonna East Beltline Corridor study to leave CSAH 43 on its
 existing alignment.

Alternative 3:

- Replaced the cul-de-sac ending on Claremont Road (existing CSAH 2 / CR 180) with a hammerhead to avoid additional residential property acquisitions and relocations.
- Shifted CSAH 2 / CR 180 alignment further north to reduce impacts to residential backyards and septic systems.

Alternative 4:

- Shifted CSAH 2 / CR 180 alignment further east to eliminate impact to construction of future structures on parcel 07-017-3300
- Replaced horizontal curve connecting Claremont Road (existing CSAH 2 / CR 180) to existing CR 171 with two hammerheads to avoid additional residential property acquisitions and relocations.
- Shifted the intersection of CR 171 and CSAH 2 / CR 180 to the south, away from parcel 07-017-2400.
- Explored relocating CSAH 2 / CR 180 up to Havana Road. This option was ultimately abandoned
 due to the additional length of roadway on Havana Road needed to be widened and paved to
 meet state aid standards, and due to the large skew of the existing intersection of Havana Road
 and CR 180 further west.
- Re-evaluated the need for multi-way stop signs at the intersection. It was determined that multi-way stop control could be implemented as a short term, temporary solution to try and reduce the amount of high-speed right-angle crashes at the intersection. It would also function as a



transition for shifting stop control from CSAH 43 to CSAH 2 / CR 180. It was not recommended as a long-term permanent solution to the intersection, as multi-way stop was unwarranted, and did nothing to alleviate the geometric sight distance and decision-making issues the intersection currently faces. See ICE Report in Appendix F for details.

Coordination with CPKC Railroad

CPKC Railroad was asked to review the four alternatives and provide feedback to the design team. A summary of their feedback is provided below:

- The Railroad preferred Alternative 4 out of all the options because it did not require a widening of the railroad crossing to accommodate additional turn lanes and provided the most storage spaces for vehicles when a trail was crossing the tracks.
- Alternative 4 provides the most distance between the intersections and the railroad tracks for construction of a future overpass

A copy of the correspondence with the railroad can be found in Appendix D.

Open House #2

At the second open house, the design team prepared a slideshow discussing an overview of the project, and presented their preferred Alternative, a refined version of Alternative 4. The following is a summary of comments that were received. A list of attendees to the first open house can be found in Appendix D.

- Residential owners whose homes were impacted by the project preferred this alternative because it did not require the acquisition and relocation of their home.
- Residential owners preferred the addition of hammerheads to terminate Claremont Road (existing CSAH 2 / CR 180) and existing CR 171.
- The owner of parcel 07-017-3300 strongly objected to Alternative 4 due to the large impacts to his farmable land.
- The owner of parcel 07-018-2200 understood the safety issues at the intersection, and the need to relocate CSAH 2 / CR 180 to the north was a desirable long-term solution. Even if that meant the realigned roadway would run through his farmland. He requested that the design team explore placing additional horizontal curves along realigned CSAH 2 / CR 180 to shift the roadway to the south and leave a larger chunk of farmable land on his property.
- There was a request to explore shifting CSAH 2 / CR 180 and the intersection with CSAH 43 further north, just south of the property lines of 07-018-2200 and 07-017-3300, to try and mitigate the impacts to farmable land for both properties. WHKS explored this realignment option but ultimately rejected the idea, as the roadbed would sit over an existing floodway and drainage ditch CD 1 and would require a petition to modify or re-route the drainage ditch. Discussions with the Steele County Local Governing Unit determined that this alternative would not be approved for a floodplain permit due to the hardship caused to drainage ditch CD 1. Alternative 4B would also shift the turn lanes for CSAH 43 up into an existing bridge and require the existing structure to be widened. The cost of Alternative 4B would drastically increase due to the additional roadway length required to shift the alignment that far north and was estimated to be \$6,960,000. The minimal additional benefit gained by shifting the roadway is not enough to offset the major floodplain concerns, the additional bridge widening project, and the added project cost.
- It was decided that the relocation of SE 18th Street and CSAH 43 intersection be implemented at a later date to eliminate the need to relocate any property owners as part of the immediate project.



Environmental Impacts

Wetlands

WHKS performed a Level 2 Wetland Delineation to determine the presence and location of wetlands within the boundaries of the proposed alternatives. Level 2 delineations include an on-site assessment to determine the wetland boundaries. The wetland delineation identified seven different wetlands within the project area. Six of the delineated wetlands are anticipated to be regulated under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (CWA). Five of the delineated wetlands would be regulated under the Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act (WCA). There is also a county drainage ditch within the project limits, County Drainage Ditch #1. This drainage ditch is part of the County Drainage System and is managed by the County Drainage Authority.

As stated in the wetland delineation report, we also recommend that a copy of the report be submitted to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, WCA Local Government Unit (LCU) and Minnesota DNR as part of any permit application for impacts to aquatic resources. A table summarizing impacts to delineated wetlands for each alternative is provided below:

Floodplains

Floodplains were identified within the project area using the MN DNR Lake & Flood Elevations Online mapping tool. See the figure below for limits of the floodplain:






Figure 1 – A map of floodplains within the project area

WHKS held a pre-permit coordination call with Jeff Weiss and Gary Bennett from the MnDNR Floodplains program on 2/13/2025 to discuss potential floodplain impacts from the proposed alternatives. It was noted that the current floodplain map does not appear to account for an area of raised upland located above the 100-year base flood elevations noted in pink in Figure 1 between the two tributaries that form the upstream limits of the area of study. A detailed hydraulic model would need to be completed during final design to update the existing hydraulic model with current LiDAR terrain as well as to delineate the floodway limits along the eastern tributary.

Alternatives 2 and 3 will require a floodplain permit for extension of the existing triple box culvert due to the re-aligned CSAH 2 / CR 180 roadway. Alternative 4 will require a floodplain permit, as the re-aligned CR 180 will run through the floodplain located west of CSAH 43 and will also run through the floodway of the unnamed drainage ditch. The Alternative 4 roadway berm would likely be able to be constructed along the area of upland between the two tributaries as shown in Figure 1. Detailed hydraulic analysis will need to be performed to update the existing hydraulic model with current LiDAR terrain and to delineate the floodway limits, and a "no-rise certification" will need to be documented with the construction of the proposed roadbed and the installation of a new drainage structure along the unnamed drainage ditch.



Environmental Review

Each alternative was compared to the state environmental review requirements listed in the Minnesota Rules Chapter 4410. Table 3 and Table 4 summarize the roadway and wetland project thresholds that would trigger an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) or an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS):

Based on the thresholds provided, Alternative 4 is the only Alternative that would require preparation of an EAW.

WHKS explored whether this project could be considered exempt from the EAW process. Chapter 4410.4600 subp.14.A states that highway safety improvement projects can be exempt from preparation of an EAW. A "Highway Safety Improvement Project", according to Chapter 4410.0200 subp.39 is a project designed to improve safety of highway locations that have been identified as hazardous or potentially hazardous. Projects in this category include the removal, relocation, remodeling, or shielding of roadside hazards; installation or replacement of traffic signals; and the geometric correction of identified high accident locations requiring the acquisition of minimal amounts of right-of-way. Alternative 4 requires the acquisition of multiple acres of right of way to construct and would not be considered a minimal amount of right of way. The exemption would not apply.

If the selected alternative is funded using federal funds, it will automatically require the preparation of environmental documentation as described in Chapter 5.1 of the MnDOT State Aid Manual.

Hydraulics

There were four (4) roadway alternative layouts considered for this feasibility study and required drainage structure sizing recommendations. Drainage structures were analyzed using Autodesk 2024 Hydraflow Express or HEC-RAS 6.5 based on recommended drainage structure types. The runoff for the 2-year through 100-year design storms were obtained from StreamStats for unnamed tributary draining under CSAH 2 / CR 180 near Havana, MN. Drainage structure sizing recommendations were based on the minimum overtopping flood frequency outlined in the Minnesota 2024 Drainage Manual Chapter 5.

The recommended drainage structure sizing for each alternative is as followed:

- 1. Alternative 1:
 - a. No change to Bridge No. 95786 on SE 18th Street as part of this project.
 - b. Extend the concrete box culverts of Bridge No. 96797 on CSAH 2 / CR 180 as needed to meet proposed grading limits.
 - c. Recommended channel shaping and sediment removal per the field investigation site photos of Bridge No. 95786 and Bridge No. 96797. Proper channel shaping should reduce future sediment deposits, but the county should set a maintenance schedule for annual site visits. Sediment deposits removal will restore the culverts to their full design capacity.
- 2. Alternative 2 & Alternative 3:
 - a. No change to Bridge No. 95786 on SE 18th Street as part of this project.
 - b. Extend the concrete box culverts of Bridge No. 96797 on CSAH 2 / CR 180 as needed to meet proposed grading limits.
 - c. Recommended channel shaping and sediment removal per the field investigation site photos of Bridge No. 95786 and Bridge No. 96797. Proper channel shaping should reduce future sediment deposits, but the county should set a maintenance schedule for annual site visits. Sediment deposits removal will restore the culverts to their full design capacity.
 - d. Install two (2) separate segments of 36"x58.5" reinforced concrete arch pipe or equivalent 48" reinforced concrete pipe for each culvert crossing on CR 171 East.
 - e. Install two (2) separate segments of 30" reinforced concrete pipe for each culvert crossing on CSAH 2 / CR 180 East.



3. Alternative 4:

- a. No change to Bridge No. 95786 on SE 18th Street as part of this project.
- b. Remove concrete box culverts of Bridge No. 96797 on CSAH 2 / CR 180 per the exhibit.
- c. Recommended channel shaping and sediment removal per the field investigation site photos of Bridge No. 95786 and Bridge No. 96797. Proper channel shaping should reduce future sediment deposits, but the county should set a maintenance schedule for annual site visits. Sediment deposits removal will restore the culverts to their full design capacity.
- d. Install double 8'x6' precast concrete box culverts and single 14'x8' precast concrete box culvert OR 70' x 35' concrete slab span bridge. Additional flood plain coordination and HEC-RAS modeling will be needed to establish the floodway, which may result in a longer bridge length than 70'.
- e. Install two (2) separate segments of 36"x58.5" reinforced concrete arch pipe or equivalent 48" reinforced concrete pipe for each culvert crossing on CR 171 East.
- f. Install two (2) separate segments of 30" reinforced concrete pipe for each culvert crossing on CSAH 2 / CR 180 East.

Recommended Alternative

Alternatives were compared based on the conceptual cost of construction, benefit and utilization provided to the public, and feedback received from the Public Information Meetings. A Decision Matrix with the three alternatives was also compiled to visually compare the benefits and costs of each option. The Decision Matrix is in Appendix E.

Alternative 4 was identified as the preferred option because it did not result in the acquisition and relocation of any residential houses, it provided the most space between the railroad tracks, CSAH 2 / CR 180, and 18th Street SE for future improvements to the intersection. It also provides the most room for a future railroad overpass when future traffic demands are met and provides the most space at the intersection of CSAH 2 / CR 180 and CSAH 43 for future upgrades to the intersection. The cost of Alternative 4 was also comparable to the costs of Alternatives 2 and 3 but provided far greater short-term and long-term benefits.

Alternative 4 also does not require any modifications to the existing CPKC railroad crossing.



Grant and Funding Opportunities

State Aid Funds

State Aid Funding is used by counties and cities for reconstruction, construction, and maintenance projects on designated state aid routes. Funds can be spent on a wide variety of roadway and structural items. The amount of funding available each year varies and is determined using a distribution formula that is established by statutes and the respective county and city screening boards.

Local Road Improvement Program (LRIP)

LRIP provides funding to local agencies for construction, reconstruction, and reconditioning projects with regional significance. Funding is split between the TH Corridor Projects Account, Local Road Account for Routes of Regional Significance, and the Rural Road Safety Account. Items eligible for funding include any reasonable elements of roadway construction, and includes many landscaping, fencing, lighting, and other aesthetic items. The Rural Road Safety Account is intended to assist counties on capital improvement projects on CSAH that are intended to reduce traffic crashes, deaths, injuries and property damage.

Turnback Funds

The County received turnback funds from MnDOT as part of the TH 14 realignment project in 2022. These funds are available after a route has been released from the TH system and may be used for road or bridge construction, R/W, Engineering, utility relocation, railroad adjustment and locally furnished materials or labor.

Federal – Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)

This program is part of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and is intended to achieve a significant reduction in traffic fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads, including non-State-owned public roads and roads on tribal land. Projects eligible for funding include intersection safety projects, construction and improvement of railway-highway grade crossing safety feature, construction or installation of features, measures and road designs to calm traffic and reduce vehicle speeds, installation or upgrades of traffic control devices for pedestrians and bicyclists, roadway improvements that provide separation between motor vehicles and bicyclists and pedestrian security features design to slow or stop a motor vehicle.

Estimated \$3.177 billion available for FY 2025 and \$3.246 billion available for FY 2026

Federal – Railway Highway Crossing Program (Section 130)


The Railway Highway Crossing Program is part of the IIJA and provides funding for the elimination of hazards at public railway-highway crossings. Funds are set-aside from the HSIP apportionment, and an annual set-aside of \$245 million scheduled from FY 2022 through FY 2026


Local Option Sales Tax



Brian,

We are working on another project near or across the subject rail crossing to make some safety improvements with construction scheduled for 2026. This intersection in the unincorporated village of Havana is one of most hazardous intersections in the county; including a truck vs train crash in 2019. The intersection has seen a significant increase in traffic with the expansion of US 14, closure of several other area rail crossings. It especially takes a lot grain truck traffic headed to the Al Corn Ethanol Plant to the east near Claremont which is serviced by this rail line.

We'll be realigning the intersections of CSAH 2 (Claremont Rd), CSAH 43, CR 180 and CR 171 to combine and spread out the distance between intersections and rail crossing, and remove skews if possible.

Would you provide comments on the 4 concepts attached to help us determine a preferred option, preferably by December 13? If you'd like, we can set up a Teams meeting to discuss.

In summary the concepts are:

Concept 1: Roundabout. Yield line is approximately 150 feet from the center of the track. No change at the crossing. Impacts to residential properties are very high, so we are unlikely to choose this option.

Concept 2: Realign CSAH 2/CR 180 to CR 171, combines intersection and moves it about 200 feet from the center of track. Increases width of crossing to about 70 feet with the skew (includes four 12' lanes (two thru and two turn lanes) with two 6' shoulders). Turn lanes would be over the track, so could introduce occasional queuing of traffic over track.

Concept 3: Realign CSAH 2/CR 180 to about 90 feet north of CR 171, combines intersection and moves it about 290 feet from the center of track. Increases width of crossing to about 70 feet with the skew (includes four 12' lanes (two thru and two turn lanes) with two 6' shoulders). Turn lanes would be over the track, but near their beginning compared to Concept 2. Traffic less likely to queue over track, but still possible.

Concept 4: Realign CSAH 2/CR 180 to CR 171, combines intersection and moves it about 950 feet from the center of track. No changes necessary for the crossing. Turn lanes are north of the track. Significant farmland impacts, but this is looking to be our preferred option for many reasons. And it appears to have the least impact on the railroad.

Currently the crossing is controlled passively by stop signs. The intersection to the north is also controlled by a stop sign, so currently, trucks stopping for CSAH 2/CR 180/Claremont Rd have their trailer over the track when waiting for clearing the road. If the railroad is supportive, we are supportive of seeing if a diagnostic would change this to gates and flashing lights, and then fund the crossing controls with a federal or state crossing improvement program.

Project Description

An intersection control evaluation (ICE) report has been prepared for the intersection of CSAH 2/CR 180, CSAH 43, and CR 171 in Steele County, Minnesota. The report applies the signal justification warrants, as outlined in the *Minnesota Manual on Uniform Traffic Control* Devices (*MUTCD*) and uses engineering methods outlined in the *Highway Capacity Manual*, 6th *Edition*. Several alternative layouts for the intersection have been proposed and analyzed in this report, including the findings of different traffic control evaluations.

The purpose of the report is to determine which type of intersection control is the most beneficial for the intersection. Specifically, this report will evaluate whether side-street stop, multi-way stop, traffic signal, or a roundabout is the most beneficial method of traffic control for the intersection.

Intersection Location

The intersections of SE 44th Avenue (CSAH 43) with CR 171, CSAH 2/CR 180, and 18th Street are located in the City of Havana, Minnesota. The study area lies in the east central region of Steele County. Currently, the area surrounding the intersection is mixed agricultural / residential (See Figure 1).

Existing Intersection Characteristics

CSAH 43 / CR 171 Intersection

The CSAH 43 / CR 171 intersection is a three-legged intersection. CSAH 43 is a north-south route. The side street, CR 171 is an east-west route with stop control on CR 171. All approaches to are two-lane roadways with no additional turn lanes. There are several entrances near the intersection for residential properties.

CSAH 43 / CSAH 2/CR 180 Intersection

The CSAH 43 / CSAH 2/CR 180 intersection is a skewed four-legged intersection. CSAH 43 is a north-south route with stop control on CSAH 43. CSAH 2/CR 180 is an east-west route. All approaches to are two-lane roadways with no additional turn lanes. There is a residential entrance in the northeast quadrant of the intersection and a skewed railroad crossing on the south leg of the intersection.

CSAH 43 / 18th Street Intersection

The CSAH 43 / 18th Street intersection is a three-legged intersection. CSAH 43 is a north-south route. The side street, 18th Street is an east-west route with stop control on 18th Street. All approaches to are two-lane roadways with no additional turn lanes. There are several entrances near the intersection for residential properties and a skewed railroad crossing on the north leg of the intersection.

All three intersections and the railroad crossing are closely spaced.



Proposed Configurations

Four alternative layouts for this intersection are being proposed and analyzed in this report.

Alternative 1:

Alternative 1 consists of a 5-leg roundabout connecting CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171. Alternative 1 includes rerouting SE 18th Street to the south to remove the skew of the intersection (see Figure 2). For a full-size print of the alternative, see Appendix H.

Alternative 2:

Alternative 2 consists of a new realigned intersection of CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171 with the stop control switched from CSAH 43 to CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171. Alternative 2 includes rerouting SE 18th Street to the south to remove the skew of the intersection (see Figure 3). For a full-size print of the alternative, see Appendix H.

Alternative 3:

Alternative 3 consists of a new realigned intersection of CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171 with the stop control switched from CSAH 43 to CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171. Alternative 3 includes rerouting SE 18th Street to the south to remove the skew of the intersection (see Figure 4). For a full-size print of the alternative, see Appendix H.

Alternative 4:





Figure 5 - Alternative 4

Alternative 4 consists of a new realigned intersection of CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171 with the stop control switched from CSAH 43 to CSAH 2/CR 180 and CR 171. Alternative 4 includes rerouting SE 18th Street to the south to remove the skew of the intersection (see Figure 5). For a full-size print of the alternative, see Appendix H.

Traffic Volumes

Existing Traffic

Directional intersection traffic volumes were obtained from intersection traffic counts performed on Tuesday, May 21, 2024 (see Appendix A for the traffic count data). Traffic counts were performed from 6:00 AM to 7:00 PM. See Figure 6 for the peak hour traffic volumes.





Traffic Changes Due to Planned Roadway Improvements

Previous corridor studies have indicated there will be an increase of traffic on CSAH 43 due to planned residential growth on the east side of the City of Owatonna.


The County is anticipating making improvements to CR 180 at a railroad underpass to the west. Currently the underpass is restricted to a 12-foot vertical clearance. The project will update the road to meet current clearance standards of at least 14' 6" or more. That change would encourage more truck traffic to utilize CR 180/CSAH 2.


It is estimated that in 2030, the average daily traffic (ADT) on CSAH 43 will be 5,500. Based on the traffic counts taken as part of this study, the current ADT on CSAH 43 is 1,500. Using a 1% compound growth factor, the ADT volumes were factored up to obtain design year (2044) volumes. The estimated 2044 ADT for CSAH 43 is approximately 6,300. The additional traffic was converted from ADT to hourly traffic using a K factor of 0.10. The future traffic volumes are shown in Figure 7.

Traffic Redistribution Based on Proposed Alternatives

Based on the proposed alternatives, the traffic was redistributed to analyze each alternative. Alternatives 2 through 4 have the same redistribution (see Figure 8 for the redistributed traffic).







Intersection Analyses

The capacity of the intersections was analyzed using the procedures outlined in the *Highway Capacity Manual*, 7th *Edition (HCM)*, the intersections were modeled using Synchro Studio 11 with SimTraffic 11 and Sidra Intersection 9.1.

Level of Service (LOS) at intersections is primarily a function of peak hour turning movement volumes, intersection lane configuration, and traffic control. For intersection analysis, the *HCM* defines LOS in terms of the average control delay at the intersection in seconds per vehicle. Level of service is broken down into letter grades, with LOS A representing good operations and LOS F representing poor operations. LOS E is considered to be at capacity. Table 1 shows the level of service correlations to seconds of delay for signalized intersections and stop control (unsignalized) intersections. Currently in the United States, roundabout control is also categorized as unsignalized.

Capacity Analysis

The proposed alternatives were analyzed using the Synchro/SimTraffic and Sidra Intersection software programs, which uses the *Highway Capacity Manual (HCM)* methodology. The intersections were analyzed using the 2044 traffic volumes. Alternatives 2 through 4 have the same redistribution and will result in the same capacity.

Alternative 1

For Alternative 1, roundabout control and side-street stop control were analyzed. Based on the analysis, it has been determined that roundabout control connecting CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180, and CR 171 in addition of a side-street stop control for 18th Street/CSAH 43, is acceptable. A summary of the detailed LOS results is shown in Appendix B.

Alternatives 2-4: Side-Street Stop Control

For Alternatives 2-4, side-street stop control was analyzed. Based on the analysis, it has been determined that side-street stop control at the intersection connecting CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180, and CR 171 in addition of a side-street stop control for 18th Street/CSAH 43, is acceptable. A summary of the detailed LOS results is shown in Appendix C.

For Alternatives 2-4, multi-way stop control at the intersection connecting CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180, and CR 171 in addition of a side-street stop control for 18th Street/CSAH 43, is acceptable. A summary of the detailed LOS results is shown in Appendix D.

For Alternatives 2-4, traffic signal control at the intersection connecting CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180, and CR 171 in addition of a side-street stop control for 18th Street/CSAH 43, is acceptable. A summary of the detailed LOS results is shown in Appendix E.

Safety Analysis

Crash data was obtained from the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) showing fifteen recorded crashes at the three intersections between 2014 and 2024. The majority of crashes were angle (47%), other (27%), and single vehicle run off road (13%). There were four minor injury crashes, four possible injury crashes, and seven property damage crashes. Four crashes were at the CR 171 intersection. Nine crashes were at the CSAH 2/CR 180 intersection. Two crashes were at the 18th Street intersection. See Appendix F for the detailed crash data.

MnDOT provides an online calculator⁽⁴⁾ to determine the intersection crash rater per million vehicles entering the intersection. MnDOT has a crash rate goal of 1.0 crash per million entering vehicles (MEV) for all intersections.

The 2040 Transportation Plan identified the intersection as the top ranked crash location in the County based on 2016-2020 crash data. The current traffic counts and crash data were entered into the MnDOT crash calculator with the following results:

Intersection Crash Rate = 1.81 per million entering vehicles

Based on the crash data provided at this location, there is a need to address safety issues. Angle crashes are severe crash types at high speeds.

Alternative 1

The proposed 5-leg roundabout combines two closely spaced skewed intersections and reduces the number of conflict points.

Studies show that roundabout control improves safety in the following ways:

- 1. Slower vehicle speeds
- 2. Decreased number of conflict points
- 3. Reduction of accident severity

Installing a roundabout is an accepted traffic calming technique which is achieved by controlling geometrics. Speed reduction can be realized at all times of the day and during various traffic volumes. Roundabout control is a flexible type of control that handles varying traffic volumes efficiently. Installing a roundabout may reduce crashes by 44% (p. 30, DRCRF⁽¹⁾) and may reduce property damage only crashes by 42% and injuries by 82% (p. 31, DRCRF⁽¹⁾). Actual crash reductions vary due to site-specific factors.

The rerouting of SE 18th Street to the south to remove the skew of the intersection may also reduce crashes by 9% (p. 33, DRCRF⁽¹⁾).

Alternatives 2-4

The new realigned intersection of CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180, and CR 171 will remove the skew and increase the separation from the railroad crossing. The new realigned intersection combines two closely spaced intersections, reducing the overall number of conflict points. Turn lanes will also be added on CSAH 43 to remove turning traffic from the through movement. Installing right turn lanes on the major road approaches may reduce crashes by 26% (DRCRF⁽¹⁾). Installing left turn lanes on the major road approaches may reduce crashes by 48% (DRCRF⁽¹⁾). Removing the skew of the intersection may also reduce crashes by 9% (p. 33, DRCRF⁽¹⁾). No crash reduction factor was available for combining

intersections; however, it is expected to reduce the number of crashes significantly. Actual crash reductions vary due to site-specific factors.

The rerouting of SE 18th Street to the south to remove the skew of the intersection may also reduce crashes by 9% (p. 33, DRCRF⁽¹⁾).

Warrant Analysis

A warrant analysis was performed in accordance with the *Minnesota Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MnMUTCD)* utilizing Highway Capacity Software (HCS). There are no warrants for the installation of roundabouts. However, MnDOT's current policy states that roundabouts are considered warranted if traffic volumes meet the criteria for either multi-way stop or traffic signal control warrants. The peak hour traffic was also analyzed using the NCHRP report 825 Exhibit 17⁽³⁾.

Multi-way stop control warrants:

- 1. Crash Experience
- 2. Sight Distance
- 3. Transition to Signal or Roundabout
- 4. 8-Hour Volume
- 5. Other

Signal control warrants:

- 1. 8-Hour Volume
- 2. 4-Hour Volume
- 3. Peak Hour
- 4. Pedestrian Volume
- 5. School Crossing
- 6. Coordinated Signal System
- 7. Crash Experience
- 8. Roadway Network
- 9. Intersection Near a Grade Crossing

Multi-way stop warrants 1 through 5 are not met.

Signal control warrants 1 through 8 are not met. There are currently 5 trains a day at the grade crossing. Signal warrant 9 will be met if the future traffic is observed and the existing intersection configuration is not improved. The existing queue distance is approximately 65 feet and meets the requirements for existing traffic. To meet the needs of the future traffic, 130 feet of queue distance will be required. All proposed alternatives will meet the queue requirement.

NCHRP report 825 Exhibit 17 suggests that two-way stop control is appropriate for all proposed alternatives.

A summary of the warrant analysis is shown in Appendix G



Site Review

Right of Way

All four Alternatives will require additional right-of-way (ROW) to be constructed.

Alternative 1 will require the acquisition of approximately 17 acres of property and result in the relocation of four single-family residential houses.

Alternative 2 will require the acquisition of approximately 22 acres of ROW and result in the relocation of three single-family residential houses and one multi-family apartment unit.

Alternative 3 will require the acquisition of approximately 21 acres of ROW and result in the relocation of three single-family residential houses.

Alternative 4 will require the acquisition of approximately 14 acres of ROW and the relocation of one single-family residential house.

Cost Analysis

The estimated construction cost for Alternative 1 is estimated to be \$3,440,000.

The estimated construction cost for Alternative 2 is estimated to be \$4,710,000.

The estimated construction cost for Alternative 3 is estimated to be \$4,500,000.

The estimated construction cost for Alternative 4 is estimated to be \$5,620,000.



Findings and Recommendations

Capacity Analysis

Alternative 1

It has been determined that roundabout control for CSAH 2/CR 180 / CR 171 / CSAH 43, and side-street stop control for 18th Street/CSAH 43 is acceptable.

Alternatives 2-4

It has been determined that side-street stop, multi-way stop, and traffic signal control for CSAH 2/CR 180 / CR 171, and CSAH 43 is acceptable. Side-street stop control for 18th Street/CSAH 43 is acceptable.

Safety Analysis

Based on the crash data provided at this location, there is a need to address safety issues. Angle crashes are severe crash types at high speeds. Using the MNDOT crash calculator, an Intersection Crash Rate of 1.81 was calculated. MnDOT has a crash rate goal of 1.0 crash per million entering vehicles (MEV) for all intersections.

Alternative 1

Roundabouts offer significant safety benefits including an overall reduction in vehicle speed, elimination of dangerous intersection conditions such as stop sign running, and removes serious conflict points including angle, left-turn, and head-on crashes.⁽²⁾

Alternatives 2-4

The new realigned intersection of CSAH 43, CSAH 2/CR 180, and CR 171 will remove the skew and increase the separation from the railroad crossing. The new realigned intersection combines two closely spaced intersections, reducing the overall number of conflict points. Turn lanes will also be added on CSAH 43 to remove turning traffic from the through movement.

Warrant Analysis

Multi-way stop warrants are not met. It is not recommended that multi-way stop be implemented if unwarranted. Multi-way stop control is suitable only at intersections with moderate and relatively balanced volume levels on the intersection approaches. Under other conditions, the use of Multi-way stop control may create unnecessary delays and aggressive driver behavior. Not every two-way stop-controlled intersection should be considered as a candidate for multi-way stop control. This strategy should be used selectively, recognizing patterns and volumes of traffic and potentially adverse reaction by the driving population to being stopped for no apparent reason. If drivers encounter substantial delays, they may become impatient and act irrationally, which can lead to crash patterns of the type that the strategy is intended to correct.⁽⁵⁾

Signal control warrants 1 through 8 are not met. There are currently 5 trains a day at the grade crossing. Signal warrant 9 will be met if the future traffic is observed and the existing intersection configuration is not improved. The existing queue distance between the railroad crossing and the highway is approximately 65 feet and meets the requirements for existing traffic. To meet the needs of the future traffic, 130 feet of queue distance will be required. All proposed alternatives will meet the queue requirement. Based on the signal warrants not being met, it is not recommended that a signal be installed. Unwarranted signals can increase crash rate by 24%⁽¹⁾.

NCHRP report 825 Exhibit 17 suggests that two-way stop control is appropriate for all proposed alternatives.

Summary of Findings

All alternatives presented and types of intersection control will provide an acceptable Level of Service for future traffic. Warrants related to crashes, sight distance, and traffic volumes are not met for multi-way stop or signal control and roundabout control based on signal and multi-way stop findings. Signal warrant 9 related to the railroad crossing will be met if the future traffic is observed and the existing intersection configuration is not improved. The existing queue distance between the railroad crossing and the highway is approximately 65 feet and meets the requirements for existing traffic. To meet the needs of the future traffic, 130 feet of queue distance will be required. All proposed alternatives will meet the queue requirement for existing and future traffic. Based on the signal warrants not being met, it is not recommended that a signal be installed. Unwarranted signals can increase crash rate by 24%⁽¹⁾.

Based on the crash data provided, there are specific safety issues that need to be addressed in the proposed improvements. Roundabout control is an accepted traffic calming technique. Reduced vehicle speed is achieved by controlling geometrics and therefore, speed reduction can be realized at all times of the day and under varying traffic volumes. The redesigned intersections in Alternatives 2-4 that eliminates the skew and tight spaced intersections will also improve safety.

While not recommended as a permanent solution to the intersection based on the analysis performed in this report, multi-way stop could be implemented as a temporary traffic control. It would help reduce the number of right angle crashes at the intersection caused by poor sight distances and skewed geometry, and could be implemented immediately until the improved intersection is reconstructed. Multi-way stop would also provide an opportunity to prepare drivers for the switch in stop control from CSAH 43 to CSAH 2/CR 180 as recommended in this report. Additional pavement markings and advanced warning signs should also be updated at all approaches of the intersection to improve driver awareness to the interim control change. Dynamic changeable message signs should also be used in the short term to draw more attention to the changes.

Alternative 4 was found to require the least amount of additional ROW acquisition and require the least amount of housing relocations. Alternatives 1,2 and 3 all required higher amounts of acquisition and additional housing relocations.

Alternative 1 was found to be the cheapest alternative at \$3,440,000. The remaining alternatives were similar in cost, with Alternative 3 at \$4,500,000, then Alternative 2 at \$4,710,000, and Alternative 4 being the most expensive at \$5,620,000.

Based on these factors and the analyses performed in this study, Alternative 4 is the recommended Alternative. While all four alternatives had adequate safety and capacity requirements, Alternative 4 provides the most separation from the railroad tracks and other intersections for future upgrades to the intersection of CSAH 2/ CR 180 and CSAH 43 for a similar cost compared to the other alternatives. This was the only alternative that also provides enough space for construction of a future railroad overpass. Alternative 4 also requires the least amount of ROW acquisition and relocation of properties to construct. The two-way stop control in Alternatives 4 could be upgraded to multi-way stop or traffic signal in the future if the traffic demand requires it.





General Criteria for considering an Interim Use Permit:

1) The use will not create a burden on parks, schools, streets, public facilities or utilities:

The planning commission find the project will have no impact on parks and schools. No utilities or public facilities are used other than CSAH 18. This is a 9 ton per axel weight limit road and adequate to hand the expected traffic.

2) The use is compatible, separated, or screening from adjacent agricultural or residential land so it will not deter development or depreciated the value of existing properties:

The planning commission find the surrounding land use includes mostly agricultural land, several rural residences, and other gravel pits. This project should not affect nearby agricultural operations or the gravel pits. A limit on the hours of operations has been imposed to mitigate potential effects on neighboring residences.

V. Project Description:

Matt Holland with Richland Grain LLC requests to use a silage bunker, (2) manure pits, and a slurry store, currently located on the property, for temporary storage of the following industrial by-products (IBP): sweet corn silage and sweetcorn leachate. Up to 5,000 dry tons of silage may be stored in the silage bunker seasonally. Silage is expected to be onsite temporarily before being transferred to Hometown BioEnergy in Le Sueur, MN. Some of the silage may also be land applied or fed to beef cattle in the adjacent feedlot. Silage leachate and stormwater runoff will be collected and stored in a 550,000-gallon storage tank (slurry store). This facility has a current feedlot registration 147-92029. Runoff from the feedlot is also collected and diverted to the slurry store. The leachate/stormwater runoff may be land applied or transferred to Hometown Bio Energy.

VI. Reason for Conditional Use Permit Application:

Section 704.1 of the Steele County Ordinance allows agricultural related businesses as a conditional use in the agricultural district.

VII. General Criteria for Issuing Conditional Use Permit:

1) The use will not create a burden on parks, schools, streets, public facilities or utilities:

The proposal will not affect parks or schools. Primary public facilities used by this proposal will be County Road 9. County Road 9 is a 9 ton per axel weight limit paved road and is adequate to handle any expected

traffic.

2) The use is compatible, separated, or screening from adjacent agricultural or residential land:

The property is surrounded by agricultural land and several rural residents that are located predominantly along county road 9. The nearest residences to this property are approximately 270 feet north, 310 feet west, and 730 feet northeast of the proposed site. To the east, Crane Creek is approximately 350 feet from the proposed storage site, and Revol Greens is approximately 1580 feet to the east of the site. The site is located within the 100-year flood plain. The greatest potential to affect the neighboring residential properties would be if odors, rodents, or noise became an issue.

The utilization of the existing infrastructure for Industrial By-Products (IBP) could have the potential to create odors, attract rodents from the silage and leachate that is stored there. The storage and land application of IBP requires the issuance of an MPCA permit which was issued January 1st, 2025. That permit determines if the slurry store can environmentally contain the IBP and if it can be land applied as a fertilizer product. A MPCA permit does require minimum separation distances from the storage area and residences, wells, and etcetera which should help with the potential odor reaching nearby residents. The MPCA permit also includes some language requiring the storage pit to not generate offensive odors and attract rodents but generally speaking this is not the emphasis of the permit. Steele County should consider conditions concerning odors and rodents if this permit is granted.

With one to two trucks coming and going a day, noise and lights shining into windows may also be an issue to neighboring residents. Steele County should also consider conditions concerning hours of operation if this permit granted.

Being located in the flood plain, another potential effect is runoff polluting the surface water. The MPCA permit has language concerning runoff from the storage area as well and Richfield Grain obtained a slurry tank certification from Anez Consulting. This certifies that the slurry tank can contain the leachate and if it fails, the land around is able to contain a spill. Planning and Zoning would like the sileage bunker and manure pit walls certified as above the base flood elevation (BFE) to prevent sileage leachate from polluting flood waters. A site inspection also revealed cracks in these walls and PVC holes. The cracks should be repaired and the PVC holes plugged.

We have sent additional questions to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (PCA) regarding various aspects of the property and permit. At the time of the board packet being sent, we have not yet received those answers.

3) The appearance will not have an adverse effect on adjacent properties:

The appearance of the property will remain the same as it is today.

4) The use is related to the existing land use and the county needs of the county:

The existing site is a 18.16 acre rural agriculture site containing a registered feedlot. The site contains two livestock buildings, a silage bunker, two manure pits, a slurry store, and a storage shed.

5) The use is consistence with the zoning ordinance and zoning district:

The property is located in the Agricultural Zoning District. The applicant is applying under Section 704.1 of the Zoning Ordinance as an agricultural related business or 704.16 which allows other similar uses as determine by the planning Commission and the County Board. There is no definition for ag. related business in our ordinance as that has been left up to interpretation for individual requests. Historically we, have been more open to uses when they involve the re-use of existing structures or facilities. The planning commission should make a determination if this use should be allowed in the agricultural district.

6) The use will not creation a traffic hazards or congestion:

Additional traffic will be minimal. The applicant plans on one or two extra vehicles trips occurring per day. The site accesses onto County Road 9 (NW 50th St.). This is a paved 9 ton / axel rated road and is capable of handling the expected traffic. In the past, Steele County Highway has received complaints about the lack of sight distance for the east bound traffic and traffic coming from those driveways as well as the township road at that hill. The top of the hill is at NW 32nd Ave, and approximately 250 feet from the west driveway. The speed limit is 55mph with a 45mph advisory sign. The advisory sign was installed within the past couple years. There is no significant crash history here. The Steele County Highway Engineer has requested that the driveway to the east be used due to lack of sight distance for the east bound traffic while utilizing the driveway to the west. They would like the west driveway removed.

7) Existing businesses will not be adversely affected because of curtailment of customers trade: The nearest existing business is Revol Greens. No effect is expected on this business.

8) Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other facilities will be provided:

Access: The current access onto County Road 9 will be used.

Drainage: Drainage should not change from existing. Run-off from storage operations should not be





This project should not affect nearby agricultural operations or the gravel pits. A limit on the hours of operations shall be imposed to mitigate potential effects on neighboring residences.

3) The appearance will not have an adverse effect on adjacent properties:

The planning commission find the appearance of the pit will be similar to others in the area and is setback far enough to screened it from neighboring residences and the road.

4) The use is related to the needs of the county and the existing land use:

The planning commission find the existing land use is an active mine, areas of reclaimed mine that are now open water, and cropland. The proposed use shall be consistent with past mining operations.

5) The use is consistence with the purpose of the zoning ordinance and zoning district:

The planning commission find mining of aggregate material and the temporary storage, crushing and processing of recyclable aggregate material is consistent with the Zoning Ordinance if approved as an Interim Use.

The planning commission find the site will access onto County Road 18 thru the Dietz Pit. There have been no reported issues with traffic from this site or the Diet Pit.





Background (Including Budget Impact):

In 2021, the county retained SEH to complete a feasibility study to evaluate the traffic operations of Main St., determine appropriate lane configurations and intersection controls, to determine pavement preservation or replacement strategies, and to review pedestrian safety throughout the corridor. In 2023, SEH completed the study and recommended reconstruction of CSAH 48 Main Street from Oak Avenue to Grove Avenue and the Board accepted their findings. SEH has prepared a proposal to amend their professional services agreement to add the final design services for a not-to-exceed cost of \$720,000. While completing the feasibility study, SEH gained significant experience and understanding of the project that could be lost if other proposals are requested. Staff has reviewed the proposal scope and costs and believe them reasonable for the project needs.

As part of the final design work, staff is recommending SEH revisit the study recommendation to construct a roundabout at the intersection of Main Street and Grove Avenue and instead replace the aging signals and modify turn lanes. Also, staff is recommending extending the west limit of the project to include reconstruction the Main Street and Oak Avenue intersection to include replacing the aging signal system.

The county budgeted \$500,000 in sales tax and city cost share funding to complete the final design of that project in 2025. The remaining \$220,000 is proposed to come from sales tax funding fund balance.

Payments to Consultant for Services and Expenses Using the Hourly Basis Option

The Agreement for Professional Services is amended and supplemented to include the following agreement of the parties:

A. Hourly Basis Option

The Client and Consultant select the hourly basis for payment for services provided by Consultant. Consultant shall be compensated monthly. Monthly charges for services shall be based on Consultant's current billing rates for applicable employees plus charges for expenses and equipment.

Consultant will provide an estimate of the costs for services in this Agreement. It is agreed that after 90% of the estimated compensation has been earned and if it appears that completion of the services cannot be accomplished within the remaining 10% of the estimated compensation, Consultant will notify the Client and confer with representatives of the Client to determine the basis for completing the work.

Compensation to Consultant based on the rates is conditioned on completion of the work within the effective period of the rates. Should the time required to complete the work be extended beyond this period, the rates shall be appropriately adjusted.

B. Expenses

The following items involve expenditures made by Consultant employees or professional consultants on behalf of the Client. Their costs are not included in the hourly charges made for services but instead are reimbursable expenses required in addition to hourly charges for services and shall be paid for as described in this Agreement:

- 1. Transportation and travel expenses.
- 2. Long distance services, dedicated data and communication services, teleconferences, Project Web sites, and extranets.
- 3. Lodging and meal expense connected with the Project.
- 4. Fees paid, in the name of the Client, for securing approval of authorities having jurisdiction over the Project.
- 5. Plots, Reports, plan and specification reproduction expenses.
- 6. Postage, handling and delivery.
- 7. Expense of overtime work requiring higher than regular rates, if authorized in advance by the Client.
- 8. Renderings, models, mock-ups, professional photography, and presentation materials requested by the Client.
- 9. All taxes levied on professional services and on reimbursable expenses.
- 10. Other special expenses required in connection with the Project.
- 11. The cost of special consultants or technical services as required. The cost of subconsultant services shall include actual expenditure plus 10% markup for the cost of administration and insurance.

The Client shall pay Consultant monthly for expenses.

C. Equipment Utilization

The utilization of specialized equipment, including automation equipment, is recognized as benefiting the Client. The Client, therefore, agrees to pay the cost for the use of such specialized equipment on the project. Consultant invoices to the Client will contain detailed information regarding the use of specialized equipment on the project and charges will be based on the standard rates for the equipment published by Consultant.

The Client shall pay Consultant monthly for equipment utilization.

General Conditions of the Agreement for Professional Services

SECTION I - SERVICES OF CONSULTANT

A. General

1. Consultant agrees to perform professional services as set forth in the Agreement for Professional Services or Supplemental Letter Agreement ("Services"). Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with or a cause of action in favor of a third party against either the Client or the Consultant. The Consultant's services under this Agreement are being performed solely for the Client's benefit, and no other party or entity shall have any claim against the Consultant because of this Agreement or the performance or nonperformance of services hereunder.

B. Schedule

- Unless specific periods of time or dates for providing services are specified, Consultant's obligation to render Services hereunder will be for a period which may reasonably be required for the completion of said Services
- 2. If Client has requested changes in the scope, extent, or character of the Project or the Services to be provided by Consultant, the time of performance and compensation for the Services shall be adjusted equitably. The Client agrees that Consultant is not responsible for damages arising directly or indirectly from delays beyond Consultant's control. If the delays resulting from such causes increase the cost or the time required by Consultant to perform the Services in accordance with professional skill and care, then Consultant shall be entitled to a equitable adjustment in schedule and compensation.

C. Additional Services

- 1. If Consultant determines that any services it has been directed or requested to perform are beyond the scope as set forth in the Agreement or that, due to changed conditions or changes in the method or manner of administration of the Project, Consultant's effort required to perform its services under this Agreement exceeds the stated fee for the Services, then Consultant shall promptly notify the Client regarding the need for additional Services. Upon notification and in the absence of a written objection, Consultant shall be entitled to additional compensation for the additional Services and to an extension of time for completion of additional Services absent written objection by Client.
- Additional Services, including delivery of documents, CAD files, or information not expressly included as deliverables, shall be billed in accord with agreed upon rates, or if not addressed, then at Consultant's standard rates.

D. Suspension and Termination

- 1. If Consultant's services are delayed or suspended in whole or in part by Client, or if Consultant's services are delayed by actions or inactions of others for more than 60 days through no fault of Consultant, then Consultant shall be entitled to either terminate its agreement upon seven days written notice or, at its option, accept an equitable adjustment of compensation provided for elsewhere in this Agreement to reflect costs incurred by Consultant.
- 2. This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon seven days written notice should the other party fail substantially to perform in accordance with its terms through no fault of the party initiating the termination.
- 3. This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon thirty days' written notice without cause. All provisions of this Agreement allocating responsibility or liability between the Client and Consultant shall survive the completion of the Services hereunder and/or the termination of this Agreement.
- 4. In the event of termination, Consultant shall be compensated for Services performed prior to termination date, including charges for expenses and equipment costs then due and all termination expenses.

SECTION II - CLIENT RESPONSIBILITIES

A. General

1. The Client shall, in proper time and sequence and where appropriate to the Project, at no expense to Consultant, provide full information as to Client's requirements for the Services provided by Consultant and access to all public and private lands required for Consultant to perform its Services.

- 2. The Consultant is not a municipal advisor and therefore Client shall provide its own legal, accounting, financial and insurance counseling, and other special services as may be required for the Project. Client shall provide to Consultant all data (and professional interpretations thereof) prepared by or services performed by others pertinent to Consultant's Services, such as previous reports; sub-surface explorations; laboratory tests and inspection of samples; environmental assessment and impact statements, surveys, property descriptions; zoning; deed; and other land use restrictions; as-built drawings; and electronic data base and maps. The costs associated with correcting, creating or recreating any data that is provided by the Client that contains inaccurate or unusable information shall be the responsibility of the Client.
- 3. Client shall provide prompt written notice to Consultant whenever the Client observes or otherwise becomes aware of any changes in the Project or any defect in Consultant's Services. Client shall promptly examine all studies, reports, sketches, opinions of construction costs, specifications, drawings, proposals, change orders, supplemental agreements, and other documents presented by Consultant and render the necessary decisions and instructions so that Consultant may provide Services in a timely manner.
- 4. Client shall require all utilities with facilities within the Project site to locate and mark said utilities upon request, relocate and/or protect said utilities to accommodate work of the Project, submit a schedule of the necessary relocation/protection activities to the Client for review, and comply with agreed upon schedule. Consultant shall not be liable for damages which arise out of Consultant's reasonable reliance on the information or services furnished by utilities to Client or others hired by Client.
- 5. Consultant shall be entitled to rely on the accuracy and completeness of information or services furnished by the Client or others employed by the Client and shall not be liable for damages arising from reasonable reliance on such materials. Consultant shall promptly notify the Client if Consultant discovers that any information or services furnished by the Client is in error or is inadequate for its purpose.
- 6. Client agrees to reasonably cooperate, when requested, to assist Consultant with the investigation and addressing of any complaints made by Consultant's employees related to inappropriate or unwelcomed actions by Client or Client's employees or agents. This shall include, but not be limited to, providing access to Client's employees for Consultant's investigation, attendance at hearings, responding to inquiries and providing full access to Client files and information related to Consultant's employees, if any. Client agrees that Consultant retains the absolute right to remove any of its employees from Client's facilities if Consultant, in its sole discretion, determines such removal is advisable. Consultant, likewise, agrees to reasonably cooperate with Client with respect to the foregoing in connection with any complaints made by Client's employees.
- 7. Client acknowledges that Consultant has expended significant effort and expense in training and developing Consultant's employees. Therefore, during the term of this Agreement and for a period of two years after the termination of this Agreement or the completion of the Services under this Agreement, whichever is longer, Client shall not directly or indirectly: (1) hire, solicit or encourage any employee of Consultant to leave the employ of Consultant; (2) hire, solicit or encourage any consultant or independent contractor to cease work with Consultant; or (3) circumvent Consultant by conducting business directly with its employees. The two-year period set forth in this section shall be extended commensurately with any amount of time during which Client has violated its terms.

SECTION III - PAYMENTS

A. Invoices

1. Undisputed portions of invoices are due and payable within 30 days. Client must notify Consultant in writing of any disputed items within 15 days from receipt of invoice. Amounts due Consultant will be increased at the rate of 1.0% per month (or the maximum rate of interest permitted by law, if less) for invoices 30 days past due. Consultant reserves the right to retain Services or deliverables until all invoices are paid in full. Consultant will not be liable for any claims of loss, delay, or damage by Client for reason of withholding Services, deliverables, or Instruments of Service until all invoices are paid in full. Consultant shall be entitled to recover all reasonable

- costs and disbursements, including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred in connection with collecting amounts owed by Client.
- Should taxes, fees or costs be imposed, they shall be in addition to Consultant's agreed upon compensation.
- Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, Consultant may pursue collection of past due invoices without the necessity of any mediation proceedings.

SECTION IV - GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS

A. Standards of Performance

- 1. The standard of care for all professional engineering and related services performed or furnished by Consultant under this Agreement will be the care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of Consultant's profession practicing under similar circumstances at the same time and in the same locality. Consultant makes no warranties, express or implied, under this Agreement or otherwise, in connection with its Services.
- 2. Consultant neither guarantees the performance of any Contractor nor assumes responsibility for any Contractor's failure to furnish and perform the work in accordance with its construction contract or the construction documents prepared by Consultant. Client acknowledges Consultant will not direct, supervise or control the work of construction contractors or their subcontractors at the site or otherwise. Consultant shall have no authority over or responsibility for the contractor's acts or omissions, nor for its means, methods, or procedures of construction. Consultant's Services do not include review or evaluation of the Client's, contractor's or subcontractor's safety measures, or job site safety or furnishing or performing any of the Contractor's work.
- 3. Consultant's Opinions of Probable Construction Cost are provided if agreed upon in writing and made on the basis of Consultant's experience and qualifications. Consultant has no control over the cost of labor, materials, equipment or service furnished by others, or over the Contractor's methods of determining prices, or over competitive bidding or market conditions, Consultant cannot and does not guarantee that proposals, bids or actual construction cost will not vary from Opinions of Probable Construction Cost prepared by Consultant. If Client wishes greater assurance as to construction costs, Client shall employ an independent cost estimator.

B. Indemnity for Environmental Issues

1. Consultant is not a user, generator, handler, operator, arranger, storer, transporter, or disposer of hazardous or toxic substances. Therefore the Client agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend Consultant and Consultant's officers, directors, subconsultant(s), employees and agents from and against any and all claims; losses; damages; liability; and costs, including but not limited to costs of defense, arising out of or in any way connected with, the presence, discharge, release, or escape of hazardous or toxic substances, pollutants or contaminants of any kind at the site.

C. Limitations on Liability

- 1. The Client hereby agrees that to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant's total liability to the Client for all injuries, claims, losses, expenses, or damages whatsoever arising out of or in any way related to the Project or this Agreement from any cause or causes including, but not limited to, Consultant's negligence, errors, omissions, strict liability, breach of contract or breach of warranty shall not exceed five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). In the event Client desires limits of liability in excess of those provided in this paragraph, Client shall advise Consultant in writing and agree that Consultant's fee shall increase by 1% for each additional five hundred thousand dollars of liability limits, up to a maximum limit of liability of five million dollars (\$5,000,000).
- 2. Neither Party shall be liable to the other for consequential damages, including without limitation lost rentals; increased rental expenses; loss of use; loss of income; lost profit, financing, business, or reputation; and loss of management or employee productivity, incurred by one another or their subsidiaries or successors, regardless of whether such damages are foreseeable and are caused by breach of contract, willful misconduct, negligent act or omission, or other wrongful act of either of them. Consultant expressly disclaims any duty to defend Client for any alleged actions or damages.
- 3. It is intended by the parties to this Agreement that Consultant's Services shall not subject Consultant's employees, officers or directors to any personal legal exposure for the risks associated with this Agreement. The Client agrees that as the Client's sole and exclusive remedy, any claim, demand or suit shall be directed and/or

- asserted only against Consultant, and not against any of Consultant's individual employees, officers or directors, and Client knowingly waives all such claims against Consultant individual employees, officers or directors.
- 4. Causes of action between the parties to this Agreement pertaining to acts or failures to act shall be deemed to have accrued, and the applicable statutes of limitations shall commence to run, not later than either the date of Substantial Completion for acts or failures to act occurring prior to substantial completion or the date of issuance of the final invoice for acts or failures to act occurring after Substantial Completion. In no event shall such statutes of limitations commence to run any later than the date when the Services are substantially completed.

D. Assignment

1. Neither party to this Agreement shall transfer, sublet or assign any rights under, or interests in, this Agreement or claims based on this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party. Any assignment in violation of this subsection shall be null and void.

E. Dispute Resolution

- 1. Any dispute between Client and Consultant arising out of or relating to this Agreement or the Services (except for unpaid invoices which are governed by Section III) shall be submitted to mediation as a precondition to litigation unless the parties mutually agree otherwise. Mediation shall occur within 60 days of a written demand for mediation unless Consultant and Client mutually agree otherwise.
- 2. Any dispute not settled through mediation shall be settled through litigation in the state and county where the Project at issue is located.

SECTION V - INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

A. Proprietary Information

- 1. All documents, including reports, drawings, calculations, specifications, CAD materials, computers software or hardware or other work product prepared by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement are Consultant's Instruments of Service ("Instruments of Service"). Consultant retains all ownership interests in Instruments of Service, including all available copyrights.
- 2. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, Consultant shall retain all of its rights in its proprietary information including without limitation its methodologies and methods of analysis, ideas, concepts, expressions, inventions, know how, methods, techniques, skills, knowledge, and experience possessed by Consultant prior to, or acquired by Consultant during, the performance of this Agreement and the same shall not be deemed to be work product or work for hire and Consultant shall not be restricted in any way with respect thereto. Consultant shall retain full rights to electronic data and the drawings, specifications, including those in electronic form, prepared by Consultant and its subconsultants and the right to reuse component information contained in them in the normal course of Consultant's professional activities.

B. Client Use of Instruments of Service

- 1. Provided that Consultant has been paid in full for its Services, Client shall have the right in the form of a nonexclusive license to use Instruments of Service delivered to Client exclusively for purposes of constructing, using, maintaining, altering and adding to the Project. Client shall also defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Consultant from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses including attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting from reuse of Consultant documents without written consent.

Thank you for the opportunity to continue to provide professional engineering services for the CSAH 48 (Main Street) Reconstruction Project from Oak Avenue to Grove Avenue.

BACKGROUND

In 2022 and 2023, Short Elliott Hendrickson, Inc. (SEH) worked with Steele County and the City of Owatonna to study the existing infrastructure and analyze traffic on CSAH 48 (Main Street) and prepare a feasibility study identifying improvements to the corridor. It was concluded in the study that the portion of Main Street from Oak Avenue to Elm Avenue needs a complete infrastructure reconstruction with utility replacements and adjusting the pavement width and lane and intersection configurations to enhance public safety in all modes of transportation. With the study, it was recommended to replace the aging intersection signal system at the intersection of Elm Avenue and at Oak Avenue with another signal system. It was also recommended to replace the signal system at Grove Avenue with a roundabout, however, with the relocation of the Owatonna High School, some traffic rerouting has occurred, and it has been requested that this intersection is re-evaluated again looking at a signal system prior to including its redesign in final construction documents. SEH is pleased to be given the opportunity to continue working with the County and City on this important community project.

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

We understand that this is Phase I of the CSAH 48 (Main Street) improvements, which will involve a complete reconstruction of the corridor from Oak Avenue to east of Grove Avenue. Phase II will be a concrete rehabilitation project from the end terminus of Phase I through the Chambers Avenue intersection. Phase II will happen at a later date depending on the availability of funds and other road improvement needs in the County.

The County and the City of Owatonna have asked SEH to design the street and utility plans for the reconstruction phase (Phase I) of the project, which will include new designs for the sanitary sewer, water main, storm sewer, and lighting utilities in the corridor, as well as implement a road diet to improve safe way of passage in the right-of-way for multiple modes of transportation. This work will also include traffic signal removal/replacement at the three signalized intersections along the corridor. The ultimate geometric configuration of Grove Avenue will be fully vetted with this project, however for the basis of this proposal it is assumed to remain under traffic signal control. We understand that Highway Safety Improvement Funding (HSIP) has been received to make traffic signal and ADA improvements at the Elm Street intersection.

PROJECT WORKPLAN

Task 1: Project Management

SEH project manager Jenna Obernolte will work with the SEH team to complete all aspects of this project to the County's satisfaction. Jenna will be responsible for tracking the budget and progress of the project as well as providing quality checks throughout the project duration.

Jenna will coordinate with the SEH team, the County, the City of Owatonna, and Owatonna Public Utilities (OPU) to ensure all critical decisions are well vetted and accurately communicated to the project stakeholders. Jenna will also track project status as it relates to the project schedule and deliverables. Effective project management for this project will require timely communication with the County and other stakeholders. At the commencement of this Contract, SEH will work with the County and City to develop the Project Management Team (PMT). These individuals will be responsible for guiding the project through final design and will help make design decisions as more information becomes available.

SEH has included weekly virtual half-hour conference calls with the County's PM for the duration of the project, assumed to be 11 months or 48 total meetings. In addition, large group PMT meetings are also proposed every month before construction documents have been completed. Twelve large group PMT meetings have been budgeted for this project.

Task 2: Public Involvement

Our public involvement for this project will be centered around being educational and informative with a focus on collaborating with adjacent property and business owners and partner agencies. We will also provide equivalent engagement opportunities both in-person and virtually to best align with stakeholders' preferences and schedules. Our recommended engagement plan includes the following tools and activities:

- Develop and periodically update a Public Involvement Plan (PIP) with insight from the PMT
- Host a minimum of (2) Public Open Houses one during the finalization of the layout with the
 preferred geometrics and roadway improvements identified and one prior to the start of
 construction to provide information regarding construction detours, construction staging, business
 access and timelines for construction related activities
- Develop (2) Project Mailings County to provide mailing list, SEH to print and send out
- Develop (2) Social Media Campaigns and Email Updates aligning with open house timelines
- Create and host a project website including materials, interactive feedback opportunities and ADA accessible content

Task 2 Deliverables: PIP, project website, social media post, assist with creation of news releases, public open houses (2)

Task 3: Surveys and Mapping

As part of the completed feasibility study for this corridor, all topographic surveying has been completed. It is anticipated that additional supplementary surveying will be needed in order to set right of way for the project corridor. The marking of existing right of way will aid in the identification of temporary and permanent easements needed to compete all sidewalk and curb ramp work to bring the existing facilities up to ADA standards.

Task 4: Public and Private Utility Identification and Coordination

SEH understands the importance of coordinating early and often with affected utilities to decrease the potential for delays during construction. SEH's Dan Horsch will work with the County, City of Owatonna, Owatonna Public Utilities and all private utilities to identify any potential utility adjustments and improvements that need to be made throughout the project limits. Coordination with OPU and the City of Owatonna will help inform final roadway design elements as well as ultimate construction staging, and possible temporary easement needs.

As part of this task, SEH will host three (3) utility coordination meetings. It is assumed that one meeting will occur in each phase of the project, data collection, finalization of roadway layout, and final design.

The cross sections and final roadway design plans will show all in-place utilities and proposed locations of utilities along the corridor. A utility tabulation for each utility will also be provided as part of the final design documents.

Task 4 Deliverables: Utility coordination meetings, meeting minutes

Task 5: Preliminary Hydraulics

This task will build on the work started with the feasibility study. SEH understands that the existing stormwater infrastructure is undersized throughout the project area. As part of the preliminary hydraulic analysis, we will provide a preliminary trunkline profile and sizes for the storm sewer based on State Aid standards and preliminary calculations and locations for permanent stormwater BMPs. SEH will work closely with the City of Owatonna, who currently has an ongoing study being completed evaluating the City's current stormwater systems and needs. Coordination will occur to have preliminary pipe sizing added to the City's storm sewer model and to determine whether opportunities exist for regional treatment or to develop cross sections and details for BMPs within the right of way.

Task 6: Environmental

Jennifer Force, PG will lead the environmental investigation of the project corridor to gain an understanding of contamination that might require mitigation during construction. In order to evaluate if contaminated soil and/or groundwater is present within the Project Corridor that would require special management or disposal during reconstruction activities, SEH will conduct a Modified Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) that will build off the results of the Environmental Desktop Review conducted as part of the Feasibility Study. As part of the Modified Phase I ESA, SEH will review and summarize available data from a range of sources including, but not limited to, regulatory databases, the Minnesota Well Index, historical topographic and fire insurance maps, historical aerial photographs, and regulatory files. We will also complete interviews and a site reconnaissance. We will prepare a Modified Phase I ESA report that summarizes and evaluates the data reviewed, ranks sites using Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) criteria and documents our findings and conclusions. The Modified Phase I ESA will be used to finalize the scope of work for the Phase II ESA and obtain

Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) approval of a Response Action Plan/Construction Contingency Plan (RAP/CCP) and liability assurances for planned property acquisitions, as needed.

To evaluate if impacted soil and/or groundwater is present within the Project Corridor, a Phase II ESA will be conducted to collect samples for field screening and chemical analyses. Sampling locations and analytical parameters will be determined based on the results of the Modified Phase I ESA and design documents; however, for the purposes of this proposal, it is assumed up to 10, 15-foot, push probe soil borings will be advanced. One to two soil samples will be collected from each soil boring for chemical analyses for volatile organic compounds (VOCs) using United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Method 8260, polynuclear aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) using EPA Methods 8270, the 8 Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) metals using EPA Methods 6010 and 7471, and gasoline/diesel range organics (GRO/DRO) using the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Method. One groundwater sample will also be collected from each soil boring for chemical analyses for VOCs, DRO and GRO. Following receipt of the analytical results, SEH will prepare a Phase II ESA Report documenting the results of the investigation. The report will include figures, tables, boring logs, laboratory reports, conclusions, and recommendations.

Information from the Phase II ESA along with the project design will be incorporated into a RAP for the project. The RAP will outline procedures for the management and handling of contaminated materials and other environmental issues that might arise during the project. Specifically, the RAP will describe how contamination will be handled, what sampling/monitoring activities will be completed during construction to characterize the Site conditions, proposed cleanup levels, and engineering controls. The RAP will also include a CCP that will outline procedures for appropriately managing and characterizing unidentified contamination that might be encountered. SEH will also incorporate information regarding the occurrence of contamination and proposed response actions into the project specifications. If desired by the County, the RAP/CCP will be submitted to the MPCA for review and approval by enrolling the project into the MPCA's Voluntary Brownfields Programs. We will also prepare Proposed Actions Letters requesting No Association Determinations on the County's behalf in the event contaminated soil or groundwater is identified on properties that will be acquired for the project. It's important to note the MPCA's Brownfields programs are fee for service programs, and they will invoice you separately for their review time.

Sam Turrentine will lead the SEH team in obtaining all information necessary to successfully complete the environmental review and documentation including the CATEX (Project Memorandum) for this project. The development of the environmental document will be processed in accordance with the May 1, 2020 FHWA/MnDOT Programmatic Categorical Exclusion Agreement. SEH will be responsible for using the Environmental Document Decision Tree to determine the appropriate level of CATEX document. The team will gather data from appropriate resource agencies and online sources to be used in the project analysis, evaluation and environmental documentation process. It is our understanding the 1st submittal of the Environmental document will be completed by December 1, 2025 with an approved environmental document by April 1, 2026.

Task 7: Traffic Analysis

Led by Chad Jorgenson, an evaluation of the CSAH 48 (Main Street) and Grove Avenue intersection will be completed. This analysis will help solidify recommendations for intersection control both in the near term and long term. A 13-hour traffic video was collected at this intersection in the Spring of 2024 with

school still in session and will serve as the basis of analysis and control evaluation. The intersection video that was collected will be processed through Count Cloud and will include separating out autos, heavy vehicles, pedestrians, and bicyclists.

A traffic operations analysis will be completed for both the AM and PM peak hours. All roundabout control operations will be conducted in RODEL to ensure that the design and operational analysis work together.

A detailed summary memorandum will be developed providing a summary of the analysis, assumptions, results, and recommendations for County and City review. Data from this analysis and the previously completed corridor study will be used to create a Roundabout Justification Report (RJR) if roundabout control is the chosen alternative.

In addition to this review, Signal Justification Reports will also be prepared for County, City and MnDOT State Aid review for the following signals:

- Oak Avenue
- Elm Avenue
- Grove Avenue

A Signal Removal Letter will also be prepared for the removal of the signal system at West Park Square.

In addition, the City's Crosswalk Policy will be reviewed to determine the potential need for an enhanced crossing system at the intersection of W Park Square.

Task 7 Deliverables: 13-Hour Traffic Count at Grove Avenue, Grove Avenue Traffic Analysis Memorandum, Signal Justification Report for Oak Avenue, Grove Avenue and Elm Avenue, Signal Removal Letter for West Park Square

Task 8: Preliminary Design and Cost Estimates

Led by Jenna Obernolte, this task will build upon the completed feasibility study. At this task's end, a final preliminary layout will be developed to serve as the base for final design documents.

SEH will provide a draft and final preliminary layout of the CSAH 48 (Main Street) corridor identifying all stormwater improvements, utility impacts, temporary and permanent easement needs, and construction limits. The layout will include draft profiles along CSAH 48 (Main Street) to help ensure design standards can be met. In addition, typical sections will be provided. Using the results from the Traffic Analysis in Task 7, the appropriate intersection control will be depicted on the final layout.

As part of this task, SEH will review the potential impacts of including an off-street, raised, cycle track along the project area and will evaluate the tradeoffs and impacts to the existing corridor, including parking, lanes widths, and intersection traffic control. Three separate alternatives will also be considered for the layout of Court Avenue SE and the connectivity of it to E Main Street. SEH will coordinate discussions with the primary stakeholders to evaluate the impacts of all alternatives and help the PMT decide the best option for the stakeholders, corridor and public.

Once a final layout is approved a preliminary cost estimate will be generated identifying cost splits between Steele County, the City of Owatonna and will identify items eligible for federal funding through the current HSIP grant award. SEH will continue to work with Steele County and the City of Owatonna to

pursue additional funding opportunity options that fit the project and would fit the design criteria already in place by the funding provided.

Task 8 Deliverables: Draft and Final Preliminary Design Layout depicting typical sections, horizontal and vertical alignment, and preliminary construction limits and proposed right of way, Preliminary Cost Estimate

Task 9: Right of Way

Our team will lead the identification and acquisition of the right of way/easements needed for the project improvements. This task includes ordering title work, parcel sketches, legal descriptions, field title investigations, coordination with property owners, making offers, and negotiations in accordance with the federal aid process. We have teamed with a Certified General Appraiser to determine just compensation for the impacted parcels. Our team has also teamed with an attorney to complete conveyance documentation for any permanent easements needed. For any easements that are not settled, we will work with the City to determine the next steps, including potential eminent domain proceedings.

Task 9 Deliverables: Title search, field title investigation, parcel sketches, electronic file submission, appraisals, direct purchase activities, and negotiations.

Task 10: Final Design

Following completion and acceptance of a preliminary geometric layout, final construction plans, special provisions and cost estimates will be generated. As part of the final design process, the SEH team will incorporate all public utility information and the drainage and recommendations from the drainage and hydraulic report to help develop final roadway design plans. Construction documents will follow MnDOT, MnDOT State Aid, AASHTO, Steele County, City of Owatonna and PROWAG standards.

SEH understands the need to get the roadway design to a point that right of way needs are identifiable as quickly as possible for the County to complete the right of way acquisition process prior to construction in 2028.

We propose to submit construction plans for review at the 60%, 95% and final (100%) benchmarks. Plans will be 11"x 17" half size sheets and can be provided in both hardcopy and PDF format. Estimates of construction costs (with appropriate cost splits) will be developed for all plan submittals. Plans and project documents will be prepared following submitted following the Delegated Contract Process (DCP), with plan review checklists and forms as part of SEH's internal QA/QC process. Comments received through these submittals will be reviewed and incorporated as appropriate into the final plans and special provisions.

SEH will prepare a draft project manual following Steele County and the City of Owatonna's procedures and content. The draft will be updated/finalized prior to advertising for bids by the County.

Task 10 Deliverables: 60/95/100% Roadway Design Plans, Cost Estimates, Project Manual, DCP Checklist, QA/QC Documentation

Task 11: City Streetscaping

The streetscape plan for this project must be consistent with guidance from the 2019 Downtown Streetscape Study. A cohesive design will complement other areas of Downtown as they have been reconstructed, such as North Cedar Avenue. Improving user experience is a priority in this area. It includes safety, connectivity and circulation for people walking, rolling, biking and driving.

Streetscape elements that create or enhance pedestrian, bicycle and parking facilities and delineate space for each mode of travel provide safe passage and improve comfort for all users. Space for street furniture and pedestrian lighting must also be incorporated, along with green infrastructure options that improve water quality while enhancing aesthetics and livability.

Landscape Architect Karl Weissenborn will work with Steele County and the City of Owatonna to identify the appropriate treatments to enhance safety and the user experience along the corridor.

Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Chair Lammers at 7:00 pm. Present were Smith, Lammers, Pool, Gillis, Spatenka, Queen, Cole, Commissioner Brady and staff member Brooks.

Agenda:

Motion by Queen, second by Cole to approve the agenda as submitted. Motion passed unanimously.

Minutes:

Motion by Spatenka, second by Cole to approve the February 3rd, 2025, minutes as submitted. Motion passed unanimously.

Building Permits:

The building permits for February, and March were reviewed.

CUP 441 (Richland Grain LLC)

This request is from Matt Holland with Richland Grain LLC requests to use a silage bunker, two (2) manure pits, and a slurry store, currently located on property located in the NW ½, of the SW ¼, Section 20, Clinton Falls Township, for the temporary storage of the following industrial byproducts (IBP): sweet corn silage and sweetcorn leachate. The property address is 3151 NW 50th St.

Questions and comments of the commission.

As there were no questions or comments, from the commission hearing was closed.

The public hearing was opened.

Matt Holland- Explained that the land is currently a feedlot and stated that the operations will be the same with the addition of temporary storage of Industrial By-Products (sweet corn silage and sweetcorn leachate).

Lammers- Is the sweetcorn silage coming from Owatonna?

Holland- That was the original plan, but it didn't work out that way.

Dave Stursa- What is the smell going to be like for all the commercial properties down the road? Voiced concerns about Crane Creek being right next to the property.

Holland- The smell would be the same as if we brought silage in to feed the cows, it would not be any different then it is now being a feedlot. The farm before worked with soil and water to design the bunkers incase of flooding to ensure that there would be no runoff.

As there were no questions or comments, the public hearing was closed.

Smith- How many times will the site be pumped?

Holland- Mostly in the spring and the fall.

Lammers- Is the tank open or covered?

Holland- It is open.

Spatenka- Have we had a complaint about the surrounding comp

Spatenka- Have we had a complaint about the surrounding companies and their waste? *Brooks- No complaints*

Motion by Spatenka, second by Queen to recommend approval of CUP 441 (Richland Grain LLC) with the following 6 conditions: (underlined is added, strikethrough is deleted)

- 1. The site must be operated in a manner that does not create offensive odors to the neighboring residential used properties.
- 2. The site must be rodent free at all times.
- 3. Silage and manure pit wall height must be certified as above the base flood elevation.
- 4. PVC holes in manure pit wall must be plugged.
- 5. Storage of industrial by-products must comply with all MPCA requirements.
- 6. Once issued, this CUP may be revoked, following notice and hearing, and upon finding(s) established by the Planning Commission that the Subject Property and/or use is not in compliance with the Conditions of Approval as stated herein.
- 7. The driveway to the west must be removed.
- 8. Equipment, including trucks entering and exiting, shall only be operated between the hours of 6:00 AM and 7:00 PM. Monday thru Saturday.
- 9. Limit the number of trucks to (2) two per day.

Motion passed unanimously.

CUP 299 (Dietz Pit)

This request is from Loken Excavation and Drainage to mine sand and gravel in the E ½ of the NW ¼ and the SW ¼ of Section 29, Owatonna Township on property owned by David Dietz.

Questions and comments of the commission.

As there were no questions or comments, from the commission hearing was closed.

The public hearing was opened.

As there were no questions or comments, the public hearing was closed.

Discussion by the planning commission.

Motion by Smith, second by Gillis to recommend approval of the renewal of CUP 299 (Dietz Pit) With the following 16 conditions:

- 1. Mining is limited to areas identified on the submitted site map.
- 2. Mining is limited to a bottom depth of 1125 feet.
- 3. The access road to the site shall be gated with the gate installed so that it does not swing into the road right-of-way.
- 4. A stop sign shall be maintained on the access road as it enters onto County Road 18.
- 5. Signage warning of truck traffic shall be located along county road 18, as directed by the Steele County Highway Department
- 6. Hours of operation shall be between 6:00 AM and 7:00 PM Monday thru Saturday.
- 7. The applicant shall be responsible to maintain dust control on the access road, and in the pit if necessary.
- 8. A 30-foot unexcavated buffer with 3:1 side slope shall remain adjacent to all property lines. Any erosion to neighboring properties as a result of this mine shall be corrected by the applicant.
- 9. A 30-foot vegetated buffer shall be left adjacent to the drainage ditch.
- 10. Stockpiles of aggregate material, recycled material and any equipment shall not be placed in a manner that will impede water flow during a flood event.
- 11. No hazardous material may be stored in the floodplain areas.
- 12. To prevent erosion and minimize visual impacts, interim closure (e.g., stabilized slopes and vegetation) shall occur on excavation exposures and soil storage areas inactive for greater than 18 months.
- 13. Final reclamation shall be completed in phases that have been inactive for greater than five years. Final reclamation shall include grading slopes to a 4:1 slope or greater, replacing topsoil, and vegetating exposed areas not used for cropland or reclaimed to open water.
- 14. Applicant is responsible to obtain and follow all other federal, state, and local permits and regulations including but not limited to NPDES permits, DNR Water Appropriation Permits, and Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act regulations.
- 15. Applicant is responsible to initiate renewal proceeding on or before May 1st, 2025, 2030.
- 16. This permit remains valid during times when the owner/operator is current on all tax obligations including but not limited to aggregate taxes. In addition, if notified by the Auditor of a delinquency, the owner/operator is required to either pay the tax or file an appropriate challenge within 30 days or else the permit is null and void.
- 17. The access road shall be maintained in a manner that prevents trucks from tracking material onto the public road.

Motion passed unanimously.

Renewal of IUP 2015-02 (Hafstad Pit)

This request is from Loken Excavation and Drainage to mine sand and gravel in the SE ¼ of the SE ¼, Section 30, Owatonna Township on property owned by Richard Hafstad.

Questions and comments of the commission.

As there were no questions or comments, from the commission hearing was closed.

The public hearing was opened.

As there were no questions or comments, the public hearing was closed.

Discussion by the planning commission.

Motion by Queen, second by Pool to recommend approval of the renewal of IUP 2015-02 With the following 16 conditions:

- 1. Mining is limited to the 10 acres areas identified in the application. Before excavation can begin the boundary of the area shall be clearly marked onsite at the corners and a minimum of every 300 feet along all perimeters.
- 2. Mining is limited to a bottom elevation of 1125 feet. (Approximately 25 feet deep)
- 3. A 30-foot unexcavated buffer shall remain adjacent to all property lines and road right of ways. Any erosion to neighboring properties as a result of this mine shall be corrected immediately by the applicant. Setbacks between properties may be eliminated by written agreement of both property owners.
- 4. Equipment shall only be operated between the hours of 6:00 AM and 7:00 PM. Monday thru Saturday.
- 5. The operator shall use the existing access through the Dietz Pit onto County Road 18. The establishment of any new accesses shall require the permit approval by the road authority.
- 6. Signage warning of truck traffic shall be located along the County Road 18. The size and placement of these signs shall be at the direction of the Steele County Highway Department.
- 7. Trucks shall not track material from the pit onto the public road.
- 8. Trucks hauling material to and from this site shall not use "jake brakes."
- 9. Operator is responsible to maintain dust control in the pit and on the access road so excessive dust does not negatively affect neighboring properties or highway traffic.
- 10. Operator shall maintain the viability of any existing private drainage system at all times during the operation of the pit.
- 11. Water from the pit shall not be discharged onto any neighboring property without written permission from that property owner. Discharge flowing to adjoining ditches or streams shall meet the MN Pollution Control Agency standards for total suspended solids.
- 12. The applicant shall follow their submitted reclamation plan. Final reclamation shall include grading slopes to a 4:1 slope or flatter. A consistent slope must be maintained below the final waterline to a depth of 6 feet. Topsoil must be replaced on upland areas and revegetated if not used for cropland.
- 13. This permit remains valid during times when the owner/operator is current on all tax obligations including but not limited to aggregate taxes. In addition, if notified by the Auditor of a delinquency, the owner/operator is required to either pay the tax or file an appropriate challenge within 30 days or else the permit is null and void.
- 14. Applicant is responsible to obtain and follow all other federal, state, and local permits and regulations including but not limited to NPDES permits, DNR Water Appropriation Permits, and Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act regulations.
- 15. Applicant is responsible to initiate renewal proceeding on or before May 1st, 2025, 2030 or this permit becomes invalid.
- 16. The permittee shall furnish bond or other financial surety as approved by the county, for potential site restoration. The bond or other financial surety shall be in an amount of \$5,000 per acre x 13 15.5 acres for a total amount of \$65,000 \$77,500 and remain in place for 6 years from the date this permit is issued or until the total site is reclaimed and the reclamation is approved by Steele County.

Renewal of IUP 2010-02 (Schult Pit)

This request is from Loken Drainage Inc. to mine sand and gravel on property located in the S ½ of the SW ¼, Section 9, Lemond Township, on property owned by Larry Schultz.

Discussion by the planning commission.

Motion by Queen, second by Cole to recommend approval of the renewal of IUP 2010-02 With the following 18 conditions:

- 1. All mining and stockpiling activities are limited to the areas as identified in the application and marked onsite and approved by the Soil and Water Conservation District. No mining or stockpiling of soil or material shall be allowed outside of this area.
- 2. Mining is limited to a bottom elevation of 1148 feet. (Approximately 15 to 20 feet deep)
- 3. All access roads shall be gated with the gate installed so that it does not swing into the road right-of-way.
- 4. When more than 5 trucks per day enter the pit, signage warning of truck traffic shall be located along County Road #7 or SW 68th St if requested by the township. The size and placement of these signs shall be at the direction of the Steele County Highway Department and/or the Lemond Township.
- 5. Dust control shall be maintained in the pit at all times so that dust from the operation or truck traffic does not negatively affect nearby properties or traffic on County Road #7.
- 6. Trucks shall not track material from the pit onto public roads.
- 7. Hours of operation shall be between 6:00 AM and 7:00 PM. Monday thru Saturday.
- 8. Trucks hauling material to and from this site shall not use "jake brakes."
- 9. The applicant shall follow their submitted reclamation plan. Final reclamation shall include grading slopes to a 4:1 slope or flatter, replacing topsoil, and vegetating exposed areas not used for cropland or reclaimed to open water. No more than 10 acres of open excavation shall be allowed at one time.
- 10. A 30 feet unexcavated buffer shall remain adjacent to all property lines. Any erosion to neighboring properties as a result of this mine shall be corrected by the applicant.
- 11. All excavation shall be setback from the road right-of-way a minimum of 100 feet unless a berm is installed along County Road #7. This berm shall be a minimum of 5 feet high and seeded to prevent erosion.
- 12. Storage piles of recyclable aggregate materials shall not exceed 30,000 cubic yards. These piles shall not remain onsite more than 5 years unless crushed.
- 13. This permit remains valid during times when the owner/operator is current on all tax

- obligations including but not limited to aggregate taxes. In addition, if notified by the Auditor of a delinquency, the owner/operator is required to either pay the tax or file an appropriate challenge within 30 days or else the permit is null and void.
- 14. The operator shall pay a user fee for industrial discharge into the Judicial Ditch #5 agricultural drainage system. The discharge shall be metered by the operator with the amount of discharge and payment made to the Auditor by the 14th day of January of each year. The discharge rate shall be \$.10 per 10,000 gallons of discharge.
- 15. Applicant is responsible to obtain and follow all other federal, state, and local permits and regulations including but not limited to NPDES permits, DNR Water Appropriation Permits, and Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act regulations.
- 16. Applicant is responsible to initiate renewal proceeding on or before June 1, 2025, <u>2030,</u> or this permit becomes invalid.
- 17. Trucks hauling loads to or from this pit must comply with all road weight limits and restrictions.
- 18. The permittee shall furnish bond or other financial surety as approved by the county, for potential site restoration. The bond or other financial surety shall be in an amount of \$5,000 per acre x 28 acres for a total amount of \$140,000 and remain in place for 6 years from the date this permit is issued or until the total site is reclaimed and the reclamation is approved by Steele County.

County Sheriff: New drop-off boxes are being delivered. The mandated encryption of radio traffic went live.

Detention Center: Staffing is stabilized. Female section of the detention center is open.

Emergency Management: MCIT renewal process is underway. Building appraisals are completed (every five-year process) Seventeen schools in Steele County are on board with the mapping project. This number includes public and private schools.

Finance: Joint dispatch audit submitted last week. Steele County audit is due May 15th. Budget meeting is tomorrow afternoon with the commissioners. Grant process for the homeless funds has begun.

Public Health: New case manager starts on Monday. Public Health Services will be meeting with a group at Trinity Church where PH will explain what they do.
