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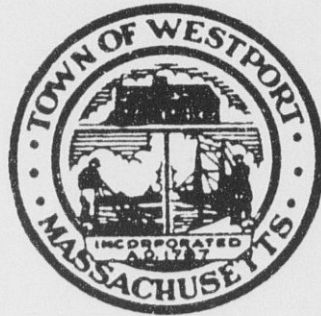

TOWN OF WESTPORT

Westport was settled in 1670 as a locality within the town of Dartmouth. In 1787 this locality was incorporated as a separate town. The name Westport was not an arbitrary choice. The boundary lines of older maps do not correspond exactly with their modern counterparts, so that Massachusetts, New England's largest state at the time, included present day Maine. Many people who lived in Dartmouth township traded furs with the Indians and went fishing all along the Maine coast. Some of the Sailing ships would leave port at Westport Harbor and sail the entire length of the then Massachusetts coastline. When sailors spoke of their voyage, they would tell of sailing from the west port to the east port of Massachusetts. So when it came time to name this part of Dartmouth, the General Court of Boston allowed the town fathers to name it after the harbor and to be called Westport.

The town had cobbler shops, blacksmith shops, forge mills, a grist mill, as well as a cotton mill located where Westport Factory now stands; industries located at the Head and at the Point included shipyards, sail lofts and tailor shops. The shipyard built whaling vessels that sailed all over the world. This industry grew so rapidly that a fleet of twenty to thirty ships called Westport their home port.

The 1787 division of Westport from Dartmouth put Westport under the leadership of a Board of Selectmen. The Town has retained that type of local government down through the centuries and even today the policies of the Town are decided upon each March by an open town meeting of registered voters.

The Westport of today is an ideal spot for either home or industry. Within minutes of two large cities - Fall River and New Bedford - it affords easy access to shipping lanes, inland rail transportation and air transport service.

If you like country living with its rivers, lakes, and ocean; if you've yearned to relax your pace, but you've never found the surroundings that suited you exactly; or if you'd just like a spot in which to let the world slip you by for a while - then, come to Westport. You'll find it's just the place you've been looking for.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to rescind existing by-laws and/or regulations indicating set backs and amend the Zoning By-Law to establish set-back requirements by adopting the following and/or take any other action relative thereto:

SECTION II DEFINITIONS

14. A "front yard" is a required open unoccupied space, within and extending the full width of the lot, between the street line and the front of a building.

15. A "side yard" is a required open unoccupied space within the lot between a side lot line, not a street line, and the parts of the building nearest to such a lot line. Such a side yard shall extend for its required width from the street line or its equivalent to the rear or its equivalent to another street.

16. A "rear yard" is a required open unoccupied space, the full width of the lot lying between the extreme rear wall of the building and the rear line of the lot or the line of a public street or private way in case the lot borders on such street or way.

VI - H YARD OR SET-BACK REQUIREMENTS

FRONT YARDS: Every building or structure shall be built or placed on a lot so that there shall be a front yard of at least 25 feet clear depth from the street line or lines to the part of such building or structure closest to the street line; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet on both sides of the lot in question.

SIDE YARDS: At each side of every building or structure there shall be a side yard not less than ten feet in clear width between the side of the building or structure and the side lot lines. However, in the case of corner lots, there shall be a set back requirement of 25 feet from the street line to the side of any building or structure; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet of said lot in question.

REAR YARDS: Behind every building or structure there shall be provided a back yard between the rear line of a building or structure and the rear lot line not less than six feet in depth and/or 25 feet from the rear street line.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law to provide for off-street parking by adopting the following and/or take any other action relative thereto:

VI - 1. OFF-STREET PARKING

1. Parking facilities off the street right-of-way for new construction shall be provided on the same lot as the building for each use within the district. Off-street parking shall be designed to prevent the necessity of any vehicles backing into a public way. No parking area shall be less than 5 feet from a road or property line. Each parking space shall have a useable area of at least 180 square feet and be served by two-way access lane at least 28 feet wide, except that if parking stalls are angled at 60 degrees or less, a one-way access lane may be used with a minimum of 22 feet. The 28 foot two-way access lane shall not be required for dwellings of up to four units. In such cases a 12 foot one-way access is sufficient. The number of spaces required for each use shall be determined by the Building Inspector based upon the following criteria:

USE	MINIMUM REQUIRED SPACE
Residence - Housekeeping, rooms for roomers or boarders, apartments, multi-family	1.5 spaces per unit
Customary Home Occupation or recognized Profession	1 space for each home occupation or profession in addition to residential requirements.
Retail stores, Financial Institutions, Consumer Services, Professional or Business offices and similar businesses	1 space for each 200 square feet of floor space
Wholesale showrooms and Operations	1 space for each 1,000 square feet plus 1 additional space for each 2 employees actively engaged at any one time
Hotel and Motels	1 space per room and 1 space for every 3 seats in restaurants and/or meeting rooms and 1 space for each 2 employees
Restaurants, Clubs, Theatres, Churches or other places of public assembly	1 space for every 3 seats or 50 square feet of gross floor area and 1 space for every 2 employees
Barber Shops and Beauty Parlors	3 spaces for each operator
Bowling Alleys and Tennis Courts	4 spaces for each alley or court
For any use not specifically listed	1.5 spaces for each 1,000 square feet of floor space and 1 space for each 2 employees

2. Other uses conducted for profit on premises within or without a building such as flea markets, auction houses, and fairs shall provide for adequate off-street parking. The Board of Appeals may grant a special permit to any person or organization to allow for sporadic of intermittent use of a premises without complying with the requirements of this section. Nothing herein will be construed to affect or limit churches or other charitable organizations from conducting fund raising events without complying with the requirements of this section.

3. Industrial and commercial buildings shall provide adequate parking, maneuvering and loading space on premises for freight and delivery trucks in addition to the minimum requirements for spaces listed in paragraph (I) 1. above.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Zoning By-Law to regulate the installation of towers and/or windpower generator systems or take any other action relative thereto.

SECTION VI. GENERAL REGULATIONS

J. TOWERS AND WIND GENERATING SYSTEMS

Towers and wind generating systems, including windmills, radio transmitters and receivers, solar and satellite discs and similar structures shall be permitted in all districts if authorized by a special permit by the Board of Appeals pursuant to Section VI-E of the Zoning By-Law provided they are not detrimentally dangerous, or obnoxious to adjoining areas and provided:

1. SETBACK: The minimum setback distance for towers from any abutters' property line shall be (and shall continue to be for the life of the installation) at least equal to the maximum height of the tower from grade plus 20 feet. Setbacks will be measured to the center of the tower base.
2. TOWER HEIGHT: No tower shall exceed 35-feet from grade.
3. TOWER ACCESS: Access shall be constructed in such a manner as not to become an attractive nuisance. In no case shall the climbing access to the tower be lower than ten (10) feet from the ground.
4. STRUCTURAL REQUIREMENTS: A certificate shall be submitted to the Board of Appeals from a registered professional engineer certifying the safety and structural stability of the entire tower system.
5. SPECIAL PERMIT: Such special permit shall contain restrictions and/or safeguards with regard to noise control and height, assure that there will be no electrical emissions that will interfere with electrical reception of neighboring property, and requirements for fencing and liability insurance.
6. MAINTENANCE: If a tower is designated a safety hazard by a registered structural or civil engineer, the owner of said tower shall be required to dismantle the installation. All tower mounted equipment shall be operated in a safe responsible manner. Any interference caused by the tower or equipment on the tower to local radio and/or other electronic equipment shall be corrected within ten (10) days at the applicants expense.

Planning Board

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws as follows or take any other action relative thereto:

Delete the first paragraph under Section III-B-2, and substitute the following therefor:

"Beginning at a point approximately 2,100 feet south of centerline of Hix Bridge Road where it intersects Main Road, which is a point on the southern boundry of Lot 29, Plat 80 (presently owned by Westport Marine Supplies), and where it intersects Main Road and running easterly across Main Road 1000-feet; thence northerly in a line parallel to the east line of Main Road and one thousand feet easterly therefrom to a point distant northerly one thousand feet measured in said line from the north line of Kirby Road; thence westerly at right angles to the

east line of main Road one thousand feet to the east line of main Road; thence continuing westerly to the same course across Main Road to the west line of main Road and continuing westerly in the same course one thousand feet beyond west line of Main Road; thence southerly in a line parallel to the west line of Main Road an one thousand feet westerly therefrom to the southern boundary of Lot 29, Plat 80, thence easterly of the southern boundary of Lot 29, Plat 80, one thousand ft. more or less to the place of beginning.

The balance of the area formerly zoned as business under the deleted section III-B-2 and running from the southern boundary of Lot 29, Plat 80, to the south line of Cornell Road (a distance of 4,200-feet, more or less) shall be zoned as residence."

Planning Board

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws as follows or take any other action thereon:

Delete paragraph B-3 of Section III which reads as follows:

"3. As Unrestricted: All remaining portions of the Town." substitute therefor the following under paragraph B-1 of Section III:

The portion of the Town formerly zoned unrestricted and bounded on the north by Old Bedford Road, on the east by Highland Avenue, the Dartmouth line and Washington Street, and on the south by a line running 500 feet to the north of and parallel to Route 6. The area within the boundary of the line running northerly from Washington Street to the Fall River-Westport line and 500 feet northerly of Route 6 and parallel thereto shall be zoned business.

Planning Board

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Zoning By-Law or take any other action relative thereto.

VI. H. WATER RESOURCE PROTECTION

1. Purpose and Application

For the purpose of protecting groundwaters and other water resources in the Town of Westport, there are hereby established water resource protection regulations as part of the Zoning By-Law. These regulations apply throughout the Town.

All uses and dimensional requirements and other provisions of this by-law applicable to land, buildings, and uses in all zoning districts shall remain in force and effect, except that where the water resource protection regulations impose greater or additional restrictions and requirements, such restrictions and requirements shall prevail.

2. Use Regulations

Notwithstanding use regulations for a particular district, the uses listed below are prohibited. Such uses where lawfully existing, may be continued, but may not be expanded or altered without a special permit from the Special Permit Granting Authority (SPGA) which for the purpose of this section of the zoning by-law is the Planning Board.

- a. Outdoor storage of the following substances: Salt, snow-melting chemicals, or hazardous substances such as pesticides, herbicides, and water soluble and volatile chemical compounds. This prohibition shall include, without limitation, outdoor storage of materials containing or coated with such chemicals susceptible to being carried into surface or groundwaters.
- b. Storage of radioactive waste.

Uses by Special Permit

Except as specified in VI H.2., the following uses will be allowed only upon issuance of a special permit issued by the Planning Board in accordance with section VI H.3.b. of this by-law.

- (1) Business or manufacturing use employing over twenty (20) persons.
- (2) Any manufacturing or processing industrial use disposing of hazardous toxic (as defined by federal and state regulations) solid waste or hazardous toxic wastewater through an on-site sub-surface disposal system.
- (3) business or manufacturing use with an impervious area in excess of one acre.
- (4) Junk yards and salvage yards.
- (5) Landfills and similar waste treatment or disposal facilities.
- (6) Conversion of seasonal homes to year-round use.
- (7) Storage tanks of 1,000 or more gallons capacity, above or below ground, for liquid fuels and other liquids capable of contaminating groundwater.
- (8) Manufacture of pesticides, fertilizers, weed killers and herbicides.
- (9) Facilities for the storage or treatment of hazardous wastes.

B. The Planning Board shall adopt rules and regulations relative to the issuance of special permits. Such rules shall include but need not be limited to requirements for:

- (1) Site plan showing the extent of impervious areas, water supply, drainage and layout and design of disposal facilities.
- (2) Provisions and conditions designed to prevent or correct conditions detrimental to water resources, health, safety and welfare.
- (3) Provisions and conditions to control cause of pollution to ground and surface waters.

The rules and regulations of the Planning Board relative to the issuance of special permits shall provide for notice to and review by the following local boards: Board of Selectmen, Board of Health and Conservation Commission.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by adding the following new section:

SECTION VI-J: RADIOACTIVE WASTE

No land within the Town of Westport may be used for the collection, treatment, storage, burial, incineration, or disposal of radioactive waste, including, but not limited to, waste classified as "low level radioactive waste."

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by-law or take any other action thereto:

**ARTICLE XXVIII
WETLANDS BY-LAW**

2801 APPLICATION

The purpose of this by-law is to protect the wetlands of the Town of Westport by controlling activities deemed to have a significant effect upon wetland values, including but not limited to the following: public or private water supply, ground water, flood control, erosion control, storm damage prevention, water pollution, fisheries, shellfish, wildlife, recreation and aesthetics (collective, the "interests protected by this By-Law")/

No person shall remove, fill, dredge, alter or build upon or within one hundred feet of any bank, fresh water wetland, coastal wetland, beach, dune, flat, marsh, meadow, bog, swamp, or upon or within one hundred feet of any estuary, creek, river, stream, pond or lake, or upon or within one hundred feet of any land under said waters or upon or within one hundred feet of any land subject to tidal action, coastal storm flowage, flooding or inundation, or within one hundred feet of the 100-year storm line, other than in the course of maintaining, repairing or replacing but not substantially changing or enlarging, an existing and lawfully located structure or facility used in the service of the public and used to provide electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph and other telecommunication services, without filing written application for a permit so to remove, fill dredge, alter or build upon, including such plans as may be necessary to describe such proposed activity and its effect on the environment, and receiving and complying with a permit issued pursuant to this By-Law.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to work performed for normal maintenance or improvement of land in agricultural use.

Such application may be identical in form of a Notice of Intention filed pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 131, Section 40, shall be sent by certified mail to the Westport Conservation Commission (the "Commission"), and shall be accompanied by a filing fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) payable to the Town of Westport and must be filed concurrently with or after applications for all other variances and approvals required by the Zoning By-Law, the Subdivision Control Law or any other by-law or regulation have been obtained. No filing fee is required when the Town of Westport files an application for a permit. Copies of the application shall be sent at the same time to the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Board of Health. Upon written request of any person, the Commission shall, within twenty-one (21) days, make a written determination as to whether this By-Law is applicable to any land or work thereon. When the person requesting the determination is other than the owner, notice of the determination shall be sent to the owner as well as the requesting person.

2802 HEARING

The Commission shall hold a public hearing on the application within twenty-one (21) days of its receipt. Notice of the time and place of the hearing shall be given by the Commission at the expense of the applicant, not less than five days prior to the hearing, by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in Westport and by mailing a notice to the applicant, the Board of Health, Board of Selectmen, Planning Board and to such other persons as the Commission may be regulation determine. The Commission, its agents, officers, and employees, may enter upon privately owned land for the purpose of performing their duties under this by-law.

2802.1 PERMIT AND CONDITIONS

If, after the public hearing, the Commission determines that the area which is the subject of the application is significant to the interests protected by this by-law, the Commission shall, within twenty-one (21) days of such hearing, issue or deny a permit for the work requested. If it issues a permit after making such determination, the Commission shall impose such conditions as it determines are necessary or desirable for the protection of those interests, and all work shall be done in accordance with those conditions. If the Commission determines that the area which is the subject of the application is not significant to the interests protected by this By-Law, or that the proposed activity does not require the imposition of conditions, it shall issue a permit without conditions within twenty-one (21) days of the public hearing. Permits shall expire one year from the date of issuance, unless renewed prior to expiration, and all work shall be completed prior to expiration.

2802.2 RELATIONSHIP TO MASS. GENERAL LAWS CHAPTER 131, §40

The Commission shall not impose additional or more stringent conditions pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 131, Section 40 than it imposes pursuant to this By-law, nor shall it require a Notice of Intent pursuant to Section 40 to provide materials or data in addition to those required pursuant to this By-Law.

2803 EMERGENCY PROJECTS

This By-Law shall not apply to any emergency project as defined in Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 131, Section 40.

2804 PRE-ACQUISITION VIOLATION

Any person who purchases, inherits or otherwise acquires real estate upon which work has been done in violation of the provisions of this by-law or in violation of any permit issued pursuant to this By-Law shall forthwith comply with any such order to restore such land to its condition prior to any such violation; provided, however, that no action, civil or criminal, shall be brought against such persons unless commenced within three years following the date of acquisition of the real estate by such persons.

2805 REGULATIONS

After due notice and public hearing, the Commission may promulgate rules and regulations to effectuate the purposes of this By-Law. Failure by the Commission to promulgate such regulations and rules or a legal declaration of their invalidity by a court of law shall not act to suspend or invalidate the effect of this By-Law.

2806 BURDEN OF PROOF

The applicant shall have the burden of proving by a preponderance of the credible evidence that the work proposed in the application will not harm the interests protected by this By-Law. Failure to provide adequate evidence to the Commission supporting a determination that the proposed work will not harm the interests protected by this By-Law shall be sufficient cause for the Commission to deny a permit or grant a permit with conditions, or, in the Commission's discretion, to continue the hearing to another date to enable the applicant or others to present additional evidence.

2807 DEFINITIONS

The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and implementation of this By-law.

2807.1

The term "person" shall include any individual, group of individuals, association, partnership, corporation, company, business organizations, trust, estate, the Commonwealth or political subdivision thereof to the extent subject to town by-laws, administrative agencies, public or quasi-public corporations or bodies, the Town of Westport, and any other legal entity, its legal representatives, agents or assigns.

2807.2

The term "alter" shall include, without limitation, the following actions when undertaken in areas subject to this by-law:

- (a) Removal, excavation or dredging of soil, sand, gravel or aggregate materials of any kind;
- (b) Changing drainage characteristics, flushing characteristics, salinity distribution, sedimentation patterns, flow patterns and flood retention characteristics;
- (c) Drainage or other disturbance of water level or water table;
- (d) Dumping, discharging or filling with any material which may degrade water quality;
- (e) Driving of piles, erection of buildings or structures of any kind;
- (f) Placing of obstructions whether or not they interfere with the flow of water;
- (g) Destruction of plant life, including cutting of trees;
- (h) Changing of water temperature, biochemical oxygen demand or other physical or chemical characteristics of the water.

2807.3

The term "banks" shall mean that part of land adjoining any body of water which confines the water.

2807.4 Agricultural Practices

- (a) The term "land in agricultural use" shall mean any qualifying wetland within a farm which is qualified or eligible to be qualified under the Farmland Assessment Act, MGL Chapter 61A, Section 1-5.
- (b) The term "qualifying wetland" shall mean only inland fresh water areas which are seasonally flooded basins or flats or inland fresh meadows.
- (c) The term "normal maintenance or improvement" of land in agricultural use shall mean only:
 1. Tilling practices customarily employed in the raising of crops;
 2. Pasturing of animals, including such fences and protective structures as may be required;
 3. Use of fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, and similar materials subject to state and federal regulations covering their use;
 4. Constructing, grading, or restoring of field ditches, subsurface drains, grass waterways, culverts, access roads, and similar practices to improve drainage, prevent erosion, provide more effective use of rainfall, improve equipment operation and efficiency, in order to improve conditions for the growing of crops.

- (d) "Improvement" of land in agricultural use may also include more extensive practices such as the building of ponds, dams, structures for water control, water and sediment basins, and related activities, but only where a plan for such activity approved by the Conservation District of the Soil Conservation Service is furnished to the Conservation Commission prior to the commencement of work.

All such activity shall subsequently be carried out in accord with said plan. In the event that the work is not carried out in accordance with the required plan, the Conservation Commission may place a stop order on said work and have recourse to such measures as if the plan were an order of conditions.

2807.5

The Commission may adopt additional definitions not inconsistent with this Section in its regulations promulgated pursuant to Section

2808 SECURITY

The Commission may require, as a permit condition, that the performance and observance of other conditions be secured by one or both of the following methods:

- (a) By a bond or deposit of money or negotiable securities in an amount determined by the Commission to be sufficient and payable to the Town of Westport;
- (b) By a conservation restriction, easement or other covenant running with the land, executed and properly recorded (or registered, in the case of registered land).

2809 ENFORCEMENT

Any person who violates any provision of this By-law or of any condition or a permit issued pursuant to it shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200, each day or portion thereof during which a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense; if more than one, each condition violated shall constitute a separate offense. This by-law may be enforced pursuant to MGL Chapter 40, Section 21D, by a Town police officer or other officer having police powers. Upon request of the Commission, the Board of Selectmen and Town Counsel shall take such legal action as may be necessary to enforce this By-law and permits issued pursuant to it.

Conservation Commission

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to amend the TRAILER BY-LAW so called, to allow the placement of mobile homes in areas zoned "Business" for use as business offices by adding the following section:

"Notwithstanding other provisions of this by-law a 12 month permit may be granted for use of a mobile home as a business office providing such mobile home is located in an area zoned for business".

And take any other action relative thereto.

Board of Selectmen

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Flood Plain Zoning to provide for trailers to be placed on a year round basis by amending the Zoning By-Law to adopt the following sections:

SECTION VI C. 10

All new mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions, all expansions to existing mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions, and all existing mobile home parks and mobile home subdivisions where the repair, reconstruction or improvement of the streets, utilities and pads equals or exceeds 50% of the value of the streets, utilities and pads before the repair, reconstruction or improvement has commenced, shall have stands or lots that are elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the base flood level, (ii) adequate surface drainage and access for a hauler are provided, and (iii) in the instance of elevation on pilings, lots are large enough to permit steps, piling foundations are placed in stable soil no more than ten feet apart, and reinforcement is provided for pilings more than six feet above the ground level.

SECTION VI C. II

All mobile homes to be placed within the Flood Zone but not into a mobile home park or mobile home subdivision shall have stands or lots that are elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the base flood level, (ii) adequate surface drainage and access for a hauler are provided, and (iii) in the instance of elevation on pilings, lots are large enough to permit steps, piling foundations are placed in stable soil no more than 10 feet apart, and reinforcement is provided for piers more than six feet above ground level. And/or take any other action relative thereto.

The procedure at town meetings shall be governed by the rules of practice contained in "Town Meeting Time", except as modified by these by-laws.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$50.00 to equip the Free Public Library, Selectmen's office, and Town Clerk's office with copies of "Town Meeting Time". Two other copies will be available at each and every town meeting for the use of the general public.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 90, Section 20A 1/2 which enables the Town to enforce parking regulations, collect fines, and provides the schedule of fine payments or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 59, Section 5, Clause Seventeenth C which further regulates real estate tax exemptions or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 32B, Section 17 which allows continued group health insurance coverage for laid-off employees for 39 weeks to be paid entirely by the laid-off employee or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53E, which enables the Town to use the estimated receipts from user fees to offset the related department's current year appropriations or take any other action relative thereto.

FRONT YARDS: Every building or structure shall be built or placed on a lot so that there shall be a front yard at least 25 feet clear depth from the street line or lines to the part of such building or structure closest to the street line; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet on both sides of the lot in question.

SIDE YARDS: At each side of every building or structure that shall be a side yard not less than ten feet in clear width between the side of the building or structure and the side lot lines. However, in the case of corner lots, there shall be a set back requirement of 25 feet from the street line to the side of any building or structure; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet of said lot in question.

REAR YARDS: Behind every building or structure there shall be provided a back yard between the rear line of a building or structure and the rear lot line not less than six feet in depth and/or 25 feet from a rear street line.

Retail stores, Financial Institutions, Consumer Services, Professional or Business Offices and similar businesses	1 space for each 200 square feet of floor space.
Wholesale showrooms and operations	1 space for each 1,000 sq. ft. plus one additional space for each 2 employees actively engaged at any one time.
Hotels and Motels	1 space per room and 1 space for every 3 seats in restaurants and/or meeting rooms and 1 space for each 2 employees.
Restaurants, Clubs, theatres, churches, or other places of public assembly	1 space for every 3 seats or 50 square feet of gross floor area and 1 space for every 2 employees.
Barber Shops and Beauty Parlors	3 spaces for each operator.
Bowling Alleys and Tennis Courts	4 spaces for each alley or court.
For any use not specifically listed	1.5 spaces for each 1,000 square feet of floor space and 1 space for each 2 employees.

VI — OFF-STREET PARKING

2. Other uses conducted for profit on premises within or without a building such as flea markets, auction houses, and fairs shall provide for adequate off-street parking. The Board of Appeals may grant a special permit to any person or organization to allow for sporadic or intermittent use of a premises without complying with the requirements of this section. Nothing herein will be construed to affect or limit churches or other charitable organizations from conducting fund raising events without complying with the requirements of this section.

3. Industrial and commercial buildings shall provide adequate parking, maneuvering and loading space on premises for freight and delivery trucks in addition to the minimum requirements for spaces listed in paragraph (1) 1. above.

(ii) adequate surface drainage and access for a hauler are provided, and (iii) in the instance of elevation on pilings, lots are large enough to permit steps, piling foundations are placed in stable soil no more than six feet apart, and reinforcement is provided for piers more than six feet above ground level. And/or take any other action relative thereto.

VI H YARD OR SET-BACK REQUIREMENTS

FRONT YARDS: Every building or structure shall be built or placed on a lot so that there shall be a front yard at least 25 feet clear depth from the street line or lines to the part of such building or structure closest to the street line; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet on both sides of the lot in question.

SIDE YARDS: At each side of every building or structure there shall be a side yard not less than ten feet in clear width between the side of the building or structure and the side lot lines. However, in the case of corner lots, there shall be a set back requirement of 25 feet from the street line to the side of any building or structure; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet of said lot in question.

REAR YARDS: Behind every building or structure there shall be provided a back yard between the rear line of a building or structure and the rear lot line not less than six feet in depth and/or 25 feet from a rear street line.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Local government efforts during 1982 focused on providing the Town of Westport and its residents with access to modern technological advances while at the same time preserving the rural, recreational and historic qualities which so profoundly characterize our community.

Of significant technological impact this past year was the delivery and installation of the NCR 9020 Computer System. Coordinated through the Accountant's Office, this in-house data processing system offers a management tool which will process and retrieve information more quickly, effectively and accurately. The Real Estate and Personal Property Tax Billing and Accounts Receivable applications are now operational. The Payroll, Census/Voter Registration, and Financial/Management/Accounting Systems are all expected to be computerized during 1983. Although the conversion process has been and continues to be a difficult and demanding task, we are confident that the benefits of a fully automated system will off-set the inconvenience of this period.

Another form of modern technology also appears a step closer to reality for the residents of Westport. The submission last summer of an application for a cable television franchise started the process towards the granting of such a license for our community. Currently two companies are vying for the franchise. After careful consideration and in accordance with state regulations, the Selectmen with the assistance of the Cable Advisory Committee will award a cable license during 1983. It is anticipated that this exciting telecommunications system will be operational in Westport during the following year.

While recognizing that these technological innovations can greatly benefit our community, Town officials are also cognizant of the unique environmental, recreational, agricultural and historic elements that so enhance the quality of life in Westport. Efforts to preserve these vital features of our Town continue to be a primary objective of local officials. During 1982 funds were appropriated at the Annual Town Meeting for the Agricultural Preservation Restriction Program through which state and local monies may be used to purchase development rights from participating farmers. As a result these agricultural properties cannot be developed and must remain in their natural state. We feel that this is an extremely valuable program both in terms of preserving the rural atmosphere of our community and protecting the productivity of our cropland. By purchasing development rights the State and Town can ensure that our treasured farmland does not disappear and our agricultural self-reliance is not completely lost.

A second aspect of our community that requires protection is its' unique coastal beach system. In conjunction with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service, the Town initiated a dune stabilization project that will continue to be implemented over the next few years. In addition, during 1982 a significant portion of Westport's beaches were designated as "undeveloped coastal barriers". Beginning October 1, 1983, all coastal barriers so designated will be ineligible for federal flood insurance and other federal funds which promote development, the purpose being to maintain these important buffer zones. Other ways to preserve Westport's agricultural, recreational and open space properties are being explored by town officials. It is hoped that the completion of the Town's Master Plan Update and its open space and recreation plan will further assist in this area.

Another example of Town officials' concern for the protection of our natural resources has been their involvement with the permitting procedures for the proposed coal gasification facility to be located in the northeast portion of Fall River. Considerable time has been spent in 1982 by this board and its representatives in reviewing and monitoring the environmental impacts of this billion dollar synfuel project, the site of which is within the Westport River drainage

basin. While the Board has not taken a position as an advocate or opponent of the plan, it does feel that the town has some legitimate concerns, especially in regard to water-related issues, which must be addressed during all phases of the permitting process.

In other matters, the Selectmen continued in 1982 to enforce the by-laws and regulations under its jurisdiction with liquor, motor vehicles and repair licenses once again requiring a great deal of time, attention and careful scrutiny. In addition, two new areas were placed under the Board's jurisdiction. Entertainment Licenses, as established under state law, were issued for the first time and the collection of parking violations was transferred from a district court to a local responsibility. In connection with the latter item, the town has realized a substantial increase in revenue as a result of an effective and firmly pursued local system for parking fine collection. The issue of enforcement of the Town's Trailer By-laws remained in litigation throughout the year and at this time is still unresolved.

Adjusting to the provisions of Proposition 2½ remained a major consideration in financial decisions. The most obvious impact in 1982 was the inability to make timely fiscal determinations. Although a budget was adopted at the annual town meeting, adjustments had to again be made at a Special Town Meeting during the summer (after fiscal year had begun) because the necessary state-aid data was not available sooner. Also some service reductions were further implemented. For example, in order to stay within the appropriate budget, designated street light removals were completed.

After several years of turn-over the internal administration of the Board and its staff experienced few changes during 1982. The membership of the Board remained the same with Charles A. Costa being named as Chairman, George T. Leach, Jr., as Clerk and Richard P. Desjardins as representative to the Bristol County Budget Advisory Committee. Only two full-time staff changes occurred during the year. William Tripp was appointed Fire Chief to replace George Dean who retired after eleven years of dedicated service and Ronald Costa was selected as Veterans' Agent to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Donald Oakley. In addition Michael McCarthy was chosen to replace Arthur Marshall in the part-time position of Civil Defense Director.

This fairly stable personnel situation offered the Board an opportunity to focus its attention on improved hiring and evaluation techniques. An examination procedure which included written and physical fitness tests and an oral interview was instituted as a basis for decisions in the hiring and promotion of Fire and Police Department personnel. Also a performance evaluation system was initiated for all full-time non-contract employees under the Board of Selectmen's jurisdiction and negotiations with the union commenced regarding establishment of a similar system in the Police Department. The Board feels strongly that these standardized personnel procedures will contribute to improved individual and department performances.

In conclusion we wish to express our appreciation to our appointed officials and staff for their dedicated service and commitment to local government. The effective management of the Town of Westport in this era of rapid change and complex issues requires our combined and cooperative efforts and the support of the entire community.

It should be noted the only two decisions not rendered in favor of the Town involved individual labor matters regarding a one day suspension and a pay classification problem.

The total money impact for the two labor cases that were ruled in favor of the union resulted in one days pay for a police officer and a change in the system of establishing the date of pay classification for employees.

The money impact of cases won by the Town were \$70,000., \$25,000., undetermined but over \$100,000. and undetermined but over \$2,000,000. One Case resulted in judgment for the Town to receive approximately \$10,000.

While I am extremely pleased to report that the Town was successful in defending over \$2,000,000. in alleged damages, it is equally disturbing to have other suits pending alleging damages of \$500,000. and \$1,000,000.

Whereas more and larger claims are being lodged against the Town and the trend will continue rather than abate I again strongly urge that the Town secure additional liability insurance. This would lessen the impact of the cases that are in fact lost.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION SOIL CONSERVATION BOARD

In May the Conservation Commission held its annual meeting electing Urbain Pariseau, Chairman; Anne Barnes, Vice-chairman; and Thomas Porter, Secretary/Treasurer. Urbain Pariseau was reappointed and Thomas Jansen was newly appointed for terms on the Commission. Norman Sasseville, James Tripp and Thomas McGarr continue as Commission members.

The Commission and Board accepted with regret the resignation of Conservation Agent Jon Kerr and wish him luck in his future endeavors. Louise Lawrence filled the position as agent and Barbara Hickey continues her exceptional job as part-time clerk.

In administering the Wetlands Protection Act the Conservation Commission processed 21 Notices of Intent issuing favorable Orders of Conditions on 18, 5 emergency Orders of Conditions, 22 extensions on existing Orders of Conditions, 31 Certificates of Compliance and 2 formal Wetlands Determinations along with the agent's routine informal determinations and complaint investigations.

In accordance with the Town Soil Conservation by-laws, the Board processed 1 new soil permit, issued 10 renewals on existing permits and released 2 bonds.

In addition the Conservation Commission reviewed and commented on 2 applications under the Agricultural Preservation Restriction Program for development restrictions on land totaling 209 acres. One previously submitted application was accepted by the state for funding to preserve 76 acres for agricultural use.

The Conservation Commission is in the preliminary stages of applying through the Massachusetts Self-Help Program for funds to purchase a 27 acre parcel of land on the Horseneck which extends from the Atlantic Ocean to the Westport River. This purchase would preserve an environmentally sensitive and unique area of barrier beach consisting of sand dunes, scrub pine woods and wetlands for future generations at no cost to the town other than a minimal loss of tax revenue.

In conjunction with the Self-Help application the Commission is currently developing an Open space/Conservation/Recreation Plan for Westport.

The members of the Commission wish to thank all those town Boards and Commissions, departments and citizens who have helped and supported our efforts throughout the year.

14 volunteers working on a regular basis have enabled the Council to keep the office open two additional hours daily. Until August 1, 1982, the office was open 9:00 until 1:30, closing at 12:00 on Fridays. With the help of the volunteers, the hours were extended to 3:30 Monday through Friday.

Paulette Ponte was replaced by Marylou Buntel; Lydia Rego was added by B.C.H.E.C.* as a second Social Worker for the Westport area because their workload has increased markedly in the last year.

Information and Referral:

Phone calls handled by office and people coming to office were primarily for information about the following: I.D. Cards, podiatry clinic, fuel assistance, weatherization, newsletter, employment exchange, medical insurance, legal aid, Friendly Visitor, Home-delivered meals, Widow(er)'s Support Group, Social Security, S.S.I., food stamps, health screening clinics, Homemakers, flu shots, Mini-Van, line dancing, arts and crafts, cheese distribution, emergency help list, Adult Foster Care, Christmas dinners and parties, free concert tickets, Phone Pal program, V.I.T.A. (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance), etc.

Newsletter "Evergreen"

The newsletter *Evergreen* is in its second year of publication, having first appeared in August, 1981. 800 copies are distributed, free of charge, to the meal sites, senior clubs, post offices and other public places of easy access to elders and to the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication. The Council is most grateful for their help.

Jean Lozinski writes and edits the paper. Beverly Cordery types it for printing. The masthead was designed by Christopher Gillespie.

The paper is published by Senior Citizen Publishing Co. of Allston; the Council hopes that more local merchants will advertise in the newsletter in order to ensure its continuance and to show their support for this valuable service.

Podiatry Clinic:

A grant of \$2,027 was awarded the C.O.A. under Title III of the older Americans Assistance Act, for a podiatry clinic to be offered at three sites in Westport: Greenwood Terrace, Howland Hall and the Town Hall. The Clinics were held once a month from Sept. 1981 and continued through August 1982.

Two podiatrists, Dr. Kenneth Brum of Somerset and Dr. Marshall Taitz of Fall River, volunteered their services to the clinics; almost all were filled to capacity, often with a waiting list for the following month.

A large number of clients served at the clinics were at poverty level, although the service was open to all older Westport residents.

A new series of clinics began in November, using part of a formula grant from the D.E.A. of \$1,238. These clinics will continue through June 1983.

Grants:

The Council has received \$1,838 from the D.E.A. in a formula grant for fiscal year 1982-83 to continue the podiatry clinics and to cover the mileage costs of the second Friendly Visitor.

The D.E.A. also awarded the Council on Aging a \$3,500 Discretionary Grant to provide several health screening programs (oral and skin cancer clinics and audio-visual testing) and to provide emergency overnight respite care.

In summary:

This has been an extremely busy and successful year. To our sorrow, two of our excellent members left us - Mary Hart who had served the Council on Aging so long and so well, and Mike Gordon who was a great help to us during his short time with us. Happily, we are now up to our full seven member board, Edward Bliss, Shelly Cohen and Carols Samson having joined the Council during the year.

Because of our excellent, highly skilled staff our Council on Aging office has been able to provide more assistance to more older citizens this year; our office is functioning efficiently and well. We are most fortunate in having volunteers providing assistance in a variety of ways and it is because of them that we are able to have our office open for two hours longer each day.

Since more and more people are living longer, and since old age often brings with it many physical, mental and financial problems, the need for assistance to the elderly is increasing greatly and will continue to do so. It is becoming more difficult, with the limited hours of our staff, for our office to keep up with the amount of work that must be done. A second social worker has just been assigned to Westport by B.C.H.C.E., another indication of the increased demands on our office and the nursing department.

We feel that we have been able to help a great many people, in the areas mentioned earlier in this report. Our newsletter, *Evergreen*, continues to take much time and effort in its preparation, but it is an important way for us to communicate valuable information to the older citizens of the town. As we have said previously, we hope that more merchants will support the newsletter by advertising in it; in that way, and only in that way, can it continue.

Our nutrition program, providing noon-time meals at two meal sites, and to homebound elderly, continues to be an essential service. This program not only provides nutritional meals, but also gives the participants an opportunity to meet with others at the meal sites or, for the homebound, an opportunity for almost daily contact with the driver delivering the meals. In cooperation with the Recreation Commission, a series of line dancing sessions was provided twice during the year.

The Council again wishes to thank the Friends of Senior Citizens, Inc. for making a mini-van possible; it provides valuable, much needed transportation for the handicapped and elderly. The volunteers who work hard to keep the van going deserve the thanks of all Westport residents. We hope that they will be able to find a way to continue this service.

Our two friendly visitors are a vitally important part of our work in their contact with people in need of someone to visit them; they serve as an important link between our office and the homebound elderly.

We are naturally very concerned that funds for essential services for the elderly are being cut at the national level while the need for services is increasing so rapidly. We will continue to do all that we can at our local "information and referral" level.

Lastly, we are extremely grateful that we have been awarded two grants from the Massachusetts Department of Elder Affairs; these will enable us to provide extremely valuable services - health screening clinics, podiatry clinics and some short-term night-time respite care.

When the position of Assistant Librarian for Children's Services was established, the Library was fortunate to secure Bette Souza for that post. After five years of dedicated and imaginative service, she resigned in August. Dolores Tansey was appointed to fill this vacancy. A former substitute, Gayle Boudria, was named Library Aide in May.

Two former associates, Gladys Plante and Allen M. Shorey, Jr., died during 1982. Gladys Plante was Assistant Librarian from 1963 until her retirement in 1975. Allen M. Shorey, Jr., served on the Board of Trustees from 1959 to 1977. A memorial fund was established by his family, and with the proceeds a sign-making machine was purchased for the Library.

Earnings from five trust funds were used to purchase materials for the collection -- books on agriculture and industrial and automotive arts from the Ronald A. and Randall A. Tripp Fund; large print books from the Arline A. Gifford Memorial Fund; children's books, puppets, and supplies from the Alice Dennett Tripp Memorial Fund; and non-fiction books from the William B. Hicks Memorial Fund and the Imogene Weeks Fund.

Six books on nature and religion were purchased with contributions to the memory of Basil D. Hall. The Westport River Defense Fund donated subscriptions to six periodicals.

After the exterior of the building was painted this spring, an effort was made to improve the landscaping by adding wood chips to the beds. Lorman Trueblood, who in the past donated daffodils, this year gave the Library day lilies.

During the spring a Friends of the Library group was formed. By the end of the year almost 100 individuals had joined the organization. The present officers are: Donald Oldham, President; Michael Habib, Vice President; Lillian Barresi, Secretary; and Edythe M. Pelletier, Treasurer.

The purpose of the organization is to maintain an association of persons interested in libraries; to focus public attention on the Library; to stimulate the use of the Library's resources and services; to receive and encourage gifts, endowments, and bequests to the Library; to support and cooperate with the Library in providing services and facilities for the community; and to support freedom to read as expressed in the American Library Association Bill of Rights. Volunteers from the organization have been delivering books to shut-ins, and in some cases have transported shut-ins to the Library. The first donation by the Friends was a set of letters and tapes for the Library's sign-making machine.

The Library was most fortunate to receive a donation of Westport historical material from Eleanor Tripp. The collection includes thirteen notebooks containing 700 types pages and 600 pictures. Volunteers from the Friends of The Library are in the process of indexing this invaluable material. An irreplaceable collection such as this represents hours of dedicated research on the part of Mrs. Tripp, and the Library is grateful to have been the beneficiary.

In September the Library was awarded a grant from the Department of Energy to conduct a technical audit. The federal award for \$347.00 is to be matched by the Town. The energy audit will be completed in early 1983.

The Library is still operating under the budgetary constraints that forced a reduction of hours in July 1981. The Board of Trustees looks forward to the time when the normal schedule can be resumed.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1983 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty-four years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

Mosquito control in Bristol County is a year-round effort encompassing many individual control measures: winter pre-hatch; spring and summer larvicide; catch basin treatment; light-trapping to monitor mosquito population; adult spraying and water management. We are continually working to improve all methods of control in our fight against mosquitos, using the latest equipment and techniques in order to serve the public in the best manner possible.

It is also the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety, yearly, in order to keep their certification.

In sensitive areas such as where bees are kept, no spraying will take place provided we are made aware of these areas. All spray trucks have a list of beekeepers which is continually updated but with more people keeping bees each year, it would be helpful if those people would notify our office.

Should a person have a sensitivity to pesticides and not want their property sprayed, they should contact our office and we shall honor that request.

In 1982, Bristol County was once again free of any human cases of encephalitis. Although there were no human cases, high levels of the virus were found to exist in the *Culiseta Melanura* mosquitos. Because of the high level of virus that was present in these mosquitos this year, we intend to increase our light-trapping program for 1983. By combining our efforts with those of the encephalitis surveillance lab in Lakeville we will be able to keep abreast of any impending build-up in the virus, should it occur.

During the early spring a total of 55 acres of known mosquito-breeding swamp and woodland pools were treated in order to reduce breeding. Only areas that contain water that does not run off and are known breeding sites are treated.

The spring brood of mosquitos emerged around the end of April and our spray program got underway the first part of May. Once a significant number of mosquitos were on the wing our ultra low volume foggers began to spray areas of high infestation. This was done continually throughout the season. During the summer all recreational areas and camps were sprayed on a weekly basis as well as all other areas of the town where mosquitos were a problem. We also treated 244 breeding catch basins during this time. Due to the warm weather extending into October this year our spraying continued until the end of September.

With the end of the spraying season our work turned to water management projects. At this time crews cut brush and clean debris from existing ditches and streams in order to insure a better flow of water from normally wet areas. A total of 500 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 10,324 feet of existing drainage ditch cleaned of debris. Our crawler tractor also dug 729 feet of drainage ditch. On the salt marshes a total of 7,675 feet of ditch was cleaned by hand.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

During 1982 the Town of Westport continued its membership for the thirteenth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Westport's Commission representatives for the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board, respectively, are: Julia S. Enroth and George M. Hall, who also serve on SRPEDD's Executive Committee.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and town. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for federal and state dollars.

Services to Westport this past year included:

- Preparing proposed by-law amendments for water supply protection;
- Providing assistance with revisions to the land use draft of the town's master plan;
- Assisting in the preparation of the town's open space plan; and
- Staffing the New England Energy Park Citizens Advisory Committee of which Westport is a member, to review and comment on the Environmental Impact Report for the proposed New England Energy Park -- the EG&G coal gasification facility in Fall River.

As a coastal community, Westport was also the benefactor of an oil spill program conducted by SRPEDD last year which identified vulnerable areas and organized response teams.

Regional plans and other activities conducted last year benefiting all communities include:

- The **Overall Economic Development Program** (OEDP) which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.
- The **Transportation Improvements Program** (TIP) which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included on the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.

- A Housing Conversion and Rehabilitation Program funded with bonus money provided to SRPEDD by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The program will provide grants to establish approximately 25 new housing units in existing structures throughout the region.
- Marketing Southeastern Massachusetts -- SRPEDD was actively involved in the Golden Connection effort in California to attract high technology industries to the region; sponsored a conference for over 100 local officials at Southeastern Massachusetts University on marketing the region; and prepared a special edition of the **Southeastern Massachusetts Fact Book** which provides all the data necessary for development decisions.
- Certification by the U.S. Small Business Administration of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, established by SRPEDD. SEED will provide low-interest, long-term financing to small businesses in southeastern Massachusetts through SBA's "503" Program.
- SRPEDD also conducts "A-95" and environmental assessments reviews of state and federally funded projects; reviews of industrial review bonds; and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

WESTPORT SHELLFISH DEPARTMENT

RE: Annual Shellfish Department report to the Town.

Dear Gentlemen:

The 1982 season was one of mixed blessings for the Westport shellfisheries. A bumper crop of bay scallops with an estimated value of 322,579 dollars was harvested and enjoyed by many of our citizens. On the minus side, the greater portion of our oyster fishery was closed due to high coliform bacterial counts in the Hixbridge area. This fishery has been greatly restricted since 1979 and our best estimate is that the full potential and benefit of the oyster resource will not be realized until 1985, assuming by that time pollution levels can be sufficiently reduced.

In our efforts to combat bacterial pollution and reopen the oyster beds as well as halt the evident progression of pollution from the Hixbridge area, south to quahaug beds, the Shellfish Warden with the invaluable assistance of Deputy Warden Robert Sykes, Jr. have been engaged in tracing the major pollution sources via water analysis. Approximately 350 water samples were obtained from tributaries which affect the northern portion of the East River. Samples were analyzed for bacteria by Edmine Bibieau at the Westport High School. Fortunately, the cost of water analysis was defrayed, and this project made possible by a surplus of water analysis equipment and materials left over from a C.E. T.A. grant program.

The Shellfish Advisory Committee has requested help from the Board of Health in performing dye tests of septic systems in areas which were found to be likely pollution sources. The Board of Health has assigned their part-time agent, Mr. Wilfred Ancil, to this task with exceptionally good results. As of December 31, 1982, some 18 dye tests together with another 114 visual inspections have found 10 faulty septic systems along the East River and its tributaries. The Shellfish Advisory Committee and Shellfish Warden are also working with the Board of Health, U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and U.S. Food and Drug Administration in efforts to abate agricultural pollution of the River. We intend to continue with these endeavors on a permanent basis not only until these kinds of pollutants cease to threaten any fishery but also to prevent this travesty from reoccurring.

The Shellfish Warden has taken part in some co-operative ventures with out-of-town agencies. Foremost was the assistance given to the Mass. Division of Marine Fisheries in the development of new surf clam regulations and management plan for Massachusetts coastal waters. The biology of, and fishery for the surf clam in Westport is the best documented within the commonwealth, therefore, our comments were instrumental in formulating rules which will conserve and protect this resource to the advantage of our citizens. We are also working with Massachusetts and Rhode Island Divisions of Marine Fisheries in accessing the transplanting of scallops from one town to another. We know these scallop relays enhance the fishery a year or more after the transplant but is little understood as to how or why. To this end we are collecting information which will maximize the benefit of these relays. The Shellfish Warden has also been called upon on 7 separate occasions to give reports and testimony on in and out of town projects which might effect our shellfish.

As for future planning, the Shellfish Warden is performing studies of various areas of the estuary to determine the most suitable types of shellfish and propagation activities for each area.

Propagation work is still proceeding at a good pace. The quahaug rearing program has been expended from its initial 30,000 seed quahaugs in 1979 to 150,000 this year, with plans for further expansion in 1983. New raft designs together with the use of bottom holding pens are increasing the efficiency of this program resulting in excellent growth and survival. In conjunction with the rearing project we will be relaying littlenecks in from other towns. The relayed and seed quahaugs are then planted in the river and that area closed to shellfishing until the majority of the quahaugs are of legal harvestable size. By rotating closed areas our citizens are slowly beginning to enjoy increasing quahaug stocks.

Over the last two years, we have been relaying scallops from other Mass. and Rhode Island communities. These scallops as well as native stock have been experimentally rafted. The spawn from rafted scallops appears to be increasing our scallop population much more than what has been seen by simply scattering relayed scallops in the wild. In 1983, we will be rafting scallops as a regular project in strategic areas of the estuary. In the coming year, oyster spat collecting will continue on an experimental basis and we will begin the collection of scallop spat. The creation of new oyster beds outside the contaminated area will continue on an experimental basis.

In the area of law enforcement, compliance with rules and regulations in waxing. This year, we had to suspend only 3 licenses. However, we did have 2 arrests in regards to lobster violations. Not only were the culprits successfully prosecuted, but a precedent was set for other local wardens when the boat used for committing these crimes was seized and libelled.

Our budget appropriations were 26,772.00 dollars. State re-imbursements due to shellfish activities were 8,834.76 dollars and license fees collected were 7,970.00 dollars. We experienced unplanned financial setbacks of some 550 dollars caused by greater than estimated costs for a boat rental while awaiting the delivery of our new work/patrol skiff.

Our plans for this coming year are to continue and improve propagation, pollution control, planning, and policing. We would also like to perform bottom cultivation by jetting. This propagation method has proven most successful on Cape Cod, for increasing natural shellfish stocks.

We have asked for additional appropriations this year, so that we can begin the task of bottom cultivation, continue with experimental projects and add some, and increase the efficiency of our existing programs. Our projects and programs have increased shellfish availability for our citizens and we wish to continue this trend in order to make the Westport shellfisheries as productive as possible. Someday, we may see a shellfishery worth more than 1 million dollars; it has been accomplished in other coastal communities and we can do it in Westport.

The Board meets in the Planning Board Room at Town Hall on the first, third and fifth Mondays each month at 7:30 p.m. During the past year the Board held twenty-five meetings during which there were no subdivision plans submitted, but plans for forty-eight approval-not-required lots on existing streets were submitted and endorsed.

The Board held three public hearings, two of which were for the purpose of reviewing proposed zoning by-laws and one to consider rescinding a subdivision plan.

Planning Board members continued during the year to work with the Update Master Plan Committee, a plan which it had hoped would be completed in time for the 1983 Annual Town Meeting, but, in this Board's opinion, needs considerably more work. As it has in the past several years, the Board allotted its twenty hours of SRPEDD municipal assistance time to the Update Committee.

A number of changes were made during the year in the Board's Subdivision Regulations including increasing its filing fee for subdivision to \$125.00.

The Town of Westport continues to experience growing pains. The Town's attractiveness as a "nice place to live" is considerably enhanced by its beautiful river, the long shore line, its rural atmosphere, large amounts of open space, and agriculture.

This attractiveness and its location between two of the largest seven cities in Massachusetts combine to bring pressure on the Town to grow at an alarming rate. Its 40% growth rate over the past twenty years has been greater than any other town in the area. Another major contributor to its high growth rate has been the vast improvement in transportation. Route 1-195 and Route 88 have made the Town much more accessible to not only Fall River and New Bedford, but to Providence and Boston. Many of our seasonal dwellings are being used for year round homes creating more demands on schools and services.

The most important deterrent to an even higher growth rate for the Town has been our zoning (60,000 sq. ft. lots) and the thousands of acres of wetlands. The Planning Board feels that much more effort must be exerted on planning and enforcement of all Town rules and regulations and zoning if the Town is to experience orderly and reasonable growth and remain a "nice place to live".

Throughout this process the committee has attempted to ensure that Westport's future growth is well planned in order that its rural and recreational qualities as well as other environmental assets may be preserved.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

January 1, 1982 - December 31, 1982

Our annual report reflects another successful year for the Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee in their continuing efforts to provide quality vocational education for youth and adults in the regional school district.

As of October 1, 1982, a total of 1,029 students, 885 boys and 144 girls, were enrolled in 13 high school shop programs; 57 students were enrolled in three (3) Technical Institute programs; 69 students were enrolled in the Practical Nursing Program; 8 students were enrolled in the Nurse Assistant Program; and 183 students were enrolled in 8 Evening School Programs for a total of 1,346 students in the day and evening programs.

The high school student enrollment has been increased by an additional 32 students this year. The technical institute enrollment has increased slightly in all program offerings.

In addition, 24 students completed a 12 week training program in the nurse assistant program and 41 adults completed a 60 hour training program for homemaker home health aides.

In 1982, 194 graduates were awarded diplomas from the high school programs. Of this number, 102 were placed in jobs directly related to the trade they studied; 18 were placed in jobs in other trades; 20 went into the armed services; and, 28 went on to higher education. A follow-up study indicated that 23 of the graduates were not working. This is a commendable

record realizing that the unemployment rate of youth between the ages of 16 and 25 is an all-time high. Many of the students not working had been prepared to enter the construction trades. The unemployment in some of the construction trades is very high. The placement record of our graduates is a tribute to the quality of training our students receive and we commend the faculty and administration for their efforts in affording high quality vocational education to all students.

The cooperative work experience program allowed 98 seniors to work in the trade during their two week shop cycle. This program offers local industries an opportunity to help our students make a smooth transition into the world of work. The Job Placement Coordinator is an employee of the Division of Employment Security who has been assigned to the school with his prime responsibility being that of finding suitable employment for our students. He works with juniors to help them find part time or summer employment prior to their senior year.

The Guidance Staff, which includes a part time Admissions Aide, visited the 25 feeder schools to show interest eighth grade students an audio slide presentation which resulted in approximately 600 processed applications. The number of female students enrolled has increased 27% in the last year. Despite a concerted effort by the Admissions Aide to contact limited English proficiency students and their parents to explain the trade offerings available, we were unable to meet our goal.

Federal funds allocated under PL 94-482 in the amount of \$92,069 were used as follows: salary of a Career Admissions Aide, English as a Second Language Teacher, educational supplies for the Resource Instructional Center, Remedial Health Services Program, and updating shop equipment. The block grant for library supplies under PL 97-35 totaled \$7,819. A special education grant, PL 94-142, in the amount of \$3,741 was used for a Special Education Resource Program Instructor.

The annual Open House and Trade Fair was held on Saturday, March 13 and Sunday, March 14 with more than 3,500 people attending. More than 700 shop projects planned, designed, and constructed by students in the thirteen shops in the school were judged by 48 members of the school's Advisory Board. In many of the shop displays, classes were organized so that the judges could rank the first, second, and third place projects based on the quality of workmanship, accuracy as to measurements that were specified in specific plans or drawings, and the detail involved.

Scholarships awarded to members of the Class of 1982 were as follows: \$500 to Anna Antunes by Alro Oxygen & Supply, Inc. Ms. Antunes, who graduated from the Basic Electronics Program, is majoring in Computer Science at Southeastern Massachusetts University. Scholarships of \$300 were received by John Bowker and Elizabeth Richard of the Basic Electronics Program and by Brian Hickey of the Auto Body Program. These scholarships were granted through the Scholarship Aid Program of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Bowker and Hickey are attending Southeastern Massachusetts University majoring in Engineering and Ms. Richard planned to attend Bridgewater State College in January 1983 after a tour of duty in the Air Force Reserve.

The Outstanding Vocational Student Award for the Class of 1982 was presented to Elizabeth Richard of the Basic Electronics Department at a dinner meeting prepared and served by students of the Culinary Arts Department. The first runner-up was Kenneth J. Pleiss of the Auto Mechanics Department, Lauro M. Couto of the Plumbing Department and Eugenio S. Rebelo of the Machine Shop shared second runner-up honors. Also selected as the outstanding student in their respective shop areas were Rui M. Cordeiro, Auto Body; Jeffrey M. Freitas, Culinary Arts; Christopher Goncalo, Drafting; Joseph R. Forand, Electricity; Jeffrey P. Thiabult, Graphic Arts; Jose F. DaCosta, House & Mill Carpentry; Robert G. Costa, Metal Fabrication & Welding; and Kathleen Souza, Painting & Decorating.

Our students continue to gain recognition by their participation in extra-curricular activities. Three members of the soccer team were selected for the Southeastern Massachusetts conference All-Star Team - Manuel Pimental, Alvard Borges, and Pual Leite. Manuel Pimental was selected to be a member of the State All-Star Soccer Team. Reginaldo Arruda was selected to the All-Star Southeastern Massachusetts Cross Country Team.

The school's yearbook, *The Artisan*, received a superior achievement award in scholastic editing and publishing from the New England Scholastic Press Association. The school newspaper, *The Tradesman*, received the following commendations: An Honorable Mention award for excellence in typography by the Department of Journalism at Suffolk University in the Greater Boston High School Newspaper Competition; Superior Achievement Certificate in scholastic editing and publishing for the fifth consecutive year; Third Place Certificate from the Columbia Press Association.

Students participated in the regional and state science fairs.

Members of the Key Club attended the 33rd Annual District Key Club Convention in Bedford, New Hampshire on March 26, 27, and 28, 1982. The Club also sponsored a Christmas basket project and received donations of food and money which allowed them to fill 27 baskets which were distributed the day before Christmas to 27 needy Diman families.

Students in the House and Mill Carpentry, Plumbing, Painting and Decorating, and Electricity Shops completed a 6 room Cape Cod cottage for Mr. and Mrs. Richard Levesque on Bark Street, Swansea. The Open House was held during the latter part of May during which time more than 300 people toured the house. The twelfth house in the housebuilding program is being built for Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Carvalho on Meeson Street in Fall River.

Students in the Carpentry shop helped in remodeling exterior walls to the Bluffs in Swansea and have worked on improving the physical facilities at Camp Welch. A number of shops in the school provided services for most of the municipal departments in the City of Fall River as well as for the Fall River Chamber of Commerce.

The physical facilities of the school have been improved by the installation of additional insulation on three major areas of the roof which were reroofed. A new independent gas fired hot water boiler has been installed to be used when the main boilers are not needed for heating purposes. Storm windows have been contracted for in the office areas, cafeteria, and along the north window wall of the classrooms. Ramps have been installed to make the building accessible to the handicapped. A contract has been awarded to modify all heating, ventilating, and exhaust units to conserve energy. A study has been made by the architectural firm of Korslund, LeNormand, and Quann relative to modifications to the building to make it comply with the needs of the handicapped.

Several items of new equipment have been purchased in an attempt to keep the instruction current to the technical demands of the trade and to make the maintenance of the facilities more economical. The equipment purchased includes computerized phototypesetter, plasma arc cutter, numerical controllers, computerized numerical control lathe, bandsaw, drafting machines, air compressor, surface grinder, drill press, and a 3/4 ton, 4-wheel drive pickup truck.

The school's budget preparation process was very demanding because the amount of available funds and the anticipated revenue to reduce the assessments had been drastically reduced. The Committee received more than sixteen revisions to the budget before they ratified the 1982-1983 budget.

This year the communities were advised during the latter part of the year that they would not be assessed for the fourth payment due in June of 1983 and for a pro rata payment for the amount to be assessed in March 1983 because the unexpended balance in the appropriation account and the amount of anticipated revenue were used to reduce this year's assessment. In prior years these amounts were used to reduce the subsequent year's assessment.

The school's staff and administration have spent endless hours preparing for the arrival of a committee selected by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges to evaluate the school. The 25 committee members were from the States of Maine, Rhode Island, Connecticut, and Massachusetts. The Chairman of the committee was the director of a regional vocational school in Connecticut. The committee spent three days reviewing the school's philosophy and objectives, program of studies, guidance services, instructional media center, school staff and administration records, plant and equipment - school facilities, school and community relations, financial support, and school atmosphere. In all of these areas, the Visiting Committee stated that the school realted a good or excellent. The Visiting Committee Chairman and all of his sub-committee chairmen stated that the school, as viewed by them, received affirmative answers to all questions directly relating to the Commissioner's 11 Standards of Membership for vocational technical secondary schools. The school staff will study all of the recommendations made by the Visiting Committee and develop an implementation program which will stratify recommendations into one of four categories; recommendations that can be carried out at once, in the near future, those that require long range planning, and those that are invalid.

A two year and five year progress report must be made to the New England Association relative to the progress made in implementing the recommendations. Continued accreditation will be based upon the progress made and efforts expended in completing the recommendations.

During the same period of time the Visiting Committee from the New England Association was evaluating the school representatives from the Division of Occupational Education addressed the school's compliance to the ten controllible factors as outlined in Chapter 74. The ten controllible factors are as follows: 1. Organization; 2. Control; 3. Location; 4. Equipment; 5. Courses of Study; 6. Qualification of Teachers; 7. Method of Instruction; 8. Conditions of Admission; 9. Employment of Pupils; 10. Expenditures.

The successes of this educational institution in providing quality vocational education to all students enrolled can be attributed to a number of factors. The most important factors can be priorities such as leadership, cooperation, finance, industry, professionalism, and high ethical standards. I need not expound on each item and the role it may play. All are related to the activities of the school committee, administration, faculty, supportive staff, students, and advisory committee members. All should build on prior successes and address changes to be made to prepare strong contributing members to our democratic society in the years ahead.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

This is my second annual report to the people of Westport. Previously, I have outlined the objectives of the school system that I perceived, and detailed the programs I felt were needed to achieve them. I cautioned the parents, that value inculcation was a family responsibility and suggested that school concentrate on the primary function of teaching children those things needed for a productive adulthood.

Well realizing that I run the risk of turning these annual messages into Jeremiads by concentrating on problems rather than detailing accomplishments, I still feel compelled to use them as means of transmitting my concerns for the future of our schools in Westport. In the larger context, we should be measured, not by the degree to which we reproduce the past or explain the present to our students, but to the extent to which we anticipate their future individual and social needs. The children we teach have never lived in a world without television, telephones, transcontinental jets or canned music. They are receiving their education in a decade of questioning uncertainty, potential turmoil, and confrontation.

Obviously, all around is change. Past promises of education are losing the ability to placate a patient people. Parents, concerned for their children, are looking for answers. Unfortunately, many are recommended that we solve today's problems with yesterday's solutions. They are caught up in the dilemma posed by Lewis Mumford when he declared that the past never leaves us and the future is already here. Educators, too, are responding to the same dilemma. Let me use two examples to make my point - The "Back-to-basics" and "Career Education" concepts being pushed as panaceas.

We must redefine basic skills in terms of our changing world and we must teach those essential skills that will contribute to a responsible and productive life in the twenty-first century as well as this last quarter of the twentieth century. I believe these skills should still include reading, writing, arithmetic and personal discipline. They may take different forms and they will certainly have to be taught with different methods that relate to the realities of today's world. The three R's of the McGuffey Reader would be laughable to today's youngsters who spend more hours before the TV tube than they do in school.

Equally incessant as "Back-to-basics" in educational literature is the call for "Career education." Certainly, it is a truism that schools should be designed to train the children of a society to participate in the work of the society. This has been translated by proponents of career education to mean that high school graduates would have a specific salable skill. If pushed hard enough, they will change "skill" to "trade". The manual workers are to be those who do not attend college - some other parents' children. It is potentially impossible for the schools to teach the manual skills needed by our industrial and business complex. A more important objection to turning the public schools into training institutions is that it would deny access to college for those certain children whose family tradition is not towards higher education and thus further stratify our society.

For all of us it is a startling experience, this whole business is being caught in the middle of a tremendous wave of societal change. How can we find the right combination of change and tradition? My answer is to adhere to the democratic process and not be pushed into hasty solutions. This, in most instances, is a very boring, tedious process in which conflicting groups appear, testify, argue relentlessly, and recite statistics. However, this democratic procedure is the only way to be thoughtful and rational in the decision making process.

Reform clearly is in the education air. In facing up to our mutual responsibilities for sensible change I would remind our community of the thesis of the early Chinese philosopher who believed that there were two types of fools. The first who stated, "This is old, therefore it is good"; and the second who was convinced that, "This is new, therefore it is better." The solutions, like the problems, are complex. There are not simplistic answers to the complex problems facing our schools. I am sure, however, that if Westport follows the democratic procedure they will find the right combination of firmness, discretion and sensitivity that will best meet our children's needs.

REVIEW OF THE PAST YEAR

This past school year was both unusual and difficult and on behalf of the Westport School Committee and myself, I would like to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to the entire school community and the people of Westport for their understanding and support.

The water problem at Westport High School was finally resolved. What started as a minor irritant before Thanksgiving of 1982 took more than 13 weeks and \$35,289.62 before we could say, "All's well." I would like to thank all the high school students and staff for their patience and understanding and the Town for their financial support in resolving this problem and particularly Mr. Benjamin H. Hampton our Business Manager who acted as overseer. We now have two excellent wells. However, I can not pass over this without commenting that the situation should have been addressed earlier. If it had, I am sure that the Town would have had expended far less money than we did now. I do not mean to sound like a Monday morning quarterback, but we will be facing other situations like this when we address the maintenance, repair and energy conservation measures we are planning for the Westport Public School buildings (see Business Manager's report).

This year was also the year that one of Westport's finest citizens dedicated to retire from the Westport School Committee - Mrs. Martha W. Kirby, after 24 years of service to the Community of Westport but more particularly for the students of Westport Public Schools!

This was also the year that the Milton E. Earle School closed its doors as a schoolhouse. With the continuing declining enrollment and Proposition 2½, the superintendent recommended and the School Committee voted to close the Earle School. This past fall all the children from the Earle School attended the Westport Elementary School and although the parents were somewhat apprehensive, their children made the transition very smoothly. Meanwhile the Earle

School will now be utilized as the Administrative Building and as one of the elected town officials stated, "It's good to have the School Department back in the Center".

During 1982, the school system went through an extensive research and screening process for a new Middle School Principal, Westport Elementary School Principal and Director of Pupil Personnel Services. I welcome to Westport Dr. Nicholas Balasalle, Mr. Donald Brightman and Dr. Reino Kock to their new assignments, respectively. I also thank Mr. Ronald Marino and Miss Mary Mello for their service to our schools and wish them well in their new careers.

This year was the year in which we finally addressed the issue of the Westport Middle School roof. At the Special Town Meeting in August the Town voted to approve \$215,000 for the remodeling of the Westport Middle School roof which was built in 1970. We are happy to say that even though we started late in November, construction was substantially completed before winter set in.

This past year the Westport Public School System lost the service of four excellent teachers who collectively provided the children of Westport with one hundred years of service. They were Mrs. Gladys Cronan, Mr. Charles Donnelly, Mrs. Elizabeth Moran and Mrs. Jean Parsons. Each one served the children with twenty-five years of faithful and dedicated service and we are eternally grateful for their contribution.

This year the entire staff is working to develop a K-12 curriculum compendia which when completed will include a listing of concepts, content/skills and materials for each grade level. In addition, a concept and skill chart will be provided as a means of identifying the grade or level in which a given concept is introduced, developed, or refined. These compendia will be shared across the grade levels and thus begin a process of a system wide evaluation in order to identify unnecessary duplication, instructional gaps and those skills and concepts needing greater emphasis or reinforcement.

For a school system to ensure that it remains current, it is important that the curriculum development process be an on going one. Once completed these compendias will be reviewed and updated periodically.

During 1982, the School Department has developed a new teacher evaluation instrument which is being utilized for the first time this Fall. The quality of written staff evaluations prepared by department chairmen, assistant principals, and principals have shown some improvement. However much work still needs to be done. It is essential for leadership personnel to be able to document well and discriminate among excellent, good, fair and poor performance. Furthermore, a goal of the Westport Public School System is to retain the best staff members - administrators, teachers, secretaries, custodians, etc. It is my expectation that significant improvement will be made by building level administrators in this area next year.

I want to assure the townspeople that even though the school department went through a very difficult year with the ramification of Proposition 2½, we are providing solid and challenging educational programs within our financial parameters for the students in our school system. Also, I am pleased to report that our staff has continued to display its firm commitment to working with and for young people.

The major priorities which the School Committee and I envision for Fiscal 1984 are:

1. Improve administrative leadership in reference to:
 - a. Academic Program
 - b. Student Discipline
 - c. Staff Supervision

2. Improve cleanliness of all the buildings and on going maintenance procedures.
3. Develop a substantially improved curriculum compendia in all subject matters K-12 consistent with the needs of the student and the demands of the 1980's.
4. Improve the quality of written staff evaluations and improve the response of the School Committee to administration's recommendation resulting therefrom.
5. Continue to improve working relationships with town boards and the Community at large.

Finally I am pleased with the progress being made in the Westport Public Schools, proud of the accomplishments of our pupils and staff and optimistic about the future. There will continue to be difficult times which must be addressed, however, with your continued interest and support we can work cooperatively to make a good school system better.

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT

The water problem at the High School was finally solved with the bringing on line of the outside well and repairing the inside well.

During this past summer we embarked on a "gang" cleaning program of all the schools in the system. We took all the custodians and put them in one building and thoroughly cleaned each building. The end result was that all of the buildings were in good shape for the opening of school. All of the floors were sealed and a floor finish was applied. This now enables the custodial staff to maintain the floors better. This past Christmas vacation, the men were able to bring the floors back to opening day look in a shorter period of time.

We have installed 2 water holding tanks at the Westport Elementary School. This has resulted in a more even flow of water to all parts of the building and a reduction of the rattling of the pipes.

The Macomber gym floor has been repaired and refinished and now looks like a brand new floor.

The transportation system was completely reworked with the saving of 4 buses on the regular runs. At present there are 17 buses transporting the students K-12. Sixteen buses serve the High School, fifteen buses serve the Middle School, and seventeen buses serve the Elementary Schools. The buses now make three runs instead of two and this has allowed us to cut back on the number of vehicles.

We have begun a system of centralized purchasing for custodial supplies. We have been able to save some money on shipping charges, and by buying in bulk we have also realized additional savings. The central distribution of supplies has allowed for better inventory control. This will allow us to save on future purchases.

In the area of energy conservation, we have had all the burners checked and repaired to make them more efficient. Lights are not being used unnecessarily, and our thermostats have been adjusted lower. The No. 2 boiler at the Middle School has been relined to make it operate more efficiently. The new roof at the Middle School will help to reduce Fuel consumption now and in the future.

We are now in the process of joining the Town Hall's computer system. Once this system is fully operational, we will be able to process all of our payrolls easier. It would also allow us to retrieve information more efficiently. Also, we will be able to put all of our other accounting functions into the computer thus giving us up to date information. This will result in better cost control and cost analysis of schools and departments within the school. This all will result in the development of a program budget.

In the area of building maintenance, we are developing a 3 year plan to encompass a complete maintenance and energy conservation update of all our buildings. This plan covers the installation of new energy efficient oil burners, changing over incandescent lamps to energy saving 35 watt florescent lamps, insulation, reworking the HVAC systems, and possible computer monitoring of the heating systems.

This 3 year plan also covers the long neglected general building maintenance that is needed to bring all of the buildings up to a like new condition. This work will encompass the following: painting of the exterior of the Macomber; repair of portions of the High School roof; the subdividing and partitioning of the large English and Science areas at the High School and repairs to the outside of the Middle School.

This is an ambitious project to be sure, but one that is needed and long overdue. The money expended, particularly in energy, is not an expense but in actuality an investment whose rate of return will continue to climb as time goes on. The money saved on energy costs can be then used in the educational process of the students of Westport.
