MAYOR GARDNER'S REPORT

Good Afternoon Willoughby Hills. I hope that everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving and is ready for another very busy holiday season.

I want to express my deepest appreciation to the many residents and Marc's customers who donated food to this year's Police Department Food Drive. St. Noel's has reported that 1,747 pounds of food (almost 500 pounds more than last year) was delivered to the food pantry as a result of this group's generosity and the efforts of the Police Department to collect the donations. Special Thanks to Post Commander Dave Broadwater and VFW Post 4358 for their generous donation of \$2,000 to the food drive. Thanks to Chief Naegele, Capt. Leonbruno and Officer Continenza for coordinating the drive and collecting the donations.

Sunday is our annual WinterFest and Toy Drive. Special thanks to Emerald Glen Title for stopping by this week with a very generous donation to help us start filling the ambulance for Toys for Tots. I hope that everyone will come to the Fire Station between 5:00 and 6:30 P.M. and bring a toy (or more). As I noted above, all toys collected will go to the Toys for Tots Holiday campaign. If you bring a toy to Winterfest, you will be entered in a raffle for one of many gift cards that have been donated by local businesses and restaurants. Winterfest will also feature a visit from Santa, the WHFD Bounce House, snacks and performances by the Willoughby South High Holiday Band. If you can't make it to WinterFest, donation bins are available in the Community Center Lobby, City Hall Lobby, Fire Department Lobby and in the Police Department Lobby (enter through the entrance at the rear of City Hall, this one is available 24/7).

Next weekend's Breakfast with Santa is filling up fast! If you haven't had a chance to register, contact the Recreation Department ASAP. Details for registration appear later in this Newsletter. Also attached is the registration form for our Holiday Lights Contest. Please consider entering individually or with your neighborhood! Judging will be in 2 weeks. Next week we will post the routes for the 2023 Willoughby Hills Parade of Lights with Santa (and the Grinch). The Holiday Parade will be December 18-21 with a make-up night on December 22 should we have inclement weather or an emergency in the City that delays Santa and the Grinch from completing their rounds.

I want to complement the hard work by the members of our Service Department plowing the roads during this week's Lake Effect storm and for their hard work collecting leaves throughout the City. The leaves fell in bunches this Fall and they did a great job keeping up. They are now back to finishing off their last passes through the City.

The Police Department's photo-enforcement program will kick-off on Monday. There will be a thirty (30) day warning period. A ticket may be issued if you are in excess of 10 miles per hour over the 20 mile per hour speed limit in our School Zones (Chardon Road in front of the School of Innovation and SOM Center Road in front of Cornerstone Christian Academy) during restricted hours. Photo enforcement will also be used on Interstate 90 and Interstate 271 if you exceed 15 miles per hour over the posted speed limits. As noted by Chiefs Collins and Naegele, the speeds on our highways have been increasing steadily since 2020. Please drive within the posted speed limits and help keep our community safe for everyone.

Finally, I want to welcome Janet Feld, Bernadette Blumel, Renee Viola, and Scott Cameron to our Recreation Commission! It is great to add some folks to this group. I hope to see many of you at Winterfest this Sunday.

It's that time of year to deck the halls, but please have fire sense when decorating your Christmas tree.

Here are a few facts from NFPA:

- Almost one-third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, they are more likely to be serious when they do occur.
- A heat source too close to the tree causes more than one in every five of the fires.

Enjoy your holiday decorating; having fire sense may even keep the Grinch away!

Christmas Tree Safety



As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.



PICKING THE TREE

- Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.



PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.



LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.



After Christmas

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

Check with your local community to find a recycling program.

Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

City Leaf Pickup

The City's Service Department has begun leaf pickup and will continue to pickup until the first heavy snowfall. Please note the following:

- Keep leaves within 8 feet of the road.
- Do not block the ditch.
- **Leaves only** (no grass, twigs, or branches).
- **Please slow down** when you see our Leaf Crew out and pass with caution.

The Service Department would like to remind residents that snow plow season is coming up quickly and it's a perfect time to check that mailboxes are secure and not rotted. The City will not be fixing mailboxes unless the plow strikes them. Plow shields are recommended.

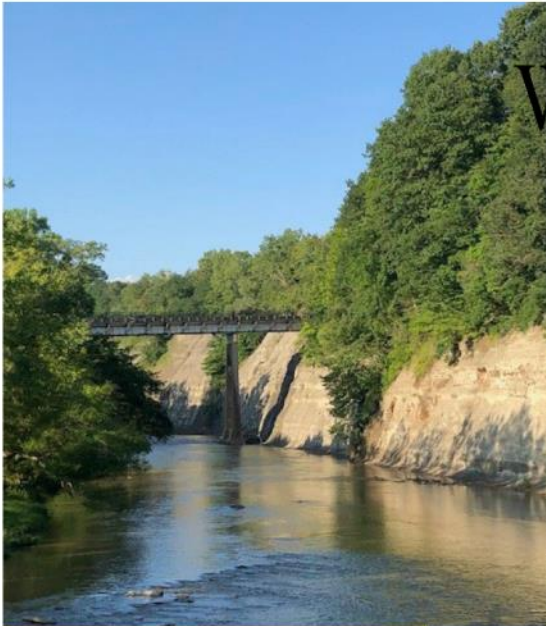

Traffic Safety Enforcement Program

Each year, too many families are affected by crashes caused by speeding. Sadly, the victims of traffic crashes are often occupants of other vehicles who have fallen victim to speeding and careless driving.

Improving traffic safety for residents and visitors is a strategic goal of the Willoughby Hills Police Department. That is why I am so pleased to report that we are implementing a photo enforcement system in Willoughby Hills. The state of the art system is designed to help us encourage safer driving habits and save lives.

Our police officers cannot enforce traffic laws everywhere, all the time. The new enforcement system will allow us to enforce traffic laws in a safer way for the officer and the violator. There are no upfront costs to the taxpayers and, over time, violators will fund this program.

I encourage you to respect the rules of the road – help keep yourself and your neighbors safe and sound. Join me in supporting our new traffic enforcement system.

Question & Answer



There will be a warning period for the first 30 days, after the program begins.

Is speeding a public safety concern?

According to the IIHS, speeding is a factor in one-third of all fatal crashes in the U.S., killing more than 10,000 people per year. In addition, according to the NHTSA, speed-related crashes cost the U.S. economy approximately \$40 billion per year.

How will the new Speed Enforcement Program work to protect lives in Willoughby Hills?

This Traffic Enforcement Program will protect lives by reminding motorists to slowdown and obey speed laws. Automated safety cameras will identify motorists who are breaking the law by exceeding the speed limits. The registered owner of the violating vehicle will receive a traffic citation in the mail.

What systems will the police department be using?

The Willoughby Hills Police Department will be utilizing handheld and fixed location photo enforcement equipment. In school zones, we have set up fixed location cameras to capture vehicles traveling at an unsafe speed in an effort to keep our children safer. These will be operational only on school days during school hours. The handheld equipment will be used by certified police officers in multiple locations along the interstate and other roadways in the community. The system will be used to identify and ticket speeding vehicles in a manner that is potentially safer for the officer and occupants of the vehicle.

Does someone double-check the evidence?

Sworn police officers will determine violations. Our vendor will do the initial screenings of information for photo and data quality. Officers will review every violation to verify vehicle information and ensure the vehicle is in violation. These officers will utilize the same standards for photo enforcement as they would with a standard violation event. Upon officer approval, a citation will be mailed to the vehicle owner. The owner will then have the right to pay the citation or exercise a contest process.

What are the Traffic Enforcement fines in the City of Willoughby Hills?

Speed Over	Fine Amount Owed	Fine if in a Construction or School Zone
1-19 MPH	\$150.00	\$150.00
20-29 MPH	\$200.00	\$200.00
30+ MPH	\$300.00	\$300.00

Are automated enforcement cameras legal?

Yes. Courts have ruled in favor of a municipality's right to use automated enforcement technology in a fair and judicious manner.

Will people know when they are entering a School enforcement zone?

Yes. Signs will be posted at every enforced zone, warning drivers that photo enforcement is in use ahead.

Can I challenge my citation?

Yes. Each citation ticket contains detailed information on how to exercise your due process rights and contest the citation.

What about privacy? Will I be photographed in my vehicle?

No. Vehicles following traffic laws are not photographed. Additionally, the driver is not visible on the citation.

WHISPER HELP FOR OUR SENIORS:

Several residents have reached out to get information about the City's WHISPER Program, which was developed in 2009 to help our seniors with everyday tasks. The City website has the complete booklet for the policies and procedures of the program, to include a list of various outside and inside tasks that are offered. Here is a brief list of the indoor tasks listed:

Dusting, vacuuming, general cleaning, indoor/outdoor window washing, indoor minor painting, indoor minor repairs, technology assistance (computers, printers, etc.) and indoor battery/bulb changes.

In order to receive services, the resident must complete the Service Application (on the City website or email whseniors@yahoo.com for an application to be emailed to you). The Application is then sent to the WHISPER Facilitator, Karen Mehollin (City Communications Supervisor), Willoughby Hills City Hall, 35405 Chardon Road, Willoughby Hills, OH 44094. Some of the tasks are reviewed before the WHISPER Committee while others are assigned to volunteers, all of whom have been background checked (over the age of 18 only!) according to the WHISPER guidelines.

The Willoughby Hills Senior Board will be reaching out to the WHISPER Committee for a special project to help replace some address numbers around the community that are difficult to read or are absent. You may recall, Fire Chief Gandee presented this issue at our April Senior Potluck. It would be nice to get this taken care of in the new year. We will be reaching out to residents who are in need of this service once the request is approved by the Committee. We will keep you posted.

In the meantime, feel free to use the program that was developed to help our seniors! Reach out if you have any further questions or concerns!

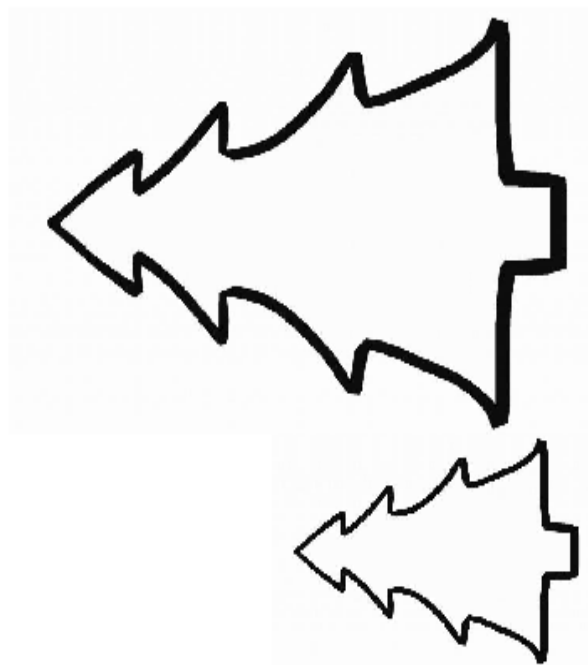
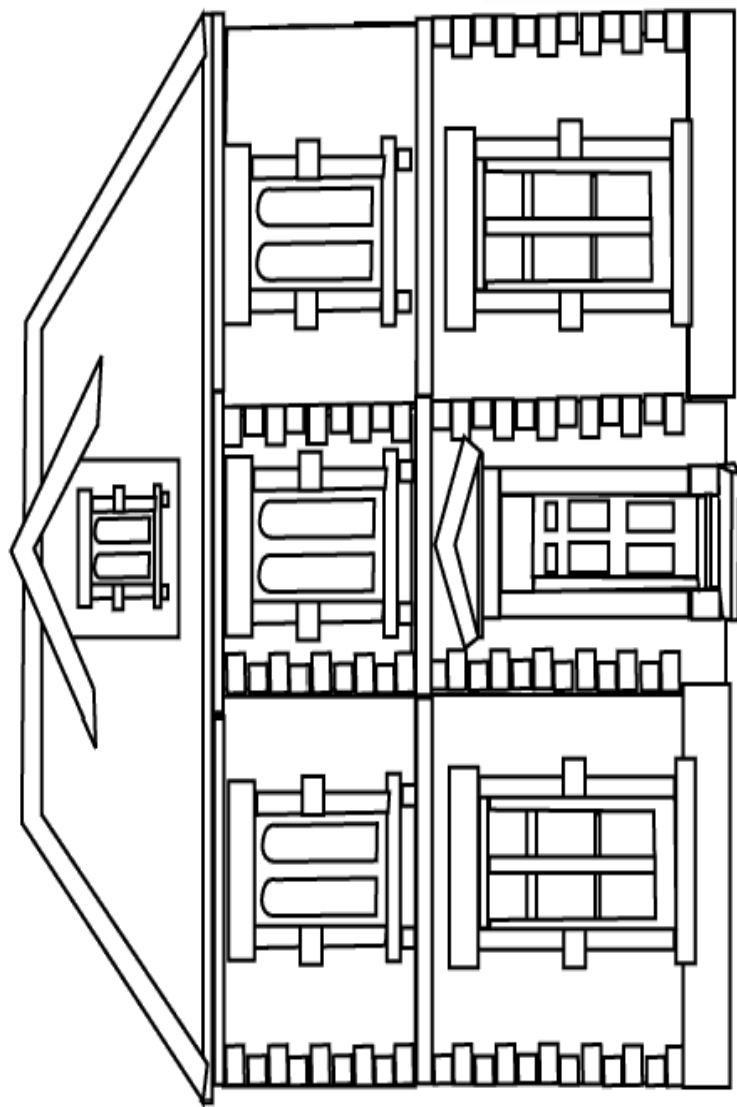
