# **Permits You May Need**

DRIVEWAY PERMITS: Are issued by the Town Engineer. A driveway permit protects the Town's interest in the road the driveway connects to. The permit process also helps ensure the driveway's location is in a safe place for both how visible it is to the traveling public and how well a person exiting the driveway can see approaching traffic. Driveway permits are required for almost anything you may do to your driveway in the vicinity of the town road. This includes paving a gravel driveway or repaving an existing paved driveway. If you are having your driveway paved, you need a driveway permit.

WORKING IN THE RIGHT-OF-WAY PERMIT: Working in the right-of-way permits are issued by the Town Engineer in an effort to ensure that the Town's infrastructure remains in working order. The right-of-way extends about 14 feet beyond the traveled portion of a road. Exactly how far beyond depends on several factors, but if your work is close to the road, contact the Town Engineer at (802) 479-2595 to ask for help.

BUILDING PERMIT: Building a shed, a deck, a garage, or pretty much anything else outside more than 64 square feet in size, it is likely requires a Building Permit. A valid building permit takes about 25 days to obtain so you should plan and allow ample time before you begin your project. Projects 64 square feet or less do not need a building permit.

BURN PERMIT: If you're going to have an outside fire you



may need a permit. Fires that are larger than an ordinary backyard campfire will need a permit. It is important to remember that you can ONLY burn legal material such as natural untreated wood and leaves. The Fire Warden

can be reached by calling 802-498-8694 and leave a message. The Warden will call you back to discuss your plans and may require a site visit before he issues the permit. The burning of trash is never legal and is enforced by the Police Department with steep fines.

If in doubt about whether you need a permit for something, or you want to obtain applications, please call the Planning and Zoning Office at 802-479-2595. We are happy to help. Most permit applications are also available at <a href="mailto:barretown.org/permits">barretown.org/permits</a> and <a href="mailto:forms">forms</a>.

FIREWORKS PERMIT: If you are planning a fireworks display, please remember a permit is required by law. Those who do not obtain a permit could be found guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00 or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days or by both, (V.S.A. § 3135).

Fireworks as defined in V.S.A., Title 20 § 3131 means any combustible or explosive composition, or any substance or combination of substances, or article prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by explosion,

deflagration, or detonation. These include, but are not limited to firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman candles, and cherry bombs.

Contact the Town Clerk's Office to pick up a fireworks permit application. You can also find the application on the Town website, www.barretown.org. All requests must be

submitted to the Town Clerk's Office at least <u>fifteen (15)</u> days in advance of the display. The application fee is \$25.00. This can be paid by cash, check or credit card. Please note when using a credit card there is an additional convenience fee.

The Barre Town Fire Chief, Chief of Police, and Selectboard will review each application. They have the authority to deny or place restrictions on requests.

Keep your family, friends, and neighbors safe and remember to obtain your firework display permit! As always, contact the Town Clerk's Office for any questions (802) 479-9391.

# Audio-Visual Equipment Upgrade in Town Meeting Rooms

During the pandemic, it became obvious to many organizations that their existing equipment was not suited to holding effective meetings if some people were gathered and others were joining remotely. The Barre Town Budget Committee and Selectboard decided an audio-visual equipment upgrade would be useful during and after the pandemic. After reviewing designs and proposals from several vendors, the town chose to work with Fuzz Buzz Technologies, from South Burlington. Two systems have been installed.

The largest conference room in the municipal building, where the Selectboard meets, has three large TV screens so those in the room may easily see people joining remotely, or presentations shared by someone in the room or remotely. The audio system includes a sophisticated microphone array that filters out unwanted noise, helps those in the room who are hard of hearing, and effectively picks up voices of those almost anywhere in the room for the benefit of those joining remotely. The camera system can automatically point and zoom to those speaking in the room. You can see this system in action during

Selectboard or Development Review Board meetings. This system, with associated electrical work, cost \$52,968.73. The Selectboard is considering a change order to allow voices to be heard from anywhere in the room.

Another conference room, which also serves as the town's Emergency Operations Center, now has one large smart board and a webcam. Meetings with fewer people in the room can now be effectively held in this room. If the Emergency Operations Center were activated, the smart board could be used as a collaborative white board. You can see this system in action during Recreation Board or Planning Commission meetings. This system cost \$5,979.62.

#### (Cont'd - Budget Vote Information)

This year (fiscal year 2022-2023) the Town has ten fund budgets; one more than last year. The state mandated the records (land records) restoration fee revenue and expenses for eligible uses of the revenue be kept in a separate fund. The revenue and three expense accounts were moved from the GF to the new Records Restoration Fund budget, which totals \$18,770.

A Budget Committee of five citizens and the five Select-board members reviewed all ten budgets. The five citizens on the Budget Committee were Tony Amaral, Phil Cecchini, Alan Garceau, Mike Gilbar and Chris Neddo. The committee met every Tuesday night for at least two hours from January 25 to March 29. On its last night the Committee voted to make changes to four of the fund budgets. The final total of the GF and HF are presented to the voters for approval. The Committee adopted the other eight fund budgets.

The proposed GF and HF budgets total \$7,791,161, which is an increase of \$409,340 or 5.54% over current budgets. The estimated tax rate increase for the two budgets is 3.83¢.

The proposed GF budget amount is \$4,418,306, which is an increase of \$174,190 or 4.10%. The GF tax rate increase would be 1.58¢. The budget is balanced (revenues equal expenses). 87.04% of revenues would be produced by current year property taxes, a slight increase over the '21-'22 figure. The GF proposes two notable staff changes: a full-time, year-round recreation director and a temporary full-time police officer.

There are 24 departments in the GF budget. The five largest department budgets are: 1) Police (\$1,016,115); 2) EMS (\$599,780); 3) Employee Benefits (\$587,435); 4) Fire (\$414,115); and 5) Recreation (\$272,350). By percentage the biggest changes are in: 1) Animal Control (-60.28%); 2) Recreation (+41.28%); 3) Board of Civil Authority/Elections (+40.02%); 4) Selectboard (+20.35%) and 5) Finance Office (-16.73%). In dollars, the five greatest department changes are: 1) Recreation (+\$79,580); 2) Police (+\$70,275); 3) Finance Office (-\$38,,115); 4) EMS (+\$26,680); and 5) Town Clerk's Office (-\$24,235).

In addition to the recreation director there is one other notable item in the Recreation budget. \$75,000 for replacing baseball field light poles is listed in the budget. The capital improvements account where the light poles are lodged is not rising \$75,000, however, because FY '21-'22's capital improvements are not repeated. The account increase is \$40,555. With salary, payroll expenses and benefits the recreation director position is adding \$69,250 to the budget. Yes, the sum of these two items is greater than the total Recreation increase. Other accounts (bleacher railings, one-half of the cemetery sexton/rec maintenance supervisor salary, East Barre Bike Path gravel) offset the two large additions.

The Police budget is proposed to increase \$70,275. The temporary full-time officer accounts for \$46,430 of that amount.

The new Finance Office Department's FY '21-22 budget included \$48,000 to help with the transition from a private bookkeeping/accounting service to town staff. That \$48,000 is not repeated, however, \$6,000 was added to the cost estimate for the independent audit in case a single audit is needed.

Barre Town's payment (per capita fee) into its own Ambulance Fund is going up \$26,680 for two leading reasons: 1) adding a part-time administrative assistant; and 2) fee for billing services.

To help with hiring and transition in the town manager position, an extra \$16,890 is budgeted in the Selectboard and Town Manager's Office budgets.

The Animal Control budget is small (\$9,870 currently). This budget is reduced 60.28% because animal control wages were eliminated. The temporary full-time police officer will follow up on animal nuisance complaints. The Board of Civil Authority budget is up 40.02% because of the two state elections during the summer and fall of 2022.

For '22-'23 the proposed HF budget is \$3,372,855. That amount is \$235,150 or 7.49% greater than the current budget. Property taxes would generate 93.70% of all revenues. The tax rate would go up an estimated 2 1/4 ¢. This budget is balanced. Like the GF, staffing changes are planned. A public works person would be added and one of the contracted snow plowing routes would be cut. This change gives the public works department one more employee for completing warm weather tasks.

The HF has nine department. The five largest department budgets are: 1) Winter Maintenance (\$819,810); 2) Retreatment (paving) (\$593,945); 3) Summer Maintenance (\$567,630); 4) Employee Benefits (\$499,820); and 5) Summer Construction (milling and paving) (\$469,885).

The five greatest changes to by dollar amount are: 1) Summer Construction (+\$98,070); 2) Retreatment (+\$83,505); 3) Employee Benefits (+\$61,065); 4) Summer Maintenance (-\$24,600); and 5) Gravel Pit (+\$9,675).

The five greatest changes by percentage are: 1) Grant Projects (-\$35.70%); 2) Summer Construction (+26.37%); 3) Retreatment (+16.35%); (Continued on page 4)

4) Gravel Pit (+14.48%); and 5) Employee Benefits (+13.91%)

The proposed 2022 road paying work (see article on page 6) and the additional employee account for all but \$12,430 of the \$235,150 budget increase. Due to rising oil prices the estimated cost per ton of asphalt paved was increased 9.72%, or from \$72 per ton to \$79 per ton. The paving accounts in Retreatment and Summer Construction are up \$77,720. The work plan for 2022 includes more payement milling (cost per square yard is the same) raising the Summer Construction department account for milling by \$35,855. Other road paving expenses - labor, equipment use, and materials are estimated \$68,000 higher than the current year.

With benefits, payroll expenses and wages the additional employee will cost \$72,675. However, because of the extra help, \$3,200 budgeted for hiring trucks was eliminated as was \$28,420 for a contracted plow route. The net expense for the additional employee is \$41,055.

The employee Benefits department is higher because of Worker's Compensation (\$15,890), health insurance (+\$14,930) and pension (+\$8,170). The amount of these increases are not due to the new position. Grant Projects is \$7,140 or 35.70% less because the \$10,000 set aside for the Quarry Street intersection project is not repeated.

Finally, in the Gravel Pit budget \$6,000 is planned for exploring and testing for a new source of sand and gravel on a parcel of land the Town owns.

#### **Notice of Change in Appraisal**

The property taxes you pay to Barre Town are used to maintain town roads, provide emergency services, keep and improve recreation facilities, and more. Property taxes are based on the value of property as determined by the town's assessor, who is appointed by the Selectboard. This value determination is also known as an assessment or appraisal. Property assessment is designed to be a fair, equitable process, but it is not an exact science. Therefore, taxpayers have the opportunity to appeal the appraised value of their property every year. The 2022 grand list of all property values will be available at the Town Office in the first week of June. When it is, notices that it is available will be posted on the town website, in the Times Argus, at grocery stores, and post offices around town. This notice is known as "the lodging of the abstract grand list." The appraisal for your property may be changed by the Barre Town Assessor, Russ Beaudoin, if there have been structural changes or building permits since the 2021 grand list. In this case, you will be mailed a notice the same day the abstract grand list is lodged.

Any taxpayer, whether their property appraisal has changed or not, may dispute their property appraisal through the Property Assessment Appeal Hearings process. This process is set by state law. If you wish to dispute your property appraisal, follow this process:

Step 1: File a grievance with the Assessor in writing within 14 days from the lodging of the abstract grand list.

When the Assessor receives your grievance, he will schedule a grievance hearing with you. The hearing can be COVID-safe if appropriate. The purpose of the Assessor's grievance hearing is to discover any possible errors or omissions in determining the value of a property. The burden of proof and persuasion is on the taxpayer. It is recommended that you provide documentation to show that the assessment is unfair. Upon completing the hearings, the Assessor will mail the taxpayer notification of his decision.

Step 2: Appeal to the Board of Civil Authority (BCA) by writing to the Town Clerk within 14 days from the date that the Assessor mailed the notice of his decision from the appeal hearing (Step 1 above). The Town Clerk will notify you of the way the BCA hearing will be held depending on the COVID-19 situation. The purpose of the BCA property assessment appeal hearing is for the BCA to judge whether the property being appealed was assessed fairly when compared to other, similar, properties in town. Again, the burden of proof and persuasion is on the taxpayer. All parties may introduce any relevant material and evidence (including, while under oath, verbally describing facts) during this hearing, whether or not that evidence was submitted previously to the Assessor. After the presentation of evidence and cross-examination, the BCA will appoint an inspection committee of three members to inspect the property and submit written findings to the full BCA within 30 days of the date of the BCA hearing. During the property inspection, property owners are not to engage in conversation pertaining to the appeal unless questions are asked by the inspection committee. Within 15 days of the BCA receiving the inspection committee report, the board will report and list reasons for their decision. The Town Clerk certifies the decision, records it in the grand list book, and notifies the property owner in writing of the decision by certified mail. Step 3: Appeal to either the state hearing officer or Superior Court within 30 days of the Town Clerk mailing the notice of the BCA decision (Step 2 above).

Step 4: Appeal to the Vermont Supreme Court.

# Disable Veteran's Tax Exemption Reminder

And, proof of eligibility to the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs is due by May 1.

#### **CFLRF Update**

A February newsletter article described the United States Treasury's (UST) new Final Rule about the coronavirus local fiscal recovery funds (CLFRF). The Final Rule contained a surprising provision offering the option to elect a standard allowance for revenue loss. The standard deduction could be the full amount of the CLFRF grant or up to \$10,000,000, whichever is less. On April 12 the Selectboard will be asked to authorize Barre Town make the one-time irrevocable decision to elect the standard allowance approach for CLFRF award in the amount of \$2,307,709 to spend on the provision of government services throughout the period of grant performance.

Because of budget work the Selectboard has not discussed use of CLFRF since January. However, action has been taken on the five leading uses reported in the February article. The digital audio/visual equipment in the Selectboard Meeting Room and lower lever conference room has been installed. (See article on page 3.) The radio system for the public works, ambulance and fire departments has been researched and discussed at the staff level. New base radios, antennae and associated cabling is needed to replace existing 20+ year old base radios. Those radios are needed regardless of the tower site eventually selected and can be moved. A decision about ordering that equipment is imminent. Engineering work is underway and the state permit for the DPW Yard stormwater facility has been submitted. Pipe necessary for the project was ordered. Engineering work for the Jail Branch waterline crossing is being coordinated with the Agency of Transportation and almost is complete (See article on Page 6.) The water pipe and parts for the project will be ordered soon to be sure it is on hand when needed next spring. Bids for the Upper Websterville waterline contract are due April 21.

Since the end of January three new suggestions/requests for use of the CLFRF have been submitted: two by town officials and one from the public. The Selectboard will discuss use of the funds during upcoming meetings.

# **ARPA Funding Available for You**

Homeowners: Late on your bills due to the pandemic? The Vermont Housing Finance Agency (VHFA) is accepting applications from Vermont homeowners who are behind on their housing expenses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Funded through the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, the Vermont Homeowner Assistance Program provides grants for eligible Vermont homeowners for missed payments on their mortgage, utilities, including water and sewer, electricity, and home heating, as well as property taxes, and homeowner's or condominium association fees. The program is restricted to expenses related to a homeowner's primary home. Other eligibility criteria also apply. If applicants are approved, payments will be made directly to service providers. Renters: The Vermont Emergency Rental Assistance Program (VERAP) was created to help renters dealing with financial challenges related to the COVID-19 pandemic. For eligible households, the program offers rental and utility assistance to help Vermonters avoid eviction or loss of utility service. Find out more at erap.vsha.org.

#### Home Water and Septic System Help

The governor and state legislature allocated \$1 million of ARPA funds to the Agency of Natural Resources (ANR), which will use the money to assist owner/applicant-occupied single and multi-unit (up to 4) residential properties that have failing or inadequate on-site water and/or wastewater systems. This program will help income eligible homeowners with their water well and septic system (tank and leach field).

The ANR website states Tier 1 households earn less than \$65,000 per year and Tier 2 households earn \$65,000 to about \$120,000.

The first application period closed April 15. Starting April 16 applications will be accepted on a rolling basis and funding will be provided as available. The website states, "Additional funding is anticipated in future fiscal years."

#### Private Stormwater Facility

Property owners with three or more acres of impervious surface (e.g. rooftops, pavement, gravel surfaces) are required to have pollution reducing stormwater treatment. The state has allocated \$9 million this fiscal year (ending June 30, 2022) to help citizens and businesses comply with these regulations. The funding will help owners, "with technical support on permitting aspects, construction oversight and construction." # **Project Updates**

Websterville Waterline Project: This summer the Websterville Water System will continue the waterline upgrades that were started two years ago. This will be the final stage of the waterline upgrade. The remaining work to be completed on Libercent, Brook Street, and Violette Street will take place this summer. The project is out to bid this spring and construction will start mid to late summer. The project will upgrade the waterlines from 4-inch water line to 8-inch waterlines, which helps with water quality and required fire flows for hydrants. Any questions about the project please contact the Town Engineer at (802) 479-2595.

VT 110 Bridge: Vermont Agency of Transportation, VTrans, is in the design process of replacing the VT 110 bridge located near the roundabout in East Barre. With new funding sources the project has been fast tracked for construction next summer, 2023. The project will be put out to bid this fall with work commencing early summer. VT 110 will be shut down with a detour for 60 days during construction. The detour will direct traffic to use Websterville Road to Quarry Hill Road through Barre City to US 302. Old 302 will remain open during construction. Also, part of the reconstruction of the bridge is the installation of a waterline. The water line is needed to provide sufficient water flows for hydrants on the roundabout side of the river. #### **Ash Tree Removal**

During the winter of 2021-2022 the department of public works finished removing ash trees from rights-of-way along Cutler Corner, lower Phelps, Belding, Maplecrest, Jalbert, Anderson, Nuissl, Pierce, Sierra-Lavin and Osborne Roads. Letters recently were mailed to property owners along Lyman Road and East Cobble Hill Road between West Cobble Hill and

Sunnyside Drive. Because of warmer weather, public works might begin spring and summer work earlier than usual, thus ash tree removal along these two roads might not be completed in April.

Next fall or winter, DPW will resume ash tree cutting by finishing Lyman Road and East Cobble Hill from Sunnyside to West Cobble Hill. The next roads on the mailing and work list are: lower Sunset, Higuera, Windywood, Sugarwoods, Taplin, Partridge and the remainder of East Cobble Hill Road.

If you receive a property owner letter and want the wood from trees cut down, please take note of the instructions to call the DPW and ask that the wood be left for you.

Homeowners should determine if there are ash trees near their home or lawn. If there are ash trees near buildings or frequently used areas, consideration should be given to removing the trees before they succumb to damage inflicted by the emerald ash borer. #### **CV Fiber Positions**

Barre Town is a member of the communication union district (CUD) known as CV Fiber. Every municipal member (there are 21) may appoint a primary board member and an alternate board member. Both of Barre Town's positions are vacant at this time. Recently the Town's primary representative stepped down due to new work responsibilities. Several months before that the alternate accepted the position of treasurer for CV Fiber necessitating his resignation from the alternate board member position.

CV Fiber's mission is to bring high speed (through use of fiber optic cabling) to every address in the 21 town district. CV Fiber has progressed quickly since its inception in 2018. A full-time executive director experienced in telecommunications has been hired. The district has begun installing cable, and thanks to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding CV Fiber is planning for much more work in 2022. CV Fiber holds remote meetings on the second Tuesday of each month.



# **Bulk Trash Collection**



The spring bulk trash collection will be held on its regularly scheduled date. The service is for disposal of large (bulky) items that won't fit into a trash bag. The service is for town residents to clean up around their home. It is not intended for business use nor for landlords to clean up rental property. Residents must bring a tax or utility bill or this newsletter with mailing label, and a driver's license to verify residency.

Items or materials accepted are listed below. Extra explanation or instructions are needed for some items.

When: Saturday, May 14, 2022 Time: 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Place: DPW Yard, 129 Websterville Road

Cost: See below

- Roofing shingles No vans or box trailers with loose shingles will be accepted. Shingles must be in containers boxes, buckets, bags or tubs. Loose loads (in cars, pick-up trucks, or open trailer) will be directed to the side and unloaded when no other user is waiting for service. The per vehicle prices listed below are doubled for all loads containing shingles.
- Concrete, asphalt, bricks, blocks, large stones These items are set aside for recycling. Don't mix in with other materials. Concrete must be free of wire and rebar.
- Building demo Small pieces of sheetrock, plaster, tile, wood scraps, etc. must be in buckets, boxes, barrels or other containers for
  ease of unloading. Loose loads will be directed to wait for a break in the line. Larger pieces of lumber, vinyl siding, wood siding,
  gutters and the like must be cut to easily handled lengths and bundled.

# **Examples of Accepted Items**

Mattresses, box springs, furniture
Large plastic toys, porcelain fixtures
Carpets, pool liners and covers
Building demolition materials such as siding, windows,
doors and lumber, roofing shingles
Concrete, asphalt, bricks, blocks and large stones.

At the unloading station please stay in your vehicle, unless the workers ask for your help with the tailgate or straps. Salvaging is permitted. Volunteers will place items with potential for re-use outside the front gate. When checking out these items be mindful of traffic.








# Green Up Day is May 7

Green Up Day is the first Saturday of May. Citizen and group volunteers may select a roadside(s) or public space to be cleaned up. Check the static sign-up sheet posted on the town website (<a href="https://www.barretown.org">www.barretown.org</a>). A link to the list is provided in the Green Up announcement. When a roadside(s) or public place is selected stop by the town

manager's office or call 479-9331, M-F, 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. Green up bags, latex gloves and safety information are distributed through the manager's office.



Green Up can begin anytime starting in late April and extend until a few days after May 7. Please tie bags shut and leave by the roadside. Large items (tires, other car parts, furniture and so on) can be left by the roadside too. Town public works employees will collect the bags and large items for disposal.

Vermont Green Up provides the free bags. The Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District reimburses the Town \$400 for disposal expenses.

Most years there is a volunteer Green Up coordinator who might host a volunteer BBQ lunch or collect small gifts to raffle off to volunteers. To date there is no coordinator this year. The manager's office would like to hear from anyone interested in serving as the coordinator in 2023.

# Wilson Depot - Trash and Everyday Recyclables

The trash, recycling, and food scrap (compost) drop-off station at the Wilson Depot in the Wilson Industrial Park is open on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, 8 am to 4 pm. This station is operated by Casella Waste

Management.

Current fees for trash are \$3 - \$7.50 per bag depending on the size. The fees are less for seniors. Recycling costs \$2.50 for up to the first 30 gallons and \$1.25 for each additional 15 gallons; cardboard costs \$5 per yard. Numerous other metal items such as appliances, bicycles, and push mowers may be recycled for free. Refrigerators, freezers, AC units, and dehumidifiers are \$20-\$40 each because of the chemicals in these items. Fees for bulky items like carpeting and furniture vary from \$10 - \$40 depending on the size. Electronics such as tvs, monitors, computers and printers are not accepted at the Depot. Hazardous wastes also are not accepted. For more information call Casella at (888)852-2151.


# Reserving the Picnic Shelter
