POOL PASS UPDATE

WITHOUT A PUBLIC POOL IN THE CITY, WE RELY ON OUR NEIGHBORS TO PROVIDE THAT PIECE OF RECREATION AND THEN OFFER A SUBSIDY OR REIMBURSEMENT FOR OUR RESIDENTS.

THE INFORMATION PROVIDED BY THE CITY OF WILLOUGHBY RECREATION IS AS FOLLOWS: OSBORNE POOL WILL BE THE POOL AVAILABLE TO WILLOUGHBY HILLS RESIDENTS, OPENING ON SATURDAY, MAY 29 UNTIL AUGUST 15. AFTER THAT DATE, THE POOL WILL BE OPEN ON WEEKENDS ONLY (NOON TO 5PM) UNTIL LABOR DAY. POOL PASSES WILL COST \$125 PER PERSON AND WILLOUGHBY HILLS WILL OFFER A REFUND OF \$25 PER PASS TO INDIVIDUALS, OR \$35 PER PASS TO SENIORS (AGE 60 AND OVER). RESIDENTS SIMPLY PROVIDE A COPY OF THE RECEIPT PAID TO THE CITY OF WILLOUGHBY AND WILL RECEIVE REIMBURSEMENT, AS NOTED.

WE ARE STILL ATTEMPTING TO WORK WITH THE YMCA FOR POOL PRIVILEGES AND WILL KEEP YOU POSTED AS THAT INFORMATION BECOMES AVAILABLE. IF AVAILABLE, RESIDENTS HAVE THE REIMBURSEMENT OPTION FOR ONLY ONE OF TWO POOL OPTIONS.

A NOTE FROM MAYOR ANDY GARDNER:

May 16 to May 23 marks "National Public Works Week", which includes such services as street maintenance, snow removal, sewer utilities, recycling, refuse, forestry and other services that are so vital to our municipality.

And it is so fitting that Monday, May 17 marks the beginning of our road striping program, which is city-wide and will take a few weeks to complete, with crews working at night to reduce traffic disturbance. They will be using cones and signage to control traffic.

The fourth and final phase of the painting of the Pleasant Valley Road Bridge is underway, and hopefully finished by the weekend.

The City has been given the dates of early June and lasting until late July (barring any delays from weather or unforeseen circumstances) to begin the asphalt pavement project on Alan Drive, Diane Court and Meadowbrook Drive. We look forward to this project that should help the residents and motorists in that area.

Council Ordinance 2021-35 will allow the City to move forward with the Dodd Road slope repair project. We will report updates on this project as they are relayed to us by the contractor.

Republic Services, our trash and recycle contractor, has reminded us that Republic Services will be closed on Monday, May 31 in observance of Memorial Day. Services will resume on Tuesday, June 1 and will be running one day behind for the rest of the week.

Finally, our Service Department needs to be recognized for the fine job they do all year.

POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS: FROM Police Chief Matt Naegele

It is with great sadness that we share the news that retired former Chief of Police George Malec passed away in the early morning hours of May 11th in the presence of loved ones. Chief Malec honorably served the City of Willoughby Hills from 1965-2000 as a Patrolman, Sergeant & his last 13 years of service as Chief of Police. He was 86 years old at the time of his passing. When George Malec started with the police department times were very different. In fact, in the early days of his career George drove the ambulance on night shift (which was really just a station wagon). The city, as well as the police department, went through a massive transition over the course of George's 34 years on the job. Willoughby Hills transitioned from a small country town to a bustling suburb, and George was there to see it all through. Through the course of his career as Chief, George served in several capacities to include:

Vice-President & President - Lake County Association of Chiefs of Police, Ohio Chiefs of Police Ethics Board, and the Lake County Narcotics Executive Board. The Willoughby Hills Police Department extends our deepest sympathies to George's family, and offer our thanks for his years of honorable service to this community. Governor DeWine Announces Vaccine Incentives, End Date for Health Orders is June 2, 2021

May 12, 2021

(COLUMBUS, Ohio)—Ohio Governor Mike DeWine on Wednesday announced a series of statewide drawings to provide incentives to Ohioans to get a COVID-19 vaccination. With wide access to the life-saving vaccine to help Ohioans safe, Governor DeWine also announced that most COVID-19 health orders would be removed on June 2nd. DeWine made the announcements during a statewide address to Ohioans Wednesday evening.

"For a year, Ohioans have made sacrifices to save lives and keep our state moving forward. What you have done has really worked! And now, we have a powerful weapon that is almost 100 percent effective in beating the virus," Governor DeWine said in his remarks. "Simply put, the vaccine is stronger and better than medical experts ever imagined. And now, everyone 12 and over can use it to protect themselves -- to put an invisible shield of protection around themselves. Everyone can now control their own health—their own destiny."

Expiration of Health Orders

Governor DeWine also announced that he has asked the Ohio Department of Health to remove most pandemic health orders on June 2nd. The timeline will allow any Ohioan who has not yet received a COVID-19 vaccine to obtain one to protect themselves and others before the lifting of coronavirus mitigation protocols.

"It is time to end the health orders. It's been a year. You've followed the protocols. You've done what we've asked. You've bravely fought this virus," said Governor DeWine. "And now, our cases are down, and we have a tested and proven weapon with the vaccine that all Ohioans 12 and over can utilize."

Measures being removed will include facial covering protocols, social distancing guidelines, and capacity restrictions for indoor and outdoor events.

Governor DeWine announced that any pandemic health orders that would remain solely relate to either 1.) nursing homes and assisted living facilities, which will also to have federal safety protocols, and 2.) data collection related to the pandemic.

Vaccine Incentives/Statewide Drawings

In an effort to increase the number of Ohioans who currently have not taken a COVID-19 vaccine to get vaccinated, Governor DeWine announced a series of statewide drawings to help incentivize vaccinations.

Ohioans under the age of 18 who are eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine will be entered into a drawing for a four-year full scholarship to any of Ohio's state colleges and universities, including full tuition, room, and board.

Ohioans aged 18 and older will be entered into a weekly drawing with a prize of up to \$1 million.

A total of five weekly drawings for each prize will take place, with the first winners being announced on May 26th. Winners must have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine by the date of the respective drawing.

The drawings will be administered by the Ohio Department of Health, with technical assistance from the Ohio Lottery Commission, and will be funded through existing allocations to the Ohio Department of Health of unexpended coronavirus relief funds. Further details & contest rules forthcoming.
