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Budget Vote Information

The Annual Election with Voting by Australian ballot in Barre Town will be held May 9. See the article on page 8 for more information about voting. The purpose of this article is to offer highlights of the General Fund (GF) and Highway Fund (HF) budgets. More detailed and complete budget information is available in the annual budget booklet that will be available for pick-up at the: Trow Hill Grocery, Gunner Brook Store & Deli, Hannaford, Lawson's Store, Quarry Hill Quick Stop, Graniteville General Store, and Municipal Building,. The booklet also is posted on the Town website. On the homepage, click on Publications and Budget.

A budget committee of five citizens and the five Selectboard members reviewed all ten of the fund budgets submitted by the town manager. The five citizens on the Committee were Jamie Cushman, Mike Gilbar, Josh Howard, Chris Neddo, and Todd Provencher. The Committee met for at least two hours every Tuesday from January 31 to March 28. The Committee held one special meeting in March. During its last meeting the Committee voted to make one change to the Equipment Fund and several changes to the GF. The Committee approved the other eight budgets without changes. The General and Highway Fund budgets are on the Annual Election ballot.

Recreation Solid Waste The proposed GF and HF budgets total \$8,329,851, which is an increase of \$538,690 or 6.91% over the current year. The estimated tax rate increase for these two budgets is 5.8¢. A 5.8¢ increase in the municipal tax rate would raise annual tax bills \$58 per \$100,000 of assessed value. The tax bill for a property assessed at \$150,000 would increase \$87. A \$200,000 property would see a \$116 jump in its tax bill. The bill for a \$225,000 property would be \$130.50 more.

The proposed GF budget is \$196,205 or 4.44% more than the current budget. The HF proposal for FY '23-'24 is \$342,485 or 10.15% greater then FY '22-'23. Lets start with the HF.

There are nine departments in the HF. Two of the departments (Summer Construction and Retreatment) are used for road paving expenses. The sum of these two department budgets for FY '23-'24 is \$108,850 or 10.23% more then the current year. Using the per ton price paid for paving last summer as an indicator, the budgeted per ton price for paving was increased 13.9%. Further increasing the Summer Construction amount is the need to reclaim (grind all existing pavement) the asphalt on Plainfield Brook Road before re-paving.

After road paving the second biggest department increase is Summer Maintenance at \$98,360. Wages in Summer Maintenance are up \$68,040 in part because less of the public works crew's time will be devoted to other DPW duties like water and sewer. Also the delayed start of winter weather is allowing the DPW to perform summer maintenance work further into the fall. The Winter Maintenance wage account is decreasing \$20,310 as a result of this shift. The Town's Equipment Fund charges were increased 10% across the board. The Summer Maintenance department is projected to pay \$35,100 more in equipment charges. S.M. contracted services is increased \$17,800 based on recent price increases for contracted work such as line-painting and gravel crushing. The finance payments for a large equipment item in S.M.was paid off in '22-'23 producing a \$20,215 savings.

The Employee Benefits department amount is \$56,410 more because of an one-time union contract bonus (\$11,275), workers compensation (\$10,745), health insurance (\$22,430), pension payments (\$4,340) and social security (\$3,160).

Stormwater permit fees (\$34,145) are the leading cost increase in the Administration and Engineering department, which is going up \$51,085. Other rising costs in this department are salaries (\$9,455), Town equipment charges (\$4,220) and computer program (GIS) upgrades (\$2,525).

Permits

Fireworks: A common misunderstanding is that you do not need a permit to "shoot" fireworks. In fact, you absolutely need a permit for fireworks if they include anything larger than a common sparkler or "pop-its" type pyrotechnic. You can legally purchase fireworks without a permit, but it is

illegal to transport them or launch them without one. Unlike many towns, the fire chief in Barre Town is not the sole person responsible for issuing fireworks permits. The process includes the chief, but a permit application is also reviewed by the police chief and the selectboard. The process can take a couple of weeks. A permit must be submitted at least 15 days in advance of the show, so please plan early. A fireworks permit application can be obtained by calling the Town Clerk's office (479-9391).

Paving Driveways: If any work, especially paving, is to occur within the town road right-of-way (at or near the road) you will need a driveway permit. Other work in the right-of-way could also require a permit, especially if digging. In a case such as that, a Working In The Right-Of-Way Permit is required. Both permits are reviewed and issued by the town engineer. While applications can be obtained by calling the zoning office at 479-2595, you should contact the engineer in advance at 476-3522 to discuss your plans.

Building Permit: Finally going to build that deck or shed you've been thinking about but putting off? Or for that matter really anything outside more than 64 s.f. in size? A Building Permit is likely going to be required. And, you should be thinking about this early too. A building permit is another permit that needs to be planned ahead because it takes about 25 days to obtain a valid permit. A building permit application can be obtained by calling 479-2595.

In addition to calling the office for these permit applications at the number noted, applications also can be found at barretown.org/permitsandforms.

Cemetery Vault History

This summer season will mark the 100th anniversary for the

construction of the cemetery vault located at the front of Wilson Cemetery on the Quarry Hill Road. Reference to the vault can be found in 1922 as an item of discussion for town meeting that year. Carried over into the next year, at the 1923 town meeting the voters overwhelmingly approved the vault's construction. The initial construction plans showed



brick as the main building material with any necessary trim to be granite. Just before the vote, the citizens decided brick did not fit the image of Barre Town; our vault should be all granite. Changes were made, vote taken, ready for contractor.

The town clerk's office and the chair of the cemetery commission advertised the job in the Barre Daily and eventually awarded the contract to a local builder, A.B. Lane, a resident of Barre City. Lane and his company had a very good reputation for the buildings and other structures they built. The cost for the vault had been estimated to be \$6,000 and the Wilson family donated a \$1,000 towards construction. In the end the tax payers paid \$5,850 for the work. Lane and his company completed the job and the year "1923" is engraved in the granite lintel above the door. No published articles could be found that there was any kind of grand opening.

Times have changed and the vault no longer is used as it was in the past. Over the years, the vault had a lot of use, but between other storage facilities in the area and the general trend toward cremation, the vault is more of a monument to the cemetery now. Barre Town Fire Department Open House

The Barre Town Fire Department will be hosting an Open

Combined, the proposed amounts for these four departments are \$314,705 more than the current year, accounting for 91.89% of the HF increase. The HF budget is not predicated on any change in full-time staff. The number of summer helpers will be cut from four to two in anticipation of utilizing automated flaggers. Services would not change. The proposed road paving program (see article on page 6) is in line with prior years.

As stated, the proposed GF budget is 4.4% or \$196,205 more than the '22-'23 budget. The top ten budget increases, either for a new item or in an operating account total \$200,675. The single largest increase is \$49,735. The tenth largest is \$10,320. Unlike the HF, mid to small increases in many items produce the GF increase.

The largest increase (\$49,735) is for health insurance premiums caused both by premiums rising and a higher percent of employees utilizing Town offered insurance. Because of this jump in premiums, the Employee Benefits department has the largest increase of all 24 GF departments. Police straight-time wages are projected to go up \$26,325, a 5.1% increase. The third largest increase is for an one-time expense to re-fence the Little League field in the recreation area. The budgeted amount is \$21,675. The fourth and sixth items on the list also are one-time expenses and both are in the Municipal Building department. It is proposed to have the entire white clapboard addition re-painted (\$18,300). Inside, a partition will be built to divide the Finance Office from the mail and copier room. The cost estimate is \$15,350. The fifth item on this year's list of top ten GF increases is fire department equipment charges. The 10% across the board increase in equipment charges is pushing the fire department's payment up \$16,935. The police equipment charges are seventh at \$15,185. Barre Town pays money into its Ambulance Fund. The increases for '23-'24 is \$15,080 or 2.5%. Next is an \$11,770 increase in the contribution to Barre Area Development for its operating expenses. Last, the contract for managed care of the Town's computer network is going up \$10,320.

The hundreds of other GF expense accounts have a net decrease of \$4,470.

The tax rate is not a result of spending alone. Growth in the Grand List (property tax base) and changes in non-tax revenue also factor into determining the tax rate. The assessor estimates the Town will see a \$1,300 increase in property tax revenue per 1¢ of tax rate. GF non-tax revenue is

down \$29,045, meaning property taxes have to make up that reduction in other revenues.

No changes in services are being planned. Regular full-time and part-time staffing will not change. The temporary extra full-time police officer in the '22-'23 budget, as planned, is not included in the '23-'24 budget.


All twenty not-for-profit donation requests on last year's ballot were approved. All twenty are back on the ballot seeking the same amounts. Barre Area Development requested a \$28,565 or 54% increase in the Town's contribution. The Budget Committee decided to carry the amount for BADC's usual operating expenses and place the amount requested for a new part-time marketing coordinator position on the ballot. The amount in Article 25 is \$16,795.

A Town Charter amendment about the Board of Civil Authority's annual reorganization meeting is proposed. To reduce confusion the proposed amendment to Section 6 (a) would move the BCA re-organization meeting from its first meeting after the Town's Annual Election to the first BCA meeting on or after February 1. Article 27, pursuant to existing Town Charter Section 10 (f), asks if the voters will abolish the position of (elected) Auditor.

For more detailed budget information, come to the Municipal Building to look through a budget book, or read the budget booklet that will be available by hard copy and on the website. A one-page summary of every fund budget, and for most budgets, a list of highlights is posted on the Town website. Another source is the recorded budget presentation played on CVTV and on the Town website.

The Selectboard is holding public hearings for the Town Charter amendment on April 4 and 11. A recording of those meetings is available to view on the Town website. Or, for answers to questions about any of these matters, call the Town Manager's office at 479-9331.



Filing Your Homestead Declaration Form

If you own a Vermont property and live on that property you must declare homestead this year by April 18, 2023. If you do not file by this date, then you will accessed a penalty. If you miss the April 18 deadline, you still can file by October 16, 2023, but a penalty fee will be charged.

Filing a Homestead Declaration Form (HS-122) is easy and can be done online at the Vermont Department of Taxes website. You must file the HS-122 even if you do not have to file a state income tax return, for example if you are retired. This ensures that you will pay the lower tax rate assessed by the State for education, and not the higher non-homestead education tax rate.

If your household made less than an amount specified by the state during calendar year 2022 (whether from a job, retirement income, or other income), you may be eligible for a property tax credit. To claim a property tax credit, file a Household Income (HI-144) Form with your HS-122 by the same deadlines. Filing the HI-144 at the same time as your HS-122 will potentially reduce your tax burden even more. The maximum household income to be eligible for a property tax credit for 2022 is \$134,800. If your household made less than that in 2022, file an HI-144 this year.

<u>Accessing the forms</u>: The 2023 HS-122 Homestead Declaration and Property Tax Credit Claim Forms for 2023 are available from the Vermont Department of Taxes on the Town of Barre website at www.barretown.org. Additionally, they can be completed online at www.myvtax.vermont.gov.

Property Assessment Appeals

The assigning of property values (aka property assessment or property appraisal) is designed to be a fair, equitable process, but assessing is an imprecise science. Therefore, taxpayers may appeal the appraisal of their property. The 2023 grand list, which includes property ownership and value as of April 1, will be available at the Town Office in the first week of June. When it is, notices that it is available will be posted on the Town website, in the Times Argus, at grocery stores, and post offices around town. This notice is officially called "the lodging of the abstract grand list." If the Assessor for Barre Town has changed the appraisal of your property, you will receive a notice in the mail. Any taxpayer (not just those whose property appraisal has changed) may dispute their property appraisal through the tax grievance process, a process set by state law. A summary of the process should you wish to dispute the appraisal is below:

Step 1: File a grievance with the Assessor within 14 days from the lodging of the abstract grand list, which will be the same date any notice of changes in appraisal are mailed. When the Assessor receives your grievance, the office will schedule a grievance hearing with you. The purpose of the hearing is to discover any possible errors or omissions in determining the value of the property. The burden of proof and persuasion is on the taxpayer. Upon completing the hearings, the Assessor will notify the taxpayer in writing of his decision. What if the taxpayer does not agree with the Assessor's decision...

Step 2: Appeal to the Board of Civil Authority (BCA) in writing via the Town Clerk within 14 days from the date that the Assessor mailed the result of his grievance hearing (Step 1).

The purpose of the BCA Property Assessment Hearing is for the BCA to judge whether the property being appealed was assessed fairly when compared to other, similar, properties in town. Again, the burden of proof and persuasion is on the taxpayer. All parties may introduce any relevant material and evidence whether or not it was previously submitted to the Assessor during the grievance process. After the presentation of evidence and cross-examination, the BCA will appoint an inspection committee of three members to inspect the property and submit written findings to the full BCA within 30 days of the date of the BCA hearing. During the property inspection, property owners shall not engage in conversation pertaining to the appeal process unless questions are asked by the inspection committee. Within 15 days of the BCA receiving the inspection committee report, the Board will report and list reasons for its decision. The Town Clerk certifies the decision, records it in the grand list book, and notifies the property owner in writing of the decision by certified mail. What if the taxpayer does not agree with BCA's decision...

Step 3: Appeal to either the State Division of Property Valuation and Review or Superior Court within 30 days of the Town Clerk mailing the notice of the decision. More information about this step will be provided by the Town Clerk when mailing notice of the BCA decision.

Step 4: Appeal to the Vermont Supreme Court. These appeals are governed by the Vermont Rules of Appellate Procedure.

- Repairs needed to correct municipal or state code violations
- Access modification for elderly or disabled household members
- Energy upgrades (including energy audit, insulation, air sealing, and other measures recommended in the energy audit report)

Who Qualifies: To be eligible a Barre Town resident must have a household income that does not exceed 80% of the Washington County median income, e.g., household income of \$73,100 or less for a family of four, or \$51,200 or less for a single person. Special exceptions may apply to historic homes and/or homes that may contain lead paint or hazardous building materials. The homes must be primary residences.

Project Updates

Websterville Waterline Project: This fall and winter Munson Earth Moving completed the Websterville waterline project. Munson installed new water mains on Libercent, Brook Street and Violette Street. The new water line will give adequate fire flows in the Brook Street area and better water quality through the system. This May Munson will be back to clean up lawns and other areas that were disturbed while snow was on the ground. The streets will be paved by the Town in 2024.

The contract awarded to Munson totaled \$555,306, based on the consulting engineer's estimated quantities. To date Munson has billed \$349,804. The construction work should cost less than the awarded contract. The engineer's fees since July 2021 are \$97,927. The Town is using Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CLFRF) to pay for this project.

DPW Yard Stormwater: Ten bids for this construction contract were opened on February 17. The low bidder was Poulin Companies LLC from Burlington with a bid of \$101,468. After review by the Town's stormwater consultant the Selectboard awarded the contract to Poulin on February 28. On March 21 the Selectboard approved the \$120,000 grant agreement with the Friends of the Winooski River. The Town has learned the GMP pole in the project vicinity must be moved. GMP has given a cost estimate of \$6,735. By contract, Poulin cannot start work until May 15 or later. Substantial completion must be reached by September 30, 2023. The Selectboard had designated \$45,000 of CLFRF for this project. Thanks to the FWR grant and Poulin's low bid, very little of the \$45,000 will be needed.

VT 110 Bridge: This summer Vermont Agency of Transportation, VTrans, will be replacing the VT 110 bridge located at the roundabout in East Barre. The contractor, CCS, will start construction in early June with a 60 day road closure starting at the end of June. The road closure will detour traffic to use Websterville Road to Quarry Hill Road through Barre City to US 302. For more information on the VT 110 bridge project and other VTrans projects please go to the VTransparecny website, vtransparecny.vermont.gov.

A part of the bridge replacement is installation of the Town waterline on the side of the bridge. The new 8" waterline will provide sufficient water flows for hydrants on the roundabout side of the river. The Town will pay for waterline work. CCS's lump sum price for the waterline work was \$61,144. The Town bought the pipe and other items ahead of time at an expense of \$42,900. Engineering expenses to date are \$17,523. The Town is using CLFRF for this project. Wilson Industrial Park Waterline: Last September the Selectboard awarded this construction contract to Munson Earth Moving. The contract amount based on the consulting engineer's estimated quantity of bid items was \$374,950. Munson started working on the project in February. As of early April all roughly 2,700' of 8" waterline is installed, tested, sanitized and connected to 8" pipe in Bolster Road and in Parker Road. Service stubs were connected and laid to possible lot locations on both sides of the road. Munson will return soon to handle the necessary restoration. The connection from Bolster Road to the industrial park provides another route for receiving water in the event the waterline in Bolster or Parker needs to be shut-off. Bolster Road will be paved this summer.

Munson has submitted one invoice for \$234,098 to date. There will be more, but the construction work should be under contract. Engineering expenses so far are \$22,013. The Town secured a state loan with 75% foregiveness for this project. The 25% balance can be pre-paid without penalty. The loan could be paid with income from W.I.P. lot sales or from the Water Fund.

Burning Permit Required

The fire warden's primary activity is issuing Permits to Kindle Fire commonly known as burn permits. These permits are required to burn untreated wood, brush, weeds, or grass. The fire warden cannot issue permits to burn furniture, mattresses, building demolition material and the like. Burning these materials is considered an illegal burn. The police department will be called if there is an illegal burn.

The fire warden may refuse to issue a permit if, in the warden's judgement, the weather or the site create a dangerous situation. The warden will not issue a permit if illegal material is on the pile or is part of the plan.

A burn permit is not required for a campfire, if the campfire is on property owned by the people having the campfire. A campfire must be in a fire ring no more than three feet in diameter.

Call the Fire Warden (498-8694) to ask questions or to request a permit. Leave a message. The warden will inspect the site and burn pile, which might take several days. If possible call about five days before the date planned for burning.

The last Tuesday of May the Selectboard appoints volunteer citizen members to the half dozen boards, commissions and committees (BCCs) that help the Town operate. As required by the Town Charter, every year a notice that applications are requested is published. Notice is given for all seats up for re-appointment even if the current member wants to be re-appointed. The terms expiring in 2023 are shown below.

In addition to these 11 positions there is one open position on the Traffic Advisory Safety Committee. An opening on the Planning Commission is anticipated. The alternate representative positions to the CV Fiber board, C.V. Regional Planning Commission (CVRPC) and CVRPC Transportation Advisory Committee are vacant. The quick application form shown below may be used to apply for any of the BCC positions. For the three vacant alternates submit a brief letter (email) of interest.

BCCs meet in the evenings in the Municipal Building. A staff member is assigned to each. Meeting material is sent to the members before the meeting. Except for the Cemetery Commission, staff prepares the agenda and writes the minutes. Occasionally training opportunities are available. The Town will pay registration fees. BCC members learn much about their area of responsibility and have an impact on town services or life in Barre Town. Learn more about the BCCs by visiting the town website and clicking on Boards and Commissions. A description of each BCC, past agendas and minutes are available. Another option is calling the Town Manager's Office at 479-9331.

Box 116, Websterville, VT 05678 or drop it off at the Municipal Building. Another way to apply is to submit a letter of interest. 
Forest Recreation Rules: The rules below relate to safety, stewardship, or both.


SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING SERVICES

Bulk Trash Collection – May 13

When: Saturday, May 13, 2023 Time: 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Place: DPW Yard, 129 Websterville Road

The spring bulk trash collection will be held on its regular date - the second Saturday of May. The service is for disposal of large (bulky) items not appropriate for weekly trash pickup or disposal in a trash bag. Town residents may use the service to clean up around their home. The service is not intended for any business use, nor for landlords to clean



up rental property. A Town tax bill, a utility bill, this newsletter with mailing label, and a driver's license will verify residency. Items or materials accepted are listed below.

Before preparing to use the service take note:

Roofing shingles - No vans or box trailers with loose shingles will be accepted. Shingles must be in containers - boxes, buckets, bags or tubs. Loose loads (in cars, pick-up trucks, or open trailer) will be directed to the side and unloaded when no other user is waiting for service. The per vehicle prices listed below are doubled for all loads containing shingles.

Before loading the car, pick-up or trailer, take note:

- Building demo Small pieces of sheet rock, plaster, tile, wood scraps, etc. must be in buckets, boxes, barrels, or other containers for ease of unloading. Larger pieces of lumber, walls, roofs, vinyl siding, wood siding, gutters and the like must be cut to easily handled lengths and sizes. Pieces of siding and gutters should be bundled.
- Concrete, asphalt, bricks, blocks, large stones are set aside for recycling. Don't mix in with other materials. Concrete must be free of wire and rebar. If cleaning up the garage basement, outbuilding or lot there may be small items; be sure all are in a container for quick unloading.

Green Up Day is May 6th



Vermont's Green Up Day, a 53 year tradition, is the first Saturday of May. Before vegetation comes on, litter is very visible along roads and in public places. Barre Town residents have been amazingly active in Green Up. Last year's volunteers collected litter and trash along 71 miles of Town roads. The Green Up bags and larger trash items weighed 2.20 tons. Green Up volunteers also removed 223 tires from roadsides.

Citizen and group volunteers may select a roadside(s) or public space to be cleaned up. Check the static sign-up sheet posted on the Town website (www.barretown.org) to avoid duplication and disrupting another party's plans. A link to the list is provided in the Green Up announcement. When a roadside(s) or public place is selected stop by the Town Manager's Office, M-F, 8am to 4:30pm, or call 479-9331. Green Up bags, latex gloves and safety information are distributed through the Manager's Office.

Green Up may begin starting in late April and extend to a few days after May 6. Please tie bags shut and leave by the roadside. Large items (tires, other car parts, furniture and so on) can be left by the roadside too. Town public works employees will collect the bags and large items for disposal.

Green Up Vermont provides the bags free to the Town, but of course the bags are not free. Green Up Vermont's generous sponsors help make the bags free to cities and towns. Notice the sponsors' name on the bags.

On Saturday, Green Up Day, from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., there will be a BBQ lunch for the gathering of the Green Up volunteers. The get together will be at the picnic shelter in the Barre Town Recreation Area. Please come meet other volunteers and share your Green Up story. There will be raffle prizes.

Lawn Waste Site

The Town's lawn waste site will be open Saturday mornings from 8:00 am to noon starting April 29. A volunteer will open the site from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm on Tuesdays starting May 2.



For those not aware, the site is located on Holden Road not far from the Graniteville Road, Holden Road intersection, across from Rock of Ages.

Residents may take tree branches, grass clippings, leaves, hedge clippings and unwanted lawn and garden vegetative matter to the site. Deposit material in the appropriate area. Tree branches larger than 5" will be placed in the firewood area. Residents may take wood mulch, compost material and firewood.

Public works employees and volunteer(s) are not required to help unload users' vehicles.

Volunteers could be added. A lawn waste site volunteer opens and closes the site, keeps a count of users, directs residents to the right section for dropping off material and discourages improper use (littering, dropping off junk, trash and lumber). Call the Town Manager's Office at 479-9331 to learn more about volunteering.


Additional Recyclables Collection Center

The mission of the ARCC is to "provide an outlet that can expand and adapt as needed for traditional and non-traditional recyclable materials that further the goal of zero waste to meet the needs in central Vermont." To that end the ARCC currently accepts at least 56 different items from toothpaste tubes to skis. Fees are charged for most items, but disposal of 5 critical materials is free because of Vermont's Extended Producer Responsibility Programs: 1) household batteries, 2) electronics such as TV's, computers, computer peripherals, 3) household paint, stain and tile sealer, 4) fluorescent bulbs and tubes, and 5) mercury containing thermostats. There are fees for other items; payment is by cash or check only. Fees are as low as \$.10 for a wine cork (that was unnecessary; no one in Barre Town drinks wine) to \$75 for a floor model copier. In between those extremes: a box of books up to 30 pounds is \$3, a gas powered push-mower is \$6, a smoke detector is \$5, and a small microwave is \$5, to name a few items accepted for a fee. Very small items (beer bottle caps, toothpaste tubes, juice pouches) can be recycled for \$1.50 per gallon.

Household Hazardous Waste Collections

Household hazardous waste (HHW) includes a variety of toxic household substances banned from the landfill. Consider anything labeled with the following warning words to be HHW: caution, toxic, danger, hazard, warning, poisonous, reactive, corrosive, flammable.
