MAYOR GARDNER'S REPORT

I wanted to share some great news with everyone this Friday. First, a special honor for two members of our Police Department and then exciting news for the redevelopment of The Shoppes of Willoughby Hills.

The Lake County Chiefs of Police present the Life Saving Award to police officers from Lake County who have performed an act in the line of duty that, through disregard of personal safety or prompt and alert action, resulted in saving a life, or a valiant effort to that end. I want to congratulate Sergeant Shannon Vachet and Officer R.J. Harmon from our Police Department as well as Officer Nick Merrifield from the Wickliffe Police Department who received Life Saving Awards last night. Sgt. Vachet and Officers Harmon and Merrifield were nominated for the award by Police Chief Naegele for their efforts to save the life of a suicidal individual last July here in Willoughby Hills. We are very fortunate to have Sgt. Vachet and Officer Harmon serving our community and, once again, are fortunate to benefit from the assistance of our neighboring departments, as was the case with Officer Merrifield providing mutual aid in this critical situation.

Last night, the City's Planning Commission gave conditional approval to plans for the re-development of the former Marc's/LaSalle Furniture building at the Shoppes of Willoughby Hills. Plans can be found on the City's website, or by clicking here. This redevelopment will include up to four new national retailers including Burlington (f/k/a Burlington Coat Factory), Ross Dress for Less and five Below. These stores will join Sheetz to bring exciting new shopping opportunities to the West end of our City. A potential fourth retailer is anticipated to join this line up and will likely be presented at a future Planning Commission meeting. Other potential tenants of the buildings and parcels along Chardon Road in the area may also be presented at a future Planning Commission Meeting. Congratulations and thanks to Shoppes of Willoughby Hills owner J. Scott Scheel and his team, including former City Council President Ray Somich, for their vision to reinvigorate the corner of Chardon and Bishop Roads. Thanks also to City Engineer Pete DiFranco and Asst. Law Director Tom Lobe for their work on behalf of the City to assist to ownership team as this project gets started.

On October 5, 2023, law enforcement officials began issuing citations for violations of Ohio's distracted driving law, which took effect on April 4, 2023.

With limited exceptions, anything that involves using, holding, or supporting a device while driving is prohibited. This includes:

- Dialing a phone number
- Sending a text message
- Updating or browsing social media
- Video calls
- Browsing the internet
- Watching videos
- Playing games, and
- Recording or streaming videos

Drivers over the age of 18 can make or receive calls using hands-free devices. Drivers under the age of 18 are still restricted from using devices in any way, including using hands-free features. The law includes limited exceptions for first responders, utility workers, and drivers holding a phone to their ear for phone conversations if the call is started or stopped with a single touch or swipe.




Deer Management Update:

On September 28th Council adopted <u>Ordinance 2023-041</u> which allows white-tailed deer archery hunting within the City. **This ordinance will go into effect on October 28th, meaning no hunting will be allowed until that date**.

Permit packets will be available on the City's website Monday, October 9th. There will also be a deer permitting evening at City Hall on Tuesday night at 6:00PM where packets will be available (including hunting and retrieving forms) and a proficiency test can be taken. Completed packets can also be turned in that night.

Officer training day was Tuesday! Traffic stops factor prominently in our agency's recurrent training scenarios. Traffic stops are one of the most common activities for law enforcement officers on patrol. They are the epitome of proactive, self-initiated policing. They are also, however, sometimes extremely dangerous. Officers can be struck by passing vehicles, dragged by a vehicle fleeing the stop, assaulted physically either with personal weapons (fists and feet) or by weapons up to and including firearms. So today, our in-house instructors put officers through the paces of high-risk stops, defensive tactics and varying scenarios to sharpen our officers' skills.

Traffic Safety Enforcement Program

Each year, too many families are affected by crashes caused by speeding. Sadly, the victims of traffic crashes are often occupants of other vehicles who have fallen victim to speeding and careless driving.

Improving traffic safety for residents and visitors is a strategic goal of the Willoughby Hills Police Department. That is why I am so pleased to report that we are implementing a photo enforcement system in Willoughby Hills. The state of the art system is designed to help us encourage safer driving habits and save lives.

Our police officers cannot enforce traffic laws everywhere, all the time. The new enforcement system will allow us to enforce traffic laws in a safer way for the officer and the violator. There are no upfront costs to the taxpayers and, over time, violators will fund this program.

I encourage you to respect the rules of the road – help keep yourself and your neighbors safe and sound. Join me in supporting our new traffic enforcement system.

Question & Answer



There will be a warning period for the first 30 days, after the program begins.

Is speeding a public safety concern?

According to the IIHS, speeding is a factor in one-third of all fatal crashes in the U.S., killing more than 10,000 people per year. In addition, according to the NHTSA, speed-related crashes cost the U.S. economy approximately \$40 billion per year.

How will the new Speed Enforcement Program work to protect lives in Willoughby Hills?

This Traffic Enforcement Program will protect lives by reminding motorists to slowdown and obey speed laws. Automated safety cameras will identify motorists who are breaking the law by exceeding the speed limits. The registered owner of the violating vehicle will receive a traffic citation in the mail.

What systems will the police department be using?

The Willoughby Hills Police Department will be utilizing handheld and fixed location photo enforcement equipment. In school zones, we have set up fixed location cameras to capture vehicles traveling at an unsafe speed in an effort to keep our children safer. These will be operational only on school days during school hours. The handheld equipment will be used by certified police officers in multiple locations along the interstate and other roadways in the community. The system will be used to identify and ticket speeding vehicles in a manner that is potentially safer for the officer and occupants of the vehicle.

Does someone double-check the evidence?

Sworn police officers will determine violations. Our vendor will do the initial screenings of information for photo and data quality. Officers will review every violation to verify vehicle information and ensure the vehicle is in violation. These officers will utilize the same standards for photo enforcement as they would with a standard violation event. Upon officer approval, a citation will be mailed to the vehicle owner. The owner will then have the right to pay the citation or exercise a contest process.

What are the Traffic Enforcement fines in the City of Willoughby Hills?

Speed Over	Fine Amount Owed	Fine if in a Construction or School Zone
1-19 MPH	\$150.00	\$150.00
20-29 MPH	\$200.00	\$200.00
30+ MPH	\$300.00	\$300.00

Are automated enforcement cameras legal?

Yes. Courts have ruled in favor of a municipality's right to use automated enforcement technology in a fair and judicious manner.

Will people know when they are entering a School enforcement zone?

Yes. Signs will be posted at every enforced zone, warning drivers that photo enforcement is in use ahead.

Can I challenge my citation?

Yes. Each citation ticket contains detailed information on how to exercise your due process rights and contest the citation.

What about privacy? Will I be photographed in my vehicle?

No. Vehicles following traffic laws are not photographed. Additionally, the driver is not visible on the citation.



SNOW PLOW REGISTRATION

June 1st began the new year for snow plow registration. Registration IS required if you plan to remove snow from private driveways or private parking areas in the City during the 2023-2024 winter season. Cost to register is \$25.00 for the first vehicle and \$5.00 for each additional vehicle. Registration is required annually (expiring May 31, 2024) and there is no prorating of registration fees.
