Shellfish Constable's Report

To the Board of Selectmen:
Westport, Mass.

Gentlemen:

I hereby submit the annual shellfish report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1961.

A new program for the propagation of oysters was set up this year, to establish a better and stronger oyster breed. Oysters were purchased at a total price of \$1,070.00 and distributed throughout the river.

Another new program to benefit our river, is to reclaim barren areas through the use of lime. Fifty-two ton of lime was spread in test areas covering approximately twelve acres. If this project is successful as anticipated, we can reclaim hundreds of acres of unproductive bottom.

Our biggest predator "the starfish" was found more numerous this year. We reduced a large majority of them by means of dredging.

It has been the custom in previous years to send shell bags to various parts of the State to catch oyster spat. This proved unsatisfactory. This year we placed shell bags in our own river and caught a very good set.

The State experimental oyster raft is providing valuable data for both the State and the Town. A report of this project will be sent to you upon completion.

I would like to thank all those who took part in these various projects for their efforts to better the shellfishing in our river.

Board of Public Welfare

The Board of Public Welfare organized for the year ending, December 31, 1961, by appointing Norman L. Gifford as chairman.

This has been another year marked by changes in public assistance programs. The Federal and State Governments have extended the Aid to Dependent Children program to include needy children deprived of parental support because of the unemployment of parents. This was a temporary extension to June 30, 1962. It is quite possible that it will be extended. Absence from the home due to service in the Armed Forces has caused assistance to be necessary to supplement the armed service allotments.

Time specifications relating to desertion, separation and duration of need were eliminated in the Aid to Dependent Children program. More needy children are now eligible for assistance under this program without first having to have General Relief. The method of applying earnings of children in Aid to Dependent Children and General Relief cases was changed as of July 1, 1961, in the matter of "community activities" and for planned education beyond the high school level.

Disability Assistance is now limited to persons up to age 65. Recipients at age 65 must be transferred to Old Age Assistance or Medical Assistance for the Aged if eligible for such assistance; otherwise, assistance is continued under General Relief.

MEDICAL CARE PLAN

The Medical Care Plan has been revised to include provisions for use of drug store of choice as provided by law in Old Age Assistance and Medical Assistance for the Aged and review by Medical Advisor and State Department when hospitalization exceeds 30 and/or 60 days respectively. Fee schedules covering increased hospital rates and nursing home rates have been established.

The hospital rates in this area have been increased again for 1962 and nursing home rates have been increased to \$6.85 per day.

REST HOME

Rest Home rates were established at \$4.25 a day as of July 1, 1961.

MEDICAL SOCIAL SEMINAR

The State Department of Public Welfare held a five-day Medical Social Seminar for directors and social workers engaged in the responsibility of furnishing good medical care to persons in need. The effects of illness on family and on community were noted. The Seminar has been a valuable factor in helping local public assistance workers carry out day to day assignments.

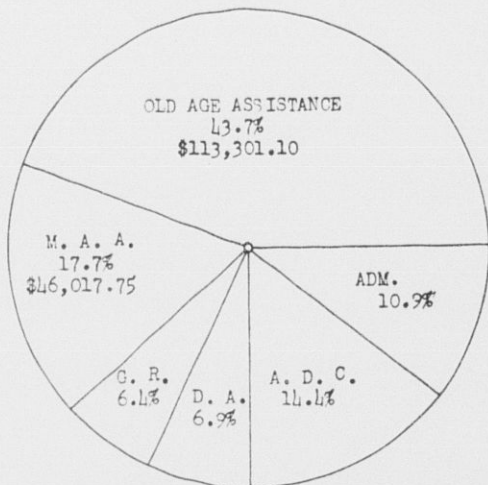

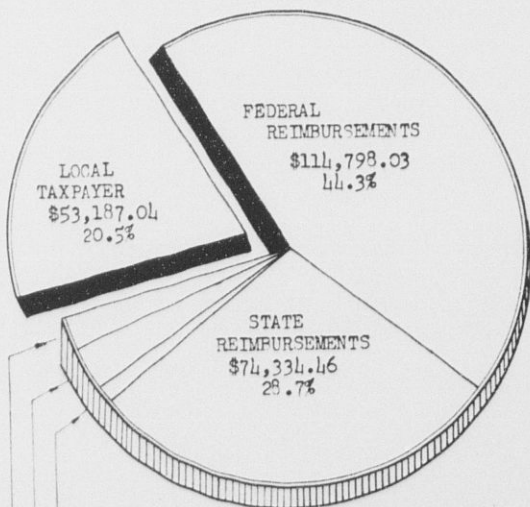

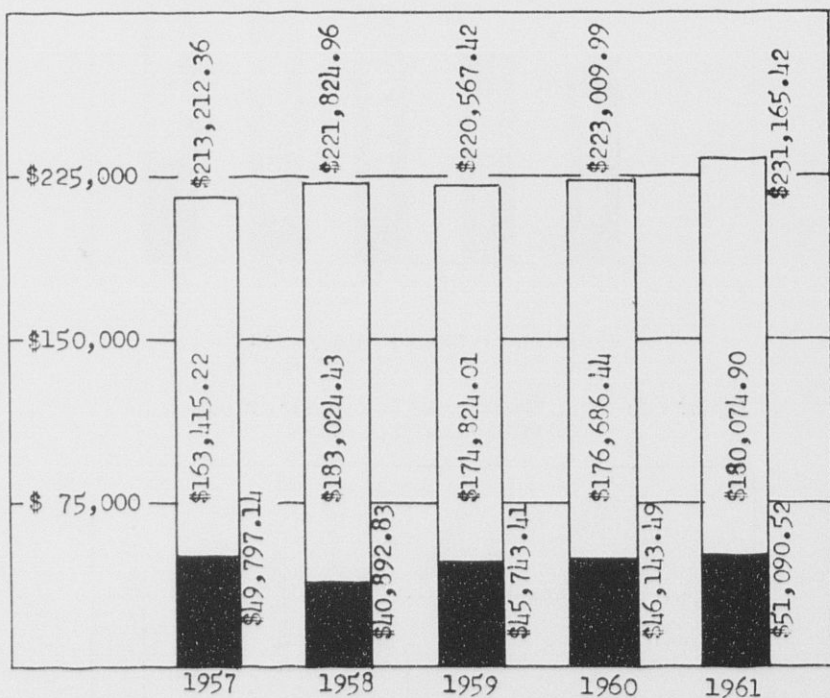
PUBLIC ASSISTANCE REVENUE FOR 1961

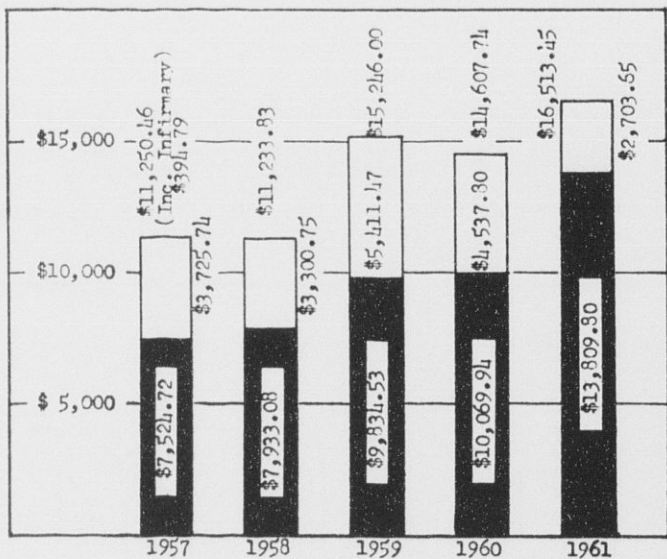
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS (ALL CATEGORIES) GRANTS

 Solid Portion: Cost to Town



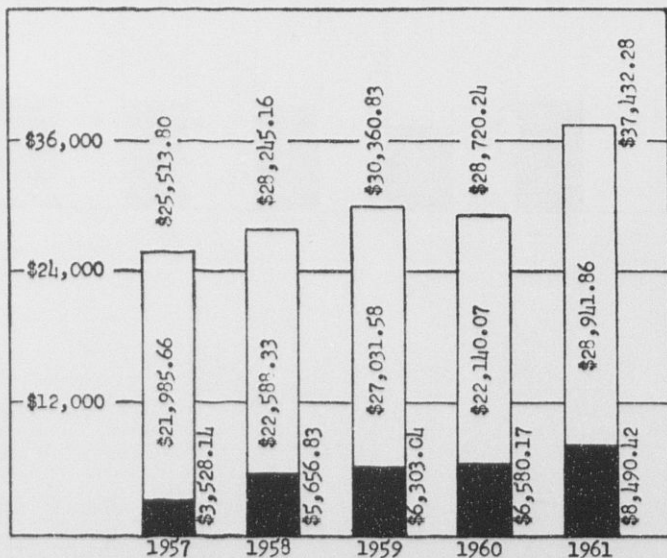
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR GENERAL RELIEF

Solid Bar: Total Cost to Town



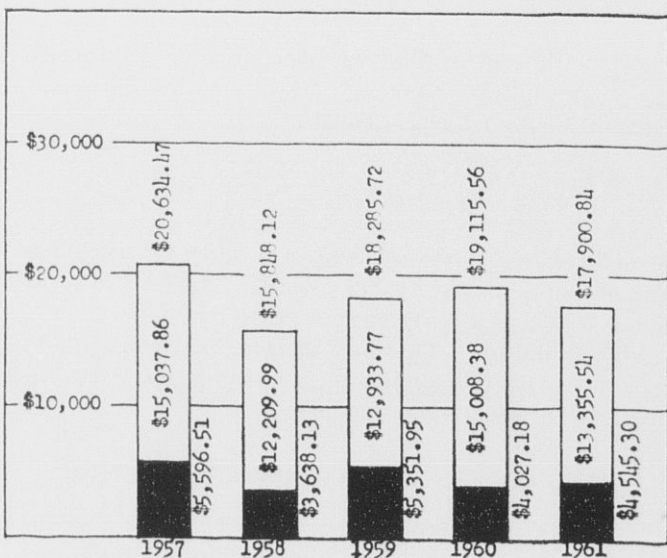
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS

Solid Portion: Cost to Town



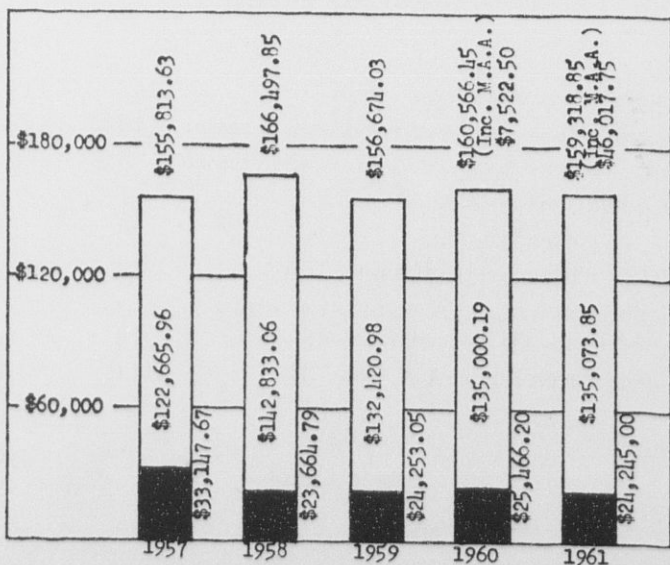
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS

Bureau of Old Age Assistance

The Bureau of Old Age Assistance organized for the year ending December 31, 1961, by appointing Samuel A. Boan, as chairman.

The above total reported by our librarian, represents the "highest on record and exceeds by more than one-third the total for 1960."

This is gratifying not only to trustees and library personnel, but to those who are the borrowers. Adult requests greatly increased, and with those of the Juvenile, prove we have the nucleus of a family-reading public. Our library is of interest and help to all. This is as it should be.

State aid, plus an increased appropriation from the town, has made possible the purchase of many new books, including a set of the Book of Knowledge, the Children's Encyclopedia, The Cambridge History of English Literature in 15 volumes, Life Pictorial Atlas of the World, McGraw-Hill Illustrated World Geography, Worldmark Encyclopedia of the Nations,

The Bible Companion and Taylor's Encyclopedia of Gardening. These volumes, and many more are helping to fulfill our need to the student for source material.

New improvements in the library include installation of four new bookcases, a new table and chair, a beautiful new library sign which stands along the drive near the northwest corner of our Town Hall. This sign is to be illuminated by floodlights. Arrows pointing the way to the library have been placed within and outside the Town Office Building. Three new metal book stacks are ready to occupy the last available floor space for the shelving of books. There are over ten thousand books in the library.

In addition to the above, the library has had a thorough cleaning, making it inviting and cheery. The Westport Art Group continues to exhibit on the large bulletin board, and throughout the year they have been generous with their gifts of choice art books to the library.

In this yearly report to you down through the years, it has been brought out we are so much in need of larger quarters. When you visit us you agree. In your Town Warrant for 1962 there is to be an article calling for the formation of a nine-member committee to study library needs.

We have been very cautious in our spending in the past, considering always needs for the community. If fruitful plans develop in 1962 we hope to see a library building ready for your use in the near future. Our thought shall be for the mutual benefit of the entire town.

By your continued support, you have made your library grow and become a most useful part of Westport's every-day living. Let us all get behind plans of growth for our present citizen and future citizen alike. You have been doing this, and for this we are grateful.

Report of the Planning Board

Dear Sirs:

Herewith is the report of the Planning Board's many and varied activities for the year 1961.

The Planning Board was organized as follows:

Planning Board members attended a total of (51) fifty-one regular scheduled bi-monthly, special, executive meetings, and public hearings in the pursuit of its work relative to Town planning business. Members of the Planning Board attended conferences, lectures, and demonstrations relative to planning. These assemblies were held in Natick, Taunton, and Boston, Massachusetts, under the sponsorship of the State Planning Division, the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District and the Federation of Massachusetts Planning Boards. These annual, semi-annual and monthly conferences and meetings are a tremendous help to the members of the Planning Board as a guide in its work. However, they are not a sole substitute to professional help in the planning field.

The members of the Board spent a total of (542½) five hundred forty-two and one-half hours in pursuit of Town interests.

During 1961, the Board reviewed and studied a total of twenty-two plans. This total is broken down as follows: Plans not requiring approval (but need study to determine conformity)—10; Preliminary Plans and rough sketches—8; Definitive Plans—4 (of this total 1 Definitive Plan was granted leave to withdraw; 2 were rejected—one of these rejected was sustained by the Appeals Board.) One Plan refused approval is now pending Appeals Board hearing and action.

Again the Planning Board advises all who desire to develop land in the Town of Westport to submit a rough sketch at the first meeting with the Board. This course of action will save the prospective developer much time and money.

Once again of the many subjects and problems considered by members of the Planning Board, water continues to be of prime importance. Members of the Board and the Board of Selectmen attended several meetings in Fall River where water problems of Tiverton, R. I., Fall River, Somerset, Swansea and Westport were discussed with the Mayor of Fall River and representatives of other towns. It is a recognized fact that future water requirements cannot be met with existing facilities. The subject of water is a main item of study and its area solution is a must on the agenda of the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District. It is recognized that the lack of public water can stymie the growth of an area, cause insurance rates to be high and ultimately effect the tax rate base. This is a very preplexing complex problem of not only the Planning Board but of the entire Town.

Further study of this problem will be made and reported. The national water problem is becoming more acute as predicted and if the 1980 prediction of the need of double the present water supply is a fact then Westport's problem will be considered very acute.

The resolve voted at the 1961 Town Meeting gave the Westport Planning Board delegate the authority to discuss this problem, and to explore the many avenues possible to the solution of this basic Town growth need. The water shortage of our neighbors and their understandable reluctance to relinquish control over their present water supply and water sources adds to the acuteness of the water problem. Our neighbors political strength in the General Court is another factor to be considered. The Planning Board members are still of the opinion the most economical, the most equitable solution to the very complexed water problem in this area, is for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to establish through legislation a Southeastern Massachusetts Water District or Regions. The community that controls the water distribution controls its neighbors growth. This growth can mean the exclusion of light and heavy industry from the waterless area and thus effecting the future tax base of a community in such a position.

Planning Board members have learned that their studied plan to eliminate dead end streets is a worthy, wise and a necessary effort to the safety and growth of the community. However, many of the recommendations to eliminate dead end streets thus improving the safety factors, increasing land values, and protecting the Town from possible civil suit have not been acted on to date. An informal discussion between the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board was held one evening when both Boards were discussing another subject, and it was decided a specific time and place would be designated by the Board of Selectmen to meet with the Planning Board with reference to the elimination of dead end streets, duplicate street names, and further discussion on the subject of roads in use as public ways for considerable period of time but not accepted. Unfortunately this important meeting was

not held. So in an effort to permit the Town to catch up with the previous recommendations the Planning Board has not made any further studies of dead end streets, hence no recommendations were made during 1961.

During the year the Board held many discussions, did much research without cost to the Town taxpayer on the following:

1. Unaccepted roads and streets.
2. The changing of road and street names.
3. The problems caused by the duplication of road and street names.

So at the Planning Board's regular scheduled meeting of May 3, 1961, it was voted to forward the following letter on this three-pronged problem. The letter expresses the Board's thinking on this subject.

"May 8, 1961

Mr. Frank DeAndrade, Chairman
Board of Selectmen
Westport, Massachusetts

Dear Mr. Andrade:

The Planning Board has held discussions on the subject of road and streets and some of the problems relative to this subject. Mr. Cassidy informed the Board that he has asked the Board of Selectmen to consider roads of prime use by the public for a number of years but to date unaccepted by the Town. He claims he informally mentioned to the Selectmen, Monday, March 20th, 1961.

The following is a resume' of the discussions and thinking of the planners with respect to the subject roads and streets:

SUBJECT: ROADS AND STREETS

The roads and streets in the Town of Westport at this time present three (3) major problems—namely:

1. Unaccepted roads and streets;
2. Names of roads and streets changed;
3. Duplication of road and street names.

1. Unaccepted Roads and Streets.

There exists at present two (2) categories of unaccepted roads and streets in Town. These may be classified as follows:

- (A) A road used for a number of years as a prime important major public highway, and to date not accepted. Much monies have, in the past, been expended on this type for upkeep, repair, expansion, improvement, and snow removal. A trial search fails to reveal and record in Town or in the Registrar of Deeds Office of such a road as Cornell Road. There appears to be others according to rumor.
- (B) The other type of unaccepted road or street is that type which is a part of an early subdivision of land and registered with the Registrar of Deeds, but for one reason or another, to date, has not been accepted by the Town. This type of unaccepted road (street) is not heavily traveled, but primarily by the people who live on the road. An indignation meeting of townspeople living on this type or road (street) was held in February this year because of the inconvenience caused by the non-removal of snow from this type of road. The reason given these folks at the meeting for the non-removal of snow, was that State law prohibited public funds be expended on

private property. Further, insurance covering Town-owned equipment prohibited the use of Town equipment on private property. If this logic applies to the unaccepted road in the north end of Town, how can the continued expenditures of funds be justified on such roads as Cornell Road in the south end of Town?

2. Names of Roads and Streets Changed.

There are no provisions for the filing of street names within the Town government. No Town agency to whom this responsibility has been assigned by Town Regulation or otherwise. This is deemed a necessity—to establish by regulation through an article in the Town Meeting the agency, and the rules adopted by the agency, for the filing of road (street) names.

The changing of road (street) names that have been in use as a public highway for a long period of time, causes considerable confusion. As an example, a road (street) has been in public use and known for a long period of time as X Road and then the name is changed. A whole group of legal problems arise, for instance the State of Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities has granted authority to the Electric Company, Telephone Company, Gas Company, and others to install certain facilities to service the public on X Road. These companies file the road layout of their installations with the State D.P.U. and the Registrar of Deeds and, in some instances, with Land Court. It must be remembered that the Town officials have granted the Public Utilities approval prior to the application by the Utility Company to State D.P.U. All of these records are not in conformance with the road (street) name change. Aside from the legal troubles caused, the costs of changing the legal recorded records costs money and much time.

If we continue to apply the same thinking to the problem, consider the Town resident living on X Road and said road name is changed. Mr. Taxpayer must, to have his records changed to coincide with his deeds, have his Social Security Records, Insurance Car Registration and, if he has a passport, this, too must be changed.

Further, under this category, we should place the filing of road (street) names on deeded property to help control this free use of road names.

3. Duplication of Road (street) Names.

Here, again, if there was an agency responsible for the filing of street names, there would not exist the present duplication of names in Town. There appears several names of roads (streets) on Assessors' Platts, Town maps, recorded deeds, street directories, etc. that have been duplicated five or six times. Others have been duplicated in less numbers.

To name a few, the confusion caused by this duplication of road (street) names must effect the residents, public utilities, mailmen, fire, police, ambulance, doctors, and delivery men. Now is the time to correct this situation before it becomes more wide spread.

These are problems that should not be burried. Criticism of any group of Town officials is not implied, nor will it accomplish anything. Each Board of Selectmen must, of necessity due to our form of Town part-time government, inherit some unresolved problems. However, it is not good for the Town to delay the solving of its problems.

It is recommended to the Board of Selectmen that a Committee be formed or appointed to serve on a voluntary basis, without pay, to work out the details and do the research on the above cited three problems.

Further, it is recommended that the appointed Committee be composed of representatives from the following:

Board of Selectmen
Town Finance Committee
Town Counsel
Planning Board
House Numbering Committee
Building Inspector
Chief of Police
Fire Chief

Representative from:

Westport Taxpayers' Association
Chamber of Commerce
Veteran Organization
Portuguese-American Civic League

The longer these problems are permitted to exist and increase in area and volume, the more complex the solution shall be.

The Planning Board would welcome a joint meeting on this subject if such a meeting is convenient to the Board of Selectmen.

Unfortunately there was no special meeting of the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen on these three subjects.

The Wood Bridge at Westport Point was a subject discussed several times during 1961. The Planning Board's proposed recommendations on this subject were outlined in the 1960 report of the Board. A pub-

lic hearing was held in the High School Cafeteria with reference to this bridge and its removal. Not much was developed from the information and discussions made during the hearing to be of a contrary nature of the Planning Board's report on the subject in the 1960 Town Report. Unfortunately there are many persons who should have attended the public hearing and voice their opinions, but rather elected to stay away and then express their opinions in private. This type of voter reaction is unfortunate, it does not afford the Town official the broad scope of information desired by them to formulate a decision. Absence from a Town Meeting or public hearing is a loss to the individual absentee, the vote is your right alone.

Apparently the cutting of the let is a dead issue for the time being at least. This is most unfortunate to the future growth development of one of the Town's most important assets namely summer recreational activity through shore and harbor development.

The Planning Board was not advised that the Board of Selectmen had requested State Senator Edwin Stone to file legislature to remove the entire bridge at State cost. This legislature could lead to a later date taking by the State of the remainder of the remainder of the Horseneck area. There exists a possible deterioration of the area adjacent to the old wood bridge. The Planning Board felt that a section of this bridge should be converted to a mariner for the mooring and servicing of water craft. A shortage of mooring berths does exist and has for some time, and is presumed will continue to exist as the popularity of boating increases. This boating popularity increase could be used to improve present tax base, and at the same time afford facilities for Town summer and permanent residents.

The Planning Board continued its efforts to improve the harbor entrance as provided by House Document 692, 75th Congress, 3rd Session, enacted June 20, 1938. A member of the Board had several discussions with the offices of U. S. Representative Hastings Keith, U. S. Representative Joseph Martin, State Representative Milton Silva with reference to have the original act wording changed to eliminate the words local funds from the act (see Page 76, 1960 Report). Further action was taken to include this Harbor entrance subject in the plan of the Town submitted to the Greater Fall River Area Redevelopment Committee. Thus this problem of the harbor entrance was approached from three angles. State Representative Milton Silva has filed a bill in legislature to have the Commonwealth assume the local funds costs.

The Area Redevelopment Act (Public Law 87-27) enacted last year by Congress, to assist and revitalize such areas as declared as excessive unemployed areas. A meeting of a member of the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen was held to resolve a single action plan under this U. S. Law. Accordingly, Mr. Frank DeAndrade Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, requested Mr. Carl Lees to serve as the Town's representative with a member of the Planning Board. Colonel Frank J. Cassidy was selected for this task. A series of fifteen weekly meetings were held in Fall River City Hall with Mayor John Arruda, Assistant City Solicitor John Farrell, City Planner Alfred Edwards, and others representing Labor, School Department, Chamber of Commerce. Other Boards of Selectmen and Planning Board members from the following attended some or all of these meetings: Somerset, Swansea, Westport, Freetown, Massachusetts, and Tiverton, Rhode Island. Many committees were formed under this General Area Redevelopment Committee. To make a full complete report of all discussions and

visitations to the State Planning Division, the Office of Commissioner of Administration and Finance would fill a town report about the size of the 1960 Report. Please let suffice to say Progress has been made.

The Westport representatives filed the first recommended projects to be included in the overall plan for the Area Redevelopment on August 16, 1961. That project plan is a follows:

"August 16, 1961

The Greater Fall River Area Redevelopment Committee

ATTENTION: Mr. Alfred Edwards, Chairman

Dear Mr. Edwards:

Submitted herewith are the projects considered to be of prime importance to the relief of the unemployed, protection of and growth of the present limited employed in the Town of Westport, Massachusetts.

Employment in Westport is principally confined to farming, commercial fishing, recreation and near by city cotton weaving, and printing mills whose industries volume has been so badly damaged as to be the main cause of this depressed area. Light and heavy industry is negligible due to the absence of public water and sewer systems. The continued lack of water in Town hampers, the commercial growth in that fire insurance rates are excessive and the fire protection, while the best that can be afforded under the lack of water, is considered to be insufficient.

A small growing community such as Westport experiencing an accelerated growth has many public needs to insure its orderly growth. Present population of Westport is 7,365, of this total 2,565 increased growth was reached in the past ten years. It is esti-

mated that the population of Westport will double in the 1960 - 1970 period.

To cope with this potential growth expansion, it is hoped this modest program under the Area Redevelopment Act will help to increase the employment potential, reduce the welfare case load and stabilize the town's tax base which is considered as high for the total services rendered.

1. Water:

The Town of Westport has no water rights of its own: all water rights are presently owned by the City of Fall River through acts of the Legislature of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The need for a public water source in the Town of Westport is imperative to its future growth. Without water or a water source the Town's future is limited and growth retarded.

As the number of farms diminish and house lots increase, the natural water shed is reduced and the need for a water source increased.

There is no estimate to the cost of this project at present because the water source is indefinite.

It is recommended that consideration be given to the establishment of a State owned operated water shed, water distribution system be established for the Greater Fall River Area.

The North End of Westport Town area has been plotted as far back as 1917 with very small lots of 20' x 50' which further complicates matters as to the need for public water.

2. Dredge and build Diked Channels to the Outer and Inner Entrances of Westport Harbor.

This project is considered very essential to enlarge and maintain the commercial fishing industry of the Town of Westport.

The present entrance is very unsafe for navigation, except for those daring persons who engage in commercial fishing and a few venturesome recreation minded seamen. It is the considered opinion of many experienced seamen, that, if the outer and inner entrances were channeled and diked that the commercial fishing industry would become a major town industry. It is also believed that with the improvement of the Harbor entrances that pleasure boats of a much larger size would frequent the Westport Harbor because of its natural protection for storm and sea elements. The recommended improvements would place Westport Harbor as a Harbor of Refuge. The increase in pleasure boating would further increase summer recreational activity and thus create new employment.

The present entrance to the harbor is a hazard to boating in general. It is estimated there are 14 large (over 40 ft. length) commercial fishing boats using Westport Harbor entrances and about 30 pleasure boats of the same size. The number of commercial fishing and pleasure craft of smaller sizes is estimated in the hundreds.

Estimated cost of this project is \$200,000.00

3. Establish a marina at Westport Point from a portion of the existing Westport Point Wood Bridge

The old wood bridge at Westport Point connects Horseneck Beach State Reservation with the mainland of the Town of Westport. This bridge is of wood construction with steel girder underpinning, and has a center turn table which is opened by use of a large wood pole as a key turning by manpower. To open

and close this bridge may consume as much time as 40 minutes. This old bridge parallels a new modern steel center lift span bridge electrically operated, which can open in 2 minutes and close in the same equal time. The new bridge cost in the neighborhood of two million dollars financed equally by Federal and State funds. Continued use of the old bridge would hamper marine traffic, the new bridge can and should carry the vehicle traffic. The old bridge is a Chapter 90 Fund road maintained and is in need of extensive expensive repairs and up dating. The continued use of this bridge as a vehicle traffic artery is considered unnecessary.

This project would remove the portion of the old bridge from the turn table north to the north shore of the harbor. Converting the remaining structure to a marina, by strengthening the underpinning, erecting an end barrier, construction of ramps and floats from the old structure. This project will provide much presently needed berthing space and thus, with the diked harbor entrance, increase the recreational potential of the Town of Westport enabling an increase in employment of new jobs.

Cost estimate of this project is \$15,000.00

A Public Hearing of the proposed Area Plan of projects was held November 2, 1961, in the State House, Boston, under the supervision of the Office of Commissioner of Administration and Finances, Mr. Joseph Courtney presiding. Representatives from the following State Departments were a council sitting in judgement on the proposed projects plan:

Assistant Commissioner of Administration and Finances, State Department of Education, Aeronautics Department, State Welfare Department, Planning Division D.P.W., State Department of Public Health, Department of Commerce, State Planning Division, Department of Commerce, Water Resources, Department of Interior, Department of Labor and Industry, Public Housing, Old Age Division, Conservation Division Department of Natural Resources.

Mr. Alfred Edwards, City Planner, Fall River, and Colonel Frank J. Cassidy, Westport Planning Board, represented the Greater Fall River Area before this hearing. Subsequently the plan submitted was approved by the State Commissioner of Administration and Finances and forwarded to the U. S. Government for study and approval. Final approval of the plan was made by the U. S. Department of Commerce Luther Hodges December 22, 1962. No meetings have been held since the approval.

The Westport Planning Board representative to the Greater Fall River Area Redevelopment Committee, deems it wise to hold off any further action under this approval until after the 1962 Annual Town Meeting awaiting the results of the voting on an article to have a Master Plan Study made.

It shall be necessary to hold open public hearings on the proposed or other proposed projects under this U. S. Congressional law.

Soil Conservation has been under consideration during the past year. The vote of confidence by the Town Meeting members granting the Planning Board representation on the Soil Conservation Committee was a great step forward to the prudent use of this committee. The Planning Board selected as their representative to the Soil Conservation Committee, Mr.

Arthur V. Tripp, who subsequently has been selected as Secretary to the Committee.

The Planning Board has on order thirty-one sections of an Aerial Map comprising the Town of Westport. This Aerial Map was made in 1952 under the direction of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The Board has requested copies of an aerial survey made by the State D.P.W. in its progress of building Horse-neck Beach Road and 195 in Westport. Unfortunately, the aerial views of the D.P.W. do not constitute a complete aerial picture of the Town. However, they shall prove very valuable to the Planners in their Town work. The D.P.W. has placed a requirement of compliance that these aerial views shall not be used for private gain. The combination of these aerial views shall help in determination of any detriment to the Town when soil removal is considered.

The Appeals Board has been an asset to the Town in its fair and impartial decisions governing zoning and subdivision regulations. The Appeals Board should be congratulated on a job well done. Theirs is not an easy task. The State laws are numerous on these subjects and are constantly changing which necessitates constant review. The Appeals Board wears three (3) hats. The same group of men act on building, zoning, and subdivision control regulations.

Planning Board membership in the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District continues to be an effectual help. In June of this year, this organization went to bat for the Southeastern part of the State as the forgotten area, as far as State higher education institutions located here is concerned. The Officers along with the professional consultants under contract to the Planning District had many conferences with the Regional Community College Board. The Regional Community College Board, a state established

and supported activity, has the task of establishing twelve Regional Community Colleges. These Community Colleges will be established under the board supervision in various parts of the State. It became quite apparent that Southeastern Massachusetts was not being considered. Perhaps the future establishment of the Massachusetts Technological Institute was considered as sufficient. However, the Regional Planning District membership did not think so, and accordingly gathered much materials from previous professional studies by the consultants under contract to the Planning District and convinced the Regional Community College Board that a dire need was apparent for possibly three such colleges. The big problem is that suitable buildings must be offered by the communities wherein the college will be established, free of any charges to the College Board for a period not less than five years and also there must be suitable area for the construction of a permanent college facility in the same community as the temporary facility is established. A committee was formed and facilities were studied in Lakeville, Taunton, Attleboro, New Bedford (three sites) and Fall River. It appears at the writing of this report, New Bedford will be the first site selected in Southeastern Massachusetts. Complications exist in the other areas mentioned above. This is a very worthwhile project of the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District.

The Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards, a State authorized body of some forty-eight years in existence, is a very worthwhile body and assists the Westport Planning Board much. The conferences and seminars sponsored by this organization are very educational and helpful. For the non-professional planner these organizations are very useful. Their usefulness is only as good as the town planning members attention is good at their conferences and meetings. Colonel

Frank J. Cassidy is the Westport delegate to both of the above mentioned organizations.

During the past year the Planning Board members became aware of a shift in population trends in Town. This knowledge was acquired as a result of inquiries and the presentation to the Board for discussion several (7) preliminary plans and rough sketches of proposed land development into house lots. Six of the preliminary plans were for an area west of Sanford Road. All total these lots approximated 500 house lots. This was surely a population trend shift from the Greenwood-Washington Park Areas of Town.

To review some of the facts confronting the Planning Board, let's go back to April 1958. On that date the Planning Board presented some of its thoughts regarding some of the possible future problems which the Town may have to face. At this meeting there were representatives from the Board of Selectmen, Board of Assessors, Board of Health, Finance Committee, Board of Welfare, Fire Chief, Police Chief, Highway Surveyor, Building Inspector, members of the Chamber of Commerce, and others for a total of thirty-one persons.

True, the presentation was crude, but the potential was stressed as what problems Horseneck Beach Road and Route 195 might cause. At the conclusion of the presentation the Planning Board made a plea for helpful cooperation of all departments of Westport Government and to make any suggestions, comments or other help possible. Much doubt was evident and one must conclude this to be a fact for not one of these persons present took the trouble to offer help or a helpful suggestion. The merchants located on Main Road this past year only too well realized that some of the statements made by the Planning Board members were fact. They suffered a volume loss of patro-

age due to Horseneck Beach Road extending to Route 177. Sanford Road will experience to an extent the same loss.

Other facts are prior to the Town voting in 1956 to adopt Chapter 41 of the General Laws a total approximating 2,000 house lots were on file in the Registry of Deeds and thus exempted from the provisions Section 81A to 81GG of the General Laws. These filed house lot plans have so called Grandfather rights of exemption. Many of these lots are of substandard size 20-22-30 feet wide by 50 feet, 60 feet, 80 feet long. Too small for a Town with no public water or sewer systems coupled with poor soil-obsortion. Health, fire will be some of the problems in these small lot areas.

To date (1957 to 1961) the Planning Board has stamped approved a total of 229 house lots that comply with all existing Town regulations. A total of 249 lots will be approved if and when the developer constructs the road nets, catch basins, set road monuments and other requirements as the particular plan may require for the safety, health and protection of the prospective home buyer. All these essential expenses are born by the developer. So adding up these cited facts, the Planning Board decided a Master Plan study of the Town of Westport was needed **now** before it is too late.

Our form of part-time Government with not specifically trained officials needs the knowledge to be gained by a Master Plan Study of the Town. It is proposed to have the Master Plan Study cover the following:

A basic study, analysis of the studies, and the Master Plan based on the studies involving Land Use, Population distribution, Traffic Patterns, Circulation and Parking, Public Utilities, Plan for Community Facilities to cover 1. Open Areas, 2. Educational, 3. Health

4. Welfare Service, 5. Religious Service and other institutions, 6. Public Buildings, Review Sub-Division Regulations and Zoning Regulations, The Capital improvement program.

To date the Planning Board, in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen, members of the Finance Committee, have interviewed representatives from six professional planning consultant engineering firms. More are to be scheduled at a later date.

This worthwhile program will save the Westport taxpayer many monies through wise future planning. Such a plan will help the Town to avoid many of its past mistakes. It will mean many hard long hours of work for the Planning Board. Now is the most appropriate time to have such a study done, while the area is classified as a labor depressed area the Federal Government pays 75% of the total cost of such Master Plans under 701 fundings.

The Planning Board very highly recommends the Master Plan be adopted by the Towns-people at Town Meeting. The dollars they will save by voting for the plan will be their own.

The Planning Board desires to thank all who have aided by cooperation in the Board's tasks.

Report of the Zoning Board

Herewith is the report covering the activities of the Zoning Board for the year 1961.

The Zoning Board was organized as follows:

Some interest was indicated this past year by Town residents relative to zoning. Again the interest was aroused because of the threat of a junk yard application filed with the Board of Selectmen. The nearby residents, of the area petitioned for permission to establish a junk yard, were the first ones to seek the protection offered by zoning. The Board of Selectmen denied the junk yard application and the interest subsided. A few months later a committee of residents living on and adjacent to Sanford Road formed a committee to zone a large section of the northwest end of Town as residential.

The Zoning Board members attended several of the meetings held in the local area and participated with the committee, explaining the zoning regulation now in force in Town, the application of the State laws governing zoning, and making such recommendations as the Board members felt were best for the Town.

In some instances, the Board's suggested recommendations were rejected by members of the Committee. The Zoning Board realized that a considerable number of commercial enterprises were established on Sanford Road, that these established businesses would continue to operate if this large track of land was zoned residential, having Grandfather rights to continue in business under law. Further the Zoning Board recognized that as homes were built in the area, the need for the community local business was an essential. With this knowledge in mind, the members of the Zoning Board recommended either spot zoning or a large section of Sanford Road be zoned commercial. Spot zoning is considered not in the best principles of zoning, but is used to contain areas that have presently established business, with intervening residential areas.

The Zoning Board must in its deliberation consider all elements involved and must of an necessity be impartial in all its decisions with regard to zoning areas. The Zoning Board must give credence to the petition to zone and not lose sight of the fact that while the persons who object do not have a petition objecting to the petition to zone have a right and such rights must be respected. Very wisely the state provides for a public hearing on all zoning law changes to give the objectors, as well as the petitioners, the opportunity to be heard.

As a result of the committee's refusal to accept the Zoning Board's suggested recommendations, the Board after the Public Hearing, which was held at the High School, September 12, 1961, dispatched the following letter without recommendations to the Board of Selectmen:

"October 5, 1961

Dear Mr. DeAndrade:

On August 3, 1961, the Westport Zoning Board received a petition to zone an area as a residential district of the Town of Westport. The petition described the areas requested to be zoned residential as follows:

'That portion of Town bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point one thousand feet north of Route 177 (American Legion Highway) on the boundary line between Fall River and Westport, thence Northerly along said boundary to a point one thousand feet South of Route 6 (State Road) to a point one thousand feet South and Parallel to Route 6 (State Road) in an Easterly direction to a point one thousand feet South of Route 6 (State Road) and Gifford Road to a point one thousand feet North of Route 177 (American Legion Highway) continuing one thousand feet North of and Parallel to Route 177 (American Legion Highway) in a Westerly direction to a point one thousand feet North of Route 177 and the Fall River-Westport line which is the point of beginning.'

Description in quotation marks taken from the petition submitted to the Zoning Board. This petition was circulated by a Committee of residents living in the area petitioned to be zoned residential and contains three hundred thirty-three signatures as residents of the Town.

Prior to the submitting of the petition to the Zoning Board, the Committee of residents in the area held several open meetings. Members of the Zoning Board attended several of these meetings to be as helpful as possible offering suggestions and clarifying points of zoning law as applicable to the Town of Westport exist-

ing zoning regulations. Some of the offered suggestions by members of the Zoning Board were not acceptable to some members of this Committee. At no time was it the intent or purpose of the Zoning Board to try to force its will on this Committee. The Zoning Board was of the opinion since this Committee was to accomplish most of the difficult task necessary, the will of this Committee must prevail.

A Public Hearing was held September 12, 1961 with regard to this petition. About 75 persons attended. There was a discussion for and against the petition, reasons varying. Some objectors were quite vocal. Members of the Zoning Board explained the effects of the petition if the area was zoned residential by Town vote and answered many questions.

It is the belief of some members of the Zoning Board that much of the opposition to zone Sanford Road residential would have been eliminated had the construction of Horseneck Beach Highway been completed to Route 6. After the completion of this new road from Route 177 to Route 6, Sanford Road will cease to exist as a main artery of Town, and will become a secondary road. When this happens, many of the presently established and small operating businesses will cease to continue in business. The Zoning Board has advertised the Public Hearing as required by law in the Fall River Herald and the New Bedford Standard Times.

The Westport Zoning Board recommends that a Special Meeting be held during 1961 to enable the Town residents to vote and accept or reject the petition to zone the area described in the petition. The Zoning Board agrees with the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen in his logic that the Annual Town Meeting is a very serious financial discussion period, to detract the

voters from the main reasons of an annual town meeting by including a Town problem of the magnitude of Zoning an area of Town is unwise.

The members of the Zoning Board attended one conference and two seminars on zoning conducted under the auspices of the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District and the Federation of Massachusetts Planning and Zoning Boards. These lectures and demonstrations are given by members of the legal profession, state officials, and professional planning engineering consultants. Members have visited with zoning boards of other towns in an effort to improve their knowledge of the subject. Members of the Zoning Board have devoted a total of seventy-six and on half (76½) hours to this vital subject.

Much remains to be accomplished in the way of zoning the remainder of Town and to improve the present zoning regulations. A zoned area has certain protection according to the type zoning and thus affords a security to the prospective buyer of land and enhances the value. Financial institutions are giving more consideration to areas presently zoned than to unzoned areas. Reason their investment has less chance of depreciation due to a nonconforming use of land adjacent to that area granted a trust.

Zoning is still the best protection provided property. Large commercial and industrial corporations will

not invest in an area not protected by a classification conforming to their interests.

The Zoning Board feels if the voters at the 1962 Annual Town Meeting vote to authorize the Master Plan study recommended by the Planning Board, an impartial professional study report and a land use map will be developed as a section of the Master Plan. The map of recommended land use, with the report will be a guide to a future zoning regulation based on these studies. Such studies are essential as they eliminate the guess work with regard to zoning an area of land. The present Zoning Board does not subscribe to the theory that land should be zoned just for the sake of being zoned. This idea to zone a large tract as residential can be just as detrimental to an area's growth potential, and in some instance more harmful than no zoning at all.

It is the policy of the school department to issue no-school bulletins or announcements through Stations WSAR—Fall River, WNBH and WBSM—New Bedford, and WPRO—Providence, whenever driving conditions are, or promise to be, **dangerous**. On doubtful mornings, the family radio should be tuned in from 6:30 A.M. to 7:30 A.M. for no-school decisions.

Weather conditions in a given area at a given time are still largely unpredictable. Therefore, there will be days when, with the best of intention, buses will be sent when they should not, and not sent when they should be.

Parents will have to use their own judgment in determining whether their children should attend school under adverse weather conditions. When attendance is poor because of weather conditions, no new work will be presented by the teachers.

Voted:

That so much of the report of the Superintendent of Schools, as is herein printed, shall be the report of the School Committee for the year ending December 31, 1961.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Westport:

I submit herein my third annual report as your superintendent of schools, it being the seventy-third such report submitted in the history of this superintendency. I am also including the reports of the school principals and supervisors as a part of my report to you.

While we are primarily concerned with our local educational picture, we must also concern ourselves to some extent with the national trend which portrays the shape of things to come educationally. National trends are rapidly reflected in our own community. This is as true in education as it is in other fields.

I am going to divide the non-statistical part of my report into three sections. The first will be concerned with our local educational gains and growth. The second will concern itself with further educational needs in our Town. The third section will deal with national educational goals which will in turn affect the total educational process in Westport.

Local Educational Gains and Growth

Some of the items below were inaugurated during the previous fiscal year, but have only been fully realized during the past year. Therefore, there will necessarily be some over-lapping. A superintendent of schools can only recommend, and attempt to persuade a school committee, to follow any particular line of action. Therefore, any gains made, must in the end, be credited largely to the policy-making power; namely, the School Committee.

1. An effective building maintenance and repair program has been put into effect.
2. Raising the age of entrance in Grade One, in accordance with national studies and local experience, is a sound educational step. This should go a long way in eliminating the experience of failure in the first grade, except for those cases where low I.Q.'s and overage are involved. It will also cut down on the number of children that need "remedial reading instruction" in the middle and upper grades.
3. A definitely progressive leave-of-absence policy for teachers who wish to take advanced study and return to Westport has been adopted by the School Committee.
4. Many of our textbooks have been updated, and old equipment replaced with new. Several items of new equipment (not replacements) have been obtained in the audio-visual and physical education fields.
5. A teachers' salary schedule that is competitive with the area has been adopted by the School Committee. This action has served to reduce the annual turn-over of teachers to a marked degree to the benefit of the school system. We cannot financially afford to be too far ahead of our area; neither can we afford educationally to be behind the area in this field. It would seem to be the part of good business and educational wisdom to maintain our present position in relation to area towns and cities.
6. The High School Faculty and the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools Evaluation Committee have completed their study of Westport High School. The evaluation pro-

gram has been very stimulating and revealing to all concerned, as the many aspects of our school program and plant were examined with an objective eye, debated pro and con, with ratings and conclusions recorded. The faculty and administrative personnel are to be commended for the serious way that they have gone about this evaluation program. The evaluation committee's report is on file in both the superintendent's and the high school principal's office and may be examined by interested citizens.

7. Our Elementary Faculty is to be commended for the work that they have done and are doing under the leadership of the elementary school principals, in the fields of English and arithmetic courses of study. The project of putting in booklet form just what each grade teacher is responsible for teaching in her grade, is certainly a very worthwhile activity, and will eliminate much confusion and uncertainty as to who is responsible for each subject matter area. These courses of study will become our basic guides, rather than any textbook, as far as subject matter responsibility is concerned.
8. The School Department is continuing to receive a new driver training car each year. This year, the Ashley Motor Sales of New Bedford is providing a 1962 Falcon with dual controls. This is a great help to our program at relatively little cost to our taxpayers. We are indebted to this company for this service.
9. Our High School English Program has been greatly strengthened by acquiring a Department Head last year and an additional English teacher this year.
10. The Art program in the grades and in the High

School has been substantially improved by allowing teacher-supervisors enough time to work effectively in this field. The music program in grades one through six has been similarly strengthened.

11. The acquisition of a second, and much needed guidance counsellor, has enabled the High School to meet standards in this field, as recommended by the state department of education, and by such authorities as Dr. James B. Conant.
12. The need for a fire escape at the Milton Earle School has been discussed for many years. The Westport School Committee recently voted to have the work done. It is now in the process of construction to the satisfaction of the fire Department, the Earle School P.T.A., and area residents in general.
13. First steps have been taken toward acquiring additional land for the Milton Earle School playground, which is at present inadequate by any standard. The land, after acquiring, will be gradually developed into a safe and usable play area. We expect that the total expense of this project will be relatively small.
14. A beginning has been made in building up the Alice A. Macomber School library.
15. A two-way communication system has been installed in the Earle School at relatively small expense. This system also contains a radio and a record player. This installation has proven to be especially valuable to the principal when general announcements to all rooms are necessary. The Committee is to be commended for having this efficient, economical, time-saver installed.

16. The artesian well at the Earle School has been cleaned out, and is now producing a satisfactory amount of clear water. This was previously done over 20 years ago. We hope that it will be good for another 20 years.
17. The school cafeterias have had some new equipment, are being efficiently managed, and the financial operation running substantially in the black.
18. Fire and safety hazards have been removed or remedied in all school buildings. School basements and firerooms have been largely cleared of materials no longer used.
19. Aluminum storm-windows have been obtained for the west side of the Greenwood Park School. New fluorescent lighting has been installed in some areas of several buildings.
20. The Head School has been renovated inside and out, and is proving to be a valuable part of our school plant.
21. The windows of the Factory School, which was recently returned to the School Committee by the Selectmen, have been covered with protective shutters by the custodial force. I anticipate that we will have a future use for this building.
22. The drives at the Earle School have been black-topped and the parking area at the High School has been repaired.
23. Homogeneous, or ability grouping of children, has been put into effect as far forth as practicable. This is in line with the national trend and holds considerable promise in providing for individual differences in the learning rate of children.

24. Despite changes and improvements that have cost money, the School Department has been able to return substantial sums of money to the Town for the past two years.

Needs, and Other Considerations for the Future

1. Probably an additional math-science teacher in the High School.
2. Provision made, if possible, for after school transportation from the High School (perhaps at 3:30 P.M.).
3. Some arrangement made so that we have a driver-training car during September and October which are good-weather months for road work in the driver-training program.
4. Some clerical help for the Macomber and Earle Schools so that the school principals will be free for supervisory work.
5. More physical space for guidance and counselling at the High School.
6. Possibly a longer school day at the High School. There is a definite trend in this direction all over the country.
7. A physical education program in grades one through six. This need has been well established in national studies, and is strongly recommended by President Kennedy's advisory group, and by former President Eisenhower's fact-finding committee. This will have to be much more than merely a games program in which only a part of our children regularly participate.
8. More use of Educational TV, or the 21" classroom, particularly at the High School level. At the

present time New England telecasts are largely in the "enrichment field", rather than full subject teaching (except possibly in French). However, it now seems that Telecasting is on the way toward producing full courses in some fields, with the intent of teaching large groups with specialists as teachers. If such courses are developed and specialists are used, we will certainly want to get this "exposure to great teaching" for our youth!

9. Consideration of elimination of grade designations below grade four, as is being experimented with at present in some places. This would involve "ability grouping", with each group going at its own speed, with "enrichment programs" for the fast groups, etc. Promotions from this **Primary Group** would be at the end of the third year into Grade 4. The potential advantages of this method seem to be—ability grouping which allows for maximum accomplishment at the various levels—less non-promotion in the lower grades—more accomplishment, by virtue of enriched programs in the faster groups.
10. Study of, and possible purchase of a "language laboratory" for the High School.
11. Possible development of not only an enriched, but an accelerated, or advanced placement program in our school system. This would involve getting started as low as Grade one, or the Primary Group.
12. The possibility of a remedial reading teacher for Grades 2-3-4, primarily.

The Development of Our National Educational Goals

or

Where we have been — Where we are now

Where we hope to go

In order to conserve space I am going to take pertinent statements from Silberman's original theme on this subject, rather than print it in its entirety.

1. The present tide of educational change has taken place because large numbers of our people from many walks of life have come to the conclusion that the educational needs of our country in the future would be very different from those of the past.
2. In the early years of the Republic, education was a concern chiefly of the social and economic elite. The content was largely classical — the purpose principally to train clergymen, lawyers, and community leaders.
3. The rise of industry created the need of a literate working class, and shifted great numbers of illiterate people from the farms to the cities. At the same time, large cities were being engulfed by waves of immigration from southern and eastern Europe. Children in droves deserted the schools as not practical in the world in which they lived.
4. In a search for a practical education for this new situation, the last great change in American education began, known as "Progressive Education". In an effort to Americanize the immigrants, and to fulfill a multitude of social and business needs, our schools took the emphasis off intellectual discipline and turned toward vocational training, health, and the quality of community life. For 50 years this system helped the U. S. to make more smoothly than any other nation the difficult transition from a farming to an industrial society.
5. Recently the feeling has been growing that the educational system that we have is "not right" for the future needs and responsibilities of Amer-

ican society. The United States today is moving away from progressivism, not because it is false in the absolute sense, but because it badly serves the needs of our times.

6. The growing complexity of organization and the explosive pace of technological and social change, are creating enormous demand that is without historical precedent. Society has always needed a few men with highly developed and disciplined intellects; industrial society needed masses of literate but not necessarily intellectual men. Tomorrow requires something the world has never seen — Masses of Intellectuals.
7. Language laboratories, teaching machines, or programmed instruction as its advocates prefer to call it, team teaching, etc., are all efforts that proceed from or contribute to a re-emphasis on the intellectual aims of education. These new tools and methods may not prove to have permanent value and be retained. However, if they are not, others will take their place, and they will have served their stimulating purpose.
8. The road to excellence is always uphill. There will be resistance from parents who prefer the easy way, from taxpayers who prefer the least expensive way, from educators reluctant to try any new way. It is never easy for any group to abandon ideas and practices of long standing, and educators are perhaps more hidebound than most where their own work is concerned. But this nation will be unable to hold its own in the hard and exciting years ahead, unless the great change now beginning in education comes to fruition.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Mr. Laurence A. Fogg

Dear Mr. Fogg:

As Principal of the Westport High School, I hereby submit my annual report:

Changes in Personnel

Miss Frances Roscoe resigned to further her study at the University of Massachusetts.

Mr. John Mello, who replaced Miss Roscoe, was called into active service by the National Guard.

Mr. David Kraner, who was appointed to the Agricultural Department during Mr. McGarr's absence, accepted a position in a private school. Mr. McGarr returned to Westport after a year at Cornell, where he received his Master's Degree.

Mrs. Rita Griffin was assigned to supervise music in grades one through six and Mrs. Eckhardt took over the music at the secondary level.

The following teachers were appointed: Miss Alice Hearn as an additional English teacher; Mr. Louis Finucci to teach English and Social Studies.

Mr. Paul Larrivee, Head of the English Department, submitted a progress report as follows:

PROGRESS REPORT OF THE ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

As Chairman of the English Department, I submit the following as my annual report for the year 1961.

STAFF ADDITION

The appointment of Miss Alice Hearn to the English department has enabled us to reduce class size and to add a reading course to our senior high English program. This kind of action by the School Committee and Mr. Laurence Fogg with regard to English instruction is indeed gratifying.

Miss Hearn has brought to her first teaching position a keen interest in her work and a sympathetic understanding of the language problems of our youth. She has already shown herself to be a valuable addition to the staff.

CONTINUED POLICY

The revision or modification of policy outlined last year in this report is for the most part still in effect. Such matters as the teaching of composition, book reporting, pupil re-assignment, professional help, and supervision are being conducted in much the same manner as before.

READING INSTRUCTION

For the first time, an elective course in reading and study skills, carrying 2½ credits, is being offered to juniors and seniors. At present there are two such groups, each meeting five times weekly.

The course proposes to develop reading speed and comprehension through activities involving S. R. A. Laboratory materials, reading accelerators, and the tachistoscope. We hope soon to introduce the Harvard Speed Reading Film series, if it is available to us on a loan basis.

Mr. John Carli has served ably as the teacher of this course. Besides developing reading skills, he has introduced activities relating to study skills. Most

recently the pupils of this course were engaged in taking notes on a phase of biology, organizing the notes in a logical outline, and studying this material as if preparing for an actual biology examination. This procedure will be repeated with other subject matter.

Moreover, Mr. Carli has taught the syllogism as a means of analyzing the logic of both reading matter and the pupil's own composition. With relation to this analysis of discourse, pupils are made to write paragraphs while consciously observing a syllogistic pattern. It need not be argued here that there is a relationship between writing skill and reading ability.

Next year we plan to add at least one other reading group to our organization of classes with the hope of eventually making the reading course available to all pupils. While all pupils may not at present elect the reading course, the reading laboratory, nevertheless, is now being used on a part-time basis with three other English groups whose reading level is low.

SPEECH NEEDS

Although there is a variety of speech activities being offered during regular English classes, none of these activities receives much treatment in depth since, by their own nature, such activities demand more time than is now available during the English class period, when so many other important phases of the English program also require attention. To provide adequate coverage for speech activities, the department must organize separate speech courses for all pupils. The department, however, is not numerically adequate to handle such an increase in number of courses. Another English teacher must be added to the staff before this change in course organization can be effected.

SCHOOL PAPER AND JOURNALISM

Plans are now being made to publish a school

paper, which will attempt to present the school and community with news of the school, and which will offer the creative student the opportunity to practice creative writing.

Next year I plan to introduce a course in first-year journalism for juniors and seniors, who will be responsible for the publication of the paper. Without a course in journalism, the paper could not be effectively managed; pupils who have shown an interest in a school publication have other activities which prohibit them from meeting with me on a regular basis. Furthermore, the activity period is certainly not long enough to teach journalism and plan a paper during once-a-week meetings.

If the course is successful in attracting students who are genuinely interested in publishing a paper, I plan the following year to add a second-year journalism course, so that eventually the English department will offer Journalism I and Journalism II, elective for juniors and seniors who meet the prerequisite requirements in their English and Journalism I grades.

NEW BOOKS AND MATERIALS

Single titles, both classical and modern, have been purchased this year (in some cases from dealers in used books, which I find to be in excellent condition) to supplement the anthologies that we now have available. In so doing, we are observing NCTE and CEEB recommendations to teach a few books in their entirety rather than to present a great number of excerpts from anthologies.

Also we are continuing to add to our professional library in some cases by purchasing at a discount from the NCTE. These publications have proved valuable both in course construction and as reference material in teaching.

In addition, literary maps of London, the British Isles, and the Mediterranean have been acquired to develop a substantial store of instructional materials for the teaching of English.

PROMOTION

The school system should seriously consider a change in the present policy which allows the automatic promotion of the high school pupil in his English courses. Such scholastic permissiveness results in an untenable state of affairs: a college preparatory pupil may fail freshman English, for example, and may nevertheless be promoted to **English for college preparatory sophomores**; however, the courses of study are organized as a sequence, but sequential development is in truth only nominal if actual practice disregards the provisions of the courses.

Changes in Curriculum

The commercial department added three periods of transcription to their curriculum.

French was offered to the entire seventh grade. In the past this subject was available to the better groups only.

Additional Equipment

During the past year the following equipment has been purchased:

- Milk cooler.

Looking Ahead

I believe we should consider expanding our Program of Studies to include French I in the ninth grade college curriculum. This would enable a student to study four years of one modern foreign language.

It may be advisable to offer more commercial subjects and make it a four-year course rather than the two-year course that we now offer.

The general curriculum should be expanded by the addition of more courses for the non-college student.

Consideration should be given to an increase in the number of elective art and music courses.

To accomplish these goals more space would be needed, and until it is available, our program of studies must be limited.

All courses of study should be examined and revised to meet the needs of the community and the age in which we live. This is particularly important in the field of mathematics and science.

Some intensive curriculum work has been done on both the elementary and secondary levels. However, articulation between the two levels is necessary for a smooth and effective transition. This could be accomplished by having a curriculum co-ordinator who might work with committees comprising both elementary and secondary teachers to achieve a system-wide, united effort.

**REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF
MILTON E. EARLE SCHOOL**

My dear Mr. Fogg:

The following is my report as Principal of the Milton E. Earle School for the year 1961.

Again this year, there were no changes among our faculty. Our pupils are the fortunate beneficiaries of the stabilizing influences which result from the continuing services of this group of sincere and dedicated teachers.

Our total enrolment is 218 pupils, a slight increase of 8 pupils over last year's figure at this time.

Our teachers, working in cooperation with all other elementary teachers in Westport, have completed a course of study in English for grades 1-6 which has been in use since September. This is the first course of study in English which has been made available to elementary teachers in Westport for at least thirty years.

While, admittedly, there is "room for improvement," the subject matter to be taught at each grade level is made definite, there is continuity, and an emphasis on written English in grades 3-6. We consider this course of study a beginning, subject to changes and frequent revisions.

Work on an arithmetic course of study is now underway. Curriculum meetings are generally held after school twice a month. Mr. John Shomer, Supervisor of Elementary Education was a speaker and consultant at one of our meetings.

For some time we have requested full time supervisors in art, music and physical education for the elementary grades. This need was realized in September in the fields of music and art. These subjects, not primarily academic in nature, require leadership by a specialist, in most cases, in order for the pupil to derive benefit from activity in this area. Participation in, creation and enjoyment of music, art and physical education is one of the purposes of the elementary school. In these fields, I make the following requests:

1. A new piano to be placed in our auditorium, as a beginning for piano replacements in our school.
2. Provision for materials for handwork opportunities in art.
3. Supervision in physical education.

During the past year our combination 5th and 6th grade class has profited from a course in conservation and natural science presented by the Massachusetts Audubon Society. Mrs. Thibault requested this program. We were most fortunate in having, Miss Emily Goode, an outstanding teacher in this field, assigned to our class. I wish that we could extend this program to include all fifth and sixth grade pupils. Grades 4-6 have been participating recently in the educational television program which the Massachusetts Audubon Society presents on Channel 2.

An extensive evaluation of first graders was made this fall. Parents were informed of this plan by Superintendent's letter and subsequent letters offered suggestions for preparing pupils for grade one.

In addition to physical examinations, reading readiness and mental ability tests were administered. In some instances, where pupils did not do well in these tests and, in addition, were not adjusting well to the

daily routine of first grade, a recommendation for the pupil's exclusion for the remainder of the year was made to the parents.

In view of the fact that the elementary school day is excessively long for first graders, and that there is no opportunity for pre-primary training in Westport, I believe it to be in the child's best interests to delay his entrance to school. I recommend that effective September 1, 1962, a child must be 6 years of age by September 1 in order to be admitted to grade one.

I further suggest the possibility of shortening our school day for all elementary grades, and, at the same time, eliminating a number of "special services" in the schools which are not required and which could take place after school hours. The result would be a more worthwhile day from an academic standpoint, enabling the teacher to concentrate "on the essentials" to a far greater degree than is now possible.

In the interests of the safety and welfare of our pupils, I recommend that matrons be employed by the School Department to ride on our school buses and that they be given the authority to maintain discipline. It is impossible for parents and teachers to supervise pupils' conduct by "remote control". The bus driver should be relieved of this responsibility, so that he can devote his efforts exclusively to the operation of the bus. I believe that the costs of this service would be insignificant in the light of the moral and physical welfare of the pupils which is involved in this situation.

A unique innovation in our school this year is the participation of our pupils in a "live" radio broadcast on Friday mornings at 9:35. This opportunity was made possible through the cooperation of Mr. Albert Lees of Westport and Radio Station WALE, Fall River, Mr. George Sisson, manager.

School news and special programs have been presented. This offers an opportunity for oral expression for all who take part and, for sixth graders who serve as announcers, it affords a practical situation for the organization of material to be presented. One fourth of our pupils have already participated.

Our school savings program has expanded even further this year.

The Milton E. Earle School was awarded a certificate in appreciation of patriotic service to the nation through the United States Savings Program in November, 1961 by Douglas Dillon, Secretary of the Treasury.

Our physical plant has been further improved in 1961.

A significant safety feature for the welfare of our pupils is the fire escape leading from the second floor at the rear of the building, installation of which is nearly complete.

Enlargement of our play area is now assured for the near future as a result of recent town meeting action which authorized the purchase of land for this purpose.

We have received additional equipment which includes steel cabinets, filing cabinets, principal's desk, pupil utility desks for individualized instruction, folding arm chairs, and regular folding metal chairs.

Bookcases have been built and installed in three classrooms.

We have received supplementary textbooks and materials, library books and a filmstrip projector.

I thank you, Mr. Fogg, not only for your attention to the needs of our school plant, and your consideration of our requests for instructional materials, but also for your constructive suggestions for improving the educational program of our school, and above all, for your concern for the general welfare of our pupils.

December 31, 1961 marked the completion of ten years in the "life" of the Milton E. Earle School. Perhaps this is an appropriate time for a renewal of our purposes and a word of reaffirmation of our faith.

During the past ten years, despite our daily struggles with the inequalities and limitations of human nature, I trust that, we have done well in "living up" to the objectives of the philosophy of our school by **helping** our pupils:

1. To live in harmony with the truth of God, and in obedience to his laws.
2. To show respect for people and property in the home, in the community, and in the world.
3. To develop pride in and respect for our Country.
4. To know fundamental learnings for this level of education.
5. To think clearly, intelligently and honestly.
6. To maintain health and practice safety.
7. To appreciate beauty in the truly esthetic.

To everyone in our school, in our school department, and in our community who has helped us towards the fulfillment of these purposes for our pupils, I am most sincerely grateful.

May I also express to you, to the Westport School Committee and to the citizens of Westport a reaffirmation of our faith in our schools, in their purposes and in their accomplishments!

Through the continuing cooperation of the home, the church and the community, may we, the teachers of the Milton E. Earle School continue to share in giving children a "firm foundation" on which to grow spiritually, morally, physically, and mentally.

REPORT OF GUIDANCE DIRECTOR

Sir:

Following is my report for the school year of 1961.

The addition of Mrs. Ethel Liebmann to the guidance staff has had many worthwhile results. The case load of girls has increased significantly, due to her presence, and she has achieved notable results with many of them. Her selection as counselor was indeed a happy one.

No situation, however, is ideal. The physical space in which we work is severely limited. This was pointed up by the evaluating committee of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, who realized that confidential counseling was virtually impossible without one of us leaving the entire suite to the other. The committee further suggested plans for expanding the guidance office to include the present nurse's office. We sincerely hope this plan will be considered favourably.

It is a truism to say that no guidance program can operate successfully without the support of the faculty and administration of the school. We continue to receive this and we realize its importance.

Percentage-wise, we are showing a noticeable increase in the number of nursing and teaching candidates graduating from our school, and the overall percentage of students moving on to further education after graduation has risen to 57%, the highest we have ever experienced. Much of our counseling these days is devoted to educational placement of this sort.

Another major emphasis of our counseling program has dealt with potential drop-outs, and our records show that several of these have experienced changes in attitude through counseling.

In conclusion, several potential areas of growth are apparent. We need to spend additional money on our testing program, especially in those areas evaluating the achievement and capacity of the non-college groups. Of utmost importance, however, is the expansion of our physical facilities.

REPORT OF ELEMENTARY ART SUPERVISOR

The importance of art at the elementary level is well appreciated by both teachers and administrators. For the most part, we have common goals—creation, self expression, exploration, personal satisfaction and social growth through cooperation and sharing. This year it is possible for the first time, to have a full forty-five minute period every week in every elementary grade one through six with the addition of adequate time for preparation and travel between schools.

A ceramics kiln has been installed at the Macomber School which is a tremendous addition to the art program at the elementary level, providing a means of using clay, firing and glazing the children's work.

The art program helps boys and girls to develop as individuals through emphasizing:

Expression — providing ways to communicate feelings, ideas and experiences that cannot be expressed in words.

Visual judgment — giving opportunity to learn to select, manage, organize and use different materials and tools and to gain a sense of the relationship among tools, materials, and what is expressed.

Creativity — learning to use one's own ideas in starting, making and completing something; developing self-confidence.

I am very happy to report that my schedule this year makes it possible for me to visit each class at a definite appointed time each week. It also allows time to give added assistance where it is needed.

It is the classroom teacher who has daily music experiences with the class which help the children grow in the skills of making music and the understanding of the use of music in their lives. It is

the classroom teacher who makes each musical experience reach its potential learning effectiveness.

We are most fortunate in having these well experienced teachers in our Elementary Schools, and I am most grateful to them for their wholehearted acceptance of our broadened Music Instruction Program.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to all Elementary Principals for their cooperation and for their genuine interest in our Music Department.

I also wish to express my appreciation and sincere thanks to you, Mr. Fogg, as well as to the members of the Westport School Committee, for accepting my suggestion and for allowing for this more extensive Music Education for the girls and boys of our Elementary Schools.
