

FIRE & POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

This past Saturday marked the 64th anniversary of the tragic flooding that occurred here in Willoughby Hills that claimed the lives of five people. On January 21, 1959, heavy rains along with melting snow combined to create significant flooding of the Chagrin River warranting the Fire Department and Civil Defense to issue a warning to residents living in the flood-prone areas of the City. In an attempt to rescue a family that chose to remain in their home on Milann Drive, a boat overturned and dumped the family and their would-be rescuers into the raging icy river. While able to cling to trees for some time, one by one they were swept away to their deaths; their bodies found the next day along the riverbank. Perishing that night were three members of the Peterson Family (Douglas, Virginia, and Dorothy Peterson) along with two rescuers: Raymond Kifer and Hamilton Schweitzer, both Willoughby Hills residents and members of the Civil Defense. The sixth occupant of the rescue boat, Carl Hardee, a member of the US Coast Guard from Fairport Station, survived.

A memorial marker remains to this day outside the Fire Department honoring the sacrifice made by Mr. Kifer & Mr. Schweitzer that night and stands as a constant reminder of our duty to protect the community from not just fire but all hazards.

SNOW SHOVELING SAFETY TIPS:

- **Be heart conscious.** If you have a history of heart problems and are currently inactive, it's best to speak with your health care provider before shoveling. Additionally, don't shovel while smoking, eating or after consuming caffeine; this may place extra stress on your heart.
- **Dress Warm.** Wear several layers of clothing. You can always remove a layer if needed.
- **Drink plenty of water.** Remaining hydrated during cold-weather months is just as important as during warm-weather months.
- Warm up your arms and legs. Stretch your arms and legs before beginning to shovel. You are less likely to injure muscles when they are warm.
- Take it slow. Pace yourself and take breaks if you need to. Safety is more important than speed.
- **Protect your back.** Bend at the knees, not the back. Lift with your legs bent, stand with your feet hip-width apart for balance and keep the shovel close to your body. Also, don't pick up too much snow at once; use a small shovel or fill up a large shovel no more than half way.
- Shovel while snow is fresh. Freshly fallen snow is lighter than snow that has started melting.
- **Listen to your body.** This is the most important snow shoveling tip. If something feels abnormal, or if you're tired, it's time to stop.
