A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR SAM JOSHI

Dear Edison Residents,

With rising gas prices and inflation, more Edison families are looking to stay close to home for their leisure. I'm pleased that my administration is pushing forward with several capital projects that will facilitate just that. You've read in our previous editions of the Illuminator about our massive parks projects, senior center addition, improvements to local recreational and youth sports facilities, and beautification efforts that touch every neighborhood across Edison. Every single day we are getting things done to provide our families with a better future in Edison. This involves fixing problems that existed well before I took office while also proactively improving neighborhoods. Below are just a few of many highlights of today:

- Parks all across Edison are getting improvements! (You can check out the upgrades on pages 6 & 7)
- More and more roads are getting resurfaced every day
- Town Hall building improvements are ongoing, making for a welcoming atmosphere for residents and increased comfort and morale for our dedicated staff
- We held a resource fair and clothing drive for residents impacted by the fire at the Waterford complex, and my administration continues to provide information, resources, and communicate with every affected family to provide them with the support they need to begin to move forward
- Work for our turf fields at Jets field has begun!

These are initiatives we are focusing on this quarter, and there are many more projects to come. Change doesn't happen instantly, but we're making progress every day.

My administration also continues to develop and support initiatives that celebrate the diversity that exists across this amazing town. Over the last few months, we welcomed the Lunar New Year with a parade and celebration, held a St. Patrick's Day Block Party, hosted an Easter Eggstravaganza indoor egg hunt, participated in the burning of Chametz with local residents, and observed Eid at Town Hall with our Muslim neighbors.

As one of the most diverse municipalities in the state, Edison Township takes pride in its many different cultures, identities, religions, and backgrounds. This being said, my administration remains acutely aware that discrimination still takes place, especially for the Township's most vulnerable populations. Mayor Joshi announced the resurrection of Edison Light Transit – a once-popular service that was discontinued in 2010. The Mayor explained that the program will not only be revived, but also expanded with additional shuttles to accommodate a greater number of residents. "This means fewer cars on the roads and therefore less traffic. It's environmentally friendly and reduces our collective carbon footprint, and it's economical for the residents who use it.

It's truly a win for everyone," Mayor Joshi said in his address.

In an effort to address long-standing resident discontent with internet service, Mayor Joshi also announced plans to make good on his promise to end Optimum's monopoly as the only internet service provider in Edison Township, telling the audience, "I promised to end Optimum's monopoly, and tonight I'm proud to announce Optimum's monopoly in Edison will end this year. Comcast is coming to town."

Additionally, the Mayor announced renovation and expansion plans for the Dr. William Toth Health Center, the development of a second community garden at Bernard Dwyer Park, and the completion of construction projects including a children's splash park and youth sports recreation center.

Edison Police Department Celebrates Promotions

Earlier this year, Mayor Sam Joshi and Police Chief Thomas Bryan announced the promotion of three Captains, 12 Lieutenants, and 25 Sergeants within the Edison Police Department. During his time in office, Mayor Joshi has hired 13 new police officers, directed the installation of more than 60 license plate readers on EPD vehicles, launched "Prepared Live" for 9-1-1 dispatch to facilitate a real-time view of emergency calls, and added a departmental K9 Unit with two police canines.



Edison Swears in New Fire Chief Andrew Toth

After serving as Acting Chief for several months and 21 years with the department, Andrew Toth Jr. was sworn in as the Township's new Fire Chief in March.

"My commitment as Chief is to listen, learn and work hard every day to achieve our mutual goal. It's about working together toward a common goal of protecting and safeguarding those of us here today and those whose future depends upon the actions we take today," said Toth.

Toth Senior Center

The Toth Senior Center provides critical public health services and resources in Middlesex County. Mayor Joshi worked with Congressman Pallone to secure \$3M in federal funding that is being used to renovate and expand the Center by nearly 3,000 square feet to better meet the health needs of the community, especially seniors. The new space will include a large meeting space for events and activities, reading room, full kitchen, and

a common lounge. The expansion will also enable Edison to greatly expand its vaccinations, health screenings, and other essential services to older residents. "We are grateful for Congressman Pallone's partnership with our office and the residents of Edison," Mayor Sam Joshi said. "This \$3 million federal appropriation will help us expand the footprint of our Township's Senior Center. The added space will greatly benefit our older residents, allowing them to spend time doing recreational activities and receive health care all in one place."


Paterniti Park

Historical Society: Farms of Edison

It may be hard to imagine that where you live now in Edison was once farmland. For hundreds of years farmers cultivated the rich piedmont soils of Edison, growing corn, wheat, oats, fruits and vegetables for the city markets. Along the Raritan meadows, farmers harvested salt hay for their animals. Cows grazed on the rolling pastures of Woodbrook and Maplehurst farms. In spring, the apple orchards in the Old Post Roa area burst into bloom and by fall the apples would be turned into cider and brandy at Forman Martin's cider mill. Francis End's farm on Talmadge Road grew cherries, grapes and asparagus, as well as grains. There were horse farms, stables, and a few racetracks for those who

liked to ride. During the Great Depression, small farms kept many families fed, with the extra crops sold to neighbors. Large chicken farms were built on Oak Tree Road, which produced thousands of eggs daily. By the 1950's, the farms began to disappear. The Menlo Park Mall replaced the 250 year old Thornall farm, and thousands of new homes were built all over Edison. Those newcomers to "the country" could still hear the moo of a cow, and roosters crowing at dawn. In the 21st century farms are a historical memory of life in Edison, with a few streets named after the farms, and a few old farmhouses remaining.
