MAYOR GARDNER'S REPORT

Happy Friday Willoughby Hills,

This week Fire Chief Rob Gandee, Lt. Lou DiMattia and FF/PMs Steve Lucic and Zach Martin traveled to Spartan Fire & Emergency Apparatus in Sioux Falls, South Dakota to inspect our recently completed Fire Engine. Chief, Lou, Steve and Zach reported that the Engine passed inspection (pictures on page 4). The new Engine will now be sent to our Fire Equipment Dealer, Johnson Fire Equipment Solutions in Wellston, Ohio, where equipment shelves and racking as well as identification decals will be installed on the Engine. Following that, the Engine will be delivered to the City where our Fire Department will train operating the new engine, install and transfer the necessary equipment to the Engine for operations in the City and then, place the Engine in service. As you may recall, this engine was ordered in March of last year after the Fire Department worked with Spartan and Johnson to design the engine to meet the needs of our City. The Engine features a stainless steel and galvanized steel undercarriage and fuel tank to be more resistant to corrosion, a 750 Gallon water tank to have sufficient water to fight car fires on the highway where hydrants are not accessible, a Lifepak unit and drug box for medical first responses, enough hose to connect the Engine to hydrants, even down our longest driveways, new state-of-the-art fans and scene lighting and set of new extrication tools to assist victims trapped as a result of motor vehicle accidents. In addition to Chief Gandee, Lt. DiMattia, FF/PM's Lucic and Martin, I would like to thank all of the members of our Fire Department for their assistance in this process, Finance Directors Frank Brichacek (retired) and Bruce Scott for their work in connection with the financing of the Engine and our teams at Spartan and Johnson for their hard work designing and building the Engine for our City. Of course, I also need to thank all of the members of City Council for their support of the Administration and the Fire Department in the financing and procurement of the Engine. It should serve all of us well for the next two decades. We will be holding a reception and traditional "Push-In and First Wash" ceremony when the Engine is placed in service. Details will be in future newsletters as we plan to place the Engine in service in mid-December.

Also in the Fire Department, Congratulations to FF/PM Bob Vencl on his promotion to Lieutenant where he takes the place of retired Lieutenant Patty Heller. Bob has been a full time member of the Department for almost 10 years. Bob is a member of the East Tech Technical Rescue Team, has been responsible for the Department's Turnout Gear program and has a passion for training new firefighters.

Don't Forget that our second Electronics Recycling Day for 2023 is tomorrow, from 9:00 AM until 12:00 Noon in the City Hall Parking Lot. Please see the information flyer on Page 3 below for details. Most items are accepted free of charge, but there are charges for CRT Monitors and TVs (\$20 each) and Printers (\$10 each). 


Fall Craft Show 2023

Traffic Safety Enforcement Program

Each year, too many families are affected by crashes caused by speeding. Sadly, the victims of traffic crashes are often occupants of other vehicles who have fallen victim to speeding and careless driving.

Improving traffic safety for residents and visitors is a strategic goal of the Willoughby Hills Police Department. That is why I am so pleased to report that we are implementing a photo enforcement system in Willoughby Hills. The state of the art system is designed to help us encourage safer driving habits and save lives. Our police officers cannot enforce traffic laws everywhere, all the time. The new enforcement system will allow us to enforce traffic laws in a safer way for the officer and the violator. There are no upfront costs to the taxpayers and, over time, violators will fund this program.

I encourage you to respect the rules of the road – help keep yourself and your neighbors safe and sound. Join me in supporting our new traffic enforcement system.

Question & Answer



There will be a warning period for the first 30 days, after the program begins.

Is speeding a public safety concern?

According to the IIHS, speeding is a factor in one-third of all fatal crashes in the U.S., killing more than 10,000 people per year. In addition, according to the NHTSA, speed-related crashes cost the U.S. economy approximately \$40 billion per year.

How will the new Speed Enforcement Program work to protect lives in Willoughby Hills?

This Traffic Enforcement Program will protect lives by reminding motorists to slowdown and obey speed laws. Automated safety cameras will identify motorists who are breaking the law by exceeding the speed limits. The registered owner of the violating vehicle will receive a traffic citation in the mail.

What systems will the police department be using?

The Willoughby Hills Police Department will be utilizing handheld and fixed location photo enforcement equipment. In school zones, we have set up fixed location cameras to capture vehicles traveling at an unsafe speed in an effort to keep our children safer. These will be operational only on school days during school hours. The handheld equipment will be used by certified police officers in multiple locations along the interstate and other roadways in the community. The system will be used to identify and ticket speeding vehicles in a manner that is potentially safer for the officer and occupants of the vehicle.

Does someone double-check the evidence?

Sworn police officers will determine violations. Our vendor will do the initial screenings of information for photo and data quality. Officers will review every violation to verify vehicle information and ensure the vehicle is in violation. These officers will utilize the same standards for photo enforcement as they would with a standard violation event. Upon officer approval, a citation will be mailed to the vehicle owner. The owner will then have the right to pay the citation or exercise a contest process.

What are the Traffic Enforcement fines in the City of Willoughby Hills?

Speed Over	Fine Amount Owed	Fine if in a Construction or School Zone
1-19 MPH	\$150.00	\$150.00
20-29 MPH	\$200.00	\$200.00
30+ MPH	\$300.00	\$300.00

Are automated enforcement cameras legal?

Yes. Courts have ruled in favor of a municipality's right to use automated enforcement technology in a fair and judicious manner.

Will people know when they are entering a School enforcement zone?

Yes. Signs will be posted at every enforced zone, warning drivers that photo enforcement is in use ahead.

Can I challenge my citation?

Yes. Each citation ticket contains detailed information on how to exercise your due process rights and contest the citation.

What about privacy? Will I be photographed in my vehicle?

No. Vehicles following traffic laws are not photographed. Additionally, the driver is not visible on the citation.






Deer Management Update:

On September 28th Council adopted <u>Ordinance 2023-041</u> which allows white-tailed deer archery hunting within the City. **This ordinance will go into effect on October 28th, meaning no hunting will be allowed until that date**.

Permit packets are available on the City's website as well as in the lobby of City Hall. Completed packets can also be turned in to the Police Department. **There will be a \$25 fee for every permit issued.**
